

## Battle of the Bosom

### Salvation Army vs SF North Beach

SAN FRANCISCO—"Jesus Saves," the Salvation Army soldiers sang at a massive street rally called to protest bare bosom entertainment at "topless" nightclubs in the gaudy entertainment center of North Beach.

"Take it off," chanted the crowd of several thousand, aiming their barbs at Salvation Army women and girls, their blue tunics buttoned tightly to the neck.

And while the Army's Citadel Band and Timbre Brigade sounded out with a rousing chorus of "The Old Rugged Cross," strains of "A Pretty Girl Is Like A Melody" drifted down the street from a crowded nightclub.

The implausible scene, played last night in the heart of an area wracked by controversy, marked the latest skirmish in the battle of the bosom. It's a battle which the topless clubs have

won, at least temporarily in the courts, and which the Salvation Army has vowed to fight until the last breast is covered.

Police said more than 2,000 persons turned out to witness the Army's street meeting with its demands that bare-bosomed dancers start using tops.

"The city must regain its grip on standards of responsibility," speaker after speaker pleaded.

"You'd make a beautiful 'playmate of the month,'" shouted a sailor at a pretty tambourine player in the second row. The 100 members of the Army just thumped harder, blew harder and sang more lustily.

Protesting "Any un-Christian behavior anywhere that might lead to moral breakdown," the Army said it would soon invade the top-

less nightclubs and distribute tracts titled, "What Does Your Own Conscience Say?"

The nightclubs, seeing an opportunity to drum up business in the dispute, placed dancers in front of the crowd to display their anatomy.

"Gee, I think it's wonderful," said Yvonne D'Angers, who bills herself as "Miss Topless of 1965."

Shapely Carole Dora performed an impromptu dance to "What A Friend We Have in Jesus" and invited everyone to "come by and have a drink" at the Condor Nightclub where she performs.

The topless shows were ruled legal early this year when a Municipal Court judge said they were not in conflict with contemporary community standards.

## Cease-fire Violations Charged

NEW DELHI (UPI)—India and Pakistan today fought a battle of charges and counter-charges over alleged violations of the United Nations cease-fire. Some shooting was reported and both sides refused to budge from territory seized during the border war.

Radio Pakistan reported a continuing battle in the Lipa Valley along the 1949 Kashmir cease-fire line. The area where the fighting started more than two weeks ago.

The Pakistan broadcast charged that Indian artillerymen were shelling Pakistani positions near Lahore and that Indian troops had occupied Alhar village in the Sialkot area.

In all three cases, Pakistan said India violated the truce imposed by the United Nations Wednesday. India lodged similar protests against Pakistan yesterday, charging that Pakistani troops crossed the cease-fire line in widely separated frontier sections.

More bloodshed was reported in Indian-held Kashmir by the Voice of Kashmir, the clandestine radio speaking for pro-Pakistan rebels trying to seize control of the disputed state.

The rebel radio said so-called Kashmiri "freedom fighters" killed 54 Indians in three engagements yesterday, set fire to a gasoline dump, seized arms and ammunition from a police station and blew up a bridge. All took place in the area of Srinagar, Kashmir's summer capital, the radio said.

In Rawalpindi, the Pakistani capital, a spokesman for the U.N. military observer group said he had no information about the reported cease-fire violations.

### Russ Cooperation Only Temporary

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andre Gromyko's United Nations speech indicates that U.S.-Russian cooperation over Kashmir has had little effect on overall Soviet-American relations.

U.S. officials say the tone of Gromyko's remarks, though relatively mild, indicated that major U.S.-Soviet problems remain unchanged.

Officials here saw nothing new in his address, including an attack on the United States over Vietnam and restatement of Soviet opposition to proposals for a North Atlantic nuclear force.

The United States and Russia had a somewhat rare coincidence of views over Kashmir, both working in the United Nations Security Council for a cease-fire between India and Pakistan, officials said.

The only talks they had on the matter were over specific resolutions at the U.N.

Both appeared primarily concerned with the threat of Communist China and the dangers which disorder and economic disruption on the Indian subcontinent could mean to world peace.

TALKS

Secretary of State Dean Rusk leaves Sunday for two weeks of talks with foreign ministers attending the United Nations. He is expected to meet privately with Gromyko to see whether there is any chance of progress on U.S.-Soviet issues, including the Far East, disarmament and Berlin.

Meanwhile, U.S. officials reported there is a possibility that Indian Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri and Pakistan President Mohammed Ayub might visit the United Nations.

## New Trial Scheduled In Beating

SANTA ANA — Superior Court trial for a 29-year-old Santa Ana man who allegedly beat his wife on the head with a hammer has been scheduled Nov. 17.

Superior Judge William L. Murray ordered the trial Friday after Manuel G. Lopez, of 222 N. Lowell St., pleaded innocent to charges of assault with intent to commit murder and assault with a deadly weapon.

The alleged attack followed an all-night argument Sept. 5 after Lopez spanked the couple's seven children for not doing their assigned chores, police said.

His wife, Bertha, 24, is in satisfactory condition at Orange County General Hospital after being in critical condition when she was admitted.

Hospital authorities said Mrs. Lopez has undergone brain surgery.

Lopez is held in Orange County Jail in lieu of \$6,500 bail.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Negotiations aimed at ending the shutdown as seven city newspapers resumed today, but pessimistic statements by both sides dimmed hopes for a quick settlement of the 10-day-old strike.

## U.N. Agrees To Debate China Seat

UNITED NATIONS (UPI)—The General Assembly ended its first week by agreeing without dissent to debate the question of seating Red China and adopting a record 106-ite magenda.

The 117-member world body also had before it today the policy statements of both the United States and the Soviet Union, with both powers presenting sweeping nuclear disarmament proposals.

