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WHAT'S THE BEST FAMILY SIZE?

It's a tough question. A lot depends on how many children you want.

Some men and women, well before marriage, have already decided upon the ideal size for their families — a given number of children. The reasons for such a decision, often enough, are quite personal: fond memories of growing up in, say, a large family, or unpleasant memories of being an only child. Sometimes those reasons might be reversed: A man or woman liked being an only child, or emphatically didn't enjoy being one of eight or nine brothers and sisters. Then, too, there are people who have no clear idea of how many children they might want to have. "I don't know," one hears, or "I haven't really thought about it — maybe two or three."

A good number of people have thought about it, yet they arrive at a final answer only through experience — the ups and downs of marriage and parenthood, which might persuade one couple that the first child should be the last, and another that lots of children are life's major blessing. There are, of course, some families whose choices are defined by biology rather than attitude — couples, for example, who cannot have any more children, or can have them only with considerable risk. And there are those who, out of religious or moral conviction, keep having children even though they might feel a certain reluctance or worry about it, perhaps because there isn't enough money at hand.

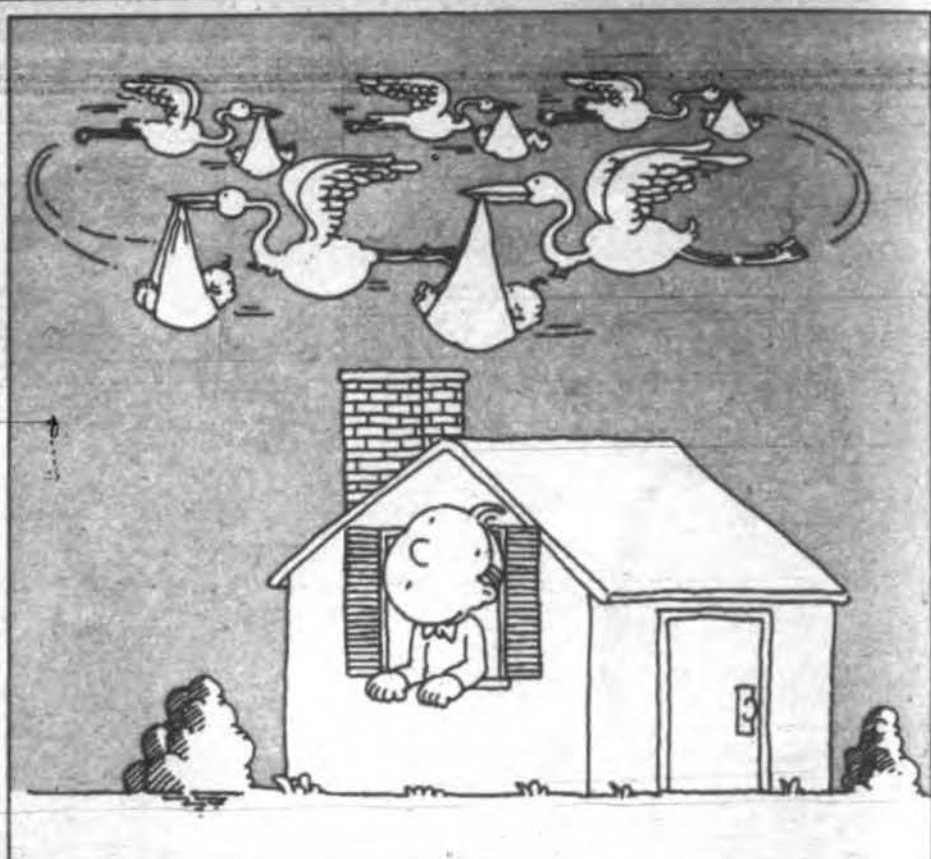
Sometimes a parent will experience many different attitudes toward family size over time — as was the case with a mother of eight who told me years ago about the shift in her own ideas about children: "I come from a small family, I guess. There were only three of us — two boys and me. But my parents

always wanted more kids. My mother came from a large Italian family. My father came from a large Irish family. I had so many cousins I couldn't keep track of them.

"I thought back then that I didn't want to continue all that — kids and kids and kids! I can recall a story in a magazine about the average American family, and there were the mother and the father and a boy and a girl. I thought to myself: That would be great, just to have a couple of kids, and no more. Then I could really pay attention to each kid, like my parents did. Both of my parents were really brought up by their older sisters. My mother had six older than her, and two younger. My father had five older and one younger. [My parents] thought they were failures, because my mother had to have a hysterectomy after my younger brother [was born]. But I guess us three kids — we were glad. I know my younger brother was. He's now married, and he has one kid, and he says he'll only have one more — two at the most. My older sister has only one kid. She had to get a divorce. Her husband is a bad gambler, and there was lots of trouble. She's glad she doesn't have a lot of children.

"I'm the one who's carrying on the family tradition! Like I said, I thought I wouldn't. I thought I'd settle for a small family. But my husband was an only child, and he said, 'No way.' To tell the truth, after our first was born, our Sally, I wanted to stop right there. She was a wonderful, wonderful baby. She was quiet and sweet, and she smiled all the time, and she never woke up in the middle of the night, the way our other children, almost all of them, have done. I got so attached to her that I began to worry about having another baby, because it would break up our love, mine for Sally and hers for me. I think, for a while, my husband felt the same way. He really loved coming home and holding Sally. He'd feed her and wash her and put her to bed.

"But we're Catholics, and even



though we tried not to have children through the rhythm method — and we even talked about using contraception — we ended up having our second daughter, Debbie, and that was no fun. I had a lot of trouble with that delivery, even though it was the second, and maybe I'm just being superstitious when I say this, but the result was that Debbie turned out being a very difficult baby: She cried and cried, day and night, to the point I thought I was going to lose my mind.

"Well, Debbie outgrew her colic," and by then my husband and I wanted one more child — a boy! We had our boy; we were lucky. My husband just adored that kid, and we'd gotten used to having a lot of noise and commotion around the house, and one day we were talking, and suddenly my husband was sounding like his old self — that we should just let them come, one after the other! 'Wait a minute,' I said, but then I stopped and thought, why not! Of course, I wasn't totally convinced. Neither was he, actually. We had to think about money. Who doesn't, except the rich. [You have to] worry about where you'll get the dollar bills to buy all that food and those clothes and toys and a house that's big enough. Sure, you can say that you don't have to live in luxury, and you can hand the clothes down and learn to be real economical with food. But there's only so far you can cut down; sooner or later those big expenses start hitting you real hard. And just as important, I worried back in those days about whether there was enough of me to go around. I mean, how much energy can one person have — for her husband, her children, the house and all it demands of you, and — I know it

sounds selfish — to have a little bit left over for yourself.

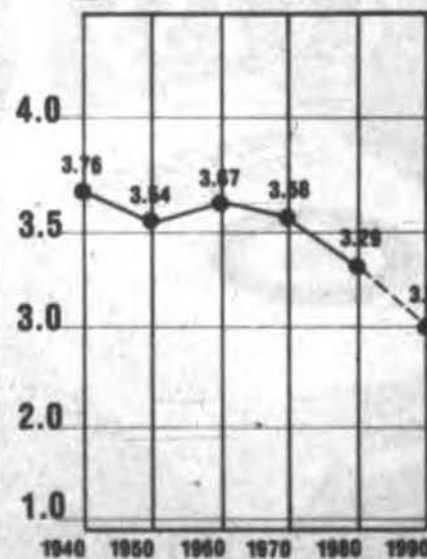
"We just decided to put the matter in the Lord's hands. I think, secretly, my husband and I had decided that we'd have a big family. And that's how we ended up with our eight kids: five girls and three boys. It's been hard a lot of the time, but I'll tell you, I'd never, ever do any different, if I was to have a second chance. The same goes for my husband. We look at each other sometimes, when we're sitting in church — and the whole pew is us and only us! — and we are both thinking the same thing. I know: Thank you, dear Lord, for these blessings, all eight of them. They're worth eight million dollars, at least!"

She went on to tell me about the satisfactions of having a large family: the way older children took care of younger children; the way self-centeredness or egoism (which we all have, to some degree) yielded to the demands of a group of 10 people. Her children were "each individuals," as she put it. They had their idiosyncrasies, their respective strengths and vulnerabilities. But her family possessed a solidarity that made it hard for any one child to be demanding and spoiled. On the other hand, as she was the first to admit, "some of my children, maybe, haven't had quite as much as others, at least from me and my husband."

No life is perfect, nor is any family size going to guarantee parents anything and everything they want — for themselves or for their children. Rather often, in large families, a wonderful solidarity does emerge: a sense of "us" that dampens the rivalries and competition that so com-

monly occur in smaller families. But in those smaller families, as the mother of eight noted herself, a great deal of attention can be given to this or that child, often to good effect, creating opportunities and advantages that can help shape a quite special person. In one-child families such an outcome is by no means rare — but there may be difficulties, if not outright dangers: a child who is lonely; a child who expects (and gets) just about everything, and so may be relatively vain or self-preoccupied; a child who has trouble getting along with others, accepting the give-and-take one learns to regard as normal in a larger family.

One more sibling may not change that state of affairs — because two children can fight and fight, or become polar opposites in so many respects that each is substantially shut off from the other. A third child can “break up” such a family positively — so that the parents needn’t concentrate as intensely on how “the two and only” manage. Sometimes two of the children become closer, leaving the third child comparatively alone. On the other hand, the three children can emerge as distinct individuals, with no such “pairing off” taking place. It is obviously not a matter of family size alone, but of the particular family — how the parents regard their children and, not least, how able they are to enrich their chil-

dren’s lives. The more social and economic opportunities a family has to offer, the more likely it is that its children will pursue their different ways productively.

No matter what our preferences, those who gather statistics tell us that the average American family size will be exactly 3.0 by 1990 — down from today’s 3.26 and 3.58 in 1970. The so-called only child will soon be a major presence among us, and the old-fashioned large family will be relatively rare — a cause for regret, surely, for some of us. Perhaps enough of us will continue to have a range of children (large families or medium-sized

families of three and four children) so that we will learn from one another and — very importantly — offer this country a variety of children: offspring shaped by all sorts of family situations and sizes.

In the course of my work as a child psychiatrist, I have seen troubles occur in every kind of family, large and small. I have seen remarkably solid families in which there have been only one or two children or, in contrast, many sons and daughters. But I’ve been especially impressed by the strength and vitality of those families with four or five children. I am *not* recommending any particular number of children as ideal — I am simply sorting out in my mind memories of families I’ve observed and studied.

In small families, as noted earlier, the general preoccupation our culture has with children can become all too amplified, as every word and deed of a particular child is scrutinized or turned into an important occasion for celebration or reprehension. In exceptionally large families, a child or two can get “lost” — the one or two whom busy parents can’t seem to avoid overlooking or taking for granted. There is, in all of us, a limit to the amount of attention we can give to others — and after a while, at least in some instances, a child with eight or nine siblings may become quite aware of that. On the other hand, an only child, or two children with no other siblings, may wish at times that *they* were a bit “neglected” by their doting, overly watchful parents.

A number of parents have told me

how much they learn from their first and even second child — how much more relaxed and knowing they feel when a third child is born, and a fourth. A pity to stop at one or two, they may observe. And yet they do so for entirely understandable reasons (financial, social, even moral — out of their personal conviction that the world is already too heavily populated). But those who do go on to have two or three more children often tell me they have been especially pleased with the way things have worked out.

Over the years I’ve come to realize that for many of us the size of the family we dream of having, or end up having, is not only a matter of our social or religious or ethnic backgrounds but of our quite personal lives — how we grow up as children, how we want to live as adults. As in most matters, the mind’s experience is often the deciding force, no matter the significance of considerations such as the pocketbook, the teachings of a religious tradition, the customs and values of a neighborhood, a country, a certain historical era. And why not — given the intensely personal nature of what it means, day in and day out, for each of us to be a parent. **RW**

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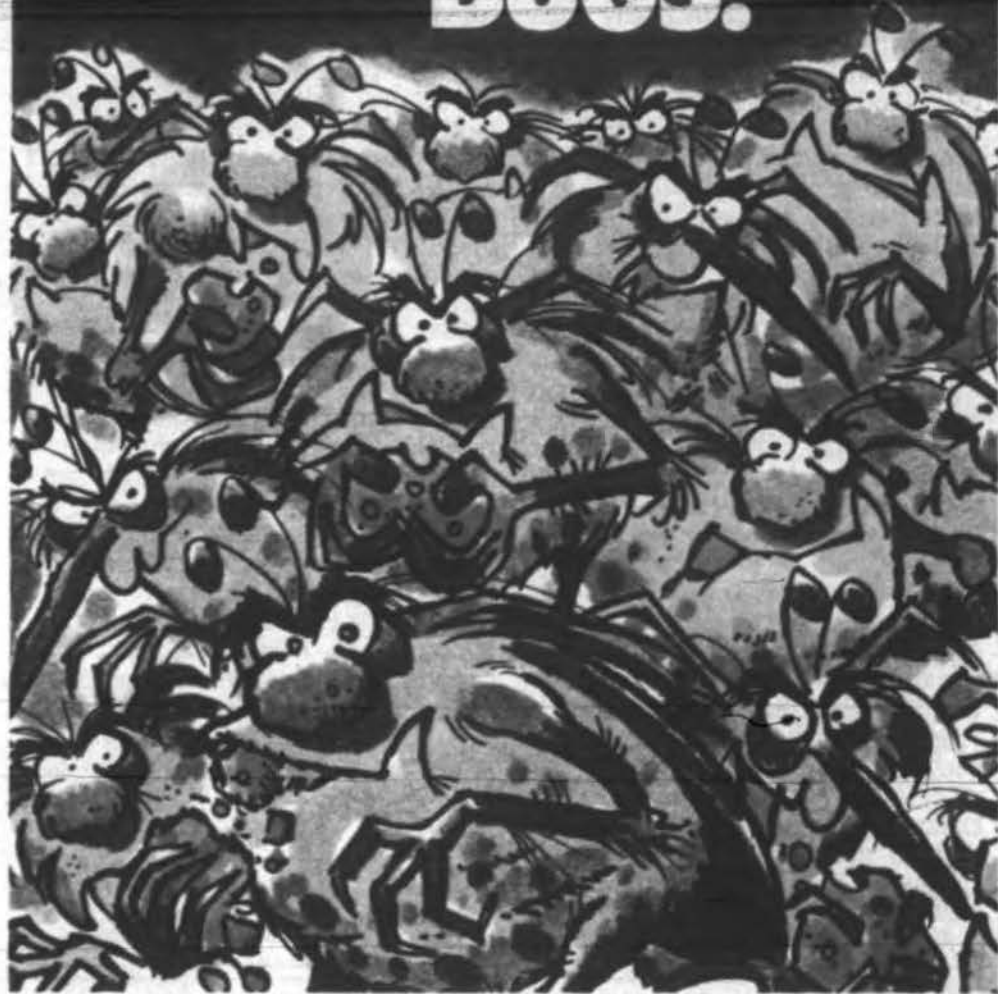
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HARD-LEARNED RULES OF THE MARRIAGE GAME

Although they made their names as co-authors of the 1968 play and the 1970 screenplay *Lovers and Other Strangers*, Joseph Bologna and Renee Taylor have been the closest of spouses and working partners. They co-wrote and co-starred in the 1971 film *Made for Each Other*, and were co-interviewees in publications all over America. The couple recently co-authored and co-starred in the play *It Had to Be You* in Los Angeles.

