#### Wife-rape Case Nixed

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — New Jersey's first wife-rape conviction has been thrown out by an appeals court on the grounds that the offense came before the state law against forcible sexual relations with a spouse.

The Appellate Division of Superior Court made the ruling on an appeal by Daniel Morrison, 35, of Metford Lake.

Morrison was found guilty in May 1978 of raping his estranged wife, Rosita, and was sentenced to 4-12 years for rape. Kidnapping and simple assault sentences were suspended. back' thing," Joni said.

# Dollar' Remains Steady

LONDON (AP) — Gold hit \$850 an ounce in London today, surpassing the record set in European trading Friday.

London silver prices, riding the coattails of the bullion boom, rose to a record \$50 an ounce from \$49 at Friday's

The dollar firmed against all major European currencies, except for the strong British pound.

London's five major bullion dealers fixed the price for the afternoon trading session at \$850. But it fell at the close to \$838. Gold bullion was quoted at

\$845 in Zurich, matching the record set Friday at Europe's main gold market.

The metal closed Friday at \$840 in Zurich and \$835 in Lon-

It hit a record of \$838.78 in Hong Kong trading today, but fell to close at \$827.78 in the Far Eastern market.

The gold price has soared by more than \$640 an ounce since this time last year in a rush for the traditional haven in times of monetary uncertainty and political crises.

A New York investment adviser, James Sinclair, was quoted in The Times of London today as saying the price may reachfourfigures this year.

Sinclair said events in Iran and Afghanistan, as well as growing talk that the Soviet Union could invade Pakistan and Turkey, was sending "flight capital" from oil-rich Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and the United

Arab Emirates into gold.

# Waldheim's Plan To Free Hostages?

By The Associated Press
U.N. Secretary-General Kurt
Waldheim says he hopes a plan
devised during his visit to Iran
will lead to the release of the
American hostages in Tehran.
But the Iranian militants holding the Americans captive still
insist the deposed shah must be
returned before the hostages
are freed.

"We have worked out a mechanism ... and I hope this mechanism will make it possible to satisfy the government of Iran and lead to release of the hostages," Waldheim told reporters Sunday in New Delhi,

The U.N. chief would give no details of his plan. But after his visit to Tehran, Iranian officials said he proposed setting up a U.N. commission to investigate the Iranian revolutionary regime's charges against the deposed shah.

At the time, Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh welcomed the proposal. But he said the commission's findings would not be binding on Iran, and the hostages would not be released until the shah was returned.

Ghotbzadeh repeated this stand Saturday, telling a French interviewer that the return of the shah, now living in Panama, was the only way out of the impasse.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) Saudi Arabia has told the United States and Britain that the Soviet Union and Cuba reinforced their military presence in neighboring South Yemen in re-cent weeks, Arab diplomatic sources said today.

They said the Saudis told Washington and London that the alleged communist build-up might prompt them to put their armed forces on alert soon.

The sources said the Saudis informed the American and British governments that hundreds of Cuban troops and dozens of Soviet generals and experts have been airlifted to the South Yemen capital of Aden since the Kremlin's military intervention in Afghanistan.

# Hit by Auto, Girl, 9, Dies

A 9-year-old girl was killed Sunday night after she was struck by a car at the intersection of Beach Boulevard and Cerritos Avenue in Stanton. police reported today.

# Tough Defense Vowed

# Carter Lists National Priorities

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter pledged today to work for a "strong, unsurpassed defense capability" in his fourth year in office and said he expects progress this year in reducing inflation, which he called the nation's most serious economic problem.

"We must pay whatever price is required to remain the strongest nation in the world," the president said in a 75-page State of the Union message he sent to Congress.

Carter said the price of remaining the strongest nation has increased because of the growing military might of the Soviet Union and its readiness to use their military strength, which has "been made all too evident in Afghanistan."

He said U.S. steps to penalize the Russians for their intervention in Afghanistan demonstrate that the Soviet Union "will pay a heavy price for its aggression in terms of our relationship.'

Carter said he will offer only a few new initiatives to Congress in 1980 because of the importance of enacting proposals he has previously sent to the lawmakers, especially those aimed at creating energy

"In the coming legislative session, the last in this presidential term, I am deeply committed to finishing the agenda that I have placed before the Congress," he said.

Carter said action on his uncompleted agenda is "absolutely essential for the nation's wellbeing.

However, he said he will make several proposals, including programs to expand youth employment, reauthorize general revenue sharing for state and local governments and require utilities to switch from oil to coal.

The president repeated an earlier pledge to increase defense spending by more than 20 percent above the rate of inflation over the next five years.

He defended his economic policies, saying that the past three years have been ones of "progress and achievement for the American people," although he acknowledged much more has to be done.

He predicted flatly that "inflation will slow this year" and should be even lower in 1981. The nation's inflation rate is about 13 percent and most (See CARTER, Page A2)

# Newport Mooring Rate Hike Mulled

Orange County Supervisors are to decide Tuesday how much to raise the annual rates on the 18 county moorings in Newport

Beach. In two previous discussions, supervisors agreed that the mooring rates should be hiked, but deadlocked over how much.

Newport Beach officials have said they will take a second look at the rates of 572 city moorings should supervisors vote to raise fees for the county moorings.

A spokesman for the only supervisor who hasn't voted on the issue, Edison Miller, said today that Miller's main concern was with what he calls the "black market" in moorings.

'There's a significant black market going on in moorings right now,' said Chris Loumakis, Miller's aide.

Besides subleasing the moorings, boat owners can substantially hike the sale price of their vessels if they have moorings, Loumakis said.

Presently, a mooring can be transferred only if someone buys the vessel moored there. Loumakis said Miller may propose adding a no-transfer

clause to the mooring agree-

But Loumakis added that Miller is favoring a raise toward the lower end of the \$11 to \$18

Ryckoff, who will seek a third

council term in April, told the more than 200 people at the SPON dinner they should look for council candidates who are consistent in the views they represent and not candidates who "just take a stand because it's election time."

Ryckoff was one of five council members to participate in the SPON conference which opened with two afternoon panel dis-cussions. Councilman Ray Williams, who is also running for re-election, along with his colleagues Paul Hummel, Don Strauss and Evelyn Hart served

The point of the SPON conference, according to the group's president, Jean Watt, was to provide information so that voters could decide what issues are significant and how those issues could be solved.

Ryckoff in his speech that con-

cluded the SPON event, praised the current council majority, which he leads, for its independence of the interests backed by the chamber and developers such as the Irvine Co. He also charged that the pend-

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way today for increased busing of public school pupils in Dallas as a method to provide racial balance in the nation's

eighth-largest school district.

By a 6-3 vote, the court decided not to review an appeals court ruling that gave the go-ahead for busing an estimated 20,000 students at an annual cost of \$5.8 million.

Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., writing for the dissenters, said the increased busing could backfire and lead to further exodus by whites from the city's public schools. Powell noted that since 1971, the percentage of white students in Dallas schools dropped from 69 percent to 33.5 percent last year.

# Suspect in Shock Following Arrest

Former reporter Thomas Barley was seemingly in a state of shock and unable to recollect events after his arrest in the stabbing death of his wife, a Santa Ana police investigator testified today.

Clark W. Moorhouse told the seven-man, five-woman Orange County Superior Court jury that Barley, 51, was "extremely nervous" when he was interviewed several hours after Catherine Barley, 46, was stabbed outside a Santa Ana coffee shop last May 26.

"The impression was he couldn't believe he was there,' Moorhouse testified in apparent reference to the police station.

Further, Moorhouse testified Barley said in the interview that he could not believe his wife was dead. He reportedly told investigators "I just saw her out side," Moorhouse told the court.

Barley, who formerly covered the county court beat for the Daily Pilot, was arrested at the murder scene. The crime was witnessed by at least 14 persons. Barley has pleaded innocent

by reason of insanity It is the contention of defense attorney George Chula that the former news reporter was suffering diminished mental capacity when the knife attack took place.

Moorhouse also testified that Barley complained of chest and lung pains after his arrest and was examined at UC Irvine Medical Center before booking into Orange County Jail.

The investigator also told the court that a search of an Orange apartment where Barley was living produced a sheath to the letter opener used in the attack on Mrs. Barley.

Chula attempted to win suppression of the sheath based on the assertion that the search of the apartment was illegal. Judge Mason Fenton however, decided that the investigators did have permission to search the apartment.

# 'Hub' Keavy, 77, Cancer Victim

By The Associated Press Veteran newsman Hubbard "Hub" Keavy, a former chief of the Los Angeles bureau of The Associated Press for 25 years, has died of lung cancer. He was

Keavy, a Laguna Beach resident, was admitted to the South Coast Medical Center, South Laguna, Friday and died Sunday afternoon. He is survived by his account wife. Jane, and his two second wife, Jane, and his two sons, Mike and Tim. Rosary will be recited at St.

Catherine's Catholic Church in Laguna Beach at 7:30 p.m. Wed-

Services will be held at the same location, 890 Temple Terrace, at 11 a.m. Thursday.

After retiring from the news cooperative in 1967, Keavy became executive director of the Laguna Beach News-Post. He left this position after launching a syndicated column of "Good News" items.

Even after being hospitalized with lung cancer in April 1979, Keavy's news instincts were always with him. The bed-ridden man called the AP office at San Diego to report a news event at the hospital.

He was tall, pink-cheeked, silver-haired and impeccably dressed - from bow tie to gleaming oxfords. Before coming to Los Angeles from the AP's Chicago bureau in 1929, he had worked on seven Midwestern newspapers.

For 13 years in the Los Angeles office he was feature editor and writer of a Hollywood column.

He was known for his knack of getting the facts behind the publicity, and telling them in his light-hearted manner. And as bureau chief, Keavy encouraged simplicity, informality and brevity in writing.

In 1958 he headed a systemwide AP campaign credited with markedly improving the news service's writing. For several months before retiring he was AP executive representative in California and

He presided over the founding of the AP's first state organization of newspaper editors, California AP News Executive Council, which set the pattern for others around the country.

Keavy was born in Minneapolis, Minn. on Dec. 24, 1902, of Irish ancestry. His newspaper career began in Sioux Falls, S.D. - where at the age of 12 he became a delivery boy for the Argus-Leader.

After a year at Columbus College there, he worked first as a reporter for the Sioux Falls Press, then as reportercolumnist for the Argus-Leader and assistant telegraph editor of

the Des Moines Tribune.

After jobs with the Milwaukee Sentinel, Cleveland Times, and Toledo News-Bee, he was hired as a city editor of the Bloomington, Ill., Pantagraph.

After joining the AP in Chicago in 1928, Keavy married Harriett MacGraw of Bloomington, whose brother Robert later became mayor of that city. Mrs. Keavy died after her Mrs. Keavy died after her husband's AP retirement.

He was founding president of Los Angeles' Catholic Press Council, for a time regent of Immaculate Heart College and board member of the Los Angeles Press Club and its 8-Ball Welfare Foundation.

At a 1967 testimonial dinner at the Ambassador Hotel which was attended by hundreds of newspaper and civic officials and show-business personalities, the Press Club's printed program said: "His personal qualities — unfailing warmth, endless enthusiasm, a rare gift for humor and a way of doing things with a flair — have made him a friend to cherish."

Keavy was also responsible for creation of a standard writing test used to appraise job applicants. First tried in Los Angeles, the test or variations of it are now used in many AP bureaus.

His writing advice to staffers was simple: Write as you talk, plainly and informally. Relax at the typewriter, but don't take the easy way and crank out the first approach that enters your head. Exercise your imagination. Seek the fresh, the novel.

"Think about every word you write," Keavy said, "and avoid nice, satisfying little ruts. Use short words, short sentences, short leads - and keep the stories short.