The General Assembly yesterday adopted, despite Soviet objections, an Irish proposal to discuss the authorization and financing of peace-keeping operations.

The Assembly also agreed to debate on Communist China's treatment of Tibet after employing for the first time new voting machines installed on either side of the president's podium.

The question of Tibet was put on the agenda by 41-46 vote, with 46 abstentions.

Albanian Foreign Minister Behar Shytilla urged the assembly to vote down the item. He termed it a U.S. attempt to divert world public opinion from U.S. policy in Vietnam.

The abstainers included all Communist members plus France, the Scandinavian countries and Afro-Asians.

There was no vote on the item adopting the Irish peace-keeping proposal.

## She Never Returned

# What Could Have Happened To Heiress on Honeymoon?

Nearly five months ago, Eileen Jeffers became the bride of Thomas C. Yager and sailed off from Newport Harbor on a honeymoon from which she never returned.

Despite a conclusion of the Coast Guard that there is no evidence of foul play in the disappearance of the 61-year-old heiress, her many friends in this area ask each other, in frank bewilderment, "Whatever could have happened to Eileen?"

What remains of Eileen Yager presumably lies at approximately 33 deg. 26 min. north latitude, 118 home at Shamrock Cottage, deg. 09 mins. 15 sec. west longitude under a coverlet of Pacific Ocean water 330 fathoms deep—1,980 feet.

That would be about midway between Avalon and Newport — and a very deep six — where Eileen Yager disappeared from the flying bride of the cruiser Care Free about 7:45 a.m. on May 6.

AT HOME

After a decent period of mourning, Yager returned to the Superior Court bench in Los Angeles County to which he had been appointed in 1958 by then Gov. Goodwin J. Knight.

He has been making his home at Shamrock Cottage, Pasadena.

Shamrock Cottage had been built by Mr. and Mrs. William J. Jeffers in 1946 after Jeffers retired as president of the Union Pacific Railroad.

Eileen was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tim Keliher of North Platte, Nev. Her father was once sheriff there. Her mother died at Eileen's birth and she was adopted by the Jefferses. Mrs. Jeffers was her aunt.

Eileen and Judge Yager had met about five years ago through Catholic church and (See BRIDE, Page 2)

## General Exonerates Marine

SAIGON (UPI)—Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of American forces in Vietnam, today exonerated a Marine officer who used tear gas to flush Communist guerrillas from a tunnel hideout. The Viet Cong had used women as human shields.

"No disciplinary action has been taken and none is contemplated," Westmoreland said in announcing results of an investigation into the case of Lt. Col. Leon Utter. The Leatherneck officer ordered use of the gas on Sept. 7 to root out Viet Cong near the U.S. base at Qui Nhon, 260 miles northeast of Saigon.

On battlefronts today, American pilots flying B52 jets from Guam raided a Viet Cong stronghold hidden in the jungles of the central highlands and American infantrymen smashed a network of Communist fortifications only 20 miles north of Saigon.

It was disclosed that other American planes dropped propaganda leaflets yesterday for the first time on Haiphong, a big North Vietnamese seaport, telling the Communists that peace could be achieved if they stopped their aggression in South Vietnam. A million leaflets were released.

The ground action near Saigon involved troops of the U.S. First Infantry Division — "The Big Red One" — who have been sweeping through the Thien Khanh forest in a massive search-and-destroy mission.

The infantrymen met patches of fierce resistance in the early stages of the sweep before the Viet Cong faded back into the jungle. One guerrilla bunker was bombed, strafed, shelled and stormed at least three times before it was overrun.

A U.S. military spokesman reported today that U.S. troops destroyed a series of tunnels and captured 1,000 pounds of Communist rice without any serious opposition.

Other American and allied forces pressed a similar mission against guerrillas using the so-called "iron triangle," 40 miles north of Saigon as a jungle haven. This week-long assault included South Vietnamese, Australian and New Zealand infantrymen.

## Judge Doesn't Like His Budget Slashed

GARY, IND. (UPI)—Politicians take heed: If you have to cut someone's budget, make sure it isn't the judge's.

City Court Judge Richard S. Kaplan said yesterday he'll toss all nine members of the Gary City Council in jail if they don't restore \$13,000 they cut from his budget.

"I don't think it will come to that," the judge said, "but I'm prepared to do it if I have to."

Kaplan filed suit in Lake County court at Hammond asking that the council be ordered to approve his full budget request of \$135,370.

"If the court grants me the mandamus and the council refuses, I'll cite them for contempt and jail them," Kaplan added.

Included in the budget cut were funds for a court physician to attend prisoners and salary increases for probation officers and bailiffs.

Kaplan maintains that his budget requests were reasonable and unselfish.

## Questioning To Continue In Slaying

SAN BERNARDINO — A 29-year-old Highland Park man was scheduled to undergo further interrogation during the weekend as sheriff's deputies sought clues in the brutal slaying of a Fountain Valley family of four last month.

Authorities here said Frank Lafin, a parolee from a Washington prison, was still being held on a warrant alleging possession of a firearm by a felon and another charging receipt of property taken in a burglary.

Lafin, arrested Thursday on a Redlands street after an anonymous tip, is being questioned in the murder of the James A. Boles family at their Crestline mountain cabin Aug. 16.

Boles, 41, his wife, Darlene, 37, and their two sons, Bob, 13, and Tom, 12, were slain in the cabin they had just finished building. They had lived at 15947 Silvertop Court, Fountain Valley, since February when they moved from Anaheim.

# Fraternity Must Pay \$100,000 Tax

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—A District Court jury, shown photos of couples embracing at a Sigma Nu party, ruled yesterday the fraternity is more social than religious, therefore not exempt from tax on its \$100,000 frat house.

