Lengthy Locks Lost

'Beatles Haircuts' Are Like Out

"Beatles haircuts" along the Orange Coast are conspicuous by their complete absence — at least in high schools.

Lengthy locks on teenage boys have fallen victim to the barber's clipper with the ringing of school bells and the educators' unanimous admonitions that boys in their schools must be distinguishable from girls.

Principals and other administrators in the seven coastal area high schools as well as Mater Dei High in Santa Ana report that students not only are conforming but cooperating with rules of dress and grooming.

"The beaches are one thing, school is another," observed Costa Mesa High School Principal John McGowan. "We've always had

a policy that boys should look clean and neat. No mode of dress which distracts attention in class is permitted, and this includes any extreme boys' hair styles."

Dr. Paul Berger, vice

principal of curriculum and instruction at Huntington Beach High School, reported little problem at his school. "We sent about four or five boys home the first day and they came back

Victim Reported Critical

A 21-year-old Costa Mesa woman was arrested on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon early today following the near-fatal stabbing of a 32-year-old Costa Mesa photographer.

Shirley Anne Baird, a brunette bank teller, told Costa Mesa police Lt. Glenn Walker that she didn't remember how it happened.

She said she only remembered grabbing a kitchen knife with 8-inch blade "to keep him away" after he hit her in the mouth, giving her a swollen lip, Walker reported.

CRITICAL
The victim, Vincent J. Ferguson, 2565 Orange Ave., was listed in critical condition at Hoag Memorial Hospital this morning following surgery for a stab wound in the abdomen. A hospital spokesman indicated he suffered a perforation of the bowel and lost a lot of blood.

Ferguson was driven to Hoag by a neighbor, James Cronkrite, 2563 Orange Ave., when Miss Baird wrote him following the 1 a.m. stabbing. Hoag notified police, who then arrested Miss Baird at the hospital.

'ALL THE TIME'
Miss Baird, who also gave her address as 2565 Orange Ave., and Ferguson were reported to "fight all the time" by Cronkrite.

Police have not determined what the argument was about.

GI Found Shot Near Disneyland

ANAHEIM — A 20-year-old soldier was found shot to death in an excavation ditch at the site of additions to the Disneyland Hotel early this morning.

A second soldier, Lawrence Stanko, 22, is being questioned by Anaheim police in connection with the shooting of Ronald E. Wood, 45th Signal Battalion, Ft. Huachuca, Ariz.

Police report they received a call from a Mr. Tavern, who identified himself as an attorney, shortly after 3 a.m. Tavern said Stanko had just informed him of the "accidental shooting" of his friend about an hour earlier, and he was relaying the message to police.

Stanko told investigators he is a member of the same Army battalion as the dead man.

Prelates See Hope In Visit

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Ecumenical Council bishops looked today for Pope Paul's U.N. trip to bring Roman Catholicism closer to the problems of the peace-hungry modern world.

The 2,200 prelates at the council went into their weekend recess as the Pope's Monday morning departure for the

All three major television networks (Channels 2, 4 and 7 in Los Angeles) will cover Pope Paul's arrival in New York City Monday continuously from 6 a.m. until 3:15 p.m.

United Nations headquarters in New York grew closer.

Despite the recess, there was no letup in the hectic pace that has marked this fourth and final council session since it began Sept. 14.

The prelates were preparing for prayer and a special Mass in St. Peter's Basilica on Monday morning. The Pope will then be flying by jet over the Atlantic to U.N. headquarters in New York.

Now the drafters must revise the text to take into account the numerous criticisms leveled against it from conservative and progressive factions in the council. Neither group was satisfied with the text — for different reasons.

Conservatives generally wanted stronger statements to affirm traditional Church teachings on family planning.

In one case, the woman called was told she could pick up a brass pitcher. The other was told a color TV set, or a bracelet, was waiting for her. She said she was offered a choice, but decided to check and be sure.

The Blue Chip Store employees said they had never heard of any action of this type before. One theorized that perhaps someone was trying to get people out of their houses in order to burglarize them.

Demonstrators Hit Taylor With Paint

LOS ALTOS HILLS (UPI) — Maxwell Taylor, former ambassador to South Vietnam, was splattered with red paint last night as he answered questions of pickets following a speech at Foothill College.

The paint struck Taylor's gray suit in a large splotch above the breast pocket. Reportedly "very disturbed," the former envoy canceled a news conference and left for his hotel.

A can of paint hurled from the crowd also splashed the moderator and several of the pickets who crowded about the platform from which Taylor spoke.

NO ARRESTS
The identity of the paint thrower could not be determined and there were no arrests.

Officials believed the students demonstrators, who were protesting his speech, were the target of the paint thrower rather than the ambassador himself.

Only minutes before, Taylor had said the Vietnamese war was "entering a new phase."

The officials pointed out that in the past anti-war and civil rights pickets had been doused with red paint by persons who disagreed with their views.

Viet Cong Mine Kills 8 Cadets

SAIGON (UPI) — Communists exploded an anti-personnel mine outside a police training center today, showering lunch-hour crowds with razor-sharp fragments.

The blast killed eight police cadets in a column marching to noon mess and three children who were riding past on bicycles. Five other persons were wounded.

A second mine, timed to explode moments later as rescuers rushed to the aid of victims of the first blast, failed to go off.

CENTER

The explosion occurred outside the Cong Hoa stadium in Cholon, Saigon's Chinatown. Police use the stadium as a center for cadet training.

The bomb — apparently a Red version of the deadly U.S. Claymore mine — was attached to a lamp post. Police cordoned off the area while they dismantled the second mine.