Even though Bologna's solo career has been gaining momentum with his starring roles in such films as *My Favorite Year*, *Blame it on Rio*, and the soon-to-be-released *The Woman in Red*, the 48-year-old actor/writer still views his marriage as the most important venture of his life. Bologna was interviewed for *FAMILY WEEKLY* by West Coast journalist Mitchell Fink.

FINK: Does the professional closeness you have with Renee strain

your marriage?

Bologna: In some ways it's easier, in other ways harder. It's harder because we deal with four relationships — husband, wife, writer, writer. Now, this gets even more complicated when we're acting together. Then it's six relationships. My writer will have a certain relationship with Renee's actress, and so on.

Q: How do you turn off the working relationship?

Bologna: By taking vacations together and, once in a while, separately. Just recently I got in the car and for four days I was gone. By myself. I drove up to Yosemite [National Park]. Renee was busy doing things, and she wouldn't have wanted to go anyway, so I went alone. It was wonderful, just being by myself, listening to myself think.

Q: Renee isn't as well-known now as you. Does that become a problem at home?

Bologna: Our relationship has about 500 problems, just about all of which can be solved. But the fact that I'm

working more in films than Renee, that's one of the unsolvables. After Meryl Streep and Jane Fonda, there aren't a whole lot of parts for women . . . I think the problems of the show-business marriage are blown out of proportion. My marriage has lasted for 20 years. And it's as strong now as it ever was. If you're committed to a relationship, you do whatever it takes to make it work. In our case, there are certain rules.

Q: Like what?

Bologna: We don't have extramarital affairs. Monogamy is an absolute rule—a simple rule for us. For someone else, if your sexual preference is to live in an igloo with a casaba melon, great. But I need structure in a relationship, and my structure is built on monogamy. I like this structure. I like my family. I like being bonded with another person. It's a very safe, warm feeling. No matter what problems I have in life, I know I can count on the love of that person.

Q: Any other rules?

Bologna: Not really, except that you can't hold things in for too long. At some point you have to deal with what's bothering you. No matter what's going on, both of us know that we have to get back to being in love. I know what it is to be in love, and when I've

tasted steak, I can't go back to hamburger. I know what it means to be emotionally turned on. And in a way, that's why acting and writing together helps. When we work together, we're very close to our feelings — the love, the sexuality — and I'd rather get those feelings from my wife than go somewhere else. So we constantly have to get back to that thing — if it takes seeing a psychiatrist, or having a fight. If we've locked horns on something, we have to do that thing that unlocks them, whatever that thing is. And with us that thing is being madly in love. **FW**

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EXTRAORDINARY PEOPLE

NASA'S "TRAVEL AGENT" WANT TO FLY WITH HIM?

Most people gaze at the night sky and see a wondrous natural light show. Alan Ladwig

looks up and imagines the firmament bustling with human activity — artists, manufacturers, builders, industrialists, entrepreneurs, all plying their trades in the milieu of zero gravity.

As manager of NASA's ambitious Space Flight Participant Program, the 35-year-old Ladwig is helping to fulfill his own dreams. He views himself as a "cosmic wagon-master helping pioneers reach the New Frontier."

By late next year, NASA hopes to launch a civilian, non-astronaut observer into space aboard the shuttle. Thousands have already asked for a seat, including ABC anchorman Hugh Downs, Civil Aeronautics Board Chairman Dan McKinnon, and folk singer John Denver.

Yet NASA officials have spurned all requests, opting instead to pick their own passenger. A selection process is being devised that will include both NASA and civilian-review committees, medical evaluations, and thorough background investigations. Ladwig is supposed to make sure it all runs smoothly — just like Ward Bond easing homesteaders across the prairie in *Wagon Train*.

Perched in a swivel chair next to a coconut-headed mannequin that serves as a hanger for his suitcoat, the cleft-chinned, mustachioed Ladwig is both a space zealot and a pragmatic bureaucrat well aware of the exorbitant cost of space travel (prospective bookers of space in the shuttle's cargo bay must make a \$100,000 down payment before negotiations even begin). "I can't come up with a dollar-and-cents reason why we should [send a civilian into space]," says Ladwig. "It has to do with higher aspirations and goals."

Ladwig's goals have been lofty ever since he joined the now defunct Committee for the Future while he was a student at Southern Illinois University in the late '60s. "All there was at the time was the Apollo program with three people in a tiny capsule," he recalls. "We were advocating moving masses of people into space, and folks would look at us like we were crazy."

After college and a two-year stint as a personnel specialist with the Army in Greece, Ladwig took his master's degree in education and his visions of extraterrestrial touring to Washington. There he joined the Forum for the Advancement of Students in Science and Technology (FASST), a space advocacy group that lobbied NASA to include college-level science projects among the shuttle's planned experiments. When NASA decided to use projects from high school students instead, Lad-

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wig signed on to manage the program for the agency. He helped ensure that experiments ranging from beehive construction to crystal growth were aboard shuttle flights.

Ladwig became an assistant to the shuttle program's director, Lt. Gen. James Abrahamson. When the general — whom Ladwig describes as a "visionary" — left NASA to head up President Reagan's "Star Wars" space weapons project, Ladwig was named to manage the Space Flight Participant Program. "I feel good about it — lucky to be involved," he says. "I think space should be opened up to everybody... and I think it's happening. It's moving in the same sort of pattern that the exploration of any frontier takes. A certain kind of person goes out first. Then, in a later phase, people will come out to commercialize the frontier. Space flight is becoming almost routine. But it will be the commercial effort that will really open up space. People will discover that it's the place to move outward, to do things differently for the future."

In the near future, though, Ladwig must concern himself with more mundane problems, such as sifting through the flood of applications NASA expects will pour in from prospective shuttle passengers. Ladwig says, "I'm here to explain the opportunities — to show people how they might qualify for the program and brief them on what may lie ahead."

But Ladwig won't have any personal role in the selection process itself. "If people think I'm selecting them, I won't be able to talk with them as freely," he explains. He might also be the target of intensive lobbying or even bribery. But it would all be to no avail — Ladwig is so scrupulous and wary of those who might try to influence him that he shunned the innocent offer of a reporter to pick up a luncheon tab.

Whoever gets the nod from NASA as the first passenger aboard the shuttle is bound to become an instant celebrity, simply by virtue of the fact that he or she will be paving the way for non-astronauts in space. Yet Ladwig bristles at the suggestion that the flight might be viewed as gimmickry or as a chance for the passenger to cash in on the inevitable public attention.

"The last thing we want," he insists sternly, "is for someone to walk off the shuttle, wave goodbye to us, and then merchandise himself for a million dollars. The American taxpayers would tear us apart, and justifiably so. We, I think, are going to demand some sort of commitment." It's possible the passenger will become a temporary employee of NASA and agree to represent the agency for a year after the flight. At any rate, whoever gets to fly away on the shuttle will have to be flexible enough to devote a minimum of three months to NASA for the necessary training.

After years of dreaming and working to open up the frontiers of space, doesn't Ladwig want the first passenger on the shuttle to be none other than Alan Ladwig? "Oh, I'd love to go up,

but I don't pretend to have the necessary qualifications for that role. Maybe I can go on a later flight." He pauses, flashes a sly smile, and asks mischievously, "Did Ward Bond ever

go over the mountain into the promised land?" **PW**

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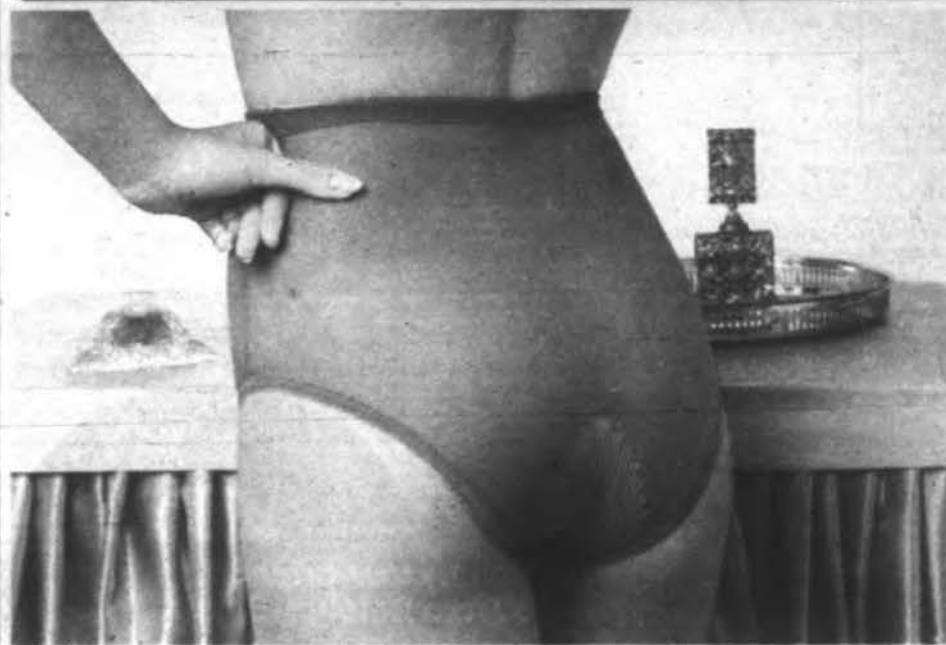
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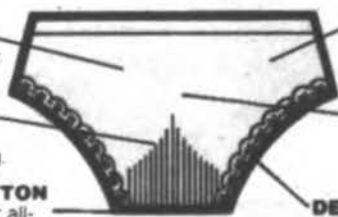
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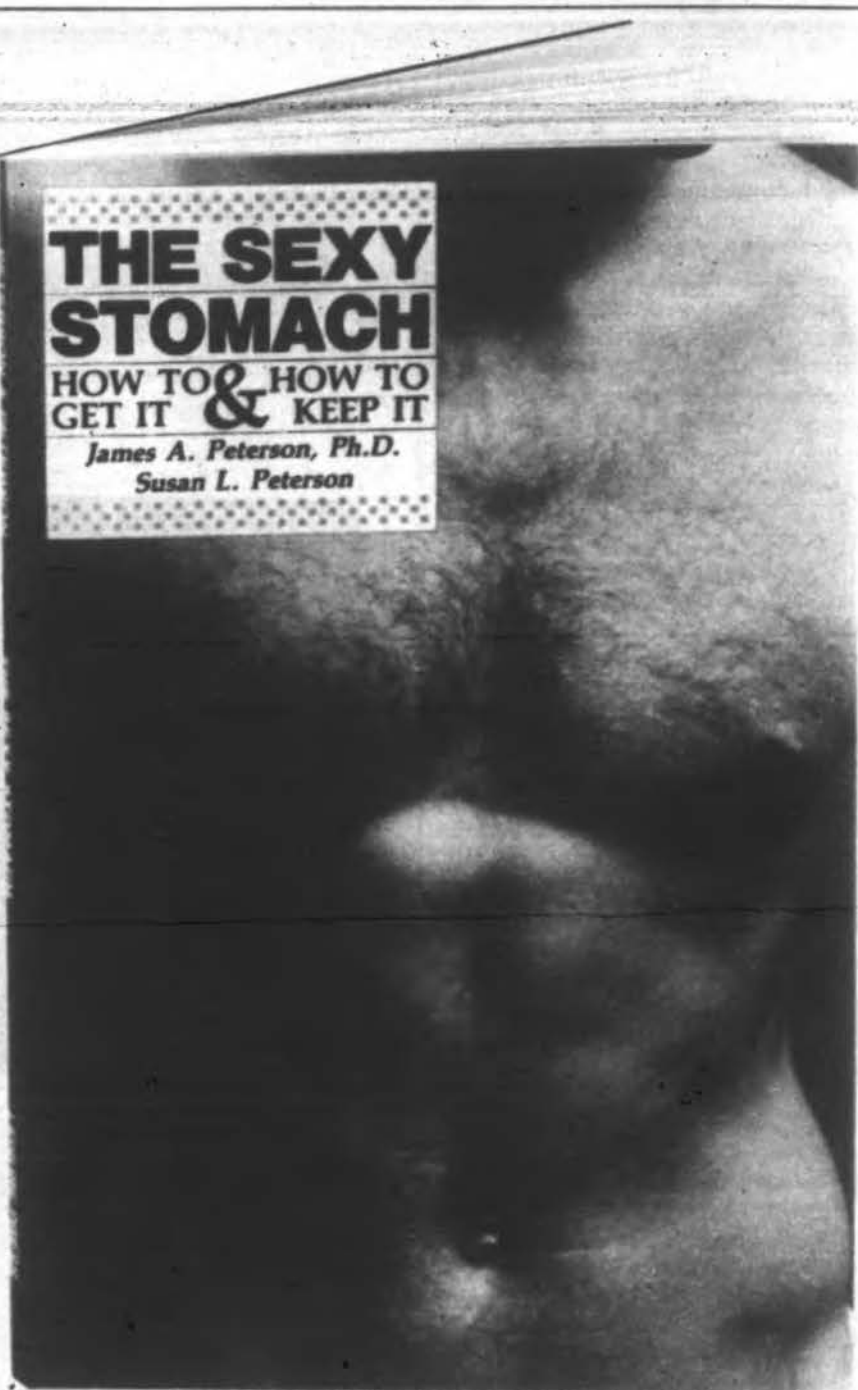
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THE ALL-IMPORTANT SELF-ESTEEM FACTOR

TRUE OR FALSE?

