

Brown's OC Pick to Aid His Campaign?

Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. will have his own presidential candidacy in mind when he appoints a replacement to the Orange County Board of Supervisors, a Sacramento source said Friday.

The state official, who asked to remain unidentified, alleged the appointment will be based on

which selection stands to help Brown the most in 1980 when he is expected to challenge President Carter.

Gov. Brown's press secretary declared Friday, however, that Brown is making efforts to appoint "the very best candidate" to serve Orange County.

The unnamed official declared Brown and his aides are con-

sidering not only political support in Orange County but throughout the West as they review candidates to fill the seat that will be vacant Sunday because of Supervisor Ralph Dieckrich's bribery conviction.

The five hopefuls—Ron Cordova, Jess Perez, Edison Miller, Robin Young and Elaine Weinberg—were interviewed

Thursday in Sacramento by Brown and his aides.

All were asked to pay loyalty to Brown in consideration for their appointment, the official asserted.

The Sacramento insider said Cordova appears to be in the favorite's role for the job because he has support of conservative and liberal elements

of the Democratic Party as well as the backing of Orange County political power and State Democratic Party Chairman Richard O'Neill.

However, Orange City Councilman Perez also was rated a strong candidate by the source who offered the following comments:

"The governor is trying to cor-

ral the Chicano vote in California, Texas, Arizona and New Mexico.

"The selection of Perez could be looked upon favorably in this Chicano fertile ground."

Perez declined Friday to comment on the appointment other

Judge Nixed in Third Rape Trial

HB Girl's Murder Probed

A team of 13 Huntington Beach police investigators and cadets grimly searched the foothills near Sierra Madre Friday for clues in the murder of 12-year-old Robin Christine Samsoe.

The skeletal remains of the pert blonde who vanished after a June 20 beach outing, were discovered Monday on a hillside by a state forestry employee.

Dental and X-ray charts were required by Los Angeles County Coroner's deputies Friday to confirm Robin's identity.

Her unclothed body was badly decomposed due to exposure to elements and apparent mauling by roaming animals in the rural area, police said.

Exact cause of her death and any indication of sexual molestation will remain unknown until completion of coroner's reports, police said.

"It's sickening. It's depressing," said Sgt. Ron Jenkins, who headed a team of six investigators who mounted around-the-clock search for Robin when she was reported missing.

Her mother reportedly was hospitalized Friday, in shock over confirmed news of her daughter's death.

Police had held hope that Robin might turn up alive.

"I would rather she (Robin) had been gone 11 months and turned up alive like little Valeena," said Jenkins.

Earlier this week, 6-year-old Valeena Miller was discovered in a foster home in Arkansas nearly one year after being abducted by her mother, a former mental patient who no longer had custody.

Jenkins said police will continue to search for a man who reportedly asked to take pictures of Robin and her girlfriend while at Huntington State Beach, the day she disappeared.

The photographer, described as a slender, curly haired man about 30 years old, remains a possible suspect in the murder, Jenkins said.

After returning to her girlfriend's house in the downtown area that afternoon,

Strangle Suspect Pleads Not Guilty

The 15-year-old Westminster boy charged with strangling 11-year-old Julie Meyer has pleaded not guilty and not guilty by reason of insanity.

The youth, whose name has not been revealed because of laws protecting juveniles, entered the plea during a detention hearing Thursday in Orange County Juvenile Court.

Young Julie's body was found early June 26 near a vacant house across the street from her Westminster home at 15241 Xavier Circle.

She had been reported missing at 11:30 o'clock the night before, some three hours after she was last seen playing with friends in the street near her home.

Julie's body was found at the base of a high wall at 1:30 a.m. the following day by her father.

The accused youth lives in the same neighborhood.

He was arrested June 29 after police launched a round-the-clock investigation that carried them to all of the homes for several blocks surrounding the murder scene.

Two of the 20 investigators assigned to the case remain on it, said Lt. Joe Woods. They are continuing to look for a possible motive in the case, he said.

Sources close to the investigation and subsequent legal actions indicate that the death may have followed taunts allegedly voiced by the girl.

Presiding Orange County Juvenile Court Judge William Murray said Friday that a hearing is scheduled for 9 a.m. July 19 to determine if the accused youth is psychotic.

Judge Murray said three psychiatrists have been appointed to aid in determining whether the youth understands the nature of proceedings he faces and can cooperate in his own defense with his lawyer, Thomas Brown of Westminster.

"Those are the questions," Murray said. "If they say he is OK, there will be a trial to determine if he killed."

The judge said if the boy did commit the murder and was insane at the time, he'll probably be set free.

And if he did commit the offense and is judged to be psychotic at this time, he would be committed to an institution and freed when cured, he added.

No bail is set in juvenile offenses of this nature, the judge added. The boy is being held in Juvenile Hall.

Judge Murray said 12 youths currently are housed there on various murder charges.

Irvine Home Destroyed By Fireworks

Orange County firemen estimated a fireworks-caused blaze caused \$40,000 worth of damage to an Irvine home Friday afternoon.

The fire, set off by bottle rockets, brought to six the number of major fires this month caused by fireworks in the territory covered by the county fire department.

Those six fires have caused an estimated \$425,000 in damage, according to department figures.

The Friday fire at the home of Richard English, 3861 Cedron St., was reported at about 2:25 p.m.

Fire department spokesman Chuck Murphy said the only occupant home in the College Park residence was a non-speaking housekeeper who ran to a neighbor to call firemen.

In all, 23 firefighters fought the blaze in the two-story home. They doused the flames in 23 minutes.

No Autos Sold

Beacom's Prejudice Charged

Orange County Superior Court Judge Richard Beacom was disqualified Friday from presiding over Glen Howard Hutcherson's third rape trial.

Judge Byron McMillan issued the disqualification order after he had been appointed to rule on a motion of prejudice filed against Beacom by Hutcherson's attorney, Terry Giles.

Hutcherson, a 46-year-old Whittier aerospace worker, will return to court Monday when his trial is to be assigned to a new judge.

Beacom had presided over Hutcherson's now widely heralded second trial on charges that he raped 21-year-old Catherine Hardin two years ago after he picked her up as she hitchhiked in Buena Park.

The retrial ended with jurors deadlocked 11-1 in favor of acquittal. And Giles later accused Beacom of having a "fixed anticipatory judgment as to the defendant's guilt" because of statements the judge made when he ordered Hutcherson to stand trial a third time.

Beacom, however, has insisted that he is not prejudiced against Hutcherson. Instead, the judge said in a court affidavit, his statements were based on what he called Giles' "prejudicial misconduct" during the course of the trial.

The rape trial of the aerospace worker drew national attention in March when another judge, Mason Fenton, overturned a jury's guilty verdict and ordered a second trial.

At the time, Fenton said he didn't believe the story told from the witness stand by the alleged rape victim, Ms. Hardin.

His decision immediately was attacked by women's groups who labeled the judge "sexist-traditional" and threatened a move to recall him from the bench.

After the jury in Hutcherson's rape retrial returned with an 11-1 vote favoring acquittal, the prosecutor, Dan Brice, asked Beacom to dismiss the charges.

Beacom refused and criticized Giles for his presentation of the defense in the case, accusing him of violating rules of evidence by bringing in allegations about Ms. Hardin's past sexual activity.

"I didn't rule against Mr. Hutcherson," Beacom said in his response to Giles' judicial challenge, "nor am I prejudiced

Ex-Valley Man Held In Theft

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A former Fountain Valley businessman who reportedly masterminded a plot to steal nearly \$1 million from bookkeeper Arne Ristol's bank account was in custody Friday.

Ralph Ersten, 51, was being transported here for arraignment, following his arrest Tuesday at a Sacramento real estate office, said Los Angeles police Lt. Lewis Riker.

Ersten, being held on \$750,000 bond, is scheduled to be arraigned Monday in Superior Court on charges of grand theft, receiving stolen property and conspiracy to commit grand theft and receive stolen property, authorities said.

Ersten had been a fugitive since February, when he was indicted by the Los Angeles County grand jury in connection with the theft. He was arrested in Sacramento when police spotted his customized 1977 Cadillac.

Ersten, whose arrest record dates back to 1945, had served five years in federal prison after pleading guilty in an \$11 million Orange County bank fraud.

Ersten, Ristol and certified public accountant Leonard Harris have been accused of stealing most of the \$927,288 that was inadvertently transferred to Ristol's United California Bank account in May 1978. Authorities have recovered only \$93,000.

Ristol, 53, of West Covina, is on trial in Superior Court on a grand theft charge. Harris, 59, of Century City, is awaiting a preliminary hearing on the same charges brought against Ersten.

Ristol has testified that he gave Ersten a deposit slip for the bookkeeper's checking account. The reason, according to Ristol, was that Ersten was expecting a large finder's fee for helping South African investors bid on a Palm Springs hotel.

Prosecutors, however, contend the defendants stole the money mistakenly transferred into Ristol's account, then laundered through Montreal, Canada, and Geneva, Switzerland, before being returned to accounts in the United States.

Snake Act

Coast Actor After Own Show

One of San Clemente's newest residents already wants to hit the road and take on a new role as a touring medicine show leader named "Snake Oil" Johnny McMahon.

Joe Conley, known as storekeeper Ike Godsey on "The Waltons" television show, moved to San Clemente recently with a proposal drawn up to start his own television program based on his grandfather's colorful life.

"Johnny McMahon, my mother's father, was a hooper and singer who traveled through Texas in a medicine show," Conley said.

Conley's grandfather claims to have been cured of disease after being treated with snake oil supplied by some Indians some time between 1885 and 1890.

"He believed in it and toured the area telling people about the curing properties of snake oil," Conley explained.

The oil is taken from the area between the skin and fatty tissue found in the rattle snake. "The Indians figured anything as hearty as a rattler must have a gift from God," Conley added.

While Conley, 51, does not believe in the oil theory himself, he is sure he can make a pretty interesting television series by playing his grandfather and writing the weekly show's script.

Conley is optimistic about his proposal being accepted but admits the top brass at CBS has not rushed it to production.

A regular on the Waltons since 1972, Conley has entered production for the eighth time with the popular series. He said he hopes to retain the role as storekeeper Ike Godsey until his talents in scriptwriting and acting can be expanded.

While acting on the Waltons nine months of the year, Conley,

his wife Louise and daughters Erin, 7, and Jana, 4, will spend some time at their Chatsworth house.

But much of their time will be spent in San Clemente where they bought a home to be near the ocean, Conley said.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Conley said he and his family chose San Clemente after considering Newport Beach as their new home.

Conley broke into entertainment as a radio kid show singer and actor and studied theater at Los Angeles' Loyola University until he joined the Army where his military duties were combined with entertaining officers.

After serving his hitch, he enrolled at Arizona State University only to be recalled to active duty as a second lieutenant. While serving in Korea, Conley was wounded in battle and awarded a Purple Heart and Silver Star.

Conley's first television experience was on a series called "Big Town." He later appeared on "Playhouse 90," "Studio One," "The People's Choice," "Acapulco," and "Bracken's World."

A veteran of 25 motion pictures and more than 200 commercials, Conley has recently started to use his musical talents again in the nostalgic patter, song and dance "Conley and Scott Revue."

Eric Scott, who portrays Ben Walton in the Waltons TV show, joins Conley in the revue.

A former real estate agent while not acting, Conley enjoys golf, tennis and traveling with his family when he can find the time.

Conley has agreed to serve as grand marshal for the July 21 parade on the second day of San Clemente's annual La Christianita Fiesta.

Robin realized she was late for a dance lesson and asked to borrow her friend's 10-speed bicycle, police said.

Police flyers with a photo of the young girl and an artist's drawing of the photographer were circulated throughout Southern California.

Huntington Beach investigators were contacted Tuesday by Los Angeles County Sheriff's offices after the grisly find near a campground road in the Sierra Madre foothills east of Pasadena.

The team of Huntington Beach field investigators remained at the discovery scene late Friday, about one mile from a residential tract.

And the investigation also continues in Huntington Beach where officers still are checking more than 200 telephoned responses in their search for the photographer who talked to the two girls the day Robin disappeared.

Also being sought is the yellow bicycle which Robin presumably borrowed that same day.

Meanwhile, funeral services for the young girl are pending final arrangements, Sgt. Jenkins said.

Funeral services for 12-year-old Robin Christine Samsoe, whose body was found Monday near Sierra Madre, are scheduled for 2 p.m. Monday at Pierce Brothers and Smith Mortuary, Huntington Beach.

The Huntington Beach Dwyer Intermediate School seventh grader was believed kidnapped June 20. Her death is being investigated by Huntington Beach police.

The young dancer and gymnast is survived by her mother, Marianne Frazier, of Huntington Beach and her father, Robert Samsoe Jr. of Lake Havasu, Ariz. and brothers Tim and Robert and a sister, Taranne, all of Huntington Beach.

Survivors also include her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Breckler of Kenosha, Wis.; paternal grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Robert Samsoe of Dunwood, Ga.; her maternal great-grandfather, Johan Schmidtke. Interment at Good Shepherd Cemetery, Huntington Beach, is to follow services at the mortuary chapel, 627 Main St.

against him because of antipathy for Mr. Giles.

"I hold no antipathy toward Mr. Hutcherson, nor the merits of his case, but only toward what I perceive to be Mr. Giles' professional misconduct," the judge wrote.

Giles, however, said of Beacom, "His dislike and distrust of counsel has rendered him incapable of doing justice towards the defendant."

McMillan's order disqualifying Beacom was based on the written affidavits submitted by Giles and Beacom.