In air action today, two Air Force Skylanders supporting a road-clearing action north of Qui Nhon collided in flight and crashed. Both pilots were reported killed.

At the same time, it was reported that the air-mobile U.S. 1st Cavalry Division has been placed on combat alert following reports of a massive Communist buildup 295 miles northeast of Saigon.

Mrs. Oswald To Russia?

DALLAS (UPI) — Margaret Oswald, mother of presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, said she probably will go to Russia next spring to get more details about her son's life in the Soviet Union.

Mrs. Oswald said she planned to make the trip on money she will get from the auction two days ago of letters she once received from her son. The information may aid her attempt to prove her son did not kill President John F. Kennedy, she said.

"The Russians haven't turned over everything to the United States," she said. "I thought if I went to Russia I might be more successful."

Outbreak Of Fires Hit State

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A new outbreak of major brush and grass fires hit the state today, blackening 13,500 acres of land.

But the latest rash of blazes did not immediately threaten to near the \$2 million damage level of some 250 fires last month. The greatest peril today stemmed from high temperatures and dry winds that fanned flames created by careless campers, loose wires, heat lightning or sparks from burning trash.

A fire that scarred 10,000 acres of grass 20 miles east of Stockton was contained late yesterday and a 950-acre brush fire in the foothills of the San Jacinto Mountains in Southern California was expected to be contained today.

Several smaller fires were reported in Central and Southern California, but none appeared dangerous at the moment.

Deputy State Forester Don Knowlton said dry, desert Santa Ana winds were raking across the Los Angeles Basin and reaching as far north as Sequoia National Park.

He said high winds also were sweeping across the northern parts of the state. The Mt. St. Helena forestry lookout 40 miles north of San Francisco Bay reported winds of up to 78 miles an hour.

The Division of Forestry of the state termed the hazard "critical."

Crews successfully conquered the blaze east of Stockton, while more than 425 men fought the Southern California blaze southeast of Idyllwild.

ROME (AP) — The appointment of the first U.S. Negro Roman Catholic bishop was announced here today. He is the Very Rev. Harold R. Perry, named by Pope Paul VI to be auxiliary bishop of New Orleans.

Suspect Fails To Show Up For Hearing

SANTA ANA — A bench warrant was out today for the arrest of Samuel W. Laughlin of Buena Park who failed to appear Friday for a hearing on a felony child stealing complaint.

Superior Judge William L. Murray set bail at \$10,000.

Laughlin, 37, was arrested Sept. 8 at Clovis, N.M., while en route to Winona, Okla., with his son, Randall, 5.

Police said the suspect visited his former wife, Ethel, in her home at Orange. The mother left the house for a while and Laughlin told his daughter, June, 17, he was going to take Randall for a short walk.

Police were able to determine Laughlin had bought two railroad tickets to Winona, but Clovis police and Santa Fe Railroad agents took him into custody.

Miss Malone Taken Off Critical List

HOLLYWOOD — Academy Award actress Dorothy Malone may be able to resume her role in the "Peyton Place" television series in five to six weeks, according to a studio spokesman.

The announcement came after doctors at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital said yesterday the 40-year-old Miss Malone was making "rapid progress" in her recovery from lung surgery.

As the actress was being moved from the intensive care unit to a private room, her former husband, Jacques Bergerac, was denied custody of the couple's daughters, Mini, 5, and Diane, 3.

The French-born actor had asked that he be given physical custody of the girls until their mother was fully recovered.

Volcano Eruption Feared

MANILA — Fears mounted today that Mt. Taal might erupt again and American geologist James G. Moore, ordered here by President Johnson, arrived to help assess the danger.

Moore arrived at the Clark Air Force Base 60 miles north of Manila. He immediately took off again and flew over the volcano before coming here for conferences with Philippine volcanologists and scientists. He planned to make a personal inspection tour of the disaster later.

Riot Figure Sentenced

LOS ANGELES — Marquette Frye, 21, whose arrest last Aug. 11 triggered Los Angeles riots, has been given a 180-day suspended jail sentence and placed on three years probation.

The sentencing came yesterday after Municipal Judge Mary E. Waters refused to let Frye and his brother, Ronald, 22, change their pleas from guilty to innocent.

The brother was given a 120-day suspended sentence, placed on three years probation and fined \$250.

Mariner Bid Bon Voyage

PASADENA — Scientists bid bon voyage Friday to an "Ancient Mariner" — now 307 days old and nearing the end of its usefulness — by turning off the radio which transmitted 21 historic close-ups of Mars last July.

The U.S. spacecraft Mariner 4, 191 million straight-line miles from earth, is beginning to show signs of age: The error rate in its radio signals is increasing.

"It's near the end of useful telemetry," said a spokesman at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Karachi Ready for Attack

KARACHI, Pakistan — Civil defense officials blacked out this Pakistani city last night and early today in what they called a "precautionary measure" against a possible attack by India.

Street and house lights and neon signs were turned out following reports of a heavy Indian ground attack against Pakistani forces in disputed Kashmir. All day yesterday the Pakistan radio reported the fighting continuing but gave no details of the battle.

In Rawalpindi, Maj. Gen. Bruce MacDonald of the United Nations cease-fire team paid a courtesy call on President Mohammad Ayub Khan of Pakistan. Later MacDonald, a Canadian, told reporters the situation along the cease-fire line in Kashmir was tense.

U.S.-Russ Talks Failed

NEW YORK — Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko have failed in talks this week to make significant progress toward ending the nuclear arms race or reunifying Germany, officials said today.