Ed Badough, an officer of the fraternity's Upsilon chapter, said the University of Texas group may appeal.

"We wouldn't have presented the case unless we thought we had a case," Badough said. "We didn't agree with it (their verdict), but we're not the jury."

The chapter contended it was primarily religious and educational organization instead of a social group and should enjoy the tax-free status of a religious group.

The fraternity, which has about 100 members, stopped paying property taxes in 1959 after it added a \$12,500 swimming pool to its fraternity complex. Sigma Nu sued the city about three weeks ago in an attempt to get out of paying back taxes from 1959 to the present and to gain an exemption from future levies.

The other 34 fraternities on campus have been paying taxes, but indicated they would file similar suits if Sigma Nu succeeded in its efforts.

Attorneys for the city of Austin claimed Sigma Nu is "just another fraternity" offering more beer and good times than religion and education. Any religious activities at the Sigma Nu house "are a

Guerrilla Warfare  
Reported in Cuba

MEXICO CITY—Cuban refugees reported today that large-scale guerrilla warfare has broken out again in Cuba's Pinar del Rio Province, forcing the government to send heavy reinforcements to the area.

The refugee Revolutionary Student Directorate (DRE) said "numerous" firing-squad executions have taken place in the Organs mountains.

Army reinforcements have been moved in from the Maestra mountains of Oriente Province and a cordon has been established along the Pinar del Rio coast from Mariel to Arroyos de Mantua, the exiles said.

Residents of the area were moved elsewhere to permit army control of all traffic and to speed movement of equipment, they added.

## Birth Control Controversy

VATICAN CITY—The birth control issue is one of the big behind-the-scenes controversies at the current session of the Ecumenical Council. Many Catholic prelates are hoping Pope Paul VI will make a statement on the question.

The pontiff has reserved to himself the decision whether to change the ban on all artificial contraception.

The Council's document "on the church in the modern world" skirts the issue. Debate on the document resumes Monday after a weekend recess.

## France, U.S. Showdown Feared

PARIS—Diplomatic sources today said they feared France and the United States were headed for a collision over the issue of Chinese Communist admission to the United Nations.

The sources said France would throw its support behind efforts to seat Peking in the world organization on the ground that its presence would facilitate the solution of a number of issues, including Kashmir and Vietnam.

Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg told the U.N. General Assembly yesterday the U.S. would fight to keep Red China out until Peking refutes its avowed policy of "chaos, threats and violence" in international affairs.

## Greek Crisis Ended

ATHENS—The 71-day-old Greek political crisis is ended at least temporarily today when Parliament accepted Stefan Stefanopoulos as Premier.

Stefanopoulos, the latest of three men chosen by King Constantine to form a government, won a confidence vote by a narrow 152-to-148 majority.

## Antipoverty Bill Readied

WASHINGTON—President Johnson's \$1.8 billion antipoverty bill was ready for his signature today. It doubled the amount appropriated last year.

The House approved the bill on a 46-22 vote yesterday, extending the program for one year and authorizing funds for the Job Corps, Community action programs, neighborhood youth corps and the Domestic Peace Corps.

The measure, however, only authorized the expenditure. The cash must be provided in an appropriations bill.

## Revolt Against Political Boss

MEXICO CITY—The Daily El Universal said today Thursday's guerrilla attack on a military post in Madera appears to have been "a revolt against a local political boss and dictator" rather than against the government.

A dispatch from Chihuahua said the armed band headed by Arturo Gamiz took to the hills "to combat the despotic rule" of a rancher it blames for various crimes.

"On various occasions, the group complained to the state government and to the military zone commander about the rancher's alleged crimes of robbery, assassination and rape, the dispatch said.

## Speechless

'Mystery' Boy's  
Identity Sought

MIAMI (UPI) — Frustrated authorities today hoped for a break in the case of the abandoned speechless mystery boy with the expected arrival of a man who claims to be his grandfather and a woman who seeks to learn if he is her missing son.

Both the man, whose identity was not disclosed, and the woman, Mrs. Tina Elliott, were flying from Texas. The man was to arrive from Cleveland, Tex., and the woman was flying from Dallas.

The boy, about 13, was found Wednesday morning wandering aimlessly in the main terminal of Miami International Airport. He had a sandwich, three pennies and a pack of tissues.

MISSING  
Mrs. Elliott's son Kenneth has been missing two months and is about 13 or 14 years old. She was being accompanied here by her parents.

It could not be learned if her trip was related to that of the man from Cleveland. Attempts to identify the child, who has not uttered a word, extended even to Michigan. The Detroit News aided in the efforts by making copies of a picture of the lad from a UPI transmission and sending 40 persons onto the streets, asking passersby: "Do you know this boy?"

## RETARDED?

Doctors who examined the boy said he might be retarded or in deep psychological distress. But they were not sure. They did say he was not deaf and not a mute.

The first development in the puzzle came yesterday when Mrs. Alfred Klein of Flint, Mich., positively identified the boy as having been on the same plane she took to Miami from Detroit Tuesday night.

Mrs. Klein said the boy was accompanied on the plane by a stocky, red-haired, middle-aged woman. The airline said the woman and boy had used the names "M. Thorn" and "B. Thorn," the latter's age being listed as 13.

Juvenile Court officer Barren Shields said Detroit police were trying to track down the woman and to determine whether a boy had been taken from a youth home in the Detroit area.

social groups. Both were devout church members.

But when she announced that she and the judge planned to wed, her friends were aghast. They pointed to the discrepancy in age — the judge was 46, 15 years her junior — and noted that while he had squired many other women over the years, he had never before married. Neither had she.