He told youngsters, "Develop a style, and keep your eyes off

# Jury Deliberates In Hashish Case

A federal court jury has begun deliberations in the trial of four men with ties to the Laguna Beach Hare Krishna Temple who are charged in a multimillion dollar hashish oil smuggling scheme.

Joseph Davis, 30, of Laguna Beach, is accused of being the ringleader of a group that allegedly sent couriers posing as U.S. businessmen between Pakistan and the U.S., carrying hashish oil in typewriter cases.

Also on trial in connection with the ring are Douglas H. Snyder, 26, Jack Carreras, 32, and Lawrence D. Montgomery

In all, 11 men were named in a federal grand jury indictment handed down last November.

Four defendants named in the multiple-count indictment already have pleaded guilty before federal District Judge A. Andrew Hauk

#### **Brakes Hit** In Vegas Plane Mishap

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Air California officials say a loss of brakes apparently caused a Boeing 737 to slide off a runway at McCarran International Airport, injuring six of the 26 persons aboard.

The plane, flight 805 to Orange County Airport and Sacramento, was carrying 21 passengers and five flight attendants Saturday when it plunged 50 feet off the wet runway while taxiing for takeoff about 7:10 a.m.

# Bleachers Fall; 162 Die 2 Killed

500 Injured at Colombian Bullring

SINCELEJO, Colombia (AP)

— The death toll in the collapse
of a crowded wooden grandstand
in this northern Colombian city
climbed to 162 today, police said.
The weekend accident at a bullrunning left 500 spectators ininvad.

The bleachers, an upward ex-tension of the grandstand at Colombia's largest bullring, were supported by long beams sunk into the ground. Officials said recent heavy rains softened the ground and the beams gave way under the weight of the crowd. Witnesses said that when rain started to fall, people rushing to the back of the stands where there was an overhead shelter caused the collapse.

AN ESTIMATED 40,000 fans had packed the bullring Sunday afternoon. Witnesses said about 3,000 were in the five sections that crashed down.

Each of the five sections was designed to hold about 500 persons, but witnesses said there were about 700 in each. The tragedy occurred as the fans were excitedly cheering scores of youths and men in the ring running from several bulls before the start of the bullfights.

"We were at the eastern end grandstand when suddenly I noticed that one of the sections began to fall backwards, and then the other four fell, trapping thousands of persons," said one of the spectators.

Some of the victims were impaled on the splintered beams; others were tramped by panicstricken survivors.

MANY OF THE VICTIMS were children who were seated around the ring and hit by falling debris.

All afternoon and through the night the sirens of ambulances and other vehicles helping with the victims wailed through Sincelejo and neighboring towns.

The Sincelejo hospital and a local health center were unable to handle all the casualties. Many were taken to the neighboring towns of Corozal, Cerete and Sampues.

About 300 of the injured were treated and released but 200 others were hospitalized in very serious condition, the Red Cross

IDABEL, Ukia. (AP) - Some businessmen armed themselves with rifles today following a night of shooting, rioting and burning by several hundred an-gry blacks that left two people dead and four others wounded.

An auxiliary policeman and an unidentified black man were killed in the rioting that broke out after a black youth was beaten to death early Sunday near a predominantly white night club, authorities said.

THE BODY OF another black man, believed to be in his 20s, was found this morning in tall weeds behind a service station that had been vandalized by the mob Sunday night. The cause of death was not made public immediately.

While reinforced police patrolled the mostly-quiet streets today, authorities said the discovery of the body increased tensions in black neighborhoods. Some business-men armed themselves with rifles before opening their stores this morning.

Eight persons were reported arrested in connection with the

ONLY 25 STUDENTS out of a normal enrollment of about 500 showed up for classes this morning at the high school. Attendance also was down at the junior high and the three elementary schools.

The blacks began protesting after the 15-year-old black was found beaten to death early Sunday near a bar - patronized mainly by whites - which has been the scene of several recent racial confrontations.

# Carter Edged By Kennedy

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — See. Edward M. medy has narrowly defeated President Carier California Democratic Party straw vote, and furnia Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. was a distant d choice in his home state.

Spokesmen for all three candidates claimed victories of one sort or another from the balloting Sunday among 1,471 delegates to the California Democratic Party annual convention.

Esmedy won 622 votes, or 42 percent. Carter had 538 votes for 39 percent and Brown 207 votes for 14 percent. Another 58 votes were cast "uncommitted" or for minor candidates.

IN BEALITY, THE BALLOTING had no meaning whatsoever, except for the news stories it generated on the eve of today's Iowa caucuses, which are the first step toward selection of the first 50 delegates to the Democratic National Convention were Asserted. vention next August.

Kennedy, who was in Washington, said he was "delighted" with the results.

"It clearly demonstrates that members of the Democratic Party in the nation's largest state are unwilling to accept four more years of current policies and are looking for new leadership in the 1980s," the Massachusetts senator said.

BUT KENNEDY'S VICTORY was not the landslide many observers had predicted earlier. California Democratic Party Chairman Richard O'Neill, who said he is neutral in the race, said if the balloting had been late last year, Kennedy would have won handily.

"I don't know if any of the candidates won," O'Neill said, adding that Kennedy's victory "is not as important as if he'd gotten over 50 percent."

But in sharply contradictory statements, spokesmen for all three candidates each claimed the results were better than they expected.

"I think the fact that at the height of the international crisis, with this convention heavily weighted with people in political office, where the incumbency of the presidency is an additional advantage, the fact that we came out ahead here is something close to a miracle," said former New York congressman Allard Lowenstein, who led the

"WE THINK IT'S VERY significant that the Carter-Mondale campaign made such a great comeback," said Lees Francis, national staff director of the Carter campaign.

"The people who come to conventions are activists. They're the kind of people who ought to be in Kennedy's back pocket. And yet we fell short by only 39 votes," said state Assemblyman Michael Roos, Carter's California campaign chairman.

Brown's chief spokesman, chief of staff Gray Davis, who earlier had said the straw vote was meaningless, also saw encouragement in Brown's 14 percent showing.

THE GOVERNOR DID better than either of his rivals anticipated. We made only a very modest effort. Dick O'Neill said at the start of the convention we'd be lucky to get 10 percent. We improved on that quite a bit and we're pleased,"

The straw vote results conflicted with results reported Saturday of a mail poll of about 1,000 contributors to the California Democratic Party. Carter won the mail ballot with 57 percent to 36 percent for Kennedy and 7 percent for Brown.

California's 306 national convention delegates will be selected in a June 3 primary, and O'Neill said he organized the straw vote only to "liven up"

an otherwise routine party platform convention. Although none of the three presidential candidates appeared in person, O'Neill did liven up the convention. It attracted more than a dozen top political celebrities representing the three candidates and a delegate turnout about double normal for the convention.

APPEARING FOR CARTER, who was opposed by feminist leaders for not doing enough to enact the Equal Rights Amendment, Health and Welfare Secretary Patricia Harris declared that the Carter Administration "has been the best in history in its record of appointments of women, blacks, Hispanics and other minorities.'

Among a half-dezen standins representing Kennedy, economist John Kenneth Galbraith condemned Carter for allowing inflation to get out of control and then attempting to create a recession to cure the inflation.

'It is the final irony that, for a year, having tried to produce a recession, they haven't even achieved that," Galbraith said.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The publisher of a respected oil industry survey, who sees the world energy situation turning into an escalating economic war for many nations, says a hemispheric energy conference should be called for the Americas.

Dan Lundberg, who publishes the weekly Lundberg Letter, said in a telephone interview Sunday that the aim of the conference should be discussion of a "regional energy tetente."

While calling for a system of long-delayed assistance to less fortunate nations in the Western Hemisphere, Lundberg stressed that

his intent in calling for such a co ference is not to split up the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries cartel.

# Road Financing **Must Be Shared**

Approval of two adjacent major residential develop-ments in the foothills between El Toro and the Cleveland National Forest is going to bring more traffic problems to

clogged El Toro Road. One of the proposals calls for the development of 960 residential units on property at the Glenn Ranch.

The second calls for 706 units across the street in the Saddleback Meadows project, Orange County's first ownyour-own lot mobile home park.

Together, the two projects will bring more than 1,600 new homes to a rural area in which El Toro Road provides the only access.

#### **Truth Too Dangerous**

The "kill the messenger" syndrome still flourishes in Iran and Afghanistan but, these being more civilized days, the offended victims of bad news are settling for exile rather than beheading of the messengers — in this case American journalists.

Our journalists were welcome enough in Iran when they turned their television cameras on shouting mobs outside the American embassy where our hostages were

Apparently the misguided leaders of that land had persuaded themselves that a first-hand view of their "revolution" would inspire the American people to rise up in their defense.

It didn't work of course.

But the real problem arose when the journalists, apprised of anti-Khomeini uprisings in the north, turned their cameras and microphones in that direction.

When crude censorship of television broadcasts of the counter-revolution was ineffective, the journalists were summarily ordered out of the country.

Similarly, in Afghanistan, there was no move to impede reports and filming of the arrival of Soviet troops to 'help'' that small nation. But when reporters revealed it was the Soviets who had ordered the execution of the leader they supposedly had come to help, and went on to report Soviet losses in fighting with the tough rebels in the mountains, the Americans once more were ordered out

Of course, with a totally controlled press in both these countries and in the Soviet Union, the people of these lands can simply be fed the lie that the journalists were really spies and agitators in disguise. They'll never know the difference.

There are those in this country who seem to feel the press sometimes goes too far in unveiling the flaws in our

own government and the warts on our leaders. True, the press sometimes is shrill. But is enforced silence the better alternative? Apparently the Soviets and the Iranians believe so. Sudden doses of truth can be very upsetting to a subjugated people, and very dangerous to totalitarian government.

# U.S. Technology - Soviet Deceit

WASHINGTON — In his righteous indignation at the Russian rape of Afghanistan, Jimmy Carter has understandably chosen to ignore the valuable help given to the Soviet invasion by the United States: Many of the Russian soldiers now occupying Afghanistan rode across the border in trucks that were built with American technology, supplied in the holy name of detente.

Though initial responsibility for the American technical aid and the



outrageously lax safe. guards under which ib was provided be laid at the door of Richard Nixon and Henry Kissinger, the

Carter administration cannot escape a good share of the blame. When a middle-echelon Commerce Department official blew the whistle last year on the Soviet's misuse of U.S. technology, his warnings were disregarded by his superiors and he was denounced as a troublemaker

THE PRESIDENT tacitly admitted that U.S. technical aid is important to the Soviets when he announced that shipments of sophisticated industrial equipment would be suspended as a result of the aggression in Afghanistan. He declined, however, to go into specifics, which would have made clear how he and his predecessors were duped by the Russians in a single-minded U.S. pursuit of detente.

From confidential documents and knowledgeable sources who talked to my reporters Dale Van Atta and Mark Zusman, I can now provide details of the way Carter's policymakers were led down the primrose path by the Kremlin's palace elite.

Back in the early 1970s when Secretary of State Kissinger was seeking glory as the architect of detente, the export of advanced industrial machinery, including IBM computers, for the Soviets'

HEAVENS TO BETSY, I HAD NO IDEA A TEDDY BEAR COULD BE SO MASTY! MIND IF I HIDE OUT WITH Y'ALL. gigantic Kama River truck factory was approved at the highest levels. At the time, some officials, including then-Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird, voiced

KISSINGER brushed the misgivings aside. A confidential Commerce Department memorandum states that in 1971 Kissinger 'ordered the Secretary of Commerce to grant three pending applications" for construction of the Soviet plant. Another secret memo set the final value of U.S.-licensed equipment and technology at \$1.5 billion. A major U.S. news magazine described the Kama River plant as "a living symbol of how detente can work

concern that the Russians might

use the central Asian truck plant

- the biggest in the world - to

produce military equipment.