They have managed, however, to avoid whipping up any new crises at a time when the aims and actions of Red China are much on the minds of Russian and American leaders.

Rusk told newsmen late last night, after a three-hour session with Gromyko, that they spent most of their time on disarmament and the results were "not conclusive." He said they also discussed the European security question — which includes the problem of German unity — with an equal lack of progress.

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — Promising racial peace and an administration dedicated to education, former congressman Carl Elliott Friday became an official candidate for the governor of Alabama.

CAPE KENEDY — The new Air Force Minuteman-2 missile, key to the nation's long range ballistic rocket forces, Friday night streaked to its 11th straight test success.

CHANTILLY, Va. — A Spartanburg, S.C., physician, his wife and two of their four children were killed Friday night when their Cessna-182 crashed and burned on a landing approach to Dulles International Airport.

HONOLULU — The first boatload of returning Marine veterans from Vietnam is due to land in Honolulu Sunday for a 24-hour liberty enroute to the West Coast.

Tragic Plane Crash Cause to Be Told

The riddle that is the cause of an airplane crash which took nine lives in Newport Beach May 29 has apparently been solved, but the answer won't be made known to the public until after Oct. 15.

That is the deadline set by Civil Aeronautics Board investigators for tying together several investigations into circumstances surrounding the tragedy.

Robert H. Shaw, air safety investigator for the Los Angeles office of the CAB, said he was restricted as to what he could say, but indicated researchers had arrived at a conclusion.

'CAUSE FACTOR'

In response to a question as to how conclusive he thought findings would be, Shaw said, "I think we'll be able to come up with a definite cause factor."

He indicated that there were still a lot of "difficult to pin down" factors involved, but concluded that the evidence was clear enough for him to make a determination of cause.

Beyond that, Shaw wouldn't commit himself. Investigation under his direction has progressed independently

along several lines of engine analysis, air frame study, and coroner's medical report on the pilot, any of which could supply the reason for the disaster.

WEARIED

The Oct. 15 deadline was self imposed, Shaw reported. Investigators have been wearied by the multiplicity of factors involved. He expressed hope that additional crashes wouldn't delay completion of the probe.

The May 29 crash, a fiery pre-dawn death plunge, cut short a Memorial Day excursion for pilot, Dr. Malvern K. Leisy, and eight passen-

gers, including the doctor's 10 and 12-year-old sons. The planned trip to Mexico hardly got off the ground.

Dr. Leisy's twin-engine Beechcraft lifted off from Orange County airport at 6:30 a.m. Minutes later nine were dead, flung as much as 200 feet across a grassy knoll.

WAKE

A burnt semi-circular arc of destruction was left in the plane's wake next to MacArthur Boulevard approaching Corona del Mar.

Afterward, CAB men began the painstaking task of putting together the pieces. Shaw says his investigating team has compiled a monumental report.

The essence of it, however, will be distilled in a brief summary titled "Resume of accident and cause factor." It will be made available through Civil Aeronautics Board headquarters in Washington, D.C.

with haircuts the next day," he said.

"It's a battle we've fought every year since the school opened," recalled Principal Leon Meeks of Corona del Mar High School, who has an effective method of dealing with his "longhairs." "We just tell the boy we'll be happy to loan him the money for a haircut if he can't afford it," he smiled.

PUBLICITY

Westminster High Principal Peren Christensen anticipated the situation and met with PTA leaders prior to the opening of school for a discussion on dress and grooming standards. "These were given wide publicity," he said, "and on opening day the boys looked like boys and the girls looked like girls." Jack Michie, boys' vice principal at Estancia High School, called the current crop of students "the neatest and most cooperative I've ever seen." At Marina High, Principal Glen Dyringer reported only one case of a boy being sent to the barber shop.

Harbor High Principal Robert Montgomery implements Page 21 of the student manual, which says "extreme haircuts are out of place in school." Father John Riley, principal of Mater Dei, allows "anything within reason, but nothing extreme."

However, on the college level, the hair apparently can grow a bit longer. Dr. Robert Moore, president of Orange Coast College, says his institution has clothing regulations but nothing applying to haircuts.

'BEAUTS'

"And we've got some beauts here," he laughed. The policy is much the same at the University of California, Irvine, according to Coralee Torbett, student activities advisor at the new school.

"Our only requirement is that if a fellow wears long hair or a beard that he keep it clean," she explained. "There are only a few such examples here, though, and none really radical."

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It Was a Page From the Past At Newport

Throngs of old timers flocked to Newport Pier on cue Friday afternoon to rededicate it for what it once was—McFadden Wharf.

Arthur J. McFadden, 84, unveiled the handsome California historical landmark marker at the foot of the pier. He was preceded by a number of other Newport pioneers who waxed nostalgia.

Dressed as ladies of the 80's were Faye Harbison, Marcie Schrouder, Dorthea Sheeley, Reggy O'Donnell, Sally Fleming, Winifred Bacon, Doris Frahm, Farel Hardesty and Opal Jackson. Several of them carried parasols.

Former Newport Beach newspaper publisher Ben Reddick summed up the feelings of those gathered when he said, "A multitude of rail lines once converged where we stand. The McFaddens built that railroad. And they built this town we all love so well."

It was a page from the past. McFadden was escorted by a bevy of belles dressed to the taste of 1888, the year his forebears built the wharf, and launched the old town of Newport Beach.

The ceremony, which drew scores of dignitaries, was held under scorching skies. "I prayed it wouldn't rain, but I forgot to pray there wouldn't be any Santa Ana winds," apologized Isabel Pease, who organized the program.

