





With so many blessings, it's no wonder Hope is rarely blue. "I'm an up person, especially when I feel good, and I feel good most of the time. I sing a lot. In fact, I was standing next to a guy in an airport a couple of years ago, humming and singing. He looked at me and said, 'Are you all right?' 'Yeah, pretty good," I said."

Yoko Ono, moving on

A new TV movie Monday coincides with the fifth anniversary of John Lennon's death next weekend. Yoko and Sean have built new lives, but they're not putting away the pictures in the kitchen.

Bloomingdale's on Manhattan's East Side is hectic as usual when Yoko Ono and her scn Sean Lennon arrive to buy a new bed for Sean, who is tired of sleeping on a futon on the floor. He's 10 and wants a "real bed."

A salesman asks, "Is that Yoko Ono?" and then, "Are you Sean Lennon?"

"No. Boy George is my sister." Sean teases.

"I'm a great fan of your father," the salesman says, arranging for a queen-sized bed to be delivered to Sean's address: the Dakota apartment building.

As they leave, a young woman approaches politely. "Mrs. Len-non," she says. "My husband was addicted to your husband. God bless you." She pauses. 'We miss him.'

These kinds of encounters still happen routinely, day after day. to John Lennon's 52-year-old widow. Five years after his murder on Dec. 8, 1980, he is still on the minds of many.

Monday, a TV movie marks the anniversary: John and Yoko: A Love Story, airs at 8 p.m. EST/PST Monday on NBC. Radio stations plan special programs. And outside the Dakota, where Lennon was shot by

crazed fan Mark David Chapman, devotees will gather with flowers and candles to sing his songs and share memories. Inside, Yoko and Sean will

have a quiet, personal remembrance. Lennon is still very much a part of their lives, even haunting her dreams. . .

Early one recent morning, Ono shuffled into her airy kitchen, a silky white kimono over a flannel gown, and used a burner on the stove to light her cigarette. She made a cup of strong. sweet English tea and settled onto the couch, her annoved cats readjusting. She looked shaken.

"The same dream again," she says. "John was just here. He walked into my bedroom. I looked up and was shocked, of course. I rushed to him and told him, 'Oh John, I've been having the most horrible dream that you died! I can't believe it! You're here!' and I was so relieved - it was just a dream." She took a drag from her cigarette. "And then I woke up."

Ono is resigned to her tragic reality, knowing she will always be "Mrs. John Lennon." She is newly rededicated to the work for peace that she and John began in their 12-year marriage.

On Oct. 9, Ono presided over the opening of Strawberry Fields, the memorial peace garden in New York's Central Park dedicated to Lennon. It would have been his 45th birthday.

Last month, she released her newest album, Starpeace, touching on pacifist themes and winning strong reviews.

It was Sean who inspired the album, Ono says. One night at dinner, Yoko and friends were discussing issues from nuclear politics to health care. Sean sat quietly, listening. He finally interrupted. "The world is a terri-ble place, isn't it?"

Ono's heart sank. She grasped his hands and told him, "There are many problems in the world. Sean, but there are also many beautiful things. And the problems can be solved if people care."

It was also Sean who brought his mother out of near-suicidal depression after John's murder.

Ono says of her impish son. "He tries to fill in for John that way. When he goes away - to camp or to spend a weekend with a friend - he's always worrying about me. He'll tell me, 'Don't go out by yourself, Mommy. And for my part, of course, 1 cannot replace his father, but Sean and I still have a very special relationship."

On a typical day, Sean gets himself up, pours his own breakfast cereal and goes with an armed guard to his private school. Ono wakes with a cup of tea and spends her day in her first-floor office, answering business mail and phone calls from an overstuffed armchair. In the evenings, they hang out in the kitchen, where Sean does homework at his Macintosh computer. Dinner is cooked by his male nanny, who lives there along with Yoko's three cats and Sean's dog - the final gift from

Sam Havadtoy, 33, a dapper, sandy-haired interior decorator who also helps Ono manage her business affairs and acts as her buffer against the outside world. Sam has helped us in many ways," Ono says. "He is a close companion and a close friend.

"My feeling about establishing a new relationship is very complex," she says. She and Lennon met Havadtoy in the late '70s when they wandered into the antique store where he worked.

After Lennon's death, Havadtoy eventually escorted Ono to her first social gatherings, took her on walks and comforted her amid threats on her own life.

Sean and Havadtoy have become close, Ono says. "They have a really neat friendship. I'm very grateful for that. "There was a time when Sam

couldn't stand all those photos in the kitchen of John, me and Sean. Both Sean and I were adamant that they stay exactly as they were. Now, Sam has a different attitude; he understands and he's protective of us, especially of Sean. This year, when someone suggested something about changing the kitchen photos - you know, move on with your life and all that - I was surprised that Sam was the first one to object. He said that they should stay because that's Sean's Daddy.'

John and Yoko's history began in 1968. He was married and had a son, Julian; she was on her second marriage. After they wed in 1969, Beatles fans dubbed her a dragon lady; she was blamed for the 1970 breakup of the world's most-loved rock band.

Bad feelings resurfaced recently, when Beatle Paul McCartney was quoted as calling Lennon a "maneuvering swine"; he said Lennon took credit for songs he didn't write. The comments came from a newly released 1981 interview; McCartney didn't deny them, but said he "loved John dearly." Ono was stunned" by the remarks.

Ono, educated at Sarah Lawrence and a Tokyo banker's daughter, seems to have inherited her father's business sense in running an empire worth an esti-mated \$150 million.

The Lennon estate recently was affected when the company that owns most of Lennon and McCartney's Beatles compositions was bought by pop star Michael Jackson for a reported \$49.5 million.

We are very fortunate that someone bought the company out of their love for the Lennon-McCartney songs. Since Michael is a songwriter himself, he'll be very sympathetic to how the songs are handled," Ono says.

"Another nice aspect is that Sean and Michael are friends. It's really like a friend is administering the company.

Sean is friendly with many superstars, including David Bowie and Elton John. But his closest friends are Maxie, Nicky and other non-famous kids.

"What a life Sean has. It amazes me sometimes how well he's doing," Ono says. "John would be horrified to know that Sean has a guard carrying a gun standing outside his school all the time. I mean, we were a cou-ple of peaceniks."

And Ono is still looking for a peaceful future. Her goal is simple: "All I want to do is present an alternative. That's all John and I ever wanted to do."

'Honest' film of their love has Ono's OK

Kim Miyori, who plays Yoko Ono in the TV movie John and Yoko: A Love Story, didn't meet Lennon's legend-ary widow until the final days of filming.

"You could sense her compassion," says Miyori, 34. "She is exactly what I had hoped. It was a terrific opportunity both to meet her and to play the most famous Japanese woman since Tokyo Rose."

Three years in the making, the film airs at 8 p.m. EST/PST Monday on NBC. It chronicles the relationship

the project had a shaky start. In the first days of filming, actor Mark Lindsay, cast as Lennon, was replaced when it was dis-covered that his real name is ark Chapman - the same as the man who murdered Lennon. Mark McGann, who bears a striking resemblance to Lennon, was called in. Yoko Ono seems happy with

the actors. She says Miyori is "a very sensitive actress who is ca-pable of expressing a wide range of complex emotions."

Initially, Miyori had doubts. "I thought I could never play Yoko. My impression was she was one tough lady who was very difficult to understand." says Miyori, who has starred on NBC's St. Elsewhere.

The John and Yoko film, which includes 37 Lennon-Beatles songs, required Miyori to lip-synch half a dozen songs. Though she listened to Beatles music while growing up in Cal-ifornia, Miyori was not a de-voted fan. To compensate, she did her homework - reading kiss-and-tell Beatles' biographies and studying videos of Ono's public appearances. She thinks her research paid

off, calling the portrayal of Ono and Lennon "honest." "John and Yoko are not por-

trayed as saints. We show their insecuritites and their suffer-ings from drug addiction. It would be a whitewash to leave those things out.

"John in particular was dis-satisfied. He had everything but still felt he was missing something. He lived a hungry and in some ways empty life. I don't think he really knew what he was looking for but, whatev-er it was, he never found it. And that frustration led to friction with Yoko and other people around him."

Ono is not disturbed by Miyori's reflections. "I suppose what she meant maybe or what she was trying to describe was a very artistically sensitive soul who was always not satisfied to accept the norm but felt a need to widen his horizons of under-standing about life," Ono says. Miyori says she's glad she didn't meet Ono until the end

of the production.

"It would have been too much of a distraction. I under-stand Yoko saw the rough cut and I heard that she said I had her spirit and was not just a pretty woman. What can be better than that?"

Julian: The son emerges from his famed father's shadow

Julian Lennon seems haunt-ingly like his legendary father: the same long English face, frumpy clothes and, of course, a singing voice that is an cerie echo of his famous dad's.

He's now working on his sec-ond album due to be released next year. His first, Valotte, in 1984, sold more than a million

Julian was born to John Len-non and his first wife, Cynthia I Lennon, on April 8,

His regrets: "I'm sorry we couldn't have known each other better. But I feel no anger or resentment. I know he believed in and worked hard for peace. I just hope he's peaceful now."

George Hamilton

Hollywood's hippest and best-tanned Dracula talks about his new 'Dynasty' role, his fasting diet and why he keeps a pint of his blood in the basement.

On his 'Dynasty' character, Joel Abrigore, a Svengali-like character who is after the family fortune: He is very influential with the ladies — something Γ ve always been somewhat proficient in. He is a cross between (director) Peter Bogdanovich and Claus von Bulow.

Why he wears only his private 300-suit wardrobe on the show: I don't need any more clothes. There is nothing particularly inspiring to me about someone buying me another suit.

On his four-year absence from acting that ended when he joined

What would 'Dynasty': I have had a very low profile since Zorro, The Gay Blade. Soon after that film, my brother died and I had ... the effect of his mortality on me. (His older half-brother Bill died of liver and kidney ailments.) I still felt the impact of my divorce (his five-year marriage to Alana Collins ended in 1977), and the responsibility to my child (George Ashley Hamilton). It all made me reappraise my life and I realized that the material possessions didn't matter. During this period, I didn't want to work at all. I put out the "gone fishin' " sign to major producers.

On his special diet: I believe in fasting, which cleans out the body and allows the liver to rest. I fast at least two days a week, during which time I stick to one of three drinks. If I want total cleansing, I just have distilled water. If I wish for something more, I take celery, zucchini and string beans cooked in water and blend it all into a puree. If I need lots of energy, I take a plastic bottle and pour in crude maple syrup — it keeps the blood sugar at one level - add cayenne powder - wonderful toner for the heart - and three lemons, and drink it.

When I do eat foods, I have lots of fresh vegetables and occasionally some wild game, such as deer or moose. At the moment, those animals have not been injected with dangerous hormones to make them larger for people's dinner plates.

On his trademark tan: I'm attracted to sun as a physical kind of medicine. It is a wonderful relaxation for me. I always have a "basic maintenance tan." And, of course, I have a few sun lamps. I've intensely studied them, meaning that I have taken a meter and read exactly what types of rays they are giving off. Again, I am not a crazy person. I know what I am doing.

think Dracula would do? (He had the role in Love at First Bite.) Actually, I was talking to a friend and asked him, "What would you do if you had to go to a hospital?" He said that he'd panic because of the danger in blood transfusions. I realized, "Hey, why can't we store our own blood?" I did just that and it is kept in a vault.

On his fascination with unconventional medicine: When I was in

my 20s, I slowly began to lose the hearing in one ear and I traveled to the best doctors in the United States. I was told that the auditory nerve in one ear was dead. I went to clinics in Europe and finally decided upon Paul Niehans' cellular therapy clinic in Switzerland. There, within three minutes, I received 11 consecutive injections of auditory cells from a sheep that had been slaughtered less than an hour earlier. The general idea is that fresh cells can cure problems in a specific body area.

Whether it was a placebo effect or not, 11 days later I was talking on the telephone and suddenly realized that the hearing was returning in my bad ear. The U.S. doctors could not understand the recovery. I am not some oddball, Hollywood quack who tries these things. I just know that having seen the orthodox way, I know it is not right.

On his 'life in the fast lane' image: My mother and my brother had a vision of Hollywood. They painted a picture of Clark Gable standing at the corner, and industry people who hung out together and drank together. It was supposed to be exciting. I thought I'd fit right in. I was ready to be Errol Flynn.

To be a movie star as I understood it, you had to have a prop — an exotic car, something and damn if I wasn't going to live the role. I immediately went out and rented a Rolls-Royce to drive around town. I knew that was what people wanted and that I must give it to them. It was my obligation to have some sense of flamboyance. It made

my family happy, it made me happy, and it made this town happy. The town had lost it before I came along.

On the painting of Rudolph Valentine in his bedroom: It reminds me of what this town is supposed to be. Rudolph is what they wanted when they started this town ... a ladies' man with style.