## HONEYMOON

These friends displayed their unhappiness by refusing to attend the wedding which was held in the private chapel of James Francis Cardinal McIntyre. Former Gov. Knight was the groom's man.

The bridal couple boarded the Care Fre, moored at Bay-side Village and departed the following morning for Santa Catalina Island.

The cold, clipped phraseology of a Coast Guard report told the rest of the story. Three paragraphs were based solely on the testimony of Judge Yager, as there were no other witnesses.

Lt. Cmdr. H. L. Johnson took the testimony from Judge Yager during a formal hearing in San Pedro on May 13.

"About 0500, 6 May 1965, Judge Yager arose, had breakfast, then made preparations for departing Avalon," the report related. "About 0645, M/B CARE FRE departed Avalon to return to Newport Beach. On board were Judge and Mrs. Thomas C. Yager. The boat proceeded on course at various speeds."

"After approximately 45 minutes to one hour had elapsed, Judge Yager wanted to visit the head. He asked his wife to steer the boat while he was away. He reduced the speed of the boat, but was unable to recall the amount of the reduction."

## WHAT HAPPENED?

"Mrs. Yager, who was sitting on the starboard seat on the flying bridge, arose and headed toward the steering

wheel. Judge Yager, who had been sitting on the port seat on the flying bridge where the operating controls are located, arose and went below deck to the head."

"The last recollection Judge Yager had is that Mrs. Yager had not reached the steering position when he departed the flying bridge. The head is located in the forward starboard side of the cabin area."

"Approximately ten minutes later, Judge Yager returned to the flying bridge and noted his wife was missing. As he had gone through the cabin area on his return trip from the head, he knew she was not below. He then reversed the course of CARE FRE to search for Mrs. Yager. He also attempted to contact the Coast Guard by radio, but the transmitter would not operate. After searching the area for approximately an hour, Judge Yager proceeded to Newport Beach to report his wife missing."

## VERTIGO?

Cmdr. Johnson pointed out that Mrs. Yager had no known medical history of underlying diseases, but that she had been taking medication prescribed for dizziness and slight vertigo only two months previously.

"From the evidence available, it is concluded that Eileen Keliher Jeffers Yager fell from the M/B CARE FRE into the waters of San Pedro Channel . . . at about 0745 PDT, 6 May 1965," were Commander Johnson's conclusions.

"Eileen Yager is still missing and is presumed to have drowned."

"There is no evidence of foul play."

"There is no evidence that any U.S. Government personnel caused or contributed to this casualty."

"The air/sea search conducted was timely and comprehensive."

"In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that no

further action be taken and the case be closed."

In replying to questions of the Coast Guard officer, Judge Yager prefaced almost all his remarks with the phrase "I recall" or "my recollection is."

He prefaced his testimony with the remark that "this has been a tragic, profound shock to me and I'm sure I'll never recover from it."

## PARTNERS

Judge Yager said he and his wife just prior to their marriage, had drawn up agreements which put into effect joint tenancy ownership and joint foundation ownership of their properties. He had established the Thomas C. Yager Foundation in 1959, and had amended the incorporation papers to incorporate the name of his wife.

Under a joint tenancy, the surviving spouse has complete control of the property until death.

"Our will made each other beneficiary of the other, but finally, according to the statement of intent, and according to what we believed in, everything ultimately would go to the foundation and to charity."

The value of Mrs. Yager's estate is estimated by friends to be as much as \$1.5 million.

It is a matter of record that she was bequeathed \$500,000 by Jeffers at his death in 1953. Her friends say that he had given her substantial property prior to his death, and that she had built up "quite a tidy fortune" with judicious investments.

These friends know that police detectives who made initial inquiries "as a favor" to the Coast Guard have termed Mrs. Yager's disappearance "an unfortunate accident."

They know that the Coast Guard inquiry turned up no evidence of foul play.

But they can't get over the uncomfortable feeling created by the disappearance of the wealthy heiress on her honeymoon.



NEW PORT.—The hardy band of fishermen who inhabit this Orange County coastal village gave great huzzahs today with the running of the first train on the McFadden Brothers' new railroad now linking this lumber port to Santa Ana and the hinterlands.

Indeed, the entrepreneurs of this sizeable venture, the McFadden Brothers, James and Robert, declare that opening of their rail line on this day of January 12, 1892, will set in motion the great development of commerce for this sea-side region.

The railbed has been seven years in the making.

It has already been reported that in the beginning in 1886, the course for the future railbed was laid out between the wharf and the County Seal when Messrs. Robert McFadden and H.G. Forgy drove a buggy across the region. Mr. McFadden drove while Mr. Forgy counted the revolutions of the buggy wheel by a rag tied to one spoke, thereby determining the distance for the future railroad line.

The McFadden Brothers, owners of some 4,000 acres of the old Rancho Santiago de Santa Ana, have been noted in this coastal area since 1865 and thereabouts as importers of lumber and other goods at their original landing inside the coastal bay at this location. It has been indicated they first called it their "New Port."

Difficulties in negotiating sand bars at the bay with the sizeable ships doing commerce here caused the McFadden Brothers to build their new wharf on the ocean.

It was originally intended by the brothers to build the wharfage and railroad concurrently. The ocean wharf, however, was completed four years ago, in 1888, and the railroad, not until the start of this New Year.

To date, the labours of transporting lumber and goods from the great ocean lumber ships and steamers has been difficult indeed. Most of the material has been moved inland by ox cart and mule train.

Now, with the coming of the railroad, it is anticipated that the activities of commerce will be greatly expedited.

Prior to the coming of the new railroad, the McFadden Brothers' ocean wharf handled shipping from 72 vessels in the first year of operations alone.

The McFaddens expressed the hope of continuing to expand their service to Gospel Swamp and possibly extending the rail line later to Smeltzer to handle the celery crop there.

