Steamy scenes aside, Basinger's still 'shy'

She has posed nude for *Playboy* and bared body and soul before the movie cameras. But blond, blue-eyed actress Kim Basinger insists she's very shy.

"I've always been a loner and I still am," admits the 30-ish Basinger, curled up like a cat on her New York City hotel room couch and toying with a runaway curl. "I've never really had close friends."

But the ranks of Basinger's admirers are growing. Her recent performance in the film *Fool for Love* won critical acclaim, and this month she will appear in the sensual drama *9½ Weeks*, co-starring Mickey Rourke.

Basinger describes *9½ Weeks* as "a psychological love story between two people who just forget all about the outside world as they become obsessed with each other. It has a lot of emotional ups and downs and it made me the most depressed I've ever been, and the happiest."

"My husband (painter-photographer Ron Britton) was with me in New York for the eight months it took us to shoot, and it was very hard on him, too. But it was therapeutic."

It was more demanding than the pretty-girl roles Basinger played with panache in *The Natural* (1984), *The Man Who Loved Women* (1984) and *Never Say Never Again* (1983).

In *Fool for Love* she portrays the love-starved May, a rural girl "you might like to go have a beer with."

The same could be said for the actress herself, who grew up in Athens, Ga. After winning a beauty contest at age 16, she moved to New York City to become a singer but ended up as a top model. Her acting debut was in the 1978 movie *Hard Country*. Her next movie project, in production but as

yet untitled, is a thriller in which Basinger plays a femme fatale who snarcs Richard Gere.

"I wonder what took America so long to discover her," muses Menahem Golan, the head of The Cannon Group, Inc., the studio that produced *Fool for Love*. "To me, Kim is a blend of Marilyn Monroe, Brigitte Bardot and Judy Holliday with the talent of Meryl Streep. She has both sensuality and beauty."

Despite such accolades, Basinger refuses to bask in the Hollywood limelight, opting for a quiet life with her husband in her Woodland Can-

yon home near Los Angeles.

"My best friends are my younger sisters Ashley and Barbara and their (three) little girls. When it gets to be too much in California, I leave for Athens (Ga.) and take them to the Pizza Hut. I don't know whether I will have children or not, but I adore them. Maybe it has to do with my own childhood. When I was a teeny girl, I was already grown-up. ... I missed out on a lot of childhood things."

"And," she adds, "I was never satisfied — with anything. I must say I still feel the same way." □

How's your love life? This Valentine's Day advice can make it even better

A life without love, no matter how many other things we have, is an empty, meaningless one. Love is the grandest and most wonderful of all human experiences. It can be the simplest yet most complex, the most obvious yet elusive, the most devastating yet exhilarating of all human emotions. A life lived in love will never be dull.

It's difficult for many people to accept that love is learned, that we are taught to love. Most of us simply plow ahead assuming that we are born lovers. We never stop long enough to realize that we must be as diligent in trying to understand love as we are in trying to understand any complex behavior. If joy, peace and success are our goals, then

love is the only way.

So, I'm all for any holiday that will cause us to say "I love you." For some of us, of course, that's a difficult thing to do. But at least Valentine's Day — only a few days way — affords us an easier way to express it.

Still, wouldn't it be wonderful to have surprise Valentine Days all during the year — days when we tell someone we love them, send notes or flowers or candy? As much as we may know we are loved, we never tire of hearing it.

Go ahead: Be brave and take a chance on love

If we are attracted to someone and want to get to know them

better, we have to be willing to take a risk. We have to keep in mind that we may be rejected, but also that there is a 50 percent chance that the person will respond positively — and these are pretty good odds.

Love is always taking risks. A person may say, "Keep your love!" But that's only one person, and there are many others waiting for the love we are so eager to give.

Just because someone rejects us, it's not the end of the world. It's unrealistic to expect to be loved by everyone.

So if we see someone we like,

instead of sitting back and waiting for something to happen, we should hop to it and express what we're feeling. Pay a compliment, for instance. Most people like to be told that someone finds them interesting or attractive, provided we don't come on like gangbusters, our motivations are honest, and we aren't doing it to make "points."

I think it's sad that so many people are afraid to speak honestly. We need to tell each other how we feel more often.

Big romances need plenty of elbow room

The only way to keep romance alive is for us to grow, to change and to share in those changes. We don't even have to grow together. We can grow separately together — as long as we share.

If the man you love is a freak for baseball and you detest baseball, but you love opera and he hates it, it's still possible for the two of you to celebrate and share love. You each keep growing in your own way, never excluding the other. You can disagree,

have different needs, different interests, different desires, and still love each other. Loving relationships need not be totally agreeing.

Agreement brings us together; differences keep us together. They bring the excitement into the relationship. As long as we keep growing, every time we walk into the room we're a new person, full of surprises.

I think it's wonderful that so many women are working outside the home today. This offers them so many new experiences that bring excitement to their relationships.

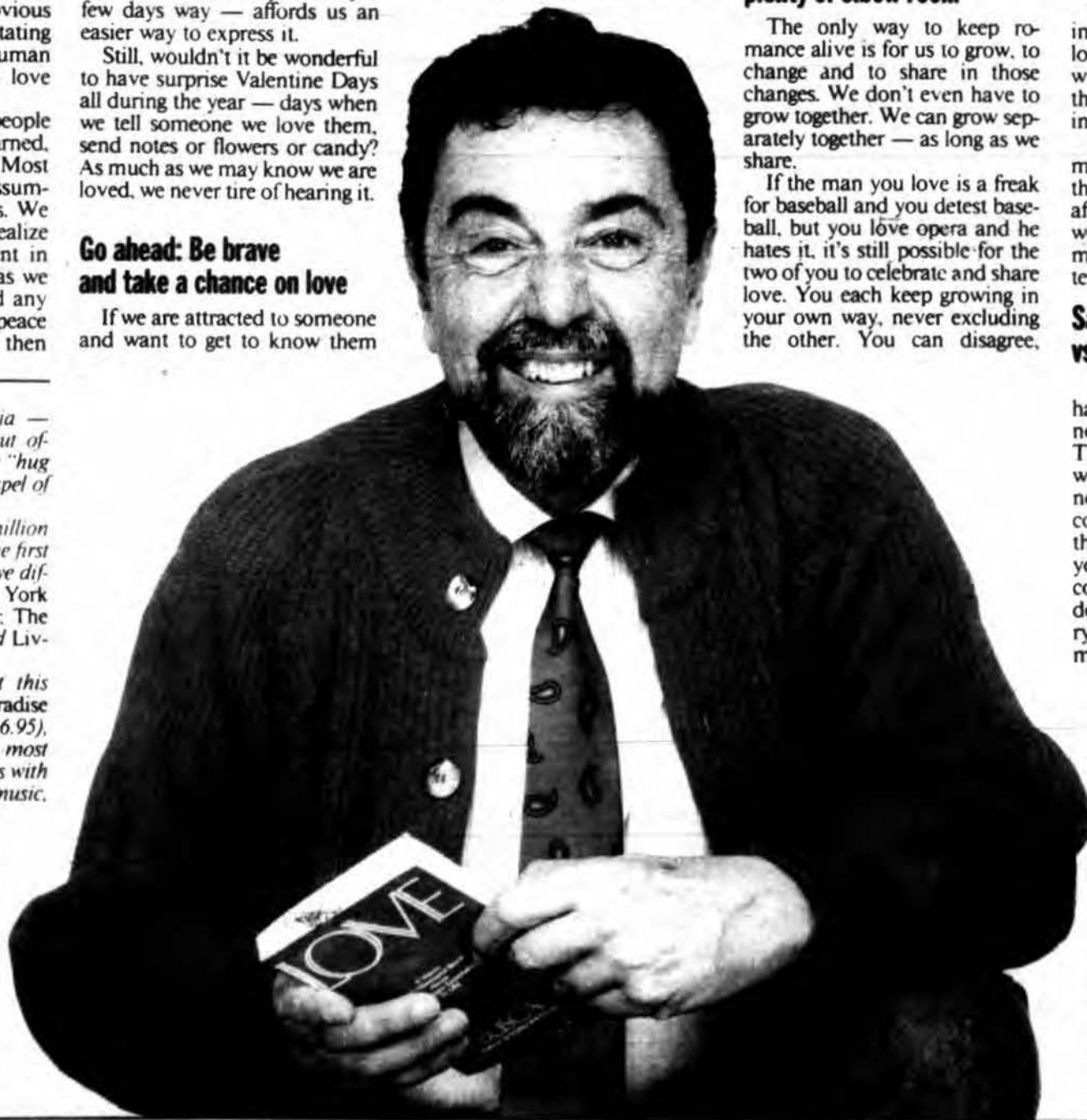
Unless each of us keeps growing, we just literally fall out of love — from boredom. Soon we will imagine we know everything the other person is thinking and feeling.