OC Water Official O'Connor Succumbs

James E. O'Connor, who was president of the Coastal Municipal Water District board and a member of the board of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, is dead at the age of 69.

Mr. O'Connor succumbed July 1 after a lengthy illness.

The long-time South Laguna civic activist founded several companies during his lifetime, but found time to participate in water agency activities and other organizations while in Southern California.

Mr. O'Connor was born in Santa Cruz and educated at St. Mary's College in Moraga where he received his bachelor's degree. He took graduate classes at Columbia University in New York, receiving his masters degree in international government.

He joined the Navy in 1938, choosing to go into the Naval Reserve three years later with the rank of lieutenant.

In 1953, he founded Fleet Disposal, Inc. in Los Angeles, leaving that firm in 1964 to found Document Disintegration, Inc. He invented the process and the equipment for that company and retired as president of the firm in 1975 to become president of Biological Water Purification of California in Newport Beach.

He served two terms as president of the Coastal Municipal

Water District since 1969, and was a member of the Metropolitan Water District board for nearly three years.

In addition, he was executive chairman of the South Coast Scenic Improvement project; a consultant on the Economic Environmental Development Corp.; director and president of the Three Arch Bay Community Service District and former president of the Three Arch Bay Association.

He was appointed by Governor Brown to serve on the California Solid Waste Management and Resources Recovery Advisory Council and was also chairman of the Orange County Citizens Directional Finding Commission on an appointment by former county supervisor Alton Allen.

The 15-year South Laguna resident is survived by his wife, Emily; a son, James C. O'Connor of Knoxville, Tenn.; daughters, Mrs. Linda Govan of Berkeley and Mrs. Sharon Hunt of San Jose.

Also surviving are his sisters, Beth O'Connor of Sacramento and Helen O'Connor of Phoenix, Ariz.

No memorial services are planned. The family has suggested that donations be made to the South Coast Medical Center Foundation at 31872 South Coast Highway, South Laguna.

Nicaragua's Somoza Ready To Step Down?

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Government troops massed for an attack on the rebel-held town of Masaya in what could be the decisive battle of the guerrillas' decade-old struggle to topple President Anastasio Somoza.

Somoza was reported on the verge of resigning. "I am like a tired donkey fighting with a tiger," he was quoted as saying in an interview in today's editions of The Washington Post.

The Nicaraguan strongman, whose family has ruled this Central American nation for 42 years, still hedged his resignation on U.S. guarantees that his army, the national guard, would not be disbanded and that there would be an orderly transition of power. But he was quoted as saying he was "in no position now to impose anything. I am not negotiating."

In Managua, the Nicaraguan capital, there were continuing rumors concerning Somoza's possible resignation.

SACRAMENTO (AP) — California's unemployment rate dropped to 6 percent in June, down from 6.2 percent in May and the lowest since April 1970, the government reported Friday.

Refinery Gasoline Tapped

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An illegal tap in an abandoned fruit stand siphoned off thousands of gallons of gasoline from an oil refinery pipeline before it was discovered, authorities said Friday.

"What we have is an unauthorized tap into a pipeline that resulted in the thieves being able to get I don't know how many gallons of gas," said sheriff's Sgt. David Watner.

"They tunneled down through the floor of the fruit stand and then laterally into a pressurized line about 20 feet away," he said.

"Then they just siphoned off gas from the pipeline at will, really."

He said oil company officials excavated and began dismantling the illegal tap Thursday at the fruit stand on an otherwise vacant lot north of Carson and several miles from the Chevron USA refinery in El Segundo.

Oil company officials said only that at least thousands of gallons were stolen, but news reports estimated the loss at more than 50,000 gallons.

The line carried regular premium and unleaded grades at different times, said Chevron spokesman James Daily.

At the moment we don't have any suspects in the case, Watner said. "It's ambitious, it's unusual and the people involved had to have a working knowledge of what was going on. But we have no reason to suspect an inside job."

"Anyone having experience working with high-pressure pipelines could have done it."

Watner said the sophisticated theft came to light in March, after the oil company noticed pressure changes in the gas line running from the refinery to a storage area some 20 miles away.

Daily said the tap was then put under surveillance, but that the thieves apparently caught on and were never seen at the site.

Watner said the thefts may have been going on for several months.

"Because of the fact that the location is enclosed and surrounded by a high fence they could have operated either day or night," he said.

Anaheim Man Dies in Crash

A 38-year-old Anaheim motorcyclist died Friday afternoon of injuries suffered at 9:42 a.m. when his cycle was struck by a van at the corner of Magnolia and Orange avenues in Anaheim.

The helmetless rider, who remains unidentified until police notify next of kin, was turning left when struck by the van driven by Juan Vargas, 23, of Garden Grove.

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — An Israeli army force crossed into Lebanon, killing two Palestinian guerrillas and taking two prisoners while dynamiting a number of houses in one village, the military command announced Friday.

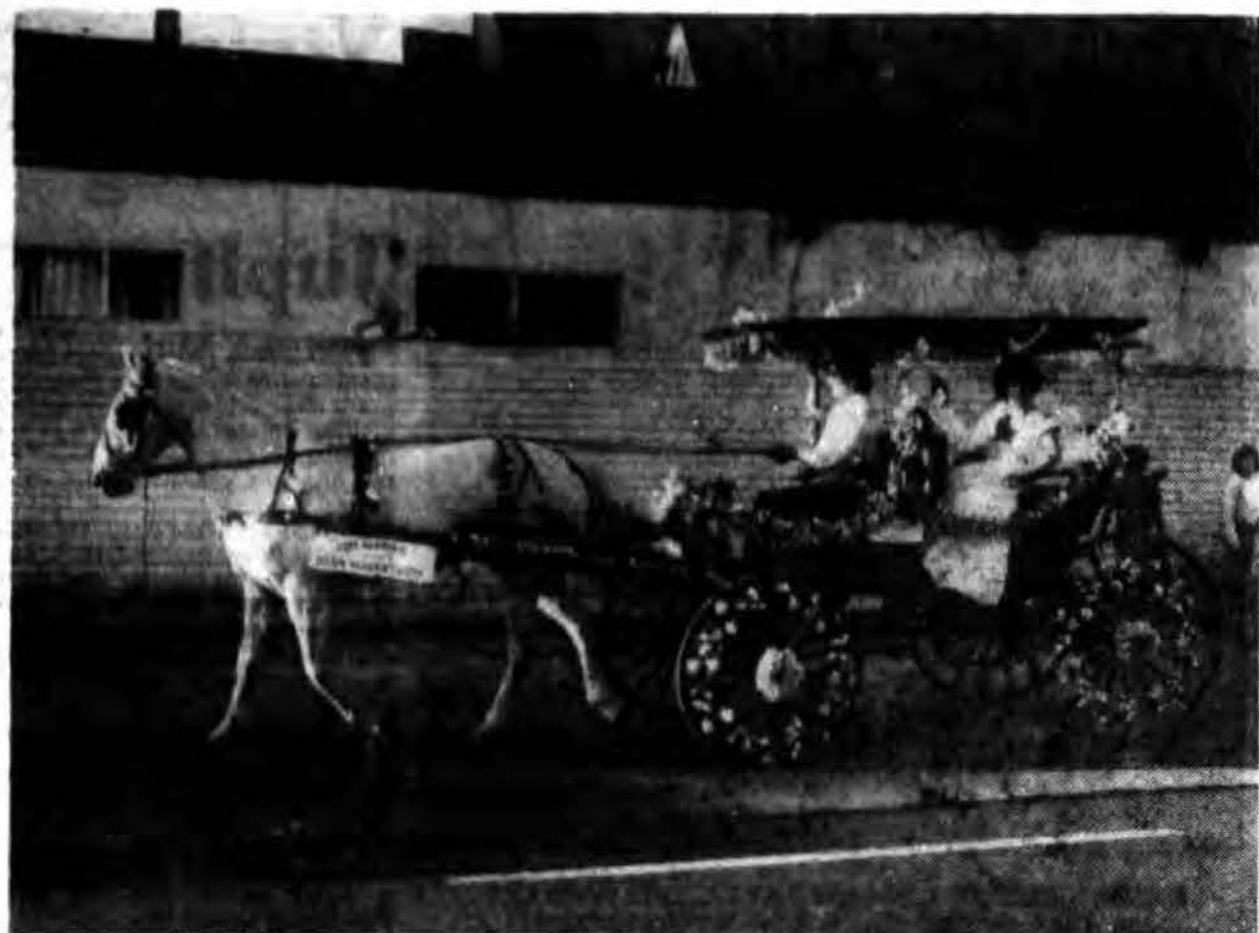

Janitor Held

Ocean View Nixes Suit in Stabbing

Ocean View School District trustees have denied a \$250,000 claim filed by a Westminster man who alleges he was stabbed by a district janitor.

Timothy R. Donoghue, 18, reportedly was stabbed with a knife in the back at Star View School in Midway City on May 2, according to police reports.

Police arrested Lee Robert Runkle, 19, of Westminster on charges of attempted murder. Runkle at the time was a janitor at the elementary school.

Donoghue, his attorney Myron Cohn claims, suffered permanent disfigurement and lost his job as a welder as a result of the incident.

Trustees unanimously rejected the claim at a board meeting this week. Cohn says he will file a lawsuit against the district and the janitor in Orange County Superior Court next week.

According to police, Donoghue went to the campus to inquire about harassment his 14-year-old brother claimed to be experiencing.

Police say he was stabbed in the back after exchanging words with Runkle. Four unidentified persons allegedly witnessed the incident, police report.

Donoghue, who suffered a four-inch gash in the lower back, was taken to Westminster Community Hospital, where he was hospitalized.

Cohn, in the claim, alleges the janitor was wearing a five-inch knife on his belt and stabbed Donoghue without provocation.

Runkle, following the incident, did not report back to work, according to Ocean View Assistant Superintendent James Carvell.

Carvell says that Runkle was hired in February and had recently been promoted to head janitor at Star View.

Appearance Of Justice Contested

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — State Supreme Court Justice Stanley Mosk, in a surprise move Friday, asked the Los Angeles County Superior Court to bar the commission investigating alleged high court misconduct from ordering him to appear.

The petition contends the subpoena issued to Mosk requiring him to testify violates the state constitution. The court will consider the request Wednesday.

On the witness stand earlier Friday, Justice William Clark threatened to go to court and challenge the constitutionality of the open hearings if a declaration he made prior to the hearings is made public.

"I stated serious doubts on the constitutionality of an open session," Clark told the Commission on Judicial Performance during his third day of testimony. "I had said I would be willing to cooperate, but that any time my deposition became public, I would seek a judicial determination of constitutionality."

Clark made the deposition before the hearings began. The commission is investigating alleged misconduct by the high court.

Carter Meets 8 Governors At Summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, searching for fresh domestic policies, closeted himself with eight of the nation's governors as aides worked on options for a new energy program.

The governors' overnight visit to Camp David, Md., the presidential retreat where Carter has secluded himself since Tuesday, was the latest development in a series of meetings aides say will run "well into next week."

The "domestic summit" follows by several days a bleak, bluntly worded internal memorandum that warned Carter his administration was facing "the worst of times."

Searching for solutions to his problems, Carter canceled a weekend appearance before a meeting of the National Governors Association and, instead, summoned the bipartisan delegation for a meeting late Friday.

County Smog Report Issued

EL MONTE (AP) — The Air Quality Management District predicts good to unhealthy air quality in the South Coast Air Basin today.

Good air quality is predicted with a pollution standard index (PSI) of 42 in the coastal areas, Big Bear Lake and the high desert, and in inland Orange County, the PSI will be 92.

Unhealthy air for sensitive persons is forecast for the Los Angeles metropolitan area, Hemet — Elsinore, and the low desert, PSI 138.

Political Fracas

2 Ex-Clemente Leaders Sued

Two former San Clemente City Council members, who were embroiled in a courtroom squabble before their recall earlier this year, were sued Friday by the city's one-time insurance carrier.

Jefferson Insurance Company of New York filed the Orange County Superior Court suit against former council members Howard F. Mushett and Donna Wilkinson.

Company officials alleged both Mushett and Mrs. Wilkinson have submitted unjustified claims to the insurance firm for legal expenses incurred over a lawsuit Mrs. Wilkinson and former Mayor William Walker filed against Mushett in April 1978.

That suit sought \$1 million in punitive damages from Mushett and five others for alleged slander, "outrageous conduct" and emotional distress.

Four of Mushett's co-defendants in that complaint filed a countersuit against Mrs. Wilkinson for alleged slander

and sought \$2 million in punitive damages, according to insurance officials.

The countersuit, however, later was dismissed.

Insurance officials claimed that they provided an attorney to Mushett in the legal squabble but don't believe he is entitled to the attorney's service because the allegations against him don't pertain to city duties.

In addition, the insurance firm's suit said, Mrs. Wilkinson never asked the company to provide counsel in the countersuit.

Yet, the complaint alleged, she later submitted a bill for \$18,658 in legal fees.

The insurance firm is asking the court to determine what the legal obligations of the company are and how much, if anything, Mrs. Wilkinson should be reimbursed.

Jefferson was the city's insurance carrier at the time the suit and countersuit were filed but have not been the city's carrier since last August, the suit said.

Recruits Punched By 3 DIs?

OCEANSIDE (AP) — Three Marine Corps drill instructors have been charged with brutality against more than 100 recruits who were allegedly slapped, kicked and punched in a 1:30 a.m. assault last month, officials at Camp Pendleton said Friday.

