

# New plan for Lafayette Square



EXAMINING the roses and crowns to be worn by the king and queen of the "Sno-Ball" are Charlotte Bernat of Corona del Mar High School and Mike O'Gara of Newport Harbor High School, co-chairmen of the semi-formal dance to be held by the Orange Coast YMCA's Hi-Y/Tri-Hi-Y. The event is scheduled for Saturday evening, Feb. 5, at the Newporter Inn. The royalty will be chosen at the dance from the 40 hi-Y's and Tri-Hi-Y's in the Harbor Area.

Architect and developer Richard Jay Smith said this week that new financing arrangements are being sought for the \$27 million Lafayette Square development in the heart of Newport Beach.

"We are looking for a large company to take over the development," he said. "Negotiations are being carried on with several groups."

The project included the entire area bounded by Newport Blvd., 32nd St., Lafayette Ave. and 28th St. The original plan called for joint ownership interest and investment by business and property owners within the area.

"We are continuing to work on the project itself, but without our original concept of encouraging the property

owners to join," Mr. Smith said. He added that the property owners apparently prefer to sell out rather than join the project.

The development plans include a 12-story office building at the corner of 32nd St. and Newport Blvd., department stores near the Lafayette-32nd St. corner; an 800-seat performing arts theatre in the center, surrounded by apartment buildings, and a 10-story hotel near 28th St. All present buildings, with the exception of Karam's restaurant, would be razed.

The Lafayette Square advisory board includes Milton Bren, Roy Gustafson, Bob Reed, Ladislav Reday and Charles Phillips. Mrs. Alice Findley is financial consultant.

## Flier hurt as bombs explode

Lt. Donald W. Schmidt, son of local realtor Bill Schmidt, of 2927 Teakwood Pl., Costa Mesa, was seriously injured Dec. 3 after ejecting from his disabled F4H phantom jet aircraft over South Viet Nam.

Lt. Schmidt, 26, a radar man in the 2-man Navy plane, is now recovering at the Balboa Naval Hospital in San Diego. The young flyer suffered a fractured pelvis

and spine injuries, and is expected to be out of action for at least 3 or 4 months. He was based on the only nuclear powered carrier in the Navy, the U.S.S. Enterprise.

The mishap occurred when Lt. Schmidt's jet fighter was over the enemy target in Viet Nam. The bombs were released but exploded prematurely before they cleared the aircraft, blowing off part of the fuselage and wing.

Lt. Schmidt and the pilot were forced to abandon their aircraft. The Costa Mesa flyer landed in rough terrain among trees and rocks. The pilot was more fortunate, landing in rice patties.

Friendly South Vietnamese picked up the injured flyer and pilot. Lt. Schmidt was taken to a field hospital in Saigon and subsequently taken to San Diego.

Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt have 2 other sons in the service. Lt. Ronald Schmidt, Donald's twin brother, is in the Army at Camp Roberts, Pasa Robles, California. He recently returned from a year's duty in Korea.

The 3rd son, Capt. Philip Schmidt, 30, is a Marine pilot stationed at Pensacola Air Station in Florida. He is presently a pilot instructor. Bill Schmidt is employed by Walker and Lee Realtors, 2760 E. Coast Hwy., Corona del Mar.

## Award winning scholar killed by 'empty' gun

Nicholas J. Aeberhard, 18, of Costa Mesa accidentally shot himself to death at his home on New Year's Eve.

The tragedy occurred when the UCI freshman, who lives with his parents at 374 Esther St., was showing his 15-year-old brother, Ronald, a supposedly unloaded pistol.

The youth leveled the pistol at his head, pulled the trigger, and the gun went off. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Hoag Hospital.

Nicholas graduated from Newport Harbor High School in June of 1965. He was a leader in the Harbor High band for 4 years and enjoyed folk singing.

The boy had been a National Merit Finalist. He was the winner of 3 scholarships: the Hughes Management Club of Hughes, the Newport Balboa Savings and Loan, and the California State Scholarship Commission.

He was a member of the Costa Mesa Police Dept. Search and Rescue Squad and the Explorer Post. The youth was described by a post spokesman as "an experienced rifleman" who had been firing guns since he was 11 years old.