Probably the most harmful myth in our love relationships is that we will live "happily ever after." To keep romance alive, we have to "work ever after" to make ourselves fascinating, interesting and lovable.

Saying 'I do' forever vs. living together for now

Marriage and the family are having an enormous rebirth — not that they ever disappeared. The majority of people have always selected them. And why not? Marriage is a marvelous commitment that says, "Of all the people in the world, I select you to grow with." It's a public commitment. It's also a tremendous challenge. People who marry know they must work at it to make it successful.

When men and women live together, it's different. There is no definite future or commitment. Each is still basically on his or her own. Many couples who live together do so because they think that it is the best way to hold onto the other person. I find in my experience that if they truly care, they usually end up marrying or else they separate because one wants to form a more committed relationship and the other doesn't.

Felice Leonardo Buscaglia — pronounced boo-SKAL-ya but often called "Dr. Love" or the "hug therapist" — spreads the gospel of living and loving joyously.

Sex combined with love is a glorious zenith

I think that over the past 20 years we have really overdone the importance of sex. We have blown it so out of proportion that many people have destroyed relationships because they think they are not as sexually fulfilled as they are told they should be. We've made people feel that unless they're having 14 orgasms, their marriage is a dismal failure.

Sex is certainly a part of love. Sex without love is like taking a drug to momentarily find satisfaction only to discover yourself lonely and despairing in the morning. But when sex is accompanied with love, it's the zenith, the most glorious of experiences, the most intimate coming together available to us.

It's interesting how we refer to sex in our vocabulary. We talk about "having sex" instead of "making love." And we even use degrading four-letter words to describe the love act. There is an enormous difference for me, at least, between having sex and making love.

I think it's wonderful that we've brought sex into the open and that we can pick up a magazine and find articles about it. But isn't it funny how few of these articles talk about love and how many talk about sexuality, and yet one without the other is not fulfilling. We need both.

Love's five ingredients: Start with words and hugs

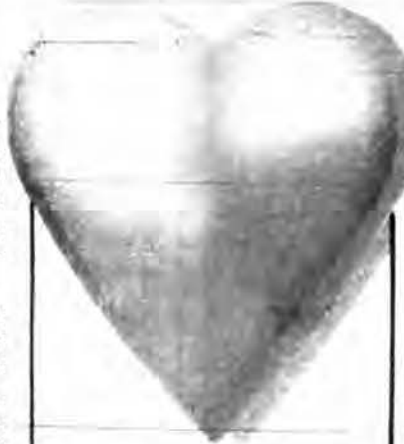
In my book, *Loving Each Other*, I describe the results of a questionnaire in which 600 women and men named those qualities they felt were most conducive to a growing, loving relationship. Here are the top five:

■ **Communication.** This is the most important skill for creating and maintaining loving relationships. When the other person says "What's the matter?" don't just say "Oh, nothing." For the other person to understand, we must say what we are thinking. We can't expect him or her to be a mind reader.

If someone says or does something that hurts us, we shouldn't keep it locked inside, fermenting, until we explode with it at some later time. Express that pain: "That really hurt me; why did you say that?" And talk about it together.

■ **Affection.** Reaching out to others in tenderness is so essential. A warm hug, a kiss, a compliment, touching hands, a look that says "I love you." These simple gestures mean so much to a loving relationship. And yet many of us find it so difficult to show affection.

I think it's because we were brought up in a culture that said it's not nice to touch. In most other societies, people greet each other with hugs and kisses. In my Love class, I had students

who had never touched their parents since they were little kids, so I gave them an assignment to hug their parents and say, "I really love you."

Imagine the effect this had on these people who instinctively wanted to be more affectionate but were afraid.

■ **Forgiveness.** One of the most vital things in a relation-

ship is to learn to forgive. Forgive moments of anger, moments of hurt, understanding that the other person is a human being with imperfections like ourselves.

If we don't forgive, we will become angrier and more bitter with time, and we will be the one who suffers in the long run.

■ **Honesty.** If we put all of our hope and trust into another person only to find out that he or she has deceived us, it's one of the most difficult things to deal with. How can we say we love someone and then not be honest? Especially if we are asked.

We need to know that those people we love will be honest with us. I'm talking about the kind of honesty we express when we sincerely feel and are not trying to hurt.

■ **Acceptance.** One of the great tragedies of love is that people believe once they form a relationship with another person, they can change the other and make him or her better. But this is a fallacy. No one has ever changed anybody who didn't have a desire to change himself.

To assume that we are going to change another person's behavior is heading us to ulcer gulch. We can offer alternatives: We can tell that person what would make us happy. But they have to want to make those changes themselves. We must accept and be happy with them as they are.

Are you a slow learner or late bloomer? That's OK

If we have not had the experience of loving, we can still learn to love — the way we learn a foreign language. If we had contact with a foreign language as a child, we are more likely to have a greater facility with that language as we grow up, but if we haven't, that doesn't mean we can't learn the language.

And anything that has been learned can be unlearned. So if we've learned a negative concept of love, we can unlearn it and develop a new concept whenever we desire to do so.

In learning to love, we have to learn the qualities — communication, affection, honesty, forgiveness, acceptance — and then practice. We learn what is positively reinforced. If I perform a certain behavior and someone tells me I'm great, someone caresses me, I'm likely to repeat the act. Giving love freely is so often reinforced: paying compliments, being sincere, responding tenderly and affectionately. These are things that people love to receive and will usually accept with gratitude and warmth.