A fourth drill instructor faces a special court-martial for allegedly assaulting 14 privates in a separate incident.

In an announcement Friday, Master Sgt. Paul Thompson said a formal investigation similar to a civilian grand jury hearing will be conducted.

Charged with abusing 116 privates in two platoons are Gunnery Sgt. Charles L. Bryant, 28, of Nashville, Tenn.; Staff Sgt. Ricky L. Cross, 29, of Ardmore, Okla.; and Sgt. Joseph Lopez, Jr., 23, of Fresno.

Sgt. Richard Speck, 22, of Commerce, Colo., is the subject of investigation for dereliction of duty for allegedly knowing of but failing to report the June 26 incident at Pendleton's Edson Range, said Thompson.

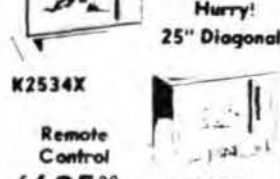

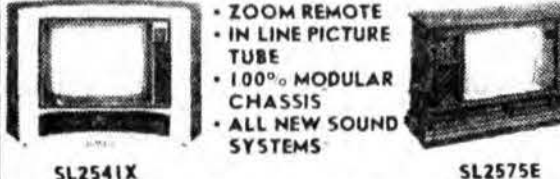

Laguna Jewelry Has Miniature Lights

To Laguna Beach jewelry maker Jan Wood, diodes are a girl's best friend.

That's because the 26-year-old artist creates jewelry pieces complete with rotating miniature lights.

IT'S JEWELRY WITH an on and off switch.

Her art form will be at the Laguna Beach Festival of Arts the next six weeks, where she'll display baubles that are best displayed after dark.

Take her copyrighted juke box design, for instance.

The two-ounce necklace piece, made of sterling silver, contains a mosaic center, comprised of tiger's eye stone, carnelian, aventurine and soda lite.

BUT THE EYE-CATCHING feature is rows of light-emitting diodes running up and down the sides of the trinket. Stand in the dark and you have an instant light show.

The electrical work is done by her friend, Jim Cochran, who used to work for electronics companies in Orange County before turning to the world of art.

The 30-year-old electronics technician installs the miniaturized controls inside the

jewelry, connecting wiring to the tiny diodes that light up on the front of the piece.

THE FINISHED WORK can be turned on at the flip of a switch—and there's even a device that allows the wearer to speed or slow the pulsating lights.

If you want to plunk down \$700 to \$2,000 for the baubles, you'll get a free miniature screwdriver—one with every purchase—so you can get into the jewelry to change the batteries.

Campagna said Sunshine Studio's new owner, Patricia McNulty, appeared in court as an official of the firm for the first time Friday.

Voyager Visiting Jupiter

PASADENA (AP) — Just four months after its sister spacecraft made dramatic discoveries while visiting Jupiter, Voyager 2 is at the giant planet and has found a few changes, scientists said Friday.

For the next five days, the unmanned Voyager 2 will take photographs of Jupiter and five of its 13 moons. The closest look at the mysterious, colorful planet will come Monday, when the spacecraft gets to within 400,000 miles.

EARLY PHOTOGRAPHS show some unexplained changes in Jupiter's most dramatic feature, a red spot three times the size of the Earth, Voyager scientist Bradford Smith said at a news conference at Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

A volcano on Io, one of the four large moons, also looks a bit different, JPL scientists said.

Jupiter seems to be mostly a gigantic ball of hydrogen and helium 1,200 times the size of Earth. Deep within the spinning liquid and gas may be a small rocky core.

VOYAGER 1 MADE several discoveries in March, including volcanoes on Io, lightning and northern lights on Jupiter and a thin ring around the planet. JPL scientists want to take a better look at some of those and hope for more surprises from Voyager 2.

After discovering the volcanoes, scientists changed the Voyager 2 program to include 10 hours of filming Io in the hopes of witnessing an eruption, said Edward Stone, project scientist.

Scientists are as much interested in the moons of Jupiter as in the planet itself because, as Stone says, "They are like a miniature solar system."

BESIDES IO, VOYAGER 1 got a good look at Ganymede and Callisto, two of the three other major moons, but the fourth major moon, Europa, is pretty much unknown and the closest photographs will come Monday.

"Europa is the object we know least about and that's where the most surprises may come from," Stone said. "That's the missing link in our knowledge of Jupiter's moons."

Voyager 2 will also take photographs of a different side of Ganymede and Callisto than was seen by Voyager 1.

Gasoline Storage Tank 'In' Thing

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Critics call it immoral and obscene, but having a private gasoline storage tank has become the "in" thing in the San Francisco Bay area, and firms that do the installing say business is up 10 times over last year.

"It's becoming the big status symbol all over the county to have your own gasoline supply," said Eric Hasseltine, a supervisor in Contra Costa County, east of San Francisco.

FOR INSTANCE, THERE is the blue collar worker who lives east of here with \$30,000 worth of hot rods. He had a 550-gallon tank buried in his yard at a cost of more than \$1,600.

"I put this underground gasoline tank in my yard because my life is in these cars," he said. "If I ever couldn't get gasoline at the stations — and maybe that day's coming — then my cars would be useless, and by God so would I."

Like others willing to talk about installations, he was unwilling to have his name used because of the fear of thieves.

"THEY'RE ALL JUST like me," he said. "They'd do anything to stay out of those gas lines."

Bill Russell, general manager of Perkins Welding Works in Sacramento, said his firm is "knocking out 30 to 40 tanks a day" in an effort to catch up with back orders. The biggest demand is for tanks with a capacity ranging from 500 to 1,000 gallons.

Russell said demand for tanks jumped briefly during the 1973 gas crunch, but he expects demand to stay high this time.

"I WOULD EXPECT demand to stay this way for as much as 18 months," he said. "The people are aware this is a serious situation, and they're going ahead and trying to protect themselves."

Court to See Topless Act?

COVINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Topless dancing in this northern Kentucky city is shaping up for a court test that could include an actual demonstration.

A Kenton circuit judge ruled that a Covington ordinance that apparently prohibits topless dancing is not in conflict with state law. Attorneys for two women arrested at local discotheques and charged with "improper apparel" want to fight the judge's ruling.

They're asking that at least one of the defendants demonstrate in Judge William Schmaedecke's courtroom.

Cardinal Blasts Gay Acts

BOSTON (AP) — Cardinal Humberto Medeiros has reiterated the Catholic Church's traditional condemnation of homosexual acts in a 16-page letter to the priests of the Boston Archdiocese.

The cardinal said he will not name a replacement for a priest who had worked with homosexuals before being reassigned to another parish and said he would discourage Catholics from joining homosexual groups.

WHILE HE URGED priests to "minister with pastoral love" to homosexuals, the cardinal specifically criticized priests and theologians who condone homosexual acts as "personally enriching" in some cases or who approve of homosexual "marriages."

Special ministries to homosexuals deny them "their full place in the church," Medeiros wrote.

The cardinal said he understood the desire of some priests to give the special attention to homosexuals, "but reminded them that church teaching holds . . . that homosexual acts are intrinsically disordered and can in no case be approved."

THE LETTER, DATED May 22, was mailed to priests last week.

In response, Frank H. Ring, president of Dignity-Boston, a group of homosexual Catholics, said, "We are saddened that there exists within the church such prejudice and intolerance for those who find their sexual attraction toward members of the same sex."

Stonehill College Professor Rev. Thomas Oddo, chaplain to the national Dignity group, said, "I am disappointed the cardinal does not fully understand and appreciate the work of Dignity and the need for specialized ministries to the gay community."

STOCKTON (AP) — The body of a Walnut Creek man has been recovered from the Stockton Channel where his speedboat sank after apparently colliding with another boat, authorities reported Friday.

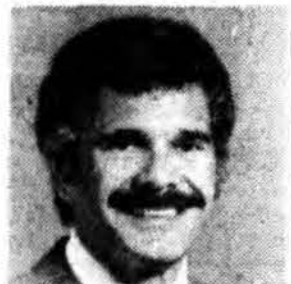

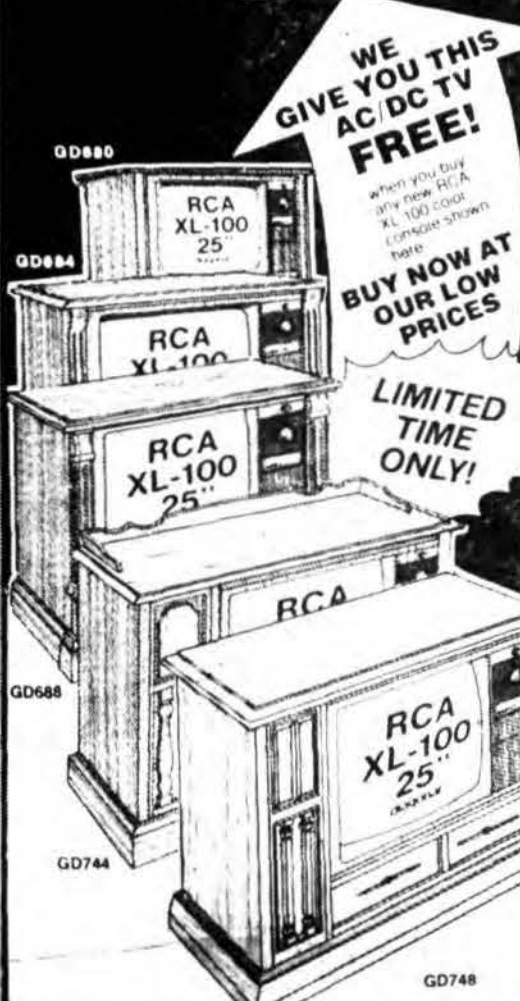

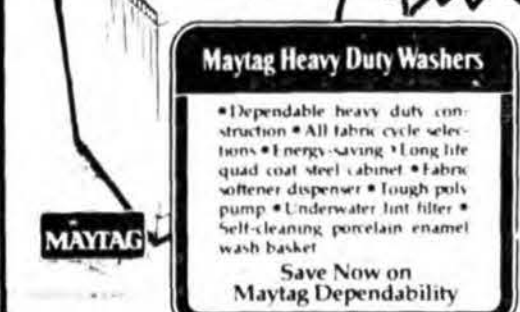

Coast Ready To Survive Big Quake?

When can we expect the next great California earthquake?

Small earthquakes occur every day. As well, every two or three years there is a magnitude 5 or 6 earthquake and some of these can be locally damaging. The last earthquake of this intermediate size in the Bay Area was the magnitude 5.3 Daly City earthquake in March, 1957 which was widely felt and did some destruction.

WE MUST now say that time is running out so far as the next big earthquake of magnitude 7 or greater is concerned. In the 17 years that I have been at the University of California, Berkeley, there has been no great earthquake in the state and each year it has seemed appropriate to think of an occurrence in the next 10 or 20 years. For a number of reasons we can no longer keep pushing this time window forward. The evidence now is much stronger than 30 years ago or even 17 years ago that a large earthquake is imminent.

The first line of evidence comes from the historical record which goes back to about 1800 in California. In the last century there was a large earthquake in 1936, centered on the Hayward fault, which runs along the foothills on the east side of San Francisco Bay. Two years later an earthquake in 1938 was felt strongly in San Francisco. It opened a great crack many kilometers in length along the San Andreas fault.

AND THEN there was the great earthquake of 1906, with the San Andreas fault breaking from San Juan Bautista to Humboldt County, a distance of 450 kilometers. No major rupture of active faults has occurred in northern California since that time.

The 1971 San Fernando earthquake had a magnitude of 6½ or less and affected severely a relatively small part of the San Fernando Valley and Los Angeles. The fault rupture was about 15 kilometers long. This earthquake killed 65 people and there was a half-billion dollar loss.

We also have geodetic surveys that measure horizontal and vertical displacements between distant points. They have gone on in the San Francisco Bay area for about a century and a half. They show that the Farallon Islands are moving north relative to Mt. Diablo at the rate of about 2 inches a year and there can be no doubt that strain is building up in the crustal rocks.

THE LEVEL of strain that was reached prior to the San Andreas fault rupture in 1906 is known from geodetic measurements of the last century and a comparison suggests that a sudden slip will again have to occur along one of the main faults in the area to relieve the present strain before too long.

Trenches recently excavated across the San Andreas fault in Southern California have revealed evidence of past great earthquakes and extended the historical record back significantly. The liquefaction effects of paleoearthquakes have been preserved in beds of sand and peat.

Two conclusions follow from

this work. First, large earthquakes on the southern half of the San Andreas may break different segments of the fault at different times. Secondly, although the recurrence interval between these past earthquakes turns out to be approximately 165 years on the average, there is variability, with the greatest separation 300 years and the least about 55 years.

IT TOOK about 100 years for the rocks to strain enough to produce the 1906 earthquake fault displacement. Thus, given the 122 years in Southern California and the 73 years in Northern California that have elapsed since the last great earthquakes, we should, as a working hypothesis, expect a great earthquake somewhere in California within the next 10 years.

Despite advances in earthquake studies, however, substantial losses have occurred in relatively small earthquakes over the last few years. For example, the Santa Barbara earthquake of August 13, 1978 was a relatively small earthquake (5.6). The strong ground motion in this earthquake lasted 2-3 seconds and shook only a restricted area, yet it caused up to \$9 million damage to property. For comparison, the strong ground motion in the great 1906 earthquake lasted 40 seconds. The amount of energy released in 1906 was spread over most of central and northern California and was, overall, at least one thousand times greater than in Santa Barbara.