Others - notably our Western European allies — were not so sure. On March 20, 1975, Kissinger cabled U.S. officials in Paris on the best way to allay such doubts. "Kama trucks are not tactical military vehicles with cross-country capability," the secret cable said. "Some may ultimately be outfitted with front-wheel drive for muddy or icy environments. However, trucks will not be equipped for deepforwarding or have other features typical of military models." Kissinger's cable concluded

that "we see little likelihood of diversion" to military uses. The American officials were instructed to belittle any odious comparison between the Kama plant and a Czechoslovakian truck plant that produced military vehicles — and for which a U.S. license was rejected in 1970. DESPITE Kissinger's un-

characteristic confidence in the Soviets' good faith, Commerce Department officials were alerted by intelligence officials last ear to the fact that the Russians were producing 100,000 more engines than trucks at Kama River, and were warned that the engines "undoubtedly were to be used in military trucks.

When this serious breach of the intent of the U.S. licensing program was pointed out by a

Commerce Department analyst, Larry Brady, his boss, Stanley Marcuss, and then-Secretary Juanita Kreps gave Congress an astonishing explanation: Technically, the Russians hadn't violated the licensing agreement, because they had never signed the standard promise that the U.S.-supplied technology would not be used for military purposes. That part of the license application had mysteriously been left blank.

FOR CALLING attention to the serious weaknesses in the technological export program, Brady was demoted, ostracized and threatened with firing. Brady's superiors have also circulated secret internal memos intended to discredit his whistleblowing.

Because Nixon and Carter officials naively discounted the possibility of Soviet skulduggery, the Russians were able to invade Afghanistan in American-engineered trucks Detente is dead, but the Afghan people will be haunted by its ghost for years to come.

# **Boat Owners Slip Away From Tax Burden**

Those who enjoy visiting the marinas around the state on a Sunday outing to view the array of wealth represented by the thousands of boats moored within them, may also wonder at times how so

many people can afford them. Certainly such thoughts must pass through the minds of some as they gaze at the magnificent

luxury yachts which cost well into the hundreds of thousands.

Now it comes out that maybe some who own these expensive boats really can't afford them. For the State Board of Equalization, which enforces the tax laws, reports that many of the boat owners are evading personal property and sales taxes.

The boats are supposed to be California taxes entirely by reg- estimate the total of such boats assessed by the county assessors each year. But the assessment date falls on March 1 and, reportedly, many boat owners avoid the hooks of the assessors by suddenly finding an urgent need to put to sea, thus escaping the property tax.

ANYWAY, it would seem with more than 550,000 registered in California the assessor has an impossible job to identify and appraise each boat.

Actually, as it works out, it apparently isn't as big a job as the numbers would indicate, since most of those registered are small craft, not even moored in marinas, but transported to the water when the mood for a "cruise" strikes the owners.

Of the total number, however, a substantial percentage are larger craft, where assessments become more than minimal.

Some of the foxier large boat owners attempt to escape istering their boats in Oregon, a state that has no personal property tax on boats or sales

THUS A BOAT, even though purchased in California, can evade both taxes by registering the boat at time of acquisition with an out of state address such as Oregon. But California tax authorities

have caught on to the game and joined with Oregon officials to hunt down the tax jumpers. Allen Swenson, Coos County tax assessor, reports that many boats giving their home port as Coos Bay have never been there but are actually based in Washington and California and even Texas and Florida.

Searches by California officials find many of these boats snugly harbored at Newport Beach, San Diego, Santa Barbara and in San Francisco Bay marinas. While they

to be as high as 600, it might be double that for all they know

CALIFORNIA LAW provides that boats purchased here for use here are subject to the 6 percent sales tax. It also provides that any boat in California waters for more than 30 days is subject to the property tax.

In the case of a yacht costing \$400,000 the sales tax would amount to \$24,000 and the annual property tax would probably be around \$13,000. Last year the state discovered 100 boats improperly registered. The boats averaged \$78,000 in value. This represents tax evasions totalling \$500,000 in sales tax alone, plus property taxes which would total even more.

For those who get caught it means a 10 percent penalty, plus interest on the sales tax, plus the property taxes. If fraud is proved, the penalty is 25 per-

#### **Dry Beans Government Graded**

DEAR PAT: Does the government grade dry beans that are sold in supermarkets? A friend gave me several good recipes that call for their use, and I'd like to know how to tell which ones are good quality. Also, exactly how do you prepare dry beans before using them in a recipe?

J.W., Corona del Mar

Many of the dry beans you see in the supermarket have been graded for quality by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, but these grades seldom appear on consumer-size packages. In most cases, you will have to be your own 'grader." When beans don't have bright, uniform color, it may indicate long storage, lack of freshness, and a product that will take a long time to cook. Color of the beans, however, won't affect their eating quality. Avoid mixed sizes that will re sult in uneven cooking, since smaller beans cook faster than larger ones. Don't buy beans that have cracked seed coats, foreign material, and pinholes caused by insect damage. After buying, store in tightly covered containers in a cool, dry place. Don't mix newly purchased beans with older ones. This can result in uneven cooking, since older beans take longer to cook.

When preparing dry beans for any dish, wash them first. Then soak to reduce cooking time. To speed the soaking process, boil the beans for two minutes, remove from heat and soak for one hour. Add spices and other seasonings after soaking to avoid toughening the surface of the beans and increasing cooking time. Boil gently and stir very little in order to prevent breaking skins. And remember that one cup of dry beans can yield up to two and three-quarters cups of cooked beans, de-

pending on the variety.

#### Inflation-income Rises Fast

DEAR PAT: At the current rate of inflation, can you tell me how much a person earning \$20,000 a year today would have to earn five years from now just to stay even?

K.P., Fountain Valley The current rate of inflation is about 13 percent. Even without compounding, the rate of interest for five years would be 65 percent. This increase in a \$20,000 income would make it \$33,000 and taking into account that the 13 percent applies to each year's higher income, the total five-year income would make it larger - in this case,



Swann's claim got a vote of support from an even higher authority than Bradshaw — Steelers Coach Chuck Noll.

Mean Joe Greene and most of the other Steeler players sidestepped the question.

Greatest team ever? I don't know. For the past six years, I know we've been damned good,"

"Well, I don't know about the greatest team ever, but I guess you could say we've got a dynasty going now," said wide receiver John Stallworth, who caught a 73-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter to turn a 19-17 deficit into a 24-19 Steeler lead.

Stallworth finished with three catches for 121 yards, and Bradshaw felt Stallworth deserved serious consideration for the Super Bowl MVP award. Bradshaw himself got the honor, his second in a row.

'IF I WERE VOTING, I would have picked either Larry Anderson or John Stallworth." Bradshaw said, "Stallworth's catches were very important. I throw them, but somebody's got to catch them."

After further consideration, Bradshaw shifted to Anderson's case.

"Anderson played a heckuva game. He should have been the MVP," the quarterback said. Anderson returned five kickoffs for 162 yards,

the longest a 45-yarder. "We knew Anderson was going to do something special before the game," Bradshaw said. "The way he was walking around, the look in his eyes. You could just feel it.

Bradshaw isn't about to make any claims as a psychic, however.

Before the game I had a thought - 28-7, with us winning. That would be the score," Bradshaw said. "And I thought (wide receiver) Bennie Cunningham would be the difference. Shows how

# Yes, the Rams **DID** Belong

PASADENA-It was a long procession of quiet Los Angeles Rams that filed into their locker room at the Rose Bowl Sunday.

The players moved slowly, saying nothing. It was evident by their jerseys and their facial expressions that they had been in a battle.

But as emotionally drained and as physically beaten as they were, the Rams were holding their heads high. One must remember that this was a Los Angeles team that supposedly didn't belong on the same field with the World Champion Pittsburgh Steelers; a team that many in the NFL said was lucky to even be there; a team that was a 101/2-point underdog.

Well, if there's one thing the Rams did prove in their 31-19 Super Bowl XIV loss, it was that they DID belong. That they weren't lucky. And that they were indeed a worthy NFC represen-

THE RAMS PROVED to more than 90 million people on national television and 103,985 at the Rose Bowl that a team riddled with injuries and adversity can bounce back and play anybody on any given day. The Rams not only gave it everything they had, they gave it their hearts.

Only two plays-Terry Bradshaw's bombs to Lynn Swann (47 yards) and John Stallworth (73 yards)- kept the Rams from winning in their first try since 1955 for the NFL Championship. The rest of the time the club not only played the Steelers on their own terms but beat them at their own game.

The Rams never gave up; they never quit. And that's what most of the players were talking about after the game.

The emotion and the scars of the long afternoon were still visible. Jack Youngblood had his head resting in a towel, the nerves of the contest so gut-wrenching he was having a hard time trying to keep himself in one piece.

LARRY BROOKS WAS so exhausted he couldn't get out of his chair. Wendell Tyler, plagued by stomach problems all day, didn't find conditions any better in his cubicle. And Fred Dryer, maybe, typified them all as he patiently answered questions from the media with a gruesome-looking bloodied right ear.

The players spoke quietly, but

proudly:
"We showed some people we could play football today," said rookie guard Kent Hill. "We wanted to go out and get some

respect. I feel inside that we did that, but you never know how they (people) feel out there.

'Nothing takes the place of winning but we can keep our heads up. Maybe another day, another time, things might have turned out different. But the game was played today and we lost.


"I think we made a little bit of a mark," said Fred Dryer.

"I know how they felt, because I went so many years myself in frustration," the white-haired chairman of the board said after his Steelers had beaten the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 in the Poses Rowl

Rams 31-19 in the Rose Bowl.

"They played a wonderful game, those boys from Los Angeles," said Rooney, who will be 79 in six days. "They should be proud. Just as I am proud of my boys, These are the most gentlemanly fellows I have ever had. None of them ever gets fat-headed."

The colorful Rooney, who purchased the Pittsburgh franchise in 1933 for \$12,000 which friends say he won at a received went at years before he saw his team win a Na-

racetrack, went 41 years before he saw his team win a National Football League championship.

The Steelers won their first title in 1974, repeated in 1975 and came back to win again last year. Rooney, son of a Pittsburgh saloon-keeper, lives in a house he has occupied for 40 years. He was designated to toss

the opening coin before Sunday's game. 'I don't know why they selected me," he said, almost apologetically. "It was all right when George Halas did it last

year. But it was a surprise when they picked me. He was driven into the stadium in an open antique automobile and taken off in a golf cart after swapping pleasantries with Georgia Rosenbloom, owner and president of the Rams since the death last year of her husband, Carroll.

The unpretentious Steeler owner, who wears thick glasses, puffed constantly on a cigar but moved crisply from the field to his position on the roof of the Rose Bowl stadium.

"That referee kept my coin," he said, appearing to be a little ill at ease. "I have asked Jack Hand (an assistant to NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle) to get it back for me."

Traffic on incoming roads at 1:30 when the pre-game show went on the air, was backed up in all directions. Then with less than 45 minutes to game time, large throngs were outside the gates trying to get in. With a half hour to go, the same crowds were backed up from the tunnels leading to the inside of the stadium and many were fortunate to get to their seats in time for the kickoff.

The largest Terrible Towel was displayed on the field just prior to the game and it seemed to hype the Pittsburgh fans into a near frenzy. There were 34 Steeler fans moving the towel about the field. . . United Airlines hostesses served as press box hostesses for the game but they were careful to dress in brown uniforms and not give either team an edge with a blue or black outfit. Most were secretly pulling for the Rams. Perhaps it's because most of them are based in Los Angeles.

In the parking lots several hours before game time, people were carrying signs stating, "I need a ticket" and some were asking for more than one. What price they would be willing to pay was not in evidence. . . The large contingent of media personnel (more than 2,100) was the largest ever for a Super Bowl. Many were seated in an auxiliary area outside the press box leading one scribe to state: "Why are all these people here when they could see it just as well on television?"

