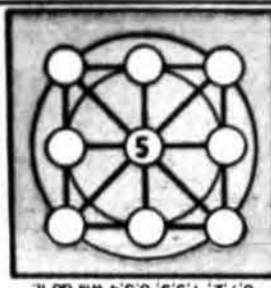

Q As I recall, John Belushi's wife, Judith Jacklin, used her maiden name before the actor-comedian's death in 1982. Were they separated?

Ann Demsky, Marysville, Mich.

Like many women, Jacklin chose to keep her name after marriage. She did, however, tack on the Belushi name as *Samurai Widow*, about her six years with John, hit bookstores. While trying to make sense of the past, the widow, 39, also is making plans for an Oct. 7 wedding with Victor Pisano. The place: Martha's Vineyard, Mass., where they live. The name she'll take this time: Judith Belushi Pisano.

Q Jean-Claude Van Damme, the actor and karate master, has my vote for sexiest man of the year. Whatever happened to his movie projects?

We've been wondering the same thing; after all, Van Damme's previous martial-arts

films were financial — if not critical — successes. The Brussels-born hunk of muscle has five movies in the works, including *Alamagordo* and *Universal Soldier*. No release dates have been set. Van Damme, a past middleweight champion of the European Professional Karate Association, lists one unexpected former job on his résumé: ballet dancer.

Q Is ABC worried that Roseanne Barr's national-anthem fiasco in San Diego will affect her show's ratings?

Though Barr's screeching and spitting caused a stir across the country, network spokesmen say they haven't received an outpouring of complaints. Still, ABC honchos fear the mess could hurt the top-rated sitcom. Nielsen ratings for the first *Roseanne* (a rerun) after the July 25 incident showed a drop of nearly 1.5 million homes from the week before.

Q I find G.E. Smith and the "Saturday Night Live" band enigmatic. Did they play together previously?

Never, though each of the band members has had successful musical careers on his or her own. Co-music director G.E. Smith has played with rock icons Bob Dylan and Mick Jagger. His music director partner in crime, Cheryl Hardwick, has worked as a composer-arranger on a number of movies, Broadway shows and television projects.

Q Who are the members of the group that makes the rules for the National Collegiate Athletic Association? How are they chosen, and what is the length of their terms?

Katie Wilkerson, Titusville, Fla.

They're high-powered, as might be expected from the Brahmins who sit in judgment over the high crimes and misdemeanors of athletic programs across the USA. Each of the 1,200 colleges in the NCAA can send one delegate — often the school's president or chancellor — to the NCAA's annual convention each January. Between conventions, an elected 46-member NCAA Council runs the organization and acts as a gatekeeper on about 150 proposed regulations each year. Hot issues under consideration: reducing grants and other financial aid for student athletes, limiting the size of coaching staffs, shortening playing seasons and restricting recruiting.

Q I love to watch tennis on television when Andre Agassi plays. How does he prepare mentally and physically for the game? Also, when are he and his girlfriend, Amy Moss, going to tie the knot?

Agassi's cocky attitude and goofy tennis attire (pink biker shorts?) give him a reputation as a less-than-diligent athlete getting by on raw talent. Don't let appearances fool you. Agassi, 20, is a fervent disciplinarian when it comes to his game. He spends two to three hours a day pumping iron to condition his 6-foot, 158-pound frame, and he puts in long hours perfecting his line strokes, on display starting Monday at the U.S. Open. The work earned him a shot at his first-ever Grand Slam finals at the French Open in June (he lost). But the French weren't as pleased with his attitude as they were with his tennis. In short order, Agassi threw a fit at Charles de Gaulle Airport when his chauffeur wouldn't let him drive the Peugeot 605 because of insurance regulations, called tournament official Philippe Chatrier a "bozo" for advocating white attire, and smashed two rackets in the first round. His girlfriend, Moss, 21, likes him fine. They met two years ago when she was a volunteer driver at a tournament. They're a steady pair, but they won't comment on marriage plans. **The U.S. Open, Page 10.**

not be condescending and, with a deep sense of relief and satisfaction to all concerned, act like real men again.

That includes opening doors for women; acting like Mel Gibson, not Pee-wee Herman; sending flowers, without occasion, to her office; splitting the wood; carrying out the garbage; and, OK, sharing the diapers and dishes as long as women are prepared to share the economic support of the family.

The big lie about men today is that we are somehow different from the way we were. Yes, society has changed; certainly men's relationship to women in the business world has changed. But the fundamentals still apply.

It's no coincidence that several magazines aimed solely at men are about to debut. I suspect we finally are coming to realize that men and women are, in fact, somewhat different in outlook, orientation and preferences.

Anyone with kids can attest to the difference between a baby girl and baby boy, even as early as 6 months. Not only have men not changed fundamentally over the last generation, but men and women may be, at birth, quite different animals.

Kate White, editor in chief of *Working Woman* magazine, confided: "A famous child psychiatrist once told me, 'I can never say this to anyone outside of this room, but I think that girls and boys are very different creatures.'" She also noted, with a note of mischief, that this natural difference is confirmed in nature. "Before I married, I was in Patagonia for two weeks, tagging penguins. The mother took care of the chicks, and the father looked a little unreliable."

Similarly, "Many of my friends married 50/50 men who turned out not to be 50/50 husbands. The wife still packs the diaper bags and remembers the kids' doctor appointments."

And that's not the only difference:

- Where men love to view the world in black and white, women see the more subtle shades of gray.

- Where men are external, women are internal.

- Where women are reverent, men worship efficiency above all.

- Where men want just the facts, women will ask, "How do you feel about it?" Put another way: Men tell stories; women confess.

But the feminist argument has been that, other than plumbing, males and females inherently are the same — society simply trains females to be

passive and males to be aggressive. This is an appealing theory for a country in which "all men (read *people*) are created equal" is a national mantra.

Things can go too far, however. And in the past 25 years, we've seen the feminization of America. Men started wearing "banana hammocks" instead of standard-issue boxer or jockey shorts. Food went from belly-busting to pretty to "look, don't eat." (Even James Beard, the dean of American cooking who died in 1985, was all in favor of a well-made hamburger and potato chips.) Barbershops became unisex salons where hair is styled instead of cut. Designer everything from sheets to socks to bathroom tissue became a part of every man's life. And back in the late '70s, some poor guys even let their "significant others" talk them into full-length fur coats.

When did we men lose our moorings, our sense of who we are? I suggest it began on or about Nov. 22, 1963. In 1985, Ronald Reagan gave a speech at the dedication of the Kennedy Library that illustrates John F. Kennedy's hold on our imaginations:

"It always seemed to me that he was a man of the most interesting contradictions, very American contradictions. He was both self-deprecating and proud, ironic and easily moved, highly literate yet utterly at home with the common speech of the working man. He seemed to grasp from the beginning that life is one fast-moving train, and you have to jump aboard and hold your hat and relish the sweep of the wind as it rushes by."

As Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis said after the speech, "That was Jack." But

it was also all of us — carpenters and philosophy majors, Peace Corps volunteers and car salesmen. We all wanted to be larger than life, jumping aboard with a voracious appetite for adventure. But we were a generation born amid great certainty, riding a train headed toward 25 years of chaos born of a rapidly changing society spearheaded by the women's movement. That year, 1963, saw not only the death of Jack Kennedy; it also saw the death of the American man.

Until 1963, the year that the U.S. divorce rate was at its lowest ebb since World War II, there was relative harmony between the sexes.

Most women didn't work; most men did. We were at the tail end of the postwar baby boom. The American family was still an institution. Much of a man's self-image derived from his role

as wage earner, one that set the tone for the male-female relationship. The men went out early in the morning, wrestled with a job and brought home a paycheck. That was all about to change in post-feminist America.

In 1970, the best-movie Oscar went to *Patton*. George C. Scott starts out the decade as an American classic — rugged, strong-willed, arrogant and a maverick. The 1975 best-picture winner was *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*, in which a group of men, led by Jack Nicholson, try to assert themselves in an insane asylum — not a bad description of that decade, from a male perspective. Then, in 1980, Robert DeNiro takes best-actor honors as boxer Jake LaMotta in *Raging Bull*, a classic struggle in which the American male fights himself and loses.

At the lowest point on this odyssey,

1985, the best-actor Oscar was taken home by William Hurt in *Kiss of the Spider Woman* — a nightmarish transition from reality to fantasy and back again, a sort of two-hour sex-change operation.

But now we've endured.

Bruce Willis brings back the affable-but-tough Paul Newman character in *Die Hard* I and II.

Richard Gere and Julia Roberts in *Pretty Woman* reinvent a traditional formula (boy meets prostitute, boy reforms prostitute) with a modern twist (prostitute reforms boy). I'm also thankful that the boardroom scenes are devoid of the female business genius, a role that was annoyingly *de rigueur* in the '80s. We even have backed off the rash of male backlash movies —

Rambo, Chuck Norris and clones — in favor of some less bone-jarring middle ground. The '90s offer peace — the end of our own Cultural Revolution.

In the new decade, most of us will retreat from the global village and bring life back down to a personal, day-to-day scale.

In the 1981 movie *My Dinner With Andre*, theater director Andre Gregory expounds on his fantastic life experiences while playwright-actor Wallace Shawn lovingly describes his first cup of morning coffee. Shawn is a man for the '90s: finding zen in the art of daily living, finding the extraordinary in the midst of the ordinary, using his own life as a prism for the outside world.

Perhaps it's a natural reaction to a society that had become too sophisticated for the people living in it. Few of us live up to the East Hampton images of Calvin Klein and Ralph Lauren, and, besides, that sort of life ain't much fun.

If we're all lucky, the '90s will be a decade of backyard barbecues, not mimosa brunches; night games at the ball-park instead of late nights at the office; sneakers instead of \$100 running shoes; tap water instead of imported fizz; and relationships between the sexes more like those on *The Simpsons* than those on *Moonlighting*.

Already there are signs that the new era is under way.

Clifford Grodd, president of Paul Stuart, a top-of-the-line New York City men's store, has seen the 1980s come and go with a sense of relief. "When braces (suspenders) came back into fashion in the late '70s, they were wild — naked ladies and dice games were best sellers.

"Today," he reports, "the patterns are subtle and subdued, because men are more confident. It's a less frivolous, more personal age."

When Larry Forgione, chef-owner of An American Place restaurant in Manhattan and a James Beard protégé, first opened in the early '80s, men invariably would order fancy wines with dinner. "Five, six years ago, men wouldn't have dreamed of ordering beer in a fine restaurant. Today, we see it all the time." He's also witnessed a trend toward more sex segregation among his clientele. "There are nights when 75 or 80 percent of the tables are either all men or all women."

At the U.S. Senate Barbershop, the trend is toward shorter hair, even in comparison to just two years ago.

A classic male ritual, golf, has come back with a vengeance, even among the

plenty of competition. Reflecting the new interest in men's image and role, the field is suddenly the hottest in magazine publishing. Besides *Men*:

■ *Men's Life* (\$2.95) is due from Murdoch Magazines next week.

■ *Details* (\$2), a trendy fashion/club mag, "repositioned" itself this month.

■ *Rolling Stone's* publisher plans a men's magazine in fall 1991.

■ With the September issue, *M Magazine* combines with *Manhattan, inc.*, to become *M, inc.* (\$3).

No wonder an ad industry columnist joked, "There are unconfirmed reports of a publishing company with no plans to launch a men's magazine this fall."

What's more, *Men's Fitness* and *Men's Health* have expanded their lifestyle emphasis, and *GQ* and *Esquire* are going strong.

Ironically, the boom comes as magazines in general — and women's magazines in particular — face the toughest publishing climate in decades. It's a virtual certainty that some of the new ventures will fold. "It's a very difficult formula," concedes Kimball, who explains why he is driven to try.

"When I was 7 or 8, I loved *Mad*. It was my magazine. Then *Playboy* came along, and that was it for a few years. Since then, no one's published a magazine that was my magazine. OK, I'll pick up *Road & Track* once in a while, *Vanity Fair*, *Sports Illustrated*, but no one's publishing a magazine that speaks in a way I want to be spoken to.

"*Esquire* did for a while, but it's too glossy. The tone's wrong. And anyone who says Roseanne Barr is a 'woman we love' is an idiot."

Evian-sipping baby boomers. The fairway is a great place for not-for-attribution comments on the fairer sex and politics, sort of a four-hour version of summer camp for adults.

Men have resurfaced in large numbers on bookstore shelves recently, with the rise of the techno-thriller, pioneered by Tom Clancy, and books for the computer-hacker industry.

As for drinking habits, the manly cocktail has made a return in the late '80s, to be followed in the '90s by an upsurge in the single malt scotches. "Ten years of white wine and cheese are over," says Janet Flynn of the Distilled Spirits Council.

We can't give all of the credit for the return of men to men. A trial by fire — thanks to the hard-core feminists — does strengthen one's inner resolve.

Turning away from "isms," men and women are starting to deal with each other with less hyperbole and more self-confidence. Boys can be boys again without fear of self-doubt and without immediate public censure. Men can return to being adolescent, impatient, exuberant, rash, oversexed, competitive and downright childish — all the things we dearly love to be. As it has for women, however, the feminist movement also has brought opportunity for men. "Many men have told me that they love being a different kind of father than their fathers were," notes White of *Working Woman*. "They can show much more affection."

The '90s man will be able to integrate his basic instincts more successfully into his role as husband and father. Still, modern women measure their satisfaction with men on a purely feminine rating system based on the ability to sustain a warm, nurturing relationship with friends and family.

It's time that we, as men, took hold of our own self-image, one that combines the bedrock instincts of the male persona with a modern awareness.

A generation has passed since November 1963,

but the memory of JFK as the classic American man is as fresh and invigorating as on the day of his inauguration. Like Kennedy, we are all an odd mix of extremes. Now we need to make peace with our contradictions so we may once again aspire to something greater.

Perhaps, once again, it's time to grab hold of that "fast-moving train," to jump aboard and to relish the sweep of the wind as it rushes by. In the end, I think, the women of America will thank us for trying.

By land or by sea

September may be the best time to take in the history, crabs and plebes of Annapolis

Thomas Jefferson was impressed with Annapolis, Md., 2½ centuries ago. "The houses, in general, are better" than those in Williamsburg, Va., he remarked.

Happily, things haven't changed too much in Annapolis, a historic town of seafood and seafarers, of spit and polish.

In the years since Jefferson and George Washington visited this Chesapeake Bay port, Annapolis has become synonymous with the prestigious U.S. Naval Academy. Touring the sprawling campus is in itself worth the visit. But beyond the Academy's halls and lawns you'll find tons of history, fabulous sailboats, waterfront bars, wonderful side streets and not-too-pricey antique stores.

September, when the hot, tourist-packed summer is over, may be the best time to visit. "Fall is perfect," says USA WEEKEND guest editor Dorothy Hedderich. "It's a little cooler, which is great, because we just love to walk around."

The season also features special events, like the Maryland Seafood Festival, Sept. 7-9, and the Kunte Kinte High Heritage Days, Sept. 28-30, which celebrate black American history. Kinte, of *Roots* fame, was sold into slavery in Annapolis.

Here's how to catch the highlights in one long weekend:

DAY 1

A formal tour of Annapolis is a convenient way to survey the town's facets.

The 145-year-old Naval Academy tends to dominate. Hedderich's touring tip: Catch the 4,500 midshipmen (as all students are called) at 12:10 p.m., when they march in formation in front of Bancroft Hall.

After you've inspected the academy, tour some of Annapolis' historic homes for a look at some sublime Colonial architecture. Don't miss the garden behind the William Paca House on Prince George Street. The garden was restored in the 1960s to mirror its 18th-century self.

Just two blocks away, on State Circle, is the splendid Maryland State House, the oldest state capitol in continuous use. It was in the Old Senate Chamber, in 1783, that Gen. George Washington resigned his commission as commander in chief.

DAY 2

Leave history behind for a day of simpler pleasures: eating, drinking and shopping.

This is seafood country: The blue crabs and oysters come straight from the bay. Each local has his or her favorite spot for Maryland's famous crabcakes. Opting for location, we tried Carroll's Creek Cafe, overlooking the harbor. Getting there is half the fun — \$1 will buy you a ride by water taxi to any of the many businesses on the harbor.

Skip the mainstream and T-shirt shopping along Main Street for more atmospheric browsing on Maryland Avenue. Merchandise there is mostly antique.