1. If your sex life is on the blah side, it may be because you're selling yourself short in the self-esteem department.
2. How success or failure affects you depends on your self-esteem.
3. How a child feels about himself is likely to depend on how his mother feels about him.
4. To a large extent, your social class determines your self-esteem.
5. Owning a pet increases your level of self-esteem.

ANSWERS

1. **True.** The California School of Professional Psychology surveyed 98 subjects (49 married couples) on self-concept and sexual problems. Those with problems differed from the others in that there was a marked discrepancy between their *real* and *ideal* self-concept. These findings suggest that people who are satisfied with themselves tend to be better lovers.
2. **True.** A group at the State University of New York studied the effects of self-esteem on success and failure. Ninety undergraduates were monitored following both successes and failures arranged by the researchers. The students who scored high on tests designed to measure self-esteem performed equally well following success and failure. Students with low self-esteem performed significantly better after a success than they did after a failure.
3. **True.** The findings of University of Tennessee researchers showed that actions that communicate acceptance and approval to children have a positive impact on a child's self-esteem. Pressure to achieve also has a salutary effect. Punishment, however, even though the child might feel it is deserved, has a negative effect. And while punishment is sometimes necessary, the findings suggest that if it is used sparingly and thoughtfully it will enable a child to maintain a more positive self-concept.
4. **False.** Research was conducted at the University of Santa Clara (Calif.) and the University of Texas on the relationship between social class and self-concept. Subjects of various ages and from all social classes were surveyed. The results showed no relationship be-

tween social class and self-concept; the self-esteem level averaged the same for all classes.

5. **False.** In a study conducted at Wright State University (Ohio), male

and female college students — pet owners and non-owners included — were given a battery of psychological tests. The results indicated that "differences in *self-esteem* were insignifi-

cant, but [that] pet owners did tend to have higher empathy scores (ability to put oneself in another's place) and higher interpersonal trust scores (more trusting of others)." **FW**

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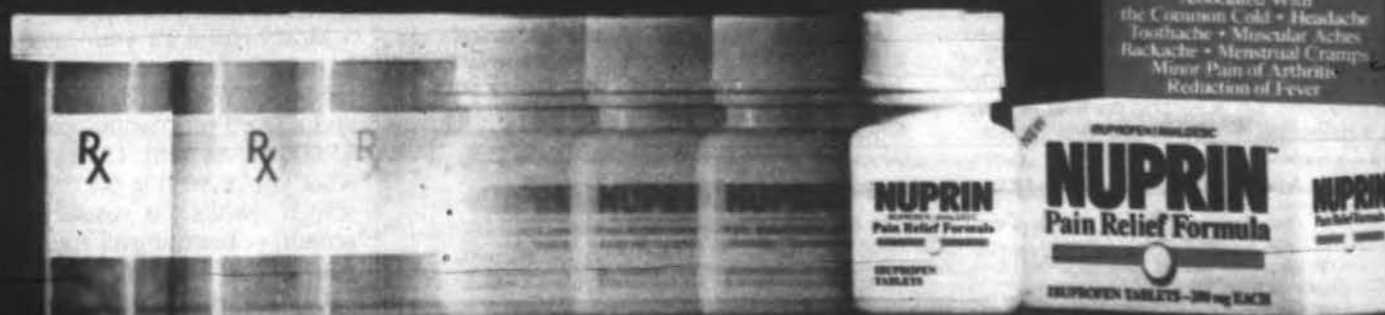

THE HOME COMPUTER
ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS KIDS ASK THE MOST

If your family is one of the 50 million American families still trying to decide whether to buy a home computer, here are six questions that your children are most apt to ask about them. The questions are based on a check of youngsters and parents who own and use computers.

Q: What games can you play on a home computer? Are they as good as the games at an arcade?

A: Hundreds of games are available, including just about all the arcade favorites. And plenty were designed specifically for computers.

Understand, though, that a computer is designed to do many things pretty well — of which playing games is one — while an arcade machine is designed to do just one thing extremely well — play a specific game. Arcade games will usually have flashier graphics and better controls. But games for a home computer can be more complex, and they can take longer to play than arcade games — hours or even days.

Q: Will a computer help me get better grades at school?

A: Those ads that seem to be saying that you'll fail in school if you don't have one leave it pretty vague about how a home computer can help.

There are computer programs to teach specific subjects — from math to foreign languages. There are even programs that will help you cram for your SAT exams. And educational programs are getting better all the time.

You can use your computer to bring lots of helpful information right into your home — from the latest news stories to articles from encyclopedias.

Most helpful for youngsters, though, is using a home computer as a word processor. You need a computer, printer and a word processing program (about \$1,000 for all of it). Then you compose what you're writing on the computer's screen (which is usually your TV screen) — rewriting all you want before you set a word down on paper.

Using a word processor will be faster and neater than using pen and ink, and you can keep revising your thoughts until you're happy with the final product. Most students report a marked improvement in their grades on reports and papers when they shift to a word processor.

Q: Do I have to know how a computer works to use it?

A: Not really — any more than you have to know how the internal combustion engine works to drive a car. You don't even have to know how to write a computer program, or know a computer language, to make a computer work. Flip a switch to turn the computer on, put in a program, and that's all you have to do.

Anything else you learn about computers and computer programming is up to you — but only because you want to know it, not because you have to.

Q: What businesses or professions will make the most use of computers when I'm grown up?

A: It's hard to imagine any field that won't be using computers in a few years — to juggle numbers, to store data, to write and edit reports, to design things, and to communicate with other computers.

Q: Can my computer really talk to other computers?

A: Sure. You need a device called a "modem" (\$100 and up) to connect your computer with the telephone lines, and a program so your computer can communicate with others.

Then your computer can make contact with hundreds of other computers around the country. There are commercial data banks (SOURCE and Compu-Serve) that have volumes of information on file for a fee. There are bulletin boards you can dial up that offer games and other features that you can copy for free. You can "talk" directly with other computer owners — typing out your messages on the keyboard.

WARNING: Between movies, TV shows and newspaper articles, there has been plenty of publicity given to computer "hackers" sneaking into business or government computers.

First, that's harder than it sounds. Second, it is a federal crime that can get you into serious trouble.

Q: Do I have to be afraid of breaking a computer?

A: The computer itself is built of solid-state electronic devices. The keyboard and the tape player or disk drive that you use to feed programs in, though, are mechanical devices and are considerably more fragile.

Still, computers are pretty sturdy machines. Treat one with the same care you'd use with your stereo system or TV set and you won't have to worry about breaking it. **FW**

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HOW TO DRESS UP HEALTHY OCCASIONS

Everyone loves a good salad, particularly one that is well-dressed. With the blending of a good oil — perhaps a fruity olive — and the right vinegar (a light rice-wine vinegar or a flavored fruit vinegar such as raspberry), a vinaigrette dressing can be great. However, for a change of pace, you might like to try a thick buttermilk blue-cheese dressing or a piquant jalapeno blend. Addendums provide interest: croutons, of course, slivers of nutty cheese, chopped hard-cooked egg, crumbled bacon, capers, sliced radishes, a sprinkle of chopped walnuts or slivered, toasted almonds. But whether you choose to create a simple salad of buttery Bibb or an olio of odds-and-ends, the right dressing can make it really special. Here is a lively selection to widen your repertoire.



FRENCH DRESSING

- 1 cup oil
- 1/2 cup cider vinegar
- 3 tablespoons ketchup
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, or to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- Few twists freshly ground black pepper
- 1 clove garlic, split

1. In a 1-pint jar with tight-fitting lid, combine ingredients. Cover tightly; shake well.
2. Refrigerate several hours; remove garlic. Shake thoroughly before serving.

Makes 1 1/2 cups

MUSTARD DRESSING

- 3 tablespoons white vinegar
- 3 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup oil
- 1/2 cup skim milk
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley or dill
- 1 teaspoon sugar

1/2 teaspoon salt, or to taste
Few twists freshly ground black pepper

1. Place vinegar and mustard in blender container; cover. Blend on medium speed

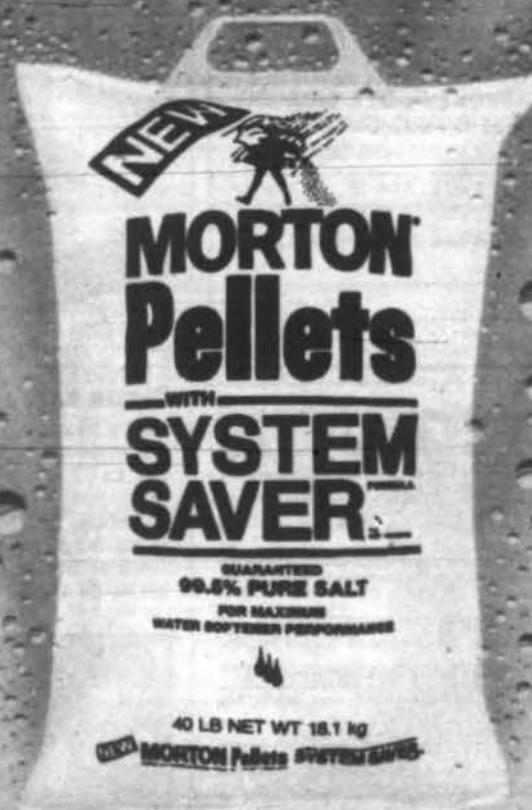
20 seconds or until well mixed.

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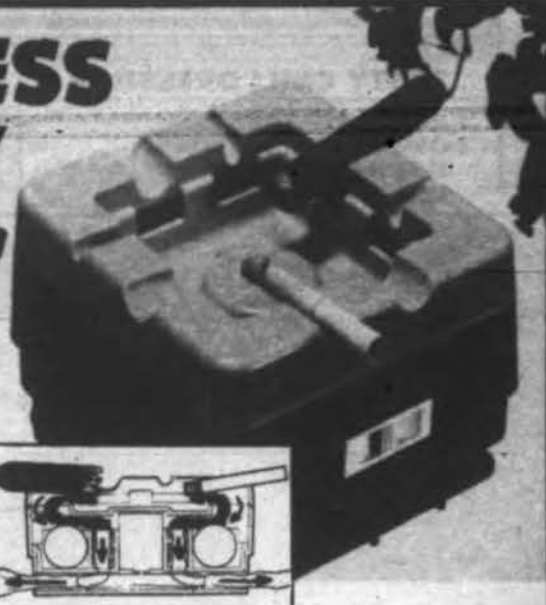
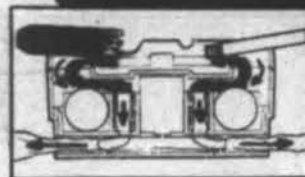

was the creator of the comic strip *Peanuts*. (Good grief!)

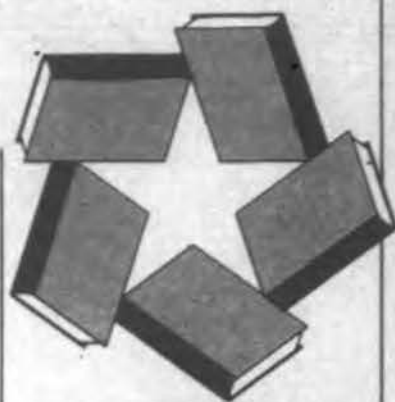

AS WE GO TO PRESS

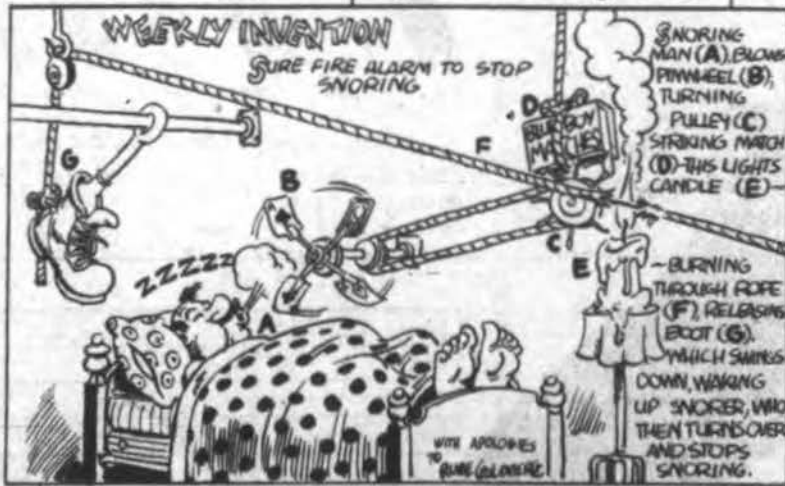

'Call to Glory' views '60s

New dramatic series from ABC focuses on Air Force family

In 1974, ABC introduced "Happy Days," a series that took a nostalgic look at life in the '50s. Now, in 1984, the same network is unveiling "Call to Glory," a series that will look back at life in the '60s.