# U.S. Committee To Poll Athletes

The U.S. Olympic Committee, facing an appeal by President Carter and sharply divided opinions from American athletes, will meet next weekend to con-sider the possibility of not sending a team to Moscow for the Summer Olympic Games.

"That will be one matter dis-cussed, among others," says Col. Donald F. Miller, executive director of the USOC. "All options and alternatives will be properly discussed."

AT THIS TIME as well, the USOC will poll thousands of prospective American Olympic athletes in hopes of getting a feel of the national pulse on the sub-In addition to the USOC affair

in Colorado Springs, Colo., on Jan. 26 and 27, Miller said Sunday that he has arranged a subsequent meeting between representatives of his organization and Ireland's Lord Killanin, president of the International Olympic Committe, to discuss "all aspects of this difficult and sensitive situation."

The meeting with Killanin was scheduled to take place Feb. 8, 9 or 10 at the IOC meeting at Lake Placid, N. Y., according to a statement from Miller.

"THE USOC HAS a trust in representing our American athletes in the international Olympic movement - both the athletes of this generation and those of future generations,' said Miller, "We believe that the President of the United States recognizes that trust.

Killanin, meanwhile, has reaffirmed his insistence that the 1980 Summer Olympic Games cannot be shifted from Moscow.

'There is no question of their being moved to another venue. Killanin was quoted today in The Times of London. "This is a

time for cool heads and quiet voices."

He again said, as he did last week, that the 1980 Games were awarded to the Soviet Union in 1974, and unless the Soviets break the terms of that binding agreement, the Games cannot legally be moved.

"THIS DOES NOT mean that I or the IOC are condoning the political action taken by the host country," Killanin, in a weekend interview in Dublin, said of Russia's recent military intervention in Afgfranistan. "But if we started to make political judgments it would be the end of the Games."

The reaction from the Olympic chief and his American counterpart came as a result of Carter's nationally-televised appeal Sunday for the Summer Olympics to be moved out of Moscow, postponed or canceled if the Soviet Union does not pull its troops out of Afghanistan in a month. Carter also urged that both the Summer and Winter Games be moved to a permanent site in Greece, where the modern Olympics began in 1896.

ALTHOUGH CARTER has no legal authority to block sending American athletes to Moscow, the President said he sent a message to the USOC on Sunday in which he outlined his position and urged that the organization present his views to the IOC, the only group that can move the Games.

In his appeal, Carter was especially careful to stay away from the term "boycott," a fact which was entirely significant to Robert F. Kane, president of the U.S. Olympic Committee.

'I was very pleased that he did not advocate a boycott, because I think a boycott is a most inappropriate tactic," said



"Mostly, we've arrested ticket scalpers and drunks," he said, There were some robberies. some motor homes were broken into, a golf cart was stolen — but most of the arrests fall into a category we call 'things related to the Super Bowl'."

THE IMPOUND ROOM was full of Super Bowl souvenirs con-fiscated because the sellers had no vending licenses and some had violated the National Football League copyright, Sgt. Don Silverman said.

One 59-year-old Escondido man lost \$170 in cash and about \$900 in jewelry when two men robbed his mobile home, which was parked near the Rose Bowl, police said. But no one was ar-

# Ficker Quicker?

#### 12-meter Yachts Duel

The 1970 catch-phrase, "Ficker Is Quicker," heralding Newport Harbor Yacht Club's Bill Ficker defense of the prestigious America's Cup, proved

true only once a decade later. Ficker, at the helm of the new 12-meter Freedom, was quicker than Dennis Conner of San Diego, steering the three-year old Enterprise, on a downwind jibing duel in the second race Sunday, overcoming a lead held by Conner on the windward leg.

Ficker then held the lead and went on to win by one minute and 20 seconds in a brisk Santana wind.

BUT IN THE FIRST race. marked by fluky winds, Conner steered Enterprise to a 48second win over Freedom.

So the question of which 12meter, Freedom or Enterprise, is the fastest apparently hinges on who is at the helm. In Saturday's two races in a light westerly breeze, Conner sailed Freedom to two decisive wins over Ficker in Enterprise.

The Newport series is part of a winter training campaign to de-termine which of the two pachts will be sailed by Conner in the America's Cup trials starting in June at Newport, R.I.

AFTER TWO MONTHS of sailing at San Diego, Conner still contends that the only difference in the two boats is that Freedom is blue and Enterprise white and that one yacht has two steering wheels and the other one.

The spectator fleet for Sunday's two races was conspicuous by its absence as most yachting fans stayed home to watch Super Bowl XIV. The often blustery Santana wind also kept a number of boats in their

Next appearance of the two Twelves will be at Marina del Rey where they will compete in California Yacht Club's Cal Cup match racing Series March 21-22-23. Conner will steer one of the boats but has not yet named the skipper of the other.

# Copying Works

By MILTON MOSKOWITZ

Innovation has often been touted as the key to success in business. Come up with new products and you supposedly confound competitors and win the day. But now there's a new rule: be a copycat.

A Chicago company, Helene Curtis Industries, has been employing that strategy to good effect. Its Suave hair care products have tripled their sales since 1974 simply by telling consumers that they do what the big-name brands do — at a lower price.

do — at a lower price. Helene Curtis looks at what other companies are selling and then moves in with a similar product that



NOW ANOTHER COMPANY seems to have hopped on this bandwagon. Steven W. Lapham, who is director of new products for the Lehn & Fink division of Sterling Drug, has put forth the theory: "replicate - don't in-

Lapham, in a presentation he made recently at a marketing conference, argued that it's silly to spend a lot of time developing new products when you can just copy ones that are already out there.

He pointed out that it's not always true that the victory goes to the one first in the market. Jell-O pudding, for example, came six years after My-T-Fine. Country Time lemonade followed Wyler's. Revion's Flex shampoo was introduced after Wella Balsam.

YOU DO HAVE to be careful, though. Lapham advised his colleagues to conduct research on a product already in the market just to be sure that it enjoys consumer acceptance before launching your own version. Also, you should confirm that the market is big enough to support two brands. And once you have done that, "be first to be second." In short, don't let anyone else copy before you do.

Lapham described how his own company has put this copycatting to work. They heard how a competitor, Airwick, had come up with a new product called Carpet Fresh. "Quite frankly," said Lapham, "we found it pretty hard to believe that Carpet Fresh had any potential at all. After all, what housewife in her right mind would sprinkle a white powder onto her carpeting before vacuuming? Who dirties their carpet first?"

Well, Carpet Fresh turned out to be a winner in the

marketplace - and so in late 1978 Lehn & Fink decided to enter the market. In six months it had a competing product in national distribution. Its name: Love My Carpet; You can move quickly when you're copying someone else's

LAPHAM CONCLUDED by stating that one of the greatest myths" of new product development is that the

only way to do it is by innovation. Don't forget duplication.

So if you want to break into the consumer marketplace, don't worry about setting up a laboratory to discover new products. Just look around and see which ones you might be able to copy successfully. 



#### **Moment of Death on TV** Losing Cancer Fight on Screen Tonight

BOSTON (AP) - Joan Robinson died, of cancer. She died after 22 months of pain and drugs and operations. She died on camera.

Mrs. Robinson was 41 when a tumor was found in her ovaries. The cancer was advanced. She knew she was terminally ill, but as a writer, she saw a story she wanted to tell.

TOO WEAK TO write about her agonies, she asked a film producer friend, Mar. Feldhaus-Weber, to make a movie of her ebbing life. With the help of her husband and her doctors, she fought cancer and lost - on

From the time she was nosed to the night she died at University Hospital in Boston, the cameras stayed with her. The result is "Joan Robinson: One Woman's Story," a 21/2-hour program being shown tonight on most stations affiliated with the Public Broadcasting Service. (Channel 50, 7:30 p.m.) Channel

8, 8:30 p.m.) It is a harrowing, often gruesome picture of the jndignities, frustrations and occasional rewards in the process of death.

BECAUSE THE program is so graphic and deals so directly with death, the producers supplied a half-hour followup program. Some stations around the country produced their own programs, featuring cancer specialists and relatives of cancer patients. (Channel 50, 10 p.m., Channel 28, 22 p.m., 2:05

"One Woman's Story. Early in the program, Mrs. Hobinson, who had worked for Seventeen magazine, explained why she was willing to surrender her privacy to die on camera.

"IT'S A CHALLENGE," she said. "It gives me-something to do. It's a form of communication. It appeals to that pro-

fessional aspect of me. "It also appeals to the part of me that wants to have part of

me go on after I'm dead. It appeals to that part of me that wants to do something worthwhile for others, and maybe this will be."

When they had finished, the crew had recorded more than 100,000 feet of film, 50 hours of videotape, 100 hours of sound and 2,000 still-photographs. Although Mrs. Robinson died four years ago, the program was delayed until the filmmakers obtained financing.



Seniors Reach Out Project PACE, a mobile

Depression, loneliness and grief are a few of the psychological problems facing many of peer counselors to help deal Orange County's senior citizens.

Adolph Stofferan figures he's gone through just about every emotion a human being can encounter in a

"I've been to the top of the ladder and to the bottom of the barrel," he says. I've experienced every sensation in life, except death.

And a part of Adolph Stofferan died when Elsie, his wife of 49 years and nine months passed away.

"My wife left me five years ago and I never got over it," he says, adding that Mrs. Stofferan had undergone open heart surgery a decade earlier

In that 10 years I got to appreciate her more because I did everything. Then he was alone, and the loneliness he experienced, he says, "bordered on

insanity. I would spend my days wondering what to do. THE RETIRED ACCOUNTANT'S life was turned around when he got involved

in Project TLC, the nutrition, socialization and activity program for senior TLC, says Stofferan with a big smile.

'has become something of a hobby of The Santa Ana man's hobby is taking

on a new twist this month as he and 19 other older Orange countians undergo training to become peer counselors for

a new senior citizen program.

"It sounded like something I would like to do," says Stofferan. "I have an uncanny ability to put myself in someone else's shoes. I think I can apply most of my experiences."

The program is called Project PACE (Psychological Alternative Counseling for Elders). It is sponsored by Feedback Foundation, Inc., the Santa Anabased organization that sponsors TLC.

PROJECT PACE, WHICH receives revenue sharing funds, started last October when it began sending a mobile counseling team to TLC sites and senior centers throughout the county.

In addition to providing individual and family counseling and a referral service, the program offered a six week group workshop that allowed seniors to discuss depression, loneliness, grief, alcoholism, suicide and other psychological problems of aging

The volunteer peer counselors, who have just begun an intensive five week training program, were chosen from among the workshop participants

'I'm asking them to commit themselves to one year.' says Christopher Hayes, Project PACE director. "It involves a lot of commitment, no pay and a lot of training

They will receive enough training to develop empathy, respect, genuineness all the qualities needed to develop a good counselor."

counseling service, is training

with these problems.

WHEN ASKED WHY they wanted to become peer counselors. Hayes says, most responded by saying, "I really care and just want to reach out."

And, adds Hayes, "What better way to get out of your own loneliness than to reach out?

The reason Project PACE began was because Hayes felt the psychological problems of the county's elderly were not being adequately addressed.

He emphasizes that the county mental health department was doing its best to meet those needs. But largely because of Proposition 13 cutbacks, he says, not enough could be done.

There is a lack of individuals trained to deal with the elderly," says Hayes, adding, "there needed to be an agency to pick up the slack.

ALTHOUGH PROJECT PACE is picking up part of the slack, counselors still face resistance from many seniors who are not used to discussing personal problems with outsiders.

'One of the hardest things we're overcoming is seniors stereotyping mental health with a dungeon - a feeling that theyr'e going to be institutionalized." says Hayes.

# Falling In Love Takes Courage

'Many people have deep doubts about whether it's okay for them to be happy,' says Dr. Nathaniel Branden. These doubts often are transformed into self-fulfilling prophecies.

Mention the word love and you've got an audience. Advertise a talk on romantic relationships and you've got a crowd.