So love becomes a very easy thing to learn, but we can't just sit back and wish for it. We have to try it out. □

How to mend a broken heart — and learn to love again

First, recognize the pain and express your feelings. Cry, scream, bang the walls, tear your hair if necessary. A broken heart hurts, and it's silly to stand there being brave about such a thing. Too often, we feel it's immature to be upset, to cry.

Once we've dealt with those feelings, we should ask: What is there to learn from this experience? Otherwise, we will repeat these same mistakes again and again. A woman I know married the same man five different times in five different faces. Each time she was certain that this man was right for her.

Then we should put on a Band-Aid, stand up bravely and go out and try again. But this

time we are a little wiser. That doesn't mean protecting ourselves; it means we have a better understanding of human dynamics. Love is learned best in the process of living. We don't learn to love locked in a room by ourselves.

In my book *Love*, I wrote that at the heart of all love is vulnerability. We must be willing to be vulnerable, to risk experiencing pain if necessary. The sad part is that so many people who are hurt cling to that hurt forever, learning nothing from it and are afraid to move on.

If we have had a painful love relationship, we may tend to shy away from love when it

comes our way again, or enter into it with trepidation, with suspicion, with fear. But the minute we say, "I've been hurt once and I'm likely to be hurt again, so I'll protect myself and keep a little bit of myself back," the other person senses it and feels insecure. And that may destroy any hope of forming a new relationship.

Often we enter into love naively, believing we just have to go out there, meet the right person, form a relationship and everything will be terrific. But for love to succeed, we have to work at it, study it, learn what it means to be a lover. We have to make ourselves lovable. □

Save your way to a nest egg

The bills are piling up again. And — oh, no! — so are those IRS forms.

What can help ease that nagging fear of impending financial failure?

Try building a nest egg.

The amount of money you'll need will vary, but most financial experts agree you'll want at least \$2,000 for a good, secure egg. And you'll need a stronger grip on your pocketbook to build one.

Kirk Starck, a personal financial planner with IDS/American Express in White Plains, N.Y., helps clients meet savings and investment goals. "Not saving in the old-fashioned way," he says, "but in a new approach that includes saving on taxes, too."

Saving the old way is built on that trusty passbook account. Your money safely, slowly compounds at a conservative 5 to 5.5 percent rate. At the year's end, you pay the tax man for the interest earnings.

Saving the new way demands astute observation of interest rates. It combines passbook savings with short-term, high-interest time deposits and Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs).

But some things are easier said than done. For too many people, a "heavy debt load" is the biggest single obstacle to creating a healthy nest egg, says Patricia Muzzey, director of the Family Financial Counseling Service in Concord, N.H.

■ **Stop charging.** Cut the credit cards in half and mail them back to the creditors.

■ **Budgeting.** Cut back overall household costs to pay off credit card charges and other bills in a systematic way.

■ **Telephone.** Put a timer by the phone and time toll calls. Don't make calls during peak hours. Scrap any extra services, such as call waiting, call forwarding or conference calling.

■ **Food.** Skip prepared and frozen items; buy fresh fruit and vegetables; shop at big chain stores or warehouse outlets.

■ **Entertainment.** Look for activities that are low-cost or free. Invite friends home for drinks or meals, rather than run up tabs at restaurants or nightclubs.

■ **Taxes.** Find out if you can take more tax deductions. If you can, save the added income or use it to help reduce your debts.

The most common and secure way of saving is to put your money in a passbook savings account, which usually can be opened with a small deposit. After you have a tidy sum of money salted away, you can move on to higher-interest-bearing savings plans. According to the Federal Reserve Board's most recent (1983) Survey of Consumer Finances, 62 percent of USA family households had passbook savings accounts.

"Today," says Kirk Willison of the American Bankers Association, "there is a decline in passbook savings accounts, and an increase in certificates of deposits, IRAs and money market accounts. The passbook savings account is perfect for some people. Other people feel they want higher risk. They have more money to invest at a higher rate."

For people who are ready to move out of the passbook savings phase, Starck advises:

■ **Make sure you have ready cash** to meet three to six months of expenses, and adequate life and disability insurance.

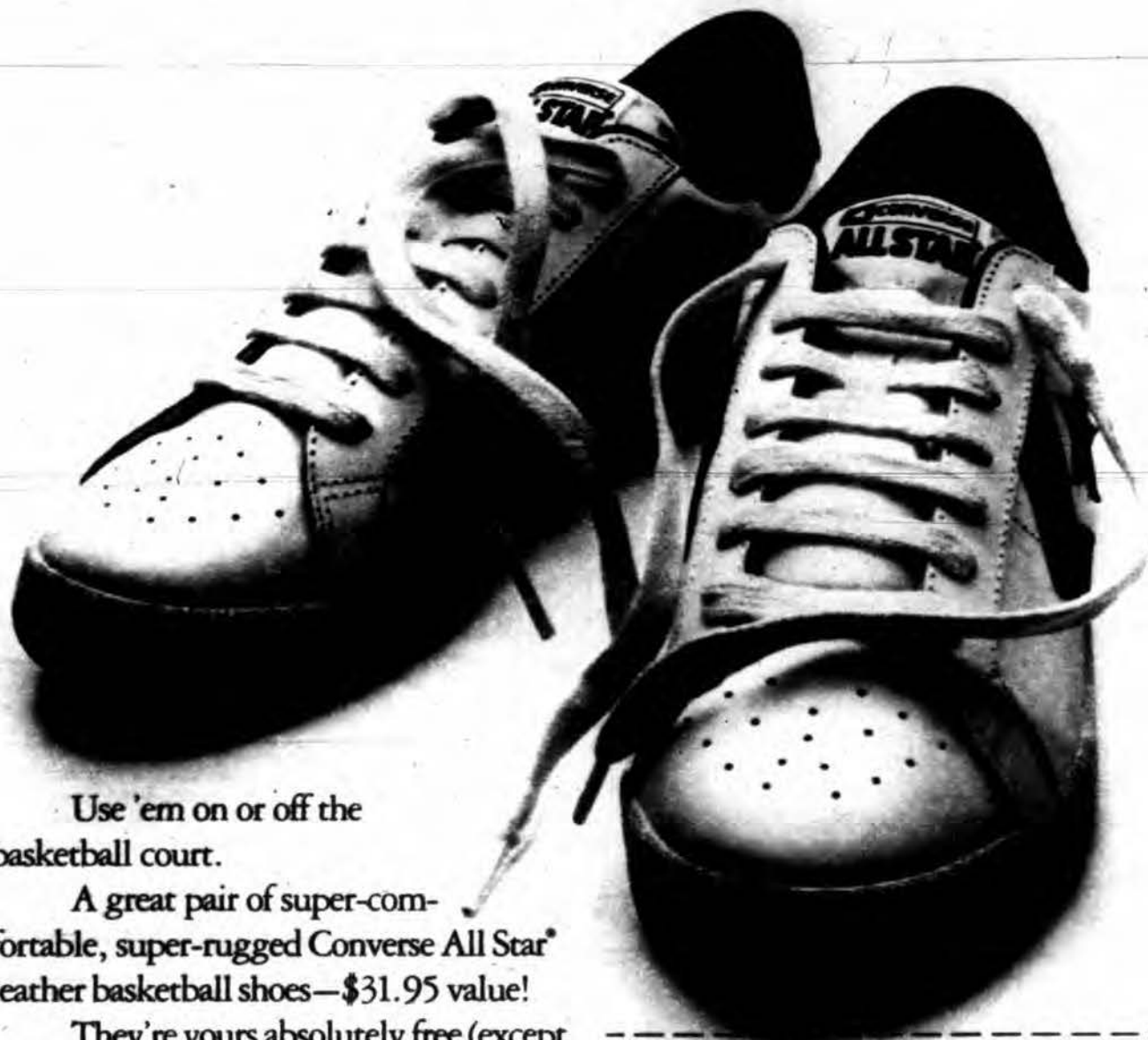

■ **Money market accounts.** First cousins of CDs, with limited checking privileges. Minimum deposit is usually \$500 to \$1,000.