IF A 5.6 earthquake is able to produce significant destruction in a limited area, what is to be done to prepare for a great earthquake?

First, detailed reexamination of earthquake risk in California is needed. We need a broader framework than the one used in the past — a framework that will consider earthquakes in relation to the whole economic system. Expenditure of public funds must be fully justified and clearly efficient in order to achieve progress.

In a recent survey by Seismic Safety Commission staff of attitudes of state officials, a question posed to state legislators asked them what it would take to cause earthquake preparedness to become a legislative issue. Two-thirds responded "a major disaster" or "a major earthquake" (with a 17-percent no response rate). The response suggests that preparedness for earthquakes is not a major political issue.

QUITE APART from government plans, community groups are coming together to examine such questions as: What can we do in this particular neighborhood if a big earthquake occurs? What can we do before the next earthquake to see what hazards can be reduced? Will adequate fire fighting facilities be available in the area?

California is fortunate to have extensive eye witness accounts of some of the big earthquakes. Such direct, unedited information gives people a chance to reassess what they were going to do when the great earthquake occurred.

A very important component in trying to reach an adequate earthquake defense in a relatively short time is to have more earthquake education.

It seems a shame to me that most California public schools no longer conduct disaster education programs for stu-

dents. I cannot understand why such limited teaching cannot be incorporated in the regular school programs.

At every level, we have to think about what will happen in another great earthquake. More encouragement must be given to local community and work-place

groups so that they can take action themselves to assist in fire fighting, first aid, and home safety procedures.

Let us in the next five years move the earthquake risk equation toward acceptable and minimal risk, for time is no longer on our side.

Smog-cancer Tie Ignored

In the five years since a landmark study found apparent links between certain kinds of smog and some types of cancer, virtually nothing has been done about it.

That's the upshot of an 18-month study commissioned by the state Air Resources Board, which sought recommendations for minimizing danger to urban residents who most often breathe air containing cancer-causing chemicals.

MOST OF the steps called for by the five scientists on the special ARB panel should have been obvious in 1974, when public health specialists from the University of Southern California first publicized the cancer-smog connection.

Even now, no real action is under serious consideration, as the ARB is understandably preoccupied with federally-mandated air quality management plans and attempts to deal with the gasoline shortage.

But the recommended actions seem straightforward and simple enough to be done without detracting at all from other smog-fighting actions.

THE FIRST move called for amounts to no more than a continuing analysis of urban air to learn how much carcinogenic smog is present at various times of the year and under various wind and weather conditions. The same kind of analysis is done regularly as part of ongoing efforts to control normal, photochemical smog.

Normal smog monitoring does

not measure how much asbestos, vinyl chloride, benzene, soot and tars are present in the air. Yet, these elements are used or produced in widely-scattered parts of California and they are known to cause cancer.

What isn't known is how they

combine with oxygen, nitrogen and other parts of the atmosphere. The ARB panel wants those combinations examined.

ANOTHER unknown is the impact of the ever-increasing introduction of new chemicals and pesticides.

The atmospheric (creation) of carcinogens from otherwise harmless substances is a real possibility, the panel's report said. In short, turning apparently harmless chemicals loose in the air and allowing them to combine at random may create new problems, just as much of California's known smog problem comes from combining ox-

xygen with petroleum vapors that wouldn't be very harmful in their original form.

One reason nothing has been done since the first indications of a smog-cancer link appeared five years ago is that evidence of the connection isn't yet scientifically "clean."

"EXISTING" data establishes that urban dwellers have a higher risk of respiratory cancers than comparable nonurban dwellers," says the ARB panel's report. "It is reasonable to assume that the exposure is via inhaled air, but current information does not establish whether this is a problem of occupational exposure or a problem of general air pollution."

In other words, since jobs in urban areas involve more contact with known cancer-causing agents, scientists haven't pinned an exact amount of blame for their higher cancer rates on the air they breathe off the job.

So the ARB panel's report calls for reliable studies to learn the exact relation of cancer to airborne chemicals. Until that is done, no one could responsibly decide how much chemical smog must be abated or which chemicals to attack.

THIS KIND of analysis could be done at little cost in connection with ongoing smog monitoring projects.

But the evidence of a cancer-smog link — strong enough to withstand all challenges for five years — demands some action, even if it's only a first-step analysis of how serious the problem is.

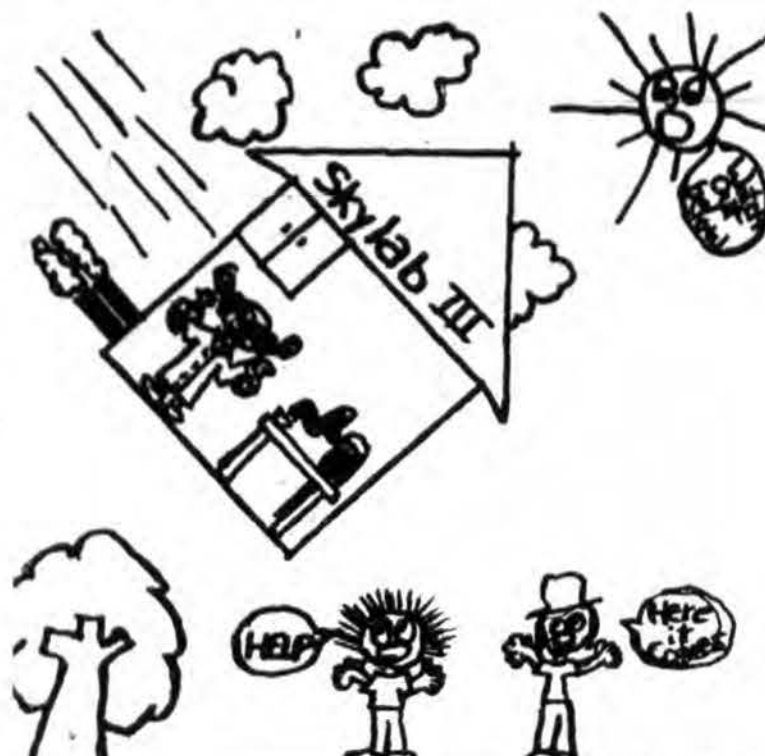

Mushroom Species Hit 38,000

Andy sends a World Book Year Book to Kim Chambers, age 9, of Edmondson, Mo., for her question:

HOW DID THE MUSHROOM RECEIVE ITS NAME?

Since ancient times the mushroom has been a favorite food item with many people. The early Greeks and Romans used them extensively. Today they are the main food item for the natives on Tierra del Fuego at the tip of South America and also for the natives in some parts of Australia. In most countries, however, the mushroom is a table delicacy rather than a main food.

Mushrooms are the best-known of the plants called fungi. There are about 38,000 different species of mushrooms growing in many parts of the world.

The name mushroom, and also the old-fashioned term mushromp, came from the French word for moss. The name was given, no doubt, because the mushroom can most



often be found growing in decaying vegetable matter or under leaves and moss.

THOUSANDS OF varieties of mushrooms that are good to eat can be found growing wild. Around most large cities, however, mushrooms are grown commercially in places where moisture and temperatures can be controlled. Specially designed mushroom houses and standard growing procedures have been worked out.

The common table mushroom is grown in a specially prepared mixture of well-fermented stable manure called compost. When the temperature is exactly right, pieces of mushroom

spawn are placed just below the surface of the compost and about a foot apart.

Mushroom spawn, also called mycelium, is the part of the mushroom plant that grows below the ground. It looks like a mass of felt that is actually a web of fine threads.

The mushroom spawn quickly grows out like threads through the entire bed of compost. Growers then add about an inch of rich soil, covering all of the compost. And in seven or eight weeks mushrooms start to show on the surface of the soil.

Mushrooms first come up in what is called a pinhead stage. The pinhead is actually a little knot or head of new growth, shaped more or less like a ball. The pinhead becomes a button in a few days.

As the tiny button grows larger, the upper part, which is called the cap, develops more rapidly. The gills grow underneath this cap but are hidden by a curtain or veil.

AS THE cap grows wider and the stem grows longer, the veil covering the gills breaks away. As the plant grows larger, it looks more like an open umbrella.

Different types of mushrooms have different kinds of veils and gill colors.

Agaric mushrooms grow in pastures, lawns and open fields. The common table mushroom belongs to this agaric group. It is the only mushroom cultivated on a large scale and sold on the market.

The famous French mushroom is called the champignon, coming from the word champ meaning field. This mushroom never grows very large.

WHAT DOES A JUSTICE OF THE PEACE DO?

The powers of a justice of the peace vary in different states. Sometimes he is appointed by a governor and sometimes he is elected by the people. He is an officer of a town, county or other small unit of government and has certain judicial powers.

A JUSTICE of the peace usually does not have the power to punish persons for breaking criminal laws involving serious crime. But he often rules on traffic laws and sometimes has the power to decide whether an accused person should be held for a grand jury.

A justice of the peace sometimes is also empowered to perform marriage services.

In large cities, police magistrates are often empowered to perform the same functions as justices of the peace.

Scarab Beetle From India

Dear Ellie,
What is so unusual about the scarab beetle, and why was it considered so important in ancient Egypt?

B.R.

Dear B.R.,

There are thousands of species of beetle that are classified under the group called scarab. Most of them eat decaying organic matter. The majority have a definite rounded shape.

Some of the species have a most unusual way of preparing a place to rear the young: a pair gather some animal dung and form it into a ball; then they will roll it to a place where they apparently decide to bury it. The female gets into the hole and reshapes the ball, making it into a pear shape. The narrow end is hollowed out, and here she lays a single egg. It hatches into a large, fat larvae that feeds on the inside of its pear-shaped cradle. In one season, a maximum of four eggs per female are laid.

The sacred scarab beetle came from ancient Egypt. It had spiny projections on the legs and head which somehow came to represent the sun's rays to the ancient people. The ball used to house the egg came to be thought of as the earth. Other mystical beliefs associated with the beetle linked it also to the moon. Since the early Egyptians found it so symbolic, its likeness was put on many carvings and was represented not only on tombs but also on jewelry.

Dear Ellie,

What is the fish like that is called a seat?

Dear Jamie,

Seats come mostly from the Indo-Pacific area and in Australia they are known as the butter fish. The body is distinctly spotted with dots that look like hundreds of eyes.

They are small fish with quite deep bodies that look extra large in proportion to the small head. Probably as some form of protection against predatory fish, they have developed rather strong spines on the fins. The adults eat refuse and decaying plant and animal matter, but the young, up to a certain stage, eat only algae.

These fish live both in salt water and in brackish backwater areas, but they seem readily able to adapt to life in freshwater and are often kept in aquarium specimens.

Wild seats sometimes reach 1 inches in length, but any living in an aquarium remain very small. These fish are quite attractive and are a variety of colors from silvery green to rich brown. All species, however, seem to have the characteristic spots.

Dear Ellie,

I was wondering if brittle stars break easily. Last week we saw some in the tide pools, but we were careful not to touch them.

Dear Nicki,

You were wise not to handle the tidepool specimens because many of these sea creatures are unfortunately damaged by curious people. (And also, some can inflict injury; for example the spines on the black sea urchins cause severe pain should they pierce a probing finger.)

Brittle stars have bony arms that are formed from a series of plates. The arms appear to be quite flexible and can twist and turn in various directions, an action resulting in the name "serpent stars." The arms are nevertheless, very brittle and will break easily if handled. But lost parts are regenerated, and the brittle star becomes whole again.

They are related to the big fleshy starfish, but differ in that the brittle stars have a distinct body disc to which the arms are attached while the common starfish have body and arms that appear to be a part of each other.

Slave Mistress?

Did Jefferson Have Liaison?

WASHINGTON (AP) — A novel is raising anew the 177-year-old questions about whether Thomas Jefferson had a love affair with a mulatto slave that produced seven children.

The book, by Barbara Chase-Riboud, is entitled "Sally Hemings" and purports to tell the story from the slave's point of view.

ALTHOUGH THE AUTHOR SAID IN an interview that she does not claim to have written fact in her novel, she made it clear she believes that accounts of the affair, first published in 1802, have substance.

"I have no doubt the relationship took place," said Ms. Chase-Riboud, a black American who lives in France.

"I don't want to get into any fights with historians, because this is a novel. But I think the book has more implications than simply a story about a president and a forbidden woman. It has to do with the way our history is written, and the way it's taught," she said.

THE AUTHOR SAYS THERE IS a possibility her book will be serialized on television. She claimed to have qualms about that, but said she is going through with it because she wants to reach as many people as possible with her story.

One of those taking exception with her view is Pulitzer Prize-winning historian Dumas Malone, author of an extensive biography of Jefferson, the nation's third president.

"It is without historical foundation. It is a legend," he said. "It's unfortunate when historical characters are treated in an unhistorical way."

ACCORDING TO THE OLD STORIES, the liaison started in Paris in 1787 while Jefferson was ambassador. The slave came from his Virginia home to be a maid to his daughter, starting a relationship with Jefferson that is said to have continued until he died July 4, 1826.

Jefferson never denied the stories publicly, but Malone said that was not unusual.

"Jefferson made a practice of never replying to any personal attacks, but he did deny this story in private," said Malone.

MS. CHASE-RIBOUD SUGGESTED the fact that Sally Hemings was the half-sister of Jefferson's dead wife, and was many years younger than Jefferson, would help explain his attraction to the slave.

She said records at Jefferson's plantation show Jefferson and the slave were either at Monticello together or in Paris together about nine months before each of her children were born. Five of the children were allowed to run away when they reached 21. Two others were freed at Jefferson's death.