Nathaniel Branden, author and director of the Biocentric Institute, Los Angeles, spoke on self-esteem and romantic relationships and drew an overflow crowd at the Marriott Hotel, Newport Beach. Most people supposedly come

talks to get a little help with their lives, but one audience member perhaps told the truth: 'They want to meet that special someone,'

But Dr. Branden threw the audience a curve "Have I found 'Mr or Miss Right' is not a legitimate question," he said. "What good is it if I'm afraid of excitement and vulnerability?"

THE BOTTOM LINE, he said, is that people must have their self-esteem in order and be willing to risk if they are to make a

relationship work, even with the most perfect

Dr. Branden, who has had two happy marriages (his first wife was killed in an accident), said the foremost obstacle to people being happy is that they doubt that they de-

He added, "Many people have a lot of deep doubts about whether it's okay for them to be happy."

These doubts often are transformed into "self-fulfilling prophecies," Dr. Branden said, and when the relationship ends, the doubter is convinced even more he's undeserving of love. 'Most of us grow up with lots of

messages telling us it's not okay to be happy," he said. "We get a happiness anxiety. Learning how to handle this is a problem. 'We're scared of disaster so we defend

before the disaster then we make the disaster happen. We're scared of being hurt and re-

So falling in love is frightening, Dr.

Branden noted. "It requires courage to let someone into your private world.

BUT KNOWING that being in love is scary is a protection, he said. "The safety lies in owning and expressing that fear.

By admitting the fear, a bond is created between partners, Dr. Branden said. "You keep the bridge between you and your partner with words."

Another problem with relationships, he added, is that many people are uncomfortable with being touched.

"But, we all have a deep organic need to be touched," he said. "There's a lot of body contact in good relationships.

'We all want to feel valued by another human being. The first part is in being held A good relationship also has a lot of

nurturing in it, Dr. Branden stressed, and part of that is paying attention to feelings.

"Love requires an extraordinary con sciousness, you can't do it comatose. Nourishing comes from self-esteem and

Dr Branden said some people attack love by treating it as "something transitory, then questioned why some relationships thrive after 25 and 30 years

PART OF IT is the excitement both partners in such a marriage feel about life.

"Most people are burned out at 35 and believe that time is something to be killed." he said "Why do people allow themselves to be extinguished?

It starts in childhood, Dr. Branden said. Most children experience most adults as the enemy of their excitement.

Children get the message that it's wrong to be excited. The better they get at it the more boring they are

Never marry a person you do not experience to be a friend of your excitement," Dr. Branden cautioned "Two people should keep energizing their excitement.

Rape: Reality At UCI

A rape awareness program at UCI is trying to combat the image of the university as a protected shelter from sexual assault and other crimes.

The intruder strolled from door to door, quietly jiggling doorknobs at UC Irvine's Mesa Court dormitory com-

At 4:30 in the morning, he opened an outer suite door and easily found a second unlocked door, leading to a room housing a pair of sleeping coeds.

As one awoke from the sound of his movements he placed his hand over her mouth, removed her nightwear and

The noise of the assault awakened the rape victim's roomate. However, she remained in bed, thinking the intruder was a boyfriend.

UCI POLICE RECORDS show that rapes at the university are rare occurrences. The Mesa Court rape was one of two reported last year. In 1978 there was one reported rape and none were reported in 1977.

But campus police and rape preven-tion groups are quick to point out that

It's a misconception that UCI, sur-rounded by bomes priced in the six-digit range, rolling hills and wildlife preserves, is a haven from crime, said UCI Police Chief Mike Michell, a member of a campuswide advisory committee to "We have problems in the Irvine community that are not different from

the rest of the state," said Michell, who participated in rape prevention programs during previous duty with UC Berkeley campus police.

"We have to deal with what has been reported to police," he added. "Statistically, we don't know how many actual rapes have occurred." The LEAA grant specifies that rape

education programs should be conducted in small group discussions with the campus community. Ms. Hummer visits a number of social science classes, holds meetings

formation through campus dormitories. "WE FEEL THAT the discussion group, instead of lectures, will bring out the concerns of different groups of peo-

The goal of the program is to change the behavior and attitudes of the campus community, Ms. Hummer said, especially in the area of reporting rape assaults to law enforcement officials.

"The program is aimed at preventing

people from taking unnecessary risks, she added. "You're not in an ivory tower, it has happened here and it can

happen to you.

"But people should not consider the whole rape awareness program as being paranoid. They should be aware and careful. And if they are fearful, they should listen to their fears and do something about them.

STERLING, Va. (AP) - Excommunication from the Mormon Church has brought Sonia Johnson triumph and strain. Her latest trauma is the breakup of her mar-

She is a heroine to feminists, the object of scorn at her church.
"It's grim," Mrs. Johnson says.

"I feel spiritually amputated Suddenly, all the world is knock-ing on her door: She's had to install a second telephone; letters arrive 100 at a time; she is in constant demand to speak out for the proposed Equal Rights Amend-

But at home, life as a Mormonin-exile is not comfortable. She still goes to her old church, she says, "but it's painful.

When the bishop's wife stood up at services and thanked everyone for sustaining her and her husband during the excommunication ordeal, Mrs. Johnson says she wondered, "What about my ordeal?"

"Excommunication is just the ultimate rejection," she says with a shake of her head. "It just says, We don't want you,' no matter how much they say they love me."

"BETTER ACCESS to campus police will make the police more sensitive to the issue of rape," she said. "We think it's going to encourage people to report because they'll have more confidence in the (legal) processes."

The UCI rape program already has coordinated the rape response procedures of UCI Medical Center and the campus student health service. A specific protocol has been set up to both ease the emotional trauma of the rape victim and speed up notification of police officials.

Last month, the 14-member advisory committee held a night walk through the Irvine campus to correct poor pathway lighting.

"But you're only as safe as you make yourself," Ms. Hummer said. "You can have a million police but you're not going to be safe unless you have them at your side."

Police Chief Michell said that skyrocketing housing cost may double the number of persons living on campus to 5,000 in five years. As the campus population increases, higher crime rates may follow, he said.

"Unfortunately, university campuses are not islands within the broader community because we are open cam-puses." he added. "We can't exert unrealistic security measures, but we can try to improve the level of awareness of rape on campus."



# Seacliff Proposals Disturb Builder

Conditions described by a Huntington Beach Company of-ficial as "killers" have been recommended by the state Coastal Commission staff for the \$31-home Deacliff IV housing de-velopment overlooking the Bolsa

The state commission is scheduled to consider the development project late Wednesday afternoon at the Airport Marina Hotel in Los Angeles.

The project was approved last December by the South Coast Regional Commission meeting in Huntington Beach.

That approval was appealed to the parent state commission in January by Steve Schumacher of Huntington Beach, Dorothy McAleavey and others of the

Long Beach area and by Amigos de Bolsa Chica, a conservation-

oriented group.

Jan Tulk, commission permit appeals director, said today in San Francisco that the commission staff is recommending approval of the Seacliff IV project, subject to conditions.

Included is a proposal that Huntington Beach Company construct some 80 low and moderate cost housing on 22 acres of mesa land immediately south of the development.

The company had proposed filling low cost housing requirements by building them on land farther inland on property closer to city hall

The staff also recommends, she said, that the project be moved 100 feet further back from the bluffs overlooking the

**Dollar Steadies** 

Bolsa Chica marshland, an ecologically sensitive area.

Also she said, the staff proposes that the company restrict the deeds to land near Pacific Coast Highway in the area to limit future developments to commercial-recreation.

Dave Eable, project coordinator for the Huntington Beach Company, called the conditions "killers

He noted that moving the project back 100 feet more to make way for a wider public park overlooking the Bolsa Chica would result in total replanning of portions of the project.

He said the company will go through the current appeals process and then make a decision whether or not to go ahead depending on how stringent the final modification orders are.

By The Associated Press U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim says he hopes a plan devised during his visit to Iran will lead to the release of the American hostages in Tehran. But the Iranian militants holding the Americans captive still insist the deposed shah must be returned before the hostages are freed.

We have worked out a mechanism . . . and I hope this mechanism will make it possible to satisfy the government of Iran and lead to release of the hostages," Waldheim told reporters Sunday in New Delhi,

The U.N. chief would give no details of his plan. But after his visit to Tehran, Iranian officials said he proposed setting up a U.N. commission to investigate the Iranian revolutionary regime's charges against the deposed shah.

At the time, Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh welcomed the proposal. But he said the commission's findings would not be binding on Iran, and the hostages would not be released until the shah was returned.

Ghotbzadeh repeated this stand Saturday, telling a French interviewer that the return of the shah, now living in Panama, was the only way out

of the impasse.
"It's easy," he said. "They give us the shah. We give them

the hostages. A spokesman for the militants holding the hostages, reached by telephone Sunday at the occupied U.S. Embassy, said: 'Nothing would possibly lead to the release of the hostages but the extradition of the deposed shah and the return of his

Sinclair said events in Iran and Afghanistan, as well as growing talk that the Soviet Union could invade Pakistan and Turkey, was sending "flight capital" from oil-rich Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates into gold.

The only slip by the dollar today was by one cent against the British pound, which cost \$2.29 compared with \$2.28 at Friday's closing.

In Tokyo, the dollar held its ground today despite Bank of Japan intervention in support of the yen. The U.S. currency closed in moderate trading at 240.175 yen, up from Friday's

The dollar was apparently helped today from what one dealer called President Carter's firm stance against the Soviet Union. But European trading was very quiet in the absence of any significant developments in Afghanistan or Iran.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way today for increased busing of public school pupils in Dallas as a method to provide racial balance in the nation's eighth-largest school district.

By a 6-3 vote, the court decided not to review an appeals court ruling that gave the go-ahead for busing an estimated 20,000 students at an annual cost of \$5.8 million.

Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., writing for the dissenters, said the increased busing could backfire and lead to further exodus by whites from the city's public schools. Powell noted that since 1971, the percentage of white students in Dallas schools dropped from 69 percent to 33.5 percent last year.

#### Brown Sees A-Plant

SEABROOK, N.H. (AP) — Gov. Edmund Brown, the 1980 presidential campaign's most vocal foe of the Seabrook atomic power plant, came face to face with the target of his opposition

After a 20-minute tour of the construction site, Brown renewed his promise to close Seabrook if he is elected president. When asked if the tour changed his mind, the California governor said, "not at all."

'The country has to change pace. The risks from nuclear power are too great," he said.

#### **Exports Blocked**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration today revoked the licenses for the export of spare computer parts for a controversial Soviet truck plant.

The action was the latest in a series of steps taken by administration officials to try to penalize the Soviet Union for its

military intervention in Afghanistan. The revocation of the export licenses will block the shipment of high-technology goods intended for a truck factory begun in the early 1970s with U.S. help on the Kama River in the Ural Mountains of northeastern Russia.

#### State Action Holds

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. Supreme Court today refused to revive an invalidated California law that barred lobbyists, acting for themselves or others, from making political contributions

By a 7-2 vote, the justices left intact a California Supreme Court decision striking down one section of the state's Political Reform Act of 1974.



# Tito 'Good' After Leg **Amputated**

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) - President Josip Broz Tito spent a quiet night and was in good condition today following the life-saving amputation of his left leg, doctors reported.

Yugoslavia's 87-year-old leader was operated on Sunday for the second time in eight days to prevent fatal gangrene poisoning due to blockage in the

arteries of the leg.
"The general condition of President Tito is good," his doc-tors said in a medical bulletin is-

They said his pulse, blood pressure and temperature were within normal limits.

Belgrade remained calm despite speculation that the Russians might try to coerce Yugoslavia back into the Kremlin's orbit if Tito, the pioneer of independent communism, died.

Antiaircraft guns were set up at the Belgrade and Zagreb airports, but this appeared to be part of a nationwide, low-priority 'vigilance' program ordered after the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan.