And save some energy for the evening. Annapolis has some great nightspots, with local bands jamming in cozy bars. *Annapolis Music Scene* magazine provides accurate listings, but it's more fun just to cruise the open square on the waterfront to find suitable tunes.

DAY 3

Take to the waters of Chesapeake Bay. You have several choices. The easiest option is to walk to the end of the city dock and catch a tour boat. Try the all-day trip to tiny St. Michaels. Cruises of 40 and 90 minutes also are available. Serious boaters can rent sailboats at one of a number of charter outfits.

If in doubt, shop. There are two discount shopping centers fairly close by: The Bay Bridge Market Place, with 24 outlet stores, and the Eastern Shore Factory Stores, with 26 stores.

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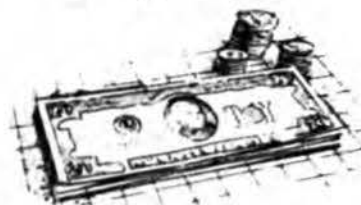
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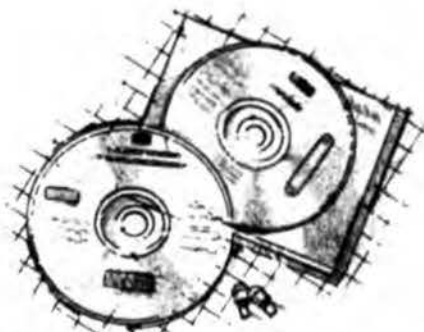
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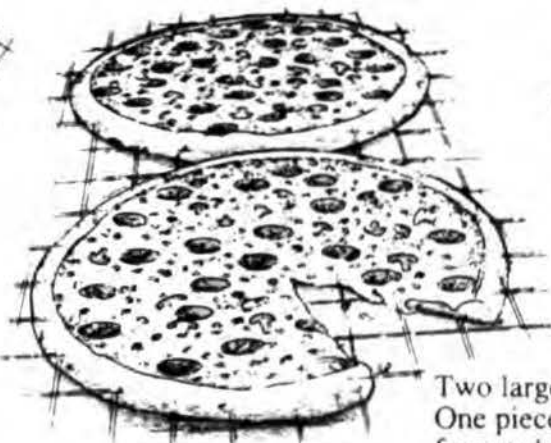
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Tune in a tennis tuneup

CBS analyst Tony Trabert tells how you can learn a few moves this week from the pros in the U.S. Open

What have Zina Garrison, Monica Seles, Stefan Edberg and Michael Chang got that you haven't got? Well, high-rent coaches, abundant natural athletic ability, incredible court instincts and the blessing of a racket bestowed upon them at an age when they were still being potty-trained.

But you can learn by watching them, says Tony Trabert, CBS' lead analyst for the U.S. Open Tennis Championships,

which start Monday and continue through Sept. 9 in New York City. "Watching their mechanics, their footwork and things like that can really help the weekend player," says the 1955 Wimbledon singles champ. Here's Trabert's tip sheet:

Bounce like Steffi Graf. "Watch her footwork. She moves extremely well. She's always bouncing; she's always on her toes. To be able to do that, of course, you need to be fit. But that's also a message to the weekend player: Get in a little better shape, and you're a little stronger, you move better, you play better."

Concentrate like Ivan Lendl. "I tell people to watch the rotation of the seams. Of course you can't really see it, but that's the level of concentration you should be trying to achieve."

Make first serves like Zina Garrison. "If she didn't get her first serve in consistently, people would jump all over her second serve. Look on your serve not as a weapon, but as a tool to use to keep yourself out of trouble and to keep your opponent off balance. Don't try to blow smoke down the pipe. Just get in. You can mix up where you hit it, but keep it at about three-fourths the speed of your hardest serve."

Play the net like Stefan Edberg. "At the net, he's a good technician: knees bent; bent slightly at the waist, almost like a shortstop; on his toes. His volley at the net is short, his wrist is firm and he 'puts it where they ain't.' " But being sharp at the net is only half the battle. Edberg knows which of his shots to follow there. "When you see a guy getting passed consistently, it means he hasn't hurt his opponent with the approach shot. But if you can hit it to the backhand corner hard enough, so your opponent gets there late, he'll have to hit it down the line. Which is where Edberg will be camped out."

Start early like Jennifer Capriati. "She gets the racket ready early, and she carries it right on through. She's never snapping at the ball at the last minute."

Rally like Michael Chang. "He's the kind of guy who wants to rally, and if you come in to the net, he's going to try and pass you. He spends his life on the base line, trying to move you around and tire you out and get you frustrated so you'll gamble."

Jump on it like Monica Seles. "Watch her and you'll see just how early you can take a tennis ball that's on the bounce, on the rise. That's one of the things that make her so effective: She takes the ball earlier than most players do."

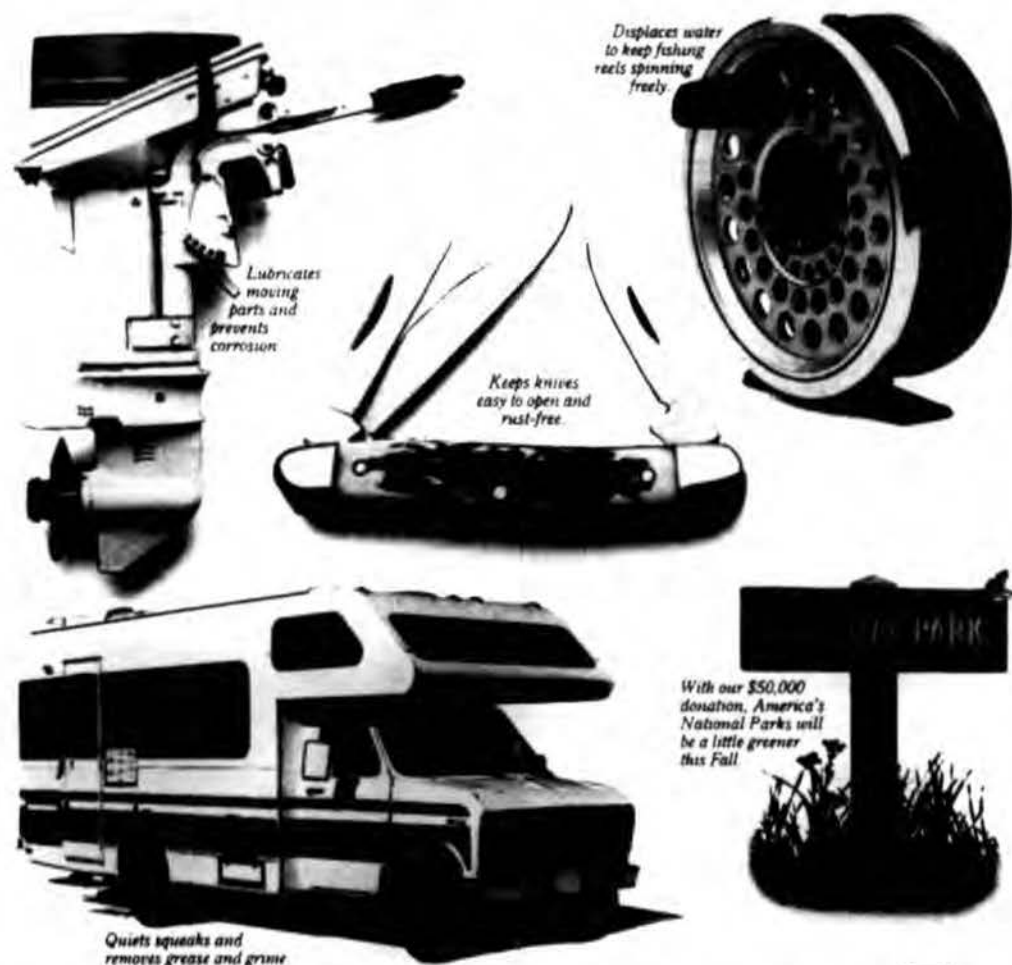
Be doubles buddies like Rich Leach and Jim Pugh. "They know how to protect each other. They're both good servers, and they return the ball well from the base line."

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2 incomes, 1 big mess

I stared at our checkbook, looking for clues, traces, some hint that money once was there. Four days earlier, my wife and I had safely deposited our paychecks and, once again, in Houdini-like fashion, they had managed to wrestle free of our checking account and escape into the general economy. Meanwhile, Jerry the Plumber would soon be playing basketball with the bouncing \$200 check I was about to present him with for eradicating a hairball the size of Ted Koppel's head from our shower drain.

"Jerry," I said, handing him the check. "Can you do us a favor and not cash this for a while?"

Jerry took the check suspiciously. "How long's a while?"

"Two, three months," I said. "But you can keep the hairball."

My wife and I both work. We both make money. So we shouldn't bounce checks. But we do. Our accountant, Steve, says we're disorganized.

And, rather than work together toward common financial goals, my wife and I frequently do our own things with our paychecks.

Apparently, we're not the only ones with this problem. According to the Bureau of Economic Analysis, the average U.S. family saves just 5.4% of its after-tax combined earnings. This statistic is particularly alarming in light of the fact that more than 30 million U.S. households are earning two incomes.

"Two incomes, two directions," Steve the Accountant explains. "When the husband purchases something that's not in the budget, such as an expensive golf bag, the working wife will feel justified in buying something equally frivolous, such as an expensive bowling ball."

Steve's lecture raises two questions:

1) Exactly what kind of woman would buy a bowling ball?

blaming each other when checks start ricocheting, we decided to take serious steps to organize ourselves. I recommend these steps to all working couples:

Agree on one specific financial objective. While you may insist "owning a yacht" is a practical objective, your spouse's goal of "paying the utilities so the water is turned back on" has merit as well.

Divide responsibilities. One person — the smarter one — should be placed in charge of depositing checks, withdrawing cash and balancing the checkbook. The other person, the one with the same business sense as Jimmy Stewart's Uncle Billy in *It's A Wonderful Life*, should be responsible for finding loose change between the cushions in the couch.

Make priority lists. Sit down and make three lists. The first ("If we don't buy these things, we will die") should include food and shelter. Games fathers and sons play

The Griffey's — baseball's unique duo — keep the best plays all in the family

He's 20. Still a kid, but feeling his oats — about a grain silo full. He started his rookie season making the minimum of \$68,000, and in his second season they bumped him up to \$180,000. One of his autographed baseballs sold for \$850 at a youth-club auction, for heaven's sake.

Such is the charmed life of power hitter Ken Griffey Jr., who, in his second season with the Seattle Mariners, is undoubtedly one of baseball's fastest-rising young stars.

But after the autograph sessions have dispersed, after the hot winds of hype have blown over, Griffey Jr. still must prove himself to the one person he can't fool. The man who can tell when he's doing just enough to get by and when he's doing his absolute best — in baseball or in life.

His dad.

Baseball got a new dynamic duo last season, and it came in the form of the first father-and-son combination in history to play simultaneously in the major leagues. Ken Griffey Sr., 40, an 18-year veteran of the Cincinnati Reds, endured to see the day his son made the cut with the Mariners. Junior is the youngest man to play in the American League, and his debut was one of the most closely watched of the season.

In major-league footsteps

Such superlatives don't come without strings of ardent autograph seekers attached. And to be sure, the Griffey's have been a hot ticket at baseball card conventions across the country.

What's it like, following in such major-league footsteps? On one hand, Ken Griffey Jr. brings to the game of baseball the benefit of a previous generation's worth of knowledge, skill and finesse. Ask Junior where he got that swing, and he'll tell you flat out: "I was born with it."

On the other hand, successful fathers cast a long shadow. And for Ken Jr., to play in front of his father is to stand naked before the eyes of God. Senior, it seems, sees every tic in his swing, knows when he's distracted or not concentrating. So it's not all that surprising that, by Junior's own estimation, he went 0-for-3 during every high school game his father ever saw him play.

If it hadn't been for the telephone, Junior might not have made it through his first season with the Mariners.

"If it was going good, he'd be talking to me all the time," Senior says. "If it was going bad, he wouldn't even call me — he'd call his mother. Then he'd get a couple of home runs, and he'd call to rub it in."

This season, the bouts of homesickness have faded, and Dad's awe, butterflies and vicarious anxiety seem to

have subsided some, too. Nonetheless, Birdie Griffey — who switch-hits as wife and mother — is still command central when it comes to hooking up father and son by phone when they're on the road.

"Senior does not advise Junior about hitting," says Birdie, who holds down the fort in Cincinnati. "It's mostly mental coaching. The biggest thing he's always telling Junior is: 'You've got to stay consistent.' He was always determined to let Junior develop his own style."

Growing up 'all boy'

As he grew up, Junior was "all boy," his mother remembers. He loved dirt bikes, skateboards and anything that had slime on it. "I was always a nervous wreck," Birdie says. "He liked to collect bugs. I was scared to reach into

his pockets, because there'd always be worms there. They knew I'd scream, too!"

Junior and his younger brother, 19-year-old Craig (who's currently on the football team at Ohio State University), loved sports from the beginning. Craig started out a baseball player, but he laid down his glove permanently at age 13 to play football.

The brothers once conned their grandmother into sewing football uniforms for two years' worth of G.I. Joe dolls. With football played out, Craig drew from an encyclopedia and the carps carved into goals and yard lines, the game was complete.

By all accounts, the Griffey's are a close family — and feisty with each other, the way people are when the bonds are sturdy. "This is fact, not fiction: Have a happy eviction" is how Junior quotes his mother upon his graduation from high school. "She said, 'I've been waiting to see this for 17 years.'"

Still, when Junior fell into an abysmal batting slump while playing on the Mariners' Bellingham, Wash., farm team, it was Birdie who hopped a plane to set him straight. Diagnosis: homesickness. He was 17 and away from home for the first time. Result: Junior's sagging .23 batting average soared about 100 points.

Brotherly bond

The advantages of fame have not completely escaped Ken Jr. As it happens, he's having a stereo installed in his Mazda RX-7. With little encouragement, he will launch into a technical discourse on the stereo's various attributes, its rows of woofers and tweeters, its ampage, its wattage, all of which add up to:

Twenty-eight speakers. Stuffed into a sports car hard-pressed to hold a sack of groceries.

"What for?" Senior asks, spreading his arms in a gesture of philosophical bewilderment.

"Bass," Junior replies.

All the attention aside, life has gone on pretty much normal in the Griffey household. Birdie says Junior's sudden star status hasn't strained family relations. "Craig is proud as a peacock. They've gotten closer as brothers. There was never any rivalry as far as the sports goes."

"Craig was more football-minded, but Ken Jr. always swore that his brother was just as good a baseball player as he was, and he tried everything to get Craig to go back to baseball."

"After this season, I'm moving back home with Mom and Dad," Junior announces over a steak dinner with his father. He says it with knock-this-chip-off-my-shoulder impudence.

"Oh, no, you're not," Senior shoots back, shaking his

head emphatically. "Your mother worked too hard at kicking you out. That's one thing we planned on: When you moved out, you were going to stay out!"

If Griffey Sr. is a bit skeptical about the attention being lavished on him and his son these days, he still is prepared to enjoy it. "The only reason I'm getting the recognition now is because of him," Senior says, motioning to his son. "This might be my last season. If it goes well, maybe I'll hang on for another one."

For most of his career, Griffey Sr. has been one of the Cincinnati Reds' best-kept secrets. His rule of consistency in all things netted him batting averages no lower than .288 (they topped .336 from '75 to '81). He was traded to the New York Yankees by choice in 1982 and returned to Ohio as a free agent in 1988.

He recalls going into a Cincinnati restaurant a few months after his homecoming. "A waitress asked me, 'Didn't you play for the Yankees?' That's how quiet it was kept. Cincinnati knew more of me from the Yankees than from the Reds."

Consistency is key

The challenge for Junior, both his parents say, is to learn the same consistency that kept his father in demand. They worry that Junior's reputation as a power hitter — the guy who ties up losing games, or wins tied-up ones — may put too much pressure on him.

"He knows what he has to do," Senior says. "If he wants to get all the things in life that he thinks he can get, or wants to get, then he has to go out and perform. I've always told him: 'You can do whatever you want in this game, but you have to play it consistently and well. You just do the best you can with what you've got, play to your standards and your capability. And if it works out that way, then you get what you deserve.'"

But Junior has demonstrated that, when it comes to absorbing the lime-light, he has sensitive skin. The "monosyllabic" answers of which one Seattle reporter complained haven't endeared him to the press. A Calgary, Alberta, newspaper last year dubbed him "The Brat With a Bat" after a similar exchange there.