■ **U.S. Savings Bonds.** Series EE bonds are as secure as the U.S. government. Bonds cost as little as \$25, but must be held at least five years to earn more than a passbook account.

■ **NOW accounts.** The interest rate usually starts at 5¼ percent on these interest-bearing checking accounts. A service charge is imposed if balance falls below minimum set by the institution. Shop around for best rates.

■ **Individual Retirement Account.** You can contribute up to \$2,000 yearly tax-free (\$2,250 for married couples with one working spouse) and defer taxes on interest, dividends or gains earned on accumulated savings until retirement or age 59½.

■ **Payroll savings plans.** Taxes are deferred on percentage of your salary deducted by your employer and put into a savings fund. Some employers make matching contributions.

■ **Universal life insurance.** Premium payment split between policy and savings, which are invested in high-yield securities. Available from licensed securities brokers. □

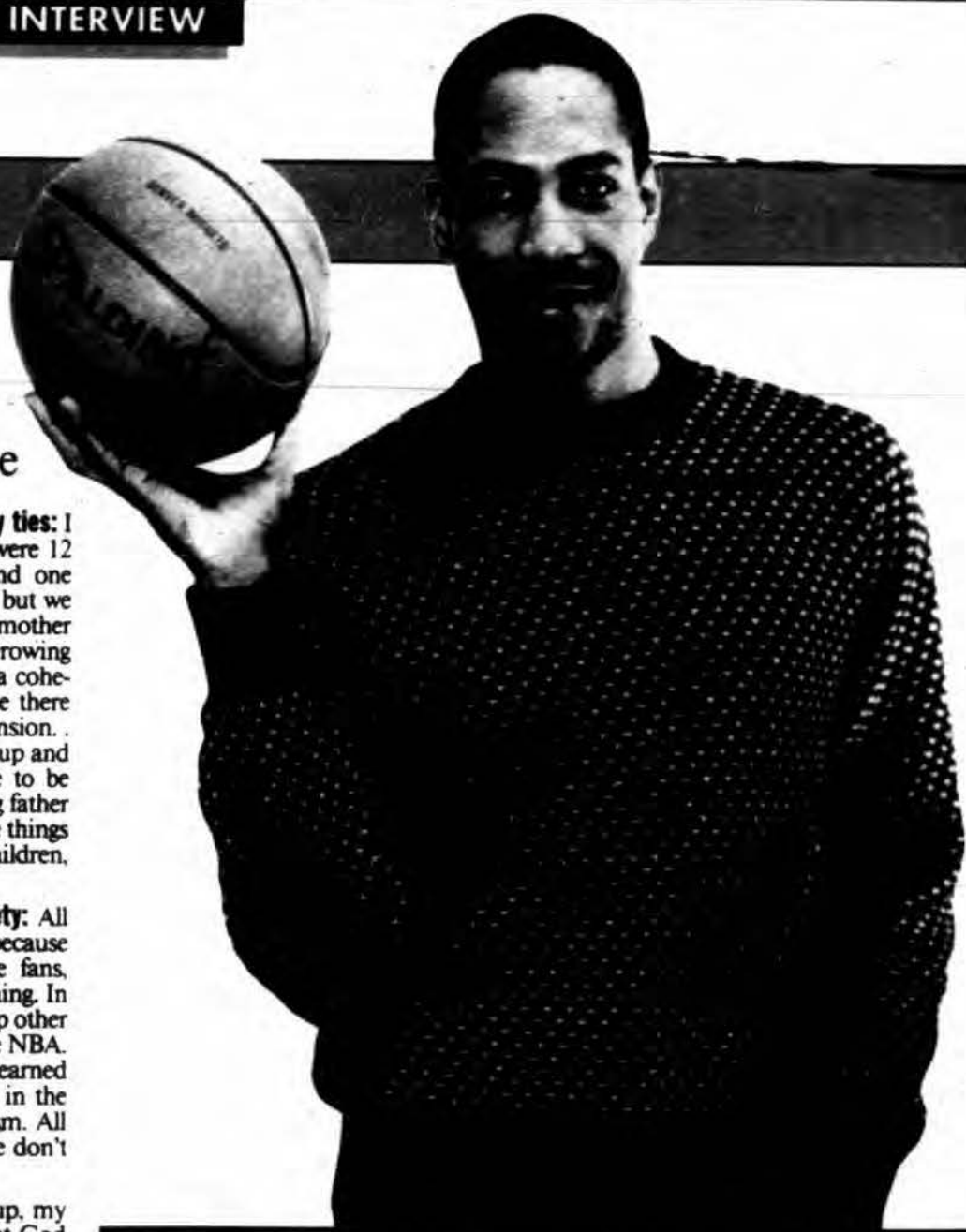

Heart's desire: Chocolate

It's sometimes hard to say what's in our hearts on Valentine's Day. But if the heart is chockful of chocolate, we may not have to speak a word.

Chocolate is one of our most enduring passions, from the traditional red-foil heart that generations of lovers have exchanged to our growing hunger for luxury and imported chocolates.

Perhaps the most traditional sweet treat is the Whitman's heart, a Valentine's mainstay since the mid-1920s. A computer microchip may now play *Love Me Tender* when we open the lid, but it's still the basic Valentine Dad gave Mom.

"We try to be with the times, but we have to stay with our image, too," says Karen Fidler, Valentine product manager for Whitman Chocolates. "We also plan Valentine's 18 months ahead, so we don't want anything too trendy that will be old by the time the heart is on the shelf."

Sweet smells fill the air in Whitman's Philadelphia factory. To fill the 27 varieties of hearts the company makes, thousands of pounds of caramel, jellies and the creamy filling called fondant are cooked daily in kettles.

From there, the fillings are placed in "remelt" kettles, and flavorings are added. Next, the fillings are transferred to a machine where they're poured into individual pre-shaped molds. When the candies firm, they move to an machine that drenches them with chocolate.

Finally, the candies are conveyed to the packing area. The pieces are nestled by hand and machine into paper cups and tucked into the hearts, an assembly process that handles more than 20 million pieces of candy each week. Whitman's will sell several million heart-shaped boxes of chocolate this Valentine's, with price tags from \$2.90 for 4 ounces to \$75 for the fancy 5-pound heart.

Those assembly lines need to stay rolling: While Valentine's Day is the fourth-largest holiday for chocolate sales (behind Christmas, Halloween and Easter), Feb. 14 is the largest *single* selling day of the year. What's more, each person in the USA chomps into 18.9

pounds of candy a year, 10.1 of that chocolate, according to the National Confectioners Association. The figures have been growing at the rate of about a pound a year since 1982.