The two programs are as different as the decades. "Happy Days" was a lighthearted 30-minute sitcom. "Call to Glory" is an hour-long drama focusing on an Air Force family during the turbulent early '60s. "Happy Days" was shot primarily on indoor sound stages. "Call to Glory" features extensive outdoor location footage and aerial photography.

The ambitious new series is getting special handling from ABC. "Call to Glory" received heavy promotion during ABC's popular Olympics coverage. The two-hour pilot movie (a particularly apt description here) airs Monday night at 8 on Channel 7.

Regular episodes will run be shown at 8 p.m. Mondays, beginning Aug. 20. The August start gives the series a chance to hook viewers before the avalanche of new fall shows arrives.

If the debut film is any indication, "Call to Glory" will be an appealing family series. The show is extremely well cast and uses a light, tasteful touch to evoke its era.

The interpersonal crises facing Air Force Col. Raynor Sarnac, his wife, his children and his neighbors may seem familiar to fans of programs like "The Waltons" or "Family." Where the series takes some chances is in weaving the domestic problems with some true historical events. If the approach doesn't work completely in the premiere film, the show at least deserves credit for stretching a familiar Hollywood formula.

Craig T. Nelson, a busy TV and movie actor perhaps best known as the father in "Poltergeist," lends a rugged presence to the lead role of Colonel Sarnac, the dedicated but soft-spoken leader of test pilots at Edwards Air Force Base.

Cindy Pickett, who graduated from "The Guiding Light" to film and prime-time TV roles, plays his strong-willed wife, Vanessa. In the premiere film, she has more mechanical aptitude than some of the male characters. (She's a whiz at repairing toasters.)

Inheriting her father's interest in aviation and her mother's fix-it skills is teen-age daughter Jackie. She's played by Elisabeth Shue, currently on movie screens as the hero's girlfriend in "The Karate Kid." Shue is outstanding in "Call to Glory," making

her character spunky but vulnerable, intelligent but socially awkward.

David Hollander is her younger brother Wesley, a more familiar TV type — the precocious, wise-cracking adolescent. Wide-eyed Gabriel Damon is 8-year-old RH Sarnac. In the premiere, RH stops talking to his parents, a behavior that forms a running dilemma in the first show.

The historic setting for the premiere is the Cuban Missile Crisis of October 1962. Sarnac and his pilots are ordered to fly over Cuba to gather photographic evidence that the Russians are installing nuclear weapons on that island. It's hazardous duty because Washington demands more detailed photos, bringing the American jets into range of the Cubans' surface-to-air missiles.

Making it worse, Sarnac and his men are sworn to secrecy and forced to keep even their wives in the dark. Most of the women suspect the worst. They get their news from televised talks by President Kennedy and his aides. (Interspersing 1963 news footage throughout the film is a good touch.)

While the missile crisis dominates the world news, at home there are other

problems. Jackie gets flying lessons from her grandpa (Keenan Wynn), even though her mother demands she stay earthbound. The Sarnacs also must find the reason for little RH's silence.

Mixing these domestic trials with the international missile crisis is an experiment that fizzles in the premiere. Because of the uneven weight given these events, you end up worrying more about why RH won't talk and less about those nasty missiles in Cuba. The film also suffers from a few unresolved storylines and vanishing characters. (A child psychologist gets a colorful introduction, then is never seen again.)

Still, there is a lot to admire about this production. There's stunning flight footage, although some seemed to have been inserted to pad the two-hour film. The '60s touches are skillfully applied in sparing strokes: A vintage Chevy station wagon. An air raid drill at school. "Surfin' Safari" and "Johnny Angel" on the radio. "To Kill a Mockingbird" on a theater marquee.

Elections: Useless ritual?

Corporations make policy, not people, UCI professor claims in his new book

All of the presidential primaries, the political conventions and even the November election are part of a giant ritual that really has no impact on who holds political power in America.

He claims that two political systems exist in the United States. One, controlled by business, wields power. The second system is the one taught about in civics classes and is an "idealized and unrealistic notion" of how American politics works, says Froman, a South Laguna resident.

Most Americans are fooled by the myth that people set broad governmental policy through their elected officials, Froman explains in

his book, published by Prentice Hall book. Real political power is held by corporations that control candidate

selections and dictate government policy, he says.

Froman takes several chapters in his book to document his premise, but he said three examples especially stand out.

A 1971 White House tape recording of a meeting between then-President Richard Nixon, Henry Ford II and Lee Iacocca revealed that the two automakers were able to convince Nixon to kill a proposed Department of Transportation regulation that would have required cars to have airbags.

"They were able to do this at an

informal meeting without anyone else present, not even the Secretary of Transportation," claims Froman.

A second example of how business controls policy is the regular meetings between California's largest agribusinesses and state agriculture officials, notes Froman.

"It is not a matter of just discussing policy. They can even set the price of oranges," he says.

A final example, Froman claims, is the reduction in the percentage of the national budget funded by corpor-

Gold medal only 2nd place in thrills

But cyclist Gorski says years of hard work all seem worth it after making it to No. 1

Mark Gorski won the U.S. sprint title in 1980, three top U.S. cycling races in 1982, and defeated world sprint champion Sergei Kopylov of the Soviet Union at the bicycling grand prix this year.

But the biggest thrill in the Costa

Mesa cyclist's 24 years came a week ago, when he stood on the medals platform at the 7-Eleven velodrome and heard the Star-Spangled Banner played in his honor.

Well, almost his biggest thrill.

The ultimate was the day he married his wife, 23-year-old Mary Gorski, 2 1/2 years ago, he says.

On Friday, as he relaxed and watched the last days of competition in the 1984 Summer Games from his modest Costa Mesa apartment, Gorski reflected on his medal and on his future plans.

He has been a cycling competitor since 11 years ago, when he started bicycling and bike touring in his native Chicago. Since then, he's risen to compete internationally as one of the fastest cyclists in the world.

Top-ranked in the cycling world this year, Gorski said, is an East

German cyclist who did not come to the games because of the Eastern Bloc boycott. But with a 1,000-meter time only 0.4 of a second off the Olympic record, Gorski said he thinks he could have beaten his top competitor.

Gorski and his family, which includes 13-month-old Alexander, moved to Costa Mesa in January and are leaving next week for Indianapolis.

Surf was up, so were rescues

Surfers reveled in it, but lifeguards and swimmers up and down the Orange Coast were left wondering what ever became of the Pacific Ocean as huge breakers continued their weekend assault on local beaches Saturday.

Lifeguards reported near record numbers of rescues as hurricane-spanned waves, often running in sets that reached 10 feet high, combined with perfect weather to lure the unsuspecting into the unusually warm water.

At Huntington State Beach, 60 swimmers were plucked from the turbulent waters and treacherous rip tides in one hour's time as 11 lifeguards battled the waves in one 400-yard stretch of beach around 3:30 p.m., according to Neil Macready, lifeguard supervisor.

"It was wild," said a weary Macready. "It was the worst I've ever seen."

He said he could not recall another instance in his eight-year career when so many lifeguards were all in the water attempting rescues at the same time.

Up and down the coast, the story was the same. The number of rescues reported ran three to eight times the normal for a summer's day.

Almost miraculously, given the ferocity of the surf, not a single drowning was recorded along Orange Coast beaches, although one near-drowning and several surf-related back and neck injuries did occur, according to area lifeguards.

It was "busy, busy, busy" along the Newport strand as city lifeguards pulled 489 persons to safety during the day, said lifeguard supervisor John Carpenter. That's more than

Games preempt NB fraud case

A Newport Beach fraud case that included the mysterious disappearance of \$300,000 worth of gold Krugerrands has been preempted by — of all things — the Summer Olympics.

The case, which has dragged on since the arrest of two men and a woman in February, was being presented to the federal grand jury in Los Angeles when the panel recessed for the Summer Games.

The three suspects, meanwhile, are free although the valuable gold coins have not been recovered.

The fraud case came to light last winter when an unsuspecting customer of American Savings and Loan in Los Angeles discovered that nearly \$1 million had been drained from his account.

According to Newport Beach police, part of the missing money was used to purchase 780 Krugerrands from Monex International Ltd., a Newport metals firm.

One of the suspects, however, botched what allegedly had been a perfectly hatched plan when he tried to sell some of the coins to an undercover policeman, authorities claim.

Arrested on suspicion of grand theft and wire fraud were Steven John Bourque, 27, of Mission Viejo; Michelle Monroe Morgan, 34, of Garden Grove; and John Mitchell Sylva, 40, of Upland.

Fraud investigators said the trio

MARATHON, Fla. — A 10,000-gallon fuel tank exploded at a dock here Saturday, shooting a fireball hundreds of feet in the air, injuring four people and destroying a warehouse, mobile homes and boats, authorities said. Local firefighters took two hours to extinguish the blaze on this island in the Florida Keys and hosed down two other fuel tanks to keep them from exploding, said Jerry Powell, spokesman for the Monroe County sheriff's office. One man was admitted to Fishermen's Hospital with burns on his upper body, while three firefighters were treated for smoke inhalation, hospital officials said.

AMC, Chrysler to hike prices

DETROIT — American Motors Corp. will raise prices on its 1985-model Renault and Jeep vehicles an average 4.1 percent, while Chrysler Corp. plans to boost prices of its minivans by 5 percent, an industry publication said. AMC expects to raise the price of its basic Encore hatchback by 3.5 percent, or \$204, to \$5,959, according to Ward's Automotive Reports. The base price of AMC's Eagle will increase 7.9 percent, or \$762, to \$10,457, Ward's said. Wagoner prices will rise 5.2 percent, or \$661, to \$13,255. Base prices for Chrysler's Caravan and Voyager will rise \$478 to \$9,147. The No. 3 automaker is expected to increase prices for its 1985 cars less than 4.1 percent, the publication said.

Ex-Jackson employee linked to threats

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Security officers for the Jacksons' Victory Tour appearance here watched Saturday for a former Jackson employee possibly linked to threats against Michael Jackson as promoters prepared for another record-breaking crowd. Damon Zumwalt, security director, said he doubted the man fired during the Jacksons' Irving, Texas, concerts was responsible for the letters but that extra precautions had been taken anyway.

'Perfect publisher' Alfred Knopf dies

PURCHASE, N.Y. — Alfred A. Knopf, described as the "perfect publisher" by his friend, newspaperman H.L. Mencken, died Saturday at his home here. Knopf, who brought before the American public the works of such acclaimed authors as Joseph Conrad, Thomas Mann and Willa Cather, died at 6:30 a.m. in bed, said his nurse, Gayle Jones. Many of the books bearing Knopf's distinctive Russian wolfhound mark won Nobel and Pulitzer prizes, including works by Albert Camus, Sigrid Undset, Mann, Ivan Bunin, Andre Gide and Knut Hamsun. Among American authors he published were novelists John Hersey and John Updike.

New Mexico braces for more flooding

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — Residents of parts of New Mexico braced for more rain as flood watches were issued and the governor-declared a state of emergency in one county Saturday after flash floods that ripped out roads and flooded streets and highways. Gov. Toney Anaya declared Lincoln County in a state of emergency Saturday, allowing relief from state agencies, and Anaya's press aide, David Roybal, said the National Guard was shipping 10,000 sandbags from Albuquerque to flood-threatened Ruidoso.

40,000-acre fire burning in Nevada

BATTLE MOUNTAIN, Nev. — A 40,000-acre range fire, the largest this summer in Nevada, burned out of control Saturday in north central Nevada despite the efforts of about 150 firefighters. Bureau of Land Management spokesman Douglas Waggoner said there have been no reports of injuries or major property damage resulting from the lightning-caused blaze that was touched off Friday.

Acid pit cleanup firm recommended

RIVERSIDE — A consulting firm which first worked on closure plans for the Stringfellow acid pits has been recommended to design and operate a treatment plant for contaminated water flowing from the site. The Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority has recommended that the state hire James M. Montgomery engineers, Montgomery — hired by the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board in the mid-1970s to study the costs of closing and cleaning up the Stringfellow site — was rated first among six firms bidding to be project coordinator for a \$1.2 million plant that would treat contaminated groundwater pumped from below the acid pits.

What's the time? Don't ask Bell

SAN FRANCISCO — If you're looking for the time of day, don't turn to Pacific Bell. The telephone company says it costs \$9 million a year to provide the recorded message and hopes to turn the service over to a private contractor who will charge 20 cents per call.

Battleship in thick of heated war

SAN FRANCISCO — A heated war has been launched between three cities vying to serve as home port for the battleship USS Missouri and win the \$127 million it could pump into the local economy each year. San Francisco, Long Beach and Honolulu have been fighting for the soon-to-be reactivated battleship since the Navy announced a month ago that one of the three cities could become home to "Mighty Mo." The 40-year-old, 888-foot battleship is undergoing a 21-month, \$500 million overhaul and modernization at Long Beach Naval Shipyard.

Souvenir pins latest Olympic theft

LOS ANGELES — Olympic souvenir pins worth \$2,500 were reported stolen from the Convention Center, the base for thousands of journalists covering the Games, and Zaire's delegation chief, Ssa Muaka, said he lost \$1,700 in the latest of several burglaries at the UCLA Village, police said Saturday. Police had no suspects in the pins theft. Sumpter said the vendor believed the thief or thieves climbed through a small opening at the back of the souvenir stand to take the pins. "There's a lot of stealing going on in the village," said U.S. sprinter Sam Graddy, whose warm-up suit was stolen from his room at USC. He added that U.S. women's team Jackie Washington lost \$170 and another member of the women's team lost \$700. "It's almost like a pack rat is loose in the village," police Cmdr. William Booth said. "We are taking a report and investigating each case."