When I started, I had thousands of girls screaming at me because I was some sort of studio idol. Then in later years, mothers and grandmothers got to know me. Today, I'm happy to report that the young girls are back. Girls are writing to me by the thousands because they live the fantasy of my recent characters (Dracula, Zorro). I've always had female mail but you don't think that when you reach your 40s, you will have 15-year-old girls writing to you with crushes. To be thought of as just an old guy who once looked good is no fun. But to be looked at and thought of as a fox, well, that's terrific.

On his return to acting: I started to realize that I had exiled myself. By the time I produce my next movie, *Love at Second Bite*, another two years will have passed and I will have been away for six years. I felt it was time to come back and show people that George Hamilton has not simply aged and gone away. It is like an old gunslinger standing at a bar with a new kid drawing on him. He just came in for a drink and now he has to prove himself and show people he is still capable.

On his development as an actor: Years ago, I was sitting with George Peppard and a kid approached our table. He asked George if he was a movie star and George replied, 'No, I am an actor.' The kid turned to me and asked, 'Are you also an actor?' I said, 'No, I'm a movie star.' In the first 20 years of my career, people saw a glib, good-looking, facile person. But is he really an actor? After my brother's death, I know that I can tackle the challenging roles. The bigger the tragedy, the more you grow as an individual. There's a lot more depth to me than there was years ago.

On possessions: I learned that having things forces you to take on the problems of other people. The more you have, the less relaxed you seem to be. The people who watch over your possessions are now the people you have to watch over. After years of being in this emotional playground, it was time to let go of the possessions and simplify my life. I plan to sell my house shortly.... I could live very nicely in a tiny, small apartment.

How to cash in on your old car

The question

My car is 5 years old, and I want a new one. What do I do first? I have money saved, but is it better to finance it or pay cash? How do I approach a loan officer?

Joseph Engels Waukegan, Illinois

The answer

You're in good shape if you will take things step by step. According to Jack Gillis, author of *The Car Book* (Harper & Row, \$8.95), concentrate on your old car first. You'll get the best price by selling it yourself.

To find out what your car is worth, check the National Automobile Association's "blue book." It lists the retail and the wholesale price — which can differ by as much as \$1,500.

Make that profit yourself. It's inexpensive to print fliers and postthem at supermarkets or other public places. Your car can sell itself with a "for sale" sign with your phone number in the car window. And, of course, consider newspaper ads. A Saturday ad gives you the most exposure.

If you can't face the hassle of selling your old car, keep your buying and selling separate at the dealer. First, negotiate the best price of the new car. Discuss the best price for your trade-in only after reaching the dealer's bottom line for the new car.

Visit several dealers to decide what cars you want. That's right, cars. Narrow the choice to two or three; avoid having your heart set on just one.

It's always less expensive to pay cash, but many people prefer the security of saving their cash. Shop around for the best deal in financing the same way you shopped for your choice of car.

If factory-subsidized below-market interest rates continue to be available, factory-financing will be an excellent value. But negotiate the car price before showing your interest in the dealer's financing.

Behind Richard Thalheimer's office desk is a suit of armor. A shelf displays 40 model cars. Nearby waits a \$499 Nautilus abdominal machine, a \$199 Mitsubishi golf trainer and a \$179 infrared pistol that shoots light at an electronic target.

Thalheimer, 37, is an overgrown kid. And a success because of it. He's ridden to riches by catering to "the little boys" inside big spenders. As president of The Sharper

As president of The Sharper Image — a catalog and 14-store chain that sells glitzy gadgets and gizmos to adults — Thalheimer has taken his childhood world of fantasy into the executive suite.

"Before we came along, nowhere in the marketplace were men provided the fun of toys they knew as boys," he says.

they knew as boys," he says. Who's turned on by the hightech toys Sharper Image sells?

"Men and women who after working hard all day look forward to escaping to a world of adult toys," Thalheimer says. "Our products are rewards, a pat on the back."

Seventy percent of his customers are male, 25-55, with incomes of \$35,000 to \$50,000. Thalheimer got hooked on toys in his native Little Rock, Ark., where his father managed a department store toy section.

Criticized by grade-school teachers for asking too many questions in class, he ultimately found a place for his "curious mind" at Yale University. After many twists and turns, selling encyclopedias door-to-door and earning a law degree in San Francisco, he ran an office-supply business that he renamed The Sharper Image in 1975.

"I knew I was on the verge of something bigger that would need a slick name."

In 1977, Thalheimer began peddling a \$29 digital stopwatch in *Runner's World* magazine. He reinvested his \$200 profit in another ad, and the profits have never stopped. The firm is expected to top \$100 million in sales in 1986.

Thalheimer, whose annual salary is \$200,000 plus, is his own best customer. At his home, all the light switches have been replaced with sound-activated AudioLites. There's also a \$249 telephone camouflaged as


a duck decoy.

In the exercise room: a \$4,000 Universal professional home gym. The master bedroom: a \$129 sound conditioner that generates sounds of nature even a gushing waterfall.

Wife Elyse, the Sharper Image personnel director, enjoys a \$1,595 mässage table in her study. The Sharper Image is a "lifestyle," says Thalheimer.

Thalheimer works 9-to-5 now, but "thinks" about his business 18 hours a day. "Sometimes correct decisions come while you're away from the office."

"I'm a person who loves business, loves toys and realizes there has to be a balance between work and play."



It's hard to imagine a holiday dream list without electronics for the home. This year's headliness:

■ VCRs. The single-VCR household faces a conflict — whether to record or to play. Rather than succumb to the torment, adding a playbackonly machine (under \$200) provides the solution.

Compact disc players. CDs are getting more popular as the \$600 price drops to the more affordable \$200 nange.

Internal house security systems. They are gailing wider acceptance. RCA, Sony and Panasonic offer closed circuit systems in the \$400-to-\$600 range that let parents in one room keep a watchful eye on young children elsewhere in the house.

Monday in Oklahoma City; Tuesday in Cheyenne, Wyo.; Wednesday and Thursday in Houston; Friday in Ventura, Calif.; and back home in suburban Fort Worth on Saturday only to leave again Sunday.

After he enters a rodeo, Henson checks the horse that a computer has determined he'll be riding. A judge's score, after all, is evenly divided between the cowboy's performance and the difficulty of the animal. If Henson doesn't know the bronc firsthand, he'll check with a buddy who does. If he thinks it doesn't buck enough, he'll pass up that rodeo, forfeit his fee of up to \$250, and enter another.

The easiest part is being in West Palm Beach in the morning. Mesquite in the evening, and San Francisco in the afternoon. It's getting there that's tough," says Henson, who travels mostly by commercial airlines.

When he is home - a mock-Mediterranean three-bedroom that he shares with Trina - there's a room with a calfskin rug nailed to the wall and pictures of heroes John Wayne and Clint Eastwood.

There also are 35 pair of boots, many of them handmade from ostrich skin or elephant ear by a guy in Wyoming, and cost-ing as much as \$500 a pair. His leather chaps are hand-stitched by another fellow in Arkansas, and can run another \$500 each.

Henson's tournament earnings last year totaled \$65,000. Half went to transportation, rooms and entry fees. More lucrative were commercial contracts with companies like Dodge, Budweiser, Wrangler and Resistol hats that can bring in another \$50,000 a year in this grueling SDOIL.

The earnings come tough.

"If there's such a thing as 100 percent health, these guys have to have 150 percent. They sustain injuries," says Theodora Goebel, a rodeo journalist and spectator, "that would put the average man in a wheelchair the rest of his life.

Don Andrews heads the Justin Heeler, a mobile medical unit sponsored by the famous Justin boot firm and under the supervision of Dr. Pat Evans, team physician for the Dallas Cowboys. The vans travel to rodeos across the USA for onsite treatment and to educate cowboys about potential injuries.

"Five years ago, if they didn't have to go to the hospital, they just threw the guy in the pickup and drove on down the road to the next stop," Andrews says.

Henson still remembers the day when a rookie saddle bronc rider was thrown in the air and kicked fatally in the head on his way down. But he doesn't let the memory spook him.

"When you start learning to win. you stop thinking about getting hurt," he says.

Except for quick, before-the-ride stretching exercises behind the chutes. Henson doesn't exercise. Rodeoing keeps his 5-foot-11, 165-pound body in good enough shape, he says. He also doesn't subscribe to a lot of old rodeo superstitions: It's lucky to wear something yellow; it's unlucky to put your hat on the bed or eat before a ride.

"I'll tell you," Henson says with a wink and a smile. "You can ride just as good with a hot dog in you as without." Hawkeye Henson knows he's respect-

ed, that he's just about as good as cow boys ever get. But he also knows that new and younger guys are moving in on his territory, pulling on their boots and fastening their spurs. They'e eager to set records at National Finals themselves.

His goal, Henson says, is to make it to the National Finals three more times. After that, he's not sure. Maybe more promotions. Maybe not.

'But I can't imagine giving up the rodeo. That 8 seconds you're riding out there is like hitting a homer or making a helluva catch.

"I'll never say I sacrificed anything, because if it wasn't for the rodeo business I wouldn't have anything. I started with a straw hat and five bucks; now I've got a felt hat and \$90."

Ridin', ropin', wrestlin' and racin

Nearly \$1.8 million in prizes will be up for grabs when the National Finals Rodeo opens next Saturday, Dec. 7. for a nine-day run in Las Vegas.

Final-day events on Sunday, Dec. 15, will be concluded by 2 p.m., but will be broadcast from 9-11 p.m. EST/6-8 p.m. PST on some of the 200 TV stations across the USA that have purchased the telecast. Others will televise later. Check local listings.

The finalists - 15 in each event no more than 125 of 625 rodeos sanctioned each year. Also on hand: the top 15 barrel racers from the Wom-en's Professional Rodeo Association.

A guide to the events:

Saddle bronc riding: The cow-boy, on a saddle without a horn to grab hold of, rides a horse that, as Hawkeye Henson says, "just doesn't want to be ridden." Cowboy must stay on 8 seconds.

Calf roping: A calf bolts from the chutes and the cowboy ropes the calf, throws it to the ground, then must gather and tie any three hooves toether. Timed event.

Steer wrestling: The steer bolts from the roping chute, followed by the cowboy who rides alongside the steer, slides onto his back and goes for the horns. He then throws the steer to the

ground as quickly as possible. Bareback riding: On a leather rig-ging just 10 inches wide, a cowboy has one hand jammed inside a stiff handle and one in the air and has to stay

aboard a bucking bronc for 8 seconds. Bull riding: Perhaps the most dangerous event. The cowboy must stay on the back of a bucking bull usually weighing 1,500 pounds or more - for 8 seconds, with benefit of only a rope.

Team roping: One cowboy ropes a steer by throwing a rope around the horns and wrapping it around his saddle. The other cowboy moves in, ropes the steer's hind legs while it is still upright. Timed event.

Steer roping: Rare event today. Cowboy ropes steer's horns, throws it to the ground, then ties three legs.

Barrel racing: For women only. Contestant on horseback runs around barrels in a cloverleaf pattern, trying not to knock any down. Timing and agility essential.

There's little rest for cowboys. The professional rodeo circuit picks right up again after the finals. Among up-Coming events: Victoria, Texas, Jan. 2-4. Odessa, Texas, Jan. 4-11.

This cowgirl, 15, is barreling along

Her closest competitor is a good 10 years older, but that doesn't seem to bother 15-year-old Charmayne James, the 1984 World Champion Barrel Racer and the second-youngest world champion in the history of the Women's Professional Rodeo Association.

"I plan to keep on doing this as long as I think I can keep winnin'," she says. Her earnings → \$65,000 so far this year make her the top-ranked contender to defend her title at the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, which begins next Saturday, Dec. 7. Barrel racing, the only event women can participate in, is for women only.

She studies high school requirements through correspondence courses and travels year-round in a van and horse trailer to about 70 rodeos, accompanied by her mother Gloria and her 10-year-old quarter horse named Scamper. Her father owns and manages Clayton Cattle Feeders in Clayton, N.M.

"I grew up on a ranch, and started riding when I was old enough to walk," says Charmayne, who also says she doesn't mind that cowboys can wear blue jeans while the Women's Professional Rodeo Association dictates that cowgirls can't. Cowgirls must compete in more dressy trousers.

"I don't really worry about it," jokes Charmayne, who calls going to the National Finals the biggest excitement of her life.

And as for the \$65,000 she's earned so far this year?

"There's really not much left over," she says, "after you take out the money for gasoline, hotels, a truck, a trailer, the vet bills, and the horsefeed. I've really had about everything I've ever wanted. And I only like stuff that's expensive."



