## Faces Deportation

### Suspect Freed In Child Death

A 23-year-old woman was turned over to federal immigration officials Friday after her release from Orange County Jail where she was held on murder charges stemming from the Nov. 6 death of her 11-month-old son.

West Orange County Municipal Judge Robert Knox ordered suspect Rosaria Cossio, a suspected illegal alien, released from jail due to insufficient evidence to prosecute her in connection with the death of her son, Edgar Salcedo.

Knox, however, approved a motion by Deputy District Attorney Paul Meyer not to dismiss the charges against Miss Cossio, who originally listed her address at 16881 Nichols St., Huntington Beach.

The case remains open pending further investigation by Huntington Beach police, Meyers said.

Miss Cossio is charged with murder and child endangering.

Huntington Beach police arrested Miss Cossio Nov. 6 at her Huntington Beach apartment address after her son died from massive head injuries at Santa Ana-Tustin Community Hospital.

An autopsy later showed the infant had also suffered numerous broken bones.

Miss Cossio, who reportedly lived with relatives in the Huntington Beach apartment, will be transported to Los Angeles by federal immigration agents where she will be processed and returned to Mexico, said her defense attorney, Al Stokke.

Stokke introduced evidence Friday that he said proved Miss Cossio was not present at the time the child was allegedly beaten.

At that time, the prosecution moved that the defendant not be bound over to Orange County Superior Court for trial and police be allowed to continue their probe into the death.

On Nov. 29, the prosecution called Miss Cossio's seven-year-old nephew, Arturo Hidrogo, to testify regarding the alleged beating death.

But the lad, also of 16881 Nichols St., refused to testify on the advice of his attorney. Arturo later became perhaps the youngest person ever to be granted immunity from prosecution by an Orange County Superior Court judge.

At that point, Meyer said he had lost his "key witness" in the case.

Meyer called the infant's death "a brutal murder on a defenseless child."

Meyer said if new evidence is found, Miss Cossio will be subpoenaed and ordered to face another preliminary hearing in West Orange County Municipal Court.

Stokke said he doubted if he would ever see his client again.

### One Newport Beach Still Hit by Sewage

One Newport Harbor beach remains closed this weekend because of a half-million-gallon sewage spill last Sunday but three others have reopened.

Mike Wehner of the Orange County Health Department said test results Friday showed no danger at the Lido Isle beach, the Balboa Bay Club beach and the Bayshores Beach.

However, he said the beach at the Sea Scout Base, which is closest to where the spill occurred, will remain posted off-limits for body contact through the weekend.

The spill occurred when a sewage main under West Coast Highway ruptured, sending raw sewage cascading into the bay through a storm drain.

### Flu Vaccine May Be Late For Season

WASHINGTON (AP) — A major manufacturer of influenza vaccines said Friday his firm will begin production of Russian flu vaccine next week, but the shots won't be ready before the end of the present flu season.

The government's confirmation Thursday that Russian flu has broken out in Wyoming raised fears that an epidemic could sweep the country this spring with no vaccine available to protect even the elderly and chronically ill for whom influenza can be fatal.

"We are going to start annual production next Friday," said a spokesman for Merck Sharp & Dohm in West Point, Pa., "but it is not possible to have a vaccine in any quantity before June or July."

### Agreement Seen By Douglas, Union

Officials of a major aerospace union bargaining with McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Co., in Huntington Beach announced tentative agreement on a 1978-80 contract late Friday.

The International Association of Machinists Lodge 720, headquartered in Torrance, scheduled a vote on the contract by its membership today at the Sports Arena in Los Angeles.

Bob Young, union spokesman, said the eight-member negotiating committee, comprised only of machinist workers rather than officials of their union, recommended approval of the new contract.

Terms of the agreement, which will benefit about 1,450 IAM members among the Huntington Beach aerospace facility's 5,000 workers, were not available.

Union negotiators have been bargaining in behalf of IAM employees at four Southland plants for a wage-benefit package comparable to one signed late last year by Boeing Aircraft Co.

That pact provides for 13 percent pay raises over three years for members of the United Auto Workers Union, who were making \$7.02 per hour.

The UAW faction went on strike Jan. 13 at five Douglas Aircraft plants in the western U.S., including facilities in Long Beach and Compton.

Machinists represented by the IAM at the primarily space-oriented Huntington Beach firm authorized a strike for 12:01 a.m. last Tuesday, but agreed to stay on the job because it appeared a settlement was near in the contract dispute.

### Four Injured In Three-car 1-5 Smashup

Four men were injured, two of them seriously, in a three-vehicle smashup on the Santa Ana Freeway near the Lake Forest offramp at 7:40 p.m. Friday, California Highway Patrol officials reported.

CHP officials said the four men were all riding in a compact auto that plowed into a motor home. The motor home had struck another vehicle stalled in traffic, CHP officials said.

Rudolph Martinez, 20, of El Toro, underwent surgery at Saddleback Community Hospital for head injuries. He was listed in critical condition early this morning.

Ciro Salgado, 20, also of El Toro, was reported in serious but stable condition at UC Irvine.

## 'I'm Glad to Be 74'

### Seniors Reminded of Advantages of Aging

Senior citizens attending Saddleback College's Emeritus Day Friday were told they shouldn't worry about getting old because "it's the best time of your life."

"I'm glad to be 74 and I don't want to go back to being 30, 40 or 50," declared Cora Cocks, the California Commission on Aging chairman whose speech was liberally spiked with humor.

She reminded her audience, which had an average age of above 60, that they have more freedom now than they ever had before... they can live where they want... they can't get fired.

Added the woman who runs a birth control clinic in Long Beach, "I don't have to worry about getting pregnant and I don't have to worry about side effects of the pill."

"I love it," Displays, demonstrations and speakers throughout the day encouraged the seniors to enjoy life, continue learning and get what they want and need from government.

"This is your country. You built it. Take it back," encouraged Mrs. Cocks, who also is a member of the national steering committee for the Gray Panthers.

Noting that senior citizens have the best voting record of anyone in this country, she said, "You can get it if you vote right."

Mrs. Cocks said she believes there should be a continuum of care for older people and one agency to handle all the problems of senior citizens.

The commissioner was called to Saddleback at the last minute when Maggie Kuhn, founder of the national Panthers organization, had to cancel because of illness.

"She and I are both little. We're both old. We're both feisty and neither of us could make a decent meal for a hungry lion," Mrs. Cocks said.

She explained that the Panthers is an organization of young and old people — both of whom have a bad image "and so they have a lot in common" — working to improve conditions for senior citizens.

Although it is a militant group, Mrs. Cocks said, their goal is not selfish. Better conditions will be there for the young people when they get old, she explained.

Assemblymen Ron Cordova, D-El Toro, who represents the 74th district, which covers much of the Saddleback Valley, and Fred Chel, chairman of the Assembly's Committee on Aging, offered the seniors a review of what the state has done for the elderly.

Both legislators noted that since 1975 California, had more senior citizens than any other state in the nation.

Pointing out that he represents more senior Californians than any other state assemblyman, Cordova said lawmakers are listening to the seniors who want to correct existing inadequacies.

### 'Fear' Told By Witnesses

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Witnesses against a former pizza delivery man accused of murdering actor Sal Mineo have expressed specific fears about testifying and their lives are in danger, the prosecution said Friday.

Deputy District Attorney Burton Katz, answering a defense complaint about taking the case to the Grand Jury, said he had done so to protect the witnesses against Lionel Williams, 21. Many of the witnesses are jail inmates.

## Scores Remain Stranded

Thousands remained stranded Friday and millions tried to dig out after a record-breaking blizzard that passed over the nation's North.

At least 90 persons were killed in the storm. Sixty were stalled for more than 12 hours aboard a train stranded in an Indiana snowdrift. Denver hotels were reported full with airline passengers diverted from Eastern airports. Police issued warnings in the Midwest for drivers to stay off roads.

Authorities reported 17 persons died in Wisconsin and 16 in Illinois as a result of the storm. Eleven died in Indiana, 11 in Michigan, and 16 in Ohio. Other states reporting weather-related deaths were Alabama 3, Georgia 2, North Dakota 2, Kentucky 2, Pennsylvania 2, Maryland 2 and one each in South Dakota, Virginia, Tennessee, Minnesota, West Virginia, Maine, and Nebraska.

Ohio was having severe problems with what the governor called the "worst blizzard in history" and officials said that even the federal help that had been promised — including aid from the Army — was not enough.

"We just haven't gotten what we had hoped to get at this time," said Adjutant Gen. James Clem of the Ohio National Guard. "I've got to lay it on the line."

President Carter declared a federal state of emergency in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana, but Clem said that was not enough. He said federal equipment had not been freed for state use.

The foul weather that crossed the East on Thursday included the blizzard in the North, hurricane force winds through the South, heavy rains, and flooding in West Virginia and elsewhere.

Gov. James Rhodes of Ohio expressed condolences for those who lost loved ones in the blizzard.

"This is the morning that most of us dreaded. It's here," he said. "The picture is not good. It may not be good."

Police refused to release the name of the assault victim. Batiste remained in custody in lieu of \$25,000 bail.

### Slide Danger Closes Lane

One lane of Pacific Coast Highway in Capistrano Beach between Doheny Park Road and Camino Capistrano was closed indefinitely Friday night due to a potential dirt slide, California Highway Patrol officials said.

A CHP official said the highway section would remain closed until it was certified safe sometime today.

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# Another Triple Murder

SACRAMENTO (P) — The second triple slaying in Northern California in four days was discovered Friday at a home in a middle-class residential area, sheriff's deputies said.

Sheriff's department spokesman Bill Miller said the victims were a mother, her 6-year-old son and a male friend. A 22-month-old boy was unaccounted for, he added.

They were identified as Evelyn E. Miroth, 36, her son Jason and Daniel J. Merideth, 52, all of Sacramento. Miller said Mrs. Miroth had been babysitting for the missing boy, David M. Ferreira.

Merideth and the boy were shot in the head. Mrs. Miroth, who is divorced, had been slashed across the stomach, Miller said. No suspects were in custody.

Merideth was found lying in the living room of the Miroth home. Mrs. Miroth and her son were in a bedroom. There was no sign of a struggle.

Merideth's car, which had been parked in the Miroth driveway, was found about a quarter mile away at an apartment complex. "We're searching that entire complex and the surrounding area," said Miller.

Miller said the slaying may have been committed by the same person or persons who slashed a woman to death Monday in the same area of town.

# Drugs Linked To Murders In Oakland

OAKLAND (AP)—A savage triple murder was linked to illegal drug traffic Friday after police investigators found what appeared to be almost \$800,000 of LSD at the site of the attack.

A final search Friday morning of a well-to-do residence where three persons died in a knife attack on Tuesday uncovered 48 plastic bags filled with what looks like hallucinogenic drugs, police said.

"It is definitely a drug-related case," Oakland Police Lt. Terry Green said in a telephone interview. "There's been a lot of street talk and a lot of phoning in to police headquarters explaining that they were dealing out of the house."

The victims were identified as Francis Anthony Ragusa, 30, his wife, Jennifer Ann, 24 and his visiting sister, Marianne Jane Ragusa, 21.

Their bodies were found Wednesday afternoon by a friend who went to the \$150,000 hillside home after Ragusa failed to pick up his 8-year-old son at a private school in nearby Berkeley.

Police said two rooms of the home were splattered with blood. Ragusa and his wife were found fully clothed in the recreation room of the two-story home.

Ragusa's sister was found lying naked on her back on the floor of a bedroom. Chief Deputy Coroner Roland Pahl said there was no evidence Miss Ragusa had been sexually molested.

Pahl said all three died of multiple stab wounds.

# UC Irvine Wins \$518,550 Grant

UC Irvine's Thesaurus Linguae Graecae, a project to translate the complete works of ancient Greek literature and documents into a computer data bank, has won a \$518,550 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The NEH also has offered to match additional gifts totaling more than a half-million dollars more to fund the internationally known project.

The thesaurus was begun in July 1972, under the direction of UCI professor of classics Theodore F. Brunner.

For five years, Greek materials written in the period from Homeric time until the year 200 A.D. have been the subject of the collection and computerization.

Brunner said the next phase covers the next two centuries of Greek literature and thought. The final phase, to be completed

sometime in the next decade, covers the remainder of the materials through the sixth century.