Adelanto ruled out as prison site

ADELANTO — A proposed 288-acre prison site in Adelanto was rejected by the state Department of Corrections, but state Assemblyman Bill Leonard, R-Redlands says there's still a fight ahead on other possible sites in the desert town. The decision to abandon the site stemmed from an attorney general's opinion citing the threat of lawsuits over noise created by nearby George Air Force Base, Adelanto City Administrator Pat Chamberlaine said the corrections department was looking at three other sites in the town 70 miles northeast of Los Angeles, but Leonard says they may be too noisy as well.

Polish cargo ship strikes Red Sea mine

A Polish cargo ship struck a mine near the southern end of the Red Sea on Saturday and the explosion stopped the ship dead in the water, the official Polish news agency PAP reported. It said the strong blast extensively damaged engine room pipes, but caused no injuries. It was the latest in a series of mysterious explosions involving commercial ships in the 1,450-mile-long Red Sea, a vital shipping route connecting Europe to the Persian Gulf and South and East Asia.

Polish cardinal urges lifting of sanctions

WARSAW, Poland — Cardinal Jozef Glemp said Saturday that conditions in Poland "will change for the better as soon as sanctions imposed by the United States are removed." It was the first public reaction by the Polish primate to President Reagan's decision Aug. 3 to lift some of the sanctions ordered after the communist government imposed martial law in December 1981 and suppressed the Solidarity labor union. Glemp declined to elaborate on his statement when asked if he favored the lifting of all of the sanctions.

Pakistan's Zia blames West for drugs

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan — Pakistan's militarily ruler, Gen. Mohammed Zia ul-Haq, said Saturday he is willing to introduce the death penalty for drug traffickers, but feels hampered because of "soft laws" for narcotics offenses in the West. While acknowledging that Pakistan is a major supplier of heroin, Zia, 63, told The Associated Press in an exclusive interview that efforts to eradicate the trade are useless as long as the United States and European countries continue giving "two-month jail terms for selling heroin on the open street."

Reagan chides House leaders

SANTA BARBARA (AP) — Giving House Democratic leaders "a red letter F," President Reagan chided a "do-nothing" Congress on Saturday for postponing action on what he called important legislation until after its recess.

During his weekly paid political radio speech, Reagan announced that he had signed the so-called equal access bill for public schools. The president said the measure was the only item in a package of six important bills that won congressional approval before Friday's recess.

The measure, which Reagan said was long overdue, allows student religious groups to meet in public high schools during non-school hours.

But Reagan accused the House Democratic leadership of failing their party's test of "new realism" — set by presidential candidate Walter Mondale — by not enacting the other measures he said were important to Americans.

He said these bills included a constitutional amendment mandating a balanced federal budget, a proposal to create economic enterprise zones in depressed areas, and a measure to allow spouses to have investment retirement accounts.

WEST COVINA (AP) — Eight families evacuated from their homes because of toxic gas from the BKK Landfill say they won't return until safety is guaranteed, but officials say fumes have dropped to an "acceptable" level.

Members of 11 other evacuated families were told, however, that it may be several months before they are allowed to return to their homes near the landfill.

At a meeting Friday of evacuees, state health officials and representatives of the federal Environmental Protection Agency, the eight homeowners vowed to stay away despite official assurances.

"It doesn't make me feel any better," said Joseph Jaime, 31, one who was told he could return. "I'm not going back. Never." About 60 families were evacuated last month after dangerous levels of

methane gas and vinyl chloride, a carcinogen, were found filtering from the landfill into their homes.

Most families evacuated from the BKK Landfill area have been living in hotels since then.

On Thursday, the U.S. House of Representatives ordered dumping at the landfill halted and voted 323-33 on a bill to expand the "superfund" toxic wastes cleanup program from its current \$1.6 billion level to \$10.2 billion.

EPA official Jeff Zelikson told the homeowners that the latest chemical readings taken at eight homes are

"acceptable." Zelikson said that of the remaining 11 homes, more testing is needed before chemical levels are declared acceptable.

Angelo Bellomo, a state health department representative, said monitoring of the houses will continue and that the eight families permitted to return could be ordered to leave again if chemical levels exceed safety standards.

"You want us to go back to our homes not knowing what's going to happen?" homeowner Edith Kunihiko asked.

It took a whole fleet to reunite relatives

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It took 10 patrol cars, three motorcycles, a few supervisors and a helicopter, but police finally reunited a lost woman with her 82-year-old mother and infant granddaughter Saturday after they were separated near the Coliseum Olympics site.

At about 10:45 a.m. Saturday, a woman told police that after parking her car so she could pick up some Games information, she got lost and was unable to locate her car, in which her mother and granddaughter were waiting, police Officer Loren Zimmerman said.

"The officers were concerned because of the heat," he said.

So the LAPD's Exposition Park Task Force assigned 10 cars, three motorcycle officers, three supervisors and one air unit (the copter) to assist this lady, Zimmerman said.

Meanwhile, the 82-year-old, who had been waiting for an hour, "became worried and started driving around looking for her daughter," Zimmerman said.

At 1:45 p.m., he said, police found the car at 39th and Vermont. The family was reunited 15 minutes later.

Police didn't get the name of the lost woman, but her relatives were identified as Dorothy Adamsom, 82, and Tiffany Wedell, 1 month, both of La Mirada.

1 percent pay offer raises faculty's ire

LONG BEACH (AP) — Despite a 10 percent hike in state support, the California State University system is offering its 19,000 professors an across-the-board pay increase of only 1 percent, the faculty union says.

"A 1 percent offer is really outlandish," faculty union president Bill Crist, an economics professor at Cal State Stanislaus, said Friday. "Both the governor and the chancellor have made proclamations since January that there was enough money for a 10 percent raise."

Jacob Samit, assistant vice chancellor and chief negotiator for the 19-campus Cal State system, says the 1 percent general salary increase is only a small part of the Cal State offer.

Cal State has agreed to lift the current ceiling on the salary schedule, to pay the added costs of fringe benefits and to include salary bonuses that are "based on merit," Samit said.

Cal State also wants to reserve some of its new money for substantial increases in salaries for professors in "hard-to-hire" subjects such as electrical engineering, Samit said.

"If you add it up, we've put almost 6 percent on the table for the union. To say it is 1 percent misrepresents our position," Samit said.

However he admitted the administration's proposed increase falls short of the 10 percent the professors were led to expect by the Legislature and Cal State Chancellor W. Ann Reynolds.

Crist said professors oppose merit pay bonuses and, while "not opposed in concept" to higher pay for "hard-to-hire" professors, are seeking a better raise for all faculty members.

The salary dispute has helped stall faculty contract negotiations, which are to resume Monday with the arrival of a state-appointed mediator, Crist said.

Cal State professors received no increase in 1982 and got a 3 percent general salary raise in 1983, the first year of collective bargaining by the

California Faculty Association, certified in March 1983.

In January, Gov. George Deukmejian said he wanted faculty salaries at Cal State and the University of California to catch up with those at comparable institutions nationwide.

Patton trainees wanted

SAN BERNARDINO (AP) — The government, seeking to compile a history of Gen. George S. Patton's stay in the Mojave and Colorado deserts, is looking for World War II veterans who remember training there under Patton.

Between 1942 and 1945, an estimated 300,000 soldiers under Patton participated in tank and infantry maneuvers over more than 20,000 square miles in San Bernardino and Riverside counties, sometimes venturing into western Arizona and southern Nevada.

Patton pioneered what later became known as the Desert Training Center to prepare for action against Nazi Germany forces in North Africa led by the infamous "Desert Fox," Field Marshal Erwin Rommel.

Patton himself only spent about a year at the training center. He died in a car accident after the war in Europe ended.

Tongan tour group under probe by INS

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Federal authorities detained 74 Tongans and their travel agent after receiving a tip that the Polynesian tour group was a "cover" for the smuggling of illegal aliens.

Ten of the Tongans, stopped in Honolulu Aug. 4 for questioning, face exclusionary hearings "within a few days," said Immigration and Naturalization Service spokesman John Belluardo.

Sipa Sekona, 42, the travel agent, was charged with making false oral and written statements to obtain non-immigration visas, Belluardo said. Sekona was arraigned Thursday before a U.S. magistrate and was being held in lieu of \$25,000 bond.

He faces up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. "I think they were using the

Olympics as a cover," Belluardo said Friday. "They had Olympic tickets, although they were outdated. It's possible some of them were genuine tourists, but we're confident the majority of them would rather stay in the United States."

Forty-one of the Tongans were released after posting a \$1,000 bond "as a deterrent for them overstaying their visas," he said. Another 23 were allowed into Los Angeles without posting bonds.

"We received an anonymous telephone call from an individual who claimed that the people who had arranged to come to the United States intended to overstay their visas and try to achieve illegal permanent residency in the United States," Belluardo said.

Beer, pop's short, but watermelon's aplenty

Peking heat wave forces shops to close, miserable citizens to sleep out of doors

PEKING (AP) — The Chinese capital is sweating through one of the hottest and most humid summers in years, blessed with a record watermelon harvest but cursed by a spate of drownings and shortages of beer and pop for its 9.3 million people.

The thousands of brick buildings and narrow alleys radiate the heat of the sultry days, turning the city into a huge oven and making it difficult for urban dwellers to stay comfortable.

Temperatures get so hot indoors that thousands of people spend nights outside, sitting under streetlights, playing cards, reading or watching the traffic go by.

Men often go bare-chested and women wear light cotton dresses, a drastic change in fashion from Peking's more puritan days of a decade ago.

The central and municipal governments have been giving many workers afternoons off. Telephone calls to offices often result in no answer or a response from a sleepy-sounding switchboard operator who says, "Xia banle," which roughly means, "Everybody's quit for the day."

By early August, daytime temperatures were exceeding 95 degrees Fahrenheit, with a humidity reading of at least 75 percent.

The Peking Meteorological Observatory said that Monday Aug. 6, when thermometers hit 99 degrees, was the hottest day in the city since 1958.

"Capital Residents Must Beware of the Intense Heat of Summer," blared

a headline in a recent issue of the Peking Evening News, the popular afternoon tabloid newspaper. It said the Peking Children's Hospital was treating 300 children a day for skin rashes and other heat-related ailments.

The Communist Party newspaper Peking Daily reported in July that more than 22 Peking residents, mostly young children, had drowned in rivers and reservoirs.

Hundreds of people have been seen swimming in the Liangma River that skirts northern Peking, though local press reports have warned swimmers that the water is filthy from sewage.

One good result of the summer has been an unprecedented supply of watermelons. Local peasants, permitted to sell on the street under the government's relaxed economic policies, station themselves outside stores, near bus stops and parks to hawk the melons, which are about the size of bowling balls.

"It is difficult to buy a bad watermelon this year," said one middle-aged Chinese who lives in Peking's Haidian district, where prices have gone down to the equivalent of less than one penny a pound. The official news agency Xinhua has said the capital is in the throes of "watermelon fever."

There is, however, dearth of beer, a favorite drink since the Germans introduced it to China at the turn of the century. The local brew costs the equivalent of 15 cents a bottle.

Except for foreigners and privileged members of the Communist Party elite, who can buy beer freely at hotels and the special Friendship Stores that only accept foreign currency, most Peking beer-drinkers are suffering.

The Workers Daily recently explained that the lack of beer bottles brought about the beer shortage in Peking. The newspaper was responding to reader complaints that only people who brought empty bottles to stores could buy beer.

The lack of bottles and other materials have also caused shortages of soft drinks and flavored ice pops, two other favorite summer treats.

"Ayah, I ran around to several stores to buy ices and soda, but all I could find were a few leftover ice cream cones," the Peking Evening News quoted an unidentified worker as saying.

Even with the shortages, Pekingers put away 5 million ice pops and 600,000 bottles of soda a day, the official press has reported.

Since there is an average of one refrigerator for every 700 people in China, most householders must buy cold drinks as needed from white-smocked sellers with insulated boxes on the street.

The shortage of refrigeration also has resulted in cases of food poisoning, according to the Peking Epidemic Prevention and Control Department. It reported that spoiled pork had poisoned more than 50 people by June.

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Graduate takes 'sandwich' on his job hunting safaris

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Finding that job hunting the conventional way is too slow, Douglas Nicholas is taking a more aggressive approach he calls "direct personal advertising."

Nicholas, 23, of Bettendorf, who graduated in December from the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls, showed up on a busy Des Moines street corner Wednesday wearing a three-piece suit and a sandwich sign which read in capital letters:

"Need a great employee! I'm a recent UNI graduate who wants to do advertising, marketing, sales. Ask for

resume."
 "Signs work great for politics. I'm going to see if they work for a job," Nicholas said.

"This is advertising in its rawest form. I got tired of sending resumes to companies and not hearing from them for several months. This way I'm letting them know that I want a job and I'm showing them that I'm aggressive."

Nicholas said the effort paid off in his first couple of hours.

"Two of the first people who stopped to talk to me were Procter & Gamble employees," he said. "They asked for my resume to send to their

regional office.
 "A man from a brokerage firm stopped to tell me they're looking for account executives. And the manager of a J.C. Penney store in the Valley West Shopping Mall asked me to come out for an interview. A lot of others have stopped to say they're interested."

Nicholas said he's been working as a construction worker in the Davenport area since he graduated.

"Last Saturday was my last day," he said. "I just decided that now was the time to find a job in the kind of work I want to do."

Crumbling mountainside being glued back in place

\$13 million project needed to stop rocks from falling on traffic

WATERVILLE, N.C. (AP) — High in the Great Smoky Mountains, workmen are literally bolting and gluing a crumbling mountainside together to stop boulders from crashing down on Interstate 40.

Traffic along the busy highway linking Asheville, N.C., and Knoxville, Tenn., stops for up to half an hour at a time while workers repair fractures and blast loose rocks that seem in danger of falling.

Hundreds of junked cars, smashed flat and stacked three deep, form a wall between the roadway and falling rock. Fallen boulders have taken huge chunks out of smaller concrete barriers.