"Because of his age, I think, he is a little more sensitive than writers expect," says Brian Goldberg, the Griffey's agent and a family friend for 10 years. "There was so much exposure, so fast, that he kind of clammed up after a while. But the kid is really shy, and people don't realize that. He understands the impact he has on kids. He'll spend half an hour after a game signing autographs for kids."

Junior has no trouble relating the best piece of advice his father ever gave him: "Hit, hit, hit. And have fun."

"We're looking for people to write children's books"

"Writing for children is the perfect way to begin," says the author of 53 children's books. "Your ideas come right out of your own experience. And while it's still a challenge, it's the straightest possible line between you and publication—if you're qualified to seek the success this rewarding field offers."

IF YOU WANT TO WRITE and get published, I can't think of a better way to do it than writing books and stories for children and teenagers. Ideas flow naturally right out of your own life. And while it's still a challenge, the odds of getting that first unforgettable check from a juvenile publisher are better than they are from just about any other kind of publisher I know.

Later on, you may get other checks from other publishers. But right now, the object is to begin, to break into print, to learn the feeling of writing and selling your work and seeing your name in type. After that, you can decide if you want your writing to take another direction.

But after 40 years of editing, publishing, and teaching (and 53 books of my own) I can tell you this: you'll go a long way before you discover anything as rewarding as writing for children.

Your words will never sound as sweet as they do from the lips of a child reading your books and stories. And the joy of creating books and stories that truly reach young people is an experience you'll never have anywhere else.

The soaring children's market

But, that's not all. The financial rewards go far beyond most people's expectations because there's a surprisingly big market out there for writers who are trained to tap it. More than \$1 billion worth of children's books are purchased annually and more than 300 of the 500 publishers of books related to children welcome manuscripts. And over 400 magazines rely on freelancers to fill their issues.

Yet two big questions bedevil nearly every would-be writer: "Am I really qualified?" and "How can I get started?"

"Am I really qualified?"

This is our definition of a "qualified person": it's someone with an aptitude for writing who can take constructive criticism, learn from it, and turn it into a professional performance. That's the only kind of person we're looking for. The reasons are simple: our reputation is built on success and if prospective students don't have the aptitude it takes, we probably can't help them. And we tell them so; it's only fair.

To help us spot potential authors, we've developed a revealing test for writing aptitude. It's free, and we don't charge for our evaluation. But no one gets into the Institute of Children's Literature® without passing it. Those who pass and enroll receive our promise:

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This is the way I work with my students, and my fellow instructors—all of whom are experienced writers or editors—work more or less the same way:

story will be read by 150,000 Sunday school children—my dream come true."

Marilyn Day, Marissa, IL, says, "I am no longer a housewife. I am a writer!"

"Most importantly, the course has allowed me to explore my creative writing skills without committing myself to a strict classroom environment with immediate deadlines and meeting schedules,"

reports Jeanne Nickerson, Washington, DC. "I needed the flexibility of a correspondence course and I have enjoyed dealing on a one-on-one basis with my instructor."

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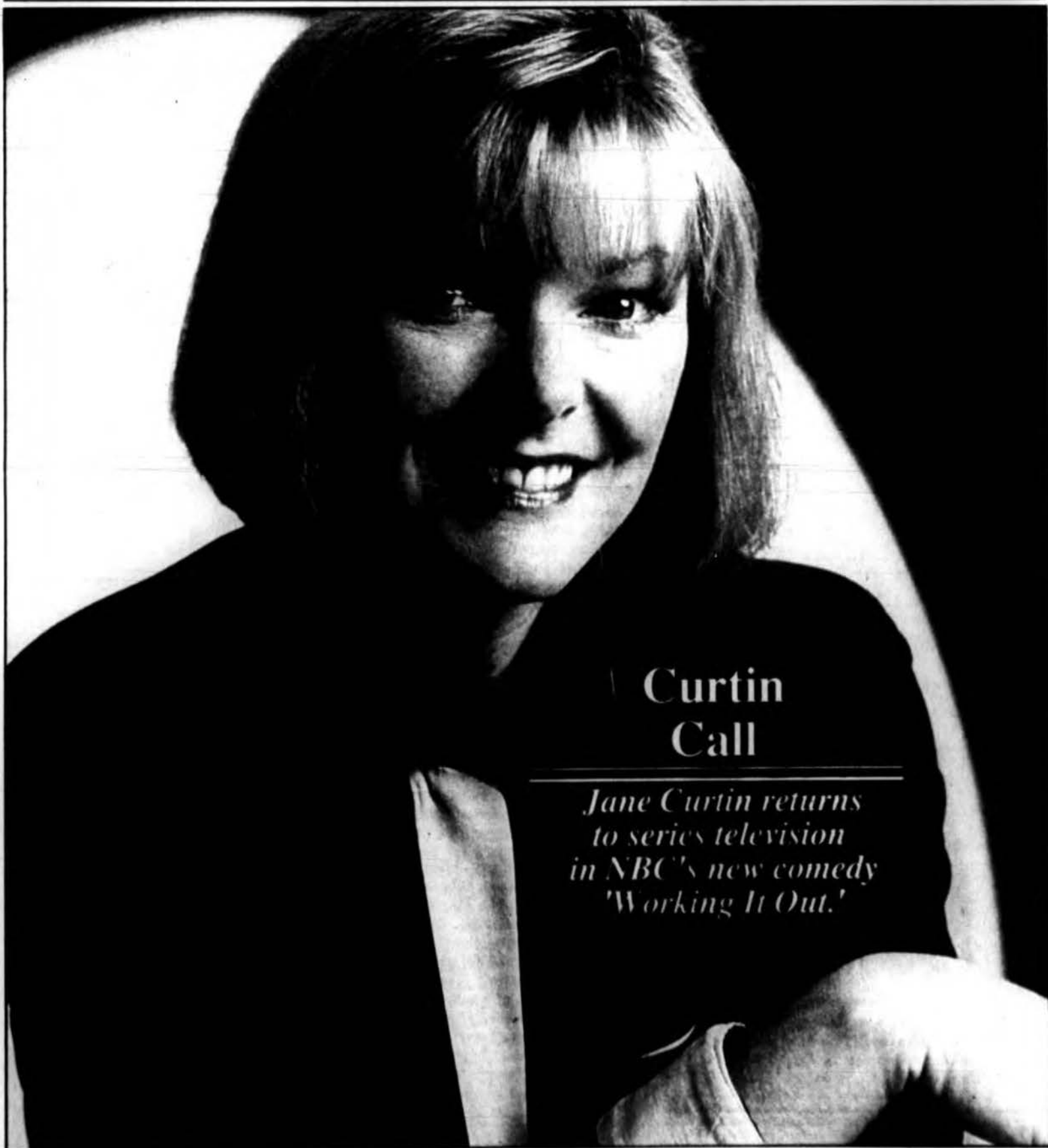

There's that moment when you meet someone for the first time and you're trying to decide: Do I ask him or her out and maybe start A Big Romance? Or do I let this moment pass me by and Risk Losing It All? Those are the kinds of questions that "Working It Out," which had a special preview last week and premieres in its regular Saturday-night time slot next week on Sept. 8, will try to answer. Starring Jane Curtin and Stephen Collins, the series focuses on two single parents and follows them through the pitfalls of dating, arguing, splitting up, making up, then starting through the whole process again.

What makes them different from any other cute bickering couple on TV? Well, he is a photographer and has two college-age daughters. She has a precocious 9-year-old. Both adults are divorced and, yes, happy. They don't need a romantic relationship in their lives. They're not looking for a commitment. They go out and do things for themselves. Get ready for adult dating in the '90s.

Series creator/executive producer Bill Persky is no stranger to modern relationships. In fact, zany single women seem to be his specialty. He created and produced "That Girl" as well as Curtin's previous series, "Kate & Allie."

"Bill and I wanted to work together again," says Curtin. "We had such a good personal and professional relationship on 'Kate & Allie.' We had many, many lunches over many, many months, but we just couldn't come up with anything that didn't seem derivative."

"I had a problem with 'Working It Out,'" admits Curtin, "because it was the same voice as 'Kate & Allie,' even though you could go deeper and get more involved."

Curtin eventually decided that maybe that "voice" wasn't so bad. "I finally realized that if I worked with Bill, that voice would be there no matter what we did," she explains. "I thought I might be killed for doing something similar to 'Kate & Allie' (on which she also played a divorced mother), but - what the heck," she laughs.

"This series will be a little more recognizable for most people than 'Kate & Allie,'" Curtin continues. "It might have been hard for a lot of people to relate to two single women living together, but this has broader appeal. The show can go in so many different directions, which is what I really like about it. And Sarah, my character, is very different from Allie. She's more in control, less neurotic. She can function better."

In addition to the appeal of the character, what else does Curtin like? "I like the clothes," she says dreamily. Sarah has great clothes - especially that silk blouse with the double collars she wears in the pilot.

"No, seriously," she adds. "I really like the fact that I'm working with Bill again - and we have such a great cast! We have Stephen, and Mary Beth Hurt, and David Garrison!" Curtin sounds almost like an excited child on her birthday.

Viewers will remember Stephen Collins from his starring role in the 1987 miniseries "The Two Mrs. Grenvilles." Hurt, who plays Sarah's best friend, had prominent roles in the films "Interiors" and "The World According to Garp." And Garrison, who plays David's best friend, is probably best-known for playing the Bundys' next-door neighbor on "Married... With Children."

"You know, I looked at other series," Curtin says, "but when it comes down to it, you have to be happy in the long haul. This series was the easiest to live with."

**Good morning,
Joan Lunden**

There's an anniversary this week, and if you sleep late you just might miss it. On Aug. 28, Joan Lunden will celebrate her 10th year as co-host of ABC's "Good Morning America." And when she calls to talk about it, she reflects with satisfaction on a career path that has not always been a smooth one.

"I never set out to work in television," says the woman who, along with Charles Gib-

son, co-pilots the top-rated morning show on television. "I didn't see television as an option. In '63, '64 there were only a handful of women on TV."

But thanks to the urging of a friend, Lunden walked into a Sacramento, Calif., TV station and left with a job.

"Every step of the way has been difficult," Lunden says. "but it's

been worth it. Going on the air in Sacramento was hard, scary, nerve-racking ... but you have to work through it. You have to put aside the fear and the paranoia. You have to really work at getting good at one level, and then just when you feel you've conquered it, you step up to the next level and you start all over."

"When I came to New York, it was unbelievably scary," Lunden admits. "I had never been a street reporter before and I was literally thrown into the deep end with no life preserver. Plus, I was not accepted by my peers, which made things that much more difficult. New York is a very ethnic town, and I was just not one of them."

"Then I started on 'Good Morning America' and got to be paranoid all over again! I don't know what makes me keep doing this. Maybe it's the feeling of conquering, that outweighs what you put yourself through to do it."

"Probably the best part of being on the show," says Lunden, who was a consumer reporter on "GMA" for four years before becoming a co-host, "is getting to meet everybody. You get to know what's going on before anybody else, because you're going to tell them! And that's fun, let's face it."

Lunden just signed a new five-year contract with "GMA." It's a commitment that a year ago she doubted she would make, but she's more than content now.

"It's like skiing," she says. "It's more fun when you've learned. Falling down all the time really hurts."

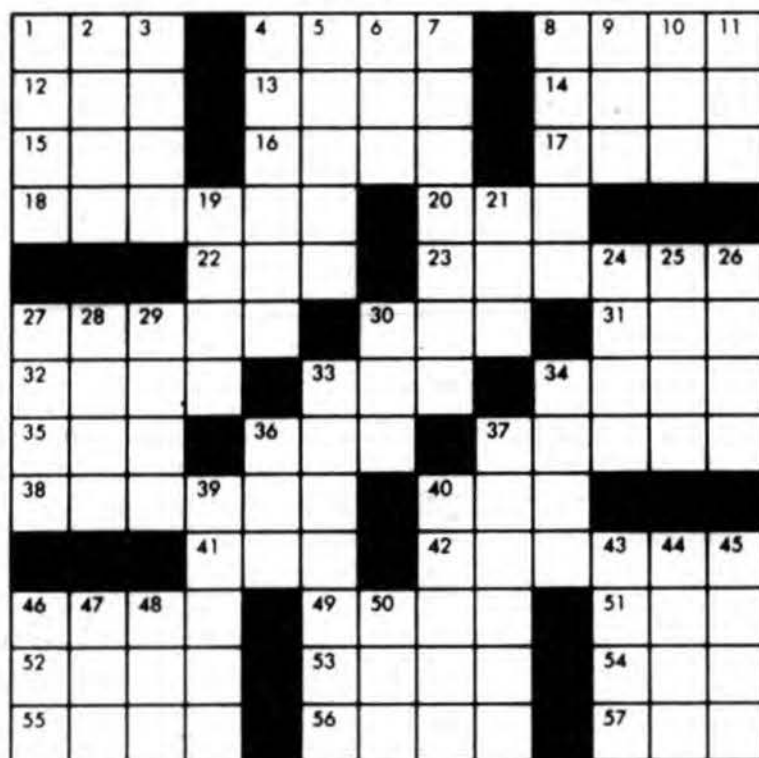

Fountain Valley man hugs girlfriend...then he vanishes

FOUNTAIN VALLEY — When Barry Paul Stephens hugged his girlfriend goodbye and got into his car that Friday afternoon, he just might have driven the red Pontiac Grand Prix over the speed limit and into The Twilight Zone.

At this point, anything is possible. At least, that's how Lori Nitkin and Fountain Valley police detective Kevin Thomas feel now. Stephens could be anywhere and nowhere. They haven't ruled out foul play.

Since Stephens failed to return

from a business trip to the Los Angeles Airport area on Aug. 10, Nitkin has received vague threats from business associates. She's seen her boyfriend's business partner attempt a takeover of their fledgling car transport business.

She's heard strangers say that Stephens is dead.

Without the insulin he needs, Stephens could be somewhere in a diabetic shock. He could've been beaten and robbed of the thousands he was carrying. Or he might have decided to disappear, as one person says he's done before.

Detective Thomas has been working the case almost exclusively for two weeks while other work piles up around him. Still, he says, "I'm in a quandary."

"I'm not ruling out a vacation, here. He could've decided to take a trip to Las Vegas with the money he had. But it doesn't seem likely that he would alienate a dozen close associates, plus his girlfriend," Thomas said.

What Thomas does know is that nobody boarded a plane that day under the name Barry Stephens and

Private support for UCI falls

IRVINE — For the first time in nearly a decade, private support for UCI has fallen, and university officials admit they're worried about raising money in the year ahead as the economy teeters toward recession.

Private support at UCI was down by \$5.5 million in fiscal year 1989-90 to \$27.3 million, compared to a record \$32.8 million the year before. But university officials say last year's stunning \$8.5 million donation from Palm Desert widow

Edra Brophy was a hard act to follow.

"That was the blip that was not repeated," said Terry Jones, director of UCI's five-year capital campaign. "We worked hard on that one and we're trying to identify future Brophy-like gifts."

It was a windfall for UCI indeed last year when Brophy, whose father made a fortune as co-founder of Farmers Insurance Co., donated \$8.5 million to the UCI College of Medicine. She also donated another \$8.5 million to the Orange County Performing Arts Center and three

other county arts organizations.

Fundraising in Orange County has proved challenging no matter what the economic weather. Statistics show the county has one of the lowest per capita giving rates in the country. In 1989, the median donation in the county was \$285 a year, only \$23 more than 1987, according to the 1989 Orange County Annual Survey, conducted by UCI professor Mark Baldassarre.

A number of organizations such as the Orange County YMCA are heavily dependent on private giving, and are fearing the impact of hard

economic times. "My development board tells me we're in for a tough time ahead," said Orange County YMCA President Jerry Nutter. "Nationwide, 83 percent of our giving comes from private individuals. What that suggests to me is that we've just got to get better at getting the word out to regular people out there and not spend so much time and money on corporate givers."

At UCI, Jones fears donations originally planned for this year may be put on hold because of doubts about the economy. "We are con-

UN OK's force to back its embargo

The United Nations on Saturday gave the world's navies the right to use force to stop vessels trading with Iraq, and Baghdad cut supplies to some embassies in Kuwait but did not carry out its threat to close them by force.