'Clan of the Cave Bear' gets 'Mammoth' sequel

The Mammoth Hunters By Jean M. Auel (Crown Publishers, 645 pages, \$19.95)

Prehistoric life didn't seem like great grist for a novel — that is. until Jean M. Auel of Arch Cape, Ore., wrote the best-selling The Clan of the Cave Bear in 1980. The saga of Ayla, a young girl living in ice age Europe, continued in The Valley of the Horses (1982). More than I million copies of The Mammoth Hunters, the third in her six-part Earth Child series, will reach bookstores next weekend. She talks here to Colleen O'Connor about her prehistoric heroine.

Ayla seems to travel a lot. Actually she hasn't traveled a very great distance. The Clan of the Cave Bear is set in the Crimea, a peninsula in the Black Sea in southern Russia. The Mammoth Hunters is set in the Ukraine, which is in southwestern Russia. But as it turns out, there is pretty strong evidence that there may have been quite a bit of traveling in those days. Jondalar (Ayla's companion) has traveled quite a distance; he comes from southwest France.

How did you decide on a prehistoric heroine?

Late one night, I suddenly got this thought in my head of a young woman living with people who were not as developed as she was, and I was thinking of prehistory — I don't know why. I thought to myself "I wonder if I could write a short story like that?" After I started writing, I realized I didn't know what I was writing about. I didn't know what they looked like, I didn't know what they ate, what they wore, how they lived. I went to the downtown Portland public library, and started digging through the stacks. I discovered this entire world I didn't know had existed.

When does The Mammoth Hunters take place?

About 30,000 years ago, in the late Pleistocene Epoch. In fact, the whole six-book series takes place in that period, during a warming trend in the ice age when the real expansion of the Cro-Magnon or Upper Paleolithic cultures seemed to have happened. Ayla's going to be the thread with which I attempt to show the diversity and sophistication of these many cultures, as shown by the archaeological record. I'm going to be covering all of ice age Europe. Instead of covering time, I'm covering space.





Social Drinking How to Cut Down Your Social Drinking

By Richard A. Basini (Putnam, 114 pages, \$13.95)

December means a parade of parties and freely poured holiday spirits. But drinking too much can trigger hangovers, thicken waistlines and, at office festivities raise corporate eyebrows.

How to avoid such trouble? Here's help from a reformed social drinker and head of a New York public relations agency. You learn how to identify the four basic types of drinking situations; how to schedule your social drinking on a daily, weekly and monthly basis; and how to create a personal drink-reduction program.

The author gives 53 tips, many gleaned from celebrities and corporate executives who know the cocktail circuit inside-out. A sampling of tips:

Set the tone. "If you want to avoid a boozy meal, take the initiative when the waiter comes to the table: Be the first to order. If you order a Perrier or a wine spritzer, nobody's going to order a martini." — Jerry Orbach, star of 42nd Street. Punish yourself. "Choose drinks that

Feel secure about non-alcoholic drinks. "My life is full of activity, and I don't want to miss a single minute of it. I just ask for a Perrier and nurse it for a long time." - Actor Tony Randall.

Your Personalized Health Profile

By Myron Winick, M.D. (Morrow, 261 pages, \$16.95)

This self-help book is designed for those who want to improve their diet, and helps the reader create a dietary plan that reduces risk of developing such diseases as osteoporosis, obesity, cancer and diabetes.

Based on the latest nutrition research. the book is written by the director of the Institute of Human Nutrition of Columbia University. Winick helps the reader analyze such risk factors as family genetic history, lifestyle and eating patterns, then gives advice on creating a low-risk diet.


BOsteoporosis: The optimal diet for those at risk includes a calcium intake of 1 gram per day, a low protein intake and adequate amounts of vitamin D.

Anemia: Raise zinc levels with seafood dinners, especially oysters and clams, and choose foods rich in iron and folic acid - beef, lamb, calf's liver, broccoli, spinach and raisins.

After the dietary plan is discussed. Winick explains how to use exercise to further diminish the risk of developing these illnesses.



Pay attention to warning signs; get help fast

By Janis Johnson

Warning: Three-fourths of us underestimate the severity of medical problems and fail to call for professional help, cautions the American College of Emergency Physicians.

Many times an emergency is obvious — broken bones, head injuries or severe bleeding — but there are other critical warning signs, says the college:

Chest or upper abdominal pain or pressure (a heart attack frequently is mistaken for indigestion).

Difficulty in breathing or shortness of breath.

Fainting or feeling faint.

Dizziness, sudden weakness or a severe change in vision.

Sudden severe pain anywhere in the body.

Severe or presistent vomiting.

Suicidal or homicidal feelings.

"People have a feeling of invulnerability and tend to disregard warning signs," says Dr. Richard Stennes, a San Diego doctor and president of the physicians' group.

"Even though there is concern about the overuse of emergency departments, it's better to go — and then find out you're OK."

A critical step in getting help fast is preparing for emergencies in advance. Stennes says. That means you should:

Know the location of the nearest fire department, ambulance service and hospital emergency room.

Determine the fastest action, such as telephoning 911 or other local emergency numbers or rushing to the hospital yourself.

Find out what resources are available at your emergency room. Some hospitals are better equipped to handle specialized problems, such as pediatric emergencies.

Discuss your general emergency plans with your family doctor.

■ Keep all emergency numbers — ambulance, hospital emergency room, poison control, police, fire and family physician — near your telephone so you can act quickly.

When the emergency arises:

Call the ambulance first.

Telephone your doctor, or if you don't have one, call the emergency room for guidance.

Housewife longs for joy of exercise

The question

I'm a 5-foot-3-inch-tall, 34-year-old housewife. I've never really enjoyed exercise, but now realize how important it is. However, I have very little strength or stamina and have trouble participating in even mild exercise. How do I get past the fatigue and pain?

The answer

Sports medicine expert Dr. Gabe Mirkin. co-author of *The Complete Sports Medicine Book for Women* (Simon & Schuster, 1985, \$16.95 hardback; \$8.95 paperback) says that it is common for beginners to experience pain and fatigue during even minimal exercise.

Biopsy studies show that muscles are actually damaged during exercise, which is the major cause of post-exercise soreness. It takes at least 48 hours for muscles to recover, whether you're a beginner or an Olympic marathoner. The best way to build stamina, avoid

The best way to build stamina, avoid fatigue and prevent soreness is to schedule exercise every other day and "stop when muscles begin to feel heavy or when they begin to hurt."

"For some, initial workouts will last only a minute," Dr. Mirkin says. "That's fine. If you're patient and you continue to exercise every other day, in six weeks you'll build up to three 30-minute workouts a week, which is all you need to maintain fitness."

Some of the best exercises to start with are stationary bicycling, swimming or walking, which can be just as effective as running in promoting fitness. If, after building up to the every-other-

If, after building up to the every-otherday workouts, you want to exercise more, Dr. Mirkin suggests alternating either the exercise activity or the intensity with which you exercise.

If you decide you want to stick with one activity, then alternate the intensity of your workouts. "Professional marathoners will run hard one day, easy the next."

He adds that exercise programs that call for working past the pain should be avoided. "Jane Fonda's 'stretch until you burn' formula will lead many into injury," he says. "And 'No pain no gain' is a formula for disaster."

CHESTNUTS

It's easy to savor the aroma and taste of a hearty holiday tradition

Chestnuts roasting on an open fire, Jack Frost nipping at your nose ... Turn on the radio this weekend. Or visit a mall. From Seattle to Atlanta, you can't escape the familiar lyrics. And if you're in some cities, you can't escape the smell.

If New York City's streets are filled with Christmas shoppers. you can bet the chestnut vendors - some 200 strong - are out hawking their smoky wares. The same can be said in places like Philadelphia, Chicago and Washington, D.C.

But you don't have to shiver on a street corner to enjoy chestnuts. You don't even have to roast them. In fact, many of us stuff the holiday turkey with chestnuts, or cook them whole in boiling water, in the oven or on a range.

"People even use their gas grill," adds botanist Richard Jaynes of Hamden, Conn., who has studied the nuts for 25 years.

Each year, we eat about 11 million pounds of chestnuts at about 194 calories per 31/2 ounces. Ninety percent are imported from Italy, the rest from places like France, Spain, China and the Dominican Republic.

And we grow 900,000 pounds of native Chinese chestnuts annually. "The nuts are smaller than imports," says Spencer Chase, 75, of Knoxville, Tenn., whose two trees yield 25 pounds a season.

You'll find chestnuts in the markets from November through December.

The Italian nut is a mahogany color, about the size of a quarter. The native Chinese nut is a little lighter in color and the size of a nickel.

Also available in gourmet stores are canned nuts - whole, puréed, glazed, brandied, dryroasted. (The native horse chestnut is not edible; Chinese water chestnuts come from the root of an aquatic plant.)

The USA had its own flourishing supply until 1904 when an Asian fungus killed 9 million acres of the American chestnut. But the Chinese nut thrives.

For 18 years, Joseph Gian-none, 82, of Wayne, N.J., has harvested four trees, yielding 100 pounds a season. In early October, the nuts fall free from



Braised Chestnuts

2-3 cups peeled chestnuts, about 1 pound fresh

FOOD

- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 Tb. comstarch
- 2 Tbs. red or white wine, sherry or wate

Place chestnuts in saucepan with broth anbutter. Simmer, covered, over low heat for 3 minutes or until tender. Mix cornstarch and wine to a paste and add during the last 10 minutes o cooking. Serve separately or mixed with braisec cabbage or brussels sprouts. Serves 4 to 6.

Brown's Chestnut Stuffing

Curt Brown of Howell Township, N.J., is a car salesman by day, gourmet by night His special stuffing for the holiday bird:

- 2 pounds fresh chestnuts *
- 1 cup olive oil
- 6 cups beef broth
- 3 shallots, chopped
- 1/2 pound sausage meat
- 1 tsp. chopped chives
- 1/2 tsp. thyme
- 1/4 tsp. marjoram
- 1/2 bay leaf crumbled 34 cup soft bread crumbs soaked
- in 1 cup milk

Make X in each nut with a knife. Sauté nuts in oil over high heat in large skillet for about 3 minutes until the shells open up a little. Remove pan from heat, transfer nuts to brown paper bags to drain, and peel shells when cool.

Cook nuts in broth for about 30 minutes, or until tender. Drain chestnuts and discard broth. Chop half the nuts coarsely and mash the rest.

Sauté shallots in butter over medium heat until they begin to color. Add sausage and mash with a spoon to separate pieces. Stir chives, thyme, marjoram and bay leaf. Cook 4 minutes, stirring constantly. Squeeze crumbs dry and toss them to separate. Add crumbs and all chestnuts to skillet and mix well. Cool before using. Makes enough stuffing for an 18- to 20-pound turkey.

*You may substitute 5 cups whole canned chestnuts for the fresh. Do not cook, but chop half of them coarsely and mash the rest.

Flaming Rum Chestnuts

A flaming dessert adapted from The Fine Art of Italian Cooking by Giuliano Bugialli (Times Books, \$19.95).

1 pound fresh chestnuts * ¼ cup sugar ½ cup dark rum

Make X in nuts with a knife. Roast on a cookie sheet in a 350-degree oven for 20 to 30 minutes. When nuts are cool enough to handle, remove shells and place nuts in flame-proof casserole. Add sugar and mix with the nuts. If not serving immediately, keep chestnuts warm by covering.

Just before serving, warm rum in a small pan over low heat. Pour rum over nuts, flame them and, while rum is burning, stir nuts with a longhandled spoon so that all the sugar is flamed. When flame burns out, serve immediately over vanilla ice cream. Serves 4.



Perry's hack on the case

Famed TV attorney of 50's back tonight for two-hour special

By JERRY BUCK

LOS ANGELES — Television's most famous defense lawyer, off the air for nearly 20 years, is returning for at least one more case.

In "Perry Mason Returns," which will be telecast tonight by NBC, Mason resigns as an appellate court judge to take on the most important defense in his long career. His former secretary, Della Street, is accused of murder.

Raymond Burr, who starred in the old "Perry Mason" series for 9% years, is backin the role that made him famous. Barbara Hale is Della Street once again, and her real-life son, William Katt, appears as investigator Paul Drake Jr.

"It was Fred Silverman (former NBC president) who thought it would be a great idea," Burr says during one of his rare visits to Los Angeles. "He got Dean Hargrove to write and produce the movie.

"I did the pilot in 1956 and it went on the air in 1957. From the day we did the first show, I've always wanted to do a two-hour show. I was always fond of Erle Stanley Gardner and I always wanted to see one of his books done properly. You couldn't do it in an hour. Jean Gardner is still alive and I'm sure she'll be pleased."

Gardner wrote nearly 90 "Perry Mason" books and he supervised every script until the last year of the series, when he was in failing health.