Orange County Supervisor Alton E. Allen discounted another nuisance when he observed, "I didn't realize I was authorizing an \$80,000 racket to drown out my speech." He referred to busy sand haulers that punctuated the ceremony.

Still, the dedication was a great success. It would have been, just because of the beauty of the historical marker itself, replete with palms. Or simply because of the gals in their costumes. But most of all, it was ensured of being a memorable occasion because it brought so many older folk together to reminisce about the past.

A city rushing headlong toward new vistas opened by a University campus, paused briefly to pay tribute to its past Friday.

American Salesman: Heel or Hero?

The average adult American spends 57 minutes a day paying heed to somebody who wants to sell him something.

That does not mean he is talking with salesmen for 57 minutes. Part of it is spent in front of a television set watching a knight on a white horse eradicate grease and stains with the point of his lance and also absorbing the information that Mr. Clean, once an amiable fellow, has turned mean because he hates dirt so much.

Part of it is reading a newspaper, looking through a magazine, answering a phone call from a dance studio offering bargain rates for lessons, riding down a super highway and scanning a billboard, opening mail addressed to "occupant," seeing a vending machine and remembering you need cigarettes.

BEST IN THE WORLD

But these are indirect attempts to persuade us to spend money. There are 4.5 million persons in this country engaged in direct selling. They are the best salesmen in the world and they can truthfully claim that they are partly responsible for the high standard of living in the United States. They convince us we should buy something and if we don't have the money they arrange for us to purchase it on the installment plan. In the middle of the last year installment credit stood at \$65.9 billion — a massive tribute to the talent of the American salesman.

For the last 45 years he has been both feared and cheered. Sinclair Lewis wrote a book about a dull fellow who could talk about nothing except business and a d selling and the word "Babbalanza" became a permanent part of the American language. But Bruce Barton also wrote a book — "The Man Nobody Knows" — in which he depicts Jesus Christ as an outgoing personality, a popular dinner guest and a man who would approve of the American salesman. The battle was joined and the controversy has been raging ever since.

There is no question that a high powered salesman hits the financial jackpot with regularity. The Council

on Opportunities in Selling, Inc., traced the backgrounds of presidents of corporations with sales exceeding \$500 million yearly. The largest group among the presidents, 27 per cent, had started out as salesmen.

HERO TO HEEL

The prestige of the American salesman rises and recedes like the tides. In the 1920's he was a national hero and magazines and books devoted thousands of words to telling why he was the architect of our prosperity.

The 1929 crash blew all that out the window and the salesman never has been able to climb back to his exalted status. Today there is a severe shortage of good salesmen. It seems to have started back in 1962 when only 20,000 male graduates from college went into selling. The economy could have used 200,000.

The Council on Opportunities in Selling, Inc., has been digging into the reasons why college graduates don't want to become salesmen. It cites these remarks by students:

'WASTE OF EDUCATION'

"Selling is a dirty word. Selling is a needless, useless way of making an uncertain living, a waste of a college education. I don't want to make people buy things they don't need."

The council believes many college teachers are biased against business and selling and have succeeded in planting this attitude firmly in the minds of the students. Psychologists offer another reason — being a salesman frustrates one of man's most powerful drives, the desire to create something. It is the nature of a salesman's job that he doesn't create anything. Other men make a product and he merely sells it.

Arthur Miller's play, "Death of a Salesman," did immense damage to the image of the American salesman. Thousands of persons saw it on the stage and other thousands read it. The book circulated widely among college students and frequently was on the required reading list.

LIFE COMES TO DEAD END

Miller told the story of Willy Loman, a salesman

whose efficiency and earnings decline as he grows older. Willy finally realizes his life has come to a dead end and he commits suicide.

Many large companies engage in recruiting and training programs, but it takes time and money. The council estimates a company must spend \$8,781 on a man before he is capable of productive selling. Even then you have to wait a while before you know whether you have a winner or a loser. More likely you have a loser because 53 per cent of the sales in this country are made by only 27 per cent of the salesmen.

That 27 per cent are the glamor boys of the business. They make big money by swinging big deals. They entertain in the best restaurants, have tickets to the hit shows and make speeches at conventions telling how they do it. The other 73 per cent of the nation's salesmen are the "marginal man." It is unlikely that they will ever get rich and many of them keep struggling to make a bare living while the clock ticks away against them.

MOST BUYERS ARE SCARED

Among the secrets which good salesmen carry in their heads is the fact that most of us are scared when we start to buy something.

Whether we are conscious of it or not, three fears are racing through our minds:

— We are not going to get our money's worth.

— There is something wrong with the product we are considering buying. The fact that we can't say specifically what is wrong irritates us and we waste hours going from store to store in search of the perfect product. Such people are known to store clerks as "lookers" because they seldom buy anything.

— Members of our family and neighbors are going to ridicule us for making the purchase. They will say the price was too high or the product is inferior. There will always be the man down the block who will explain that he bought the same product three years ago and it turned out to be a lemon. Or we will be criticized in our own home for buying something we really didn't need. The salesman has made his presentation, has

demonstrated the product, has stated the price and explained that easy terms are available. Now comes the moment of truth — what sales experts call "the closing." Millions of words have been written on the "closing," but all of them shake down to the fact that the salesman has about 60 seconds to read the customer's mind and come up with the right answer.