While at UCI, Nicholas was majoring in social science.

Memorial Park, Corona del Mar, with the Rev. Edwin E. Dyer officiating. Funeral arrangements were made by the Bell-Broadway Mortuary, Costa Mesa.

Besides his brother, Nicholas is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Aeberhard of the home residence.

## Lido boy hangs self

A 12-year-old Lido Isle boy accidentally hanged himself in the doorway of his room on New Year's eve with a "jump rope."

Kenneth Albert Brittingham Jr., 118 Via Xanthe, was pronounced dead on arrival at Hoag Hospital at 9:48 p.m. A fire department rescue squad had previously failed to revive the boy. He

was the son of Kenneth and Betty Brittingham.

Mr. Brittingham described the youth as "daring in nature." He apparently died of strangulation on a looped jump rope tied to a chinning bar in the doorway.

The boy evidently fixed the loop with a half-square knot, placed it under his chin and stepped off a chair. Police said he was probably "tempting fate."

He was discovered hanging from the rope by his brother, John, 15. The parents were in another part of the home during the mishap.

The 12-year-old lad was described as "emotionally stable and athletically inclined."

Police Officer Leo Konkel stated the boy's death "appeared accidental - there was nothing to indicate suicide."

Mr. Brittingham is a salesman for Lido Realty Inc., 3400 Via Lido.

## Prof. Robertson dies

He was born on May 23, 1891, in New York City. He received advanced degrees from the University of Southern California.

## Traffic engineer named, faces difficult problems

Robert L. Jaffe, now principal engineer with Wilbur Smith and Associates of San Francisco, has been appointed traffic engineer for the City of Newport Beach. He will take up his duties here Jan. 17.

Mr. Jaffe, 42, is a native of Pennsylvania, attended public schools in Domont, Pa., studied at Carnegie Tech for 2 years, and received his degree of bachelor of engineering from Yale University in 1944.

During World War II he was with the Civil Engineer Corps of the U.S. Navy and served with the Pacific Seabees (Navy construction battalion).

He was traffic operations engineer in Providence, R.I., 1950-55; received a graduate certificate in highway traffic from Yale in 1956; then served as city traffic engineer in Evansville, Ind., in 1957, and in Santa Clara, Calif., 1957 to 1962, before joining the Wilbur Smith consulting engineering firm.

He and his wife have 3 teenage sons - one attending San Jose State.

### FLUORIDATION PROMOTERS BUSY AGAIN

Once again we are being tested with trial-balloon tactics on compulsory fluoridation of our public water supply.

Six years ago there was an all-out effort, initiated and promoted by a Harbor Area newspaper of liberal persuasion. That newspaper did have the caution not to push the scheme in its own home town, but rather in our town of Newport Beach. Result was a heart-warming awakening of conservative conscience throughout the Harbor Area, and defeat for the high-handed campaign to medicate our drinking water.

There have been trial balloons from time to time, following that initial campaign — testing the local climate, and finding it about the same as before. Now comes a new try from a rather surprising direction, the Orange County Grand Jury, with an assist from an oldtimer in the field, Dr. Edward Lee Russell, who is the public health officer for the county and also for our city.

The 1965 Grand Jury has just issued a report, which includes the following statement: "It is our recommendation that a citizens committee be appointed by the Board of Supervisors to implement the addition of fluorine to the drinking water of the county. . . . We feel there is overwhelming evidence for the effectiveness of such a program."

The last sentence is significant, because it is the sound of an old record played over and over again, and echoed in this instance also by Dr. Russell: "Fluoridation has been proved so conclusively that it is really essentially beyond the point of argument."

That statement, with its several variations, is just about the sum and substance of the argument for compulsory fluoridation. There is one other tactic — namely, the charge that anyone opposing fluoridation of public water supply is an "emotional and scientific primitive" or a "crackpot."

I had occasion to compile, and publish, a considerable amount of information during the fluoridation fight here 6 years ago. I have that information still on hand — and now much more besides. Nowhere have I seen evidence of scientific, long-range testing of the consequences of artificial fluoridation of public drinking water. There has been no thorough study of possible accumulation of fluorine poison in the body, allergic reactions to fluorine, unsightly mottling of teeth, possible contributory stimulus for cancer and other diseases.