The project has received previous NEH grants of \$230,000.

The thesaurus serves as a single collection point for the whole of Greek study. Scholars travel from around the world to UCI in search of materials stored there.

The computer prints out literature or documents in the original text, or in translations into several modern languages.

Brunner said the most popular requests so far have been for sections from the Old and New Testaments of the Bible.

# NB Council Stands Firm On Sundance

Newport Beach city councilmen, citing a pending lawsuit, have refused to reconsider their decision to make Sundance Drive a public street.

The request for reconsideration was made by the Newport Condominium Association from the Newport Terrace condominiums off Costa Mesa's 19th Street near the Santa Ana River.

The association is suing the city and developer Eric Welton over the city's recent acceptance of the street dedication. The street gives Welton access to a development he is planning adjacent to the condominiums.

The street was offered to the city by the Newport Terrace builders about three years ago, but councilmen only decided to make the street a public thoroughway at Welton's request.

Prior to city action, councilmen had asked Welton and the association to work out a settlement because homeowners were opposed to having Sundance used as an access to Welton's new 12-home project.

They said the road is too narrow and its use as an access to Welton's project would pose a safety hazard.

And the National Weather Service could add no encouragement as it predicted more snow for the upper Midwest.

Thousands were still trying to deal with the effects of the storm. Work crews finally dug through a wall of snow Friday morning to rescue the 60 persons stranded aboard an Amtrak train that stalled in a snowdrift in Indiana and froze to the tracks.

Travelers were still trying to get from abandoned, snow-trapped vehicles to emergency shelters, hotels and motels.

The Fifth Army, an administrative command for the Midwest, called out 2,300 soldiers in Ohio. In addition, the Pentagon reported that 730 were helping out in Michigan, 600 in Indiana, 450 in West Virginia, and 960 in Kentucky.

from her apartment Jan. 17, leaving behind her car, purse, clothing and money.

Her boyfriend, James M. Goodrich, 26, told officers he helped the woman move into the Ocean Way apartment the day she disappeared.

"She possibly was intoxicated when she told her boyfriend she was going out to look for Atlantis," Davis said. "When he finally realized what she had said and went out to find her, she was gone."

Friends told police the woman was under mental stress at the time of her disappearance. Davis said she also suffered poor eyesight, which might have contributed to her death.

"We're speculating she either walked into the water on her own, or fell in," he said.

# Proud Writer Salutes Witness

SPRINTING FROM the little dairy outlet in a frantic, broken-field run, wearing a dark ski mask and carrying a butcher knife in his hand, this man was no noon-hour jogger, the witness quickly realized.

Seconds later, she saw the market clerk, a little Pakistani immigrant guy who experienced his first armed robbery on his 34th birthday, run out of the store trembling, terrified and waving his arms.

He came to America seeking a better life. All he will remember finding this week was himself in a sudden, iron-muscled headlock and a but cher knife pressed into his throat.

It felt like nothing he'd ever imagined. He almost threw up.

"I KNEW WHAT had happened as soon as I saw the guy running," said the woman, who may turn out to be the key witness. "And it made me damn mad. I drive 40 miles each way to work every day to make an honest living and these pukes just go around ripping off people."

Stopped by a red traffic light — furious and seething — the lady was elated when the armed robbery suspect in his car sped out of a side street into her path, just beating the changing light as it turned green for her.

She accelerated and fell in behind the brown 1974 Chevrolet Nova sedan as it careened down El Monte's main drag with the driver still yanking off his ski mask. Another red traffic light. He frantically changed shirts in his car.

Driving with one hand, the lady jotted it all down, along with his car's license number, make, model, year of the car and his physical description before losing him in heavy traffic.

"SHE WAS SUPER. Without her, we wouldn't have a thing," said El Monte Police Detective Craig Sperry, who has been hunting the "butcher knife bandit" who has been victimizing small businesses in that area for several weeks.

Today, there is an angry and surprised new face at breakfast in the El Monte City Jail. Its owner faced court arraignment Friday on armed robbery charges.

The lady who dislikes criminals, those who prey on the weak or unsuspecting like parasites, was not at all afraid to get involved.

SHE SPED BACK to the market to furnish police all her information and Sperry was among those staked out at the suspect's home two hours later when the familiar brown car linked to other Los Angeles County cases pulled into the drive.

Sperry alleges a butcher knife, a sum of cash close to the \$200 taken in the market robbery and other evidence were found in the car.

Sperry says the female witness made a positive identification of the bandit suspect from mug shot files unhesitatingly when he showed her a collection of several including look-alike individuals, Wednesday.

Shown the same series of crime file mug shots, the little Pakistani guy who got robbed and had his life threatened for his 34th birthday trembles uncontrollably when he sees the same face.

"HE SAYS: 'I don't know the man,'" notes Detective Sperry, which leaves the lady who wasn't afraid to get involved as the sole witness who will testify in court.

"She's super," Sperry repeats. "I wish we had more people like her in this society."

And I have to agree, even if the lady who wasn't afraid to get involved isn't exactly one of Charlie's Angels.

She's my wife. She makes me proud.

# Coast Guard Finds Debris

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Coast Guard airplanes found cotton bales, orange drums and several crates bobbing in the Gulf of Mexico Friday, but no sign of survivors from a freighter that exploded and sank three days ago.

The 492-foot Eva Marie, whose captain radioed a desperate SOS signal late Wednesday that there had been an explosion and the ship was sinking. There were 26 men on board.

The ship's cargo included three tons of explosive detonators.

# Federal Deficit \$100 Billion?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal deficit next year could run as high as \$100 billion instead of the \$60.6 billion President Carter has forecast, Republican National Chairman William E. Brock said Friday night.

Brock and Republican members of Congress joined in the second installment of a GOP reply to the State of Union message Carter delivered last week.

The Republicans contended Carter's budget ignores priorities that Congress will observe.

# Russian Flu Hits 4 U.S. Sailors

ATLANTA (AP) — At least four sailors on a U.S. Navy ship in the South China Seas contracted "Russian flu," officials said Friday, one day after they reported the first domestic cases of the disease among Wyoming schoolchildren.

The National Center for Disease Control also reported that deaths from relatively familiar types of influenza continued at epidemic levels during the week that ended Jan. 21.

# Striking Bus Drivers Sign Pact

OAKLAND (AP) — Striking AC Transit bus drivers, whose 10-week-old walkout idled public transportation for 115,000 passengers, narrowly approved a new contract Friday.

Officials of Amalgamated Transit Union Local 192 said the vote was 986 for the pact and 811 against. The drivers had turned down by a wide margin a previous settlement offered Jan. 15.

# Polanski Released From Prison

CHINO (AP) — Movie director Roman Polanski, facing sentencing for having illegal sex with a 13-year-old girl, was released from prison Friday after 42 days of psychiatric study.

The 44-year-old Polanski, who could receive up to 50 years in prison, was expected to appear before a judge early next week.

# Unemployment Benefits Run Out

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unemployment insurance benefits for several hundred thousand jobless Americans will be stopped in the next few days in all but nine states and Puerto Rico, the Labor Department announced Friday.

Payments will be stopped today for 293,428 persons who have been receiving 13 weeks of extended benefits beyond the basic 26 weeks provided by most states.

Another 50,000 persons across the country who have been receiving a second 13 weeks of benefits will lose their payments Tuesday.

# Four Oil Companies File Lawsuit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Four major oil companies have filed a Superior Court suit here in an effort to prevent the state Air Resources Board from making them start putting gasoline vapor-recovery systems into effect beginning Sunday.

The civil action, filed by Texaco, Inc., Union Oil Co. of California, Atlantic Richfield Co. and Mobil Oil Corp., claims that the two systems favored by the ARB have not been legally certified.

# Carter to Address Nation on Canal

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter will address the nation next Wednesday night on his efforts to win ratification of the Panama Canal treaty, the White House announced Friday.

Press secretary Jody Powell said the time and format for the speech have not yet been determined. He implied that Carter plans a television-radio speech but said he did not know if the White House would formally request air time from the three major commercial broadcast changes that "would disrupt the process" of ratification.

# Two HB Surfers Place in Contest

Huntington Beach surfers Randy Lewis and Carl Hayward finished seventh and eighth, respectively, among 200 competitors in the Katin Pro-Am Team Challenge Surf Contest, which ended Friday.

The four-day contest, held at the Huntington Beach City Pier, was won by top professional surfer Larry Bertleman from Hawaii.

Fifty surfing teams from around the world competed for \$12,800 in prize money.

Lewis, 27, a Huntington Beach native, collected \$400 in prize money for his seventh place performance.

Hayward, 21, a nine-year local

resident, received \$300 for his performance.

Both Hayward and Lewis turned to professional surfing last year. They design and construct surfboards sold along the Orange Coast.

The contest, sponsored by local surf shops, was postponed Wednesday due to small waves.

But breakers rose as high as eight feet during the final day of competition, said contest official Butch Cash.

# County Post To Kirkwood

H. William Kirkwood, who began his Orange County government career as an associate right-of-way agent 18 years ago, has been appointed an assistant director for administration of the county's General Services Agency.

He will be responsible for development and control of the agency's \$68.5 million budget. His salary will be \$32,616 annually, county officials said.

Kirkwood, 50, had been an acting assistant director since July. He earlier served for 10 years as an administrator with the county library system and also worked for the county right-of-way department.

Kirkwood lives in Los Angeles. His wife, Carol Moss, is librarian for Los Angeles County.

# Senate Kills Rental Bill

SACRAMENTO (AP) — A bill banning rental discrimination against children was killed by the Senate Friday after a debate over whether children are noisy, destructive or hazardous and whether adults have a right to live away from them.

The measure by Sen. David Roberti, D-Los Angeles, would make it illegal for a landlord to refuse to rent or lease housing to anybody solely because they had a child or children under 18.

The roll call was 17-17, four short of the 21 aye votes needed for passage.

## Roasted Judges Sizzle

### Apprehension Gives Way to Courtly Guffaws

Bob Gardner got the ball rolling with the first guffaws — He usually does — Thursday night when he told Orange County judges and lawyers:

"Gov. Brown's judicial selection policy is also known as the BBB system — black, brown or abroad."

The comment paved the way for Presiding Justice Gardner of the Fourth District Court of Appeal to launch his roasting of seven Superior Court judges, some of them Brown's appointees.

Several roastees looked apprehensive as the Orange County Bar Association annual meeting got under way, and the apprehension proved justified.

Gardner's comments were often drowned in laughter from his Registry Hotel audience as he put the spotlight on his Superior Court victims in a no-holds-barred expose. Among his victims:

— Juvenile Court Presiding Judge William L. Murray, promptly dubbed "Rip Van Winkle" and the "Sominex Kid" by the mischievous master of ceremonies.

"One thing about sleeping on the bench," Gardner quipped, "is that you sure miss a hell of a lot of dull stuff that's going on down there in the courtroom."

And he accused Presiding Judge Byron K. McMillan of sending Murray to Juvenile Court this year "to get rid of Margaret Grier." (Orange County's chief probation officer.)

Gardner broke through the laughter to assure his audience that he has "checked with Jimmy the Greek on Murray's chances of getting rid of Margaret. I can tell you that Margaret is a heavy favorite," he said.

— Judge McMillan, whose appointment to the bench, Gardner alleged, was greeted with cries of, "Who the hell is Byron K. McMillan?"

"They named him trial judge of the year and he hasn't tried a case for more than two years," Gardner charged. "He only got to be presiding judge because of a palace upheaval."

And Gardner told a delighted audience that the real reason for McMillan's judicial appointment was the fact that his father was a prominent Democrat in the California Assembly.

— Judge Kenneth Williams who was, Gardner said, "without a doubt the worst district attorney Orange County ever had."

"They call him the 'Bermuda Triangle,' Gardner quipped. "They send cases to him and no one ever sees them again."

— Judge Betty Lou Lamoreaux, described by Gardner as "the first lady of our Orange County Superior Court and a junk food addict."

And to prove his point he unveiled a blow-up picture of the

robed Judge Lamoreaux holding a jumbo package of potato chips.

"She loves 'em," he added. "If you want to keep her happy give her potato chips and Girl Scout cookies."