# Huge, Hairy Creature at Nuke Site

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Security forces at the Nevada Test Site searched unsuccessfully last week for a large, hairy, manlike creature reported wandering along a road in the desolate nuclear testing ground, a Department of Energy spokesman said

The creature was reported shortly after noon Wednesday by an employee of Reynolds Electrical & Engineering Co., a

prime contractor at the sprawling, Rhode Island-sized test site.

DOE spokesman Dave Jackson said the weather was clear at the time and the unidentified workman is "considered to be a reliable person."

Jackson said the man was driving along Tippipah Highway, which runs from the Area 12 camp at the northern end of the test site to the com-mand post near U.S. 95. He said he saw "what he described as a being, somewhere between 6 and 7 feet tall, standing erect and walking like a man, with dark hair completely covering its

He said the workman passed the creature, then stopped his truck "and observed the being cross the highway going in a northeasterly direction toward Yucca Flat. He watched it until it disappeared out into the sage

brush." Jackson said the man reported he was between "30 and 50 yards" from the creature.

Normally no one would be in the area where the sighting was made - about 95 miles northwest of here - except for vehicle traffic from one part of the test site to another, Jackson

The man drove directly to the test site command post at Mercury and reported the incident to security guards who "came out, looked at the area and were not able to find any tracks or other evidence that the beast had been there."

It was believed the report was the first made in Nevada. But over the years numerous reports of sightings of a large man-like being have been made in the Pacific Northwest, where the creature has been named "Sasquatch." Similar reports of a "Bigfoot" have been made in Northern California.

Jackson said no further investigation would be made of the incident, but noted that the security forces that patrol the test site daily, as well as the 3,500 employees, probably would keep a sharp watch.

"If I were out there, I certainly would be," he said.

# Carter Lists National Priorities

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter pledged today to work for a "strong, unsurpassed defense capability" in his fourth year in office and said he expects progress this year in reducing inflation, which he called the nation's most serious economic problem

'We must pay whatever price is required to remain the strongest nation in the world," the president said in a 75-page State of the Union message he sent to Congress.

Carter said the price of remaining the strongest nation has increased because of the growing military might of the Soviet Union and its readiness to use their military strength, which has "been made all too evident in Afghanistan."

He said U.S. steps to penalize the Russians for their intervention in Afghanistan demonstrate that the Soviet Union "will pay a heavy price for its aggression in terms of our relationship.

Carter said he will offer only a few new initiatives to Congress in 1980 because of the importance of enacting proposals he has previously sent to the lawmakers, especially those aimed at creating energy

"In the coming legislative session, the last in this presidential term, I am deeply com-

mitted to finishing the agenda that I have placed before the Congress," he said. Carter said action on his uncompleted agenda is "absolutely essential for the nation's well-

being. However, he said he will make several proposals, including programs to expand youth employment, reauthorize general revenue sharing for state and local governments and require utilities



# **IUSD Mulls Proficiency** Test Plan

Irvine's Board of Education will be asked tonight to approve proposed minimum proficiencies for grades six, eight and

The board meets at 7:30 p.m. at Lakeside Middle School, 3 Lemongrass.

Interim proficiency goals, obproved by Irvine Unified School District trustees last June to meet the provisions of state laws which require districts with high schools to adopt minimum proficiency standards in reading, writing and mathematics.

Students graduating after June 1980 must pass a high school minimum proficiencies test to receive a diploma.

Officials said the original law establishing proficiency standards was passed in 1976 and applied to high schools only. But another law in 1977 extended the concept of assessment in basic skills to the elementary and middle school levels.

That law, AB 65, said there would need to be proficiency standards, or progress indicators, for grades six and eight and that those indicators must correlate to the proficiencies of the high school

The law also required early assessment, once in grades four through six, and then again in grades seven through nine. 'It was the intent of the

legislation that the progress indicators serve as an 'early warning system' to identify students in need of additional instruction," Assistant Superintendent Bruce Givner said.

# Plan Survives

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way today for increased busing of public school pupils in Dallas as a method to provide racial balance in the nation's eighth-largest school district.

By a 6-3 vote, the court decided not to review an appeals court ruling that gave the go-ahead for busing an estimated 20,000 students at an annual cost of \$5.8 million.

Justice Lawie F. Powell Jr. writing for the discenters, said

Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., writing for the dissenters, said the increased busing could backfire and lead to further exodus by whites from the city's public schools. Powell noted that since 1971, the percentage of white students in Dallas schools dropped from 69 percent to 33.5 percent last year.

#### **Exports Blocked**

# Suspect in Shock **Following Arrest**

Former reporter Thomas Barley was seemingly in a state of shock and unable to recollect events after his arrest in the stabbing death of his wife, a Santa Ana police investigator testified today.

Clark W. Moorhouse told the seven-man, five-woman Orange County Superior Court jury that Barley, 51, was "extremely nervous when he was interviewed several hours after Catherine Barley, 46, was stabbed outside a Santa Ana coffee shop last May 26.

"The impression was he couldn't believe he was there," Moorhouse testified in apparent reference to the police station.

Further, Moorhouse testified Barley said in the interview that he could not believe his wife was dead. He reportedly told investigators "I just saw her outside," Moorhouse told the court.

Barley, who formerly covered the county court beat for the Daily Pilot, was arrested at the murder scene. The crime was witnessed by at least 14 persons.

Barley has pleaded innocent by reason of insanity. It is the contention of defense attorney George Chula that the former news reporter was suffering diminished mental capacity when the knife attack took

#### Klan Calls For Mexican **Deportations**

SAN PASQUAL (AP) - Three Mexican-Americans heckled 41 hooded Klansmen and their supporters at a rally urging de-portation of "millions of Mexicans" from the United States.

"It's time to round them up and ship them back to Mexico. said Tom Metzger, California director of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

The rally is staged annually at the San Pasqual Battle Monument in the northeast corner of San Diego, near Escondido, marking an 1846 battle in which 21 U.S. soldiers died fighting Mexican troops. At the time, it was Mexican land. At the head of a march Sunday to the monument was a white horse ridden by a youth who identified himself as Winston Burbage, a 19-year-old Klan member.

Metzger said the booded men, women and children came from Riverside and San Diego counties to honor forgotten Americans but 'now it's 1980 and the problem is here again,' he said.

Metzger said, "You have millions of Mexicans invading your country. The Communists love them. The capitalists love them because they are cheap labor.

When the Klansmen shouted "White Power," the three male hecklers cried "Heil Hitler!"

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) -In living rooms, church basements and schoolhouses, Iowa Republicans and Democrats meet today to declare their presidential preferences in primary campaigns marked by sharp swings in public opinion polls.

6 p.m. PST, are the first official tests of the presidential campaign and a majority of the 10 Republicans and three Democrats seeking nomination campaigned hard in the state. But not President Carter, who

said the Iranian crisis required him to remain in Washington. Instead, he sent Vice President Walter F. Mondale, members of the Cabinet, his wife Rosalynn, their children and his mother.

And on Sunday, Carter demonstrated again the ability of a president to capture attention when he appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press." He urged a boycott of the summer Olympics in Moscow and defended the policies pursued during his three years in the White House.

Carter's chief rival for Democratic nomination, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, was also on nationwide television Sunday.

On ABC's "Issues and Answers," he said he would sup-port an Olympics boycott, but called that proposal and the administration's partial embargo of grain sales to the Soviets "symbols" and added, "I don't think symbols are a substitute for an effective foreign policy."

Kennedy said Carter msust receive at least 50 percent of the caucus votes to claim victory a difficult goal in a state that traditionally elects many uncommitted delegates.

Kennedy found himself in the role of an underdog, a dramatic reversal from the days before he became a candidate and before the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Iran, when the senator led Carter two-to-one in most

A poll conducted Jan. 6-9 by the Des Moines Register gave Carter 57 percent popular support to Kennedy's 25 percent. Just a month before each man had drawn a 40 percent rating.

Regardless of the outcome in lowa, said Kennedy, he's "in the race "for the duration." On the Republican side,

former California Gov. Ronald Reagan still led in the latest Register poll but had slipped badly from his showing in an earlier one, taken before the televised debate earlier this month in which he declined to participate.

# Anthony Trial Set In March

The Orange County Grand Jury accused the defendants in December of concealing the true source of more than \$77,000 that was funneled into 1976 political campaigns.

The trial is scheduled to start March 3.

The trial-setting action came Friday after the state attorney met behind closed doors in the chambers of Orange County Superior Court Judge Richard Beacom.

SAN PASQUAL (AP) — Three Mexican-Americans heckled 41 hooded Klansmen and their supporters at a rally urging deportation of "millions of Mexicans" from the United States.

"It's time to round them up and ship them back to Mexico. said Tom Metzger, California director of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

The rally is staged annually at the San Pasqual Battle Monument in the northeast corner of San Diego, near Escondido, marking an 1846 battle in which 21 U.S. soldiers died fighting Mexican troops. At the

Lewis is to be arraigned on the charges in South Orange County Municipal Court Feb. 1. Police said the suspect posted \$10,000 bond shortly after his arrest Fri-

Police and Sheriff's investigators converged on Lewis' home at about 5:30 p.m. Friday, seizing what officers term was a "substantial quantity of evidence at all three locations. "The evidence indicates Lewis

was involved in the continuing use of minors to produce illicit movies and still photographs," said Laguna Beach Sgt. Bruce Briggs said slides and motion

pictures seized at the apartment, in Lewis' car, and at an office at 230 Oak St. filled several shopping bags.

The officer said some of the slides were photographed in Laguna Beach, probably at the Santa Ana Street address and the

He said investigators will be poring through thousands of slides and Super 8 mm movie films in an attempt to identify local youngsters who participat-ed in the filming.

"We've identified kids from 15 years of age and possibly younger," Briggs said, adding investigators are comparing the slides with yearbook pictures from the local high school.

In addition to slides and movie film, investigators said they also seized a small quantity of marijuana and narcotics paraphernalia in their search.

Briggs said "at least three" more arrests are anticipated.

#### 41 Injured In Gas Blast

BORGER, Texas (AP) — A cracking unit at a gasoline refinery exploded four miles from Borger in the second accident at the site in four months, causing widespread destruction and in-juring at least 41 persons.

Flames sprouted 200 feet high Sunday following a series of four blasts that sparked the spec-tacular fire and demolished part of the refinery. Shock waves col-lapsed ceilings in nearby homes, shattered plate glass windows in Borger and were felt 30 miles away in Pampa.

"It was more like an earthquake," said Ada Westbrook who lives in a mobile home about a mile and a half from the scene, "All the stuff on the walls just shot right off and landed on the floor," she said. "We opened the door and saw a big ball of fire."

# Dallas Busing Plan Survives

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way today for increased busing of public school pupils in Dallas as a method to provide racial balance in the nation's

eighth-largest school district.

By a 6-3 vote, the court decided not to review an appeals court ruling that gave the go-ahead for busing an estimated 20,000 students at an annual cost of \$5.8 million.

Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., writing for the dissenters, said the increased busing could backfire and lead to further exedus by whites from the city's public schools. Powell noted that since 1971, the percentage of white students in Dallas schools dropped from 69 percent to 33.5 percent last year.

#### Brown Sees A-Plant

SEABROOK, N.H. (AP) - Gov. Edmund Brown, the 1980 presidential campaign's most vocal foe of the Seabrook atomic power plant, came face to face with the target of his opposition

After a 20-minute tour of the construction site, Brown renewed his promise to close Seabrook if he is elected president. When asked if the tour changed his mind, the California governor said, "not at all."

"The country has to change pace. The risks from nuclear power are too great," he said.

#### Exports Blocked

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration today revoked the licenses for the export of spare computer parts for a controversial Soviet truck plant.

The action was the latest in a series of steps taken by administration officials to try to penalize the Soviet Union for its military intervention in Afghanistan.