Has the County Grand Jury examined the evidence against fluoridation? Has the Grand Jury read, for example, "The Grim Truth About Fluoridation," by Robert M. Buck? Has the Grand Jury considered the moral issue of the individual's right to choose his own medication?

There is voluminous information available, if the fluoridation promoters intend to go through with their project. There is also a formidable number of us who will continue to oppose this attempt to meddle with the public water supply.

## LET THE PEOPLE KNOW

"That," he charges, "is precisely the stake — our life — we have on a hot whether President Johnson and Secretary McNamara know what they are doing. . . . We have an absolute right to far better assurance than the President and his Secretary have given that they proceed with wisdom."

The people, indeed, should know.

## straight talk

REPORT FROM SOUTH AFRICA — PART V

Umtata, Transkei, South Africa: The town of Umtata is the largest town in the area called the Transkei, which is one of the "homelands" reserved for the black natives called Bantu. The Transkei area is larger than Switzerland (17,000 square miles), fertile and with rainfall from 20 to 80 inches annually. One and a half million Bantu live here. A few thousand whites are teaching them modern farming methods, but progress is slow. The Bantu resist changing the old tribal ways. One Bantu here spent 15 years as an assistant in the Agricultural Department helping teach the natives to plow on the contour instead of up and down the hill, thus minimizing erosion. When the Bantu teacher retired to his own farm, he immediately reverted to his old practice of plowing straight up and down his hillsides. Thus the farm problem here is not agricultural but human (and so it is in America!). If and when the Bantu can be converted into reasonably good farmers, this area can accommodate not 1.5 million, but at least 5 million people.

The aim of the whites is to help the natives become self-supporting and independent, in their own country. Eventually the "homelands" areas can become separate states, either completely independent of the whites or part of a South African federation of nations with a common defense effort and a preferential trading system, similar to the "Common Market" in Europe. The "apartheid" program, which has been grossly misrepresented and misunderstood throughout the world, is to help these natives to own

their own country, their own homes, farms, and businesses; to be proud of their own, instead of copying whites.

The whites have established industries here — furniture manufacturing, weaving, meat-processing — employing all-native workers, except for a handful of white directors and technicians. The bottleneck in industry is not finding markets or workers, but technicians, skilled people to train more Bantus.

Whites can own nothing in the Transkei area, except for a limited length of time. Eventually, all land owned by whites will have to be sold to Bantu.

The natives I have seen here have a far better life than the Russian farmers I saw in the Ukraine of Russia ("the workers' paradise") a few years ago. The Bantu have far more freedom than the Russian peasant. We in the United States have helped the Kremlin criminals to tighten the chains of slavery; and we have helped them modernize their agriculture by giving them machinery, seed, animals, fertilizers.

For South Africa our government and the world offer nothing but condemnation. South African athletes were even excluded from the Olympic games — but not Russian athletes. It would appear that the supreme crime today is not murder, even by the millions, but racialism.

South Africa's greatest need is time. Time to develop the Bantu. Time to prove that separate development, separate ownership, separate cultures are not only right but workable.

Electric Bill!



IT WAS A RECEIPTED BILL for electrical service rendered in 1907 by the Edison Light and Power Company to a customer in Wichita, Kansas. The bill was for \$7.00, for a month's service — for only 14 kilowatt-hours of electricity. (Collection must have been something of a problem in those days because the bill specified: "Less 20 percent if paid before the 10th of the month.")

The bill was made out on a postal card, the other side of which bore the one-cent stamp that paid for its delivery across town.

In the 58 years since 1907, the postage rate has risen to four cents a card — 400 percent of what it was then; whereas, the price for electricity has steadily declined from 50 cents per kwh to two cents now — four percent of what it was then.

An average American home today, if fully electrified with air conditioning and heating, would use about 24,000 kwh annually, costing \$480. At the 1907 rate, that cost would be \$12,000; and if kwh prices had behaved as has the price for delivering a post card, the electrical bill would be \$48,000 annually. Except that no one would use electrical appliances!

One might speculate as to what those respective rates might be today had the situations been reversed, with a government monopoly of electrical service, and a free-enterprise postal service!