In the years after "Perry Mason" went off the air, except in reruns, Burr went on to do another eight years as the wheelchairbound detective in "Ironside." He also played a German settler in the miniseries "Centennial" and attempted another series as an investigative reporter in "Kingston: Confidential."

Burr, his hair and beard nearly gray, now lives the life of a country squire on his 40acre farm north of Santa Rosa in Northern California.

"I've got 150 fruit trees. Nine kinds of apple, eight kinds of plum, three kinds of peaches, two kinds of apricots, plus pomegranates, figs and citrus trees," he says. "We have apples growing 40 feet from citrus trees, which sounds impossible, but in that climate you can grow both. I raise every kind of fruit but papayas and cherries.

"This year 1 put in 20 acres of wine grapes. And 1 have sheep for 14 distinct different earth-tone colors, black to white. We don't use any dyes. They make wonderful sweaters and rugs."

Burr says it's the first time he's lived inland since he was a boy growing up in Canada near Vancouver. "I've always

lived near the ocean, so I'm plotting to bua piece of property on the ocean indibuild + small house."

Until recently, Burr had a photostoch of an island in Fiji and still owas property there, including a piece of the Fiji Sun newspaper.

'Almanac' back on the shelf?

NEW YORK — NBC, looking to remain the No. 1 network in prime time, will likely postpone the weekly introduction of its news magazine, "American Almanac," from January to March, NBC officials said.

Grant Tinker, chairman of NBC, has said repeatedly that his commitment to a weekly prime-time news magazine was "forever" and that "Almanac," which has been appearing once a month since August, would start in January.

Tinker said in an interview that he "still was absolutely committed to 'Almanac' and it's coming on in January, but if Larry (NBC News President Lawrence K. Grossman) tells me he'd rather wait a month or so to get a better time slot, that's OK with me."

Grossman and Brandon Tartikoff, presitent of NBC Entertainment, are working on those arrangements, Tinker said, "and I won't second-guess their decision." Fartikoff is expected to announce NBC's midseason changes next month. In a separate interview, Grossman said he approached Tinker and Tartikoff retently and offered to wait until March. when some regular series run out of original episodes, it meant a better time slot for "American Almanac." Without specifying the time-period choices. Grossman said it appeared likely that "Almanac" would opt for March.

"We've geared everything so we would be ready in January, and we're ready," said-Grossman. "But it's to our advantage editorially, especially if it's a time period worth waiting for."

Ed Fouhy, executive producer of "American Almanac," agreed. "The time slot is so important to the prospect of survival," he said from his Washington office.

Fouhy said the program could only benefit from a delay. "Thare would be more time to get more pieces in production," he said. "The key to success is to have a lot of choices and I'd like to build up that inventory." Asked if NBC's desire to the foot 1 in the ratings after the the combision of the prime-time season in April was a determining factor in the delay. Grossman said the subject wasn't discussed with Tartikoff and Tinker but that it probably was underlying the maneuvering.

"This is a highly competitive place and I'm sure thy're dying to be No. 1," said Grossman.

In the modern era of network TV, NBC never has won outright a regular primetime season.

News magazines are notorrously slow to win high ratings. It took "60 Minutes" almost a decade before it cracked the Top Ten, where it has been every season since 1977-78.

In its four monthly broadcasts, "American Almanac" has achived better ratines than previous failed NBC news magazines but not close to what successful entertain ment shows achieve.

A parade of laughs for Coast cut-ups

Dressed as chainsaw murderers, zombies, bag people and businessmen with invisible dogs. Orange Coast residents were set to join the zany festivities in Pasadena today at the traditional Doo Dah Parade.

The event, launched in 1978 by youth group consultant Peter Apanel. pokes fun at the formality of the city's famed Tournament of Roses procession.

Today's Doo Dah parade, beginning at noon, is expected to feature 2.200 participants in 125 acts. As many as 60,000 people have turned out to watch the parade in past years.

Marine Corps audit reveals waste

An audit of Camp Pendleton's Special Services unit, which provides entertainment and recreation for offduty troops, has turned up what auditors call "continuous misuse and waste" of funds.

According to the Marine Corps

audit of the unit's \$5.9 million budget from last October to June, a \$5,000 loan was improperly made to a civilian and civilians were allowed to take government cars home overnight.

The money for Special Services units comes mainly from profits of the general merchandise stores on

bases worldwide. Military accountants periodically review the fund books.

According to the audit at Camp Pendleton in Oceanside, accountants "have continuously reported improprieties within the purchasing and receiving functions.



The latest rescue, reported Friday, began just after dawn Monday in the South China Sea when a lookout aboard the supply ship Mars spotted a small boat flying a distress flag, according to Navy Cmdr. Fred Gorrell. Investigating, the Mars discovered a 35-foot wood boat crammed with 26 Vietnamese adults and 10 children. The boat had sailed three days earlier Gorrell said the occupants of the vessel were political refugees, adding, "We see boats leaving that country on a regular basis."

Reagan vows to root out more spies

SANTA BARBARA - President Reagan, commenting publicly for the first time on the recent string of espionage arrests, said Saturday that the United States will "root out and prosecute the spies of any nation. We'll let the chips fall where they may." Reagan said in his weekly radio address, delivered from his mountaintop ranch, where the Reagans were spending the Thanksgiving holiday.

Suspected shoplifter slain in store

COLUMBIA, S.C. - A man suspected of shoplifting spark plugs was shot to death by police Saturday at a store filled with Christmas shoppers after he overpowered an officer and used her gun to wound a customer, authorities said. The alleged shoplifter was identified as Isaac Jones. 25. of New Orleans. The wounded customer. Carol Kaufman, was treated at a hospital and released.

New York drinking age raised to 21

ALBANY, N.Y. - Raising New York's drinking age from 19 to 21. starting today, should make roads safer by cutting down on drunken driving. state officials say. But they admit Washington's threat to withhold \$90 million in highway funds also was a consideration. New York joins 31 other states in the nation - including California - that already have a minimum drinking age of 21. Another five states have approved legislation to raise their drinking ages to 21 sometime next year.



S. Africans found new labor union

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa - Hundreds of union representatives founded South Africa's largest labor organization Saturday, a multiracial federation of about 500,000 workers that is expected to push black political demands.

In other developments, black snipers fired on police patrols near Cape Town for the third time in two days and a security guard was killed with his own shotgun after a crowd overpowered him, police said.

Hundreds of police hunt rail saboteurs

TOKYO - Police mobilized into a special hunt unit scoured Japan on Saturday for about 300 leftists believed responsible for the rail sabotage that turned travel into chaos for 6.5 million commuters in Tokyo and Osaka. The coordinated attacks Friday also cost government-run Japan National Railways more than \$6 million in lost ticket sales. Police said they arrested 48 activists on Friday near sites where saboteurs severed rail communications cables. disrupting the all-important computer systems that operate the trains. They said the attacks were apparently the work of a radical leftist group, the 1,300member Chukaku-ha or "Middle Core" faction.

Women interrupt Vatican news conference

VATICAN CITY - Two women seeking ordination of women priests one a former nun from Belgium and the other a Florida nurse — interrupted a Vatican news conference Saturday at which a top cardinal warned against attempts to introduce democracy into the Roman Catholic Church. "The Second Vatican Council decreed that any discrimination based on race, social class or sex has to be uprooted as contrary to the will of God," said Marie-Terese Sonmoy halfway through the hourlong session attended by about 500 journalists. Babi Burke, from Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., told the churchmen that the yeke of the church on the woman has to be lifted." Cardinal Joseph Malula from Zaire and two bishops from Colombia and India listened calmly to the women's statements and told them the church cannot change "the historical reality of what God did."

Thousands denounce upcoming election

MANILA. Philippines - About 8,000 leftist demonstrators on Saturday denounced the Feb. 7 presidential election as a "U.S. imperialist ploy." and an opposition coalition said Benigno Aquino's widow would be its candidate. The demonstrators marched toward the official residence of President Ferdinand E Marcos but were stopped a few blocks away by firetrucks and 250 riot police They chanted "crush the U.S.-Marcos dictatorship" and painted slogans on walls calling for "Revolution, not elections,"

Meanwhile, the pilot of the hilacked jetliner said Saturday that a second sky pirate survived the storming of the aircraft in Malta and was being treated at a Maltese hospital for a nervous breakdown.

Capt. Hani Galal also said in an interview with Egyptian television after returning from Malta with 11 other survivors that there were five hijackers, not four.

Officials at the Valletta hospital where the known suriving hijacker is being treated declined comment on ialal's report. Galal made the comments in a late-night interview, and repeated calls to the Maltese government's spokesman went unanswered.

However, Prime Minister Aly Lutty told Parliament that Egypt had requested the extradition of only one man and made no mention of a second surviving highjacker. In Valletta, the police source interviewed by The Associated Press spoke about only one surviving sky pirate

Authorities have identified the known surviving hijacker as Omar Marzouki, 20, who was carrying a Tunisian passport

The source said investigators had obtained little information from the wounded hijacker because he had been under heavy sedation. But he said the hijacker was able to sit up Saturday and police would soon be able to question him

But nuclear attack isn't likely, believes Rand Corp. analyst

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Terrorist attacks including airplane hijackings. bombings and assassinations will increase by the end of the century, but " a terrorist nuclear attack is not likely. Rand Corporation analyst says

Increased resistance to terrorists. such as recent actions taken by the inited States and Egypt to capture or kill hijackers, may prompt terrorist groups to change tactics or become more violent, said Brian M. Jenkius, chief analyst for terrorism studies at the suburban Santa Monica think tank

Despite fears hy some that terrorists will eventually use nuclear chemical or biological weapons. Jenkins said he-does not believe it likely

A 1984 Gallup Poll of 1.346 people who held key positions in government, science and business found that their greatest tear was of a "nucleat accident involving terrorists.

Jenkins believes the possibility of terrorists obtaining nuclear weapons In has been "greatly exaggerated." any event, he said, the explosion of a

numbers of people with chemical or biological weapons, would not serve the purposes of most terrorist groups He said terrorists want people watching their attacks so that they can achieve their political goals, but that large-scale killings would not advance a political agenda

Certainly, in the face of a nuclear threat, the rules that now limit police authorities in most democracies would change." he said. "They fear unleashing government crackdowns. that their groups might not survive

But in a forecast of terrorism in the year 2000 published in the December issue of the Terrorism Violence Insurgency Report, edited by Jenkins. he predicts increased bloodshed and casualties as the 21st century approaches

"If terrorism persists and we expect it will, a new generation of terrorists will have taken the field. he said

They will be "a true second generation of Kalashnikov kids more callous to the effects of them actions, said Jenkins, referring to a Soviet assault rifle popular among young killers in Third World countries

Other factors also make an increase in terrorism likely. Jenkins said ... "Terrorists who have been in the

Astronauts rest up for next walk

SPACE (ENTER. Houston (AP) The astronaut-construction workers aboard the space shuttle Atlantis rested their sore hands Saturday and got ready for another building project, the second demonstration of how astronauts one day may assemble permanent outposts in orbit

Experts on the ground praised the work of spacewalkers Sherwood Spring and Jerry Ross, who spent 5 hours, 32 minutes Friday building and taking apart a 45-foot lower or beam and a 12-foot pyramid out of snap-together metal struts in Atlantis' open cargo bay

Spring and Ross said the work inside their heavy spacesuits left their hands sore and they were glad for Saturday's day of rest before the next space walk today

They also used the time to recharge the batteries in their space suits for the next project, scheduled to begin at 2:59 p.m. PST and last about six hours. And the others on the sevenmember crew performed experiments, took photographs and tuned up Atlantis' space systems.

Anti-racist protesters arrested

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Police arrested 34 demonstrators who shouted anti-racist slogans Saturday as they marched into a mostly white neighborhood under an emergency declaration because of protests against blacks moving in

It was the first violation of the mayor's Nov 22 emergency declar ation barring protests in the area police said.

The march was an attempt hy outsiders to "inflame" tensions in the southwest Philadelphia neigh borhood, which last week was the scene of protests by whites against blacks who had purchased homes there Mayor W Wilson Goode said

The 34 demonstrators, most of whom were white, were arrested when they ignored police warnings and crossed the emergency zone boundary police Capt Robert Grasso said.

Karen Warrington a spokesman for Goode, said the demonstrators were members of the International Committee Againsi Racism, an organization she said is affiliated with the American Communist Party







Alex Haley's roots are in humility

BEREA, Ky. — In the office of bestselling novelist Alex Haley hangs a picture of a turtle sitting on a fence.

When the author of the blockbuster book and TV miniseries "Roots" looks at the quirky photo, he's reminded of a lesson in humility: "Any time you see a turtle on top of a fence post, you know he had some help."

"And any time I remotely start thinking, "Wow, isn't this marvelous what I've done,' I will look at the picture and remember how this turtle — me — got up on that post," said Haley, who had first heard the proverb from horse breeder John Gaines.