Some of the increase is caused by a new craving for gourmet and imported chocolates. These chic sweets take a larger bite out of Valentine budgets: They are \$13, \$21 or more per pound vs. \$7 to \$9 a pound for non-gourmet candy.

A red straw basket with one pound of heart-shaped, raspberry *ganache* Romeoos and praline Juliets from Le Belge Chocolatier costs \$23. Huguette Dumas of San Rafael, Calif., makes the all-natural chocolates as they have been made in her native Belgium for generations.

Even with chocolate consumption growing, some people can't get enough. To the rescue: Fanny Farmer, with her chocolate-of-the-month club.

For the rest of her or his life, your Valentine could receive 1 pound of chocolate a month. A 33-year-old, for instance, would chow down more than 500 pounds of chocolate before the Grim Reaper arrived with his scythe.

The price? A mere \$1,986. More, maybe, than you planned to spend this year, but a small price to fulfill a true heart's desire. □

Spotting a nougat, and other tasty tips

As in poetry and music, the making of great chocolates is more art than science. But there are a few elements of standardization that can help chocoholics zero in on their favorite pieces without biting into each morsel. A few guidelines to boxed chocolates, from the National Confectioners Association:

■ A square shape is usually cara-

mel; if wrapped in gold paper, it's often solid chocolate.

■ Oblong is nougat.

■ Round is cream; foil-wrapped is usually a cherry cordial.

■ Single, whole almond on top is usually a coconut-filled round.

■ Swirls on top, called strokes, are usually flavor initials: "v" is vanilla,

"r" raspberry, "p" pineapple. □

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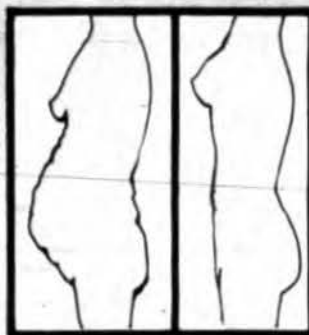

A shrimply delicious Chinese New Year

Nimble acrobats and fierce dragons are snaking through Chinatown streets again, whether the Chinatown in question is in San Francisco or Houston.

Sunday begins the Chinese New Year. The Year of the Tiger. Time to pull out the wok. Since the Chinese believe that eating seafood will bring abundance in the new year, why not try these Spicy Shrimp With Walnuts? In honor of the tiger, you might want to substitute Pacific tiger prawns for the shrimp. Measuring about 6 inches long, they have a distinctive orange and black shell, and can be found in many seafood markets.

Either way, round out dinner with rice, steamed green beans and a spicy Gewürztraminer wine. For dessert? A light lemon mousse or lemon ice cream with almond cookies. Now talk about g-r-r-reat!

Spicy Shrimp With Walnuts

- 3 pounds large raw shrimp
- 1 cup walnut halves
- ½ cup soy sauce
- ¼ cup vegetable oil
- ½ cup dry sherry
- 2 tsps. dark sesame oil
- 1½ Tbs. sugar
- 8 small dried chile peppers
- 2 Tbs. minced garlic
- 2-3 Tbs. fresh ginger, minced
- 1½ bunches green onions
- Peanut or other cooking oil

Peel and devein shrimp under cold water. Set aside in a colander to drain. Toast walnuts in a 250-degree oven for 15 minutes. Do not let burn. Set aside.

Combine remaining ingredients, except for the green onions and peanut oil, in a large bowl. Add the shrimp and combine well to coat with marinade. Let marinate for 30 minutes (or up to 1½ hours), refrigerated. Slice onions (including green tops) on the diagonal into 1½-inch pieces, and set aside.

Heat a small amount of peanut oil — just enough to coat the pan — in a large wok or skillet over medium heat. Use two skillets, if necessary, to prevent crowding. With a slotted spoon, add shrimp to pan, reserving marinade. Stir-fry for 2 to 3 minutes, until shrimp curl and turn pink. Transfer to warm serving platter. Pour the marinade and toasted walnuts into any pan juices that might have accumulated, turn heat to medium-high and, stirring constantly, reduce liquid to a syrup. Add shrimp back to pan with green onions. Stir well to coat with sauce. Serve immediately with rice. Serves 6. □

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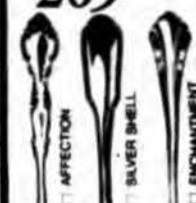

Classic cars accelerate in value

If you're not convinced that the 1950s and 1960s were very good years for the USA's automobiles, consider this: At a recent car auction in Scottsdale, Ariz., a 1957 Chevrolet Bel Air convertible sold for \$32,500. At the same auction, the highest bid for a 1956 Ford Crown Victoria was \$15,000. Both of these cars cost less than \$3,000 when new.

Ken Luboff, a publisher in Santa Fe, N.M., bought a 1962 Cadillac convertible a year ago for \$2,000 and recently sold it for \$5,000. And I recently doubled my \$1,000 investment in a 1968 Dodge Charger, after holding it for only one month.

It's doubtful if any new domestic car produced today will ever turn out to be such a good investment, so you might consider putting your money into a "classic." You'll enjoy the feeling of driving a machine that's gaining value while your neighbor's new domestic wagon depreciates 20 percent on the drive home from the dealer.

Generally, sports cars make better investments than family sedans. Peter Bohr, author of *Road & Track's Used Car Classics*, says sports cars "maintain about 70 percent of their value after four years." Other more sensible cars retain only about 55 percent of their value after the same period. He also points out that sports cars stop depreciating after four years while conventional models keep falling in value.

It's difficult to realistically price an older car. Aunt Ethel's Edsel might be worth a fortune to some, but will muster only faint interest among others who collect old cars for profit.

Muscle cars, favored by young people in the middle to late 1960s, are hot now. These vehicles — Pontiac GTOs, Ford Mustangs and Dodge Chargers among them — had powerful engines, smooth lines and a sporty image that had only been hinted at by the 1957 Chevrolet.

But before you lay out a single dollar for one of these or any vintage car, do your homework carefully. Chester Krause publishes a magazine called *Old Cars Weekly*; his *Old Cars Price Guide* is the bible for most collectors. Both are available on newsstands.

Gary Perkins, a Chicago entrepreneur and seasoned collector, advises prospective buyers to:

- Only buy a car that appeals to you personally — you might get stuck with it.
- Research its history thoroughly.
- Have the car checked by a competent mechanic who is familiar with vintage vehicles.
- Be sure the car is original; no alterations or engine swaps allowed. □

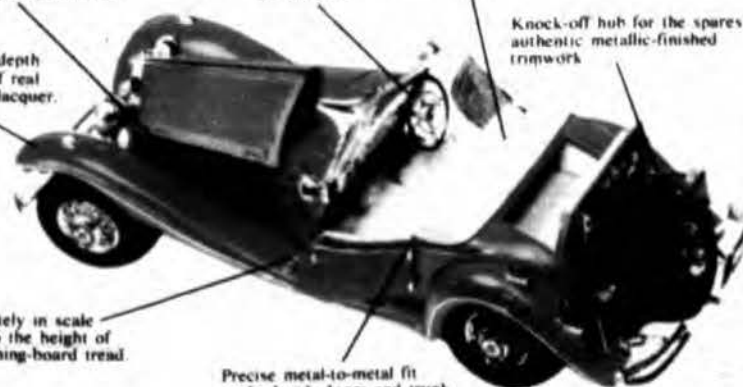

How to keep your weight from going in the same direction as your age

The question

As a teen-ager and on into my mid-20s, I was always quite thin and found I could eat whatever I wanted. Now that I'm in my mid-30s, things seem to be slipping south a little. I understand it is because of a metabolism shift, but why does a metabolism change cause weight gain? How should I alter my exercise?