And so it went through a hilarious roster of roastees, with Gardner adding the scalps of Superior Court Judges Mark Soden and James Perez to his list along with West Orange County Municipal Court Judge Marvin G. Weeks.

But the jovial justice got as good as he gave when it came to rebuttal time as witness these responses:

— McMillan: "We all know Bob Gardner is a legend in his own mind. And everybody knows that Bob was appointed city attorney of Newport Beach at a time when his brother in law was the mayor."

— Murray: "He's making a hell of a lot of fuss about a guy who takes an odd nap. Hell, (Judge) Kenny Morrison slept all the time on the bench and no one ever questioned him."

"Anyway, sleep or not, I'm going to have to listen to all you dummies out there for at least five more years."

And Murray told the story of two young lawyers who entered his courtroom with one of them telling the other: "Five dollars says I can put him to sleep before you can."

"I made that son of a gun

work damned hard for his \$5," Murray said, to a roar of laughter from the audience.

Williams: Disdaining Gardner, he took a shot at Murray. "You know, listening to Murray here, I can see now why the South lost the war."

— Soden: "OK, he's an authority on juvenile law. He should be. He stole the Balboa Island ferry when he was a young man and he was found hiding under a pier."

"And Gardner's pretty frugal. He's owned no more than two or three robes in nearly 50 years on the bench; that's why he stands alone on so many appellate decisions."

And then James Perez brought the house down with a five-minute discourse in Spanish, obviously triggered by Gardner's comment: "He's changing his name to Jaime from James because there's a vacancy on an appellate court."

And Perez made his political beliefs clear with the final declaration to a cheering audience: "All my life I have believed that Brown is beautiful."

It was the end of a memorable roast but it wasn't the end of an occasion that should have been subtitled: "An Evening with Bob Gardner."

The happy justice came back to the podium to receive the silver salver that goes with the OCBA's Franklin G. West

Award — an award honoring the judge or lawyer who has best served law and justice in the preceding year.

"All I can say about this is that this award has been going since 1970 and I am long overdue for it," Gardner quipped.

But then, in pensive mood, he recalled his happy court association with the late Judge West, whom he described as "a great gentleman and a great judge."

"And now we have the days of assembly-line justice," he mused. "We had more time to do things in Judge West's day but that didn't mean that we wasted time."

"Judge West was the first man there in the morning and the last man to leave at night. I'm deeply honored to be the recipient of an award that bears his name."

But he wasn't allowed to carry his award home without a further quip or two from State Bar president Garvin Skallenberger.

"This award is for Bob Gardner," he said. "Here he is — Orange County's living proof that the Peter Principle still applies."

But Gardner had the last crack.

"I was ill just recently," he said. "And while I was at home I got a letter advising me that the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, by a vote of 8-7, wished me a speedy recovery."

### Santa Ana Crime Drifts Into Irvine

Good police work in Santa Ana means trouble for Irvine, where law enforcement is concentrating its fight against "imported" crime, particularly burglary.

In a year-end report of police activities to the City Council, Irvine Police Chief Leo Peart said:

"The notable increase of officers in the city of Santa Ana has forced a large percentage of their criminal activity into surrounding communities, including Irvine."

"Especially apparent is the heroin addict who must resort to burglarizing homes in order to obtain merchandise that can be sold to pay for his needed daily supply of heroin."

In 1977, Peart said, Irvine police arrested more than 40 burglars whose motives for their crimes were attributed to drug addiction, compared with 10 such arrests the year before.

Peart figured that 40 heroin addicts who support their addictions through burglary would have to steal \$7 million worth of property over the course of a year.

Drug-related burglaries, Peart said, were in part responsible for a 19.6 percent increase in the crime in 1977, when 714 burglaries were reported, compared with 1976's 597.

In December alone, according to Lt. Jerry Boyd, who's directing a new burglary suppression task force, there were 107

burglaries—nearly double the normal number reported in a month.

Boyd said that, this month, police investigators identified 18 addict/burglars they believe were responsible for 42 burglaries; arrests have been made, or warrants issued, in a number of cases.

North Irvine, closest section to Santa Ana and most easily accessible because of the Santa Ana Freeway, has been hardest hit by the new breed of professional burglars.

Since Dec. 1, police estimate, the loss to burglars in northern section of the city is more than \$100,000.

The burglary rate in Irvine, on a per capita basis, was the highest in Orange County in December.

Peart said police concentration on the addict/burglar during the past two months has resulted in the recovery of tens of thousands of dollars of property.

Teams of officers have been assigned, as plainclothes detectives, throughout the city daily, to stop and question "persons acting suspiciously" in high-burglary areas, Peart said.

Other officers are working crime prevention, offering advice to residents and businessmen about how to avoid being victims of burglary.

Any resident who desires anti-burglary information may call 754-3735 or 754-3736, Peart said.

### Three Judges To Hear Fate Of Grove Man

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A three-judge panel will convene here Feb. 9 for a penalty hearing in the case of confessed killer Jesse Bishop of Garden Grove.

Bishop, 44, an ex-convict, pleaded guilty to a murder charge filed in the shooting death of David Ballard, 21, Baltimore, Md.

Ballard, who had been married only hours before, tried to stop a man who robbed a change girl at the El Morocco Casino.

The bandit whirled and fired a gun, wounding Ballard and casino floorman Larry Thompson.

Thompson will recover, but Ballard died of his wound New Year's Eve.

Bishop entered the guilty plea, saying he does not want to be "prostituted by the law," by going through a trial, then the appellate process in an effort to delay the inevitable.

Bishop said he fired the shot that killed Ballard, and he has a right to plead guilty if he wants to.

Although admitting to being under the influence of heroin at the time of the robbery, Bishop told Clark County District Judge Paul Goldman that he was fully aware of what he was doing at the time.

Judge Goldman, who accepted Bishop's guilty plea, selected fellow District Court Judges Merlin Hoyt and William Foreman to sit with him in the penalty phase of the case.

### 35 Seal Beach Home Sites To Be Sold

Thirty-five home sites will go on the auction block Sunday in Seal Beach, with more than 700 people already registered as bidders.

The land was once the Seal Beach City Yard. The 35 lots are expected to command prices of \$55,000 to \$70,000 each.

Officials of Kennedy-Wilson Auctioneers of Los Angeles predict all the lots will be sold at the auction under a big top circus tent, bringing about \$1 million into the city treasury.

Bidding, limited to those who have registered and had their credit ratings checked, is scheduled to begin at 11 a.m. The auction site is in Eisenhower Park at the base of the municipal pier.

# Stranded Couple Die in Snowstorm

ASHKUM, Ill. (AP) — John Sorensen and Judith Lottich lived together and died together, huddled in their stranded car on a lonely stretch of road in a snowstorm. Authorities said the young couple had rejected rescue efforts, hoping to wait out the storm on their own.

The bodies of Sorensen, 24, and Ms. Lottich, 19, were pulled Thursday night from their car on Interstate 57 near this town about 75 miles south of the Chicago suburb of La Grange, where they lived. Snow drifted to 4 feet deep around the car, rescue workers said.

**THE TWO HAD MET AT THE** University of Illinois in Urbana and both worked the night shift at a General Motors plant near La Grange, said Alex Bersin, a friend.

Bersin said the couple apparently left Wednesday night or Thursday for Urbana, where both had attended classes at the university last year.

During the height of the storm Thursday morning, the National Weather Service warned: "Being lost in open country during

a blizzard is almost certain death."

**HOURS BEFORE THE BODIES** were found, rescuers on snowmobiles checked the area for stranded motorists. Acting Coroner Phyllis Jameson said Sorensen and Ms. Lottich were one of several couples who refused to leave.

When rescue workers made it to the car again Thursday night, the couple were dead.

"The ignition was turned off, the exhaust pipe was free, there was a quarter tank of gasoline left and the vent window was open," said Trooper Len Addison. "The car was practically buried with snow."

**ADDISON SPECULATED HIGH WINDS** may have created a suction which drew carbon monoxide fumes into the car. The couple may have gotten groggy, turned off the ignition, fallen unconscious and died.

"We have to wait for the laboratory reports but probably died

from carbon monoxide poisoning or exposure or a combination of both," the acting coroner said.

"I'm speechless," said Ms. Lottich's father, Philip. "You know, it's hard for a parent to be objective but by the usual objective standards she was a very unusual girl — intelligent, warm, thoughtful and considerate."

**SOERSON'S FATHER, A MAJOR** general in the Air Force Reserve, was in Belgium at a NATO meeting and could not be reached. His mother is an executive secretary at General Motors.

Lottich said his daughter was "a very creative person and always wanting to do other things for people."

"When the coroner called me this morning, she said one of the items found on her body was a donor card asking that her kidneys be given to some organization," said Lottich, a dean at Loop Community College. "Apparently that might not be able to be done because of the nature of death, possibly carbon monoxide. But I cite this as an example of her thoughtfulness. This is just unspeakably sad."

### OC Panel Approves Niguel Restaurant

A plan that could result in a restaurant atop La Paz Hill overlooking Laguna Niguel Regional Park has been approved by the County's Harbors, Beaches and Parks Commission.

Voting 3-2 with two members absent, the commission disregarded staff and homeowners association recommendations that the county acquire the entire 26-acre hill as part of the regional park.

Laguna Niguel Homeowners Association and the Saddleback Area Coordinating Council.

**LYING JUST** north of the park and east of the intersection of Alicia Parkway and Aliso Creek Road, the hill is owned by Narland Corporation. Shapell Industries, which is proposing a restaurant on the hill's eastern peak, holds a purchase option on the property.

Narland and Shapell spokesmen outlined plans this week for a 10-acre apartment and restaurant project for the hill's northern slope and eastern portion of ridge line.

Under the proposal approved and passed on to the county planning commission for consideration next month, the developer would leave the remaining 16-acre south slope in open space, or possibly, allow its acquisition by the county, according to Larry Leaman, county recreation and open space manager.

**LEAMAN SAID** the environmental management agency staff had hoped to acquire the entire hill at an appraised value of \$260,000 as a natural area for nature walks, hiking and viewing as well as for model radio controlled glider flying.

Lori Andersen was jailed in Burbank after police picked her up at Burbank Community Hospital, where she was taken Thursday night after being found tied up and apparently unconscious on a street in Glendale, police said.

**BUT LT. ROBERT** Smith of Burbank police said Miss Andersen is "perfectly healthy. There's no reason for her to be at the hospital."

He theorized she may have tied herself up and remained sprawled on the street deliberately.

**THE BODY OF** Susan Hyde, 31, a tennis instructor at the university, was found Friday morning in a shallow grave along Foothill Boulevard in Sylmar. Police said she had been shot with a .22-caliber weapon.

A roommate reported Miss Hyde missing from her Burbank apartment Jan. 24, and Burbank police had been seeking Miss Andersen before she was found bound on the Glendale street, Smith said.

# Landscaping Approved

## San Clemente Settles Right-of-way Dispute

A six-year fight in San Clemente over disposition of a 3,527-square foot city right of way on East Avenida Cordoba apparently has ended with city councilmen voting unanimously to have the property landscaped.

The city-owned property is located high on a hillside, overlooking south San Clemente, with a panoramic view to the southwest of San Clemente Island and the mountains of north San Diego County.

"I DON'T HAVE a view like people who live on the hills," Eva Riley, of 121 Ave. de los Lobos Marinos, told City Council. "I like to have a public place like this property where I can go for the view. I don't see why it should belong to private parties."

Mrs. Joseph Smith, who owns property adjacent to the city land, urged councilmen to abandon the parcel, which she said is "a disgusting sight."

The right of way is an odd-shaped strip of land, with only a sidewalk and a fence on it, said Mrs. Smith. She and her husband plan to develop their property and would like to incorporate the city land in their total landscaping plan.

**DISPUTES OVER** the Cordoba Street right of way date back to

July, 1971, when a city service club asked the council if members could develop a park on excess freeway land adjacent to the city-owned parcel, the city attorney reported to council.

The possibility of a city park on combined city and state properties was entertained by the city until February, 1974. Petitions to the council in 1973 and 1974 urged councilmen not to create the park.

Citizens who addressed the council during public hearings said the proposed park would create parking problems and traffic hazards.

**EARLY IN 1974**, the council voted to abandon park plans for the right of way property. The California Highway Department

was informed that the city had no further interest in the state-owned excess freeway land.