As Haley begins writing his next book, which he's tentatively calling "Appalachia," some of that help is coming from two students. Wilhe Parker, a senior at Berea College, and Ron Sarver, a junior at Eastern Kentucky University, were hired to comb Berea's extensive Appalachian collection for material Haley might need for his novel.

They recently reported back with a one-foot stack of folders on topics ranging from moonshine to black mountain dwellers.

The students and two other researchers save the writer time and, perhaps more importantly, are an insurance policy against future plagiarism suits such as the one the 63-year-old Haley settled out of court in 1978. Harold Cortlander had charged that Haley had used a 100word segment from his novel. "The African."

The passages "were in something somebody had given me, and I don't know who gave it to me." Haley said. "Somehow or another, it ended up in the book."

Parker and Sarver spent four weeks photocopying articles, chapters and items of potential interest and making personal notes for Haley. Sarver also clambered through a stream in the Virginia mountains to find a still and he interviewed a man who used

to paint advertisements on barns. Haley gave the students the story line for the book and talked to them about two hours. Then he said. Assume that I know absolutely nothing about Appalachia, and just attack this sort of edit." Parker recalled.

"In our first meeting, he told us the , key to the best fiction is to have the most authentic historical research." added Sarver.

Haley gathered details, too, touring museums and towns in Tennessee and Kentucky But most of all in "Appalachia." whose hero is a "mountain macho"

grandfather. Haley will be drawing on his childhood experiences, as he did

in "Roots." the saga of his ancestors' lives from the rich civilizations of Africa to slavery to contemporary America

"Henning," a book about his western Tennessee hometown, will be published in December

Haley planned to board a cargo ship in Houston with his outline and files so he could do much of the preliminary writing. "Writing is a jealous mistress If

"Writing is a jealous mistress. If you don't pay the muse year in, year out, if you stay around and do what I do, you become a talking writer," said Haley, noting that he accepts 50 to 60 speaking engagements a year. "I give so many interviews about writing, I don't write. So I have to get to sea."

Bhopal leaves deadly legacy

Company's neighbors wary of future leaks

INSTITUTE, W.Va. (AP) - No area of the United States was more shaken by the Bhopal poison gas disaster than West Virginia's "chemical valley," where Union Carbide had long been seen as a benevolent employer.

Today, the chemical company and others whose plants line a 25-mile stretch of the Kanawha River are under intense scrutiny

Carbide's confident assertions that "it can't happen here" sounded hollow on Aug. 11, just eight months after Bhopal, when a cloud of poison gas from the company's Institute plant sent 135 people to hospitals. Hundreds more were treated at an emergency medical center.

The Institute plant already had attracted international attention because it contains Carbide's only other production unit for methyl isocyanate, the chemical that killed more than 1,750 in the Indian disaster

In West Virginia, methylene chloride and aldicarb oxime leaked from a unit that mixes those two chemicals with MIC to make aldicarb, an insecticide. The unit has been closed since.

Officials say the two leaks - in India and Institute - heightened residents' awareness of chemicals near their homes. They illustrate a need for Carbide to do more to protect its neighbors, said Dr. Paul Nuchims, a West Virginia State College art professor whose office is 300 yards from the MIC unit here. Nuchims helped found a citizens group, People Concerned About MIC. after the Bhopal leak.

'Union Carbide is beginning to realize slowly that there are people outside their fence. They have begun to realize that they have a responsibility to the people other than a siren." Nuchims said. Carbide employs 6,000 of the 10,000 chemical workers in the valley, and

business and political leaders have tried to put the best possible face on the company's, and the community's, ordeal.

John Chapman, president of the Charleston area Chamber of Commerce, said he believed the valley's image actually had improved because officials have improved emergency procedures.

"It raised concerns people have in making location decisions. Not a hysterical 'I wouldn't come within 50 miles of the place,' but a concern," Chapman said. "But it also increased the ability of the community to respond to toxic leaks and spills - abilities that weren't in place before.

Thousands still dying one year later as a result of Union Carbide tragedy

BHOPAL, India - A year later, Bhopal has become a synonym for industrial disaster, apocalyptic in its sweep and horror, striking thousands in their sleep, blighting leaves on the trees, animals in the field, children in the womb.

Thousands have been left respiratory cripples without hope of a normal life by the cloud of toxic fumes that spewed from tank No. 610 at the Union Carbide plant here Dec. . 1984

A question mark hangs over infants and children who inhaled the lungsearing fumes.

The extent of it will not be known for years or generations.

Even the death toll remains inconclusive.

The Indian government says it has verified 1,754 fatalities. But it does not dispute the estimates of doctors and press accounts that 2,000 to 2,500 people died. One reason for the nconclusiveness is that the toxic fumes struck the poor in an apron of slums around the plant and sometimes three or more bodies were buried in a single grave or cremated. More than 300,000 were affected in

varying ways. But doctors and officials are saying the prognosis now is fair and that the immediate medical situation and relief efforts are improving. No gasrelated deaths are being reported and many victims have recovered and that the fear of deformed and dying 'gas babies'' was unfounded, they

"The medical picture is definitely better and improving," said Dr. N.R. Bhandari, superintendent of main Hamidia Hospital and coordinator of numerous surveys. He is among those who believe as many as 2,500 people died and he said 4000 to 5,000 patients suffered massive, permanent lung damage, while 5,000 to 10,000 have less severe respiratory problems,

"But this was like Hiroshima, nothing like it ever happened," he said in an interview. "So we hope for the best and cross our fingers, but we cannot predict what will come next or the impact on growing children and the next generation.

Many slumdwellers and activists dispute those assessments and protesters allege that Union Carbide Corp., which has headquarters in Danbury, Conn., and the Indian government are covering up the full catastrophe while they devise an outof-court settlement.

About 2,000 people line up daily at Hamidia Hospital alone for treatment and doctors' certificates. They want money, food, medicine, jobs and an eventual settlement from Union Carbide.

Many claim shortness of breath, eye irritations, impaired vision, exhaustion, stomach disorders, aches and pains. They say they suffer psychological symptoms of anxiety, panick, hopelessness, helplessness

The lines now are longer and desperate because the government requires new documents for everyone seeking a cash settlement. Precious yellow "gas victim" cards are their only tickets to the money. Many are able-bodied pretenders and nonresi-

No compensation has been paid yet by Union Carbide since India rejected its initial offer of a \$230 million out-of-court settlement.

But the corporation agreed, under an arrangement approved Nov. 26 by a Federal District Court in New York City, to distribute \$5 million to the victims. The corporation will give the

On Jan. 3 a U.S. judge will decide whether more than 90 lawsuits against Union Carbide can be tried in the United States. About 2,700 suits are pending against the corporation in

Guardian Angels shrug off police criticism

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The Guardian Angels Chief William B. Kolender said. countries, but even three deaths and several arrests haven't clipped their wings.

When night falls, high schoolers, nurses aides, psychology students and part-time musicians don the distinctive red beret and winged-eye T-shirt of the volunteer group to patrol street corners from Hollywood to Manhattan.

The 150 to 200 members in Los Angeles include a mother of three, a former Explorer Scout leader and a swaggering ex-street gang member.

Except for martial arts training, they are unarmed, and recent publicity has swelled their ranks.

The question is: how effective are they?

Not very, say police officials who've had run-ins with the nationwide group and its outspoken founder, 31-yearold Curt Sliwa of New York.

"They want to be notorious, that's all," said Rafael Rubio Alarcon, chief of the Tijuana Municipal Police in Mexico. "The Angels can go to hell, where they are needed.

For their part, the Angels accuse police of slackness. "I know sometimes we have to be patient with the police," said Danny Lewis of Venice, a UCLA psychology graduate student and co-director of the Los Angeles chapter. "They're patiently waiting for those fresh, buttermilk twists to pop out of the Winchell's doughnut oven and they don't want to be disturbed.

The Angels claim to have arrested 600 people in New York since patrols began there in 1979, and one person a week in Los Angeles since that chapter formed in 1981.

But New York police put the arrest figure at less than 25 with most of them for jumping subway turnstiles or being a nuisance in the cars. And hundreds of Angels have "It's smoke and publicity to me," San Diego Police been cited, mostly for failing to pay subway fares.

Three Angels have died in the line of duty, including accidentally shot by police in Newark, N.J. But the group has expanded.

There are now 59 chapters on both coasts, supported through the modeling work of Sliwa's wife and \$80,000 in

'There were areas that they were not forging into," Sliwa said. They were timid, overly cautious and you can't

The Angels were there to direct traffic and control the crowds on the eve of the games when a disturbed man ran his car down a crowded Westwood sidewalk.

Lewis claims the Angels have prevented crimes and Sliwa travels between coasts, acting as cheerleader that criminals "scatter like cockroaches" when they glimpse the red berets.

But not everyone agrees.

"The drug traffic is still awful," Don Durkee of Hollywood said. "I can say everybody is glad they're here, but no, they haven't cleaned it up.

Disclosure ordered on federal régulations

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge has ordered the Reagan adminstration to disclose when the White House budget office receives and acts on proposed federal regulations, a decision an advocacy group said will reveal White House hostility toward government regulation.

U.S. District Judge John H. Pratt, in a decision filed Tuesday and released later in the week, ruled that 'regulatory logs" showing the status of proposed regulations are public records, subject to disclosure under the federal Freedom of Information

Pratt ordered the Health and Human Services Department to release its log showing when draft regulations are transmitted from the Food and Drug Administration to HHS, for example, and when regulations are transmitted by HHS to the White House Office of Management

and Budget for approval. The decision does not call for release of the draft regulations themselves, which Pratt said are clearly exempt from disclosure.


The log shows only the general subject matter of the regulation, along with actual and target dates for various steps in the approval process.

While the matter appears to be a technicality, the advocacy group that sued for the record said the decision will allow the public to see if OMB is indeed the bottleneck, as rumored, where important regulations are stalled and eventually killed.

"The decision will permit, for the first time, public debate on one of the hidden costs of OMB oversight - the delay in implementation of important health and safety regulations." said William B. Schultz, an attorney

Public Citizen has alleged that HHS and OMB have stalled regulations recommended by FDA to ban cancer-causing food dyes and prohibit the sale of unsafe drugs.

"Until now, however, there was no way for the public to find out the length of these delays or exactly which regulations were being delayed by which agency." the group said.

HHS said it had no comment on the decision or on a possible appeal. An appeal is considered likely, how-ever. But if the decision stands, Schultz said, it will apply to all federal agencies that submit proposed regu-lations to OMB for approval.

That makes the decision widely applicable. President Reagan, early in his first term, ordered OMB review of all significant government agency regulations.

There have been persistent reports ever since that the OMB review goes beyond the issue of budget impact to the merit of the regulations themselves, and that controversial regulations often seem to die in an OMB filing cabinet.

The suit began in an FOI request filed by the Public Citizen Health Research Group for records on when proposed regulations were trans-mitted by FDA to HHS and OMB. Their request was refused.

According to Pratt's opinion in the case, the government argued that the regulatory log was part of the de-cision-making process. That would allow it to be withheld under an exemption in the disclosure law that is intended to protect the right of officials to make candid comments without fear of public reaction. Pratt rejected the argument.

"Defendant is grasping at straws when it asserts that the essence of the deliberative process privilege is to protect public officials from lobbyists while they deliberate on public policy," Pratt said. "... The regulatory process is not a 'private' one, nor did Congress intend for (the exemption) to so make it."

Pratt said the exemption is intended only to protect "predecisional policy discussions" from disclosure, adding: "No such policy discussions would be compromised by disclosure in this case."

Kenyan official lashes 'racist element' in theory contininent spawned disease

NAIROBI, Kenya - The notion that AIDS might have originated in Africa and that the disease may be rampant in parts of the continent has angered and worried Africans, from presidents to prostitutes. It has sparked raucous debates m

parliaments, prompted a spate of government denials and has drawn nearly daily mention in newspaper stories, editorials or letters to the editor.

"If scientists cannot find a home for the virus, Africa is not the solution to their dilemma," Peter Nyakiamo," Kenya's minister of health, told Parliament Nov. 21.

Nyakiamo went before the lawmakers to tell them that seven people had died in Kenya of AIDS acquired immune deficiency syndrome - and that there were 14 suspected cases.

The minister's disclosure was an indication that some African governments are starting to address the

possibility of an AIDS problem after years of official denials.

Research studies presented at an international symposium on AIDS in Brussels, Belgium, late in November indicated that a variety of fatal AIDSrelated diseases are spreading in African cities, largely through prostitution and unwise medical practices.

In September, a six-member medical team told a government-sponsor-ed symposium in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, that at least half of the 125 known AIDS victims in that country had died since the disease was discovered there two years ago.

government-distributed pamphlet warns Tanzanians against homosexual contacts, sex with prosti-

tutes and re-using syringes. In Zaire, scientists from the United States, France, Belgium and the World Health Organization are conducting the most comprehensive AIDS research on the continent, with the cooperation of the government.