The \$13 million project began in the spring of 1982 after a pile of rock 200 feet wide fell onto the road along the Pigeon River Gorge in Haywood County, blocking North Carolina's main access to the World's Fair in Knoxville. It should be finished by the end of the year, said Ron Watson, the North Carolina Department of Transportation's resident engineer for the project.

"There have been a couple of fatalities directly attributed to falling rock," he said. "I'm sure there were many others where a rock was in the road and caused a wreck. We had quite a large number of wrecks down there. Almost every week, there was a big truck wreck."

Where a fracture in the mountain appears likely to widen, under water pressure from heavy rain or an earth tremor, workers bolt the rock together with steel bolts an inch wide and as long as 90 feet.

"We drill through the questionable rock into good solid rock beneath," Watson said. "We put epoxy glue in the bottom, stick the bolt in, spin it to mix the glue and it sets up in three or four minutes."

Grout poured into the hole prevents corrosion. Hydraulic jacks then apply 70,000 pounds of pressure to each bolt and a nut is put on the end.

"We've probably put in 20,000 feet of bolts already," said Watson. "We're probably halfway."

"It's a very common practice," said Dr. Duncan Heron, a professor of geology at Duke University in Durham. "It ought to work. We'll

Watson said if the highway's route through the mountains had been cut correctly in the first place, the problems might not be so severe.

"Twenty years ago, when the road was built, we did not pre-split rock cuts," said Watson. "It was not a practice at that time ... it was just plain blasting."

Pre-splitting involves drilling closely-spaced holes along a desired crack in a rock. It lessens the shock of the blast to the rock that remains and reduces crumbling within the rest of the mountain.

"If that road were built today with more modern technology, it wouldn't be as dangerous," Watson said. "I don't know how much investigation of the geological formation of the mountain was done then. Now we do an in-depth geological review" for such projects.

The scenic highway along the Pigeon River carries about 11,000 cars a day. Motorists traveling on it can see four tall, red cranes along the cliffs beside the westbound lane.

Workers on one crane are using devices shaped like bulldozer tracks to scrape loose rocks off the mountainside. Sometimes a small backhoe is lifted up to the cliff to push other rocks off. The other three cranes hold drilling platforms.

The project's first phase involved building two more eastbound lanes, closer to the river to move the traffic away from the cut. Heavy wire mesh was then placed over some rock that couldn't be bolted or scraped off. One of the last phases will be to build a wall between the westbound lane and the rock face to catch falling debris. With a chain link fence at the top, it will be 8 feet tall in the most dangerous areas, Watson said.

"They originally planned to put up a barrier and let the traffic go ahead," said Watson. "But we found immediately that it wasn't safe because some rocks jump completely over and land in the eastbound lane. Occasionally, a big rock about the size of my desk will jump over in the lane, and that takes an extra 15 minutes to clear."

Nose-counting the nation: An expensive task

Census Bureau already preparing for 1990 tabulation which could cost up to \$4 billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Even as details of the 1980 Census are still being tabulated, government statisticians are planning the next national head count, just over 67 months away.

"We feel that we have made a better start for planning a census than ever before," said assistant census director Peter A. Bounpane, who is in charge of preparing for the next count.

The Constitution requires the government to count Americans every 10 years, primarily to make sure there are more or less equal numbers of people in each congressional district.

But as U.S. society has grown larger and more complex, so has the census. It probes ever more deeply into peoples' lives.

"Federal revenue-sharing laws require census data to distribute funds. State and local governments, businesses and others use the data for a wide variety of analysis, planning and research activities," Bounpane explained.

"These demands and the diversity of the times have changed the census from a recurring national event to a continuous evolutionary cycle."

Indeed, that cycle is under way now. Businessmen and special interest groups already are clamoring to have their specific needs represented through questions on the 1990 Census form — which ultimately must be approved by Congress.

"The appetite of data users for more information is insatiable," Bounpane said, but its needs must be balanced with the reporting burden on the public and the counting burden on the bureau.

To help sample public interest in what should be asked on April 1, 1990, a questionnaire will be sent out to a sample of the population in 1986, and public meetings will be held across the country.

Bounpane said the bureau will go to Congress in 1987 with a list of subjects it hopes to cover in the census. A decision is needed by April 1, 1988 so that computers can be prepared and forms printed.

Preparations for the 1990 count have drawn little public interest so far, but that is changing in some parts of the country where first-stage tests have begun.

Starting in March, Census workers fanned out in parts of Connecticut, Georgia and Texas to record residential addresses and the number of dwelling units at each address. These will be compared for accuracy with lists supplied by the Postal Service and other sources. Such lists are essential to a good census, since most of the count depends on mailed forms.

Tampa, Fla., and Jersey City, N.J., will be the sites of the first full-scale test next spring, Bounpane said. This effort will try out expanded use of computers by the Census Bureau, the agency that pioneered automated data systems a century ago.

If technology can be used even more efficiently than in 1980 it could mean a major saving for the bureau. And counting America is a costly process.

The 1970 census cost \$222 million, and the bill for 1980 topped \$1 billion. The General Accounting Of-

ice says the next one could cost \$4 billion or more.

Once again, two census forms are planned for 1990 — the long and the short. In 1980 one-fifth of homes received the long form, while everyone else got the short version.

Part of next year's test will determine if that is the best way to continue, or if better results are obtained by sending everyone a short form, and then going back with the long version for a sample.

In Tampa, the bureau also will try sending a post card reminder to homes that have not responded a few days after the census. Officials hope that will save special trips by workers.

Bounpane said that computerized telephone interviews and hand-held terminals might be possibilities in 1990. But he told American Demographics magazine that people might be reluctant to cooperate if confronted with too much technology. A "Big Brother" phobia could become a problem, he warned.

Fielding 200,000 to 300,000 temporary workers is a continuing problem for the bureau. In the past, when local politicians handed out these jobs, the most efficient workers have not always been available. Also, the increasing number of two-worker families has diminished the number of housewives seeking a part-time job.

Bounpane told American Demographics that there is some thought of hiring local government employees, such as school teachers, fire fighters, or transit workers, on a temporary or part-time basis.

Census officials are sensitive to complaints that minorities are often undercounted — especially blacks and Hispanics — and Jersey City and Tampa were selected for tests partly because of large minority populations.

Big cities, the homes for the largest number of minorities, have been particularly interested in improving the census, several claiming they were undercounted in 1980, resulting in a loss of federal benefits from the growing number of programs keyed to population.

This dispute has raised the question of whether census figures should be adjusted to account for people missed in the count, and how such an adjustment would be done.

Teens write own book about teens

High school project a big success; kids sell 12,500 copies

CHICAGO (AP) — If no one understands American teen-agers, it's not the fault of journalism students at Glenbard East High School.

Twenty members of the student newspaper, the Echo, spent two years compiling "Teen-agers Themselves," a 270-page book that gives the views of hundreds of American teens on subjects ranging from parents to sex to nuclear holocaust.

The book, which sells for \$16.95, went on sale in late June. The first printing of 12,500 copies sold out, and the book is now in its second printing, said publisher Esther Cohen of New York.

The book covers 20 major topics, among them prejudice, priorities, religion, relationships, the future, drugs and death. The variety of views expressed indicates that, "while there are some universal teen-age experiences, there is no universal teen-ager," said Diana Slyfield, 17, Echo editor-in-chief for 1983-84.

"We strove for a diversity in the opinions and the areas," said Tracy Wykert, 18, Echo assignment director. "We tried to put in responses from all 50 states. And that way we could get a wide range of views."

On the subject of parents, for example, 17-year-old Kelly Curry of Lubbock, Texas, wrote: "My parents and I have an average relationship. They tell me. Then they tell me louder. Then they scream it. Then I do it."

On sex, 17-year-old Shannon Appel of St. Clair Shores, Mich., wrote: "It's so scary because if you do, then the guy might go tell some other guys. Then when another guy asks you out, you don't know if he likes you or if he's asking you out because of what he heard...about you."

On nuclear war, Brian Dary, 18, of Greenfield, Wis., said: "The thing that comes first in my life above everything would be learning all I can about superior weaponry and...survivalism."

And Steve Bresnahan, 16, of Newton, Mass., said: "My one fear concerning the future is nuclear war. I can work around all my other fears, such as an unsatisfactory job or bad

chosen topics.

In one of the discussions, on death, a 17-year-old senior girl said: "I think the biggest problem I have dealing with my mom's (heart attack) is that I made a pact with her that if she ever got to the point where she was a vegetable... I would pull the plug. That's what scares me a lot... I wonder if I could bring myself to do it. But I promised her that I would."

On teachers, a 16-year-old junior girl said, "I got the worst grade in geometry that I got all through high school, but I still appreciated that teacher the most because of the respect he had for me."

The book includes student-drawn cartoons which capture some of the contradictions of being a teen-ager. One shows a high school boy making a pitch to his girlfriend. "I don't think premarital sex should be taken lightly," he says. "So seriously, let's go to bed."

Finance panel plans major overhaul of U.S. tax system

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Finance Committee opened hearings last week on overhauling the federal income tax amid broad agreement on the panel that the system has become too complex and so riddled with loopholes that it is unfair.

"A major reason we are considering fundamental reforms is the indication of weakening consensus behind our present system, as demonstrated by the growing compliance problem," said Sen. Bob Dole, R-

Kan., the chairman, in opening the hearing.

"We do not want to hastily adopt a system that cannot be sustained over time, either because of technical flaws or lack of popular support," Dole added.

Dole emphasized that the effort to overhaul the income tax is separate from the debate between President Reagan and his Democratic challenger, Walter F. Mondale, on whether taxes should be raised next

year.

Sen. John C. Danforth, R-Mo., said the huge tax bills passed by Congress in 1982 and 1984 are "enough to make a convert of anyone" who doubts the necessity for simplifying tax laws. Twenty years ago, he said, the federal tax code filled only one book; today, it fills two books, even before the changes enacted this year are added.

"I hope we can start from scratch" and write a completely new code no bigger than the 60-page index to the present law, Danforth said.

Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., who is co-sponsor of a bill that would make numerous changes but keep the basic income tax, said "all segments of society are wanting a tax system that is fair and simpler with lower rates." He added that most people want to keep the principle in the present law that takes a proportionately larger share for taxes as income increases.

Sen. Steven Symms, R-Idaho, said many people are wary of the movement toward "tax reform," fearing it will mean higher taxes.

"When Congress talks of tax reform, grab your wallet and run for cover," he said.

On the other hand, Dole cautioned against an expectation that tax overhaul will produce a tax cut. "I don't think that's possible," he added.

Who would win if Lewis raced Jesse Owens?

Better equipment, new rules assist modern athletes

Could Carl Lewis beat Jesse Owens in a 100-meter race? You'd think so if you looked at nothing but their times, but look again.

Jesse Owens ran 100 meters in 10.2 seconds. Carl Lewis won the Olympics in 9.99. What you have to look at again is the surface they each ran on. Owens ran on a cinder track. The final layer on all tracks of that era was made of the brittle, pebbly, porous residue of the iron-smelting process. Carl Lewis won the Olympic 100-meter on a surface made of rubber and polyurethane.

Jesse Owens dug two holes in the cinder track behind the starting line and planted the toes of his spiked track shoes in those holes as a brace for his feet in the starting position. Carl Lewis used carefully designed starting blocks planted on the surface of the track. We'll never know how fast Jesse Owens could have run on a rubber track with starting blocks.

Some of the world records that were set in Olympic events suggest we're breeding a race of supermen and superwomen. Because of better nutrition and improved training procedures, athletes probably are getting better, but they're also getting a lot of help from new rules and improved equipment.

The pole vault is a prime example. I saw the world's record set at 14 feet 4 inches by Bill Graber using a bamboo pole. Today, they're using a fiberglass pole that acts as a catapult. The pole bends under the force of the runner's weight and speed and then, as he goes into the air, the pole snaps back, throwing the vaulter over the bar. The vaulters are up above 19 feet now. It's a beautiful sport, but I doubt that the vaulters today are 5 feet better than Bill Graber.

The high jump record is dramatically higher than it was 25 years ago, too, but the rules have changed so that an athlete today can get over the bar any way he's able to. Formerly, for example, a jumper could not go over head first.

Swim records have improved phenomenally in 50 years. Rowdy Gaines, the Olympic 100-meter champion, might have beaten Johnny

Weissmuller because he's in better shape, but I wonder how Rowdy would feel wearing the full top and bottom bathing suit that Weissmuller had to wear, according to the regulations at the 1924 Olympics.

Modern swimmers have dozens of technical advantages over their predecessors. Today's starting blocks can be as high as 30 inches above the water level of the pool, giving the swimmer a great advantage in forward motion from that elevated position. Weissmuller and Buster Crabbe just curled their toes over the edge of the pool for their starts.

The modern, 50-meter Olympic pool has all but eliminated the waves between lanes that earlier swimmers had to battle. Pools are scientifically designed with deep gutters and expensively engineered lane dividers that quell much of the motion. Furthermore, lanes that were once 6 feet wide were 8 feet wide at the Olympics.

Several years ago, one of the good U.S. women swimmers, Mary T. Meagher, swam in a pool with three of the dividing devices installed between each of the eight lanes. Mary T. set a new world's record that day, but swimmers are still arguing over whether it should be allowed or not.
The Huff company spent \$600,000 designing a new aerodynamically perfect \$15,000 bike for our cycling team.

Our rowers used shells whose bottoms were coated with a substance designed by NASA.

The U.S. rifle team was taking pills called "beta blockers." They reduce the pulse rate and make it easier for a marksman to hold steady.

There's nothing wrong with any of these aids to record-making. We just have to be careful not to assume that this generation has left my generation behind.

I personally would like to see the showboating Carl Lewis eat Jesse Owens' dust on a cinder track.