The new railroad was built under a contract let to Mr. Joseph Bright and Company of San Bernardino. The McFadden Brothers also announced that Mr. J. S. Smiley would serve as first agent for the line in Santa Ana.



If you are in a hurry, Orange County courts get you there faster than anywhere in the state — if you get to court at all.

Orange County Presiding Superior Judge Raymond Thompson, who just returned from a State Superior Judge's Conference in connection with the State Bar Association Convention in Sacramento, said he learned Orange County has a time lag less than half that of the second fastest county.

**FOUR MONTHS**

In this county, Judge Thompson said, the time period between when parties are ready to go to trial and the date when the trial actually begins is four months.

The second fastest county in the state, Santa Clara, presently has a time lag of nine months. Some counties are more than two years behind.

What's behind Orange County's success?

It is the ability of these men, Judge Thompson said, to understand the situation and to be able to iron out the differences.

Orange County presently has 16 Superior Courts but is slated to add two others in the near future.







## Unique Building Process Featured

Unique construction, with pressure-treated poles serving as foundation and structural framing members, is featured at two new tri-level apartment buildings being erected on a 26 per cent grade overlooking Laguna Beach and the ocean.

Designed by Richard A. Forbeck of the architectural firm of Forbeck Associates, Costa Mesa, the side-by-side buildings with four apartments each are being built by Or-Em-Co Development Co. of Tustin. They are the first apartments to be erected in Southern California using this type of construction which is uniquely adaptable to steep-grade sites.

In the buildings, each apartment is on a separate level, giving all occupants unrestricted views over downtown Laguna Beach and the ocean. Construction began by setting 40 pressure-treated poles in bored holes, lining them up carefully and tying them together with laminated timbers.

Architect Forbeck believes this type of construction has particular advantages on hillside lots.

"It eliminates the tedious and time-consuming work required in trenching and pouring more conventional foundations on steep grades and actually results in some cost savings," he said. "We estimate that cost of these deluxe apartments is about \$3 per square foot less than that of conventional construction. Furthermore, the wood poles blend more naturally into the hillside terrain than do high masonry foundations."

Each of the two buildings will contain three two-bedroom and one three-bedroom apartments. Each apartment has a deck across the 40-foot front, seven and one half feet wide. Interior finishes are plaster and wood paneling with large view windows. Parking space for cars is provided beneath the apartments.

Both buildings are cantilevered front and back. Landscaping will be placed around and under the buildings. The apartments use the "balanced power" concept.

Pass-through counters blend outdoor and indoor living and serve as functional areas for entertaining guests at Pasaverde, \$22 million, 900-home community in El Toro, reports Weldon O'Toole, community manager for builder-developer S. V. Hunsaker - Sons Inc.

"The counters are located in the kitchen adjacent to the patio," said O'Toole. "A sliding glass window enables food to be served from indoors to the outdoor area without the host having to walk back and forth between the two areas."

Located in the hills of North Laguna, the community is ten miles southeast of Santa Ana. Priced from \$23,695 on conventional terms, homes include front yard landscaping and underground sprinkler systems. Two-car garages, up to three baths, and family and/or dining rooms are also featured.

Sunken living rooms with wrought iron balustrades, full-view balconies and private courtyards are included in some models.

Fifteen Hunsaker - designed exteriors are available in New Orleans, Spanish, Contemporary and Colonial motifs, noted O'Toole.

One and two-story homes are available in five floor plans; the three-bedroom Seville and Greenlea, and four-bedroom Oliverde, Whitehall and Orleans.

Pasaverde features include massive brick or stone fireplaces, wrap-around patios, terrazzo - tiled entry ways, master suites with private dressing room boudoirs, wall-to-wall carpeting, gold-inlay on all wardrobes with matching hardware, and pullman baths with murals on tubs and showers.

Sleeping quarters are located away from major activity centers to afford maximum family privacy, said O'Toole.

Macco Realty President Proud of Job

If you're a diversified real estate company with your eye on tomorrow — then a man who stands tall, moves fast, and thinks big (on a solid foundation of experience in the field) may be just what you need to keep in step with Southern California's new housing demands.

Such was the thinking that led the Macco Realty Company to hire John B. Parker as project manager of its Mesa Del Mar development in 1960, promote him to coordinating engineer of all real estate development soon after, and name him president of Macco Realty Company in April 1963.

The thinking was as sound as Macco Realty's spectacular growth. Net income had already zoomed from \$120,000 in 1957 to \$825,000 in 1960. For 1962, however, Macco Realty reported a net of \$1.4-million; for 1963, \$1.9-million, and for 1964, a significantly higher figure still: a net income of \$2,665,905.

## PROUD

John B. Parker has reason to be proud of his contribution to these figures, and the thousands of acres acquired and homes built that they represent. But the 45-year-old Stanford University engineering graduate is too concerned with Macco's future to dwell overlong on its past — or on his own.

Parker's pre-Macco past is nonetheless worth noting. A native Californian — he was born in Pomona in 1920 — Parker was educated and worked in the Golden State all his life except for 18 months overseas during World War II as an engineering officer with the Seabees.

Parker's wartime tour of

duty began four months after his graduation from Stanford in 1942 with a degree in civil engineering, which he put to use — immediately but briefly — as a field engineer at the Kaiser Company's Richmond shipyard.

## ACTIVE DUTY

Commissioned in October, 1942, as an ensign in the Navy's Civil Engineer Corps, he remained on active duty until 1945, when he was discharged with the rank of lieutenant commander. Parker then joined the California State Department of Public Works' Bridge Division, as an engineer on the Santa Ana Freeway.