Illegal Alien Arrests Soar

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Beefed up by extra agents, the U.S. Border Patrol said it is apprehending illegal Mexican aliens at a record rate in the Chula Vista sector — nearly 1,600 a day this month.

Chief Agent Don Cameron said the apprehensions are running ahead of daily rates during the record month of April 1978, when more than 45,000 persons were detained in the sector.

IRS says there is no commission system, percentage, or quota basis in the tax audit system. Employees are paid on a straight salary basis only, and they have no financial interest in the outcome of any tax audit.

Insurance Didn't Cover Surgery

DEAR PAT: I had surgery on my feet last January and Blue Cross took it upon themselves to pay my doctor what they thought he should be paid. He sent them a full report on each step of the operation and what the charge was for each part, but they thought it was too much and paid only a portion. They did the same thing to the assistant surgeon. I have very complete coverage that costs me \$170.49 every three months, and I just don't understand this.

B.P., Costa Mesa
After contact by AYS, Blue Cross of Southern California initiated another review of your medical treatment and allowed an additional \$21.75 payment for your doctor's services. Your insurance provides benefits for medical services rendered within your community, based on the "usual, customary and sonable" (U.C.R.) fee.

This means the prevailing charges for medical treatment within a specific geographic area as determined by Blue Cross. Although you can select any doctor you choose and he can charge whatever fee he wants, your coverage is subject to U.C.R. limitations. Perhaps your doctor will reconsider his fee since it is much higher than the amount allowed by your insurance.

Shingles Should Last Decade

DEAR PAT: I'm having a new roof of asphalt shingles put on my house. How long should they be expected to last?

E.F., Costa Mesa
Anywhere from 15 to 25 years, depending on a number of factors, including weather conditions and the weight and quality of the shingles. Discuss this with your roofer, and make sure you understand any guarantees or warranties offered by the manufacturer. When deciding which type of shingles to use, remember that the labor cost of application is usually the same whether the life expectancy is 15 or 25 years.

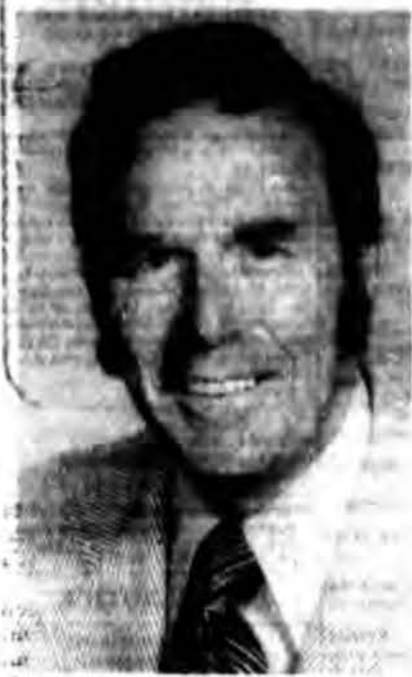

Rap Outlaws Classification

Remarried Catholics 'Angry' at Church

NEW YORK (AP) — They are divorced, remarried Catholics who are tired of being classified outlaws in their own church.

They, along with some singles, have banded together in the belief that each person has an inherent right to divorce and remarry and that their religion should not discredit them if they exercise that right.

They are members of the Divorced Remarried Persons' Movement recently formed by 40 Catholics from the metropolitan New York area, with hopes their organization will spread across the nation and have world-wide impact.

Theirs is a lay movement seeking to change Catholic law on divorce and remarriage. It embraces those outside the church while attempting to bring to the Catholic church a recognition of remarriage common to other religions.

"It is the only such group in existence and it is the first in the history of the Catholic church," says Msgr. Stephen J. Kelleher, the group's spiritual adviser and a longtime advocate of Catholic marriage reforms.

But church law, Kelleher notes, continues to teach that a valid marriage between two baptized persons is indissoluble. Only marriages not consummated or a marriage between a baptized and unbaptized person can be dissolved by the church.

WHEN CATHOLICS are divorced under civil law, the church forbids remarriage unless the prior marriage has been dissolved or ruled invalid — annulled — by a church court.

Those who remarry without such sanctions are barred from receiving the sacraments, such as the Eucharist. About half the country's approximately 6 million divorced Catholics have remarried.

The church has changed some of its annulment procedures in recent years and some parishes have sponsored support groups for separated and divorced Catholics.

ANNULMENT procedures have been simplified and speeded up, and definitions of what can make a marriage invalid have been broadened to include such causes as psychological incompatibility or deficiencies on the part of one or both spouses.

But Kelleher and those in the new movement say the church must take another step.

They advocate abolishing annulments and recognizing an individual's right to end a marriage and remarry while retaining full status in the church.

Kelleher points to the growing rate of annulments in this coun-

try — 20,000 this year compared to slightly less than 400 nine years ago — and says annulment courts are glutted with applications.

He contends it is "absurd" to say a marriage never existed years after it is "dead." The annulment process, he adds, is demeaning, demoralizing, and serves merely as a "rubber stamp."

Such ideas led to Kelleher's removal 11 years ago from the Archdiocese of New York's marriage court and continue to meet opposition from the church hierarchy.

But Kelleher, now in residence at the Church of the Sacred Heart on Manhattan's West Side, says the movement has its supporters within the church.

Members plan to lobby for

change with bishops in this country and the pope and work with divorced Catholics' groups throughout the country.

Says Kelleher, "The Church needs a three-pronged effort. It has programs that deal with marriage preparation, and others that focus on separated and divorced Catholics. Now the Church needs to address divorced, remarried Catholics."

Bible Smugglers Hit

Communist Countries Relax Shipment Rules

NEW YORK (AP) — Some doors have edged open lately to the shipment of Bibles into communist Eastern Europe, leading several Christian leaders to discount the usefulness of Bible smuggling.

In some cases, they say, it stiffens the barriers.

While more Bibles are needed in some areas, "this smuggling traffic does harm and creates difficulties" for churches in the Soviet orbit, says the Rev. Paul Hansen, Europe secretary of the Lutheran World Federation.

HE SAYS THE breaking of customs laws provides "new ammunition" for anti-religious forces, generates hostility toward churches at a time when some Soviet officials are advocating more tolerance and may "in fact be hindering the extension" of Christian faith.

"It leads to discrimination against Christians,"

Similar statements have come from other churchmen familiar with the situation, along with the recent officially approved sending of 25,000 Bibles to Baptists and others in the Soviet Union.

THE RUSSIAN-LANGUAGE Bibles, plus 5,000 Bible concordances, were provided by the United Bible Societies under an import permit granted the All-Union Council of Evangelical Christians-Baptists, the main Soviet body of Protestants.

Some copies also went to other Protestant groups. Asked by the Bible Societies if further shipments might be allowed, the Rev. Alexei Bichkov, general secretary of the council, said, "The official channels seem to me to be both open and very sympathetic."

Altogether, the Bible societies report that since World War II, a total of 12 million copies of Scriptures have been legally distributed in East European communist countries.

"FORGET WHAT YOU read about the necessity for underground evangelism," says the Rev. Robert S. Denny, general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance. "We now have the opportunity for above-ground evangelism in Eastern Europe."

He added in a report to a meeting of the alliance executive committee: "There is no need to smuggle Bibles into Eastern Europe."

However, the smuggling operations continue extensively with a network of about 80 independent, generally designated "east missions" in this country and Europe. They stock volunteer "couriers" and vehicles with Bibles.

THEIR LITERATURE TELLS of cunning strategies, duping border guards, of deep gratitude of those receiving Bibles and the dramatic impact.

"God's smugglers," the tourist couriers are called. As for the deceit and law-breaking involved, the groups cite the words of the apostle Peter when arrested in Jerusalem, "We must obey God rather than men."

When caught, they usually are held a few hours and released without their Bibles.

HOWEVER, HANSEN SAYS the materials circulated by the "east missions" often contain "exaggerations, inaccuracies and generalizations" misrepresenting the overall picture in Soviet countries, where Lutherans last year were allowed to ship 5,000 Bibles to congregations.

Some of the organizations "either do not know much about the whole spectrum of Christian life" in the Soviet orbit or are "not telling the truth about it," Hansen says.

Hansen, who has traveled extensively among East European churches for 19 years, says many people seem to find "the stories of underground activities more thrilling" than the everyday life of Soviet churches and give heavily to support the "secret missions."

HOWEVER, HE SAYS the underground activity involves only a "small minority" outside recognized churches "in some parts of some socialist countries," but the "vast majority" of Christians are not helped but harmed by fomenting antagonism to them.

"For every story about congregations which come together secretly in the woods, we can tell about thousands of others which gather in their church buildings, with state permission."

TWO OF THE BIGGEST Bible-smuggling groups in this country lately have been involved in a bitter legal battle, involving charges and countercharges of defamation and misrepresentation.

Involved are Underground Evangelism of Los Angeles, headed by L. Joe Bass, which reports annual income of more than \$8 million, and Jesus to the Communist World of Glendale, Calif., headed by Michael Wurmbrand, with annual income reported of about \$6 million.

Crusader Eyes Stage

Retired Muckraker Wants to Be an Actress

BOSTON (AP) — Jessica Mitford has been raking muck for two decades, scraping her pen against the likes of prisons, the Famous Writers School and the funeral business. Now she says she wants to become a character actress.

"I've retired," Miss Mitford, 62, said in an interview. "I'd like to have a job as a character actress."

The author of "The American Way of Death" and "Kind and Usual Punishment," added that after making a similar comment in London, she was offered the role of a woman "who does in her son for money."

"I was all set for the part," she said. "It fell through because I wasn't a member of Actors Equity."

Miss Mitford came to the United States from her native England in 1939, married lawyer Robert Treuhaft four years later, and didn't begin writing until she was 40.

"I WAS CHASED out of every job by the FBI," she said, explaining why she turned to writing, a job she said required no training or tools.

From 1948 to 1956 she was secretary of the Civil Rights Congress, an organization that was on the government's list of suspected subversive groups.

"I couldn't keep my ordinary job because the FBI would come around and tell them I was suspected of being a communist," she said.

She began writing the first of two autobiographies, interrupting her work on that to write "Trial By Headline," an article, published in 1957, on

newspaper coverage of the arrest of a rape suspect.

SHE HAS WRITTEN numerous articles and five books since then, and twice has been a college professor at San Jose State and Yale, although she never attended school as a student, receiving her education at home.

A collection of 17 of her articles recently was published in book form by Alfred A. Knopf as "Poison Penmanship: The Gentle Art of Muckraking."

Each article is followed by Miss Mitford's comment on why and how she did it.

One thing that stands out in her writing is a lack of rancor

The articles leave the impression that Miss Mitford had a good time investigating and writing.

"MY FEELING IS the less you show the anger, the more effective it is," she said. "I think it is just the normal way I do it. It comes to me more easily than to write the sob-sister angle."

For her book on prisons, she said, "rather than paint a pathetic picture of what life behind bars is like, I decided to go after administration and theory."

"The keepers — the guards — are the interesting ones. It's not natural to want to be a prison guard, therefore they make an interesting study."

ASKED IF MUCKRAKING takes a special type of person, Miss Mitford mentioned a woman student she taught at Yale, "a high-minded scientist, a naturalist," whose "mind was on animals and plants."

Her paper for the course on "Muckraking and Investigative Journalism" was on the life of the urban squirrel. She received an "A" on it, Miss Mitford said, although it had "nothing to do with the course."

"She would never have made a muckraker," Miss Mitford said. "She was much too nice to have a bit of dirt in your own makeup. I'm afraid it takes one to catch one."

Before turning to writing, Miss Mitford had done investigative work for her husband, interviewing witnesses in civil and criminal cases, and she said many of her best ideas for articles came from him.

Spraying Program Launched

WASHINGTON (AP) — A government spraying program to curb the hitchhiking of Japanese beetles into Western states has begun at two Eastern airports where the pesky insects are thriving again this summer.

Spraying began June 26 at McGuire Air Force Base, Wrightstown, N.J., and this week at Philadelphia International, the Agriculture Department said Monday.

BOTH WERE ON the government's bug-spraying list last year, which included five other airports — Greater Cincinnati Airport, Ohio; Dulles Washington, D.C.; Port Columbus, Ohio; Dover Air Force Base, Del.; and Hancock Field, Syracuse, N.Y.

Some or all of those and possibly other airports will be added to this year's spraying program if the need arises, the department said. The campaign usually lasts six to eight weeks.

OFFICIALS SAID when beetles become so numerous "it is likely they will be spread into new areas on the departing airplanes," the airport is declared to be "regulated" and thus undergoes spraying.

Last year, the department used the term "hazardous" to designate airports for spraying. But the word alarmed some airport managers, so it was changed for this season's beetle campaign.

PLANT-CHEWING Japanese beetles infest 24 states east of the Mississippi River and St. Louis. The spraying is done to prevent them from hitchhiking into uninfested western areas.

Susan Hess, a spokeswoman for the department's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, said the spraying of airplanes involves flights to Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington, and also overseas flights to Britain, Denmark, West Germany and France.

Ms. Hess said the beetles attack nearly 300 kinds of plants, including unprotected farm crops, home gardens and some shrubbery and roses, which she said are "a big favorite."

Pyracantha Shrub Most Preferred

If a popularity poll were taken to determine the most popular berry shrub among California gardeners, the Pyracantha would win hands down — and with good reason! This group of evergreen shrubs offers a wide selection of shrub types, leaf patterns and berry colors with varieties to suit every gardener's taste.