Outpacing the increased candor, however, is an anger directed toward the West and its news media over the alleged African connection.

There is an element of racism in all this," Simon Shitemi, permanent secretary in Kenya's Ministry of Health, was quoted as saying in a Nairobi newspaper, the Standard. "If the source of AIDS was Africa and one-tenth of the population are infected, why are Africans not dying in large numbers, such as is being experienced elsewhere?"

President Daniel arap Moi of Kenya bristled at what he described as a report saying that 10 percent of his 21 million countrymen carried the AIDS virus. He did not identify the source of the report but charged that "foreign elements," which he also did not identify, were spreading inaccurate stories.

Kenya, along with Burundi, Congo, Danzania, Uganda, Zaire and Zambia, have been identified in medical journals and media reports as part of the African "AIDS Belt," an area of East and Central Africa where the disease or symptoms of it have been found

The American Medical Association reported in a November issue of its journal that as many as 15 percent of healthy heterosexuals in Central Africa may carry the AIDS virus, suggesting that prostitutes in the region should be considered a highrisk group.

A week after that report was released, researchers at the Harvard School of Public Health in Boston, Mass., announced they had discovered that African green monkeys are carriers of a virus closely resembling the one believed to cause AIDS.

The researchers said the discovery supported the contention that AIDS originated in Africa and was passed from monkeys to humans, perhaps through bites or eating monkey-meat. But other medical people argue that AIDS research is still incomplete.

'There is no indication whatsoever where the disease started," Dr. Fakhry Assad, director of the World Health Organization's Division of Communicable Diseases, said during a meeting on AIDS in October in Bangui, Central African Republic. 'The disease as we know it appeared here at the same time as in the United States.'

At the Brussels symposium, it was noted the AIDS-related diseases, including a virulent form of cancer known as Kaposi's sarcoma and found in a different form among AIDS patients in the United States and Europe, began spreading in Africa only in the 1980s, casting doubt on the theory that AIDS began in Africa.

AIDS was first diagnosed in the United States in 1981, but scientists believe the disease could have been present at least four years before then. The United States has the greatest number of confirmed cases of AIDS in the world, about 15,000. More than half of the victims have died.

No official estimates are available on the incidence of AIDS in Africa, since some governments still refuse to release information on the disease within their borders. But medical officials say privately that AIDS is probably more widespread than the several hundred cases reported so far. AIDS isn't just a health problem in Africa, but it aggravates political sensitivities and spreads fears that it will frighten away tourists and trade.

On Tanzania's semi-autonomous island of Zanzibar, the government has banned the distribution of used clothes from abroad because officials they may carry the AIDS virus.

U.S. authorities say, however, that the virus has been shown to spread only from sexual contact, contaminated hypodermic needles, transfusions of blood and blood products, or from mother to child before or around the time of birth.

In Kenya, there is concern about the AIDS scare because tourism is second only to agriculture in generating income.

'In New York, of all places, one tour operating agency had a group cancel because of the fear of AIDS in Kenya," said Nicola Brown, marketing director for Abercrombie and Kent, Kenya's largest tour and travelagency Miss Brown and other tour operators said cases like that are still rare, but of no less concern. A visit in October by an 11-ship U.S. Navy battle group to give nearly 10,000 sailors shore leave in Kenya's Indian Ocean port of Mombasa provided a good illustration of the AIDS scare from both sides. Prostitutes arrived in the thousands from as far away as Rwanda, Tanzania and Uganda. But untold numbers of them returned home disappointed by a lack of customers. "Some of them whispered to us that they had been warned earlier of the disease in the country and that they should not attempt to do anything. one prostitute was quoting as telling the Nairobi newspaper Nation. "I earned peanuts compared with other times these sailors visit our shores and all because of those false foreign newspaper reports about AIDS. The controversy did not end there. In the Kenyan Parliament, lawmaker Chibule wa Tsuma, who represents a Mombasa-area constituency, suggested that American sailors be screened for AIDS before being allowed to disembark in Kenya But Dr. Herbert Nsanze, who lived in Kenya before moving to Fiji in the Pacific earlier this year, told the Brussels symposium that prostitution in Africa was an "important and serious problem" in the spread of AIDS. He said prostitution was common in many African cities and that AIDS is more common in Africa's urban areas than in othe? areas

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Today I saw something that bothered me. I don't know if I want advice or if I just need to talk to someone about it. This morning l

DEAR SAGINAW: How often I have heard your Story, but unfortunately, there is no way to turn back the clock. Again I plead for patching up old quarrels, bandaging old wounds. I've said repeatedly that peace is better than war and dissension, and old grudges are poisonous to relationships. The sooner they are rooted out the better.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: If 1 interpret Cecile

Browne's little poem correctly and your reason for publishing it, I cannot help but conclude that you and Cecile are both saying God is Jewish.

I am not anti-Semitic. I abhor any kind of bigotry. I am a Christian who believes Jesus was God's son. He was born of Mary, a Jewish maiden. Jesus was born Jewish, brought up Jewish and observed all the Jewish feasts and religious days. The night before He was crucified He ate the Passover meal with his friends, the disciples. I believe God has favored the Jewish people. He chose them for what they were and He loved them.

My main point is that God himself is not Jewish. I hope you concur and that you will say so. - A PENNSYLVANIA DUTCHMAN

DEAR PENN: The lines, "How odd of God to choose the Jews," and that clever rejoinder by Cecile Browne, "But odder still are those who choose a Jewish God but

spurn the Jews," does not imply that Jesus is Jewish. Jesus was born a Jew but left the faith to start his own religion, which bears his name - Christianity. What Browne was saying is that it's strange that folks can worship someone who was born Jewish, yet be prejudiced against Jews.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: In a recent column you heard from a reader who was worried about a letter he had written because it contained information that could be extremely damaging. He asked how private were your files. You said all letters were destroyed immediately after they were answered. How then are you able to reprint letters from years back when readers request them? - OMAHA OT

DEAR Q.T.: We keep scrapbooks of all published columns. The letters are destroyed.

BRIDGE

Q. - We still play the old-fashioned way: After a single raise from partner, opener bids three of his suit to ask partner to bid game if he is at the top of the scale for his raise. A friend who plays duplicate regularly says the re-raise is preemptive and you should bid a new suit as a game try. How does that work? R.D., Middletown, N.Y.

A. - It is fine to play that a re-raise by opener is preemptive - if you are playing duplicate bridge. There, it can be a major gain if you go down 100 points when the opponents can score 110 or even more. At rubber bridge, however, it can be an expensive pastime to go down in partscore contracts when you are not sure that the opponents are going to enter the bidding.

Given that, your friend is right when he suggests that it is more valuable to use all suits as game tries rather than a raise to the three-level in opener's. More often than not, you need to know about partner's holding in a specific suit

rather than whether he has 9 points or only 7. For example, presume you open with one spade and partner raises to two spades. You hold: ◆AK7632 ♡7 0A5 ◆KJ63 Suppose that partner does hold 9 points which include the king-queen of hearts. Those cards are not very helpful to you - at best you will be able to get a slow discard of a possible loser. He would venture to four spades and quite likely you would have no play for your contract. However, you would be almost laydown for four spades if partner has the right 4 points-the two black queens. Even a singleton club would give you good play for game

What would happen if you were -to make your game try in the suit where you needed help-in this case, clubs? Partner would value his holding in that suit only in making his decision whether to bid game or not. With a useless holding, such as three low cards, he would simply correct to three spades. With a



good holding, such as a high honor or a singleton, he would venture to game. If he is not sure whether his holding is good enough, he can show a feature in another suit if it is lower ranking-than the trump suit, and ask opener to decide.

Continued expansion in economy predicted

Outlook locally appears to be brighter than state as whole -

Continued economic expansion in the United States is still the most likely prospect for next year although performance will differ widely across sectors because of a "chronic budget imbalance" that has segmented the economy, according to the president of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.

Addressing Orange County community leaders at a recent luncheon at the Ritz Carlton Hotel, John J. Balles said overall growth is likely to occur at a slightly increased pace in 1986 with only a modest rise in inflation. He added that the outlook for the Orange County-Los Angeles area should be brighter than for California as a whole.

Balles said "there is no precedent in our peace-time history" for budget deficits of close to \$200 billion for 1985 and 1986, which are equivalent to 5 percent of the nation's gross national product or almost triple the percentage as recently as 1981. He added he was "not optimistic" that the deficit would be cut significantly in the foreseeable future.

"Over the last few quarters, the federal deficit has absorbed between 45-50 percent of the net savings made by households, businesses and state and local governments." he said, "funds that normally could be used for business spending on plant, equipment and inventories and for new home purchases.

BUSINESS CALENDAR

The Fed president said the federal government

deficit has been the most important factor contributing to the sharp increase in the dollar's value since 1980. This, in turn, he noted, has created a dual economy in which the service and trade sectors have flourished while manufacturing and agriculture have suffered.

According to the Federal Reserve official, consumer spending will continue to grow through 1986 but "significantly below" the robust rates so far this year; expenditures by businesses on equipment and construction will be sluggish. On the other hand, the economy will be given a boost in the second half of 1986 as the fall in the dollar this year begins to show up in an improving U.S. trade position.

An average increase of slightly over 3 percent in the gross national product is forecast through 1986.

In California. Balles said the trade, services and aerospace sectors will do well in 1986. He added that the drag on California's economy has been in the areas of agriculture, semiconductors and oil, whose prices are determined in world markets.

The outlook for the Orange County-Los Angeles area is brighter than for the state as a whole because the strong sectors such as defense figure more prominently locally, while just the opposite is true for a weak sector such as agriculture." added Balles. "This mix of strong and stable sectors should provide Southern California with continued, if moderate, economic growth.

Regarding inflation, the Fed official said he expects a 'small uptick" in 1986 from the projected 31/2 percent for this year. Although not ruling out completely the possibility of a recession next year, he said the Federal Reserve Bank's research staff believes that the more likely prospect is a continuation of the economic expansion through 1986.

Cal Fed limits withdrawals due to strike

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A strike by 800 to 1,000 California armored transport guards prompted at least one major financial institution to put limits on the cash customers may withdraw.

California Federal Savings and Loan, with 135 branch offices in California, imposed a \$300 cash withdrawal limit Friday to minimize effects of the strike.

Rhanda Kahawaii, spokeswoman for the savings and loan, said customers may withdraw additional funds by buying travelers checks or accepting money orders and ex-change checks.

She said the limit will probably stay in effect until early in the week.

Other banks were experiencing only minor problems from the strike. "We don't anticipate any prob-

lems," said Curt Olsen, spokesman for Bank of America, which has 909 offices statewide. He said the bank took all necessary precautions to prepare for the strike.

Ron Supinsky, spokesman for the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, which supplies cash to financial institutions in nine Western states, said there were no major delays or other problems in getting cash to banks and savings and loans.

"All of our routes are being serviced," he said.

The unions involved in the California strike are the Currency and Securities Handlers Association, the Armored Truck Employees Association and the Armored Transport Employees Association.



Anti-apartheid crusaders ignore communist threat

To the Editor:

The pattern is all too familiar. What is being produced by the selfappointed crusaders for human rights and their allies in the media is a rehash of what they fed us about Rhodesia, Iran and Nicaragua in recent years, and about the "horrors of colonial rule" three decades ago.

But virtually no one points out that the beneficiaries of these sanctimonious meddlings in the past have always turned out to be anti-Americans or outright communists who have quickly plunged their countrymen into far greater economic and political horrors than those from whom they were "rescued."

But what about South Africa? Most assuredly, I do not favor what is termed "apartheid." We look forward to a day when the remainder of South Africa's government-structured racial policies will be cast aside in the same manner that some already have been.

Yet, I am certain that tearing down this nation's government and institutions in a rush to meet standards demanded by revolutionaries and their allies will surely transform one more nation into another citadel of despotism. This will leave its people of all races in far worse conditions, something that any honest person must admit when he views what transpired in Zimbabwe, Ethiopia, Angola and Mozambique in the past decade, and in dozens more African states since the 1950s.

Contrary to popular belief, South Africa is not a nation where a white minority moved in and subjugated a united black people. To begin with, much of the land was uninhabited when white settlers began to arrive 300 years ago. Other huge portions became vacant when tribal warfare and disease either snuffed out or uprooted entire black populations.

The large-scale massacres of blacks by Zulu warriors during the 19th century took a tremendous toll of lives. After white settlers had brought civilization to various parts of the

nation, remnants of several tribes migrated back to their former territories.

Many of these areas today are designated "homelands" and four have already been granted total independence under local black leadership.