Does one or all of the three fears loom large in the customer's mind? Which fear is it? Will the customer be irritated by one more sales pitch? What can the salesman say that he hasn't said already? Charles B. Roth in his book "Secrets of Closing Sales" quotes one of the nation's top refrigerator salesman on how to snatch victory from defeat:

"I saw the sale was as good as gone so I decided to take a chance. With a perfectly serious face . . . I pointed to the screw head on the front of the refrigerator and told my prospect: 'Here is something I want to show you, Mr. Clarke. This refrigerator is the most carefully made refrigerator on the market. Do you see all those screw heads? Notice that the slot in every one of them is absolutely vertical. . . There isn't a detail in the manufacture of this refrigerator which has been overlooked.'"

FEAR BANISHED

The fact that whether screw heads are vertical or horizontal cannot possibly have any bearing on the performance of a refrigerator was lost on the customer. He immediately bought the refrigerator. The fear that had been running through his mind was that he might be buying an inferior product. The salesman had banished that fear with an inspired speech about vertical screw heads.

By far the greatest boon ever bestowed on the American salesman was the system of credit and installment buying. The charge account is a vital part of the American economy because psychologists have established beyond doubt that a person will have no hesitancy in buying something for \$19.95 and saying "charge it." If he had to produce a \$20 bill in payment, the sale never would be made.

And Other Certain Sports
Be Included in Foundation?

'Hot' Words Swapped at Capitol

The Daily Digest for the Congressional Record, Sept. 15, 1965, noted that the day's activities had included passage by a voice vote of H.R. 9480, establishing a National Foundation on the Arts and Humanities. It also noted dispassionately that certain amendments had been rejected, "including one that sought to include certain sports, belly dancing, and pinocle and other playing under the bill." Here is the exchange on that amendment.

MR. GROSS. Mr. Chairman, I offer an amendment.

Amendment offered by Mr. Gross of Iowa: On page 3, line 17, after the word "dance," insert the following: "Belly dancing, pinocle, and other playing under the bill."

THE CHAIRMAN. The gentleman from Iowa is recognized for 5 minutes in support of his amendment.

MR. ALBERT. Mr. Chairman, will the gentleman yield?

MR. GROSS. Certainly, I yield to the gentleman.

MR. ALBERT. Is the gentleman who is offering this amendment the same gen-

tleman who did not know what a humanist practitioner was?

MR. GROSS. I tried to get the definition from the gentleman from Oklahoma, thinking perhaps that these people were common to the State of Oklahoma, but I never did get an answer from the gentleman. I will be glad to yield to the gentleman so that we can get the definition straight before we do anything else. Let us see if later we can find the exact reference then, and perhaps, the gentleman can tell me who these characters are.

MR. ALBERT. I thought the gentleman knew every word in the dictionary after I heard his amendment.

MR. GROSS. We are going to have plenty of time on this bill I am sure and we will get back to that later. If the gentleman can do so, I will give him the opportunity then to provide the answer to that question.

Mr. Chairman, I regret that I did not anticipate this bill would come up this afternoon or else I would have tried to appear in my tuxedo and my dancing shoes to be properly equipped for this further going away party for the Treasury of the United States.

This will be a further march toward the bankruptcy of this country. I cannot think of anything that we ought to give less consideration to at this time than to spend \$20 million a year — up to some \$60 million or more over a period of three years — for a boon-doggie of this kind.

As far as my amendment is concerned, boiled down to simple language, it merely provides that we write a provision for subsidizing

belly dancing into this bill. I do not know why the tango, the bumps, and the rest of that stuff should not also be listed. Just about everything else is, including the professionals who allegedly deal with the humanities.

For the benefit of the gentleman from Oklahoma, I intend to come back and get his definition, because, I say again, they are apparently common to his State. I would not know one of them from a bale of hay in the State of Iowa.

So my amendment simply provides that by definition we provide in this bill the little item of subsidization of belly dancing.

I yield back the remainder of my time.

MR. THOMPSON of New Jersey. Mr. Chairman, I rise in opposition to the amendment. I suspect that the gentleman had some technical advice from one sophisticated in the language of the anatomy in order to draw his amendment. I think that it would more properly belong in a medical education bill. I am sure that if I were in control of such a bill, I would be constrained to accept the amendment. However, I regret that it is beyond me, and I therefore oppose the amendment.

MR. GROSS. Mr. Chairman, would the gentleman yield?

MR. THOMPSON of New Jersey. I yield to the gentleman from Iowa.

MR. GROSS. I should like to inform the gentleman that I had the very able collaboration of my good friend and colleague from Missouri, the distinguished Doctor (Mr. Hall).

MR. THOMPSON of New

Jersey. The outstanding surprise of the day is that a gentleman from a farm State does not know the difference between a belly dancer and a bale of hay.

THE CHAIRMAN. The question is on the amendment offered by the gentleman from Iowa.

The amendment was rejected.

Amendment offered by Mr. Gross.

MR. GROSS. Mr. Chairman, I offer an amendment.

The Clerk read as follows:

Amendment offered by Mr. Gross: On page 3, line 17, after the word "dance," insert the following: "Belly dancing, pinocle, and other playing under the bill."

(Mr. Gross asked and was given permission to revise and extend his remarks.)

MR. GROSS. Mr. Chairman, I hope that the gentleman this time will not try to put words in my mouth. The gentleman from Iowa has some vague idea of the difference between a bale of hay and a belly dancer.

MR. THOMPSON of New Jersey. Mr. Chairman, will the gentleman yield?

MR. GROSS. I yield.

MR. THOMPSON of New Jersey. I shall correct myself and admit that the gentleman from Iowa apparently does have a vague idea.

MR. GROSS. I thank the gentleman for his usual excellent contribution.