Iraq's U.S. ambassador, meanwhile, said the families of American diplomats who fled Kuwait to Baghdad can leave but that the diplomats will be detained. He also said Iraq will not use force against the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait.

In another U.N. initiative, the world body's secretary-general, Javier Perez de Cuellar, announced on Saturday he has invited the Iraqi foreign minister to open urgent talks aimed at resolving the Persian Gulf crisis.

Perez de Cuellar said the talks could begin this week in New York or Geneva. But he did not say whether Iraq had accepted the offer.

Even as the Security Council took steps to enforce its sanctions, evidence mounted Saturday that the embargo is already squeezing Iraq's citizens.

Reports filtering out of Baghdad described panic buying; shortages of cooking oil, flour and fruit; the start of a national rationing program; and house-to-house sweeps by militiamen hunting food hoarders.

The official Iraqi News Agency reported that hundreds of Iraqi children gathered outside the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad on Saturday carrying signs complaining that the international trade sanctions are depriving them of milk. The protest was likely to have had official Iraqi sanction.

The United States and its allies praised the U.N. Security Council for voting early Saturday to allow military action to uphold the embargo aimed at punishing Iraq for invading Kuwait on Aug. 2.

"Iraq has evaded resolutions of the Security Council and thumbed its nose at all humanity," U.S. Ambassador Thomas R. Pickens said following the unanimous vote at the United Nations. "This has prompted the council to take one of the most important decisions in its history."

The White House said the vote

"further strengthens the world resolve to force Iraq out of Kuwait." Although U.S. warships have been shadowing Iraqi vessels in the Persian Gulf, they have not forced them to stop.

President Bush's national security adviser, Brent Scowcroft, said the United Nations has given the Bush administration a free hand to enforce the economic embargo on Iraq. But he sidestepped a question of how much force America was willing to use.

Scowcroft said on Cable News Network that the U.N. action "means no commerce should go in and out (of Iraq) by sea, and that means that vessels will be stopped and inspected," effective immediately.

Iraq's U.N. ambassador, Abdul Amir Al-Anbani, immediately denounced the Security Council vote and said it could lead to war.

"This use of force by the United States or any of its allies or puppets

Gunshots halt police probe of shooting

HUNTINGTON BEACH — Police investigating a shooting death in Huntington Beach found themselves in the middle of a drive-by shooting at the scene early Saturday morning.

The shooting death of a Vietnamese youth at a Huntington Beach dance Friday night and the drive-by shooting at the same location could be gang related, police said Sunday.

About 30 youths who witnessed Canh Van Tran, 17, of Orange get shot in the back in a crowd of 100 were brought in for questioning, and two Huntington Beach men, Jose Munoz and Enrique Hernandez, both 20-year-old cooks, were booked on \$25,000 bail for assault with a deadly weapon on police officers.

Police received a call at 10:37 p.m. that an unknown suspect shot Tran, and in the hours following, as police investigated the scene, two Hispanic men fired shots at officers from a passing car, Lt. Ed McErlain said.

At 12:30 a.m., some of the 13 officers at the Boy's and Girl's Club of Huntington Valley at 19699 Education Lane saw muzzle flashes in the dark from a moving car, which was about 40 feet away. The

Reserves called up; local recruiters swamped

COSTA MESA — After President Bush announced Wednesday that he would call up more than 40,000 armed forces reserves to help in the Middle East conflict, local recruiters were swamped with calls from veterans who wanted to serve their country again. The would-be recruits were told they are too old.

There was no unusual increase in calls from younger people, but Uncle Sam was reaching out and touching reserves, no matter what the age. President Bush says he wants most of them to fill in stateside for active-duty Navy, Marine, Army and Coast Guard units sent to the Middle East. That could spell trouble for local police and fire departments, which are staffed by many reservists. Law enforcement and emergency service agencies are scrambling to the impacts of losing well-trained employees to active military duty.

Meanwhile, the Newport Beach-based Irvine Co. will make things easier for some of those who are called to serve. The mega-landowner-landlord has announced that it will give reservists who live in the company's apartments and who are called into active duty a break in their rents.

Second Ferris trial gets under way this week

SANTA ANA — Lawyers discussed the life cycle of maggots in a dead body and the weight of a deceased woman's internal organs as the second murder trial of James Murrell Ferris III opened.

A year and a day after Eileen Casey's death, jurors collected this week to again try to solve the mysterious case, which is fraught with decomposed clues, hidden motives and a disappearing body.

Ferris' first trial ended last May in a hung jury and mistrial. Prosecutors and the defense are hoping for a more definitive outcome from this panel's deliberations.

15 hospitalized in toxic mishap

IRVINE — Fifteen employees of an aircraft parts plant were hospitalized Saturday after a pint of epoxy glue overheated in an oven and spewed a yellow cloud of fumes across the building, according to the Orange County Fire Department.

The workers at Parker-Hannifin Corp. at 16666 Von Karman Ave. did not suffer any major injuries, but complained of nausea, dizziness, sore throats and chest pain, said Battalion Chief John Howland of the Orange County Fire Department. They were taken to four local hospi-

tals for observation, he added.

The department's hazardous materials unit was called to the plant shortly before 5 p.m. after a worker making an aircraft engine starter took a pint of epoxy from a refrigerator and heated it in a 3-foot by 3-foot oven. After he retrieved a blueprint from another room, the worker found the glue had overflowed from its container and was producing yellow fumes, said Craig Hanes, a supervisor at the plant.

Hanes said he went into the room to see what was causing the odor and found the room filled with the fumes.

"It kept getting worse and I told everyone to get out," he said. "It was like a fog. When I went in there, I couldn't see across the room."

No fumes were released into the outside air and were contained inside the building, authorities said.

About 35 employees, working a 10-hour overtime shift, were evacuated from the building. The workers who did not suffer any ill effect from the fumes sat on the grass across from the plant and watched firefighters put on breathing equipment and protective yellow and green "moon suits."

The bulky suits protected firefighters from any noxious materials that may have remained inside, Howland said. Once outside, the firefighters were hosed off in a plastic children's swimming pool inflated on the street.

The battalion chief called the fume release a "level A" incident, requiring the full resources of a hazardous materials unit.

"We think this may not be a major incident, but we didn't want to take any chances," Howland said.

SANTA ANA — A bankruptcy judge has granted FundAmerica Inc. permission to pay current payroll and certain other obligations based on five-week, \$600,000 budget through Sept. 21, officials of the discount buying service said Wednesday night.

But the Irvine-based company's woes continue, as the Utah Department of Commerce's securities division fined FundAmerica \$250,000 and ordered it to stop doing business in that state.

The company filed for Chapter 11 protection last Friday, in response to a civil lawsuit filed July 24 in federal court in Northern California. A subsequent preliminary injunction froze the company's assets and called for it to cease operations. And FundAmerica also faces legal trouble in Florida

Police seize \$500K in property in raid

LAGUNA NIGUEL — Police raided a Danforth Avenue home Thursday, seizing more than \$500,000 in cars, furniture and valuables allegedly purchased with embezzled money.

Authorities said Betty Jo Sutton-Gibson, 41, of Ontario allegedly took more than \$1 million from an Ontario space-heater manufacturer and wrote checks to her daughter, Priscilla Butler, 22, who lived in the Laguna Niguel house.

Butler used the money to buy a second house in Laguna Niguel, a 1990 Mercedes Benz, a 1990 Porsche Carrera, a 1989 Saab convertible and a 1989 Jeep Cherokee, police said.

Officers also seized a moving van full of furniture from the Butler home.

Sutton-Gibson had embezzled money from her employer for about a year, erasing the names of company creditors from checks and then depositing the money in her account, investigators said.

But Sutton-Gibson's bank noticed an unusual number of checks for large amounts of money, along with checks made out to her daughter.

Sutton-Gibson was arrested on suspicion of embezzlement, burglary and receiving stolen property, while her daughter was arrested on suspicion of receiving stolen property.

Man pleads innocent in daughter's murder

WEST COVINA — A man who walked into a sheriff's station with a gun and reportedly confessed to shooting his daughter and her boyfriend, whose bodies were in a car outside, pleaded innocent to murder charges.

Jimmy Joe Gregory, 56, entered the plea Friday, when he was charged with murdering Vera Nadine Gregory, 25, and Charles Franklin, 41.

Gregory also denied a special circumstance allegation of multiple slaying that would make him eligible for the death penalty if convicted.

He was held without bail under a suicide watch in the psychiatric wing of the Los Angeles County Jail. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for Sept. 19 in Citrus Municipal Court.

Gregory walked into the sheriff's station in Industry Monday evening and told the desk officer, "I've just shot two people. They're in my car... parked in the handicapped space in the parking lot. Now I'm going to kill myself."

Deputies confirmed that the couple, who lived with Gregory at his West Covina home, were dead inside a car. They had been shot six times each.

During a 95-minute standoff with deputies, Gregory repeatedly pointed the gun at himself. At one point, he agreed to put his 45-caliber handgun down in exchange for a drink of whiskey. Later, as deputies held their guns on him, he put the gun down again and was arrested.

Body found in Brea Canyon

BREA — Sheriff's investigators were attempting to determine the identity of a man found dead in Brea Canyon today.

A transient found the Hispanic man dead at about 6:45 a.m. near the road in the canyon, authorities said.

It was not known how the man died or how long he had been dead. His identity could not be determined, but he appeared to have been in his mid-40s, said Lt. Richard Olson of the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

An autopsy was scheduled for Saturday to determine the cause of death.

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Letter from the editor

'There's nothing golden about 'Golden Orange'
Wambaugh's effort to explain life on Orange Coast was feeble at best

If you thought \$19.95 was too much to pay for a hard-bound copy of Joseph Wambaugh's "The Golden Orange" and are waiting for it to come out in paperback, save your money.

The book stinks, as Wambaugh would say, like a three day old mackerel.

For a few nanoseconds this summer, the book was the buzz of the Orange Coast. But the talk died down as fast as "The Golden Orange" fell from the Best Sellers' list.

Here's the post-mortem.

The hype on the book jacket might have provided the best reading in the entire novel: Wambaugh, the ex-cop who has written 11 best sellers including "The Onion Field" and "The Choirboys," "takes on the world of the rich and depicts it in one of his richest settings. Newport Beach and its waters... are so vivid and so important to the plot that they are almost characters in their own right."

Right. As a character in the book, Newport Beach was a cardboard figure — flat, one dimensional, no depth and extremely boring. You'd get better insight into our community in an Auto Club travel guide.

Wambaugh allegedly lived along the Orange Coast for years, but you'd never know it. The hackneyed Newport stereotypes had all the originality of a McDonald's hamburger.

One character seemed to sum up Wambaugh's view of Newport Beach: "A town where every thirty feet there's a bar or a bank, with more massages than the Ottoman empire. Fifteen square miles of greed and white-collar crime."

Reading the book, you wonder why Wambaugh would choose to live in such a hell hole.

Degrading Orange Coast women was also a feature of the book; you won't find one sympathetic female character in the novel. For example, Corky Pebbles, Wambaugh would have you believe, was a typical Newport Beach woman: completely obsessed with her aging body, rich men's money and little less.

About Orange Coast women, he writes: "Corky blazed a silicone trail across the desk, wearing a halter top, with breasts out to here... Every head in the place turned on its axis when she jiggled by... It was astonishing what the Nautilus, the knife, and single-minded dedication had accomplished in The Golden Orange... (there were a dozen hot mommas at the Balboa Bay Club) who could correctly identify a Dunn and Bradstreet (man) with half a sniff."

Wambaugh's broad writing strokes obliterated the underlying beauty, intrigue, complexity and uniqueness of the Orange Coast. For a gifted novelist like Wambaugh, it was a complete disappointment. We received no insights; only cartoon characters in a comic strip. He took the lazy way out.

Other times, the ex-cop-turned-writer was just flat wrong. In one scene, he had his hero, Winnie Farlow, swimming out into the dangerous Newport surf. Winnie was supposedly a former lifeguard, but Wambaugh apparently decided to ad-lib this chapter without benefit of the most basic research.

He incorrectly called rip currents "nptides" and "undertows," and had Winnie caught in the middle of a "undertow," which is a mythical ocean condition, desperately stroking toward shore. Even a rookie junior lifeguard would know how to easily get out of a rip by swimming parallel to shore for a few moments. The word he often used for "waves" was "breakers," a term last used by surfers in the 1950s, I believe.

He also wrote: "As a young lifeguard, he had patrolled this beach, notching his jeep with esoteric little rabbits to record the heads (tails actually) of all the surf bunnies he'd collected."

Number one, young lifeguards don't drive jeeps — they stay in the towers. Number two, surf bunnies? Maybe he meant beach bunnies, but in either case, the man has watched "Beach Blanket Bingo" one too many times.

Finally, having an ex-cop from Los Angeles write about the Orange Coast is like having a pro wrestling beat writer attempt a ballet review. Wambaugh never could capture the feeling of the coast. For many similes and metaphors, he reached awkwardly for nautical themes.

For instance: "(The breakers) slapped against his chest like a wooden mallet smacking fresh squid into tender steaks," and "How the hanging judge just had to watch helplessly as Winnie slid out of his clutches, like an eel through a gill net."

OK, let me take a whack at it. Wambaugh's writing floundered like a school of halibut; he used more stereotypes than Circuit City (OK, it wasn't nautical, but I couldn't resist); he unmercifully pounded the locals here like a landed sea bass on the deck of a fishing boat; his plot was as tangled as a kelp forest; he was as knowledgeable about the Orange Coast as a kook from the Valley; and, because of all this, his novel plunged from the Best Sellers' list like a sounding whale.

And that's the autopsy report on "The Golden Orange." May it rest in peace — like a Navy sailor buried at sea.

Why did the McFadden brothers leave Newport?

In Newport Beach: We all know why the McFadden Brothers came to Newport Beach and what they did, but did you know why they left? In 1888 the McFadden brothers built their pier and a railroad track to carry their freight inland. The business grew to employ 100 workers, bring new settlers to Newport Beach, and provide an alternative to expensive overland shipping via the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe railroads. The McFaddens refused to sell their railroad holding to Southern Pacific who offered to buy them out, but after six years when the cost of new equipment and repairs began to mount, the McFaddens did sell out to Colonel William H. Holabird, who said he represented the beet sugar factory in Los Alamitos who would use the tracks to cut down on railway costs. However, Col. Holabird was a front for Southern Pacific, who abandoned the McFadden line six months after they acquired it and built their own line to the sugar factory. The McFaddens were enraged. Laguna Shanti boasts a rebirth

LAGUNA BEACH — Swaying and rocking in scruffy jeans, in bright-printed beach pants and high-top shoes, in shorts and stocking feet, David, Mark, Marty and Jay comprised an unlikely exercise class.

But the men hadn't gathered in the tiny second floor offices of Laguna Shanti to sweat off pounds or tone their muscles.

Their goal in attending the hour-long Thursday night Tai Chi Chih class was a more serious one. The men, all of whom have tested positive for the HIV virus, hoped to derive some of the curative powers and the energy that the martial-arts inspired blend of exercise and graceful movement is reputed to bestow.

"I'm into the holistic approach, into preventive medicine," said Jay, who tested positive for HIV.

"Any disease needs a favorable environment in which to live," he said.

So far, Jay's campaign not to provide the virus with an environment has been successful. "I've had no symptoms."

Three weeks ago, Jay's regimen of Yoga, exercise and healthy eating expanded to include weekly sessions of swaying, of gently waving his arms and rocking to and fro in the Tai Chi class at Laguna Shanti.

"What really turned me on to it was when I found out it had to do with pine trees — I'm from the Midwest," Jay said, adding that he sometimes misses the towering trees of his native Wisconsin.

He was referring to a warm-up movement, in which instructor Tais

Hoffman tells participants to imagine their hands are clutching a pine tree.

The Tai Chi class, three weeks old and growing with each session, is different, to be sure.

But a lot of things are different at Laguna Shanti these days.

A recent press release for the three-year-old non-profit organization, which offers emotional and practical support for AIDS patients and their families, boasts that Shanti has "undergone a rebirth."

As evidence, leaders of the organization point to enough new classes, including the Tai Chi class, to keep clients busy five nights a week.

There is an informational class for those who have just been tested HIV positive, gatherings for friends and family of AIDS patients, a group for patients with AIDS that discusses new medications, nutrition, and estate planning and another that offers information on new and experimental medications.