The revocation of the export licenses will block the shipment of high-technology goods intended for a truck factory begun in the early 1970s with U.S. help on the Kama River in the Ural Mountains of northeastern Russia.

According to the text of the indictment, which was released Friday, the 13 defendants conspired in 1977 and 1978 to import the hashish, valued at about \$3.3 million, to the United

Among those named in the indictment are Donald K. Drury, 42, of San Clemente and John Hart, 38, of Laguna Beach.

The hashish, according to the indictment, originally was to be distributed in Idaho, but plans were changed and San Francisco was targeted as the destination point.

Finalization of the plans for the hashish importation, it is alleged, were celebrated at a Dec. 31, 1977 party at Hart's Laguna Beach residence.

Subsequently, two of the defendants traveled to Afghanistan to prepare the hashish for shipment, it is alleged.

About 500 pounds of the drug were intercepted in the Northern California city of Concord in August 1978, according to investigators.

The indictment was sought in Orange County because many of the planning meetings of the group were held in San Clemente, Laguna Beach and Seal Beach, said Deputy District Attorney Carl Armbrust.

Several members of the Brotherhood of Eternal Love, an outfit founded by Dr. Timothy Leary, were named in a 1972 Orange County indictment.

Among those named in the 1972 bill of charges and the current case is Robert Leroy "Fat Bobby" Andrist, a Curry County, Ore., resident arrested last Wednesday by law enforcement

Andrist's attorney, Larry Scissors of Los Angeles. claimed that his client was living "a straight clean life" ever since he left Orange County after spending a year in Orange County Jail in connection with the 1972 case.

The Moslem rebels in Afghanistan are divided along tribal lines. They have been fighting their separate wars since the first communist coup in April 1978 and were reported to control half the country or

But the necessity for unification and coordination became last month when the apparent Soviet Union sent as many as 100,000 troops into Afghanistan to crush the rebellion and support the coup that eliminated President Hafizullah Amin and replaced him with Babrak Karmal, a more pliable Russian

Pentagon sources in Washington said the fighting since the Soviet intervention has been fiercest in the northeast part of Afghanistan, bordering the Soviet Union, Pakistan and China. However, he said he will make several proposals, including programs to expand youth employment, reauthorize general revenue sharing for state and local governments and require utilities to switch from oil to coal

The president repeated an earlier pledge to increase defense spending by more than 20 percent above the rate of inflation over the next five years.

He defended his economic policies, saying that the past three years have been ones of "progress and achievement for the American people," although he acknowledged much more has to be done.

He predicted flatly that "inflation will slow this year" and should be even lower in 1981. The nation's inflation rate is about 13 percent and most (See CARTER, Page A2)

#### Still Want Shah Back

By The Associated Press

U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim says he hopes a plan devised during his visit to Iran will lead to the release of the American hostages in Tehran. But the Iranian militants holding the Americans captive still insist the deposed shah must be returned before the hostages are freed.

We have worked out a mechanism . . . and I hope this mechanism will make it possible to satisfy the government of Iran and lead to release of the hostages," Waldheim told reporters Sunday in New Delhi, India.

The U.N. chief would give no details of his plan. But after his visit to Tehran, Iranian officials said he proposed setting up a U.N. commission to investigate the Iranian revolutionary regime's charges against the deposed shah.

At the time, Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh welcomed the proposal. But he said the commission's findings would not be binding on Iran, and the hostages would not be released

until the shah was returned. Ghotbzadeh repeated this stand Saturday, telling a French interviewer that the return of the shah, now living in Panama, was the only way out

of the impasse.
"It's easy," he said. "They give us the shah. We give them the hostages."

A spokesman for the militants holding the hostages, reached by telephone Sunday at the occupied U.S. Embassy, said: 'Nothing would possibly lead to the release of the hostages but (See IRAN, Page A2)

# 'Hairy Creature' Seen

#### Reported Wandering in Nevada Nuke Area

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Security forces at the Nevada Test Site searched unsuccessfully last week for a large, hairy, manlike creature reported wandering along a road in the desolate nuclear testing ground, a Department of Energy spokesman said

The creature was reported shortly after noon Wednesday by an employee of Reynolds Electrical & Engineering Co., a prime contractor at the sprawling, Rhode Island-sized test site.

Jackson said the weather was clear at the time and the unidentified workman is "considered to be a reliable person."

Jackson said the man was

driving along Tippipah Highway, which runs from the Area 12 camp at the northern end of the test site to the command post near U.S. 95. He said he saw "what he described as a being, somewhere between 6 and 7 feet tall, standing erect and walking like a man, with dark hair completely covering its

He said the workman passed the creature, then stopped his truck "and observed the being cross the highway going in a northeasterly direction toward Yucca Flat. He watched it until it disappeared out into the sage brush." Jackson said the man reported he was between "30 and 50 yards" from the

Normally no one would be in the area where the sighting was made — about 95 miles northwest of here — except for vehicle traffic from one part of the test site to another, Jackson

The man drove directly to the test site command post at Mercury and reported the inci-dent to security guards who

"came out, looked at the area and were not able to find any tracks or other evidence that the beast had been there."

It was believed the report was the first made in Nevada. But over the years numerous reports of sightings of a large man-like being have been made in the Pacific Northwest, where the creature has been named "Sas-quatch." Similar reports of a "Bigfoot" have been made in Northern California.

The revocation of the export licenses will block the shipment of high-technology goods intended for a truck factory begun in the early 1970s with U.S. help on the Kama River in the Ural Mountains of northeastern Russia.

# Suspect in Shock Following Arrest

Former reporter Thomas Barley was seemingly in a state of shock and unable to recollect events after his arrest in the stabbing death of his wife, a Santa Ana police investigator testified today.

Clark W. Moorhouse told the seven-man, five-woman Orange County Superior Court jury that Barley, 51, was "extremely nervous'' when he was interviewed several hours after Catherine Barley, 46, was stabbed outside a Santa Ana coffee shop last May 26.

"The impression was he couldn't believe he was there,' Moorhouse testified in apparent reference to the police station.

Further, Moorhouse testified Barley said in the interview that he could not believe his wife was dead. He reportedly told investigators "I just saw her outside," Moorhouse told the court.

Barley, who formerly covered the county court beat for the Daily Pilot, was arrested at the murder scene. The crime was witnessed by at least 14 persons.

Barley has pleaded innocent by reason of insanity. It is the contention of defense attorney George Chula that the former news reporter was suffering diminished mental capacity when the knife attack took place.

Moorhouse also testified that Barley complained of chest and lung pains after his arrest and was examined at UC Irvine Medical Center before booking into Orange County Jail.

The investigator also told the court that a search of an Orange apartment where Barley was living produced a sheath to the letter opener used in the attack on Mrs. Barley.

Chula attempted to win suppression of the sheath based on the assertion that the search of the apartment was illegal. Judge Mason Fenton however, decided that the investigators did have permission to search the apartment.

# Politicians Watch Iowa Caucus Vote

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) -In living rooms, church basements and schoolhouses, Iowa Republicans and Democrats meet today to declare their presidential preferences in primary campaigns marked by sharp swings in public opinion polls.

The parties' precinct caucuses, most of which start at 6 p.m. PST, are the first official tests of the presidential campaign and a majority of the 10 Republicans and three Democrats seeking nomination campaigned hard in the state.

But not President Carter, who said the Iranian crisis required him to remain in Washington. Instead, he sent Vice President Walter F. Mondale, members of the Cabinet, his wife Rosalynn. their children and his mother.

And on Sunday, Carter demonstrated again the ability of a president to capture attention when he appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press." He urged a boycott of the summer Olympics in Moscow and defended the policies pursued during his three years in the White House.

Carter's chief rival for the Democratic nomination, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, was also on nationwide television Sunday.

caucus votes to claim victory a difficult goal in a state that traditionally elects many uncommitted delegates. Kennedy found himself in the

role of an underdog, a dramatic reversal from the days before he became a candidate and before the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Iran, when the senator led Carter two-to-one in most polls.

A poll conducted Jan. 6-9 by the Des Moines Register gave Carter 57 percent popular support to Kennedy's 25 percent. Just a month before, each man had drawn a 40 percent rating.

Regardless of the outcome in lowa, said Kennedy, he's "in the race "for the duration."

# Carter Edged By Kennedy

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy has narrowly defeated President Carter in a California Democratic Party straw vote, and California Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. was a distant third choice in his home state.

Spokesmen for all three candidates claimed victories of one sort or another from the balloting Sunday among 1,471 delegates to the California

Democratic Party annual convention.

Kennedy won 622 votes, or 42 percent. Carter had 563 votes for 39 percent and Brown 207 votes for 14 percent. Another 59 votes were cast "uncommitted" or for minor candidates.

IN REALITY, THE BALLOTING had no meaning whatsoever, except for the news stories it generated on the eve of today's Iowa caucuses, which are the first step toward selection of the first 50 delegates to the Democratic National Convention next August.

Kennedy, who was in Washington, said he was "delighted" with the results.

"It clearly demonstrates that members of the Democratic Party in the nation's largest state are unwilling to accept four more years of current policies and are looking for new leadership in the 1960s," the Massachusetts senator said.

BUT KENNEDY'S VICTORY was not the landslide many observers had predicted earlier. California Democratic Party Chairman Richard O'Nelll, who said he is neutral in the race, said if the balloting had been late last year, Kennedy would have won handily.

"I don't know if any of the candidates won," O'Neill said, adding that Kennedy's victory "is not as important as if he'd gotten over 50 percent."

But in sharply contradictory statements, spokesmen for all three candidates each claimed the results were better than they expected.

"I think the fact that at the height of the international crisis, with this convention heavily weighted with people in political office, where the incumbency of the presidency is an additional advantage, the fact that we came out ahead here is something close to a miracle," said former New York congressman Allard Lowenstein, who led the Kennedy effort.

"WE THINK IT'S VERY significant that the Carter-Mondale campaign made such a great comeback," said Lees Francis, national staff director of the Carter campaign.

The people who come to conventions are activists. They're the kind of people who ought to be in Kennedy's back pocket. And yet we fell short by only 39 votes," said state Assemblyman Michael Roos, Carter's California campaign chairman.

Brown's chief spokesman, chief of staff Gray Davis, who earlier had said the straw vote was meaningless, also saw encouragement in Brown's 14 percent showing.

"THE GOVERNOR DID better than either of his rivals anticipated. We made only a very modest effort. Dick O'Neill said at the start of the convention we'd be lucky to get 10 percent. We improved on that quite a bit and we're pleased,"

The straw vote results conflicted with results reported Saturday of a mail poll of about 1,000 contributors to the California Democratic Party. Carter won the mail ballot with 57 percent to 36 percent for Kennedy and 7 percent for Brown.

California's 306 national convention delegates will be selected in a June 3 primary, and O'Neill said he organized the straw vote only to "liven up" an otherwise routine party platform convention.

Although none of the three presidential candidates appeared in person, O'Neill did liven up the convention. It attracted more than a dozen top political celebrities representing the three candidates and a delegate turnout about double normal for the convention.

APPEARING FOR CARTER, who was opposed by feminist leaders for not doing enough to enact the Equal Rights Amendment, Health and Welfare Secretary Patricia Harris declared that the Carter Administration "has been the best in history in its record of appointments of women, blacks, Hispanics and other minorities.'

Among a half-dozen standins representing Kennedy, economist John Kenneth Galbraith condemned Carter for allowing inflation to get out of control and then attempting to create a recession to cure the inflation.

'It is the final irony that, for a year, having tried to produce a recession, they haven't even

achieved that," Galbraith said.

Brown - expecting a last place finish - made substantially less effort to win straw vote support. And his chief spokesman, his father, former Gov. Edmund G. "Pat" Brown, took a more lighthearted approach.