In May, 1976, the council considered a request from the Smiths to abandon the parcel. After several discussions of alternative dispositions of the property, councilmen voted unanimously after a public hearing in November, 1976, to proceed with abandonment.

A year later, however, Gerald Weeks, hired as city manager in 1976, recommended that the city check again into obtaining the 10,000-foot state-owned property.

**COUNCILMEN VOTED** unanimously to support Weeks' recommendation. A public hearing was scheduled for January 18.

It was at the public hearing that Mrs. Riley asked the council to designate the site a view park and post it with signs, indicating it is open to the public.

Councilmen voted unanimously to support Councilman William Walker's motion to drop abandonment proceedings "once and for all" and direct city parks planner Bob Johnston to develop a landscaping proposal for the site.

"This property has become a political issue," Mrs. Smith told councilmen. "I am very disgusted."

## Virginia, South Carolina Hardest Hit

### U.S. Summary

Cold temperatures, high winds and light snow made Friday another rough winter day for the areas hit by blizzard conditions Thursday.

However, both the snow and winds were diminishing from the Great Lakes region through northern New England.

Some flooding continued in parts of the East and South from streams overburdened by rain and, in some instances, melting snow.

The National Weather Service reported that Erie, Pa., has already had a record amount of snow this winter for the city — 120.8 inches — including 34.3 inches so far in January, a record for the month.

The 20 inches in Indianapolis this month ties a record for that city.

In Virginia, severe flooding continues along the James river and moderate to major flooding has occurred on most rivers in South Carolina from the midlands to the coast. Minor to moderate stream flooding has occurred in Georgia and Alabama.

In the western part of the country, scattered rain showers have been falling in western Washington and some flooding has occurred from Montana and Wyoming into North Dakota.

Early afternoon temperatures ranged from 24 below zero at Devils Lake and Mount Air Force Base in N.D., to 75 at Brownsville, Texas.

Saturday's forecast was for snow showers to continue from the Great Lakes through northeastern New



York, northern Maine, the central Appalachians and the upper Ohio Valley.

Sunny to partly cloudy skies will prevail elsewhere.

### California

While other sections of the nation are bundling up in sub-zero winter temperatures, Southern Californians shouldn't need more than shirtsleeves to keep comfortable.

The National Weather Service said Friday that there should be sunny from the coast to the mountains, with light to moderate winds blowing to the east.

The forecast, they should be sunny, but temperatures will be about 50 degrees lower.

## Pharmacy Kits Available

## Home Test Finds Pregnancy

NEW YORK (AP) — "Am I pregnant or not?" is a question that American women can answer for themselves in the privacy of their homes.

A kit distributed by Warner-Chilcott — E.P.T. (Early Pregnancy Test) — is said to be capable of detecting pregnancy as early as nine days after a woman has missed an expected menstrual period.

THE KIT WAS introduced to the media here this week.

Dr. Arthur Flanagan, vice president of medical affairs for the pharmaceutical company, said early detection is important because "the first 60 days are crucial in healthy fetal development."

He said that during this time the expectant mother who knows she's pregnant can take steps to avoid such things as heavy cigarette smoking, excessive alcohol and even common household drugs which could cause birth defects and intrauterine death.

GLORIA PAINTER, a nurse who supervised clinical research on the kit,

said other women may want to find out whether they were pregnant because of "marital involvement." She said that "there's an awful lot of cloak-and-dagger work" involved in extra-marital affairs.

She said some women take the attitude that "I'll kill myself if my husband finds out I'm pregnant."

Early private detection also "lends objectivity" to the decision of some women considering abortion, said Dr. Howard McQuarrie, an obstetrician who participated in the clinical research.

THE KIT HAS A TEST tube, which contains chemicals that should detect a pregnancy hormone in a woman's urine; a dropper; a vial with purified water; and a test tube holder with mirror.

To use the kit, a woman must wait at least nine days after her period was due, then place the purified water and three drops of urine in the tube, shake the test tube for 10 seconds, and let the tube stand in the holder for two hours.

If a brown ring forms in the bottom of the tube, as seen in the mirror, she can be 97 percent sure she is pregnant.

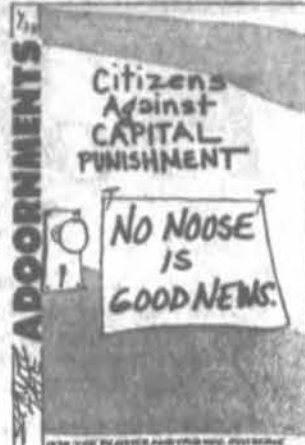
"AS SOON AS possible, we strongly advise that she consult her doctor, who is best able to advise her further," Flanagan said.

The brown ring is caused by mixture with an anti-hormone serum and a coloring agent.

"If the pregnancy hormone is not detected," Flanagan added, "only a yellow-red deposit will be seen."

DUANE MILLER, PRESIDENT of Warner-Chilcott, said the kit is distributed to pharmacies for about \$6 each and is expected to retail for less than \$10. It was introduced in New England in April 1976, and has been distributed nationwide.

Miller said it was brought to the United States under a licensing agreement with Axel Pharm of Oss, Holland, which has been distributing it in 13 European countries where it has been used by millions of women since 1970 under the name "Predictor."

VISALIA (AP) — A Bakersfield man has been sentenced to 270 days in jail for violating a court order to improve farm labor housing he owns in southern Tulare County. Superior Court Judge Kenneth Andreen, ruled recently that Robert E. Maloy rented 45 old boxcars and nine other structures in violation of a previous order.

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# Profits: Job Seed Money or a Gouge?

Half the people in America think business earns "too much" profit. At least, that's what opinion polls report. It isn't that Americans are down on business. Nine out of 10, say the polls, favor the private enterprise system.

**NOR IS IT THAT** Americans reject the idea of profit. It's just that they think business profits are higher than they ought to be. Profits should be reasonable, the public contends.

Very well then, what is a reasonable profit? Can reasonable be defined as a gauge for measuring profit levels? Not easily, for there are no pat answers.

A. R. Marusi, chairman and chief executive of Borden, Inc., says that "reasonable" varies from industry to industry, depending on risk, business cycles, and capital needs.

A profit is reasonable, suggests Irving S. Shapiro, chairman of the board, E. I. du Pont de Nemours & Company, at a level that continues to improve living standards for Americans. He answers the question in this way:

"ASKING HOW much profit is reasonable is like asking how many eggs you should buy for breakfast. It depends on the size of your family and other factors."

"By the same token, what is a reasonable profit depends on an industry's needs. Most Americans will agree that a fair profit is essential to a strong economy, but the idea that there are 'needs' for earnings may be difficult to accept."

"Profits are not pools of money that sit idle. In all business firms, profits are used — put to work — as soon as they are earned. They are plowed back into the economy through investment in new manufacturing plants and new equipment. They are used to expand production and create jobs. They improve efficiency. In sum, profits are 'seed money,' the means to insure a healthy, growing economy."

"Profits have a second function. A portion is paid out in dividends to the stockholders or owners. These dividends are, essentially, payment for the use of stockholders' money, which has been invested in the company."

"THESE NEEDS WILL vary among industries. In the chemical industry, stiff competition and new technology mean plants become obsolete quickly. Bigger manufacturing units are required to supply growing markets. These conditions add up to a huge demand for capital investment."

"All business — not just the chemical industry — has been suffering from a shortage of capital; due in large part to a decline in profits in recent years. This situation cannot go on indefinitely. At some point, additional borrowing becomes too risky."

Another prominent corporate leader, Fletcher L. Byrom, chairman of the board, Koppers Company, Inc., agrees with Shapiro in some elements, but emphasizes a different aspect. He answers the question in these words:

"A profit is reasonable when it provides for the survival of an enterprise."

"Survival is possible only when profits are sufficient to perform their two life-giving functions . . . to pay investors for the use of their savings and to increase the productive base of an enterprise so that it can remain a useful entity. These two functions are essential regardless of whether the enterprise is privately held or state-owned."

"Unfortunately, profits have not been permitted to reach levels that will allow private enterprise to survive. In the past five years, the median return for all industries has been a little over nine cents on each dollar invested . . . that's during a period of high inflation and inadequate depreciation."

"Our capital-intensive industries such as steel, paper, and non-ferrous metals are good examples. They probably need price increases of about 50 percent to provide for modernization."

"BRITAIN FAILED TO allow the steel industry to provide for its future with private capital and then had to rescue an obsolete industry with public funds. In this country, nationalization of basic industries and utilities is a probability within 10 to 15 years."

Public misconceptions about profit, and the policies such misconceptions produce, appear to threaten both personal and national welfare. It seems that profit is looked upon as something extra, something a business could get along just as well without.

Competition for capital, says Marshal McDonald, president of Florida Light and Power Co., also requires a growing level of profit.

"Recently, the United States government issued some securities offering about 9½ percent interest. That's tough competition for a private company that must bid even higher for an investor's savings."

"Indications are that what investors consider reasonable for an electric utility company is a return on common shareholders' equity in the 14 to 16 percent range. When the United States government must offer so high a return on a virtually risk-free investment, you can see why private business has to offer 14 percent or more to attract equity capital."

IN A DIFFERENT VEIN, publisher David V. White, the youthful chairman of Approach 13-30 Corporation, believes that the public furor over corporate profits has to do with the broader question of what companies do with all revenue taken in. He believes that to speak to the question of what a reasonable profit is, a business must explain how total revenues are disbursed among the conflicting private and social goals that compete for the sales dollar. He lists:

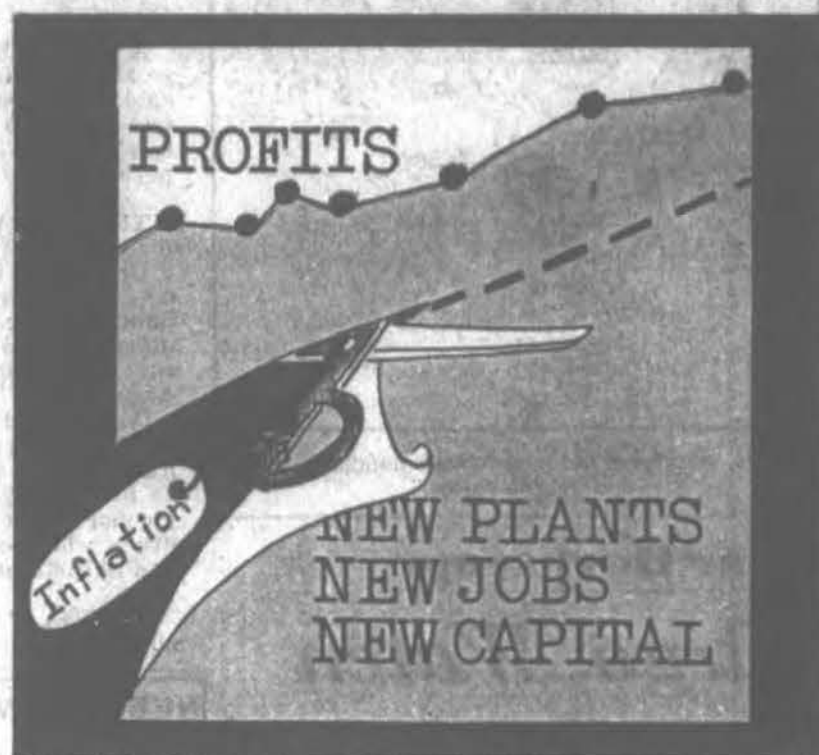
"Providing all employees with a gradually rising standard of living, as well as an increasing sense of self-worth in their jobs."

"Protecting the environment from any further damage, and even correcting past abuses of the environment."

"Attracting sufficiently competent executives to run an efficient company."

"Paying a sufficient return on invested capital to attract the capital necessary for growth."

"Providing consumers with the products they desire at the lowest possible prices."

"Funding research programs sufficient for an expanding economy."

"Accumulating the surplus funds necessary for capital investment."

"Providing an increasing number of jobs for a growing labor force."

"The business community must begin to communicate to the public that each of these goals is being given the right proportion of the sales dollar if the public's attitude toward business is to be changed," White says.