And there are gatherings in a lighter vein — like the Tai Chi class, and instruction in portrait photography.

All of this is in addition to beefed up programs that already existed — such as one that provides massages for clients and the "buddy" system, which gives patients someone who will assist with their care.

Most of these changes are the brainchild of another new element at the organization, director Dan Woods.

Woods, a psychiatric technician who worked most recently at South Coast Medical Center, took the helm of a founding Laguna Shanti in June.

From its founding in 1987 until this past spring, the organization had been a one-man show. And that one man had become burned out at the demands of singlehandedly fund-raising, overseeing patient services and coordinating volunteers.

Laguna Shanti is one of nine independent Shantis, primarily on the West Coast, which provide a variety of services, from information about the disease to companionship, to AIDS patients and their families.

Now, those duties are split between Woods and Amy Kluth, who handles fund-raising and community relations.

Kluth, who came to the organization in April, still expresses amazement that she was hired. "I don't have a background in AIDS, I don't have a background in homosexuality, I don't have a background in Laguna Beach," said the Newport Beach resident.

What she does have is a long track record working for non-profit organizations, and plenty of enthusiasm for her new endeavor.

For Woods, working with AIDS patients is the culmination of a longtime goal. "It's been a personal and professional plan for years."

In addition to a wealth of experience in AIDS-related issues — he served on an AIDS task force at South Coast Medical Center and Laguna Beach's city-sponsored task force on the disease — he brings with him seemingly unbridled energy and an understanding of what needs to be done to get Laguna Shanti back on track.

He and Kluth have their work cut out for them. Neither can say how many clients the organization ser-

ves, or how many volunteers it boasts.

And Kluth faces what is still a heady challenge — persuading businesses and organizations to donate to an AIDS-related cause. "We've had a lot of rejections, and I think it's because they don't understand."

This year, the organization can expect \$2,900 from the city and \$2,500 from Kaiser Permanente, among other donations toward an annual budget of \$130,000.

Not that the two haven't made progress.

The new programs are up and running in a matter of weeks and attendance at all of the weekly classes continues to expand.

Woods envisions a bright future for the organization. His immediate goals, he said, are to increase the number of groups available to clients even more, and to build an army of volunteers.

Friends and family say goodbye to Darrell Esgar

HUNTINGTON BEACH — About 300 friends and relatives of Tustin Super Shops murder victim Darrell Esgar gathered at a Mormon church here to remember a honest, smart young man who loved to work on cars.

"I remember him as a special young man who lived correctly according to the principles taught by his parents," said Bishop Dennis Wallace in his eulogy at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Esgar, 22, and two co-workers died last Sunday in an execution-style slaying at the Tustin auto parts store. They were bound and shot in the head before the killer took \$1,100 from the business.

An ex-employee, Gregory Allan Sturm, has been charged with three counts of murder, three counts of robbery and one count of burglary.

At the end of the service, Esgar's parents, Lynn and Clayton Esgar, and his girlfriend, Gina Hoffman, filed past the casket.

Wallace told the mourners about

Esgar's love of cars and food — a love shared with his father and friends.

"He had two interests that he loved most and that was eating and cars. Both those were inherited from his father," Wallace said. "When he got home, he looked in the refrigerator and then said hello to his mother."

Before he started at Super Shops 18 months ago, Esgar worked at an imported car shop working on Mercedes and Porsches. The owners often let Esgar take the cars home from the shop, Wallace said.

Earlier this month, Esgar wrecked his 1989 Mustang on the San Gabriel Freeway, but escaped the accident without a scratch. He planned to rebuild the car with help from his father.

Wallace added Esgar's girlfriend also knew about his powers with cars. She told Wallace that her friends called Esgar "a mechanic sent from heaven."

"Even though his life was cut short, he left a great impact on those who knew him. Let us pray that we

learn from his example," Wallace said.

Esgar, an Eagle Scout, also enjoyed scuba diving, backpacking and reading science fiction.

One of Esgar's close friends, Bert Martin of Huntington Beach, spoke about Esgar's intelligence and honesty. Martin said Esgar could always tell when someone was telling him a tall tale.

"He looked at me with those big brown eyes and listened intuitively and then gave me an upturned smile. He had a quick mind almost

to a fault," Martin said.

"If it wasn't honest or good, he didn't want any part of it. He was not only a close friend, but I also saw him as the son I never had," Martin added.

Annie, who declined to give her last name, said after the service that Esgar "always listened to you and was always interested about you."

"We're really going to miss him," Annie said. "You can't find anyone else like Darrell. Finding something else like him would be next to impossible."

Keenan says he saw two American hostages

DUBLIN, Ireland — Freed hostage Brian Keenan, who flew home to Ireland on Saturday, said he saw American hostages Terry Anderson and Thomas Sutherland during his four-year captivity in Lebanon and that both had been well.

"It's an understatement to say I'm delighted to be home," he said, his voice breaking as he read a statement in Dublin. "It's where the heart is, you know."

Keenan, 39, looking pale but otherwise physically fit, earlier had an emotional reunion with his two

sisters in the Syrian capital, Damascus, almost 24 hours after he was freed by his captors in Beirut.

In his comments in Damascus, he did not say when he had seen the two Americans. He described Anderson as being comforted by a picture of his daughter, Sulome, and said Sutherland entertained his fellow hostages with jokes and stories.

He said he had seen British hostage John McCarthy only two days ago, but did not mention any other hostages.

His hair cut short and his beard neatly trimmed, Keenan struggled to

hold back tears as he sat between his sisters, Elaine Spence and Brenda Gillham. He read the statement to reporters in Dublin but took no questions.

Keenan said he had spent "a long 4½ years (in captivity) and it sometimes seemed like 4½ lifetimes."

"On my way here, I thought of what I was going to do," he told reporters. "And finally, I said to myself I would eat all the food in the world, drink all the drink in the world and make love to all the women in the world, and then maybe I'll get a good night sleep."

Keenan said he was overwhelmed by his homecoming, "but another part of me goes back to those men who are left behind."

"They're somewhere out there; somewhere in here," he said, pointing toward his heart.

After Keenan left, his sisters spoke briefly with reporters.

"As you see he still has his wit and his humor. His character is still very strong. He is the same Brian that left us 4½ years ago," said Mrs. Spence.

Asked why her brother's voice was so weak, Mrs. Spence said he spoke in a whisper because he com-

municated that way with the other hostages and hasn't gotten used to raising his voice yet.

Keenan's sisters arrived in Syria with Irish Foreign Minister Gerry Collins and a doctor and a nurse. They all flew back to Ireland three hours after Keenan was formally turned over to Collins at the Syrian Foreign Ministry.

A welcoming cheer went up as Keenan stepped off a government jet at Dublin airport onto a red carpet. He was warmly embraced by Prime Minister Charles Haughey.

Keenan opened his arms to the crowd and then clasped his hands over his head in delight.

Keenan, wearing a sweater his mother had knit for him, clasped his two sisters to him and blew kisses to the crowd of about 500 before going into the VIP lounge for a private reunion with more than 20 relatives.

In Damascus, he told reporters, "I saw Terry Anderson some time ago. 'He's in good form ... and he appreciates the letters that he received from his family.'"

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Panel: New law lets too many 'crazies' on juries

MONTEREY — Proposition 115 is increasing the number of hung juries because judges have trouble screening out "crazies" in pretrial questioning of jurors, some State Bar panelists reported Saturday.

The prosecution-sponsored crime initiative, approved by state voters in June, included a provision requiring judges rather than lawyers to question prospective jurors.

The change is intended to speed up trials. But some problems are cropping up, a judge and a defense lawyer said in a panel discussion at the bar's annual convention.

"Without really in-depth questioning, you may not be able to pick out the, quote, crazies who won't agree with anybody," said Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Gary Klausner.

Fearful of hung juries, many Los Angeles prosecutors are asking judges to allow questioning by attorneys, Klausner said. He said attorneys are being permitted to question prospective jurors in most Los Angeles death penalty cases.

Elisabeth Semel of San Diego, president of California Attorneys for Criminal Justice, said the number of deadlocked juries has increased around the state because of "ringers and crazies" who survive pretrial screening under Proposition 115.

In one Los Angeles case, she said, the judge asked each juror only three questions — could they be fair, did they have relatives in law enforcement, and did they have any felony convictions — and refused to allow followups by lawyers, even when a juror said he couldn't be fair.

Semel also said prospective jurors are less likely to give honest answers to judges. "Jurors are intimidated by the robe" and will tell judges what they want to hear, she said.

She offered no statistics for her assertions about hung juries. Kern County District Attorney Ed Jagels, an author and leading advocate of Proposition 115, said he has not seen evidence of increases in jury deadlocks. The authors "were well aware of the potential dangers, the possibility of an increase in hung juries, particularly in sex cases," Jagels said.

Team finds riches, plague in deep forest

NEW YORK — A conservation "SWAT team" has returned from an unexplored Bolivian forest with plants unknown to science, tales of spectacular animals, and a case of bubonic plague.

The team's trip to northern La Paz province, Bolivia, was the first test of a method for surveying wilderness areas to determine whether they are deserving of protection or further study, said Russell Mittermeier, president of Conservation International in Washington, D.C., which devised the method.

The month-long trip by four American field biologists and three of their counterparts in Bolivia revealed an area with one of the richest collections of plants and animals on Earth.

"It's really confirming that the region may be as diverse as the Manu National Park (in Peru), which is known to be the richest protected area on Earth in terms of biological diversity," Mittermeier said.

The SWAT team — known more properly as a "RAP team," for rapid assessment program — found 403 species of birds and 45 species of mammals, including three not previously known to exist in Bolivia. They were the spiny tree rat, the big-eared bat and the short-eared dog.

"For me, the most exciting thing was the sighting of this short-eared dog," said Mittermeier. It was spotted by Louise H. Emmons of the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History.

"It's an extremely poorly known animal. She actually got a look at one with a frog in its mouth." That was the first observation ever of the animal feeding in the wild, Mittermeier said.

Emmons also found something she wasn't looking for: fleas carrying bubonic plague, the black death of the Middle Ages.

"She came back and got sick, and they said 'You've got the plague,'" Mittermeier said. "They cured it, but she was out of it for a few weeks."

The team also came back with hundreds of plant specimens, which they are now studying. "Some of them are likely to be new to science," the team said in its report.

Road work in canyon showed insensitivity

The problem with modern communications is few people are willing to use it.
A case in point was the failure of the Transportation Corridor Agency to notify Laguna Beach it was going to temporarily cut some roads through Laguna Canyon.

It is not known how Laguna Beach officials would have reacted if someone had said beforehand they planned to put some roads into the canyon to conduct tests, even with assurances that the damage would be repaired.

We can only guess the reaction would have been negative. However, a dialogue would have been started and perhaps, just perhaps, with the right kind of guarantees, the agency would have received some sort of blessing to do its work, clean up and get out of there.

That's all speculation.
We do know that what happened was wrong.
The agency had no more right cutting roads through the canyon without telling the city about it, no matter how temporary, than Saddam Hussein has holding civilians hostage.

After all, it is no secret that Laguna Beach has more than a passing interest in what happens to and in that canyon.

The agency, to be sure, did have permission to run tests on city property last year. Those tests were to be used in preparing an environmental impact report.

The Transportation Corridor Agency is charged with building three Orange County tollways and the reports will be used in connection with the construction of those highways.

It seems, according to Laguna Beach City Manager Ken Frank, the agency told him it needed to conduct more tests. Agency officials forgot to tell him they were bringing some bulldozers along with them.

The roads were cut through the otherwise pristine canyon so testing equipment could be transported to remote sites.

The agency says the damage caused by its equipment will be repaired.

While that is important, it really is not the point. The point is Laguna Beach should have been told what the agency wanted to do, or what the agency had to do. And how it planned to do it.

It is called being sensitive.
The agency should not have proceeded to tear up the canyon on its own initiative.

That's what was wrong.

Wilson's name bad news for GOP fund-raising effort

SACRAMENTO — A professional phonebank company hired by the San Diego County Republican Central Committee to raise funds for the local party has dropped gubernatorial candidate Pete Wilson's name from its script after reportedly being inundated with negative comments about the former San Diego mayor. An initial script being used by callers to potential contributors said the GOP "must prepare to elect Pete Wilson" and a united Republican ticket in November. A substitute script merely says the party "must prepare for the upcoming elections in November." The company, TransAmerica Telemarketing of Washington D.C., refused comment. Several telephone calls to party officials in San Diego were not returned. Wilson campaign aides say they know nothing about it.

That's life

No one will ever accuse the Assembly Republicans of leading with their hearts. Just listen to the analysis prepared for GOP members of the Assembly Ways and Means

Committee on a bill that would establish minimum safety standards to protect children against severe injury in playground falls. According to the Republican staff, "We can't afford to save them all. We do not live in a risk-free world. Falling off of swings is part of growing up."

Unsubtle message

Legislative staff members say they fear for their jobs if voters approve Proposition 130, an initiative sponsored by Los Angeles County Supervisor Pete Schabarum that would limit legislative terms and cut the Legislature's budget and pensions. A memo recently sent to the approximately 1,000 Senate staffers by Cliff Berg, executive officer of the Senate Rules Committee, poured gasoline on those fears. "If Schabarum passes, the only way to meet its requirements would be a substantial reduction in Senate staff, which could reach 50 percent," Berg claimed.

U.S. media neglecting its duty

Instead of propagandizing the Middle East crisis, our nation's media should be digging into material not provided by government sources. It should be questioning the status quo, not relying on government provided photo opportunities nor resorting to playground bully talk like "a line has been drawn in the sand."

Recent newspaper headlines reflect a dangerous smugness. They sound frighteningly like an echo from the 60s mentality of "let's kick some butt," that was short-lived in southeast Asia. Such expressions are jingoistic and, along with Bryant Gumbel's sentimental interviews from his desk on the desert sand and Tom Brokaw's "Hello, Moms" from camouflaged, but homesick GIs, have no place in objective reporting of this crucial situation.

More appropriate, when the media chooses to editorialize, are the words of General Dwight D. Eisenhower reminding the American people that he "hates war as only a soldier who has lived it can," one who has experienced its brutality, futility and stupidity.

Instead of directing gutter epithets at opposing generals, local and national press could be asking tough questions of our own leadership. Granted, the matter of Saddam Hussein must be addressed. But is it solely our job? If so, what is our strategy? Is it to defend Saudi Arabia? Free Kuwait? Attack Iraq? Or kill Hussein? And will massive amounts of manpower and material help, or hinder, this mission?

Again echoes of wars past emanate from the coverage of the current crisis and settle as un-

answered questions in the minds of millions of Americans. Such inquiry is far from unpatriotic. It is the duty of a free press and patriotic Americans to seek such information and objectively form opinions before it's too late.

Who is in charge of our military mission in the Middle East? Is it another "joint command" that proved disastrous in Vietnam? Or is this an in-name only "U.N. Security Force" that went into Korea 40 years ago and the U.S. is still there? Haven't we learned anything from past military misadventures?

With 100,000 U.S. troops, four carrier attack groups, 500 jet aircraft, (including 20 Stealth fighters) and various multi-national forces on the scene, it has to be announced who is in charge. One can only imagine the confusion.

And if the situation requires calling up the military reserves certainly it merits canceling a presidential vacation. The apparent lack of on-site military leadership and the appearance of presidential casualness represents fuzzy thinking that demands scrutiny from the press. More so than sentimental stories about yellow ribbons and separated families.

Further muddled thinking being ignored by the press concerns the constitutionality of President Bush committing massive American forces without Congressional approval. A military dictator could not be less restrained. Yet Newsweek's cover asks only "Will It Be War?" with nary an inside word on the legality of such action.

The answer that swift military

action was necessary in order to protect American lives is a glaring contradiction. By acting hastily, the massive deployment, in fact, created the hostage situation. Intelligence sources must have known captives would be taken at the first sign of war. Yet Time Magazine columnist Hugh Sidney never questioned U.S. strategy. Instead, he gushed at the president's ability to send men and material "farther and faster than at any other time in history."

There are other issues the media has ignored. Why aren't Japan and West Germany as alarmed as the U.S.? They're far more dependent on Middle East oil than we are. Also, how can Saddam Hussein suddenly become Hitler-like? Three weeks ago we used him as a source of oil, a month ago we voted him half a billion dollars in subsidies and three years ago we assisted him in his war against Iran.