I do not know of any reason why the art of baseball and the art of football, among others, should not be included in the bill. There are artists in these areas as well as artists who play poker.

Before I came to Congress I occasionally ran

into a few of them. That was when I had a little time to play poker rather than now spending it all trying to keep up with legislation such as this.

Where do we find the greatest audiences? Not in the music halls. The 80,000 crowds are to be found at the football games and other sports events.

Why leave out such artists as Willie Mays, Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford, and many others? I am sure you do not want to leave them out while subsidizing costume and fashion designers.

This is discriminatory, and I cannot believe the Committee on Education and Labor, or any member thereof, would want to discriminate against the arts and artists to be found on the athletic fields.

MR. FINDLEY. Mr. Chairman, will the gentleman yield?

MR. GROSS. I yield to the gentleman from Illinois.

MR. FINDLEY. I wonder if the gentleman is correct in assuming that the present language of the bill precludes that type of activities. If the gentleman will look at page 3, there is authorized the "performing arts." That phrase is used. It is very broad. The arts include drama and folk art. It looks to me as if the term "folk art," if none of the others would apply, would be broad enough to cover the type of activity in the gentleman's amendment.

MR. GROSS. I would say to my friend that I do not see "performing arts" in that paragraph, nor do I see a definition of "perform-

ing arts."

MR. FINDLEY. Earlier on the same page the term "humanities" includes but is not limited to various things.

MR. GROSS. That is "humanities." Now we are dealing with "art" as distinguished from "humanities."

MR. FINDLEY. Under the "humanities" comes the words "performing arts." I presume baseball, football, poker, craps, shooting, and such is in that category.

MR. GROSS. That is under "humanities." Let us not confuse "humanities" with "art," or "art" with "humanities," or should we?

If the gentleman will look at page 2 of the report on this bill he will see that there is the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities, and the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities.

Then we come to the two subsidiaries — to the brackets of subsidiaries. There are the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Council on the left-hand side. On the right-hand side there are the National Endowment for the Humanities and the National Council on the Humanities.

I am surprised that they asked for \$20 million in this bill, because by the time the taxpayers get through financing all of these high-powered councils on the arts it will probably require many more millions.

MR. FINDLEY. If the gentleman will yield further, last year, in consideration of the proposal for



a National Arts Council, we on the minority side predicted that this would soon lead to a Federal subsidy program for everything from belly dancing to the ballet, from Handel to the hootenanny, and from Brahms to the Beatles. We overlooked the fact that probably it would cover from Tchaikovsky to cheesecake. The language presently before us is broad enough to cover it all plus the activities the gentleman mentions.

If the amendment of the gentleman is defeated, it may cut off the ballplayers from participating, whereas I believe the present language is broad enough to cover everybody.

MR. GROSS. The gentleman believes it covers everybody?

MR. FINDLEY. I do. It brings everybody under the tent.

MR. GROSS. If I could be convinced of that I would withdraw my amendment.

THE CHAIRMAN. The question is on the amendment offered by the gentleman from Iowa (Mr. Gross).

The Amendment was rejected.

Vietnam Is Unbelievably Lovely

A Beautiful Country Torn by War

SAIGON — What's it like, this land where nearly 130,000 American military men now find themselves?

SOME OF it is unbelievably lovely.

The mountains in the west, sweeping toward the border of Laos, rise to 7,000 feet and are as dark green and deeply forested as the Canadian Rockies in summer.

The coastal plains on the east, all the way from the 17th Parallel at the border of North Vietnam, south almost to Saigon, run down to jewel-like bays as beautiful as any in the Caribbean. These abound in broad, empty beaches that would tempt the imagination of a masterbuilder.

IN BETWEEN, almost at the dead center of Vietnam, lies elephant country, wide expanses of flat plains tufted with tall grass. Just to the north of that is tiger country, deep jungles where in the days before there was a war hunters used to come to hang on their belts the most prized of all trophies: a tiger paw.

South is the Mekong River delta. Broad muddy rivers running down to the South China Sea in countless rivulets and irrigating a land lush enough in peacetime to feed much of Southeast Asia. The delta occupies one fourth of Vietnam's land area and is home to two-thirds of its population.

Here indeed is the inscrutable East of the tourist posters. Flooded rice paddies mirror the merciless

noonday sun. Teeming grass-hut villages sit on the banks of swift-running estuaries. Thunderheads pile up the afternoon monsoon in a vast brooding sky. Water buffaloes pull ancient plows. Sampans and junks in an endless proliferation swim the muddy canals. Dense mangrove swamps swarm with lizards and snakes. Women in coolies hats carry enormous loads at each end of a shoulder pole.

THEN THERE is the other side of the delta never shown in the tourist brochures: sandbagged outposts silhouetted in the glare of flames slowly parachuting to earth in a night attack, schools and churches ringed with concertinas of barbed wire, the

bodies of the dead wrapped up in rubber ponchos and stacked along a bridge after a Viet Cong raid.

South Vietnam is roughly shaped like a sea serpent and almost the size of the State of Washington or Missouri in land mass. It is a country of painful contrasts and glaring contradictions. Since the Viet Cong began blowing up the bridges and ambushing the convoys, many of the roads don't go any place. The railroad that used to go from Saigon in the south to Hue in the north ends in a tangle of ripped-up track a few miles outside each city.

STILL, no matter how unfriendly the terrain as far as Viet Cong infiltrators go, rickety tourist buses travel

where what's left of the dusty roads, jammed beyond belief with passengers, loaded with all sorts of bags, boxes and trunks, including bicycles strapped to the roof.