Christmas berries are produced on "Grabber" which has huge clusters of dark red fruit that colors in mid-fall and lasts well into winter. Another spectacular bearer with large, intense red berries is the "Victory."

MANY MORE horticultural varieties have been developed and they are also outstanding lawn and garden plants. "Gnome" features sprays of white spring flowers, dark orange berries in fall and winter combined with dark green foliage. This Pyracantha can be grown espaliered or in groups to form a hedge or shrub border.

Pyracantha "Stribling" also being marketed as Red Spray Pyracantha is known for its ability to hold its berries well through the holiday season. It grows to 15 feet and spreads to 12 feet if not controlled by pruning. Its branches are pendulous and the clusters of berries cover the length of the branches.

PYRACANTHAS NEED no special care but watch for aphids, woolly aphids and powdery mildew. They should be planted in full sun. Prune by pinching to direct the plant's growth. When you cut branches that have berried, cut back carefully remembering that next year's berries are borne on this year's wood.

Weekend Gardening Checklist

- Don't kill California native plants with kindness. Most natives prefer summer dryness. Fremontia will enjoy some available moisture near the outer perimeter of its drip line.

- Planning a party? Spectacular splashes of color to go along with summer festivities can be obtained by going to your local nursery and picking up pots of bright-blooming Geraniums, Pelargoniums, Chrysanthemums, Marguerites and Marigolds.

- If you grow blackberries, cut off the old canes that bore this year's crop and loosely twine new growth onto the trellis or support.

- Irrigate Tomatoes only as necessary but see to it that water penetrates deeply — well over a foot if possible.

- If you're going on vacation, be sure to prepare your garden for your absence by mulching, spraying for bugs, and watering thoroughly.

Trees Valued In Landscape

Trees are wonderful things. Not only are they lovely to look at but are efficient air conditioners that clean and cool the air at the same time. It makes sense that a big, beautiful shade tree is truly a valuable part of any landscape, especially in a sunny place.

Finding a tree that fits your specific need is easy for there are so many to choose from — flowering, deciduous, evergreen, tall or short, bold or lacey. When selecting a tree to fit your own unique requirements, be sure to understand the tree's peculiarities. Will the tree outgrow its space in the near future, will it make such dense shade that you can't grow anything under it, or will those once pretty blossoms drop in unwanted areas?

IT MIGHT BE that you really only want the tree's shade in the summer. In this case, a deciduous tree would be ideal providing summer shade and letting in the winter sun when the leaves fall. There are many available — some with lovely floral displays like the Black Locust or the Flowering Pear and some with good fall color such as the Chinese Pistache in reds and oranges, or the Chinese Sweet Gum with its yellow and gold fall leaves.

Even without additional bonuses, other deciduous trees are just as beautiful. The Hackberry, both Chinese and the larger leaved European are good medium to large species as is the Moraine Ash — a newer variety with improved branch structure and disease resistance.

MAYBE YOU ARE more inclined towards an Evergreen. There are many to choose from. For flowers, none can rival the stately Southern Magnolia with its huge fragrant white flowers — truly a sight to behold.

Several trees are better suited for smaller spaces like the delicately textured Mayten Tree which makes an elegant specimen anywhere. Faster growing is the African Sumac which will take severe pruning without difficulty or the Glossy Privet. This privet planted in groups is especially attractive with large drooping clusters of blue berries all winter.

The only problem with all the trees mentioned here is that they are all so lovely that there's never enough room to plant all the ones you'd like to enjoy.

PIGGYBACK PLANT (Tolmiea Menziesii)

In the North Western American forests, from California to Alaska, you will find the Piggyback growing wild. Not being too particular about humidity, it does quite well in most homes. It is ideal for the dining room table, a book shelf, or a compact area. They grow quite wide in time, yet they do not exceed 10-12 inches high.

LIGHT — Although Piggybacks will not tolerate direct afternoon sunlight, they will flourish in front of a Northern or Eastern window.

TEMPERATURE — With a preference towards cooler temperatures, you will find your Piggyback happiest with winter temperatures at 60° to 70° and summer's at 70° to 80°. Good air circulation is essential, but cold drafts prove most harmful.

WATER — Uniform moisture at all times is extremely important. The Piggyback when allowed to go dry will bounce back up after being watered. However, each time it wilts it loses vitality and after four or five times, it dies. When under the stress of lack of water, it accumulates fluorine, which can cause the leaf tip to burn or turn grey and curl up. Use Oxygen Plus at every watering, keep your plant consistently moist, and you will completely eliminate this problem. Daily watering during the summer months may be necessary.

The longevity of this plant is generally not more than 1-2 years, with each leaf lasting about four months.

Piggybacks are easily propagated from a leaf. Dip the cutting in Rootone and then place in pre-moistened vermiculite.

INSECTS — Mealybugs can be found in the soil or on the plant. For soil Mealybugs use Cygon 2E as a soil drench. For Foliage Mealybugs use Chacon Indoor House Plant Spray.

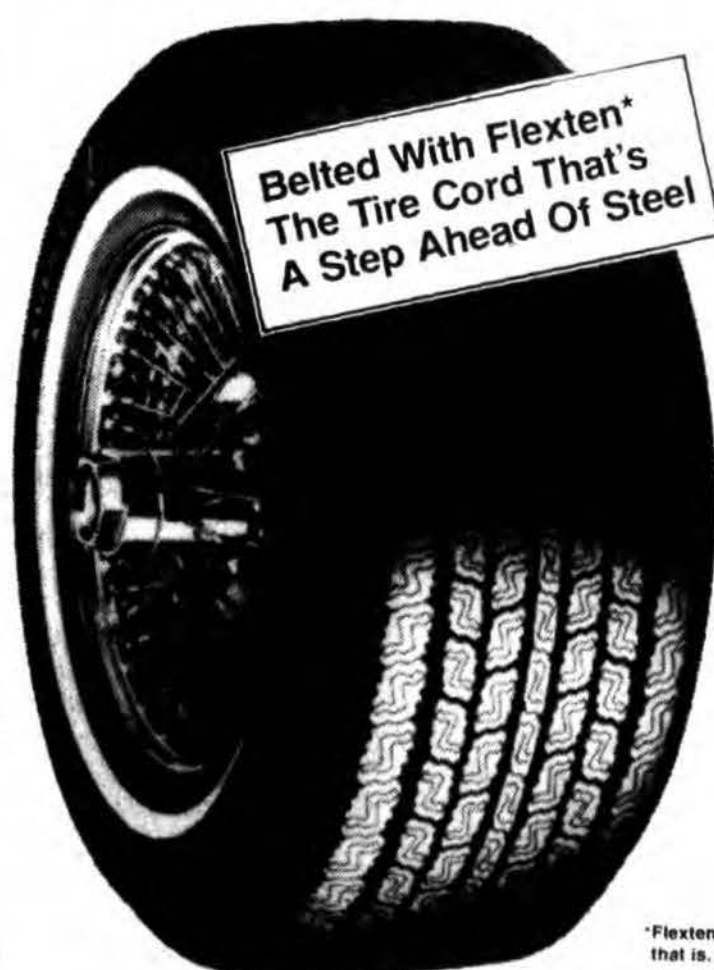

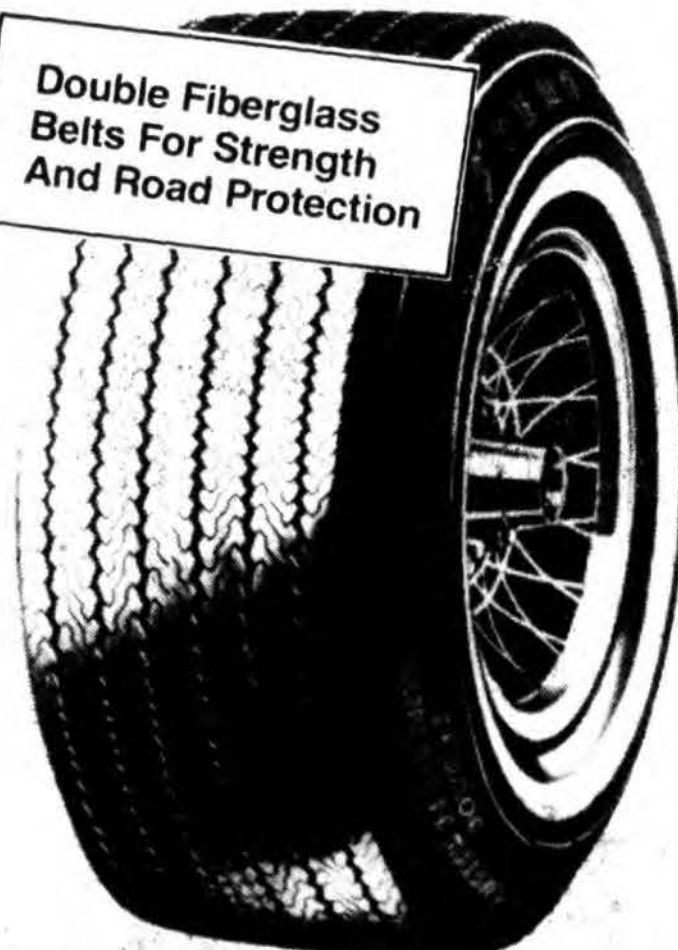

Angels Regain First Place

Baylor Grooves a Pair of Homers, 7-3

They don't call him Don or Donnie anymore. They call him Groove.

The nickname seemed silly in June when Don Baylor's hitting more closely resembled a rut than a groove.

But June is just a bad memory now. It is July, the Angels are in first place, and Don Baylor is in a groove with a capital G.

ON FRIDAY NIGHT, Baylor crushed two homers of epic proportions, drove in three runs and propelled the Angels to a 7-3 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

Baylor's first homer broke a 2-2 tie in the fourth inning and carried to the base of the Big A scoreboard.

The second Baylor bomb might have gone just as far if hadn't ramed into the seats just above the Angel bullpen.

"Geez, that first one reminded me of how I used to hit them when I was a kid," marvelled Manager Jim Fregosi, who was joking because he never hit a ball like that in his life.

"Baylor hits consistently harder than anyone I've ever played with," added Fregosi, this time more serious.

"I'M JUST LOOKING forward to the second half," said Baylor, "because I've always been a second half hitter. I have a lot more confidence in myself now than I did in June and I'm seeing the ball better."

Baylor has driven in 16 runs and hit six homers in his last six games. Over the past 10 outings, Groove has gone 16-for-37, a clip of .432.

A crowd of 24,679 watched live and a lot more sat in front of TV sets and saw the Angels pull a half game in front of the Texas Rangers in the see-saw American League West.

IT WAS THE FOURTH of five home games the Angels put on their TV schedule this season. The TV finale comes up one week from tonight when the Yankees visit Anaheim.

Baltimore was 5-0 against the Angels going into the game, but was California real-

ly facing a hot team? It depends on your point of view.

The Orioles had won 22 of their last 28 but they had also lost three straight.

"I know how Earl Weaver hates to lose, and I love to beat him," said Baylor, who played for the Baltimore manager over six seasons. "Bobby Grich also likes to see Earl lose."

Grich, who spent nine years in the Orioles' organization, also hit a towering home run, his 18th, to set a seasonal record for Angel second basemen.

IT HIT THE LEFT FIELD foul pole, drove in two runs, and gave California a 5-3 lead that Baylor soon turned into 7-3.

Also significant was the fact this is the Angels' 22nd come-from-behind victory of the season. They've gotten exactly 45 percent of their victories that way.

"I don't look at stats like that," said Fregosi. "I never expect this team to give

Wimbledon Finals

Sweden's Borg Eyes Immortality

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Bjorn Borg, the poker-faced Swede with the wisp of a beard, steps onto Wimbledon's center court today determined to etch his name indelibly in the game's records by becoming the first man since 1913 to win four Wimbledon singles titles in a row.

Roscoe Tanner, 27, a hard-hitting left-hander from Tennessee who has a serve hard enough to drill a hole in you, is determined to stop him.

The fans don't give Tanner, seeded fifth, much of chance, however.

IF PAST RECORDS are anything to go by — and in Wimbledon finals they aren't — the final will be a walkover for the 23-year-old Borg. He's met Tanner 11 times in the past eight years and lost only three times. One of his victories over Tanner was in the semifinal here three years ago. Tanner has been in the semis twice, but never before in the final.

Borg won the Wimbledon title 1976-78 to equal Fred Perry's pre-war record. Now he's shooting for the biggest record of them all — the longest string of victories at Wimbledon since the challenge round set-up of the old days, in which the defending championship only had to play the final. The challenge round system was abolished in 1922.

In those early days, playing only in a simple challenge round, William Renshaw won six times from 1881 and Laurie Doherty five times from 1902. Anthony Wilder won it four times, from 1910 to 1913.

THE FANS may be ready to witness a Borg victory, but Tanner didn't see it that way.

"There'd be no point in going on court if I didn't think I could win," he said after his semifinal victory Thursday over Pat DuPre, the tall American. "I'll be underdog and I'll just see how I go. All the pressure will be on him. If I didn't think I could win, I might as well take the plane back home and send my regards on Saturday."

Tanner's service, the most impressive weapon in his armory, could be the key to the match. If Borg manages to collar it, the match could be over early.

Borg's service is not as spectacular as Tanner's, which has been timed at 153 miles an hour. But it can be equally as effective. Thursday the Swede easily defeated his old rival Jimmy Connors in the semifinal 6-2, 6-3, 6-2, and aced the American 11 times in doing so. "I don't know when I've played better," he said after that match.