How much profit was earned over the years by the Edison Light and Power Company and its successors in Wichita is unknown to us, but we do know that within a recent period of years while the Post Office was accumulating a deficit of \$10 Billion, its largest competitor in the communications field, the privately owned American Telephone and Telegraph, showed \$22 Billion in profits — despite the fact that the rates it could charge for phone service were regulated and controlled by the Federal Communications Commission.

In view of all the talk about protecting consumers, the record suggests that private enterprise is a better caretaker than the Government is. (Reprinted from the Freeman, February, 1965.)

I look forward in 1966 to the broadening of our sources of revenue to reduce even further the burden on property taxes. I would have our city take steps toward improving in every possible manner our business climate to create more healthy business activities and attract additional desirable businesses to the community.

"During 1966 we will strive to improve our communication with the public to develop a better understanding of municipal service level demands and other needs of the community. Improvement of working relationships with other governmental agencies in the interest of efficiency and economics is our goal.

"Hopefully, during this year we will resolve the beach erosion problem and also see the resolution of the Upper Bay problem in order that this natural asset might be developed and made available to the public."

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

The kiosk was a graduation gift from the class of '63. Its officers had hoped the '64 class would complete the project and utilize it as a bulletin board for posters and announcements in accordance with the structure's tradition throughout Europe.

One group wanted to fulfill the wish of the class of '63. The other group demanded the kiosk be used as a platform for spirited statue, such as "Pete and Pirate," the college's comical mascot displayed at football games.

Although the class of '64 nursed the '63 class project along without any real accomplishment. The class of '65 agree at least on the end, if not the means.

Chuck Harbold, a past voting member of the student council, had pleaded for the status of "something that will show the spirit of the school" and had also carried the support of another past council member and student president, Pete Gordon.

But times change and the center of voting power shifts. The kiosk now stands with a minor addition—a circular tin crown—and Scott Smith, a member of the college beautification committee, has announced it will be finished with a covering of colorful posters.

"This will be the authentic European kiosk method of displaying posters," Smith said as the curtain fell on the OCC drama.

## Body with \$720 found

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

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

## PROGRESS REPORT

**LARGEST SINGLE CONTRACT** for Philco Aeronutic, a \$71,393,000 U.S. Army contract for Shillelagh production, has been awarded by the U.S. Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama. The contract is being managed by Aeronutic's tactical weapons systems programs office, headed by Robert Katkov, who heads the team which brought Shillelagh through its development program into high-volume production. The new contract marks the completion of start-up at the Lawndale plant, where 400 are now employed and

800 more will be hired in 1966. Shillelagh, shown here after being launched from a General Sheridan assault vehicle, is a guided missile which follows a line-of-sight from vehicle gunner to a spot pin-pointed by the cross hairs of the sight. The target may be stationary or moving - the gunner simply keeps the cross hairs on the target and Shillelagh does the rest, flying to the exact spot pin-pointed on the target. Program manager at Aeronutic is Nicholas Mastrocola.

## CITY COUNCIL NEWS

Here is a summary of action taken by the Newport Beach City Council at its meeting last week:

• Approved first reading of Ordinance 1148, requiring that commercial boat docking facilities and marinas located in Newport Bay should be equipped with signs to inform the public of the city's regulations prohibiting the discharge of toilets on any vessel into the waters of Newport Bay, and other sanitation provisions.

• Accepted 8 grants of easement from property owners in Shore Cliffs for construction, maintenance and repair of storm drain and appurtenances at the end of Driftwood Rd.; 3 more grants of easement are yet to be obtained.

• Awarded the contract for construction and reconstruction of cement curbs, sidewalks, approaches and pavements to the low bidder, J. Rullo Enterprises of Paramount, in the amount of \$15,136.50; the projects are scheduled in Balboa Peninsula and at Mariners Park.

• Authorized a \$9 refund to T. Kenneth Hackett of San Marino because a weed abatement assessment had been made in error against his property in Newport Shores.

• Discussed a new license agreement with John Charles Kirk for continued use of the Balboa Pier; the new terms call for \$160 a month, instead of the present \$100 plus 10% of gross annual receipts over \$24,000, which has brought the monthly average to \$111.73; the new agreement was referred to the staff for further study of requirements for keeping the pier clean.