The answer

Everybody's metabolism begins to change at about age 25, which is when aging really begins, says James Skinner, physical education professor at Arizona State University in Tempe.

The reason you can't eat the way you could when you were in your teens and early 20s, Skinner says, is because your body no longer needs the same number of calories to maintain itself. According to Skinner, this is how your body changes.

Your body begins to lose about a pound of cells a year — brain, bone and muscle cells and cells from other organs, because cells burn calories, as you get older, you need to consume fewer calories.

The only cells your body doesn't naturally shed are — you guessed it — fat cells. And if you don't cut your calorie intake in response to your changing metabolism, you start adding fat.

The fat, in turn, insulates your body,

which means you don't need the number of calories you otherwise would need to maintain your body temperature. That means that unless you cut calorie intake even further, you add more fat.

But the news isn't all bad. Skinner says. Both the loss of bone and muscle mass — and the addition of fat — can be slowed or reversed through a low-fat, high-fiber diet and regular exercise.

The ideal exercise regimen for shedding fat and building muscle and bone mass is a combination of weight training and aerobic activity. Women, especially, also should consider boosting their calcium intake — either with supplements or calcium-rich foods — because of increased susceptibility to osteoporosis.

Get your doctor to prescribe an exercise and diet program for you. The standard formula of 30 minutes of aerobic exercise three times a week applies, Skinner says. On in-between days — and depending on which parts of your body you want to tone up — any regimen of sit-ups, push-ups, leg lifts, calisthenics or light weightlifting is recommended. □

Device aims to keep stork on track

A new device designed to help prevent premature birth now has been used by more than 1,500 women — and is more than living up to its early success in a 1984-85 clinical study.

Called Term Guard, it monitors uterine contractions, which can indicate pre-term labor.

Generally used beginning in the 20th week of pregnancy, the portable monitor is worn for an hour in the morning and an hour in the afternoon. In the evening, sensor readings can be sent to an obstetrician by phone.

Of the 97 women involved in the early study of the monitor — all of them at high risk for pre-term delivery — 85 percent completed at least 36 weeks of pregnancy, enabling them to deliver normal babies. Full term is 40 weeks.

Since that study, women who used it have gotten slightly better results,

says Dr. Michael Katz, assistant professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of California in San Francisco. The machine is available by prescription and costs from \$2,000 to \$3,000 to lease. In most cases, insurance covers it.

"Symptoms of pre-term labor are very subtle. That's why a machine like this is so valuable," says Ana Tomasi, assistant professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Illinois Medical School in Chicago.

Of all women in the USA, 4 percent to 8 percent are considered at high risk for premature birth. Included are women who have had a multiple pregnancy, women who have given birth prematurely before; and, to a lesser degree, women who smoke, drink heavily, are under 17 or over 34. Women who have high blood pressure also are at risk. □

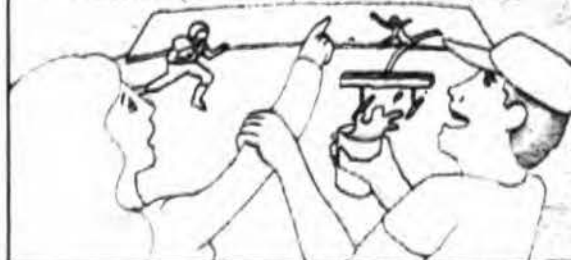

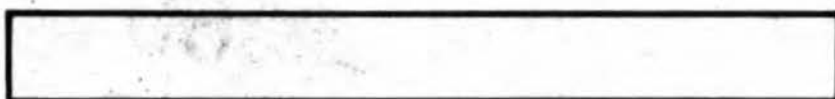

U.S. 'Under Siege' tonight

NBC movie depicts terrorist attack and government response

LOS ANGELES — The NBC movie "Under Siege," written by three Washington Post reporters, offers a "what-if" scenario of a terrorist attack on the United States.

The three-hour movie, which will be broadcast tonight, looks at how foreign terrorists might attack this country and how the government might respond. The movie's conclusions are frightening: the United States is extremely vulnerable to attack and the government response might be as questionable as the tactics of the terrorists.

The movie grew out of a six-part report on international terrorism that Bob Woodward, Chris Williams and Richard Harwood wrote for the Washington Post in 1984. They traveled throughout Europe and the Middle East to put it together. Producer Don Ohlmeyer ("Special Bulletin") saw the report and asked them to write the screenplay.

Woodward shared a Pulitzer Prize with Carl Bernstein in 1973 for reporting on Watergate, and they wrote "All the President's Men" and "The Final Days." Woodward, now an assistant managing editor for the Post, also wrote "The Brethren" and "Wired" and is now writing a book on the Central Intelligence Agency.

Williams, on leave from the Post, wrote a biography of Ted Turner, the owner of Cable News Network and the Atlanta Braves. Harwood is deputy managing

editor of the Post.

In their series, a principal terrorist they targeted was Abu Nidal, recently implicated in the airport attacks in Rome and Vienna. In the movie, the fanatical leader of the terrorists is Abu Ladeen (Nidal backwards).

"He makes a good example of a bad guy in the drama," said Williams. "His intent is to de-stabilize the government. No arguments. He doesn't take hostages."

"We have some violence and one love scene," added Woodward, "but basically it's how the government would deal with this problem, and the competing and not

necessarily consistent goals of the various agencies.

"The president is trying to keep his head above water. The FBI says it's a crime and should be treated that way. The secretary of state says there is no diplomatic solution. The secretary of defense argues against a military response against the country that appears to be behind it. These are essentially the real positions of the men in government today."

Williams said the movie suggested there really were no contingency plans for handling domestic terrorism.

Prime soaps down, but not out

NEW YORK — Reports of the death of the prime-time soap opera appear greatly exaggerated. Although the number of sex-driven serials has dipped slightly and next season won't bring any new ones, the current crop appears sturdy.

"They're not dying; they're just declining," said John Sisk, senior vice president of the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency. "They're still powerful TV entertainment, particularly for women 18-49, who are the principal target for many advertisers. For reaching that group, the four soaps have 35 percent higher ratings than the average TV program."

The four serial hits are "Dynasty" on ABC, and "Dallas," "Knots Landing" and

"Falcon Crest," all on CBS. Except for "Knots Landing," each has experienced ratings slippage. "Dynasty," which ranked No. 1 last season, is seventh for 1985-86. "Dallas" went from second to sixth. "Falcon Crest," which is bucking the "Miami Vice" phenomenon Friday nights, fell to 19th, while "Knots Landing" remained steady at 14th.