And always, as the bus rumbles along, someone is climbing out the window onto the roof to get at a piece of luggage.

The residents of Saigon, still a gay city despite the war, love to go for a drive on Sunday.

TODAY THE ROAD only goes to Bien Hoa, 14 miles to the east. That doesn't stop the Sunday drivers. All of Saigon, it seems, drives back and forth along the road to Bien Hoa every Sunday, creating a massive traffic jam that includes 20 police-squad cars the U.S.

government gave the Vietnamese police to catch speeders in the days when there was any place to speed to.

An agronomist looking at a map of Vietnam would have quite a different view of the country than the Sunday driver or the big-game hunter — or, for that matter, the military tactician.

He could follow the rice paddies of the delta north beyond Saigon to well-ordered rubber and coffee plantations, and going steadily north continue in crop progression to the vegetable and truck farms around Da Nang, the tea plantations of the middle plateau between the mountains and the coastal plains, and finally the barren, deforested hills of the north.

Lee announced his retirement and was named chairman of the board at a special directors' meeting this week. Immediately elected to succeed him as new president of Walker & Lee was former executive vice president Frank R. Hart. Three new senior vice presidents elected were William Cheney, William McCabe, and William Thagard.

The luncheon meeting was also in honor of Mrs. Ruth Shepherd, the only other living founder and was held at her residence, the Pacific Coast Club in Long Beach.

The third original partner in the real estate firm, longtime Newport Beach resident Robert K. Walker, passed away in 1959.

DeWitt Lee was born in Tacoma, Wash., and moved to Modesto at an early age. He began his real estate career in his northern California hometown after graduation from Stanford University. Later, he came to Los Angeles and worked first for the Dave Barry Company, Wilshire Boulevard developers, then for the Janss Investment Corporation. It was during his 22 years with Janss that Lee's fast friendship with Robert Walker and Ruth Shepherd, also Janss associates, began.

With Walker and Mrs. Shepherd, Lee opened the first offices of his own company in Lakewood on a day the world

will long remember — December 7, 1941. Tragedy and shock made this opening day inauspicious, but wartime needs soon made the area a booming ship building center and Walker & Lee provided the necessary housing for hordes of workers.

The thousands of homes sold in the Lakewood area by Walker & Lee were a forerunner of thousands more to be sold throughout Los Angeles, Ventura, and Orange counties. Today, the company has offices in fifty different locations and for the past four years has recorded an annual sales volume in excess of \$100 million valuation. Walker & Lee has sold more than 65,000 homes to date.

New president Frank Hart, who joined the company 16 years ago and rose quickly

to become Lee's second in command, has been responsible for much of the company's success. Hart is a native Californian who intended making the law his career after graduating from Pomona College. Robert Walker convinced him to join Walker & Lee and try real estate instead.

Success in the real estate field was not new to the Hart family. His father and uncle developed 13,000 acres in La Habra, North Whittier, and San Luis Rey. The first 700 acres of the Irvine Ranch were sold by James Irvine to Edwin G. Hart, creating what is now Corona del Mar.

Aside from this personal interest in the field, however, Hart is a firm advocate of the "professional career in real

estate" and attributes his company's success to "on-the-job" training programs conducted by company managers and nationally known real estate instructors in every phase of the business.

ert Walker, and Ruth Shepherd. Continued progressive action is a part of my immediate plan for increased growth and development for Walker & Lee, Inc." 





FROM the GROUND UP

Is there a more exciting success story than the man with \$1,000 who ran it to \$1 million in 10 years? Well it is true and not too difficult, in retrospect, and if the \$1,000 was utilized in highly profitable real estate ventures. In the exciting field of real estate investment, it is like betting on the World Series with next month's newspaper in your hands today.

In actual practice this type of success is a demanding challenge. It is necessary to project what will happen in the foreseeable future, then darn well do something about it with action. Margin of error may be minimized by a carefully planned investment program. Red flag dangers in this ambitious goal are usually impatience. Typical investors want the plan to work too fast and thereby reach too far and "short" themselves of working capital.

What else can you do with that \$1,000? Tucking it away in a savings and loan, it would double itself in 15 years, and quadruple itself in 29 years. By the time you paid your income tax, and taking inflation into consideration, your net proceeds from the investment would be less than the purchasing power of the original \$1,000.

LET'S TRY AGAIN

Take the same \$1,000 and invest it in clear real estate paying an 8 per cent return with those returns re-invested. After taxes, and allowing a 5 per cent increase in value annually, it would double in value in six years.

Now to really have some fun, let's say we paid the \$1,000 as down payment on a parcel costing \$10,000, and we made payments of \$75 per month. Assuming for tax purposes, the interest and depreciation, would make those payments nearly tax free as an out-of-pocket cost. This system would result in quadrupling your \$1,000 in three to five years depending on the capitalization rate, depreciation factors, and interest rate. This formula would give you \$4,000 in four years, \$64,000 in 12 years, and over a million dollars by the twentieth year.

Theory can be mathematically accurate and planning to perfection. Action to produce this kind of results requires a trained and qualified realtor with the talent of analyzing your needs, and one who is an expert in real estate finance and taxes. The real "art" of this type of investing is through the medium of tax-free exchanging.

The formula is simple, this is the way it works. Starting with a set sum of capital, a property is elected that best fits the plan. You buy it. You hold the property for a predetermined time and then exchange it for a larger property. This process in turn, is subsequently repeated, until all of a sudden your original pittance is a substantial equity in a major property. Your most rapid and greatest benefits are when you can subsidize contributions in capital over and above the earnings of the property. You won't go nearly as far if you try to pull earnings out during this period.