• Approved revisions to the storm drain construction contract for 1965-66; these changes include addition of curb return and catch basin at Irvine Ave. and 15th St., near Harbor High School; deletion of the proposed parallel drain on Bayside Dr. at Bayside Pl., at China Cove in Corona del Mar; and an analysis of the feasibility of regrading that portion of Bayside Dr. to provide adequate flood drainage and constructing a sidewalk on the China Cove side of Bayside Dr.

• Received an inquiry from James K. Donahue of Boston on the possibility of installing a community antenna television system to increase TV selection and reception; referred the matter to the city manager, who is preparing a report on the subject, since an earlier similar request is pending.



serve a reply.  
I testified before your group because I had acted as spokesman for the Orange County Republican Candidate Caucus. The statements I issued during the '64 campaign were supported by every Republican campaign organization in Orange County, including those for U.S. Senator, President and Vice President, with the sole exception of Assemblyman Whitmore.  
What is more important, the Caucus' position was not only their beliefs, but was based on information supplied by Kern County Democrats at several levels and a bi-partisan cross-section of engineers, scientists and mathematicians.

Although disappointed in your original findings, I was hardly surprised.

As I stated privately then, the members of Mr. Schryer's committee, present that day, seemed to miss the main point of opposition. It was (and is) that:

Granted the machine is infallible (and absolutely no machine is infallible, but we will stipulate Coleman has worked that miracle), still the County has bought a whole new election day system.

Every single step taken in the election day cycle is altered; sometimes radically changed, to accommodate the machine. It is in these changes of election day procedures — beginning with the advance order of ink pads and stamping pencils through the official canvass — that the door is opened for anything from mischief to massive fraud.

If the Voter Information Bureau gets the new vote counting system (not machine, but system) on the ballot as a referendum, the public will have a chance, to learn of all the new possibilities of their vote being debauched.

When I first met your committee members matching wits with Coleman's machine, I felt several of you had prejudged the issue. When I testified, I didn't lose that feeling. That prejudice is revealed in your recent statement, indicating you can dismiss the whole matter because all the complaints came from one area. I suggest that complaints to investigate — say, the Fullerton School Board, would come from one area also, and not be subject to easy dismissal; or all complaints on harbor rulings would be heavily "weighted," to use your word, around Newport, and not be subject to prejudicial treatment, and complaints on the Coast Freeway... ad infinitum.

I have read most of the "letters to editors" on the

subject and I do not recall any from the few people who spoke to you against Coleman's concept.

You also state categorically that any critic either has a "lack of knowledge" or is "politically motivated." How intemperate!

I can't recall anyone castigating the Grand Jury as being shallow, not conducting any respectable, thorough investigation (200 ballots run through a machine once? Ask any statistician what kind of validity that establishes for the machine's infallibility); not looking into public records (the only copies of Kern County's report you saw — if they were read — I personally bought from the County Clerk) or being unduly lobbied by the County Clerk and representatives of Coleman. And as for political motivation, are not each of you in an appointed (i.e. politically approved) office? What is your political motivation?

Probably none. You are more likely average laymen in the presence of awe-inspiring automation and its associated complex and terribly impressive hardware. Mesmerized by the image of instant efficiency in sorting, calculating and computing, you feel the machine just has to be right. Such belief is normal. One businessman I know used to spend hours with tax auditors. Now all his records are on a computer — same system, everything keyed as before, but the auditor no longer argues (the machine must be right); he just records totals, has a cup of coffee and is gone in half an hour.

In closing I wish to re-emphasize that the information leading to the Republican Caucus' opposition stemmed from the expressed feelings of Kern County Democrats and was substantiated by nearly two score men who are not mesmerized by the big machine — indeed, they invent, build, operate and debug far more sophisticated, more complex, more impressive, more efficient machines every day as they earn their living. If you want your ego squelched for all time, find any engineer worth his degree and tell him that questioning the accuracy of any counting and computing machine and accompanying system shows a lack of knowledge.

Since it is undoubtedly too late for you to reopen your investigation, may I suggest you open your minds.