BORG STARTED the tournament by dropping a couple of sets to Vijay Amritraj, the Indian touch artist, before winning 2-6, 6-4, 4-6, 7-6, 6-2 in the first round. He beat Hank Pfister easily, dropped a set against Brian Teacher, then overcame Tom Okker and Connors, each in straight sets.

Connors, ranked third, was the only seeded player Borg had to play on the road to the final.

Tanner's path to the final started with a three-set victory over Van Winitsky, followed by wins over the Australians Peter McNamara and Ross Case. Then he beat 14th-seeded Jose Luis Clerc of Argentina after two tiebreakers in the next round. Next he defeated 15th-seeded Tim Gullikson in the quarter and then DuPre.

World Record to Vassallo

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — Jesse Vassallo set a world record in the 200-meter individual medley and three other American swimmers won their third gold medals of the Pan American Games Friday night.

But the United States' victory streak in swimming was stopped at 19 when Anne Gagnon of Canada won the 200 breaststroke.

Vassallo established a world mark of 2 minutes, 32.29 seconds, defeating previous world record holder Graham Smith of Canada, who followed Vassallo with a 2:05.86. Scott Spann of Greenville, S.C. was third in 2:06.29.

VASSALLO, 17, and a Mission Viejo High School student, but a native of Puerto Rico, was given several more standing ovations Friday night, just as he received earlier in the week when he won the 400-meter individual medley.

Meanwhile, Americans Cynthia Woodhead, Linda Jezek and Rowdy Gaines won their third gold medals of the Games, all setting Pan American records.

Woodhead defeated teammate Tracy Caulkins, 16, of Nashville, in the 400-meter freestyle with a time of 4:10.56. The 15-year-old Woodhead, of Riverside, previously won the 200-meter freestyle in world record time and swam a leg on a relay.

Caulkins now has three golds and two silver medals in the Games.

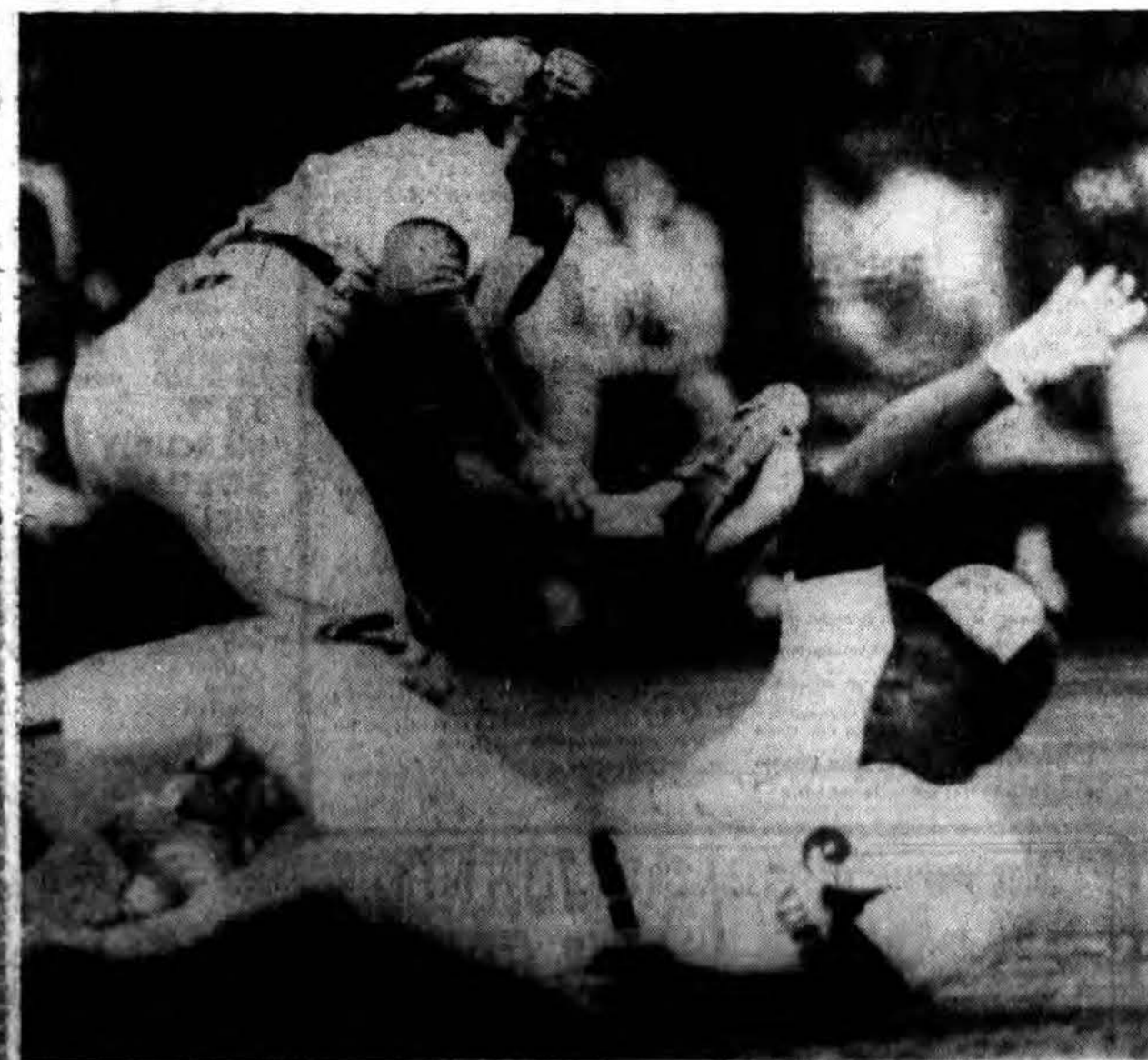
JEZEK WON the gold medal in the 200-meter backstroke in 2:16.07 with Sheryl Gibson of Canada second in 2:17.58, followed by Libby Kinkead, 14, of Wayne, Pa., third in 2:20.19. The 19-year-old Jezek of Los Altos, had won the 100-meter backstroke and swam a leg on the winning 400-meter medley relay.

Gaines now has three golds after anchoring the men's 800-meter freestyle relay to victory in Pan Am record time of 7:31.28, with Brazil second and Canada third. Gaines won the 200-meter freestyle and was on the winning 400-meter freestyle relay team.

Gagnon broke the monotonous string of U.S. national anthems played after victories with her time of 2:35.75 in the 200-meter breaststroke, another Pan Am record. Her teammate, Joanne Bedard was second in 2:40.22, and another half-second behind was Patty Spees, 18, of Oakland. Renee Laravie of Dayton, Ohio finished fourth.

OTHER MEMBERS of the winning 800-meter relay team were Brian Goodell of Mission Viejo, Dave Larson of Jessup, Ga., and Kris Kirschner of Solon, Ohio.

Track and field, inactive for the first week of the Pan American Games, finally got underway today, and the United States team — dominant in the competition in the past — was expected to begin its drive for a big gold medal harvest.

To make room on the roster for Quisenberry, Kansas City placed infielder Jerry Terrell on the 15-day disabled list. Terrell broke the index finger on his right hand while taking infield practice Thursday and is expected to be sidelined three weeks.

Detroit swept a doubleheader from Milwaukee with Jason Thompson's two-run homer in the sixth deciding the nightcap, 5-4, and Lance Parrish's two-run single in the eighth clinching a 7-4 verdict in the opener.

Willie Randolph's eighth-inning walk with the bases loaded forced in the winning run as the Yankees edged Oakland, 4-3, in the first game of a doubleheader. In the nightcap, Tommy John became the American League's first 13-game winner when he threw a seven-hitter to win a 3-0 decision. Behind Jose Cruz's two-run homer, Joe Niekro became the first pitcher in the National League to win 13 games this season as the Houston Astros beat the Chicago Cubs, 4-2. Cosmo Star in Brawl

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — A practice-session brawl involving Cosmos star Giorgio Chinaglia, three teammates and Giants Stadium workers erupted Friday with three maintenance men sent to the hospital.

Both maintenance workers and a stadium guard who spoke with Chinaglia said the fight started when Joe Montanti, a stadium cleaner, began chiding Chinaglia during a shooting drill from the east stands behind one of the goals.

Chinaglia, according to a stadium guard who requested anonymity, told the worker, "You do your job, I'll do mine." At this point, different versions of the incident surfaced. The stadium guard said Chinaglia told him a shouting match occurred, with Montanti challenging Chinaglia, saying, "If you're so tough, come on up here."

However, Joe McCloskey, another stadium worker who witnessed the incident, said Chinaglia began cursing and spit in Montanti's face.

At this point, according to both versions, Chinaglia rushed into the stands after Montanti. The 32-year-old Chinaglia, the North American Soccer League's leading scorer, was pushed over two rows of seats, whereupon teammates David Breci, Antonio Carbognani and Mark Liveric charged into the stands to his defense.

Breci and Liveric jumped on Montanti while Carbognani went after worker Rocco Luciola, who was swinging a shovel.

Ex-Wimbledon Champ Dies

WIMBLEDON, England — Elizabeth "Bunny" Ryan, joint holder with Bille Jean King of the record for Wimbledon championships, collapsed and died here Friday after watching the women's singles final. She was 88.

She died on the eve of today's women's doubles, in which King was expected to break the record by taking a 20th title. Ryan won 12 ladies' doubles and seven mixed doubles championships at Wimbledon between 1914 and 1934. But the singles title, in which she twice was runner-up, eluded her.

Czechs Ignore Martina

The victory of Martina Navratilova over Chris Evert Lloyd at Wimbledon Friday drew little comment in Czechoslovakia media. Navratilova defected to the United States in 1975. The North American Soccer League champion Cosmos announced the signing of three players Friday, including German goalie Hubert Birkenmeier. The Pittsburgh Steelers signed No. 1 draft pick Greg Hawthorne of Baylor. Burbanks' Jerry Ash escaped serious injury from a crash during the high-speed pursuit cycling trials for the Pan-American Games. The Baltimore Colts signed their No. 1 draft pick, Barry Krauss. Actor Paul Newman, San Diego's Dick Barbour and Germany's Rolf Stammelen won the pole for today's Six Hours of Endurance race at Watkins Glen. Earl Anthony opened a 241-pin lead after five rounds at the Pro Bowlers Association Fresno Open.

Transpac Leadership To Merlin

Al Cassei and his crew aboard the 66-foot ultra-light displacement sloop Merlin, had apparently found a breezy slot in the 2,225-mile Transpac race from Los Angeles to Honolulu Friday and was pulling away from the other 77 boats in the fleet.

Merlin's position report placed her 946 miles from the finish line at Diamond Head on the island of Oahu after a 232-mile day's run. She was 70 miles ahead of her ULDB rival Drifter, skippered by Harry Molosheo, Long Beach, after stretching the margin from 29 miles on the previous day.

THE POSITION also moved Merlin into the top spot in Class A and fleet on handicap time, despite the fact that she gives Windward Passage, the third place boat, nearly 24 hours on the time allowance scale.

But despite Merlin's burst of speed, it does not appear at this stage of the race that she would erase her own elapsed time record of 8 days, 11 hours and 45 minutes set in the 1977 race. A plot of her position Friday shows that she is about a full day behind her sixth day position in 1977.

AND, OF COURSE, there is no assurance she will be first to finish. A lot could happen in 1,000 miles of sailing, especially in the blustery trade winds the fleet is likely to encounter as they approach the wind-swept Molokai Channel in the last stages of the race.

Light winds continued to plague the fleet Friday, indicating that the Pacific High pressure area has split and is straddling the great circle and rhumb line courses. Most of the fleet was reporting winds of 8-10 knots from the northeast. The yachts had unusually strong northwest winds for the first three days after the start, resulting in two of them being dismasted and abandoning the race.

Bill Power's Peterson-46 sloop High Roller from Newport Harbor Yacht Club continues to dominate Class B and moved into second place in the fleet handicap standings. High Roller's position placed her 1,294 miles from the finish.

CLASS C LEADER was Bill Goodley's Peterson-43 Dakar out of Marina del Rey. The Class D leader was Bingo, a CF-37 sailed by Bert Gardner, Long Beach.

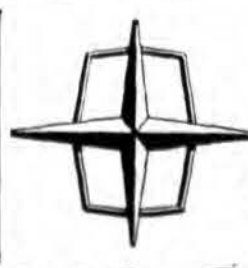

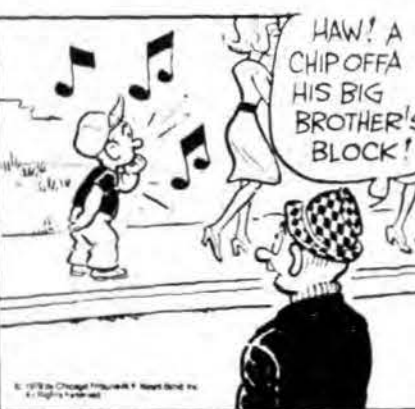

'Other Fonda' Keeps Busy in Movies



HENRY FONDA APPEARS IN SON'S MOVIE Peter Fonda, Brooke Shields Stars of 'Wanda'

By BOB THOMAS HOLLYWOOD (AP) Now let's hear from the other Fonda. While Henry and Jane are busily winning awards and making news, the youngest member of the famed trio continues quietly doing his own thing. Among Peter Fonda's activities: Living in the Montana wilds with his wife, Gortia, sailing his 102 foot boat through Polynesia, pursuing ecological causes — and making movies. The latest is "Wanda Nevada," which United Artists is releasing this summer. Peter directed and stars with Brooke Shields. Henry Fonda appears briefly as an Arizona prospector.