The 13 years preceding his association with Macco, Parker spent as engineer and project manager on a wide-ranging variety of industrial, commercial, and housing developments — among them, the 540-unit, \$8-million Capehart housing project at McClellan Air Force Base.

Macco has acquired sub-

stantial interest in no less than 100,000 acres in Riverside, Orange and Los Angeles counties, giving the company the largest land-inventory of any developer in Southern California.

## USEFULNESS

In John Parker's opinion, Macco's inventory is impressive mainly in terms of its potential usefulness. "We made our latest purchases," he says, "for the same reason as our first really big one — the Porter Ranch in the San Fernando Valley in 1962 — for conversion into master-planned communities. We hope to make money, certainly, from such conversions. But we hope even more that the community-size developments planned for these areas will help, to some extent, to meet the demand for new, quality housing in Southern California. One thing I know for sure: no matter how hard we push, we can't hope to do better than barely keep pace with that demand."

Macco's latest acquisition is the 87,500-acre Rancho California — the former Vail Ranch — in southwestern Riverside County. The acreage — three times the size of the entire city of San Francisco — was acquired for \$21-million December, 1964, by Macco Realty in equal partnership with wholly-owned subsidiaries of Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corporation and with Kaiser Industries Corporation. Because nearly a year of planning had preceded the purchase, a program of land utilization within Rancho California is now being implemented which, under Parker's supervision, is designed to (See MACCO, Page 11)







Parker is also directing development of a second major new project — Macco Leadership Homes in the Los Angeles Harbor area.

Planning also has begun on Macco's Long Beach Marina project — 85 acres of leasehold property fronting for the most part on the marina's aquatic area. On Macco's fourth new project — Capistrano Highlands, a 605-acre project near El Toro — consisting of 211 one and two-story homes available in up to five bedrooms, sales of 110 homes have been noted to date. 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
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

# Exposing Welfare Frauds

## Weekly Newspaper Editor Campaigns to Oust Unqualified Recipients From Relief Rolls

Covering a court trial for her weekly newspaper, the Hobbs (N.M.) Flare, Mrs. Agnes Kastner Head was shocked to hear a man testify that his wife had deserted him so that she would become eligible for public welfare payments.

**THE MAN** explained that his wife could then qualify for a monthly handout for their children because she had no breadwinner in the house.

Mrs. Head's thoughts flashed back to other welfare abuses. She remembered hearing of people who refused jobs to avoid being taken off the relief rolls, welfare checks cashed in bars and liquor stores, welfare recipients who chronically turned up in court on charges of drunkenness or disorderly conduct. She decided then and there to crusade against misuse of welfare funds.

"I've fought against waste in government for as long as I've had a newspaper," Mrs. Head says. "I believe it's a paper's duty to expose such things, and the welfare situation began to look like one of the most gigantic swindles I'd ever heard of."

**THAT WAS** seven years ago, and Mrs. Head — a small bundle of energy with graying hair — has not let up in her campaign to oust unqualified recipients from the Lea County relief rolls. She has spotlighted a problem which plagues communities across the United States: inflation of welfare rolls by people who seemingly would rather accept public handouts than work to support themselves.

The cost of fighting poverty has grown steadily, and spending under the many federal programs alone now totals at least \$30 billion yearly.

A portion of this — more than \$3 billion — goes in federal grants to the states to support joint public assistance programs in which

payments are made directly to the poor. Categories include aid to families with dependent children (AFDC), old-age assistance, aid to the blind and to the permanently and totally disabled, and medical assistance for the aged. Federal matching grants make up more than half the total spent. More than eight million people will receive such payments in the coming year.

**FOLLOWING** a nationwide survey two years ago, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare reported that more than five per cent of the families receiving payments under the AFDC program were ineligible. The survey results have produced a number of federal measures aimed at cutting down the number of ineligible recipients throughout the country. In New Mexico the rate of ineligibility was nearly 10 per cent.

Mrs. Head's crusade has brought threats by mail and telephone and loss of advertising contracts, but it has earned her growing support among Lea County residents. Circuit Judge Kermit E. Nash says:

"When you have someone like Mrs. Head in your town, you find that everybody walks a little straighter."

**NOW 61**, the peppery Mrs. Head has published the Hobbs Flare since 1948. Hobbs, with a population of 30,000, is Lea County's biggest city.

The land around Hobbs is flat and brown, relieved only by the occasional green patch of an irrigated field. Rainfall is sparse, and nothing taller than mesquite trees seems to grow unaided. The region's wealth, however, lies beneath the ground. The landscape is dotted with pump jacks, nodding in the sun like giant grasshoppers as they extract the oil which makes

the county prosperous and provides jobs for those who want to work.

Years of crusading for economy in government have made Mrs. Head some enemies. Her campaign against welfare chiselers has drawn wide-spread support, however. As Hobbs Municipal Judge Robert L. Bensing told a Nation's Business editor:

"**EVEN HER** strongest critics agree with Mrs. Head on this welfare issue. She has done a real good job."

For the past six years — since the state legislature passed a bill opening welfare rolls to public scrutiny — Mrs. Head has printed the list of Lea County recipients in the Flare at regular intervals. Welfare payments in the county now total about \$50,000 monthly. She also has exposed specific welfare abuses in a series of articles.

Some of the more flagrant cases:

**A RETIRED** blacksmith, drawing old-age assistance, was living in a house which he had transferred to his son's name. He was found to have a bank account of \$9,800.

Another recipient of old-age assistance had \$10,000 in government bonds. His deception was exposed when he cashed them in at a local bank.

An oil-field worker and his family began drawing aid for disability and for dependent children after he was injured on the job. When he received an insurance settlement, he used the money to buy a new air-conditioned car and a portable vacuum cleaner with a long cord to clean the auto.