# Road Financing **Must Be Shared**

Approval of two adjacent major residential develop-ments in the foothills between El Toro and the Cleveland National Forest is going to bring more traffic problems to clogged El Toro Road.

One of the proposals calls for the development of 960 residential units on property at the Glenn Ranch. The second calls for 706 units across the street in the Saddleback Meadows project, Orange County's first own-

your-own lot mobile bome park,

Together, the two projects will bring more than 1,600 new homes to a rural area in which El Toro Road provides the only access.

El Toro Road has only two lanes in the development area and cannot handle the expected increases in traffic. As a result, Orange County supervisors have served notice to the developers that they will have to help

finance road improvements. Even though it is a departure from past methods, the road fund program appears necessary because of re-

duced government revenues after the passage of Proposition 13 But it is no panacea.

Both the developments mentioned here are to offer units which supposedly are affordable to wage earners in the county's medium income range.

Costs for the improvements will surely be passed on to homebuyers, with the risk of increasing the price

Solutions are not simple but there seems to be little choice in the tightening economic times for local govern-

#### **Truth Too Dangerous**

The "kill the messenger" syndrome still flourishes in Iran and Afghanistan but, these being more civilized days, the offended victims of bad news are settling for exile rather than beheading of the messengers - in this case American journalists.

Our journalists were welcome enough in Iran when they turned their television cameras on shouting mobs outside the American embassy where our hostages were

Apparently the misguided leaders of that land had persuaded themselves that a first-hand view of their "revolution" would inspire the American people to rise up in

It didn't work of course. But the real problem arose when the journalists, apprised of anti-Khomeini uprisings in the north, turned their cameras and microphones in that direction.

When crude censorship of television broadcasts of the counter-revolution was ineffective, the journalists were summarily ordered out of the country.

Similarly, in Afghanistan, there was no move to impede reports and filming of the arrival of Soviet troops to 'help' that small nation. But when reporters revealed it was the Soviets who had ordered the execution of the leader they supposedly had come to help, and went on to report Soviet losses in fighting with the tough rebels in the mountains, the Americans once more were ordered out.

Of course, with a totally controlled press in both these countries and in the Soviet Union, the people of these lands can simply be fed the lie that the journalists were really spies and agitators in disguise. They'll never know the difference.

There are those in this country who seem to feel the press sometimes goes too far in unveiling the flaws in our own government and the warts on our leaders.

True, the press sometimes is shrill. But is enforced silence the better alternative? Apparently the Soviets and the Iranians believe so. Sudden doses of truth can be very upsetting to a subjugated people, and very dangerous to totalitarian government.

# Susie in Color?

It soon became apparent that the new Susan B. Anthony dollar was one of the government's more unfortunate bloopers.

The coin is so much like a quarter no one wants to have anything to do with it.

But the fact is the U.S. Mint figured it could save

about \$50 million a year by not having to print so many \$1 bills, which have a lifespan of only about 18 months. The Anthony dollar, by comparison, should be good

for some 15 years. One alternative would be to add plastic fiber to the dollar bill to make it last longer, but that's expensive too.

Now the Mint has come up with what may be the answer - change the color of the Anthony dollar from silver to bronze or brass by adding a new alloy, to make it more distinctive.

Theory is that very few people mistake pennies for dimes, despite the similar size. It's the color that does the Well, maybe it's worth a test. But the size confusion

will persist.

# U.S. Technology - Soviet Deceit

WASHINGTON - In his righteous indignation at the Russian rape of Afghanistan, Jimmy Carter has understandably chosen to ignore the valuable help given to the Soviet invasion by the United States: Many of the Russian soldiers now occupying Afghanistan rode across the border in trucks that were built with American technology, supplied in the holy name of detente. Though initial responsibility

for the American technical aid and the

outrageously lax safe-guards under which it was provided - can be laid at the door of Richard Nixon and Henry Kissinger, the

Carter administration cannot escape a good share of the blame. When a middle-echelon Commerce Department official blew the whistle last year on the Soviet's misuse of U.S. technology, his warnings were disregarded by his superiors and he was denounced as a troublemaker.

THE PRESIDENT tacitly admitted that U.S. technical aid is important to the Soviets when he announced that shipments of sophisticated industrial equipment would be suspended as a result of the aggression in Afghanistan. He declined. however, to go into specifics, which would have made clear how he and his predecessors were duped by the Russians in a single-minded U.S. pursuit of de-

From confidential documents and knowledgeable sources who talked to my reporters Dale Van Atta and Mark Zusman, I can now provide details of the way Carter's policymakers were led down the primrose path by the Kremlin's palace elite.

Back in the early 1970s when Secretary of State Kissinger was seeking glory as the architect of detente, the export of advanced industrial machinery, including IBM computers, for the Soviets'

gigantic Kama River truck factory was approved at the highest levels. At the time, some officials, including then Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird, voiced concern that the Russians might use the central Asian truck plant the biggest in the world - to produce military equipment.

KISSINGER brushed the misgivings aside. A confidential Commerce Department memorandum states that in 1971 Kissinger 'ordered the Secretary of Commerce to grant three pending applications" for construction of the Soviet plant. Another secret memo set the final value of U.S. licensed equipment and technology at \$1.5 billion. A major U.S. news magazine described the Kama River plant as "a living symbol of how detente can work

Others - notably our Western European allies - were not so sure. On March 20, 1975, Kissinger cabled U.S. officials in Paris on the best way to allay such doubts. "Kama trucks are not tactical military vehicles with cross-country capability,' the secret cable said. "Some

may ultimately be outfitted with front-wheel drive for muddy or icy environments. However, trucks will not be equipped for deepforwarding or have other features typical of military Kissinger's cable concluded

that "we see little likelihood of diversion" to military uses. The American officials were instructed to belittle any odious comparison between the Kama plant and a Czechoslovakian truck plant that produced military vehicles - and for which a U.S. license was rejected in 1970.

DESPITE Kissinger's uncharacteristic confidence in the Soviets' good faith, Commerce Department officials were alerted by intelligence officials last year to the fact that the Russians were producing 100,000 more engines than trucks at Kama River, and were warned that the engines "undoubtedly were to be used in military trucks.

When this serious breach of the intent of the U.S. licensing program was pointed out by a

Commerce Department analyst, Larry Brady, his boss, Stanley Marcuss, and then-Secretary Juanita Kreps gave Congress an astonishing explanation: Technically, the Russians hadn't violated the licensing agreement, because they had never signed the standard promise that the U.S. supplied technology would not be used for military purposes. That part of the license application had mysteriously been left blank.

FOR CALLING attention to the serious weaknesses in the technological export program, Brady was demoted, ostracized and threatened with firing. Brady's superiors have also circulated secret internal memos intended to discredit his whistleblowing

Because Nixon and Carter officials naively discounted the possibility of Soviet skulduggery, the Russians were able to invade Afghanistan in American engineered trucks. Detente is dead, but the Afghan people will be haunted by its ghost for years to come.

# **Boat Owners Slip Away From Tax Burden**

Those who enjoy visiting the marinas around the state on a Sunday outing to view the array of wealth represented by the thousands of boats moored within them, may also wonder at

times how so many people can afford them. Certainly such thoughts must pass through the minds of some as they gaze at the magnificent

luxury yachts which cost well in-

to the hundreds of thousands. Now it comes out that maybe some who own these expensive boats really can't afford them. For the State Board of Equalization, which enforces the tax laws, reports that many of the boat owners are evading personal property and sales

The boats are supposed to be California taxes entirely by regassessed by the county assessors each year. But the assessment date falls on March 1 and, reportedly, many boat owners avoid the hooks of the assessors by suddenly finding an urgent need to put to sea, thus escaping the property tax.

ANYWAY, it would seem with more than 550,000 registered in California the assessor has an impossible job to identify and appraise each boat.

Actually, as it works out, it apparently isn't as big a job as the numbers would indicate, since most of those registered are small craft, not even moored in marinas, but transported to the water when the mood for a 'cruise'' strikes the owners.

Of the total number, however, a substantial percentage are larger craft, where assessments become more than minimal.

Some of the foxier large boat owners attempt to escape

istering their boats in Oregon, a state that has no personal property tax on boats or sales THUS A BOAT, even though

purchased in California, can evade both taxes by registering the boat at time of acquisition with an out of state address such as Oregon. But California tax authorities

have caught on to the game and joined with Oregon officials to hunt down the tax jumpers. Allen Swenson, Coos County tax assessor, reports that many boats giving their home port as Coos Bay have never been there but are actually based in Washington and California and even Texas and Florida

Searches by California officials find many of these boats snugly harbored at Newport Beach, San Diego, Santa Barbara and in San Francisco Bay marinas. While they estimate the total of such boats to be as high as 600, it might be double that for all they know.

CALIFORNIA LAW provides that boats purchased here for use here are subject to the 6 percent sales tax. It also provides that any boat in California waters for more than 30 days is subject to the property tax. In the case of a yacht costing

\$400,000 the sales tax would amount to \$24,000 and the annual property tax would probably be around \$13,000. Last year the state discovered 100 boats improperly registered. The boats averaged \$78,000 in value. This represents tax evasions totalling \$500,000 in sales tax alone, plus property taxes which would total even more.

For those who get caught it means a 10 percent penalty, plus interest on the sales tax, plus the property taxes. If fraud is proved, the penalty is 25 per-

# Copying Works In Business

Innovation has often been touted as the key to success in business. Come up with new products and you sur-posedly confound competitors and win the day. But now there's a new rule: be a copycat.

A Chicago company, Helene Curtis Industries, has been employing that strategy to good effect. Its Suave hair care products have tripled their sales since 1974 simply by telling consumers that they do what the big-name brands do - at a lower price.

Helene Curtis looks at what other companies are selling and then moves in with a similar product that costs less.



NOW ANOTHER COMPANY seems to have hopped on this bandwagon. Steven W. Lapham, who is director of new products for the Lehn & Fink division of Sterling Drug, has put forth the theory: "replicate - don't innovate.

Lapham, in a presentation he made recently at a marketing conference, argued that it's silly to spend a lot of time developing new products when you can just copy ones that are already out there.

He pointed out that it's not always true that the victory goes to the one first in the market. Jell-O pudding, for example, came six years after My-T-Fine. Country Time lemonade followed Wyler's. Revion's Flex shampoo was introduced after Wella Balsam.

YOU DO HAVE to be careful, though. Lapham advised his colleagues to conduct research on a product already in the market just to be sure that it enjoys consumer acceptance before launching your own version. Also, you should confirm that the market is big enough to support two brands. And once you have done that, "be first to be second." In short, don't let anyone else copy before you do,

Lapham described how his own company has put this copycatting to work. They heard how a competitor, Airwick, had come up with a new product called Carpet Fresh. "Quite frankly," said Lapham, "we found it pretty hard to believe that Carpet Fresh had any potential at all. After all, what housewife in her right mind would sprinkle a white powder onto her carpeting before vacuuming? Who dirties their carpet first?"

Well, Carpet Fresh turned out to be a winner in the marketplace - and so in late 1978 Lehn & Fink decided to enter the market. In six months it had a competing product in national distribution. Its name: Love My Carpet. You can move quickly when you're copying someone else's

LAPHAM CONCLUDED by stating that one of the 'greatest myths' of new product development is that the only way to do it is by innovation. Don't forget duplication.

So if you want to break into the consumer marketplace, don't worry about setting up a laboratory to discover new products. Just look around and see which ones you might be able to copy successfully. You might want to start by looking at the product lineup of Lapham's company, Sterling Drug

Bayer aspirin, Midol, Fletcher's Castoria (I wouldn't bother with this one), Diaparene, Phillips' Milk of Magnesia, Haley's M-O laxative, Caroid and Bile Salts laxative, Neo-Synephrine, Lysol disinfectants, Beacon wax, Givenchy perfumes and d-Con rat killers.

Surely someone can find something there to copy.