Another issue is how, seemingly overnight, did Iraq reach almost superpower military status? Throughout the '80s her forces were held at bay by a ragtag army of Iranians. Now Iraq is the target of the largest build up of American forces in 25 years. Veteran military analyst A. G. B. Metcalf maintains that U.S. carrier attack groups alone could defend Saudi Arabia and enforce a naval blockade. According to Metcalf, massive U.S. ground forces are unnecessary and extremely vulnerable.

Inquiry such as the above are not a matter of conservative or liberal politics but of establishing sound strategy. And, most often, with logical and comprehensive strategy comes a national sense of purpose.

At a time like this, as our great nation again appears determined to use military means to resolve international disputes, General Douglas MacArthur's voice of experience is worth hearing. "I know war as few living men know it. Nothing to me is more revolting. I have long advocated its complete abolition, as its very destructiveness to both friend and foe has rendered it useless as a means of settling international disputes."

That was General MacArthur's famous "Farewell Address" of 1951. President Bush and most of his staff no doubt heard those words. But how quickly we all forget and now America again appears headed into a quagmire. Solutions are available, but they require hard facts and logical planning, not jingoistic slogans and sentimental propagandizing.

will lead inevitably to a number of explosions which will burn all in their path," he said at the United Nations in New York.

Iraq, meanwhile, carried out its threat to cut supplies to embassies in Kuwait, shutting off power at the Italian, British, Austrian and French missions; power and water at the U.S., East German and Norwegian embassies; and power, water and telephone service at the Japanese mission.

Italy's Foreign Ministry said that Iraqi soldiers were knocking down a wall at the French mission in Kuwait in an apparent effort to cut off the water supply there, but France could not immediately confirm the report.

Iraqi soldiers, some armed with machine guns and mortars, remained outside many embassies in Kuwait City but made no effort to remove diplomats by force, accord-

ing to reports reaching foreign ministries in several countries.

U.S. officials said an electric generator was being used at the U.S. Embassy and that other supplies remained adequate for Ambassador Nathaniel Howell and his staff of about 10 diplomats.

Thousands of American troops and dozens of U.S. warships are within striking distance of Iraq and Kuwait, but President Bush has given no indication how he will respond if Iraq attempts to overrun the U.S. embassy.

Earlier this week, the United States reduced its staff at the embassy in Kuwait by sending about 100 U.S. diplomats and dependents to Baghdad, where they have been stranded. Iraq's U.S. ambassador said in Washington Saturday that the wives and children of the American diplomats can leave.

"The dependents are going to be released," said Mohamed al-Mashat, who had been summoned to the State Department for another U.S.

protest.

"Some of them will be leaving soon." However, he said the diplomats will be treated "just like anybody else," meaning they will be detained. He said that although Iraq and the United States "are on the brink of a catastrophe," Baghdad is "not going to use force" against the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait.

Although international law says embassies must remain inviolable even in times of war, Baghdad ordered all embassies in Kuwait to close and threatened to detain as hostages any diplomatic personnel who defy the decree.

The many other countries that have refused to close their embassies include Canada, Sweden, Romania, Hungary, Spain, Greece, Bangladesh, Switzerland, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

Moscow has evacuated its embassy but says it remains technically open.

Many governments believe that closing the missions could be interpreted as the first step toward recognition of Iraq's claim of sovereignty over Kuwait.

As the embassy standoff continued, 96 Austrian hostages were freed in Iraq, an Austrian official said. Japan announced that some of its nationals had been rounded up.

Austrian President Kurt Waldheim secured the release of the Austrians while meeting with Iraqi

President Saddam Hussein in Baghdad on Saturday.

Waldheim said later in Amman, Jordan, that he had raised the issue of U.S. and other Western citizens stranded in Iraq and Kuwait with Saddam, but had received no commitments from the Iraqi leader.

About 21,000 Westerners, including 3,000 Americans, are being held hostage in Iraq and Kuwait.

Waldheim, the first Western leader to meet Saddam since the invasion, has been shunned by Western leaders because he concealed his links to a German army unit in World War II that has been implicated in atrocities.

Saddam did not hesitate to use the visit by Waldheim, a former U.N. secretary-general, to again reject demands by the United Nations that he restore Kuwait's sovereignty and free the hostages.

Saddam, at a news conference with Austrian reporters, said Iraqi troops will not withdraw from Kuwait and repeated that foreigners have been moved to strategic points, including missile bases and oil refineries.

"I shall say that whatever collides with Iraq will find columns of dead bodies which may have a beginning but may not have an end. We want the Americans to live. We do not want them to die. In the same way, we want the Iraqis to live and not die," Saddam told the Austrian re-

porters.

"So it is the duty of Americans now to bear in mind that they must resort to a political solution and not to force, and to end this tendency they have that they can have anything they want," he said.

After leaving Iraq for Jordan on Saturday, Waldheim gave a lengthy interview to Cable News Network in which he said of Saddam:

"I have the impression that he still wants a negotiated settlement. ... I personally insisted that one should try to find such a settlement," Waldheim said.

"He realizes, of course, that the situation is very dangerous. ... He expressed his concern about the possibility of a military confrontation, saying that he would be prepared for that, but that he wants a negotiated solution and that he is still trying to get this."

Saddam has repeatedly threatened to use trapped foreigners as human shields to protect Iraqi installations against an attack by tens of thousands of U.S. forces deployed in Saudi Arabia to contain Iraqi aggression.

In another indication that Iraq is carrying out that plan, Japan's Foreign Ministry said 20 of its nationals and 20 other foreigners, mostly Caucasians, were moved by bus Saturday from a Baghdad hotel to an undisclosed location.

The Security Council vote Satur-

day was a major victory for the United States, which had sought U.N. authority to use force in stopping trade with Iraq and thus force Saddam to end his 3-week-old occupation of Kuwait.

Three armed men rob Cypress store

CYPRESS — Three men armed with handguns and an Uzi robbed a Radio Shack store Saturday and escaped with \$1,300 in cash and three videocassette recorders, police said.

cerned about it. The reason we are concerned is that our major donors are seeing their own businesses affected by the economy," he said.

UCI's strategy has been to diversify its support by making appeals to a wider array of corporations and individuals. "What we're most encouraged about is the growth from last year to this year in cash gifts."

Gifts from the business community in Orange County were up 26 percent at UCI compared to the previous year, according to university officials. Irvine-based AST Research Inc. pledged more than \$1 million in computers and capital to the university last year.

Corona del Mar philanthropist Arnold Beckman gave a whopping \$5.2 million to the Beckman Laser Institute and Medical Clinic on campus last year. And Richard Barclay

of Newport Beach put his name on what is now the Irvine Barclay Theatre on campus with a \$1 million pledge.

Although the coming year promises to be challenging for university fundraisers, UCI Chancellor Jack Peltason said long-term prospects for the university look good. "Considering that the figures come on the heels of an extraordinary fund-raising year in 1988-89, we are optimistic about our prospects for this, our 25th anniversary year, and the years to come," Peltason said.

"Fluctuations in these figures are normal. Most important is that we continue to develop the strong base of private support."

Corporations accounted for 31.6 percent of all private support, donating a total \$8.6 million to the university last fiscal year. Foundations donated \$8 million, followed by individual giving of \$7.5 million and approximately \$3.2 million from other sources.

the rented Pontiac is more than a week overdue.

Stephens missed an appointment he had with a heart specialist last week. It's possible Stephens could be traced if he refills his insulin prescription, Thomas believes. He's still working on that angle.

When Stephens climbed into the car just after lunch that Friday he had between \$5,000 and \$6,000 in cash — his company's payroll.

He probably had a newly purchased .357-Magnum and the nitro-glycerin pills he took for a heart problem, but what he didn't have was the insulin he needs to inject twice daily, Nitkin said.

She's worried. And as circumstances and people around her have

grown increasingly bizarre.

Nitkin, 32, reported Stephens missing Friday night. Saturday morning, Stephens' silent business partner, Ralph Olcott, showed up offering a new twist to the mystery.

Olcott handed her a sheet of legal paper. In handwriting that appears to be Stephens' is written a curious statement. It names Olcott as the "financial advocate and silent partner" in Stephens' company, American Auto Transporter.

The document, referred to as a "gentleman's agreement," includes the cryptic statement: "In event of either party's lives being terminated, complete control or ownership will automatically be transferred to the surviving partner."

With Olcott that day was another man, a driver Stephens and Olcott had hired two days before Stephens disappeared: William Ortega.

"I'm here to take care of you

now," Ortega told Nitkin, to her disbelief.

Ortega also told Nitkin — and later, Thomas — that Stephens was probably dead by now. Then he laughed it off, say he was only kidding, and that he was sure Stephens was fine.

Two days later, Olcott was arrested in front of the tract house Stephens and Nitkin shared for carrying a concealed and loaded weapon.

"This has been like a nightmare; like something you'd see on TV," Nitkin said. "I just want Barry back. I want to know where he is, what happened to him."

It's true, Nitkin said, she hadn't known Barry Stephens very long. They met when Nitkin applied for a job with him in early July. The two became romantically involved and Stephens moved into Nitkin's Daisy Avenue home a few weeks later.

Before that, Stephens was "semi-transient," Thomas said. Originally from Texas and Louisiana, Stephens had lived in Orange County less than a year.

Still, Nitkin trusted the man. He was very honest with her about his somewhat sketchy past, Nitkin said. He offered to show her copies of his arrest records.

"I miss Barry. He was a peace-maker and a dynamic, new part of our lives," she said.

For Thomas, Barry Stephens is an

exasperating puzzle. One source told the detective Stephens had run off before and always came back from his "vacations" contrite and full of promises.

Without a body or evidence of a kidnapping, Thomas can't name anybody as a suspect, but he can be suspicious, he said. He's keeping tabs on Stephens' business associates. He's put a description of Stephens out on teletype.

For her part, Lori Nitkin is waiting and searching her memory. Maybe Barry Stephens did or said something just before he disappeared, she thinks, that will provide a clue.

She remembers that last hug he gave her at the door as she said goodbye that last time. He rarely hugged her like that, she said. Maybe that means something.

"You never think, when you watch someone leave for work, its going to be the last time you see them," Nitkin said.

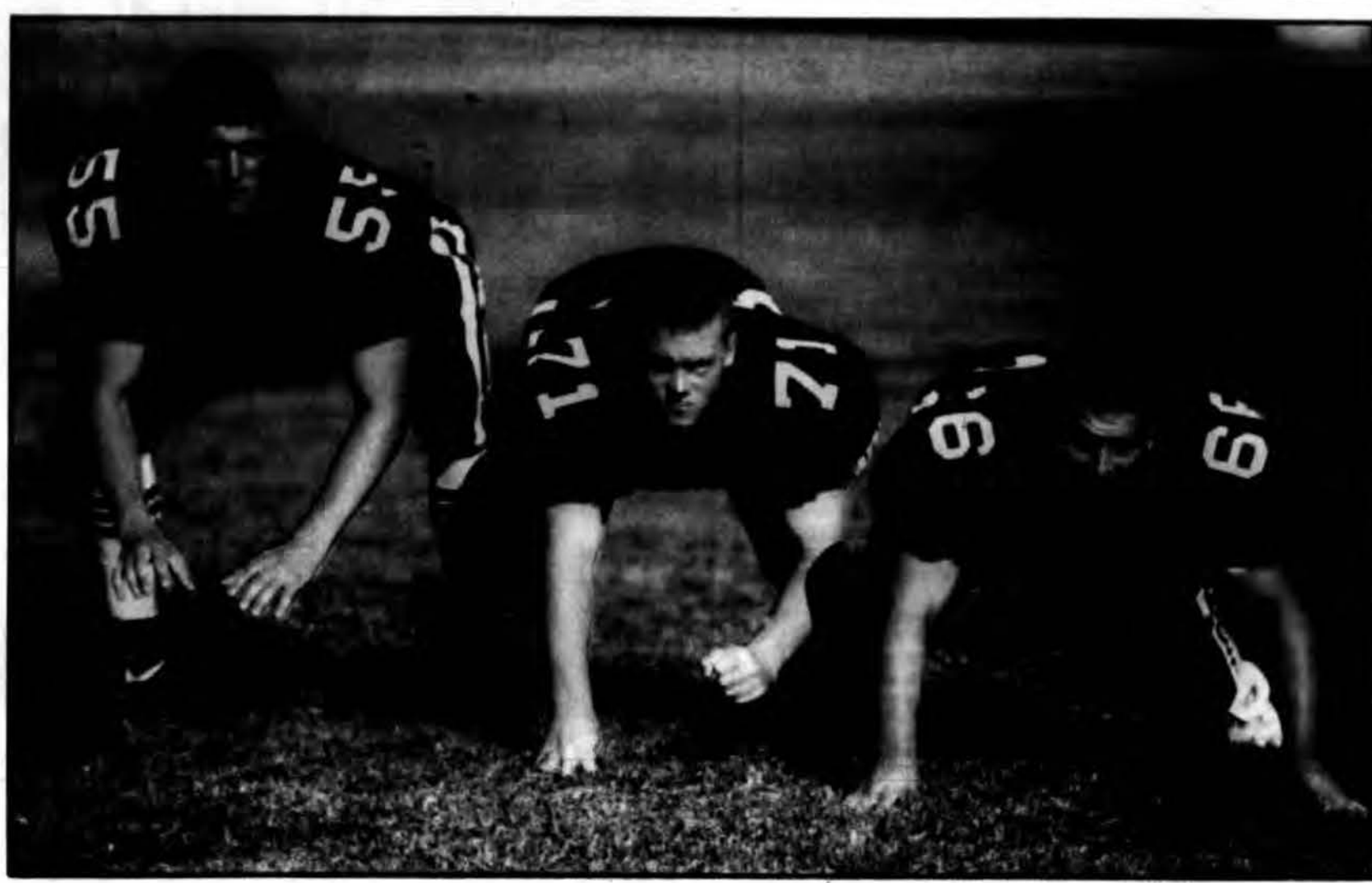

Colorado, Tennessee kick off college season

ANAHEIM

The beginning of the long road leading to the eventual national champion kicks off today as Colorado and Tennessee get a head start on the rest of the contenders in the inaugural Disneyland Pigskin Classic at Anaheim Stadium.

Fifth-ranked Colorado, the undefeated Big Eight champion last year which entered the Orange Bowl as the nation's No. 1-ranked team, and eighth-ranked Tennessee have never met. Both were 11-1 last year.

And both have much to prove in today's college football season opener which begins at noon on national television (NBC/Channel 4).

"This game has big stakes to it," Colorado Coach Bill McCartney said at the Disneyland Hotel on

Friday. "The winner will be in great shape nationally. The loser will have to pick up the pieces — there's going to be a price to be paid for the team that loses."

The Buffaloes, who enjoyed their finest season last year since 1937, lost to Notre Dame, 21-6, in the national championship game. Tennessee's only loss was to Alabama in the sixth week.

The Volunteers shared the Southeastern Conference title with 'Bama and Auburn, and then beat Arkansas, 31-27, in the Cotton Bowl. Colorado finished No. 4 in the Associated Press poll while Tennessee was No. 5.

A big question for the Buffaloes is whether they can sustain the emotion that carried them last year. They dedicated the season to quarterback Sal Aunese, who died of stomach cancer on Sept. 23.

"I'm asked that every day, and I honestly don't know," McCartney said, "but we have 23 seniors, and some of them have started for three

or four years and are very goal-oriented. They're a tight-knit group, they're very bonded and they're going to be the leaders."

"I've got a hunch that they will provide the leadership we need to duplicate what we did a year ago. We'll find out Sunday how emotional and cohesive the squad is. There's no doubt that last year's events had a unifying effect, with our quarterback suffering and dying right there."

Taking Aunese's place was Darian Hagan, who emerged as one of the best option quarterbacks in the nation.

Colorado averaged 41.1 points last year, third-best in the country. Hagan, who finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy balloting, returns after a stellar sophomore year.

Hagan became the sixth player in NCAA history to run and pass for a 1,000 yards or more in the same season: 1,004 rushing and 1,002 passing.

Guard Joe Garten, an All-Ameri-

can as a junior, anchors a strong offensive line for the Buffaloes.

However, tailback Eric Bieniemy, Colorado's third-leading rusher last year, is suspended for this game because of an altercation at his parents' home in July.