It is hardly inappropriate to ask why moralizers from our nation -where 15 million unborn infants have been legally slaughtered — should be preaching to anyone. Or where all these breast-beaters were when African blacks were killing other blacks in Nigeria, Burundi, or Uganda. Or when any of these dogmatists demonstrated against communist savagery in Cambodia, Poland, Afghanistan, or even Russia and China.

The protesters want Americans to withdraw investments from South African industry, a move that genuine South African reformers know would devastate the black population. Ad-mitted socialist and Nobel Peace Prize winner Bishop Tutu calls for such an economic squeeze while ignoring what it would destroy — the best health, education and economic conditions for blacks anywhere in Africa.

Not surprisingly, demonstrations in America have been organized by the pro-Castro Trans-Africa organization, which publicly backs procommunist terrorism in Angola and elsewhere, and which works side by side here at home with the Communist Party USA.

Nor is it any shock to learn that Sen. Edward Kennedy went out of his way during his recent visit to South Africa to mingle with the communistbacked terrorists of SWAPO (Southwest Africa People's Organization).

None of those who indict South Africa care to note that she keeps her racial policies to herself and forces no one to her view. But toward communism, which has taken over scores of nations and continues to threaten all others, they are predictably silent. V, LAVAN Mission Viejo



We can defeat Soviets if we try

Consequences of a defeat would be far-reaching

The meeting in Washington spon-sored by the Committee for the Free World could not have been better timed. The talk, you see, has been of reconciliation and there is one sense in which we all desire this, if we assume that the only alternative is

internecine nuclear war. But the trouble with reconciliation, pure and simple, is that it has overtones of moral lassitude: the reconciliation not only with the Soviet Union as the other nuclear superpower, but reconciliation with all that the Soviet Union has done during the past generation. There are those who dare to hope for something better

And a heavy congestion of these associate themselves with the Committee on the Present Danger, which is the parent organization of the Committee for the Free World. The group of scholars and writers who met in Washington shared a geopolitical insight quite devastating in its implications. It is this: that the Soviet Union is so vulnerable, because of the barbaric structure of its internal system, that the least defeat will have on it magnified consequences. One participant at the conference said it plain when pointing out that the only thing the Soviet Union has got going for it these days is its reputation for invincibility. Nothing else.

The paradise for the proletariat is believed in by nobody in the world with an IQ above 70, give or take a few dreamy ideologues. The Soviet Union, however, is powerful for other reasons merely than that it has the largest inventory of nuclear weapons in the world. It is powerful because it clings formally to a political philosophy that provides instant and respectable cover for any despot in the world who wishes to associate himself with the ideological avant garde. The pre-eminent case in point is Nicaragua. If Ortega hadn't declared himself a Marxist, but merely one more despot, he would not have three-quarters of the intelligentsia of the West enthralled. Well, the Washington intellectuals proposed that the Reagan administration take a hard look at the situation and resolve to go further than it has in proving that Marx has, in fact, no clothes. The newsiest item from the conference was the declaration from Elliott Abrams. He is the assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs, a bright and tough young intellectual who said to the conference that the help currently being given to the rebels of Nicaragua, as we persist in designating the freedom fighters, is beyond the dreams of anything we would have ventured to do during the long hangover following the Vietnam War, when the only freedom fighters we'd have dared to help were Israelis or Falklanders. Don't you see, said Mr. Abrams, things really are changing. Nicaragua now has 20,000 armed men and women opposing the communization of the Sandinistas. And if the communist salient in Nicaragua fails, just imagine the effect of this on Latin America. Salvador Allende failed in Chile, and the cost of that failure to the communist movement in Latin America was decisive for a decade. But if there was ever an opportunity provided by heaven, it is of course Afghanistan. Six years have gone by since the Soviet Union decided it wanted one more satellite power, poised over the Middle East. You don't have to be a iterary detective to hear the voice of the poet in these plays - what the critic Northrop Frye calls "the unmistakable roar of Shakespeare's mighty rhetorical engines."

its interest. We may have here our first glimpse of the young poet testing his wings. Nobody thinks this particular poem is a work of genius, but it may be the work of a man on the verge of genius, full of untamed extravagance.

Shakespeare's work follows a general line of development, like that of many great artists, from virtuosity to profundity. The plays that appear to be earlier are generally comic, polished, witty, crowd-pleasing, full of the poet's delight in showing off his immense verbal gifts. His comedies feature large social tableaux and clever, though implausible, plot devices

But at a certain point in his life, a writer often stops wanting to please the audience quite as much as he did at first, and begins wanting to please himself. He tires of the techniques that gave him early success; he wants

Nothing in the early work of any great artist, however precocious. prepares us for his supreme achievement. He himself can't predict what he will achieve; he discovers that in the process of achieving it. And at his peak he will be an almost infinite

distance from his own juvenilia. So the poem Mr. Taylor has unearthed can't be ruled inauthentic on grounds that it is unworthy of the author of "Macbeth." We are unlikely ever to know whether Shakespeare actually wrote it.

Meanwhile, we still have Shakespeare's works, as easily available as sunshine. Anyone born in the English-speaking world who doesn't take the trouble to read them, for the boundless joy of reading them, has no right to complain of having lacked equal opportunity.

Diplomats in Afghanistan

State Department cables provide a glimpse of the life of American diplomats at the U.S. Embassy in Kabul, the embattled capital of Afghanistan. It's not a pretty picture.

Far from protecting the Americans stationed there, the Soviet puppet government of Afghanistan inspires and encourages a constant campaign of denunciation in the press, "spontaneous" mass demonstrations, harassment and threats of physical violence aimed at our diplomats.

With a professional diplomat's understatement, Charge d'Affaires Ed Hurwitz noted in one cable to Washington: "Our relations with the Democratic Republic of Afghanistan are probably colder and more limited than with any other country in which we maintain an embassy." The United States has never sent a replacement for Ambassador Adolph Dubs, who was kidnapped, then killed in a botched rescue attempt in February 1979, some 10 months before the Soviet invasion.

"The regime claims that the United States is its primary enemy and threatens us accordingly," Hurwitz continued. "Frequently labeled as a nest of spies, the embassy has had four officers declared persona non grata within the last 21/2 years. Most embassy staff members are regularly

WASHINGTON - Confidential followed by secret police agents, and all but a few of our FSNs have been arrested on espionage charges. FSNs, or "foreign service nationals," are Afghan citizens employed in nonsensitive positions by the embassy.

> According to U.S. cables obtained by our reporter Jenny Cunningham. the Afghan ministry of foreign affairs delivered a none-too-subtle threat to the embassy in September 1983 claiming that it would be unable to prevent "angry Afghans from taking action against our buildings and staff members." And in fact, the regime has apparently done nothing to stop frequent anti-American demonstrations in front of the embassy. As in other communist countries, such demonstrations cannot take place without the government's collusion.

"This highly restrictive environment necessarily puts severe limits on the goals and objectives of the embassy," Hurwitz cabled Washington. "We have little hope of influencing (Afghan government) policy decisions, nor can we perform those commercial or informational functions which are normally part of an embassy's portfolio.

Why stay, then? Hurwitz disagrees with critics who complain that the embassy's continued presence in Kabul gives tacit recognition to the Soviet puppet regime. He also points



out that, for all the restrictions, the embassy is able to collect some information on the fluctuating situation in Afghanistan which is valuable to Washington policy makers.

The embassy staff is also able to keep the Soviet aggression in Afghanistan from becoming "the forgotten war" by sending out information that can be used by the press, which is barred from Afghanistan. Continued world attention will exert pressure on the Kremlin to negotiate settlement, Hurwitz believes.

"A third objective of the embassy," he wrote, "is to keep watch on the non-communist diplomatic missions and international organizations in Kabul, with a view to preventing or minimizing activities which would tend to give support to the (Afghan) regime or otherwise work against U.S. policy toward Afghanistan.

Remarkably, Hurwitz reported that "employee morale has generally been high in Kabul, since most people have volunteered for the job and know what they are getting into.

Poly on Friday, with a coin flip this morning to decide the host school.


It's the third straight trip to the semifinals for Marina and fourth in five years under Thompson, who has turned the Viking ship 180 degrees in his eight years as coach.

MURRIETA (AP) - Arnold Palmer, calling on the half-remembered magic of an earlier golfing era, dominated his younger challengers and won \$45,000 Saturday in the first nine holes of the 1985 Skins Game.

Palmer, now 56 and a living legend in the game he once ruled as the man known as "The King," birdied four of the last six holes on the Jack Nicklausowned and designed Bear Creek Club after a nerve-straining start.

Two of those birdies were for carryovers, setting up a \$100,000 value for the 10th hole, the first that will be played today








High altitude hits Vanguards at Northern Arizona, 75-63



The Trojans had already accepted a bid to the Dec. 28 Aloha Bowl, and both USC and Oregon entered Saturday's matchup with 5-5 records. The Trojans, whose big-name popularity and proximity to the Honolulu-based Aloha Bowl helped draw their invitation, were determined to avoid the embarrassment of going into that game with a losing record.

And, after spotting Oregon a 3-0 lead, USC came back strong behind an opportunistic defense and an offense that was just good enough.

We're happy to be going into our bowl game with a winning record," USC Coach Ted Tollner said.

The Trojans' opponent in the Aloha Bowl has not yet been determined and will be decided by a couple of games Saturday in the United States. It appears, however that Alabama may wind up playing USC





ATLANTA (AP) - The National Football League's two leading rushers, on teams heading in different directions, will be the feature attraction today (Channel 4 at 1) when the Los Angeles Raiders and Atlanta Falcons collide at Fulton-County Stadium.

The Raiders, tied with the Denver Broncos for the lead in the American Conference West, and Marcus Allen, the league's No. 2 rusher with 1,336 yards, are a solid one-touchdown favorite to down the Falcons,

Dallas handles Clippers

Nixon notches 24 in fourth straight setback, 124-115

DALLAS (AP) - Mark Aguirre scored 35 points to lead the Dallas Mavericks to a 124-115 victory over the Los Angeles Clippers in National Basketball Association play Saturday night.

The victory was the fifth straight for Dallas (9-7), which has won seven of its last eight games. The Clippers (6-12) have lost four straight.

The Mayericks never trailed after leading 60-56 at halftime. Their biggest lead was 15 points, 121-106,

with 2:40 left in the game. The. Clippers, who were led by Norm Nixon's 24 points, managed to. keep it close in the third period, thanks largely to their free-throw shooting. During the period, Los Angeles made 19 of 22 from the line and at 5:23, trailed by only six points, 70.73



Zappa zaps his **Congress** critics

WASHINGTON - Francis Vincent Zappa, rock music's Jonathan Swift, found inspiration in the halls of Congress. So much, in fact, he's incorporated America's lawmakers into his new album

'An average musician doesn't really think about Washington, D.C. You don't keep your mind on politics,' says Zappa. "But you can sure get mad if you get a whiff of it.

This is the same outspoken Frank Zappa, looking more like a stock-broker than a 44-year-old rock musician, who came to the nation's capital in September to do battle against the forces who want to put warning labels on rock albums.

He angered at least one senator. who called Zappa's committee testimony "boorish, incredibly and insensibly insulting," and left town disturbed by the machinery of government and vowing to fight on.

Zappa's plan is to launch the youthful forces of rock 'n' roll as a ship of attack. "What I'm going to do is see what would be the most entertaining way to package what really happened at that hearing so a kid can understand it." he said.

'Because ... there's a lot of people out there who are 18 years old and I

think the people in Washington, who are wasting everbody's time and money, should be alerted to the fact that they can vote like a beast. And I'm going to encourage them to do

Phase one of Zappa's plan is his newly released album: "Frank Zappa Meets the Mothers of Prevention." contains a 12-minute cut called "Porn Wars," which was inspired by the Senate hearing on record labeling demands by the Parents' Music Resource Center.

The song, a typical Zappa creation. is a computer-generated musical collage. It blends electronic and rock music with remarks by senators and witnesses at the Senate Commerce Committee's hearing. The statements often are speeded up or slowed down to change the pitch.

Sen. Paula Hawkins, R-Fla., can be heard repeating the phrase: "Fire and chains and other objectionable tools gratification in some twisted minds.

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., at times sounding like a chipmunk, says: 'Outrageous filth," and "If I could find some way constitutionally to do away with it, I would.

Phase two of Zappa's attack is still uncertain, but he hopes to fashion a music video of the committee proceedings.





'John and Yoko' stirring but one-sided biography

NEW YORK - "John and Yoko: A Love Story" is the Gospel accord-ing to Yoko Ono, who is portrayed as an angel with a wailing voice. But even with her singular view on living with John Lennon and the legacy of the Beatles, the film is entertaining, energetic and emotional.

It will be the Fab Four, plus Yoko, against the Refrigerator Monday, when NBC broadcasts its three-hour movie against ABC's "Monday Night Football," starring 300-pound Wil-liam "The Refrigerator" Perry and his Chicago Bears.