On one definition, business leaders agree. A reasonable profit is one that enables an efficient business to compete successfully for investment capital. It is a definition with which consumers should readily agree, for with adequate capital resources, a company can do what society requires.

When business earns a reasonable profit, consumers are the chief beneficiaries. When business is denied a reasonable profit, consumers are the real losers.

## Rate Query Bogs Down

The year-old campaign of one Los Angeles County supervisor for reform in auto insurance rates was billed when it began as a test of the county's political clout.

If it was a test, the county is failing.

FOR A YEAR, Kenneth Hahn has argued that residents of central Los Angeles County are being "redlined" by car insurance companies. He noted that they pay an average of \$960 per year for the same coverage that costs some rural drivers only \$385.

So Hahn began pushing a package of reform bills that would base rates completely on the buyer's driving record, ruling out the standard "territorial rating" system.

Because Hahn is not a normal county supervisor, his proposals were taken seriously both in the Legislature and by the insurance industry.

Democratic State Sen. Nate Holden, sponsor of the Hahn package in Sacramento, is a former field deputy for the supervisor. He got support also from almost all 10 of the other state senators and assemblymen whose districts overlap Hahn's own large supervisory one.

NEVERTHELESS, Hahn and his county's delegation have apparently failed. For there now is little hope of passing the Holden bills. A coalition of rural legislators and suburban Los

Angeles County Republicans has gathered enough votes to make passage unlikely.

Hahn is now trying to break up that coalition by convincing rural drivers and residents of smaller cities that they are victims of geographical discrimination, too.

"(The insurance) industry has been putting out the 'big myth' in an effort to brainwash the people of California into thinking they aren't safe drivers," Hahn said.

"THEY HAVE used a divide-and-conquer fear tactic, falsely saying the drivers in rural areas of California will have to pay higher premiums if redlining ends."

The opposite, he argues, is true. "Premiums would be reduced for all California drivers," Hahn claims.

His staff surveyed insurance rates in 40 states and found the average annual premium in counties like San Luis Obispo, Kings, Tulare, Sonoma and Imperial is \$481, about \$100 more than the rates paid by drivers in much more urban areas like Madison, Wis.; Las Vegas, Nev., and Charlotte, N.C.

Hahn's report contrasted premiums of \$519 in Sacramento with \$268 in Wichita, Kan., about the same size.

Hahn, whose only venture into statewide politics was an unsuccessful bid for a Democratic senatorial nomination in the 1960s, clearly understands now that simply demonstrating that his constituents pay unfair rates won't be enough to help them.

The fact that the average insurance premium in central Los Angeles County is up \$390 since 1975 won't sway suburban legislators or those from other major cities.

And after a year of trying, it is clear that even the one-man, one-vote formula that gives the legislative majority to the Southland isn't enough to bring automatic approval for plans that would chiefly benefit Los Angeles.

THAT'S WHY Hahn conducted his 40-state survey. But even that effort might not be enough to sway the Legislature.

Unless he can convince rural lawmakers that rates in their districts would also drop, his proposals have no chance. And the insurance industry has already begun a campaign to convince those rural areas they would lose money if the same factors were used to set everyone's car insurance prices.

In this contest, at least, it appears the combined clout of the insurance companies and the rural areas remains adequate to beat back even the pet proposal of one of Los Angeles County's most powerful and popular politicians.

## 'Kiddie Court' Attacked

Under California law, juveniles who commit a felony may be sent to the juvenile court system or Superior Court to be tried as an adult.

Some observers say the California Youth Authority (which can be fairly described as a prison system for youthful violent offenders) is overly eager to keep young hoods in the juvenile system.

"YOU'VE GOT this little killer and you tell the judge, people who are other people to death are amenable to juvenile treatment," says Dan M. Kinter, supervisor of juvenile prosecutions in the Sacramento District Attorney's Office.

"But," Kinter explains, in waitzes California Youth Authority experts who say, "why, this is just a disturbed young man. Certainly we have a rehabilitation program for Jack-the-Ripper, Charlie Manson and Attila the Hun."

And, according to statistics

from the state Department of Corrections, there were only ten 17-year-olds in state prisons in 1976 and no 16-year-olds.

When CYA is successful in getting a young murderer committed to its facilities, there are serious consequences for the public.

Here's what's been happening. Since CYA's formation in 1941, through 1966, a large share of its inmates were non-criminals such as runaways and school truants.

THEN, IN 1966, the state started giving financial incentives for local handling and parole of non-serious offenders. And, in 1975, another law prohibited incarceration of runaways and truants.

As a result, CYA's population has become "hard core." In 1966, 70 percent of CYA inmates were between 8 and 17 years old. Now, more than 70 percent are between 17 and 25. Also, in 1966 only 15 percent of CYA inmates were there because they had committed a violent crime. Now violent offenders make up about 42 percent of all CYA inmates.

While the ages and seriousness of offenses committed by CYA inmates is escalating, terms served in CYA institutions have decreased 15 percent in the past two years alone. From an average of 13 months served in 1975 for all crimes, including murder, terms served decreased to an average of 11 months in 1977.

WHEN SHOWN CYA figures for terms served for specific crimes, Anthony Y. Traxson, executive director of the

American Correctional Association of College Park, Maryland, said: "Generally speaking, they sound low compared with the rest of the country."

GOV. EDMUND G. Brown, Jr., has expressed shock at the early release of violent offenders, and the increased average ages of CYA inmates.

Governor Brown's other concerns include CYA's efforts to obtain jurisdiction over youthful offenders, secrecy in CYA parole proceedings, and an increase in gang violence in CYA institutions. He has promised action on all fronts.

Two bills have recently been introduced to shape up sagging CYA efforts to protect the public.

With support from James Hooper, president of the CYA Parole Agents Association, Assemblyman Alister McAllister introduced the Public Safety Youth Authority Parole Act on Jan. 12.

THE ACT WOULD open to the public all CYA parole hearings involving violent and dangerous felons, require CYA — for the first time in its history — to consider public safety before granting paroles, and set mandatory minimum CYA terms for youthful, violent offenders.

An outright bar to 18-year-olds being committed to CYA is contained in a bill introduced this January by Senator George Deukmejian.

Perhaps these bills will mark the beginning of the end of the "kiddie court" mentality that always puts the public safety at the bottom of its priority list.

## Dates Back to 1500s

# Europe Developed First Railroads

Andy sends a World Book Year Book to Debra Weber, age 18, of San Diego, Calif., for her question:

**HOW WAS THE TRAIN DEVELOPED?**

A few primitive railroads could be found in Europe as early as the mid-1500s, most of them involved in the coal or iron ore business. Men or horses pulled the first cars which were little more than wagons with flanged wheels designed to move on wooden rails.

By the mid-1700s, the wooden rails were being covered with strips of iron to make them last longer, and it wasn't too much after that the first all-iron rails came along.

During the late 1700s and early 1800s, an inventor in England named Richard Trevithick worked on the first steam engines that were capable of using high-pressure steam. His engine was mounted on a four-wheeled undercarriage that moved along a track. An 1804 model pulled a 10-ton load of coal along almost 10 miles of track and became the world's first successful railroad locomotive.

**IN 1825 A LOCOMOTIVE** builder named George Stephenson put together the world's first public railroad. The line operated between the towns of Stockton and Darlington in England, a distance of 20 miles.

## Python Bite Bigger Than His Stomach?

ITHACA, N.Y. (AP) — Even the mighty python can bite off more than it can chew.

It took surgery to remove lunch from the stomach of Bandit, a pet 5-foot blood python owned by Richard Miller, a fourth-year student at the Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine.

The problem was an 11-inch rat — her usual meal — that passed through Bandit's stomach during lunch break six months ago and lodged in her intestine. Doctors began to suspect a problem after she lost 20 pounds, and discovered a blockage from the rat's bones.

The first full-size locomotive to run on a track in North America was one built by the Delaware and Hudson Canal Company of Pennsylvania in 1829.

**WHAT EXACTLY IS A SONIC BOOM?**

A sonic boom is a loud noise caused by a plane traveling at supersonic speed. The noise is the result of a shock wave produced by the airplane.

The shock wave is a pressure disturbance that builds up around the plane flying at a high speed. It results from a change in the air-flow pattern around the plane's leading edges.

A sonic boom sounds like a loud roar of thunder on earth. It cannot hurt people, but it has been known to break windows and even crack plaster.

A plane that reaches the speed of sound is said to be crossing the sonic or sound barrier. The first person to break this barrier was Capt. Charles E. Yeager of the U.S. Air Force who did it on Oct. 4, 1947, in a Bell X-1 rocket plane.

# Chameleons Harmless

**DEAR ELLIE:** Are there any big chameleons or are they all very small?

**JAY D.** There is a "giant" chameleon — about two and a half feet long — that lives on the island of Madagascar. (The smallest of the chameleons is the "dwarf" which is only one and a half inches long and could well be the world's smallest reptile.)

Like most chameleons, the "giant" has an extremely fierce appearance: strange eyes that can focus separately, a helmet like hood that extends back of the head, a wide mouth and a nose covered with protrusions that look like tiny horns.

Many of the native people in Madagascar fear this reptile because it looks so ferocious. But it is harmless to people and eats only insects, small rodents, and little birds.

**ALL CHAMELEONS** have a very long tongue that lies coiled in the mouth. When close to a possible source of food, the reptile "shoots" out the tongue with lightning speed. The force is strong enough to stun the small victim with the club-like tip. Food such as insects is picked up on the sticky tongue and drawn into the mouth. Larger prey is picked up directly by the mouth, and all is eaten immediately.

Like most chameleons, the "giant" has the ability to change color — a feat always determined by such things as humidity, temperature, and emotional state. For example when two male chameleons fight

to defend territory, the victor turns a bright hue while the defeated assumes a dull, drab color. This seems to be a signal to the stronger one to cease the attack, for when the defeated one becomes faded and dull-colored, the victor simply walks off.

**DEAR ELLIE:** Do all caterpillars turn into moths or butterflies?

**MARCY R.**

**DEAR MARCY:** Yes. The caterpillar is one of the stages through which all butterflies and moths must pass. They hatch from eggs and although all caterpillars have distinct appearances depending on what they are going to turn into, all share some characteristics.

They never have any form of wings and never any scales. They all have strong jaws for chewing off leaves — a completely different kind of mouth from that of either butterfly or moth which can only extract nectar from flowers. And all caterpillars shed their outer skin as they grow.

These small creatures are both useful and harmful to man. For example, it is from a certain kind of caterpillar that all true silk is produced, yet many forms of vegetation are destroyed by other kinds of caterpillars.

**DEAR ELLIE:** What do you think is the most unusual kind of monkey?

**MIKE W.**

**DEAR MIKE:** There are many members of the primate

family that could in a sense be called unusual — some in appearance like the bald, red-faced uakari; some in their human like habits; and some in their peculiar practices as the food-washing by a group of macaques.

But the little 5 to 6 inch tarsier from the East Indian archipelago is one of the most fascinating. It has a short nose, with nostrils facing sideways; mobile ears; huge eyes; and a thin, almost hairless tail. The body is covered with thick fur.

The long, spidery toes have fleshy discs at the end. It is an awkward little creature when it is climbing among the branches but it is a tremendous jumper. It straightens its long hind legs and pushes itself off a limb, landing always with its tail straight up.

**THE TARSIER** is the only true carnivorous primate and eats only grubs, insects, frogs, lizards and probably small birds. Always on the alert for an animal who might eat it, the tarsier usually eats with one eye partially open.

It is the most primitive of all the primates, yet it is more like true monkeys than like the lemurs, bush babies and lorises with which it is usually grouped. Like monkeys, it has a furrowed nose and an upper lip that is free from the gum.

## Blufftop Petitions Sent Out

Dr. Eugene Atherton of Newport Beach said he has completed mailing 6,000 petitions to local residents interested in his blufftop preservation initiative.

If approved, the initiative would force developers to provide public streets and blufftop strip parks when building on undeveloped bluff areas surrounding Upper Newport Bay and in the Irvine coast area.

ACCORDING TO City Clerk Doris George, Atherton needs to get the signatures of 5,890 Newport Beach registered voters in order to qualify his measure for the June ballot.

The signatures must be filed with Mrs. George by Feb. 8.

Atherton says the initiative would assure public access and prevent "China Wall" type developments. He cited Cameo Shores as the kind he hopes to prevent.