HEY, DID YOU KNOW?

That the Pennsylvania Railroad, which is buying out Maccos Realty, is also 25 per cent owner of the new \$116 million Madison Square Garden Center under construction in New York? ... In new house construction today, our wood and stucco houses are outdone nationally by brick, by a ratio of two to one?

Banks, savings and loans, insurance companies, or any others involved in any way in the making or negotiating of real estate loans, must be licensed real estate salesmen or brokers. This is a new law effective last week that is going to make some lenders unwitting law violators.

Size, location, and cleanliness, in that order, are what renters look for most when they go apartment hunting. Secondary, but still important, considerations include storage space, on-site laundry facilities, and the condition of furnishings in furnished apartments. Oddly enough, far down the list come such items as swimming pools, air conditioning, or sauna baths. Biggest complaints of apartment dwellers is "noise."

It's Your School System

Members of the Advisory Council for Education have a message for Costa Mesa and Newport Beach voters, a message in the interest of the youth and future citizens of this area and of this nation.

It has occurred to all of us that apathy is one of the strongest enemies. And yet, ninety per cent of the voters (people who had previously taken the trouble to become eligible to vote by registering) were guilty of apathy in the election held last April to elect members to our present boards of trustees for the three school districts in this area. These local elections are just as important as the general elections because they are deciding factors as to our way of life in the local community. And to governing boards of the local school districts, in setting the pace of education for the entire nation.

Next Tuesday, October 5, we are being given a chance to vindicate ourselves for our apparent lack of interest last April. The advisory Council for Education strongly urges all registered voters in this area to learn all they can about the seventeen candidates running for the board of trustees for the new unified school district. Then on October 5, VOTE, and remind your friends to vote.

This is URGENT. If we let only ten per cent of the voting public make our decisions for us, then we deserve the results of their dictation.







The Dodgers clinched the tie one hour and 10 minutes after their first loss since Sept. 15 when Cincinnati whipped the second-place San Francisco Giants 17-2.

A Los Angeles victory plus

a Giant loss would have given the Dodgers their third pennant in the last seven years, but they now must wait at least until Saturday when they play their next-to-the last game of the season against Milwaukee and the Giants again meet the Reds.

The Giants' only hope of gaining a tie for the pennant is to win their last two games while the Braves beat the Dodgers twice, thereby forcing a best-of-three play-off.

Denny Lemaster allowed only five hits as the Dodgers suffered their first shutout since Aug. 8. They didn't have much of a chance against Lemaster after he abruptly halted a first-inning threat.

He gave up just three hits after that inning, bringing his record to 7-13 while not permitting a runner past second base.

Maury Wills led off the Los Angeles first with a single and moved to second as Jim Gilliam singled. But the Braves' 26-year-old left-hander struck out Willie Davis and Lou Johnson and got Al Ferrara to force Gilliam at second.

The Dodgers, who had beaten Lemaster in three of four previous decisions this season, didn't get more than one runner on base in an inning the rest of the way.

Southern California's Trojans gun to avenge their big disappointment of 1964 when they battle the football forces of Oregon State at the Los Angeles Coliseum tonight.

A year ago, the two clubs didn't play each other and wound up tied for the Pacific Athletic Conference crown with 3-1 records. The conference voted the Rose Bowl bid to OSU on the same day the Trojans finished their season with a 20-17 upset over previously unbeaten Notre Dame.

This time, USC goes into the game with a 1-0-1 record, having downed Wisconsin and fought a 20-20 tie with Minnesota. Oregon State beat Illinois 12-10, then fell to Iowa 27-7.

Mike Garrett, leading the PAC rushers with 300 yards for his two outings, leads the Southern California attack in this first conference game of the campaign. Washington State's surprising Cougars, with victories over Iowa and Minnesota, take on neighboring Idaho while the other PAC clubs continue their inter-sectional battling.

California entertains Kansas, Stanford plays at Air Force, UCLA at Penn State, Ohio State at Washington in a televised game, and Brigham Young at Oregon.

San Jose plays host to Utah State in a night game between independents while Hawaii, still seeking its first mainland triumph, meets University of the Pacific at Stockton.

Quarterback Tom Roth leads Washington State's bid to win three-in-a-row but the Cougars must stop big Ray McDonald, the Vandal fullback who has gained 162 yards rushing in two games.

Also the Idaho defense has allowed an average of only 73 yards per game rushing while losing to Washington and beating San Jose State.

Both Washington and Ohio State depend primarily on ground games and stubborn defenses. The Huskies, after beating Idaho, lost to Baylor 17-14 as the Bears struck hard with an aerial attack. Ohio State dropped its opener to North Carolina in a surprise, 14-3.

Elsewhere around the country, college football's current Man of the House, Bob Griese, leads Purdue against Southern Methodist and top-ranked Texas plays Indiana as the Lone Star State.

Griese was a sensation last week in the triumph over Notre Dame that carried the Boilermakers into the No. 2 national ranking. Tex-

as took over the top spot from the Irish after swamping Texas Tech.

Both the Longhorns and the Boilermakers are solid favorites against the Hoosiers and the Mustangs.

In another Southwestern feature, also a night game, Arkansas goes after its 15th straight victory, against Texas Christian at Little Rock.

The Razorbacks are rated No. 4 nationally.

Nebraska, Michigan and Michigan State are host teams in Midwestern high-lights.

The Cornhuskers open defense of their Big Eight title against Iowa State. Michigan State plays Illinois in what is a key Big Ten match for this stage of the season.