Greek arms dealer's exploits legion

Managed to win plenty of influence despite checkered career all over globe

WASHINGTON — The case of Greek munitions merchant Basil Tsakos gets curiouser and curiouser.

He spun a web that caught many prominent Washington figures, including Sen. Mark O. Hatfield, R-Ore., in its gossamer-like strands. He sought their support for a pipeline scheme by spreading money around generously in Washington. The evidence suggests that he was simply using the influence-buying technique he had perfected in arms deals abroad.

For example, sources in the United States and West Germany told my associate Corky Johnson that Tsakos tried in 1981 to cut in on the sale of 100 Leopard tanks to Greece by the West German firm of Krauss-Maffei, claiming he was owed a \$10 million commission. When Krauss-Maffei refused to pay, Tsakos sued.

According to knowledgeable sources, Tsakos offered a cool million dollars to former Greek Defense Minister Evancelos Averoff if he would testify that Tsakos had arranged the tank sale. Tsakos also told

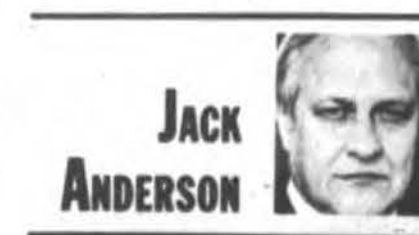
an associate that he had given \$25,000 to New Democracy, the opposition party Averoff heads.

Averoff reportedly refused to cooperate with Tsakos and became angry when the arms dealer persisted. Averoff told my associate that he knew nothing of any contribution from Tsakos.

But the sources said retired Greek Gen. Demetrios Lambridis did take money from Tsakos for signing a court statement that said Tsakos had participated in the tank sale. Tsakos reportedly paid Lambridis an initial \$20,000 from a Swiss bank account, and promised more. Lambridis denied getting any money from Tsakos.

When Tsakos came to this country in 1980, he hooked up with an entrepreneur named Frank Rosenbaum. They were introduced by an ex-congressman and ex-convict, Cornelius Gallagher, D-N.J., who had figured in the scandal of an earlier influence buyer, Tongsun Park.

The biggest deal Tsakos and Rosenbaum put together involved \$1 billion worth of old Soviet-made

weapons to be purchased from Egypt and sold to Iraq. Using an introduction from a Rockwell International employee, Al Grasselli, they persuaded Egyptian Defense Ministry officials to agree to the sale.

To be on the safe side, Tsakos hired a former Egyptian general to seal the deal. Though the army eventually got to Iraq, sources said it was doubtful that Tsakos was able to make the sale himself after several trips to Baghdad. Grasselli, who got a free trip to a ski resort in Gstaad, Switzerland, out of Tsakos, said he broke off contact with the arms merchant after learning of his shady dealings. But his employer, Rockwell, did business with Tsakos.

Court records show that Rosenbaum arranged a meeting for Tsakos in Paris with representatives of Rockwell and a French firm to discuss the sale of security surveillance equipment to Saudi Arabia. Tom Campobasso of Rockwell attended the

meeting; he later became a member of the board of Tsakos' trans-African pipeline company.

Even after being shown a report on Tsakos' criminal record by a Rockwell associate who was an ex-CIA agent, Campobasso arranged to have Tsakos represent Rockwell in the sale of aircraft and missile parts to Morocco, Tunisia and Abu Dhabi.

Campobasso did not return several calls for comment.

Late last year, Tsakos contacted General Dynamics seeking a contract to sell new tanks to Greece. He then planned to sell Greece's old tanks to Lebanon. But sources said the deal fell through when General Dynamics learned of Tsakos' alleged bribery attempts in Athens.

Despite the bulging file of evidence about Tsakos' dubious background and business methods, he was able to gain support for his ambitious pipeline scheme from some influential people in Washington, notably Hatfield.

Footnote: Because of a typographical error, a recent column reported that Tsakos had given an associate \$25,000 to buy influence in Washington. The correct amount was \$250,000.

Jordan leaves his jersey behind; police to rescue

LOS ANGELES — A police sergeant claimed a bit of credit Saturday for the U.S. basketball team's gold medal, saying he rushed starter Michael Jordan's jersey to the Forum just as the game against Spain was starting.

Jordan, who scored 20 points in the U.S. team's 96-65 Friday night romp over the Spaniards, accidentally left his jersey in his room at the University of Southern California Olympic Village.

Jordan discovered his error at about 6:15 p.m. Friday, and without the jersey, he wouldn't have been allowed to play in the 7 p.m. game because trading jersey numbers isn't allowed, police Cmdr. William Booth said.

Police in Inglewood, where the Forum is located, dispatched a car to pick up the jersey, but the Inglewood officers weren't allowed inside the village. Just then, Los Angeles police Sgt. Emilio Perez happened to be driving by the apartment building where the American team is staying.

"The assistant (U.S.) team manager ran out and flagged me down and was yelling and screaming," Perez said.

O'Meara takes one-shot lead

Laguna Niguel's Mark O'Meara, continuing a hot streak that began seven tournaments ago, fired an 8-under-par 64 in the third round Saturday to take a one-stroke lead into the final round of a PGA tournament in Grand Blanc, Mich. O'Meara, 27, the 1979 U.S. Amateur champion who is seeking his first win as a pro, was at 14-under 202, one shot ahead of Lee Trevino, Denis Watson, Iso Aoki of Japan and Payne Stewart in the \$400,000 event. O'Meara's 202 also is a 54-hole record for this tournament. After missing the cut at the Memorial Tournament in Dublin, Ohio, in May, O'Meara has finished in the top 10 in each of his last six tournaments, including runner-up four times. In the LPGA event at High Point, N.C., JoAnne Carner, forced to finish her second round shortly after sunrise Saturday, charged past defending champion Patty Sheehan at sunset with a 3-under-par 69 to take the lead after three rounds.

Stones has Olympic heritage

LOS ANGELES — Irvine's Dwight Stones has an Olympic heritage, and not only because the U.S. high jumper is competing in his third Games. His grandfather, Hal Roberts, arranged all the music for the 1932 Olympics in Los Angeles.

"He was the (University of Southern California) bandleader, and the band was known as Hal Roberts and his Trojans before it was called the Trojan Marching Band," Stones said.

Dwight Stones, however, went to UCLA, much to the dismay of his family.

"USC was late in trying to recruit me, although I always wanted to go there," Stones said.

Mets' Gooden sets club mark

Dwight Gooden struck out 10 in seven innings to set a rookie season record for New York Mets pitchers, and combined with Jesse Orosco to key a 3-1 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates Saturday night. Gooden, 10-8, a 19-year old right-hander, boosted his strikeout total to 181 to erase the old team record of 178 by Jerry Koosman in 1968. The 10 strikeouts enabled Gooden to regain the National League lead in strikeouts over the Dodgers' Fernando Valenzuela, who has 178. In other NL action, Keith Moreland singled home Ryne Sandberg with one out in the top of the ninth to lift the Chicago Cubs to a 2-1 victory over Montreal.

Mark Thurmond held Atlanta to four hits over seven innings and Graig Nettles belted his 13th home run to lead San Diego to a 4-1 triumph over the Braves. The victory, San Diego's eighth in 11 games over Atlanta this season, increased the Padres' lead in the National League West to 10 1/2 games.

Steve Carlton pitched eight strong innings and Ozzie Virgil doubled home three runs to lead Philadelphia over St. Louis 6-1. Carlton, 11-5, allowed only three hits, struck out 10 and walked four over eight innings before giving way to Kevin Gross.

Bill Doran scored the winning run from first in the seventh inning on shortstop Tom Foley's second key error of the game as Houston came from behind to defeat Cincinnati 8-2.

Morris is first in AL to win 15

Larry Herndon, Kirk Gibson and Lance Parrish slammed home runs as Jack Morris pitched the Detroit Tigers to a 9-5 victory over the Kansas City Royals Saturday night to become the American League's first 15-game winner. In other American League games, Marty Barrett and Dwight Evans homered while rookie Roger Clemens made a successful return to the state where he starred in college to lead Boston to a 5-4 victory over Texas. Clemens, 7-4, making his first appearance in Texas since pitching the University of Texas to the NCAA championship in 1983, allowed all four of the Rangers' runs on seven hits in 7 1/3 innings.

Mike Pagliarulo homered and drove in three runs and Don Mattingly also homered as the surging New York Yankees continued their domination over Cleveland with a 10-1 victory. The triumph, the Yankees' 13th in 15 games, gave them an 11-0 record over the Indians this season.

Bill Schroeder cracked a two-run homer and Ted Simmons and Cecil Cooper also had two RBI to lead Jaime Cocanower and Milwaukee to a 10-5 victory over Chicago. George Bell belted a two-run homer with no outs in the bottom of the ninth inning to give Toronto a come-from-behind 3-2 victory over Baltimore.

Al Cowens greeted Minnesota reliever Mike Walters with a run-scoring single in the 10th inning giving Seattle a 5-4 victory over the Twins.

Howell saves 4-2 triumph, behind Marshall's homer

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Mike Marshall did the early damage with a two-run homer and a big fielding play, and rookie relief pitcher Ken Howell put the finishing touches on a Los Angeles Dodgers' victory Saturday.

"It's hard to believe he's only been in the big leagues three weeks," catcher Mike Scioscia said of Howell, the tall right-hander who earned his second save as the Dodgers beat the San Francisco Giants, 4-2.

The rookie, in relief of Rick Honeycutt, 9-7, allowed two singles, walked none, and struck out five batters in 2 1/2 innings. In his last 12 1/2 innings, he's allowed no runs, eight hits, no walks, and has struck out 14.

"At first, I was a little afraid. But I'm not even nervous anymore. I throw that first pitch right down the middle," Howell said.

"He's truly amazing, considering his lack of experience in pro ball. He's got the arm and the courage to be a great reliever. He doesn't care who's up there hitting, he just fires strikes." Manager Tom Lasorda said. "I call him 'The Raven.' We had Phil Regan, 'The Vulture,' and now we have The Raven.

"Actually, Ken doesn't care what we call him, so long as we call him in to pitch."

Howell, 23, was 8-2 in Triple-A this season before joining the Dodgers.

Marshall's homer, his 20th, was in the third off Bill Laskey, 6-11.

"He wasn't able to handle inside fastballs at all the last time we faced them, but that was a long time ago. He crushed that one today," said Laskey, who left in the third because of a slightly sore shoulder.

"I've made some adjustments and I've been battling lately," Marshall said.

SAN DIEGO — Mike Fitzgerald, a student at Mesa View School in Huntington Beach, captured the national high jump championship in the 12-13 age division Saturday in the finals of the Arco Jesse Owens Games at San Diego State University.

Fitzgerald, who will enter the eighth grade this year, leaped 5-5 to win the national title, while Jason Karpes of Seattle was second at 5-4 and Shad Salusbury of Bellingham, Wash., finished third at 5-3.

Fitzgerald, who also won the high jump on the regional level, competed against young athletes representing 13 areas in the United States.

Are you willing to face up to cosmetic surgery?

Is cosmetic surgery for you?

That was the question Dr. John O. Strong of Santa Ana addressed recently at a seminar conducted at May Co., South Coast Plaza, during a week-long beauty promotion.

The room was filled with middle-aged women filled with questions concerning the procedure. The plastic surgeon presented a slide show and had a prepared program that was interrupted often by questions from his audience.

Women in the back of the room were standing and stretching their necks to get a better view of the screen. There was no doubt the doctor had a popular subject that was dear to their hearts.

Although he was anxious to get home to watch the Olympics the questions were answered patiently and he even went into "overtime" when he was surrounded by questioning women (didn't see another man there) after the program.

"Get all of the facts before deciding on plastic surgery," he stressed.

To help the participants get such information, brochures compiled by the California Society of Plastic Surgeons, Inc. were distributed.

They stated "Cosmetic surgery is a very serious surgical undertaking and should be taken very seriously. Beware of any statements that it is safe and without risk. Nothing in life is without risk and plastic surgery is no exception."

Strong echoed the advice saying, "Don't do it as a lark. Things do happen, but they are not common."

Information in the brochure noted that more than 1 million Americans undergo some type of plastic surgery each year. The choice of the right surgeon is the most important decision.

Guidelines offered were:

- Consult your family physician or another doctor your trust. Ask him or her for recommendations.
- Contact an accredited hospital in your area and ask for names of board certified plastic surgeons on staff. The society may be called at 1-800-722-2777 for names.
- Be certain the physician is a board certified plastic surgeon. (In California, any doctor who holds a medical degree can practice any specialty he or she wishes and is not breaking the law.)

Certification by the American Board of Plastic Surgery requires graduation from an accredited medical school, at least three years of approved training in general surgery, at least two years of approved residency training in plastic surgery only and successful completion of rigorous written and oral examinations covering both plastic and reconstructive surgery.

Talk to the surgeon on a one-to-one basis. The doctor has to decide if you are a candidate," said Strong, who says he is conservative, likes to see a few wrinkles and doesn't like the porcelain doll look. "A consultation will cost about \$35."

Approximately 15 percent of all prospective patients who seek cosmetic surgery are not candidates. Unrealistic expectations, depression, doing it to please another person are among the reasons people should not have the surgery.

"Smokers are not good candidates either," said the speaker. "Smoking affects the small blood vessels."

It is also important that you feel comfortable with the surgeon. I have known of women who have had as many as four consultations before deciding on a doctor. It will be necessary for you to cooperate fully with him or her and follow all instructions after surgery.

Don't hesitate to ask about fees involved. They will depend on the extent of the surgery as well as the individual surgeon. This type of surgery is usually not covered by insurance, but in some cases may be taken as an itemized income tax deduction.

Another bit of "before" advice offered by Strong, who is on staff at Hoag, Western Medical and St. Joseph hospitals, was, "Lose weight before a facelift. Be at your minimum weight. Your skin may sag if you lose weight after the surgery."

"I do facelifts in the office. In my opinion it is safe. It can be done in the hospital and occasionally patients will ask for that."