ATHERTON successfully conducted a prior Newport Beach initiative that requires developers to dedicate more land for parks. The measure was adopted as city law.

His new initiative drive is aimed at new subdivisions adjoining Upper Newport Bay and any future down coast development south of Newport Beach.

It would provide an exception for narrow areas less than 560 feet from the bluff line to Pacific Coast Highway, Jamboree Road, Dover Drive or Irvine Avenue.

ON THE IRVINE Company's Castaways site, new homes south of 16th St. would be set back from the bluff edge about 125 feet instead of 25 feet, Atherton said. He said this provision places a tougher standard on developments than current Coastal Commission guidelines.

Atherton, who has announced that he is a candidate for governor in the Democratic primary, says his latest initiative effort has cost him about \$1,000 to date.

## Crime Fear Profiled

WASHINGTON (AP) — Age and sex have more to do with experiencing fear of crime than whether a person has been a crime victim, according to a federal report.

The Justice Department survey was conducted in 13 major cities over four years ending in 1975 and contained some surprising statistics about reaction to crime.

FOR EXAMPLE, THE report said victims of assaults express less fear about the safety of their neighborhoods than victims of less violent crimes, such as purse snatching.

The apparent reason, the survey concludes, is that older women are the primary victims of purse snatchings and robbery in which there is no bodily harm.

A greater percentage of younger men are victims of more serious crimes involving assault.

THE CITIES in the survey were Atlanta; Baltimore; Cleveland; Dallas; Denver; Newark, N.J.; St.

Louis; Portland, Ore.; Chicago; New York; Detroit; Los Angeles; and Philadelphia.

Women are more likely to be afraid of crime than men, the report said. For example, 34 percent of the females questioned said they felt very unsafe out alone in their neighborhoods at night, compared to 11 percent for men.

There was little difference expressed on this question between persons who were victims of crime and those who were not.

HOWEVER, WHEN IT comes to considering a move out of the neighborhood, there is a correlation, the study said.

About one-third of the victims, but only 18 percent of the non-victims, said they seriously considered moving because of crime, the survey showed.

The survey was conducted by the Census Bureau and the results analyzed by the Criminal Justice Research Center of Albany, N.Y., under a grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.

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# Houseplant Boom Seen

## Research Developing Quality and Variety

Is the houseplant boom over? Will plastic foliage creep into our homes and offices to collect dust once again?

While sales of indoor plants are stabilizing, the foundations of the plant boom — "environmental concern, a search for beauty amid urban steel and concrete, and the realization that people need plants as much as plants need people" — have not been eroded.

**FAR FROM** losing interest in houseplants, Dr. Charles Conover, Director of the University of Florida's Agricultural Research Center located in Apopka, Florida, speculates that the next phase of the boom will be in the development of a wider availability of many more worthy plants.

Reportedly, only about 25 foliage and even fewer flowering plants currently dominate the market. Experienced indoor gardeners, however,

have found hundreds of others that are suited to a variety of home conditions.

**LARGE SCALE** commercial growers are beginning to test some of these and develop mass production methods which will turn out high quality plants profitably. Progress is proceeding very slowly but there are hopes that non-profit and university research facilities will soon devote more effort to test potentially successful houseplants.

The time is right for major plant introductions. The gains of the past six years since the start of the houseplant craze have set the stage. Production has caught up with demand, and marginal producers and sellers are being eliminated. Quality plants, greater diversity of plant material and suitability to indoor conditions are coming our way. A visit to your garden center or nursery may reveal some of the new and improved plants already.

## Weekend Gardening Checklist

● Plant deciduous bare root fruit trees now. Wait until March or April to plant evergreen fruits such as citrus.

● Don't be afraid to cut blooms with short stems for flower arrangements from camellia bushes. The light pruning will help keep plants compact and full.

● Spray Boysenberries and Blackberries to control mites. These mites prevent the berries from ripening evenly.

● Feed Cyclamen as you would Begonias with a mild liquid feed. Potted plants need more frequent feeding and watering than do those in the ground.

● Geraniums and Pelargoniums may be cut back this month in preparation for spring growth.

## Planning Needed For Shade Trees

As you daydream about the years of pleasure you're going to get from the shade trees you're about to plant, don't lose sight of the fact that the project calls for some wide-awake planning.

A good start in life is especially important with shade trees for it often dictates how well they perform later on. And, if they are hastily planted they will seldom provide a wealth of shade.

**WHETHER BARE-ROOT** or container grown stock is planted, the ground must be adequately prepared. If fortune has dealt you a rich, well-drained soil, you are lucky, indeed, and need worry little about success with whatever you plant. Most of us, however, have soil problems of varying degree that some extra thought and effort will easily remedy.

In all cases, the hole should be amply larger than the root ball or root spread. Where hard pan exists (that cement-like substratum that occasionally underlies a shallow top soil) make every effort to break through it to insure drainage and better root run. In heavy clay or adobe soil, work liberal helpings of shredded bark, compost planting mix, or manure into the soil well out around the hole before planting the tree. This allows more air penetration to the root area.

**FIGURE ON** planting the tree at about the same depth it was planted in the nursery or slightly higher. With bare-root stock, the ring left by the earth is clearly visible. Fill the bottom of the hole to the desired level with topsoil — mounding a pyramid of it under bare-root stock — then fill the hole slowly to make sure no air pockets are left. Immediately afterward, soak the roots in thoroughly.

As to the type of shade you plant, your choice is wide. As a rule, deciduous trees grow faster than evergreen trees, and if you can find bare-root trees they are a real bargain.

Analysis Aids Decision

Thinking of changing jobs? This checklist can help you decide whether to walk or stand pat.

Is your restlessness really job-based? Emotional upsets unrelated to your work — or dissatisfaction with life in general — will not disappear because of a new employment address.

TO CLARIFY YOUR dilemma, make an informal scorecard for your present employer. Rate factors important to you plus or minus.

Examples: Are promotion and pay policies objective? Are you bored because your skills are underutilized? Are you strengthening your work experience, or replaying it over and over? Can you transfer to another department if your boss is a dud? Are you boxed under a young boss who's unlikely to leave? Have you been demoted or passed over? Are you losing out in office politics?

Is the firm financially stable? Are its products curving down in sales, while your career is curving up? Does your job permit the lifestyle you want? If not, do you need to change jobs, or career fields?

BE HONEST in scoring your performance. Are you producing or coasting? Stirring up power struggles you can't win? Creating a measurable, result-oriented track record? Being public-relations wise in letting others know what a good job you're doing?

CAREERS

If the trouble's with you, not the firm, shaping up your act could be your best course at this time. Ask yourself what you have to offer a new employer that will make you more valuable than someone already on her or his team. Better not move until you have a good answer to this question (assuming you're not about to be fired).

A COROLLARY TACTIC is asking your boss to suggest ways to improve your job performance. An apathetic response is not promising. Concrete suggestions should be acted upon, keeping the boss advised of your progress (a compliment to the boss's mentoring). If the boss says you're doing great, you might get a raise without having to ask for it.

If it becomes obvious that you're giving more than you're likely to reap in return, begin to prepare a job-hunt action plan.

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Tax Benefits

Pension Plan a Boon

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the millions of Americans who do not have pension plans where they work, the Individual Retirement Account can be a boon both now and at retirement.

The accounts — commonly called IRAs — allow individuals to start their own retirement plan, and to get tax benefits from doing so.

IT IS NOT TOO late to get tax benefits this season. The deadline is Feb. 14, and now may be the time to think also about getting started on retirement savings to get a tax break next year.

With such an account an individual can contribute 15 percent of income up to \$1,500 a year, whichever is less, and defer taxes until retirement. However, as these are retirement funds, the money cannot be taken from the account before age 59½ without penalties.

Individual Retirement Accounts may differ and the Federal Trade Commission has published a consumer guide to the plans.

"FRANK TALK ABOUT IRAs" is based on a two-year investigation of the plans and the way they are sold.

Common problems which have been faced by consumers are discussed in the booklet and suggestions are offered on how to avoid problems.

The booklet notes that some persons may change jobs and become ineligible to contribute to an IRA because they become covered by another retirement plan.

SINCE SOME PLANS require payments to be kept up, these individuals may default on the plan and be required to pay current taxes

CONSUMER

plus a penalty on the money they get back from the plan.

And since most insurance companies which offer the plans deduct their fees from the first year's payments, consumers may receive little or nothing back if they default soon after starting the account.

SACRAMENTO (AP) — You may soon be able to obtain alcoholism insurance in California.

A bill approved this week by the state Senate would require group insurance, health and hospital plans to offer such coverage after Jan. 1, 1979.

Bill supporters say alcoholism is a disease and should be covered in health and insurance plans like any other illness.

The bill, SB 1301 by Sen. John Foran, D-San Francisco, was sent to the Assembly on a 25-2 vote.

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## Restaurants: 'Small Is Beautiful'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Small is still beautiful in the restaurant business, says a veteran California restaurateur, and fledgling gourmets have a good chance for success.

"You take a guy with a little cooking ability and he runs the kitchen and his partner runs the front end and they do a great job," says Stan Stockton. "They get old funky chairs out of flea markets, buy used equipment and if they know what they're doing they can turn out a good meal."

STOCKTON, 50-YEAR-OLD president of the Southern California Restaurant Association, operates on a slightly larger scale himself.

The Smoke House, a popular Burbank restaurant he has owned for 25 years, serves about 1,000 dinners a night. He believes, however, that today's diners want personal attention no matter the size of the restaurant.

"I'm a service freak myself," he said. "I don't like salad bars. I like to be taken care of when I go out and I

think most people are the same way. And you get that personal attention to quality and service from an owner-manager."

**WHATEVER IS DRAWING** them, more Californians are dining out than ever before.

Overall sales of the state's 46,000 eating and drinking establishments were \$8.3 billion last year, the California State Restaurant Association says, with that revenue generating \$500 million in sales taxes (about

12 percent of the state's sales taxes).

In addition, Los Angeles may be replacing New York as the nation's culinary capital, according to Restaurant Business Magazine, an industry trade journal.

ANGELENOS SPENT \$2.5 billion at the tables in 1976 compared to \$2.4 billion for New Yorkers, the magazine estimated, noting that this marked the first time New York has been ranked second. Figures for 1977 are not available.

## USC Can Gain Share of Lead With Win

LOS ANGELES (AP) — UCLA basketball coach Gary Cunningham can't be surprised with the importance of his club's battle at Pauley Pavilion against the Trojans of Southern California tonight (8).

It's happened before and it will happen again. This time the leadership of the Pac-8 awaits. A victory for the nationally (No. 6) ranked Bruins of UCLA continues them in the top spot of the conference. A USC triumph throws the leadership into a three-way tie, with Oregon State taking a share.

Cunningham, former assistant to John Wooden, has molded a club with a 13-2 overall record, the two losses both to Notre Dame. In the Pac-8, he's 4-0 in

his inaugural season at the helm.

Bob Boyd's Trojans have come up this season with a 10-7 record, 3-1 in the Pac-8, and only

a few seconds separate them from a seven-game winning string.

The Trojans have won five of their last seven with one loss by three points to Atlantic Coast powerhouse Virginia and the other in overtime to Oregon State.

Cliff Robinson, Southern California's freshman center, leads the conference scoring with a 17.6 average. The 6-8 freshman from Oakland scored

35 and had 28 rebounds a week ago in the non-conference 87-78 victory over Portland State.

Cunningham termed the 75-73 loss to Notre Dame at South Bend "disappointing but not discouraging," and added, "This team believes in itself and keeps coming back."

The Bruins look for their 16th consecutive victory against USC dating back to March 6, 1970, when the Trojans earned an 87-86 victory at Pauley. USC is one of just three teams to beat UCLA at Pauley. The Trojans have done it twice.

Forward David Greenwood leads the Bruins scorers and ranks third in the conference with a 17.1 average. Between Robinson and Greenwood is

California's Gene Ranson with 17.5.

In conference games, the 18-year-old Robinson leads with 17.8 while Greenwood is fourth at 15.3.

## Call Still Fishing at 86 And She Prefers Billfish

Lily Call is a retired mathematics teacher but she doesn't try to figure the odds on her participation in the Hawaiian International billfish tournament for the third straight year this coming summer.