NBC researchers are predicting that the Bears will beat the Miami Dolphins and remain undefeated, at least in the ratings trenches, now that the Refrigerator is a national mascot of sorts.

The \$5 million film, which was shot in New York and London and will have widespread theater and TV sales overseas, was the idea of Executive Producer John J. McMahon after he read "The Ballad of John and Yoko" in the Village Voice. To seal the deal with NBC, he needed Ono's consent and contributions.

He got it by promising to focus on the relationship between Lennon and nearly five years ago. In return, Ono gave extensive interviews to writerdirector Sandor Stern.

It was a tradeoff. McMahon got a first-rate love story, offering a very involving, exceedingly warm insider's view that makes Lennon a human being, not a legend, but it doesn't provide the same evenhanded treatment to the other Beatles, nor Ono.

The public perception of Ono, an avant-garde artist, is that she is a shrewd and strident woman who broke up the Beatles and radicalized Lennon — none of which comes across in the movie. "That was my first perception," said McMahon. "But when you get to know her, there's a sensitive human being beneath that veneer.

McMahon said Ono had two veto rights - one over closed-door dialogue between herself and her husband, the other over casting of the two principals.

Kim Miyori, who played Dr. Wenw Armstrong on "St: Elsewhere," plays Ono. Perhaps burdened by the character's saintly dimensions, Miyori offers a limp performance.

The first choice for Lennon was a British actor named Mark Lindsay,

his wife in the 16 years before he was shot and killed by a deranged fan learned his real name was Mark Chapman, which incredibly was the name of Lennon's killer. "I'm sure she would have vetoed him, but she was never put in that position," said McMahon. "NBC and I vetoed it first.

The replacement, Mark McGann, turned out to be a perfect choice. Like Lennon, a native of Liverpool, McGann convincingly captures Len-non's mixture of boyish ram-bunctiousness, working class sensibilities and sensitive dreamer. He has Lennon's look and lilt down pat.

The movie begins in 1966 with the mop-top Beatles touring the United States. After the early concert scenes, the group does a fadeout in the film. The exceptions are a few studio sequences where George Harrison is depicted as a bitter foe of Miss Ono's, Ringo Starr a stooge and Paul McCartney a jealous schemer. Except for McGann, the actors don't resemble the real musicians.

The movie weaves in the developing artistic tension between John and Paul, with John eventually demanding a "divorce" from the group. Where the film works best is in



Trucks, trucks, everywhere on Grapevine

By ROGER GILLOTT

ON INTERSTATE 5 - Rush hour on the Grapevine comes in the wee hours of the morning as trucks pour over the main artery linking Los Angeles to the Central Valley and San Francisco.

Every night between 4 p.m. and 8 a.m., about 7,000 trucks — half of them going each way — climb through Tejon Pass in the Tehachapi Mountains.

Most of the traffic on this stretch of Interstate 5 is compressed into the early morning so cargo will be on hand for local deliveries during the day

"You've never been over the Grapevine at 3 a.m.?" asks Steve Roth, a driver for Montebello-based Sterling Transit Co. "It's quite a sight.

abreast." An Associated Press reporter joined Roth on a recent roundtrip to Bakersfield.

Roth, 38, has been driving big rigs for 15 years. In the early 1980s, as industry deregulation began taking hold, he tried making it as an independent owner-operator, but his costs were too high and delivery rates were too low

So he sold his rig and went to Sterling, a major intrastate hauler whose drivers are Teamsters.

The cab of the International shudders as Roth turns on the diesel engine at the Montebello yard and lumbers over surface streets to Interstate 5. "It settles down as it warms up," he says

It takes over 21/2 hours to haul his two trailers of merchandise to Sterling's terminal in Bakersfield and

nuts bound for Los Angeles.

Along the way, he talks about truck accidents.

"The worst area is when they go over the hill," Roth says, referring to the notorious Grapevine grade that takes traffic from the top of the Tejon Pass to the floor of the Central Valley 4,000 feet below. "Some trucks hit the hill at 50 to 60 miles an hour, then they can't slow down.

About halfway down the Grapevine is a shiny new road sign that says, "Runaway Truck Ramp."

"They (the state) put that in just a few months ago," Roth explains. "It's really just a big gravel pit. When you hit the gravel, you'll go about 10 feet. sink down to the trailer and then have to pay about \$1,500 to get towed out."

Roth bristles a bit at California Highway Patrol statistics showing

Sometimes, the trucks are four exchange them for two trailers full of commercial trucks log about 3.7 percent of the vehicle miles traveled in California but are involved in about 6.9 percent of the accidents.

> He pins part of the blame on automobile drivers who do things like cut off a truck or slow down in front of one, apparently not cognizant of the danger they are creating for themselves

A truck hauling two loaded trailers can weigh up to 40 tons. A standard car weighs about a ton and a half.

"If there's an accident, it isn't going to hurt the truck," he says. He concedes some truck drivers are

at fault, saying they push themselves too hard. But he insists they are a

minority. "The main problem is fatigue," he

Roth points to a shiny double gasoline tanker rig, lit up like a

Christmas tree, making its way south. "I feel sorry for some of those "guys," he says. "A lot of them are independents, paid by the load. They run from Bakersfield to Los Angeles full, then have to return empty. Some

of them make as many as three trips a night to make a living. Life is easier for unionized drivers at big companies. They are paid by the hour, and the union and regulators keep a closer watch on the time they spend behind the wheel, which is

limited by state law to 12 hours a day. At a truck stop in Bakersfield, two other truckers, Joe and Jack, join Roth and the reporter in a booth. Nearby, a waitress tries to rouse a man who has fallen asleep and slumped over the counter.

"I hope he's headed north," says Joe, who is going the other way to Los Angeles.

End of line for the red caboose

Outmoded last car being replaced by an electronic box

DENVER (AP) - After a century and a half of pulling up the rear on the rails, it's the end of the line for the caboose - in most states.

Railroads say economics and modern technology are pushing the caboose off the tracks, and the days of friendly railroaders waving from the caboose at crossings are over.

Some people, especially caboose crews, are fighting mad about it.

Well, there are romantic things always going out," said Tom LaHood, Union Pacific railroad spokesman in Omaha, Neb. "There are no more gas lights on the streets. It's a matter of economics and crew safety. The caboose simply has outgrown its usefulness. It's outmoded."

Nationally, there are about 12,000 cabooses in operation, each weighing around 27 tons and costing about \$80,000 brand new They're being replaced by an electronic box that fits on the coupler of the last car of a train.

Weighing about 35 pounds and costing \$4,000, the "Trainlink" monitors air brake pressure, train speed and other data and transmits it to the locomotive engineer.

Some railroad workers say the device cannot replace the human touch in a caboose, checking for broken wheels and axles, or watching out for overheated bearings.

Cabooses, which usually carry one or two crew members, are making sort of a last stand in North America.

"They are virtualy extinct in Europe," said Frank Wilner, assistant vice president American Association of Railroads in Washington. He said a few cabooses are still at work in Britain, where some cars still lack automatic bräkes, but they will be phased out.

In Canada, however, cabooses are still the rule, Wilner said.

U.S. railroads say about 95 percent of on-train injuries occur in cabooses, and it costs nearly \$1 a mile to operate a caboose. They note that the United Transportation Union agreed to eliminate the back car from onefourth of through trains and all local and switching movements in a contract signed in October 1982.

part of working at Gillette

BOSTON (AP) — Every weekday. almost 300 employees of the world's largest razor blade manufacturer come to work unshaven.

At an appointed time, the men take their place in a row of 28 cubicles. apply shaving cream to their faces and become part of Gillette Co.'s never-ending search for a better blade

Their daily shaving ritual is often watched by experts who record the number of strokes, the time spent shaving and other factors. Sometimes, the experts even collect the stubble in jars for examination.

For Gillette, the behemoth of the blade business, razor research means big bucks and security that looks almost as tight as some military installations.

You can imagine that the leader in any market would also be the leader in research and development," said Gillette spokesman Greg Niblett. "We're always looking for how to get a better shave.

Gillette spent \$61.9 million last year on research for all its products. Though it won't release a figure on shaving research. Niblett said "a good percentage of that is spent on blade

and razor development." And for good reason: Gillette, which pioneered the disposable blade at' the turn of the century, sells 60 percent of the 2 billion blades bought each year in the United States. It's an edge the Boston-based company does not want to lose.

The employees volunteer to shave at work, usually during work hours, at the 27-acre complex, which turns out about 5.4 million blades a day.

The men, who range from production workers to department managers, take their place in a long row of booths, each equipped with a mirror and sink. A test center employee hands them shaving cream and a razor through a window, and, in undershirts or bare-chested, they go to work.

Afterward, the men check off boxes on a computer card to rate their shave according to smoothness, closeness, freedom from nicks and cuts, and overall comfort.

The men never know what they are testing. It could be an experimental blade, an existing Gillette product or one made by a competitor. The center has been in operation

since 1973, and some of the men have

tested razors for years. They receive no additional pay, though they often are given gift certificates or movie passes.

"Basically it's very convenient for me to shave here," said Gary Zakrzewski, a manager in Gillette's product evaluation division.

"It does save some time in the morning at home. And the other thing is I'm kind of interested in the type of products we make, to judge the quality of what we shave test.

The testers' evaluations are fed into a computer along with evaluations from 2.400 Gillette employees, family members and friends nationwide who test razors at home.

"Shaving is a very, very subjective process," Niblett said. "We all have different beards."

That leads to widely differing opinions among the blade testers as to what constitutes a good razor.

Gillette's razor research has several goals.

"On one hand, we're trying to determine whether new products meet performance and safety standards," Niblett said. Another goal is to test the quality of existing products

NEW YORK (AP) - A Manhattan nightclub took on the aura of an upscale high school dance Saturday as about 60 rich and chic teen-age women gathered to meet the wealthy bachelors who will escort them to the International Debutante Ball

Madonna's "Material Girl" blared as the men, dressed in blue blazers or three-piece suits, stood in a receiving line. They greeted the debs, who came from as far as Texas for a chance to eye the guys at the Bachelors' Brunch at the swank El Morocco on East 54th Street.

The brunch, billed as a "pre-ball warmup" was actually a chance for the debs to do some Christmas shopping - for an escort to the ball, scheduled for Dec. 28.

Michael Rockefeller, grandson of the late Nelson Rockefeller, and Peter Stavropoulos, son of the designer who goes by last name only, were listed among the hosts. However, they didn't show up.

Debutante Lucinda Robb, granddaughter of the late President Lyndon. Johnson, made a brief appearance.

dictated, actually," said Jack Shaver. Colorado legislative director for UTU. "We think public safety is at stake and all trains should have a caboose.

That is why the union has pushed for legislation in several states to require that trains have cabooses if they exceed a certain length - most about 1,500 feet - or are carrying hazardous materials, he said.

So far, Virginia, Oregon, Montana, Nebraska, and recently New Mexico have passed such laws. Similar legislation in California was vetoed this year by Gov. George Deukmejian.

Negotiations are under way for a new national railroad workers contract, but Shaver said the union is seeking more money for its 100,000 members and cabooses are not a big issue.

John Bohlman, assistant state legislative director for the UTU in Nebraska, said, "The railroad tends to push the effectiveness of the electronic devices, but in actuality they're not failsafe."

The railroads, however, say the safety issue is settled and cabooses are not needed. The Federal Railroad Administration, which has extensive railroad safety rules, does not require use of a caboose.

The Presidential Emergency Board, in making its ruling on cabooses in 1982, estimated that railroads could save \$400 million a year by the action.

The board used Florida East Coast Railroad as an example of safe operation without cabooses. Between 1973, when FEC started operating without cabooses, and 1980, the railroad's train accident rate averaged 39 percent of the national rate. In some years it was as low as 15 percent of the national rate.

In 1982, the Interstate Commerce Commission recommended that the Milwaukee Road operate without cabooses to help pull itself out of bankruptcy. Soo Line, which purchased the Milwaukee Road, began eliminating cabooses last year. Santa Fe, Southern Pacific and Missouri Pacific are also running cabooseless when and where possible. In Wisconsin, railroad workers

urged the legislature to enact a caboose law.

Railroads and shippers opposed any restrictions. Christopher J. Burger, assistant vice president for Chicago & North Western Transportation Co., told a legislative hearing that the company runs more than 100 freight trains daily without cabooses and that workers are safer in the locomotive.

LaHood said Union Pacific has operated about 7 million cabooseless miles since October 1984. Although he did not have accident statistics available, he said he was sure accidents had decreased after the move. Burlington Northern would also like to do away with cabooses, said company spokesman Bill Joplin. However, because many of its trains travel through Nebraska, the company is keeping cabooses on most trains.