These losses prompted B. Donald Grant, president of CBS Entertainment, to say last month that the serial "has peaked. It's on the way out." CBS doesn't have any serials in development, nor do ABC or NBC, and there hasn't been a successful one introduced since "Falcon Crest" piggy-backed onto "Dallas" on Friday nights in 1981.

ABC's "The Colbys," this season's only

new soap entry, is a "Dynasty" clone. It is performing better than ABC's previous shows Thursday but ranks 48th out of 79 series this season.

"These shows always take time to build audiences," said Sisk. "We forget that 'Dallas' struggled on Saturday and Sunday before it finally clicked on Friday night."

Successful serials, more than any other TV form, get intense viewer loyalty. According to Sisk, in a typical four-week period, only 8 percent of the viewers of a non-serial will watch all four episodes, while 25 percent will be faithful to their soap four weeks in a row.

Daytime drama turns real

Space shuttle tragedy replaces soaps for millions of viewers

Two weeks ago a true American tragedy played out hour after hour for millions of viewers who had tuned in to see Pat Sajak spin that wheel or Tad Martin slither out of another jam. Instead they viewed the disintegration of seven humans as the space shuttle Challenger exploded while headed for the stars.

It was a special launch because it carried ebullient schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe — so special that all three major networks were carrying the launch live, something they had not done in a long time. Lately with space launches, mid-morning and

afternoon TV watchers had heard news-break announcements of another successful launch or perhaps a delay. But on this day the countdown and liftoff were viewed by millions. Then a million star-like particles exploded.

The countdown and explosion would run at regular speed, in fast motion, and slow motion for over five hours, interspersed with pieces on McAuliffe training for the project, shots of the crew members shortly before liftoff, interviews with the second woman into space, Judy Resnik, test pilot Chuck Yeager talking on the safety of the space program...and always it came back to that explosion.

As the tragedy played over and over, some viewers became restless and started dialing the networks.

"Yes, it was terrible...haven't we seen enough of it already? How many times can you run it?"

Some even foolishly wanted the soaps

back on the air immediately — that unreal world of tragedy as opposed to the very real tragedy they were getting. One local NBC affiliate handled over 400 calls in two hours. "You explain it's not up to you, you're sorry they're upset, and then you go on to the next call," said one harried but still pleasant-voiced operator.

Who is it up to? It depends on the network. At NBC, president of news Larry Grossman naturally decided to stay with the live coverage after the explosion. Then it was up to a "consortium of people to stay with the story all day." At ABC, someone "higher up than news, higher up than programming" made the decision, according to a network source. Yes, they had calls, but not as heavy as usual when the soaps are pre-empted, the source continued, probably due to the magnitude of the tragedy. Another spokesman there said press conferences usually draw the most "put my show back on the air" calls. But as the day wore on and the view of the explosion was burned into viewers' minds, the calls became heavier.

At CBS, calls started immediately, and evidently tended to be as heavy as they always are during a pre-emption. One caller was miffed because a friend was to appear on a quiz show that was now preempted. Another wanted to be certain that she wasn't going to miss the cliffhanger on "The Young and the Restless": "This isn't the day Jill was finally going to get hers, was it?"

At CBS the news department does not have to consult with anyone to pre-empt the regular schedule. There are no negotiations; if they want air time, they get it. However, CBS is often more likely to go with regular programming than with a news event. Years back, then-CBS executive Fred Friendly resigned when he learned a rerun of "I Love Lucy" was airing instead of an important Senate hearing.

One network source did say that a lot of "vamping" — stretching the story with minimal new information — was done while waiting for a slated NASA press conference and in hopes of getting an official answer to questions concerning the tragedy. After the press conference, most stations went back to regular programming. By then, however, it was after 4 o'clock EST (1 p.m. PST) and most local stations took over with reruns of ancient comedies, syndicated quiz shows or afternoon talk shows whose producers had spent the day rounding up space experts and any friends they could find of any crew member to talk about the tragedy.

In small offices, serial producers and writers were musing on the day's awful events and wondering how they could recut already-shot scenes and squeeze one episode into two so that St. Patrick's day didn't air on March 20. It was already too late to save Valentine's Day, which will occur in soapland Feb. 17.

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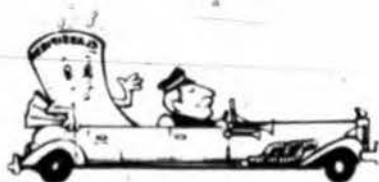

New comics score on cable channels

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Will Shriner says that cable television is the new "Borsch Belt" for young comedians looking for a place to try out their act before a wide audience.

Shriner, who appears on NBC's "TV's Bloopers & Practical Jokes," contends that it's responsible for the rapid rise of about a dozen new comics in recent years. During the 1970s there was little talk about new comics.

"There are few opportunities for national exposure outside of cable TV," said Shriner. "It gives them not only wide exposure but freedom to do a lot of things a comic couldn't do on commercial TV."

He also credits the emergence of a number of comedy clubs around the country to cable television. The clubs usually spring up in cities where the comedians have been seen on cable.

Shriner is the son of the late Herb Shriner, known as the "Hoosier humorist" and host of CBS' "Two For the Money."

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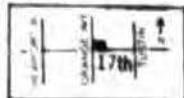

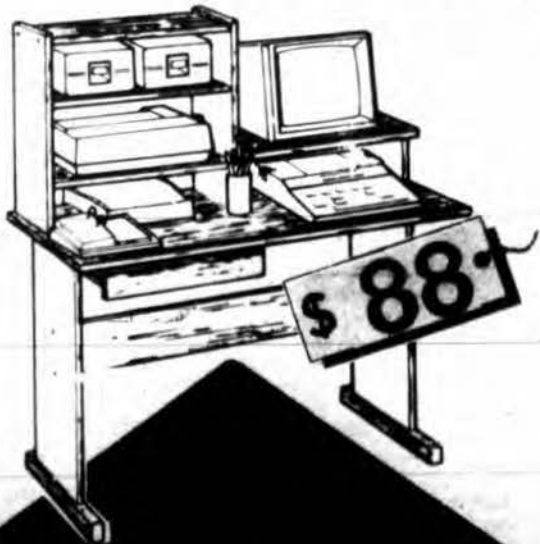
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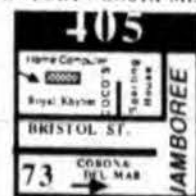

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Mysteries mount in desert

Court documents probe link between Bradbury kidnapping, desert murders

TWENTYNINE PALMS — Out here where the barren, colorless land seems to stretch to the horizon and the howling wind shapes and reshapes the dry earth, almost anything can happen.

A car can be blown off the road without warning and sandblasted by the gritty wind. A set of footprints can be erased in seconds. And a person can disappear without a trace.

But even in a land where the unexpected is expected, the Morongo Basin near Twentynine Palms has come to hold a growing number of mysteries that defy easy solution.

In the past 15 months there have been a kidnapping, two slayings and

the odd disappearance of a middle-aged man who took a walk one morning and never returned.

There are those who believe the incidents are somehow related. And now there is proof that authorities have considered that possibility too.