The Newport Beach resident has participated in the last two events at Kona, Hawaii and each of those years she has caught the largest fish taken by a woman participant.

Two years ago the fish she brought to gaff weighed in at 532 pounds. This past summer, her prize blue marlin weighed 431 1/2 pounds. This last one took more than two hours to land, but her patience and love of sport fishing kept her going to the end.

What is so surprising about these accomplishments?

The biggest thing is her age. Lily Call was 84 when she caught that fish last summer and proudly exclaims that she has now passed her 85th birthday.

Fishing has been a hobby of hers for many years — ever since the day her late husband enticed her to go along on a marlin excursion outside the Newport Jetty in nearby ocean waters — to handle the boat.

"He persuaded me to go with him," she explains. "He wanted somebody to run the boat while he fished. I told him after the first trip, that if I had to work that hard to run the boat, I wanted to take a turn fishing, too. After that, we traded off."

When Mrs. Call arrived in Hawaii last summer, she was using a cane to get around.

"I had fallen on the back porch here at home a week or so before we flew to Hawaii," she says. "I hurt my leg so bad I had to use a cane to get around and I was slow moving. They asked me if I wanted a wheel chair at the airport and I told them, 'sure'."

She also needed assistance to get on and off the boat. How about her big catch that took two hours to land? Did she need help with the reel?

"It was tough to land that one," she says. "Here I was, kinda crippled anyway from that fall and then the harness."

"But you know, I don't let anybody interfere. I got that fish and I got it on my own. They offered to help but I just said 'GET AWAY'."

Why did it take so long to land that particular fish? Did her age

have anything to do with it?

"No, age had nothing to do with it," she says. "It all depends on how a fish is hooked. This one was hooked in the top of the bill and the fish wasn't hurt by the hook."

"I had him by the boat in an hour but before he was gaffed he went back out again and it took another hour to get him back in."

"That one was the most hard work I have done in fishing, I believe. He was so ram-bunctious. They had two gaffs in him and he still wasn't ready to come on the boat."

"Finally, they let him out on a rope and dragged him into port."

Fishing as a member of a

four-person team in the tournament and representing the Balboa Angling Club, she was on a charter boat with a woman skipper. That skipper, Myrna Holdridge, says of Mrs. Call's catch:

"You should have seen that fish, a great jumper, beautiful when it would stand up, tension on the line constantly, a wild fight, the kind of fish you can really be proud of."

"So Lily fought it for another hour before she finally landed it after it went back out. That Lily, she's some lady."

The great grandmother is a familiar figure in her small out-

board motor-powered boat in Balboa Bay and around the jetty in the summertime.

"I fish for croaker and corbina in the bay, that's all," she says. "If I get anything else, I throw it back."

She takes the boat out herself and sometimes even ventures out into the open ocean outside the jetty.

She has fished above the arctic circle for shes (the shape of barracuda and weighing about 22 pounds maximum) and has been as far south as Buenos Aires to fish.

"My husband and I used to go salmon fishing at the mouth of the Klamath river, at Ft. Bragg and in Alaska for sockeye. We would take our little boat on top of our camper and get a limit, then come back in and I would can them at night," she says.

"But now I tell myself that I have had my days of work as old as I am. But I still haven't given up fishing, of course. And I won't as long as I can sit up in a chair."

Since she started bill fishing in

1947, she has taken 76 fish and has recorded every one of them as to place, weight and verification. Her records show either a picture was taken of the fish or a certificate issued.

"I want proof of everything I have done," she says.

Lily Call doesn't move quite as fast as she once did but she has shed the cane and walks under her own power these days.

Is she going back to Hawaii this summer?

"I'm not just sure about the summer," she says. "I can't just say I'm going to go. A lot depends on my health and if I am invited to go back."

There is little doubt that she will be invited if her health remains good. Each of the two years she was a participant she caught the largest fish for a woman.

She holds three world records including a 191-pound marlin taken on 50-pound test line in 1949 at La Paz.

Her mind is sharp and her enthusiasm hasn't waned. And regardless of who sets the odds, it is a small gamble that Lily Call will be participating in the 20th annual Hawaiian International Billfish tournament this summer if she cares to fish.

And as soon as the weather permits, she will be back out on the bay fishing for croaker and corbina.

Lily Call of Newport Beach is an amazing woman.

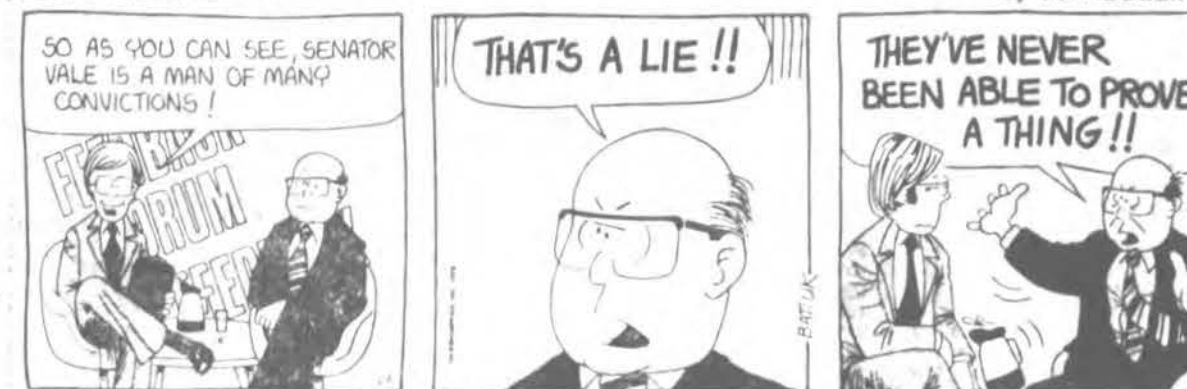

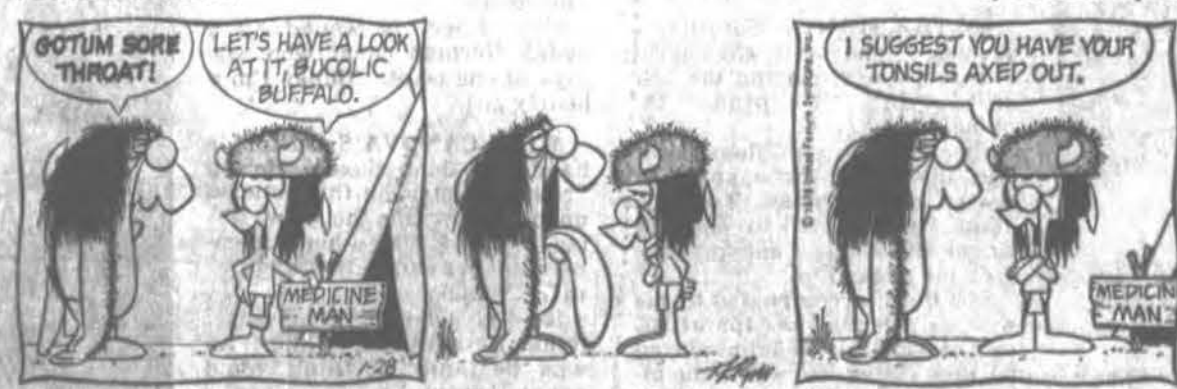

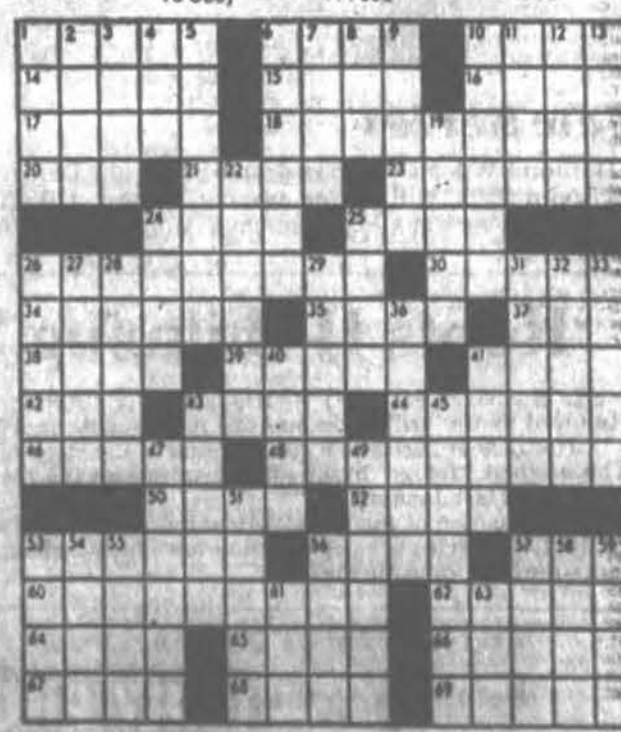

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# Travolta Doesn't Hide His Feelings

NEW YORK (AP) — "The worst thing I could have done," says John Travolta about his off-screen behavior on the set of "Saturday Night Fever," is if "I'd been sort of this 'mystery man,' no emotions, sullen. I get to do that in the movie, I don't have to do that in person."  
"Some people get very distant: they shut off any feelings," he said when asked if his fame from his television series and wide publicity tends to put off his co-workers. The solution is openness, he said, and mentioned one example:  
"Working with someone like Lily Tomlin — I'm probably her biggest fan — I told her: 'I'm so nervous about working with you, because I'm so impressed with you.'"

The as-yet untitled film with Miss Tomlin, the comedy star, is part of Travolta's current million-dollar, three-picture deal which also includes the screen version of "Grease," the long-running Broadway musical.

While Paramount Pictures attributes "Saturday Night Fever's" boxoffice success to "word of mouth," the studio has budgeted slightly more than \$3 million to catch your attention. The film, which opened in mid-December, cost a little

less than \$3 million to make, according to studio executives.

"WOULD TRAVOLTA have succeeded without the marketing campaign? Yes, he would have succeeded," said Gordon Weaver, vice president of worldwide marketing for

Paramount. "But it would have taken longer." Weaver said a \$3 million budget is average for the marketing of a major film, released nationwide.

Travolta's role in "Fever" is an extension of his portrayal of the high school "Sweathog," Vinnie Barbarino in "Welcome, Back Kotter," a television series aimed at the adolescent audience.

Surprisingly, Room 1141 — John Travolta's hotel suite at the Plaza, where this interview took place — is not besieged by mobs of teen-age fans.

DURING THE filming, actor Jeff Zinn, 27, Travolta's stand-in on "Saturday Night Fever," had to be used as a decoy to distract multitudes of autograph-seeking fans. Much of the location shots in Brooklyn were filmed in the early morning hours to avoid the crowds.

For the interview, Travolta — six feet tall, quick to smile, slightly nervous and not always given to verbal grace — was wearing a gray turtleneck, very new jeans, and loafers. No floral bodyshirt, no tight trousers, no platform shoes, which he wears in "Fever" for the role of Tony, a young clerk in a Bay Ridge paint store who escapes from the tedium of everyday life at the 2001 Odyssey discotheque.

Asked what draws people to the loud music and the crowds at discos,

Travolta said: "I think it's a search for excitement. I mean, people like pleasure. You get great pleasure out of dancing and listening to music. You know people like to feel alive. And you don't so much in everyday life."

## 'Bastard' Novel To Be Filmed For TV Series

LOS ANGELES (AP) — John Jakes' best-selling book "The Bastard" will be filmed for Operation Prime Time by Universal Studios.

The mini series will be distributed to participating television stations, as was "The Testimony of Two Men," the first Operation Prime Time project.

"The Bastard" was the first of Jakes' six-book American Bicentennial series that sold more than 20 million copies.

ESTABLISHING SOLO IDENTITY DIFFICULT Mark Farner's New York Concert Boos

Concert Crowd Boos Comeback

NEW YORK (AP) — "I'm not going to beat it into the ground," Mark Farner, onetime engineer of rock's Grand Funk Railroad, said before launching his comeback career. "If the people don't want to hear it anymore, I'll call it quits and go back to my farm."

Two days later, Farner's worst fears were confirmed as a rowdy crowd at the Palladium here continually booed during his 45-minute performance, his first big test since leaving GFR 2 1/2 years ago.

FARNER'S SOLO ALBUM and recent tour are firsts for a GFR member since the group broke up after selling 60 million records in its seven-year existence.