Other answers: "No you don't have to be put to sleep. It's done under local anesthetics. You can go home the same day."

"Depending on the bruises you can go out in one to three weeks and will be able to use cosmetics. You will need to use sunscreens, wear hats or stay out of the sun."

"You will need rest to let the body heal, drink lots of fluids and avoid doing a lot of chewing immediately afterwards."

It was amazing to see the slides showing corrective measures that can be done today with surgery. Is cosmetic surgery for you?

New wave jewels break barriers

But should dazzling metallic designs adorn your clothes or decorate home?

— A double "ring" for two fingers, that supports a top heavy turning merry-go-round.

— A steel, silver and gold sculpture that includes as a design element two detachable earrings.

— A brooch that is displayed in a shadow box frame and hung on the wall.

— A hat of aluminum and linen mounted on a pine stand. Are they jewelry or home decorations?

The question is being asked more frequently nowadays as artists-jewelers break new ground in shape, size and materials of one-of-a-kind pieces nominally called jewelry.

Several recent exhibitions in New York make it clear that contemporary American and foreign jewelry artists

have gone beyond traditional definitions in the objects they design and make.

They demonstrate a much broader idea of the word jewelry than the general public assumes, says Arline Fisch, a jeweler and president of the Society of North American Goldsmiths.

"This jewelry seeks to make a political or social statement or a connection with the real world. The popular movement closest to it is probably the punk movement in music and clothing," she said.

Fisch figured new ideas in jewelry were primarily being developed in art jewelry while the more commercial world of mass-marketed jewelry had yet to be influenced in this way.

The occasion for the recent outpouring of creativity in jewelry was the society's annual four-day meeting held this year in New York. The group, founded in 1970, is a non-profit organization dedicated to fostering the art of metalsmithing.

Coinciding with its meeting at the Fashion Institute of Technology, two exhibits surveying the diversity of handmade jewelry were presented at the American Craft Museum.

"Jewelry USA," an exhibit of 222 pieces by 122 American artists, is the result of a competition sponsored by the society. Entries from jewelers making both one-of-a-kind and production pieces were received and

three experts selected winners from among 2,200 slides submitted by 575 entrants.

After the exhibit closes Sept. 1, it will travel to museums in 10 other American cities, according to Paul J. Smith, director of the American Craft Museum.

Also on view at the craft museum was a show of the work of 50 artists from 17 foreign countries. Helen Drutt, guest curator and adjunct professor of 20th-century crafts at Moore College of Art in Philadelphia, said there had been dynamic experimentation since the early 1970s, which had resulted in a much more inclusive idea of jewelry than of jewelry purely as body ornament.

"I remember the horror of it as if it were today. To my surprise, the King of Clubs did not seem delighted with his prize. It seemed that his master was having a bit of a problem. If he returned a minor-suit card, declarer would get a ruff-suff; if he returned a spade, the defenders could take only two tricks in the suit. Either way, the contract was safe.

"They made a great fuss over me and said that it was only because of my sacrifice the contract was made. But I still don't understand it—after all, that was no way to treat a royal lady!"

Operating motor homes requires driving skills

Recreational opportunities abound in the west, particularly in California where an incredible variety of attractions exist to fit every taste. Just as varied are the many motor vehicles which have been designed, adapted or converted for recreational use says the National Automobile Club.

These specialized machines range from simple homemade camper shells to elaborate homes on wheels with every modern convenience. The one thing they have in common is that they are not the normal family sedan and they do require both driving skill and an understanding of their individual handling characteristics.

Recreational vehicle safety involves more than just driving safely. Something as basic as knowing how to properly load and distribute the weight in the vehicle can be a critical safety factor. Overloading or placing heavy objects in the wrong place can lead to steering problems and difficulties in stopping. In extreme cases it might lead to failure of components or structural damage to the unit.

SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS NEEDED

The large size and weight of many of these vehicles requires special precautions when operating at highway speeds, in gusty winds, on steep grades and even in such normal procedures as making turns, passing other vehicles or parking. Usually they take longer to stop, require wider

Nitty Gritty turns country without changing its style

By MARY CAMPBELL

NEW YORK — The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band is making pretty much the same kind of music it has made for the last 18 years. But the music business has changed. Now the band's music is called country. "I think at last we've got an identifiable niche," said Jimmy Ibbotson, who plays bass, guitars and mandolin and sings. "We're country. They've accepted us. I think we can keep pleasing them for a few years." Last year, the LP "Let's Go" produced two singles that did well on the best-selling country record charts. "Shot Full of Love" got to No. 19 and "Dance Little Jean" got to No. 9. A new album, "Plain Dirt Fashion," came out in mid-June. It was No. 63 on the climbing on the Aug. 4 country chart. The first single from it, "Long Hard Road (The Sharecropper's Dream)," was No. 7 on the country chart and climbing on Aug. 4. It's the first album on Warner Brothers Records, after 15 albums on Liberty, for the band that was formed in 1966 to play the good-timey side of folk music. Through the years it usually has been called a folk-pop

rock group.

The cover of the "Plain Dirt Fashion" album has the five members of the band standing in a hayfield being harvested and the back cover shows a rear view of five Herefords in a feedlot. But even this bucolic-looking album contains a Bruce Springsteen song. "Our music sounds a lot like it did in 1969, folksy lyrics and acoustic and electric blend of instruments," Ibbotson said. "It's mostly strong country acceptance, more than anything we're doing differently. Country radio now will play us. 'Mr. Bojangles,' our biggest hit, in 1970, would be a country hit today. It wouldn't be played on pop stations." Jeff Hanna, who plays guitars and sings, added, "Ten years ago, FM radio would play country rock. Now FM won't, but country stations will. A lot of mainstream country music now is country rock." Bob Carpenter, who plays keyboards and sings, chimed in. "The new single is by Rodney Crowell. We did his 'American Dream' about four years ago and it became a pop hit. This was before techno-pop. If we released it these days, they would play

it country."

For an interview, Ibbotson, Hanna, Carpenter and John McEuen, who plays guitars, mandolin, fiddle, banjo and lap steel, showed up. Missing was Jimmie Fadden, who plays drums and harmonica. Chuck Morris, who became the group's manager two years ago, did some smart things, according to Hanna. "He got Jimmy Ibbotson in, who had left for a couple of years. He started actively pursuing country radio because of the change in pop music and rock 'n' roll. And he changed our name back." The group's original name was the Illegitimate Jug Band. Unlike other jug bands, nobody played a jug. It quickly became the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. That got shortened to the Dirt Band in 1977, which proved more confusing than simplifying. "For last year's album, Hanna said, "We went to two country producers, Norman Putnam and Richard Landis. They're both real good but they like rock 'n' roll and pop more than country," Ibbotson added. "They didn't think we'd get played on country radio stations. They thought they had to cover all bases."

'Trash' singer's tour gets airing on HBO 'Art or Bust' special

NEW YORK — Has singer Bette Midler, who brought new meaning to the word outrageous, deserted "trash with flash" and climbed from camp to culture? Tune in to "Bette Midler: Art or Bust!" and see, she says, coyly ducking the question. "Bette Midler: Art or Bust!" is a Home Box Office special, cut to an hour from the final concert on her 1983 tour — named, since all pop music tours have names these days — De Tour. Actually, the last two concerts on De Tour, in Minneapolis, were filmed for the special which will be shown Aug. 18. Midler hadn't run out of her higher energy after 10 months of De Tour. Au contraire, as Miss Piggy, who grooms herself a bit in the Midler manner, would say. "It was a terrific time to shoot it," says the Divine Miss M. "We finally got it right. I'd been fussing with the show. I get ideas as I go along. I always change horses in the middle of the stream. So it was good we did it the last nights." The TV set is full of color. We used a lot of colors, shapes and forms that aren't usually used. It's all live. I'll bet a lot of people think some of it was done in a studio, some of it's so beautiful. "In its way it's a little bit about art. I'm interested in art and the way that it changes our lives and our perceptions. I'm fascinated by the way artists have an idea and put it into action and have it come out the way they imagined it." "The show is kind of baby steps in the direction of art. I try not to be too pretentious. I'm not a scholar. I comment on it. I've always commented on all my own actions. I've always wanted to burst my own balloons before anybody else does." "Paintings, music and dance are put out there to reflect a certain kind of human struggle. I think that sounds pompous. But I think you have to have something to say. Otherwise, it is purely mercenary and doesn't count for anything. I'm way past that at my time of life." You can also drown fears that it's too highbrow, Midler says. "It's got

Delores de Lago on for a good 15 minutes. She's always a scream." Delores de Lago looks a lot like Bette Midler in a fishtail. Midler and director Thomas Schlamme cut the show to an hour for TV, leaving out most of her talking. She expects to add some of that to the "Bette Midler: Art or Bust!" cassette, which she says will be longer than the TV version. HBO also will air the special Aug. 20, 23, 26 and 29 and Sept. 4 and 7. Just after De Tour ended last year, Midler's second book, "The Saga of Baby Divine," came out, with illustrations of a red-haired tot in high heels and garish diaper. Her "A View From a Broad," was published in 1981, after her first world concert tour. She's working on a third, "a book of little stuff — essays, poetry, short stories, crossword puzzles. I want it to be fun." Her last record album, "No Frills," which included one song she wrote, came out last October. Now, the singer whose first hits were oldies like "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy," is writing lyrics with guitarist-composer Barry Reynolds for an album which will be entirely her own compositions. She's currently reading everything she can find about the Victorians, novels, biographies, costume books. "I must say they were a steazy lot. But they certainly could write; the women were terrific. The Brontes just slay me." She never has been offered a TV series but she might do another movie. "I'm one for one," she says.

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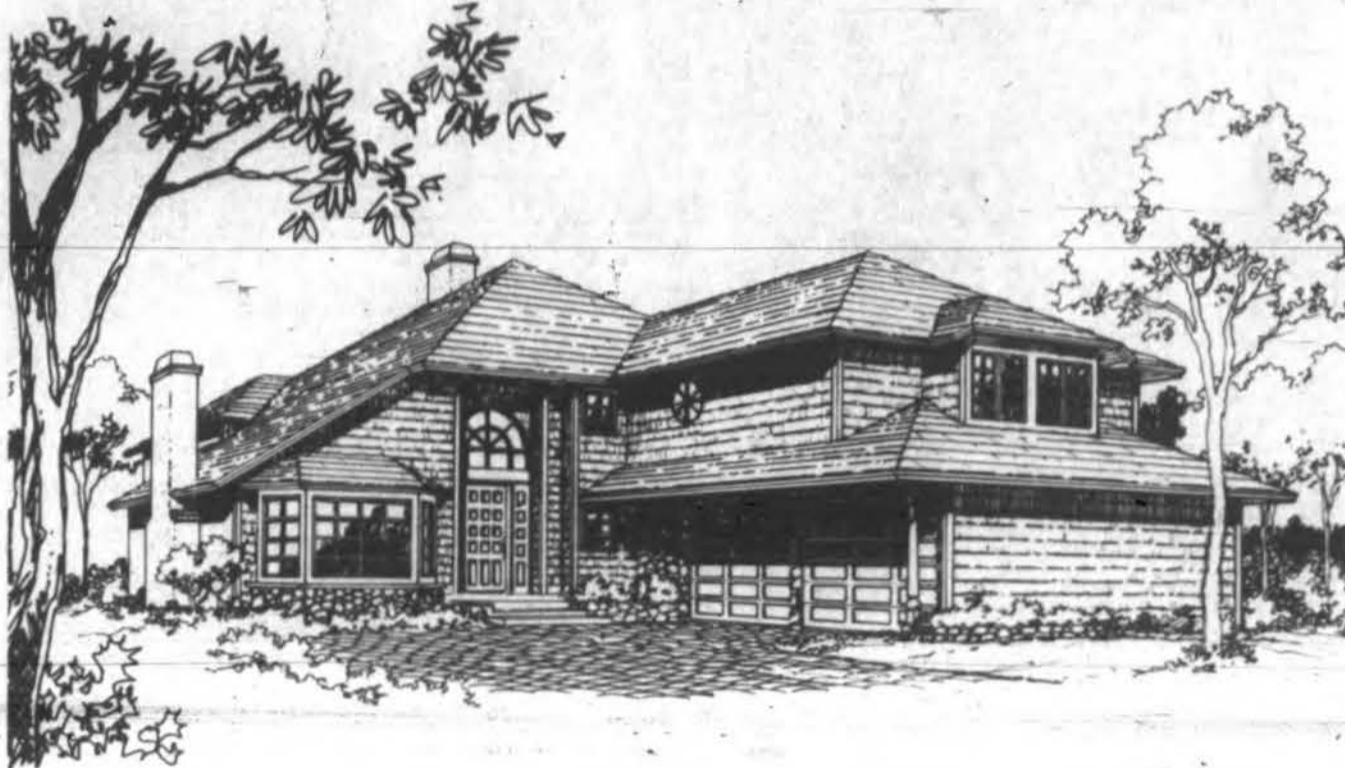

As interest rates increase, property values decline. This is a fact of life which many sellers have come to accept.

A seller who has determined a "price" and is unwilling to reduce it may be forced to "carry back" paper.

This means the seller participates in the financing by carrying a second trust deed and charging below-market interest. This will enable the buyer's monthly payment to cover the first trust deed payment and at least the interest on the carried-back second trust deed.

One way this transaction can be made more appealing for a seller who insists on his full price is by means of "shared appreciation at maturity."

As compensation for the low interest rate return, the seller

receives a share of any increase in the property's value.

When the property is resold or refinanced, the seller should receive a payoff large enough to compensate him for carrying paper at lower-than-market rates.

There are several options involving shared appreciation at maturity. Sellers and buyers should carefully review these to determine which best suits their needs.

The tax considerations must also be reviewed.

If properly structured — with professional advice where necessary — this financing technique can benefit both buyer and seller.