So while Colorado will be without Bieniemy, the Volunteers will have sophomore tailback Chuck Webb, a Heisman Trophy candidate who was the Southeastern Conference's Freshman of the Year in 1989.

Webb, accused of cheating on a test, was suspended for a semester and missed spring practice. He regained his academic eligibility this summer.

Webb last year did not become a starter until the sixth game, but was the eighth-leading rusher in the country, with 1,236 yards on 209 carries, the second-highest total in school history.

The Volunteers have plenty of motivation going into their centennial year of football.

"We liked what we did last year,"

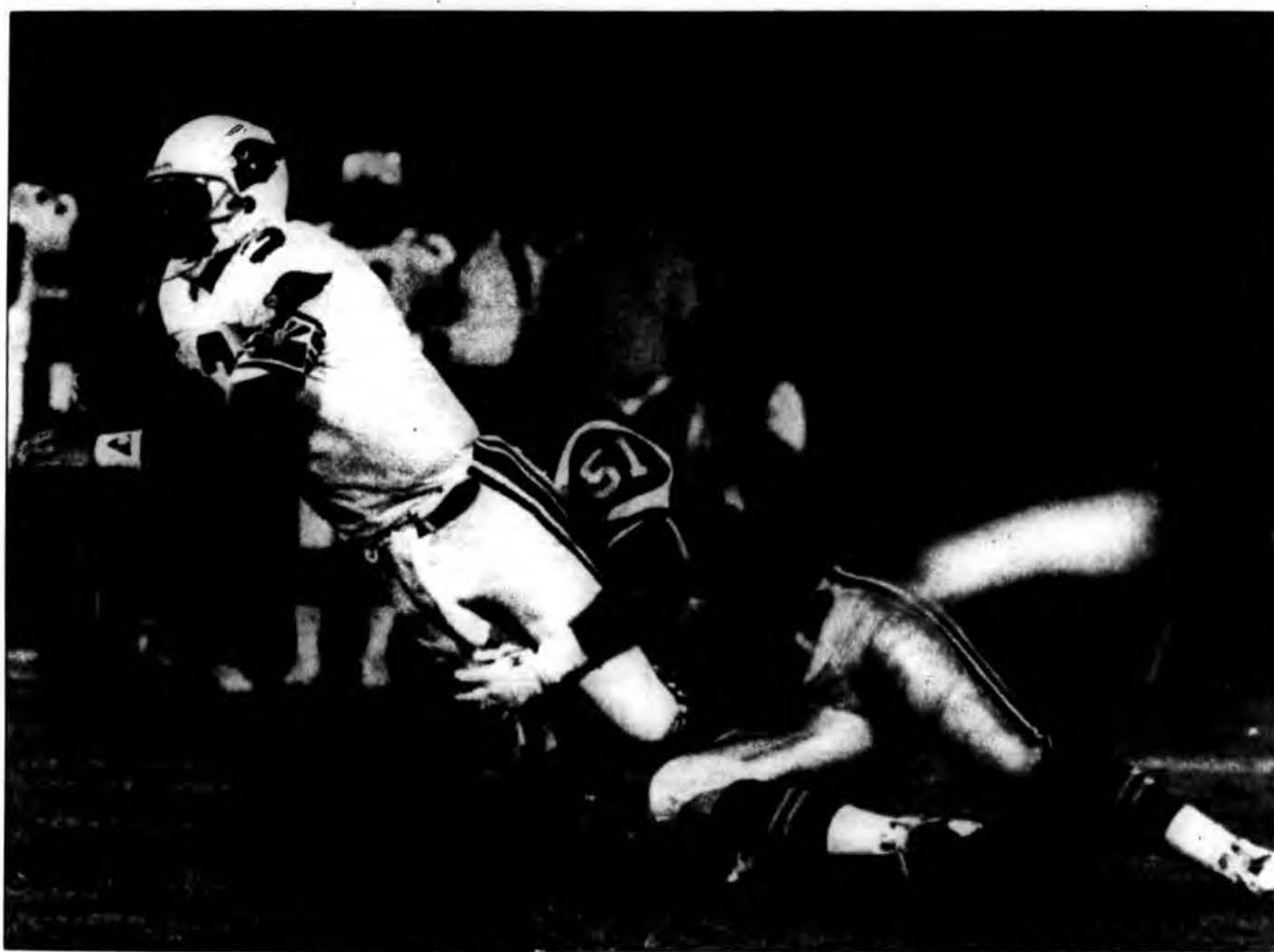
quarterback Andy Kelly said. "We want to get back to the level we were at last year, or better."

Hagan could give the Vols' defense plenty of trouble. "He's the most exciting performer I've seen as an option quarterback," Tennessee Coach Johnny Majors said. "Hagan's a great athlete and he throws the ball (well)."

"The things Hagan does are unbelievable," Tennessee linebacker Darryl Hardy said. "He's the best I've seen and he's a lot quicker than anybody else. He didn't complete a lot of passes last year, but he has a great arm — he's the key to (Colorado's) offense."

Preparation was probably more difficult for Tennessee. The Volunteers already faced a tough schedule when they agreed to play in this game, and they have had to focus mostly on Colorado in preseason practice.

While three Rams rookies are doing their share of dazzling fans with their play at wide receiver, the team's coaches and quarterbacks know their presence represents a problem as much as their talent is a blessing.

Rookies Derrick Faison, Tim Stallworth and Tony Lomack are locked in a battle for the fourth wide receiver position, and whichever two don't make it may very well be suited up for other NFL teams before long.

Faison caught four passes for 73 yards and two touchdowns, Lomack

grabbed two for 91 yards and a touchdown and Stallworth caught one in traffic for 27 yards while taking a tremendous hit.

Also, quarterbacks Jim Everett and Chuck Long turned in their best performances of the exhibition season to lead the Rams to a 27-7 NFL exhibition victory over the Phoenix Cardinals before 44,134 at Anaheim Stadium.

"We have two catches out of that entire group of people who did most

of the receiving last year," Robinson said. "I wouldn't be concerned if they were in practice."

Miami opens '90s same way it ended 80s—rated No. 1

Miami, which ended the '80s as the nation's top college football team, is starting the '90s the same way.

The defending national champions are ranked No. 1 in The Associated Press' preseason poll. The Hurricanes beat Notre Dame by 25 points in voting by a nationwide panel of 60 sports writers and broadcasters.

"It's nice to be recognized, but it also puts a burden on you," Miami Coach Dennis Erickson said. "When you're No. 1, everybody wants to play their best against you."

The Hurricanes, who have won three of the last seven national titles, received 24 first-place votes and 1,431 points. Notre Dame, which finished second last season, was runner-up again with 22 first-place votes and 1,406 points.

It is the first time Miami has been ranked No. 1 in the preseason poll, which started in 1950. Prior to this year, the Hurricanes' highest preseason ranking was No. 3 in 1986.

Miami lost six starters from last year's dominating defense, which allowed the fewest points and yards in the nation. But the Hurricanes return eight starters on offense, including Heisman hopeful Craig Erickson at quarterback.

"We have a chance to be a real good team," Dennis Erickson said. "It's going to be a challenge, though, because our schedule is a lot tougher. Last year, we won some games when we didn't play well. I don't think we'll be able to do that this year."

Certainly not on Oct. 20 when the Hurricanes play Notre Dame at South Bend, Ind. The last three seasons, the winner of that game has gone on to win the national championship.

Miami and Notre Dame both lost one game last season, but the Hurricanes finished No. 1 because they beat the Irish, 27-10.

Auburn was third in the preseason poll, Florida State was No. 4 and Colorado was No. 5. Auburn received three first-place votes and 1,311 points, while Florida State—which handed Miami its only defeat last season—got six first-place votes and 1,268 points.

■ Don Bies, playing on his home course, shot his second straight 67 to take a one-stroke lead going into the final round of the Northwest Classic seniors tournament in Kenmore, Wash.

Anti-smoking fever fires company's success

Advantage Life Products becomes leading U.S. distributor in 2 years

There's nothing like being at the right place at the right time.

As the anti-smoking fever sweeps the country, a Laguna Hills company has found itself in just such a place. In just two years, Advantage Life Products Inc. has become the largest distributor of stop-smoking products in the nation.

"We virtually created a brand new category in retail," said company co-founder Don Danks. Eighteen months after the company was founded, Advantage Life began retail distribution of the CigArrest stop-smoking system in 1988, making \$5.1 million its first year. For fiscal year 1989, the company reported \$11 million in earnings, capturing about 80 percent of the over-the-counter smoking cessation market.

And now that smoking is becoming increasingly taboo in public, Advantage Life is just two months away from a \$5 million national advertising blitz which will introduce a smoking substitute in gum and lozenge form for smokers unable to light up. The new, nicotine-free product is called Smokers Choice which the company plans to sell alongside tobacco products.

Advantage Life signed an agreement early this month with the nation's largest drug store chain — Rite-Aid Drug Stores — which will distribute CigArrest at checkout counters in 2,400 stores throughout the Eastern United States. CigArrest is now distributed at more than 30,000 drug stores nationwide.

"We have a permanent location in most major drugstores," Danks said. "We strive for the checkout location because for smokers, it is definitely an impulse buy."

The company was founded by Danks and Charles Sleichter, marketing and public relations professionals who couldn't help but notice that then U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop was spending a lot of time publicizing the health hazards of smoking.

"Chuck and I also noticed a trend toward home health care, with products like home pregnancy tests and blood pressure

testing," said Danks, a 33-year-old Newport Beach resident and chief operating officer of Advantage Life. "This corresponded with C. Everett Koop continuing to reinforce the dangers of smoking and the increase of smoking restrictions. We saw a huge opportunity for self-help, smoking cessation intervention."

A former pre-med student who earned a bachelor's degree in physiology from UCLA, Danks was interested in the CigArrest stop-smoking system which was then only sold through direct marketing television ads. CigArrest is manufactured by More Direct Health Products Inc. of Carlsbad.

Thinking they would create a similar product, Danks and Sleichter researched products on the market, talked to smokers, pharmacists and physicians and decided the CigArrest system was a winner. "We aggressively pursued getting the retail distribution rights to the product," Danks said. "It proved to be a very legitimate product with a sound medical basis. We repackaged and repositioned it."

Advantage Life now has exclusive distribution rights for CigArrest products in perpetuity.

Unlike other smoking cessation products on the market, Danks said CigArrest was the only product based on a system covering the entire smoking addiction cycle. The \$19.95 product comes with a behavior modification booklet and cassette, a seven-day supply of lobeline tablets which suppresses the urge to smoke, vitamins and a sample of CigArrest gum which also contains lobeline.

Danks said the product has what most health care professionals told him are the necessary components of any smoking cessation system — ways to deal with the psychological and behavioral aspects of addiction, physical withdrawal and the tendency to relapse. With a money back guarantee if the program fails to work, CigArrest has less than a 2 percent return rate, according to Danks.

"We worked closely with a group of physicians and pharmacists to get their input on how effective this brand was," Danks

said. "It passed with flying colors. CigArrest was also appealing because it already had \$20 million to \$30 million of advertising behind it."

With airports, restaurants and

even entire cities banning smoking in public, Advantage Life's next step was to create its own product, Smokers Choice, to offer a smoking substitute for smokers caught in no-smoking areas.

"There's quite a war between

smokers and non-smokers right now," Danks said. "We view this product as something that can ease those tensions. This is something that can at least allow smokers back into the mainstream."

Antonovich seeking to clear the air

There are two approaches to cleaner air. You can tax economic growth. Or you can make the polluters pay.

At the Building Industry Association (BIA) meeting this week, Los Angeles County Supervisor Mike Antonovich advocated the more direct approach.

Basically, he said, it gets down to forcing people to give up their cars, their factories, and their housing developments or letting them retain their basic freedoms as long as they pay for any damage they do to the environment.

Warning that many of the rules proposed by the Air Quality Management District (AQMD) are a threat to economic growth, Antonovich called for more public involvement in AQMD meetings.

"Don't send your government relations liaison to speak for you," he advised. "If you're concerned about your business, come yourself."

As the AQMD gets heavily involved in the permit process, he predicted, building decisions will be relegated to "political backrooms" where "unelected officials are hiding behind the appointment process."

Already, he said, many over-regulated business executives wake up in the morning feeling they are "sliding slowly down the razor blade of life."

According to Santa Margarita vice president Donald Moe, the moderator at the BIA meeting, the state's high housing costs can be traced to its huge number of regulations. Before California became the most highly regulated state in the nation, he said, its housing costs were on par with the national average.

The '91 AQMD proposals will create more rules, Antonovich said, governing such areas as grading, parking and energy usage standards for the building community.

Calling for more responsiveness from the AQMD, Antonovich likened the agency to the bureaucracies now being privatized by governments in Eastern Europe.

"Eastern Europe is beginning to learn that you don't want to turn power over to unelected, appointed directors," he said. "When you create unelected officials with powers to tax and regulate, you're opening Pandora's Box."

Private solutions to pollution problems are the key, he said. Citing the 1984 Olympics as a case in point, he said that people will get

Local businessmen give you Car Smarts

Dan Cwieka has car smarts. But until he started a company by that name, he was giving away all his smarts for free.

A car salesman for 12 years, the 30-year-old Huntington Beach native started Car Smarts last July when he and a friend decided that if other people could give surf reports over the phone, he could give car reports.

Today, if you call 900-BLU-BOOK, paying \$2.19 for the first minute and 99 cents for each additional minute, you can find out how much your car is worth, how to negotiate a used car sale and how to buy a new one.

The problem with doing your own research, he said, is that the information is usually too old by the time you get it. Consumer Reports, Car and Driver and other magazines cannot take into account the day-to-day changes in local demand, and tend to overestimate a car's value.

Take an '83 Cadillac Biarritz in good condition with low mileage. Most people would advertise it for \$5,675, about \$700 over the

suggested wholesale price. Then they'd wonder why they didn't get any calls, Cwieka said.

Cwieka would tell them to list it for \$4,500, about \$1,000 more than the dealer would offer, but low enough to be competitive.

To assess the local demand, Cwieka checks "Auction Reports," a publication typically read by car dealers and salesmen.

Sometimes, he gets personally involved in a call. Recently, a man was upset because he'd totaled his car and the insurance agent was offering what seemed to be a low estimate of its worth. After a \$6 chat with Cwieka, the customer was able to get the insurance agent to pay an additional \$725. "He was one happy camper," Cwieka said proudly.

Cwieka's six-employee Laguna Niguel firm has been averaging 400 calls a month — most from L.A., San Diego and Orange County — with some calls coming in as far away as New Jersey and Pennsylvania. About 42 percent of the callers are women.

More than one fourth of the calls are from friends or relatives of people who tried the service, he said. Other referrals come from mechanics.

Cwieka said he accepts no commission from dealerships for steering new car customers their way. Instead, he said, he uses his own experience, the experience of his employees — all of whom have at least five and as much as 12 years experience working for dealers — and the customer satisfaction ratings put out by J.D. Powers to decide which dealerships to recommend.

To help consumers get information beyond the initial phone call, he offers four free booklets: "How to Sell a Used Car," "How to Buy a Used Car," "Understanding Financing and Leasing" and "Lemon Aid."

It's been really satisfying, he said, to find out that people are taking advantage of his advice. "When I was a salesman," he said, "and I would try to give information, people would look at me and say, 'Yeah, sure.'"

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Interest rate rise, bank failures seen

Before the tension in the Middle East, First Interstate Bank economists were predicting that long-term mortgage interest rates would drop 25 to 50 basis points — one fourth to one half a percentage point — in the next three to six months. But now, says chief executive officer William Siart, the bank predicts that rates will rise 25 to 50 points.

And in ten years time, he said, 15,000 financial institutions will fail.

Speaking at the Marriott Hotel on Wednesday at a breakfast sponsored by the Newport Center Association, Siart also said that the growing S&L crisis will cost taxpayers \$500 billion, all told.

That's \$450 billion more than it would have cost them, he said, if an increase in government-provided deposit insurance — coupled with deregulation — hadn't opened the doors to the high fliers in the industry.

But as regulations tighten, he predicted, there won't be any bad sav-

ings and loans left.

There won't be any good ones either.

According to Siart, the number of U.S. financial institutions will fall from 17,000 today to 2,000 in ten years.

There will be about 300 big banks, about 1,700 small ones, and no S&Ls, he figured. "Anything mediocre will be gone."

"Ten years from now, the financial institutions will be stronger, bigger and better, but they'll have to go through this cleansing process first."