Farner, 29, assembled a band of younger musicians from his native Flint, Mich., cut the album and played a warmup gig in Ohio before heading for New York, where GFR once sold 60,000 tickets in record time for a Shea Stadium appearance.

But memories are short in the rock world. The Palladium audience booed when the second-billed Farner was announced, booed when he opened with two new songs and booed when he quickly switched to old GFR hits in hopes of placating the crowd, which had given a standing ovation to the night's opening band.

WHILE INITIAL SALES OF his debut album were poor, the response to his concert appearances reportedly was better in other cities on the tour, especially in the Midwest.

"Those are my people out there, where my farm is," says Farner. "I've got to go out there and meet people head-on, get a track record on my own."

Grand Funk's track record was impressive, especially considering the hostile reaction from critics. The trio debuted at the Texas International Pop Festival in 1969 and stayed at the top of the pop world.

BUT DESPITE ITS STRING of hit albums and singles like "We're An American Band," it drew critical jeers for its uncomplicated, straightforward music. The strange mixture of right-wing and populist rhetoric that Farner would espouse from the stage also irritated the pseudo-radical leanings of many rock critics and fans in the late 1960s.

Farner hasn't softened his political posture. His new album includes songs like "Social Disaster," which Farner says expresses his fear of a Communist takeover in America, and "Ban the Man," a tirade against aerosol sprays.

Institute Seeks Tales Of Laetrile Success

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Cancer Institute is seeking case histories of cancer patients who believe Laetrile reduced the size of their tumors.

The institute, which in the past has branded Laetrile as useless in treating cancer, wants to examine the records of 200 to 300 persons before deciding whether to seek a clinical test of Laetrile on humans.

"IT'S HARD FOR me to believe that 50,000 to 75,000 Americans are all wrong. That's my personal opinion," said Dr. Guy R. Newell, deputy director of the institute.

Laetrile proponents say at least that many cancer patients use Laetrile, a cyanide-containing compound made from apricot kernels and other plants. The Food and Drug Administration bans interstate shipments of Laetrile and contends it is worthless and possibly harmful.

But 14 states have legalized Laetrile and last month a federal judge in Oklahoma ruled that the FDA could not interfere with patients' receiving Laetrile.

NEWELL SAID THE institute will be looking only for evidence of reduced tumors, not for any pain-killing effect or sense of well-being that Laetrile's backers say it can cause.

He admitted that public and political pressures, as well as scientific interests, have prompted the institute's study, which is expected to take six months.

The formal protocol for the study was published in The New England Journal of Medicine. But in the same issue, Dr. Charles G. Moertel, direc-

tor of the Mayo Clinic's cancer research, said the case-review study was "doomed to failure."

MOERTEL SAID ONLY "a tightly controlled clinical trial performed in competent and experienced hands" will answer the unresolved debate about Laetrile.

Mark Lockman of the National Health Federation, a California-based health food group, attacked the study as biased. But Michael L. Culbert of the Committee for Freedom of Choice in Cancer and Therapy of Los Altos, Calif., said his organization would try to provide the patient records that the researchers are seeking.

Newell said the institute will send letters to more than 400,000 doctors and health professionals in late February soliciting case histories.

PATIENTS OR "SURVIVING next-of-kin" must give their signed consent to allow the institute to see their records. They also will be asked to fill out questionnaires. The institute wants only cases that include slides of the tumor, and the patients must have used Laetrile "as the only cancer treatment for at least 30 days," Newell said.

They may have been on special diets or receiving vitamins during that time, and they may have undergone conventional treatment such as radiation or surgery before or after the 30 days, he said.

Finally, a Beret Army Marches to New Drummer

EDITOR'S NOTE — Army life is not what it was in 1957. Nor is Associated Press Writer Rayner Pike, who returned 20 years later to Fort Bragg, where he was a reluctant member of a Green Beret unit. The changes in the routine mirror in some ways the changes in society, as Pike found during his one-day tour.

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — "What in hell am I doing here, 20 years overage, 30 pounds overweight, shuffling around in a soldier suit with a green beret, yet?"

Back to re-enlist for 24 hours during press week. I was doing my best to fade into the pines of this huge military reservation. But I left a wake of double-takes everywhere, an incongruous figure in combat fatigues, civilian shoes and full gray-flecked beard.

THAT OLDER ARMY had only recently come through the bitter Korean police action, but still was led largely by the men whose careers were forged in World War II. William Westmoreland was a promising young division commander, newly arrived to take over the biggest unit at Bragg, the 82nd Airborne. The bitter end of his career in the Vietnam morass lay more than a decade ahead.

In 1957 there was no airport in Fayetteville, N.C., 10 miles south of the post via a six-lane umbilical called Bragg Boulevard. Commercial jet travel anywhere in the United States was still a year in the future. I came down from New York by Atlantic Coast Line railroad, 16 butt-numbing hours from the old, vanished Penn Station.

IN 1977 I FLEW to Fayetteville in 70 minutes.

Twenty years ago, girls were wearing black ballet slippers. The hit movie was "Bridge on the River Kwai." President Eisenhower sent the Army to Little Rock to integrate its high school, and the Russians launched Sputnik.

Charles de Gaulle was six months from power in France, and Fidel Castro wouldn't reach Havana for another two years.

THE DODGERS AND Giants played their last game in New York that year and the Mets would not be born for another five. Lew Burlette beat the Yankees in the World Series for the Milwaukee Braves. Nobody made much of Hank Aaron hitting 110 home runs in his first four seasons.

And women? Women in the armed forces in 1957 were scarce. I remember only a handful of WACs at Fort Bragg. I talked to one or two, once or twice, but in 22 months never found out for sure just where they lived.

This time, I left the barracks after my first night and saw a soldier coming back from physical training. She — she —

had dark liquid eyes, hair down to the terminus of her spine and wore sweat togs that were slack only at the elbows and knees.

"SHE LIVES UPSTAIRS," said S. Sgt. Patrick Sears, who mother-henned me for the day. "Third floor is for the female troops. The men live on the first two."

Modern barracks living has altered radically. Even the humblest private enjoys the quasi-privacy of a three-man room with a door that closes. Never in my two years in the openfloor barracks did I have as much as an electric outlet, a furniture drawer or a table top that I could call my own. The post seemed more relaxed.

I REMEMBERED A TIME when a colonel swooped down on a buddy who failed to stop his car, get out and salute the nearest flagpole at the sound of the bugle at sundown. The negligent soldier spent his evenings in a variety of invigorating activities for two weeks.

But now — and I faced it with an odd tinge of regret — retreat is no longer being observed. Nor is another hallowed tradition: plain fare in the mess hall with as much choice as a Russian election.

You can enter the mess hall in the morning to subdued Muzak and choose among eggs (any style), bacon, sausages, home fries, french toast, pancakes and corned beef on toast. At lunch, chopped beef or barbecued ribs or turkey or chicken or beef stew or veal cutlet, with any or all of four hot vegetables, half a dozen cold vegetables and relishes, mixed salads, milk, coffee, soft drinks and desserts.

And no KP. There's hired help.



FATIGUES, CIVILIAN SHOES, GRAY-FLECKED BEARD 20 Years Later, Writer Gets His Green Beret

FAYETTESVILLE HAS changed too, with a population nearly double the 35,000 of 1957. But with prosperity have come other trappings.

Prostitutes patrol a one-block strip of topless bars and porno movies that weren't there in the old days.

Gone from Hay Street, the old main drag, is the Brooklyn Spaghetti House, where the pizza was ambrosial and the juke box offered Peggy Lee's "Fever," as a sonic oasis in the desert of Jerry Lee Lewis' "Great Balls of Fire."

BUT NICKELS FOR a juke box were not all that plentiful — not when pay was \$91.23 for the month, before taxes. Paydays now are twice a month, which means 24 wretched hangovers a year instead of 12. The Army also is on a five-day week, and the 250-mile, three-day pass is no more. Normally, you can take off for anywhere after duty Friday as long as you're back Monday morning.

There is no more Army serial number with the prefix RA for enlistees and US for draftees. A Social Security number will do.

Today a PFC draws a basic \$460.20 a month, a 500 percent hike but an actual increase of 250 percent compared with the 1957 dollar.

ORDERS ARE WRITTEN in English (gone, gone such gems as EDCSA — effective date change of strength accountability — which meant only "get

there by such-and-suchtime." Army slang isn't much changed, but there's been some updating. The Army converted to metric measure more than a decade ago and "click" for kilometer is common usage, as in, "down the road a click or two."

Or, this, from Lt. Daniel Grigson, 25, of Maysville, Ky., who welcomed me on a late-fall Wednesday at the headquarters of the XVIII Airborne Corps: "We're not gonna tap dance for you."

OR AS SGT. SEARS, a 9½-year Green Beret veteran from Kokomo, Ind. put it, "No dog and pony show."

"That's a new expression," I said.

"It means this isn't like a kennel club, where you see best in show but not what a dog is really like," said Sears as we headed towards the 7th Special Forces Group, lineal descendant of the 77th Special Forces.

It was dark, but the air was mild and pine-scented as Spec. 4 Jose Morell of Miami issued me a cartridge belt and a camouflage suit with pockets everywhere and drawstrings at the trouser bottom to snug the cuff just above my tan buckskin civvie shoes.

THEN THE CROWNING touch — one "beret, man's, wool, rifle green, shade 297." At its peak, a red shield to which was pinned the Special Forces crest of a bayonet on crossed arrows.

I had been a bona fide, if accidental, member of Special Forces two decades earlier, but I had never had a green beret. I was a "leg" — pronounced "laig" — not a paratrooper.

I had been assigned to Bragg's

Psychological Warfare Center, of which the Green Berets were a part. My intended (and eventual) unit was the Orwellian-sounding Propaganda Platoon of the 1st RB&L for Radio Broadcasting and Leaflet Battalion. The men called it 1st Rakes. Brooms and Lawnmowers, to better describe what it did.

THE DAY I CHECKED in at the PsyWar Center, Special Forces was looking for someone who could type. Nuff said. I was a Green Beret.

The berets had been worn semi-officially a few years previously but had been outlawed when I got there, in part because it seemed to inspire after-hours brawls between Special Forces men and the bantams of the 82nd Airborne. Every once in a while, a veteran would draw his beret lovingly from his footlocker, put it on for a minute, then stash it away again.

A few years later, President Kennedy signaled out Special Forces for his special favor, and the green beret became official. Nowadays, berets are a mark of any jumper, and the 82nd Airborne's paratroopers sport a maroon model.

NOW, WEARING MY new beret, I tried not to hesitate as I took the oath of one-day enlistment from Col. Timothy Gannon.

Gannon, 46, with steel-gray, short-cut hair and the build of a middle-distance runner, took command of the group last September, bringing both a distinguished military record and a master's degree in international relations from George Washington University.

I would spend my time watching a company make a night jump, then sleep while the men hiked 18 kilometers in the moonless dark to bivouac at an artillery range.

UP AND OUT AT 6:30 a.m. for breakfast. Then to the range, where the jumpers set up 81-millimeter mortars for firing. I didn't get to chuck a round or two down the tube but enjoyed the needling and story-telling during a leisurely morning of setting up and zeroing weapons.

I spent the rest of the day being briefed, then saw off another company of Green Berets heading for the windy western Carolina mountains and a two-week field exercise. I wound up with a visit to the rigger detachment, where the Group's parachutes are packed.

Shutdown, and my discharge came through. Army adieu. I got to keep the hat.

Skin Cancer Spread Probed

LIVERMORE, Calif. (AP) — Fourteen cases of malignant melanoma, a fast-spreading form of skin cancer, are being investigated among workers at the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory.

Pauline Bondonno of the California Health Department said recently that the investigation was initiated by the lab and the state agency is assisting.

Melanoma spreads rapidly through the body and is frequently fatal. The laboratory, about 40 miles east of San Francisco, applies about half of its work to weapons research. It is operated by the University of California with funds from the federal government.

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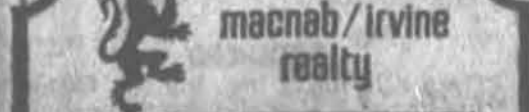

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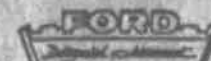


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