"DAD CALLED ME WHEN I was preparing the picture," Peter related. "He said, 'Well, I'm out of work, you got anything for me?' I said, 'Yes, but I can only pay you a grand.' He said, 'I'll take it.' He came down to the Grand Canyon and worked for one day, putting on a white beard and chewing tobacco. The scene had him scolding me. 'I reckon you forgot to tell me.' Oh, what memories that brought back. Like when I was 8 years old and he would say, 'I reckon you forgot to pick up the towels in your bathroom.' Or, 'I reckon you forgot to put the cap back on the toothpaste.' Peter Fonda was late to an interview at the Beverly Wilshire Hotel because his pa had called from New York to inquire about a preview of "Wanda Nevada" the night before. "Did they know it was me?" Henry asked.

"THEY DID AS SOON as you opened your mouth," his son reported. "Wanda Nevada," based on an original screenplay by Dennis Hackin, is a Western, but a different kind. It is a 1950s fable about a gambler (Peter Fonda) who wins a beautiful 13-year-old orphan in a poker game. Together they hunt the Arizona wilds for a lost gold mine. "Casting the girl was important," the director-star remarked. "Most of the actresses who could handle the role were 15. There is a world of difference between the innocence of 13 and the loss of innocence — or the desire for the loss of innocence — at 15. "Brooke was ideal. She was quite pretty and still a stringbean at 13. There was no hint that after our last, joyful scene that our next stop would be a motel.

"SHE WAS IDEAL in all respects. She started modeling at 11 months and knows more about the camera than my sister Jane and has had

almost as much experience as my father. She was always on time, knew her lines, could adjust if I shifted scenes. Yet she is still a 13-year-old. All that "Pretty Baby" publicity is so much baloney. "Wanda Nevada" was a grueling shoot for Miss Shields and the entire company. Production began in the canyons of Arizona last June, the average temperature 118. "One day it reached 152 degrees," said Fonda. "And we had no cars to drive to the location, the National Park Service doesn't allow them in the Grand Canyon. Helicopters, either. If they are flown in, they have to be carried out.

"ALL OF THE GEAR had to be transported by mules, and we walked to the locations. It was the only time of year we could shoot. Later, we would have started getting snow. Earlier, there would have been thundershowers. "Wanda Nevada" was Fonda's baby from the start. With a production team that included his old friend William Hayward, he prepared the project, even lined up the \$3.8 million for filming. That turned out to be unnecessary when United Artists told him, "We'll pick up the tab." "I like making movies," said Peter. "I like the creative process, the production responsibility. I like taking over and seeing that the whole thing flows."

HE LEARNED HIS TRADE at the Roger Corman School, along with Jack Nicholson, Peter Bogdanovich, Bruce Dern, Dennis Hopper, Bob Rafelson, and others. Fonda produced and Hopper directed the most influential film of the late 1960s, "Easy Rider." Fonda also has directed "Hired Hand" and "Idaho Transfer." He is asked if he worries about catching up with his father and sister. "Catch up?" he replied. "They don't write, direct and produce. I do."

Disco Sound Fills Chinese Temple

PEKING (AP) Peaches and Herb, a black American disco team, swayed and sang to blaring recorded music in the Temple of Heaven, once sacred to China's emperors. A crowd of 150 bemused Chinese, including tots of kindergarten age brought to the scene, joined the two entertainers under a broiling sun. THE PERFORMANCE was part of Bob Hope's three-hour fall TV show called "The Road To China." Peaches, dressed in a gauzy see-through outfit topped with showers of beads, and Herb, wearing a conservative suit open at the collar, sashayed down the marble steps of the Imperial Heavenly Vault to the Chinese in the courtyard below.

URGED BY A DIRECTOR to raise their hands in the air and sway their hips, the Chinese seemed to enjoy the experience. The Temple of Heaven is a 15th-century compound made of circular halls topped by blue and gold tiled roofs.

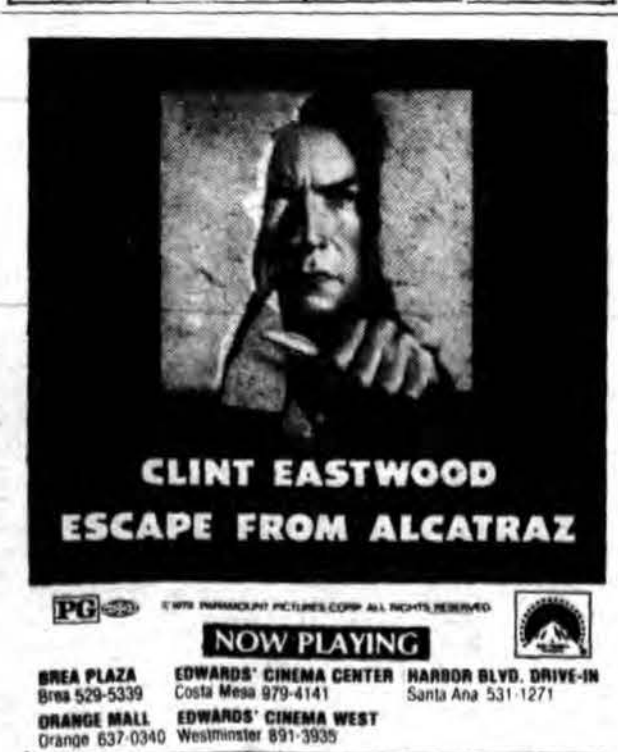

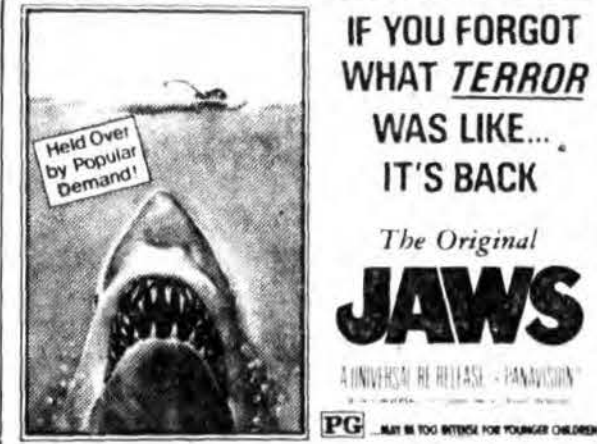

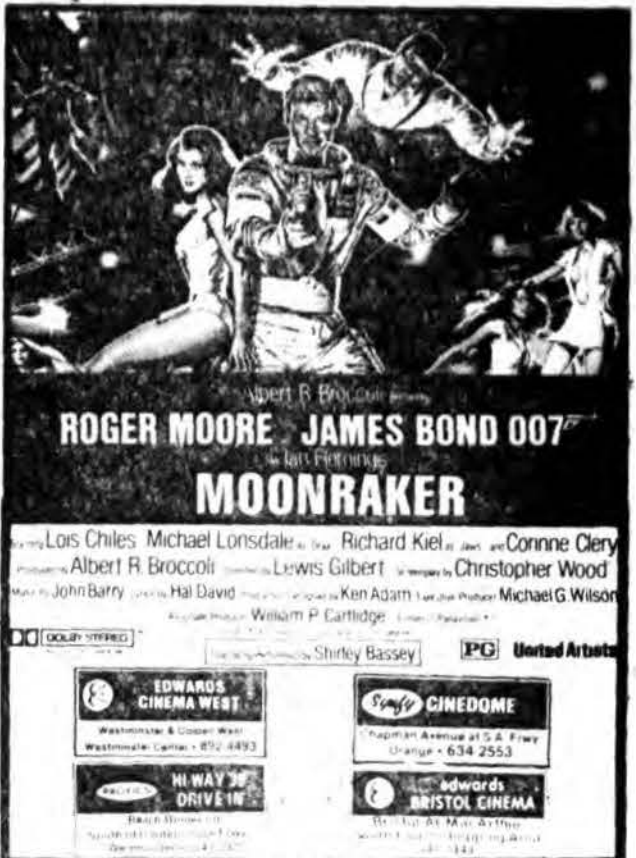

Beginners Climb

Courses Clutter Highest Peaks

SEATTLE (AP) — Attracted by the challenge of climbing Mount Rainier, thousands of people are clawing their way to the summit — only to find company on their pristine wilderness.

With aid of improved equipment and quickie mountain climbing courses, many people who heretofore would not have considered attempting the 14,410-foot mountain are clogging the trails.

LAST SUMMER 5,400 climbers attempted the summit, and 2,870 reached it, said Larry Henderson, a Rainier National Park ranger. Fifteen years ago, 300 reached the peak, he said.

Merle Mayer, 32, of Tacoma, is a self-described armchair climber who had not successfully ascended any other mountain before reaching the summit of Mount Rainier three weeks ago. "When we got to the summit we passed about 30 or 40 people returning from the summit," Mayer said.

ALONG WITH TWO other novices — a 50-year-old man and a 40-year-old woman, also from Tacoma — Mayer relied on the expertise of a veteran Rainier climber to reach the top.

Six climbers started, but two turned back at the 10,000-foot level, he said.

"One individual was vomiting because of altitude sickness, and another guy said he had lost his motivation," Mayer recalled. "Without that he couldn't make the climb. The 50-year-old man made it on sheer guts because he was in terrible pain the whole way."

"We had to carry him down the last 2,000 feet of the return trip."

NOVICE CLIMBER Todd Gay, 32, of Gig Harbor, Wash., took advantage of the Tacoma-based Rainier Mountaineering Inc., which offers a \$125 package that includes one day of instruction and a two-day guided climb.

Rainier Mountaineering was founded 10 years ago by Jerry Lynch and Lou Whittaker, a brother of Jim Whittaker, whose expeditions have conquered Mt. Everest and K-2 in the Himalayas. The guide service leads about 1,200 summit attempts a year, Lynch said, of which 75-90 percent make it.

"There has been a dramatic

increase — six-fold — since we started," Lynch said.

GAY SAID HIS Rainier climb was worth it, despite criticism by aficionados that Rainier Mountaineering "is a ripoff and just pulls up people who aren't in good enough shape."

"I had two choices," Gay said. "I could go up with friends who were reasonably proficient, or I could pay \$100 (what it cost three years ago) and go with experts."

"Rainier Mountaineering attracts climbers from across the country."

"A 14-year-old kid came on

the train all the way from Maryland, a couple came from the South and one came from Boston. One man was in his 60s," Gay said.

THE GROUP OF 15 was made up entirely of novices, and one or two turned back at Camp Muir, he said. But despite the inexperience of many Rainier Mountaineering participants, Gay believes the guide service has a good record of safety.

"The guides they hire are good climbers," he said. "Some people bad-mouth RMI because they're not hip. But for a beginner, they're real safe."

Airborne Tales Told

Example: Truman Sent Messages to Taft

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the span of three weeks, Air Force One hauled President Carter 26,500 miles to two continents and across both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Carter and his predecessors have flown around the globe so widely and so routinely that it's difficult to realize that only 36 years have passed since an incumbent president, Franklin D. Roosevelt, first took to the skies.

When FDR left Miami on Jan. 11, 1943, bound for a World War II conference at Casablanca, the U.S. government did not have a single airplane suitable for presidential travel. Roosevelt flew aboard a "Clipper" flying boat chartered from Pan American World Airways.

In subsequent years, records indicate, only one government-owned presidential plane was grounded because of a design flaw.

Harry Truman's DC-6, Independence, went out of service for nearly six months in



1947-48 because the heating system posed a threat of cabin fires.

Tales such as these, and many more, will be published in book form by Coward, McCann & Geoghegan Inc. Titled "The Flying White House," the book is written by J.F. TerHorst and retired Air Force Col. Ralph Albertazie.

TerHorst was former President Ford's first press secretary and Albertazie was Richard M. Nixon's Air Force One pilot for 5½ years.

As Nixon flew home to California in August 1974 after

resigning, H.R. Haldeman, the indicted former White House chief of staff, placed two telephone calls to Nixon aboard Air Force One seeking a presidential pardon for Watergate crimes.

As the plane flew across central Missouri, Ford became president and Air Force One, for the balance of the flight, became SAM (for Special Air Missions) 27000.

When Nixon flew into exile, Albertazie reveals, the "black box" containing top-secret codes for launching nuclear weapons was not aboard the presidential jet. The codes were left in Washington with an aide to Ford.

The book suggests that someone in the Pentagon did not trust Nixon with the codes during his final hours in office.

During the flight to California, Nixon wandered back to the rear compartment that normally housed reporters and photographers on Air Force One.

No press contingent was aboard and Nixon reportedly announced: "It certainly smells better back here."

President Truman, often at odds with the late Sen. Robert A. Taft, R-Ohio, often asked to be alerted when his plane was over Taft's home state.

Thus prompted, Truman would visit the lavatory, then order the pilot to activate the waste disposal system.

Destitute Prostitute Wins Suit

VARESE, Italy (AP) — A three-man court has ordered a male motorist to pay a 43-year-old prostitute \$4,800 in damages for reduced "professional capacity" as a result of an auto accident.

The woman, Olga Campese, told the court she lost 70 days of work as a result of her injuries and claimed she earned \$24 a day.

The court "taking into consideration the woman's age," said her take probably was closer to \$12 a day, but noted that doctors said her injuries reduced her "professional capacity" 15 percent.

"Prostitution — whether it is called a trade or a profession — is a peculiar activity to be included among independent jobs, therefore it is the equivalent of a free profession," said the court's ruling.

The man was not identified.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The alphabetized world of Washington faces a problem.