Already, he said, the trend towards bigger banks is growing. The three banks that handle more U.S. loans than any other — Bank of America, Citicorp, and First Interstate — are gaining customers in the development community, as big developers "and even minor ones" leave old lenders behind to seek safer institutions.

The small banks that will survive, he said, will be the ones that stay local. Citing Texas as an example, he

their cars off the roads if given the right incentives.
In the meantime, Southern California air has been getting steadily cleaner even as traffic has increased over the last two decades. In 1976, he said, there were 102 "first stage"

smog alerts. In 1989, there were only 54. In addition, the number of second stage alerts dropped dramatically.
Although it still has a long way to go, California can come up to federal standards, he said, if the right kind of programs are developed. As examples, he cited traffic synchronization, reverse flow lanes, tax

credits to spur builders to develop commercial businesses next to residential projects, and electronic road pricing, a system of charging cars that use toll roads, according to time of use.
The key, he said, is to use "market incentives, not the heavy hand of government."
Mark Pisano, the executive direc-

tor of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), commended Antonovich for being one of the first advocates of such incentives.
Although the idea of charging people for pollution is at least 20 years old, he said that until recently, it was considered impractical.

said that many "honestly dumb" Californians and New Yorkers invested in projects that locals wouldn't touch.
Many mid-size to large banks, he said, will survive by taking advantage of the trend towards nationwide banking. In the next three years, Congress is expected to make it easier for banks to ride a downturn in one state by profiting from branches in other states.
If that had been the case in Texas, he said, many S&Ls could have avoided going under during the real estate bust, with the possible exception of Vernon Savings and Loan. The loans of that institution, he pointed out, were 97 percent bad. Coupled with the highly leveraged position of the owners, he said, "depositors were paying for 94 percent of the loans."
Because of the advantage of nationwide banking, some industry watchers have predicted that Californians will buy New York banks and vice versa, when a new law granting such powers takes effect in '91. But Start called this law "the absolute nonevent of the decade."
New York banks have too much debt from lesser developed countries to attract Californians, he said. And the good California banks are too expensive to buy.

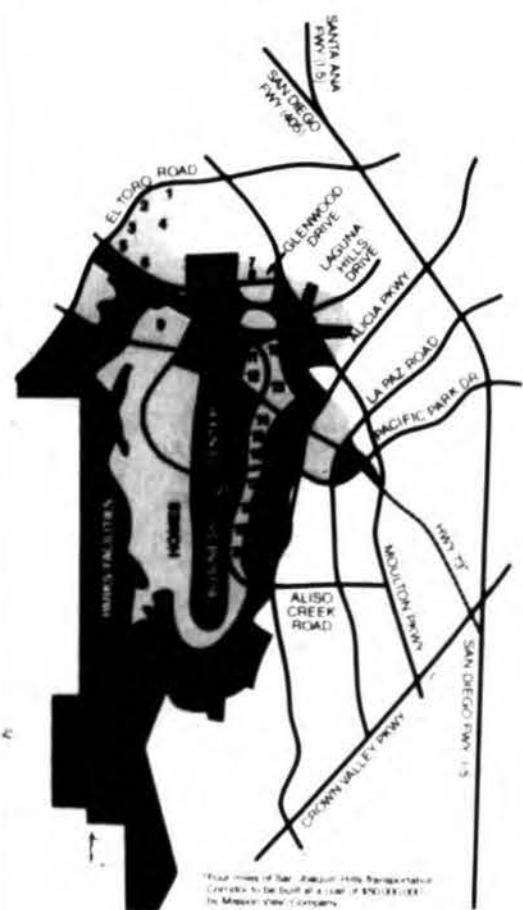

Taos: Adventure into past, present

The village of Taos, built on the high plains of northern New Mexico, has attracted visitors since about 1100 A.D., when migrating Indians established a settlement here. The multi-story pueblo, still inhabited by Indians today, stands just outside the main part of town, looking much as it did hundreds of years ago.

Among the later Taos settlers were the Spanish, who built the San Francisco de Asis Mission here about 1730; and early American pioneers, including frontier scout Kit Carson, whose Taos home has become a historical museum.

By 1898, the town was a budding colony of writers and artists who would later include D. H. Lawrence and Georgia O'Keeffe, and, currently, Navajo painter R. C. Gorman, whose work is represented at his own gallery and at Taos' Millicent Rogers Museum.

The art community in Taos remains strong today, with more than 80 galleries and shops displaying traditional and contemporary artworks and native crafts such as turquoise jewelry, rugs, woolen goods, pottery, and baskets.

If you enjoy browsing through galleries, look for those located along Bent Street, Ledoux Street, and in the buildings surrounding Taos Plaza. You'll also find handcrafted Indian goods for sale at little adobe shops within Taos Pueblo.

Although the art scene attracts visitors year-round, the nearby slopes of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains lure avid skiers every winter. Five resort areas, including the top-rated Ski Valley, offer a range of beginning to advanced trails, with a season that runs from late November into April.

Beyond ski season, outdoor recreation, is still plentiful. A good day's hike begins at Taos Ski Valley

and leads to Wheeler Peak, the highest elevation (13,160 feet) in New Mexico. Kit Carson National Forest also has hiking trails, as well as camping and trout fishing, while the nearby Rio Grande is popular for fly fishing and river rafting. You can rent horses at the Taos Indian Horse Ranch for riding on Pueblo

lands. Upcoming events in Taos this fall include the annual Arts Festival (Sept. 21-Oct. 7), featuring arts and crafts from all around New Mexico; and the annual

Romantic heroes no mystery to readers

Apparently, Orange Coast novelist Suzanne Forster's latest hero has what it takes to turn women on: he's a rogue biker — your basic outlaw in black leather.

"I'm getting letters from all across the country," says Forster, who is overwhelmed by the flash flood of fan mail raving about Diablo, the thrilling and dangerous hero featured in "The Devil and Ms. Moody."

An Oregonian confides "You wrote about one of my secret fantasies. I would love to meet up with Diablo!" A woman in North Carolina writes "I'd do anything to find a real life Diablo." Another fan (a police dispatcher) goes even farther, saying "I'm putting out an APB on Diablo."

A New Yorker considers Diablo "wonderful — sexy, weathered and sensitive." Sensitive? Just a minute now — are we talking about a trend-setter or a throwback? Just what is it that women want in a man?

According to local romance novelists, the answer is complex. Forster, who holds a degree in psychology from UCI, believes women want a "multidimensional man."

It seems contradictory, but women want men to be strong and sensitive, to be stable yet exciting and somewhat unpredictable," says Forster. "In a fantasy romance, women can safely indulge those desires a step farther than they might in real life, through a fictional hero who is compelling, mysterious and perhaps even a little dangerous."

Forster created Diablo "larger than life" and gave him the qualities of a mythic hero. "I referred to his long hair and mystery as symbols of strength — not unlike the ancient Indian warrior on horseback — and relied on a great deal of symbols and imagery to get

across the message that he was an unusual man."

Forster says that the perception that our culture lacks heroes today fuels the fantasy stories in romance novels. "Women still want the heroic, essentially noble man," she explains.

Forster says a mysterious man peaks a woman's curiosity and motivates her to discover his secrets, but it's the sensitive, vulnerable side of his nature that tells her he'll be a good husband and father.

Author Dorsey Kelley Adams agrees. In her novel, "Montana Heat," a rugged rodeo rider touched off a flurry of fan mail with a common theme. "Women were saying they wanted a strong hero again, a throwback. Women need a challenge as much as a man needs — if he's perfect in every way, what is our job — as women — going to be?" Adams says.

Adams who lives in Costa Mesa sees it as woman's job to civilize man. "I call it 'taming the savage beast,'" Adams says. "Without robbing him his basic masculinity — which attracted her in the first place — women want to harness it for their very own. They want him to forsake all others and to protect her, care for her, to give her children and to see to the welfare of her and her children on an ongoing basis forever."

Adams notes that the letters reveal much about romance industry's tremendous impact on our society. "People are reading them, being affected by what they read. Forty percent of the paperback market is romances. Hundreds of new titles come out each month and there's a flourishing used book market as well. When you consider the incredible distribution system and the fact that foreign rights are routinely sold with translations going to as many as 15 other countries, you have to figure something is going on here — a new being fulfilled."

Pat Teal, a literary agent who specializes in romance novels agrees that something is indeed "going on." On top of that, Teal says Orange County writers are on the "leading edge. Nationally, as well as internationally, readers and publishers look to us to break new ground — in the romance genre especially," says Teal.

"There's something about our California writers," Teal notes, "they seem to be more aware — they have a better outlook about the world."

"You'd be surprised at the heroes I see, and sell," Teal notes. "They come in as many different forms as they do in real life. They come out of the writers' imaginations, which gives them a real diversity. You're not just reading about a type cast hero in every book you pick up."

California wines make great strides in short history

In comparison to the 2,000 year history of winemaking in France, the California wine industry is still in its infancy.

However, after little more than a century, the wineries of California have managed tremendous strides in quality, technology and artistic style. This is a story that is a rich, colorful and fascinating blend of politics, economics, scientific research and some very eccentric personalities.

While the influence of religion on winemaking in California has not had the historic proportions that it did in France, it is significant to note that our first vineyards were planted in 1769 at the Mission in San Diego.

Today, when California wines are mentioned, Northern California and particularly the Napa Valley comes to mind. However, the birth of the wine industry in the Golden State actually occurred right here in Southern California.

It was a Frenchman Jean Louis Vignes, who in 1831 planted the first commercial vineyard on the present day site of the Union Pacific Railroad Station in downtown Los Angeles. The first commercial winery, Thomas Brothers of Cucamonga, was established in 1839, and just north of Disneyland large vineyards were planted in 1857. Anaheim's East, West, North and South Streets

were actually the borders of these first Orange County vineyards.

It was not until after California was admitted to the Union in 1850 that large numbers of vineyards were established in Northern California. A man who is often referred to as the "father" of the wine industry in California, Count Agoston Haraszthy, was responsible for the widespread propagation of European grape varieties (vitis vinifera) in Sonoma, Napa and Livermore Valleys.

After purchasing the Buena Vista Vineyards from General Vallejo in 1857, Haraszthy travelled to the Continent and returned with over 200,000 of these vine cuttings. His far-sighted action set the future course of California viticulture and winemaking in the direction of producing European style wines.

Even though the wine industry in the rest of the United States was far more developed at this time, most notably in Missouri, Ohio and Georgia, it was based upon the use of native American grape varieties such as the Isabella, Catawba and the first hybrid — the Concord.

Wine produced from these grapes is markedly different in flavor and aging potential in comparison to wine made from European varieties.

During the last half of the 19th century, California wineries proliferated and the names of many of the wine industry's early pioneers still exist in the market place today. In the Napa Valley, Charles Krug

(1861), Beringer (1876), Chateau Montelena (1882) and Beaulieu (1900) have all changed hands, but are currently viable enterprises and are prospering.

In Sonoma, Buena Vista (1857) and Korbel (1886) are continuing to make fine wines and in the Livermore Valley, despite extensive urban encroachment, Concannon (1883) and Wente (1883) are carrying on their fine traditions. In a sense, when you enjoy a wine from any of these venerable old names, you have a bit of history in your glass.

While these wineries, among untold others, persevered through per-

iodic droughts, economic depressions and outbreaks of the devastating root louse phylloxera, there was one fatal act at the hand of man that could not be overcome: Prohibition. On Nov. 16, 1920, the 18th Amendment to the United States Constitution became the law of the land, and (horror of horrors) America went dry for 12½ years. (Next, Part 2.) Salud!

Made from grapes grown in Mendocino, this soft, but rich wine was aged in small French oak barrels and is far ahead of the pack in quality and value. The nose hints of peach and vanilla with a round, elegant body that finishes crisp and clean. Only 600 cases of this gem were produced — truly a bargain. \$9/bottle.

'Darkman' is both original and familiar

Here's the one for which you've been waiting.

A stunning fusion of high camp and low melodrama, Sam Raimi's "Darkman" is an original that isn't strictly original — a comic-book movie that invents its own comic-book hero for the occasion but that formally, conceptually and philosophically is blood-kin to "Batman" and "Spiderman."

The movie is incredibly fresh, but familiar at the same time, and because the Darkman character is new, we enter it without the kind of preconceived notions that accompanied us to "Batman" and "Dick Tracy."

Comic strips are a lot like popular myths — folk legends really — that have been recounted, sometimes cross-culturally and internationally, for generations, from era to era, and movies are simply a new variant of this time-honored tradition, a new way to tell the story. They are not to be taken lightly and, in inventing a new superhero, Raimi doesn't take it lightly. He knows comics tell a lot about a society's ethos and expectations, and with "Darkman," he reveals how this particular culture dreams — and agonizes.

You can enjoy this movie as more than just a dark, cartoony entertainment spiced with sick humor. Almost immediately, it dawned on me that, like "Batman," there was a serious allegory here, that "Darkman" wasn't just an excuse for vicious fun. Comic strips are political, but if "Dick Tracy" is a political allegory, well, it eluded me.

"Darkman," like an aesthetic van-

guard, updates the old monster-who-must-be-appeased myth, introducing Liam Neeson in a truly complex performance as Dr. Peyton Westlake, a scientist who has perfected a new cosmetic — a synthetic skin that can duplicate any likeness. Simply feed any photograph into a computer and — presto! — you have a new face. He is on the brink of a breakthrough when fate steps in.

Westlake's fiancée (Frances McDormand) is an attorney who just happens to have a memo that could link one of her clients, an evil real estate developer (Colin Firth), to the mob. A bunch of goons is sent

to Peyton's lab — to retrieve the document — and before leaving, they dunk Peyton's face in an acid bath and then, to cover their trail, they turn up the gas and blow up his lab, the explosion sending Peyton flying through a window in a dynamite sequence.

enraged and wants revenge!

Now homeless, he re-creates his lab in a vacant warehouse, where he resumes his experiments with skin and whips up a few living masks to help him ingratiate himself among the developer's evil gang, exterminating them. (With his synthetic skin, he can look like anyone he wants to.) There's a catch, however — and this adds to the suspense — in that Peyton has to move fast because each new face lasts only 99 minutes in sunlight before deteriorating.

This pitiful survivor makes quite a sight, with Neeson rendered as something of an Incredible Hulk and using his handicap as his liberation instead of oppression. Larry Drake makes a vivid impression as the chief goon, a demented chap who likes to slice off the fingers of his victims (with a cigar slicer) and add them to his beloved digit collection, and Raimi himself appears as the baby-faced goon who kills Peyton's assistant.

There's a virtuoso display of photographic effects throughout "Darkman," but what keeps it so bright — so much fun and so serious at the same time — is Raimi's touch, which cheerfully mixes myths and metaphors with different genres. (He incorporates a novel Hitchcockian scene set in a Chinatown.)

"Darkman" is true to its source: It's a luridly funny and violent comic-book fantasy that comes with a conspicuous flash of political guts.

Like the best comics, it endorses anarchy as a sure way to appease a wrong.

All that's missing are the bendy dots.

Raimi's love of comic books spawns movie

A filmmaker's credo: "I wanted to let them have it, again and again and again, over the head, until they cried for mercy."

Sam Raimi first put that credo into practice with "The Evil Dead." Made in the early '80s when Raimi was barely out of his teens, it was a horror picture of such spectacular violence and intensity that it was slapped with an X rating.

Raimi took a standard situation — five young people trapped in an isolated cabin menaced by the vengeful dead — and supercharged it with graphic carnage and thrill-ride camera work. It didn't do much business at the box office, but it became a cult item among hard-core horror fans.

"The Evil Dead II: Dead By Dawn" followed in 1987, with Raimi adding ghoulish, wicked humor to his signature goulash of dismemberment and flesh-rending.

Once again, the picture caused a buzz among horror aficionados. Once again it got an X rating. Once again, general audiences stayed away.

Now Raimi is back with "Darkman." This time, for the first time, he had the backing of a major studio, Universal. This

time he worked with stars of some stature — "Suspect's" Liam Neeson and "Mississippi Burning's" Frances McDormand — rather than unknowns. This time he had a decent-sized budget to work with, \$14 million as opposed to the \$3.5 million price tag of "Evil Dead II." This time he's aiming for a mainstream audience.

Which means "Darkman" is toned down. But only by Sam Raimi standards. Although the gore quotient has been reduced, the picture still starts with a dismemberment.