**NEIGHBORS** called Mrs. Head when they saw his name listed in the paper. He drove his car out of the state after the welfare department filed suit to re-

cover the money it had paid him.

Publishing the relief rolls has uncovered a number of cases in which welfare recipients have failed to report jobs paying them enough to be dropped from the rolls or have their allotments cut. When the list was first published some county residents found that their domestic and yard workers were receiving welfare checks.

A mother with five or six children who receive no support from their father can draw as much as \$180 monthly in AFDC payments in New Mexico. The welfare office sets a figure for the family's minimum budgetary needs. If she works and her earnings added to her AFDC check total more than this figure, the difference is deducted from her welfare payment. The temptation to conceal such earnings is strong.

**IT WAS EVEN** stronger under the state regulations which prevailed until two years ago requiring that all earnings be deducted from welfare payments.

One woman got in touch with Mrs. Head to report her sister and sister's husband, who lived in a nearby town. The husband was receiving payments for disability and the family also drew AFDC checks. Her sister's family, she said, boasted a higher living standard than her own and often talked about making new purchases.

It turned out that the husband was making money as a junk dealer and hiding his income from welfare workers.

**LAW OFFICERS** come in frequent contact with the seamy aspects of welfare. Les C. Villers, the county's chief juvenile probation officer, says:

"Some people on welfare will work part time but are very careful not to work too

much. A number would rather stay on welfare than work at all. There also are women who will have several illegitimate children just to increase their AFDC payments."

Pat H. Thames, juvenile probation officer at Hobbs, agrees:

"**'MANY WOMEN'** on AFDC don't take care of their children. They don't really seem to want children except to get welfare payments."

Judge Nash says: "There's no question but what we have a serious problem in abuse of the welfare program. I see it mostly in what seems to be an indiscriminate birth rate in families that can't even take care of themselves but continue to have more children. What's more, many people on welfare could be earning a good living but won't."

"**THERE ARE** welfare recipients who drive a newer model car than I do," the judge has a 1960 Oldsmobile and 1957 Dodge. He adds:

"Responsible leaders in the county — a great majority, if not all — are very concerned about the program. They feel that it needs to be slowed down."

"**PEOPLE RAISED** in this part of the country have had to work — trying to get ahead is part of life. A number of people in this county are worth more than a million dollars, but they're still hard at work."

"It's difficult to get ranch and farm workers because of the welfare program. We can pay 80 cents to \$1.25 an hour, but some people on welfare are getting what amounts to more than a dollar an hour for just sitting. We have to take care of our old people and the handicapped, but there are too many others on the rolls that could work."

"People in the govern-

ment depend on welfare recipients for votes. They seem to be trying to get as many as they can on the rolls."

**NEW MEXICO** welfare officials agree that cheating by welfare recipients is a problem there, as it is elsewhere.

"As long as there are people, we will have individuals who will misuse the welfare program," says Leo T. Murphy, director of the New Mexico Department of Public Welfare. "Our problem lies in cutting down our case load per welfare worker so we can keep a better account. All we can do is to investigate abuses, scrutinize and follow up all leads."

"For 30 years our philosophy on welfare in this country was to give people money and push them out of sight. Since 1962, however, we have changed to trying to rehabilitate and help them become self-supporting. The only answer is to find these people jobs and fit them into society."

**AS IN A NUMBER** of states, welfare in New Mexico has been a political football. Whichever party was in power has tried to run with the ball while it had the opportunity and score as many votes as possible. The taxpayer has been on the losing side, however, as the state welfare budget has doubled since 1954.

Despite the fact that welfare reform has come to be regarded as politically dangerous, State Sen. Harold L. Runnels and Rep. Finis L. Heidel, both of Lea County and both Democrats, have been trying to tighten regulations with the help of some other members of the legislature. Their efforts have been frustrated so far, however, partly by the long arm of the federal government.

"When we try to do something in the state legislature about the welfare situation we're charged with



proposing changes that might cause the state to lose its federal grants," Mr. Heidel explains. "The state welfare department sends a copy of our bill to the HEW regional office in Dallas and usually gets back a reply that the bill might be contrary to federal welfare regulations. That kills the bill."

"**AS THE FEDERAL** government controls more and more things, you have to do it their way or lose federal participating funds," says Mr. Heidel, an attorney who once served on the Washington staff of U. S. Rep. George Mahon of Texas.

"Federal regulations are the big stumbling block — any beneficial change will have to come through the U. S. Congress," he adds. "The federal government is really stepping into our state legislative process through its regulations on use of federal funds," says Senator Runnels.

"**THE FACT** that too many people are willing to accept state and federal help rather than use their own initiative is at the base of the whole situation." "State welfare regulations must be in conformity with

federal regulations," Welfare Director Murphy points out. "The State Board of Public Welfare has the right to formulate its own policies and regulations and put them into effect. But if Washington doesn't uphold them — if they violate federal regulations — we must conform or lose our federal funds."

Senator Runnels, who is president of a company which supplies material for oil drilling, is launching an investigation of the state welfare program by the Legislative Finance Committee, which he heads.

"**WE HOPE** to establish better guidelines which will enable the Welfare Department to cut its recipient rolls," he says. "We need to go back to greater local responsibility and control."

What is at the root of our blossoming welfare rolls? A leading Hobbs attorney believes he has the answer: "When I was a child I was taught to work — that nobody owed me anything unless I earned it. I was also taught that I was a part of our government, and that government would be only as good as I helped to make it."

## Coed Takes a Second Look at Saigon

# Feeling the Presence of War

**SAIGON** — The merchants of Saigon roll down the heavy shutters in front of their shops from noon until 2 p.m. each day. The city sleeps in the midday heat and for a few minutes it's hard to believe there is a war going on, until you take a second look around.

**I VISITED** Saigon long enough to take that second look. I never saw a battle and I never read a casualty report, but I came to feel the presence of war. All you have to do is walk down the street and you know it is there.

I knew the war was there when I stopped to admire the elaborate iron grillwork over the windows of restaurants and stores, and then realized the grillwork was there to prevent grenades or other explosives from being thrown inside.

I saw it along the bare wide pavements, where sidewalk cafes have been removed to avoid placing inviting targets in front of Viet Cong terrorists.

**I SAW IT** even among the silks in the windows of tailoring shops, where signs saying "we make military uniforms" stood beside emblems and patches embroidered

with the names of bases in the jungle.

I heard it in the special slang used by the military and the press. It is language in which the Viet Cong often is called "Charlie," an American soldier who is killed is "zapped," and then referred to as a "friendly casualty."

And I learned that the initials "BLT," which I had always used at home to order a bacon, lettuce and tomato sandwich, here mean Battalion Landing Team.

**THE TROOPS** in the city brought the war closest. Vietnamese and Americans in all kinds of uniforms speed through the streets in jeeps and other vehicles. GIs on leave were relaxing in cafes, reading American comics in the Sunday papers. Pilots in gray flight suits were lounging in hotel lobbies or looking up numbers in the special inch-thick book reserved for military listings in the country.

There was the vitality of the Vietnamese women throwing building bricks up to men perched on second-story level wooden scaffolding, and in the kids playing below them on the sidewalks.

If the soldiers hadn't been here, the city might have looked just as I had always imagined a former French colony would. The decaying effects of French domination were everywhere — in the peeling yellow paint on former administration buildings and in the acrid smell of Gauloise cigarettes found in taxis and elevators with walls of open grillwork.

**BUT IT WAS** clear that Americanization had taken over. It is found in the restaurants advertising pizza and hot dogs and in the slang of the bellboys who use expressions like "no sweat" and "rack out."

Despite the military activity, I found the city surprisingly alive in other ways, with little curtailment of daily life that I had always imagined would exist in a war zone.

There was the vitality of the Vietnamese women throwing building bricks up to men perched on second-story level wooden scaffolding, and in the kids playing below them on the sidewalks.

**THERE WAS** warmth in the freckle-faced GI who spoke halting Vietnamese to a child reaching up to touch the insignia on his uniform, and in the soldier who picked up a little boy and sat him on the seat of a motorcycle parked at the sidewalk.

There was humor, too, such as that of one resident who described different reactions to the war.

"There are two types of

opinion," he said. "That of the war hawks and that of the peace doves. Perhaps I represent a third, that of the chicken."

**BUT WHEN** night fell on the city, I felt the atmosphere change.

Suddenly the Vietnamese who by day had been ordinary people talking on the sidewalks now looked mysterious in the dark shadows of doorways and cigarette stands.

I noticed for the first time that almost every other door led into a bar with neon lights and loud rock 'n' roll coming from within. I saw American Military Police on the streets with Vietnamese police in their white uniforms. None of the Vietnamese police seemed to be directing traffic and I learned that the other Vietnamese in the city call them "ces mommes aux tetes folles" — those with crazy heads. The Americans call them "white mice" because of their uniforms.

**POLICE AND** armed military guards were everywhere in the downtown part of the city, standing on the corners, in the shadows, the occasional flash of light glinting dully from the bayonets fixed to their rifles or the submachineguns cradled in their arms.

After the 11 p.m. curfew, the heavy shutters were rolled down again over the fronts of the shops. But this time, even though there were few lights on the streets, the city seemed wide awake and waiting.

## Algo Se Esta Cocinado en Cuba

Many Cuban exiles who once dreamed of toppling Fidel Castro by invading their homeland now say it is Castro's own military that will turn on and destroy him.

There seems to be a new feeling of hope among Cuban exiles in Washington, Miami, New York and elsewhere.

"Algo se esta cocinando en Cuba," they say — Something is cooking in Cuba.

Castro was hailed as a conquering hero when his revolution swept him into power in January 1959, but now grumbling is audible at times when he makes his three-hour speeches.

He mentions with increasing frequency and bitterness the problem of guerrillas inside Cuba. And in characteristic Castro fashion he insists they have been stamped out.

Another problem to which he refers obliquely at times is that of the loyalty of his army and military forces. Experts here say disaffection has increased enormously within these forces in recent months with the spread of discontent among Cubans at their plight under Communist masters.

Castro still controls Cuba. His military forces and sophisticated weapons are the most powerful in all Latin America. The great hope of the exiles is that this power will be turned on the Castro government.

Some exiles insist there have been at least three attempts in recent months to assassinate Castro. U. S. officials say they have nothing to confirm such reports.

Exiles and U. S. officials often have disagreed about some aspects of the situation inside Cuba. Cuban refugees concede they may be influenced at times by wishful thinking, but say U. S. intelligence in Cuba has been deficient at times — as in the missile crisis of 1962.

But there are a number of things on which U. S. experts and Cuban exiles do agree:

—Cuba's economy and international finance is in chaos.

—Castro's theory that below-cost prices for Cuba's bumper sugar crop will be offset by profits in other production is nonsense.

—The Cuban army and the militia are heavily infiltrated by anti-Castro forces. There have been numerous purges and arrests of military men, and weapons have been taken away from various units.

—Hatred for the Communist regime is spreading among the populace.

—Imprisonment, firing squad executions, and other measures aimed at stamping out dissenters are producing additional defections throughout all elements of the population.

—Grumbling against rationing, shortages and repressive measures is widespread. One report says that when Castro told people in the vicinity of Nuevitas, a key port city on Cuba's north coast, that they were better off than ever before, the crowd chorused denials so vehemently they drowned out the loudspeakers.

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
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