In court documents only recently made public, San Bernardino sheriff's investigators established a strong link between the well-publicized disappearance of Laura Bradbury and the slaying of a former beauty queen and her boyfriend last year.

The bodies of Clifford W. Leville, 41, and Toby Ann Santangelo, 21, were found buried in adjacent dry

lake beds several months after the couple had gone to sheriff's investigators to identify an acquaintance as a suspect in the Bradbury kidnapping.

Both were shot and buried in shallow graves, one in Copper Mountain Dry Lake and the other in Sunfair Dry Lake.

Court documents identify a Landers chemist as a leading suspect in the Bradbury kidnapping and quote sev-

Highway closed as sea crests barrier

For the second time in a week, the Pacific Ocean crested man-made sand barriers at Bolsa Chica State Beach and splashed onto Pacific Coast Highway — this time forcing the road's complete closure for eight hours on Saturday.

Powered by high tides and churning surf, the water broke over a newly constructed sand berm and spilled

onto the four-lane highway about 8 a.m.

Huntington Beach police closed off a four-mile stretch of the road to both north and southbound traffic until 4 p.m. while Caltrans workers pushed the water and sand back onto the beach with bulldozers.

The stretch of highway affected runs between Warner and Gold-enwest avenues.

Bicyclists, usually limited to narrow bike lanes on either side of the

highway, had a rare opportunity to pedal along the northbound traffic lanes, which remained relatively free of water and sand.

The daylong closure is believed to be the longest the Coast Highway in Huntington Beach has been closed since 1983, when a savage winter storm forced the road to be sealed off three different times, once for five weeks.

State lifeguards said Saturday's high tide was 6.6 feet. The surf was

breaking at about 5 feet when the flooding started, lifeguards said.

The ocean broke over the sand barriers last Wednesday and slowed morning traffic when it spilled onto the highway. The road was not closed, however.

Chuck Churney, maintenance supervisor at Bolsa Chica State Beach, on Wednesday ordered the sand barrier reconstructed and fortified in anticipation of further prob-

Irvine Amtrak stop facing Reagan roadblock

President Ronald Reagan's plan to eliminate Amtrak's federal subsidy has thrown a shadow over plans to add regular passenger train stops in Irvine.

When a proposed \$2.3 million transportation station is constructed in Irvine, Amtrak has agreed to schedule local stops for trains running between Los Angeles and San Diego.

But the future of the passenger rail system was thrown into doubt last week when Reagan unveiled his \$994

billion federal budget proposal for fiscal 1987.

Under pressure from the president, Congress last year agreed to reduce Amtrak's federal subsidy to \$671 million. In his new budget, Reagan wants to erase the remaining allocation.

If that occurs, the future of the Los Angeles-San Diego route — and the entire Amtrak system — may be shrouded in uncertainty, a state transportation official said Friday.

Congress has refused to support some of Reagan's "hit list" proposals

in the past. But this year the lawmakers may have to take another look — because if selective cuts aren't made, the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law could force reductions.

That law is the subject of a legal challenge, but remains in effect pending a U.S. Supreme Court review.

"The only alternatives to the domestic spending cuts emphasized in the president's budget are to raise taxes, to lower defense spending or to cut Social Security benefits, none of which is acceptable," Treasury Sec-

retary James A. Baker III said, according to an Associated Press report.

Irvine's Amtrak boosters point out that the Los Angeles-San Diego route is one of the system's most profitable and least likely to be eliminated. Nevertheless, the proposed cutback has raised questions about the viability of passenger rail service.

If the full Amtrak cut is approved by Congress, "It could curtail (passenger train) service everywhere," said Donald Dove, chief of the California Department of Transportation's pub-

lic transportation branch for Los Angeles, Orange and Ventura counties.

But regarding the proposed Irvine connections, he added, "As long as the trains are running, these stops are viable."

Irvine Councilwoman Barbara Wiener, who helped secure funds for the local station and permission for Amtrak to stop there, said, "San Diego-Los Angeles is one of the most profitable lines for Amtrak. The idea would be to make it more profitable

Woman on cliff chair plunges to her death

A 78-year-old woman killed when she fell from a motorized cliff chair carrying her to the beach from a Laguna Beach residence was identified Saturday as Madge T. Allen, a corner's deputy reported.

The woman, a resident of Laguna Niguel, fell about 25 feet when a cable apparently snapped, causing the chair to come to an abrupt stop, said an Orange County fire spokesman. Authorities said she apparently had dropped off trash at the bottom of the hillside and was riding the private chair to the top when it stopped.

It was not clear, however, whether the elderly woman was thrown from the chair or if she fell while trying to climb to safety.

The accident at 1:30 p.m. Friday occurred at the southern end of Thousand Steps Beach in the 32200 block of Pacific Coast Highway.

Man dies as crashed car burns

A man with a history of epilepsy died inside his burning car early Saturday despite the efforts of an Irvine police officer and a passing motorist who tried in vain to save the man, it was reported.

Michael B. Solis, 37, of Santa Ana was pronounced dead at the scene, according to Sgt. Tom Hume.

Solis apparently lost control of his 1972 Pontiac Grand Prix while traveling west on Barranca Road at the intersection of Milliken Avenue near the Tustin Marine Corps Air Station.

The car swerved across the roadway, jumped a curb and slammed into a tree, pinning Solis behind the steering wheel, Hume said.

Officer Jim Potts said he spotted the car in flames about 10:45 p.m., radioed the Orange County Fire Department and then tried to pull

A Southgate man trying to land a single-engine airplane at Meadowlark Airport in Huntington Beach escaped injury Saturday when the craft skidded off the runway and crashed in a mud puddle, police reported.

seriously injured in any of the incidents.

Police officers said Mohammed's airplane touched down safely at the airport, but then skidded off the end of the runway where the ground was muddy from a morning rainstorm. by adding passenger stops (like Irvine) midway. She added: "It may be that some of the less profitable Amtrak lines would have to curtail service. But I think Los Angeles-San Diego would be one of the last to be affected." Caltrans official Dove said a "wait-and-see" attitude prevails while Congress considers the proposed Amtrak cutback. He said complete elimination of the federal subsidy could cause Amtrak to fold. If that happens, he said, the nationwide system could be divided into regional segments that would be taken over fully or partly by private investors.

falls into private hands, the Los Angeles-San Diego route is likely to survive, he said. Dove confirmed that Amtrak's Southern California service is second in popularity only to the New York-Washington, D.C., route. He said the seven daily trains running between Los Angeles and San Diego carried 103,278 passengers during January 1986—a 17 percent increase over the same month in 1985. Even so, he said, the route needed \$1.50 per passenger in subsidies. Dove said the federal government subsidizes four out of the seven Southern California Amtrak trains, while Caltrans underwrites the remaining three.

If the federal money is eliminated, however, it is uncertain whether the state would be able to absorb the additional cost, he said. Meanwhile, design work continues on Irvine's transportation center, to be built just north of the intersection of the Santa Ana and San Diego freeways. Councilwoman Wiener pointed out that it will be a "multimodal" station, with connections for local and interstate buses, taxis, car pools and shuttles as well as trains. City officials are hoping for a late 1987 opening, and Wiener is optimistic that passenger rail service will still be operating. "I don't think Amtrak is going away," she said.

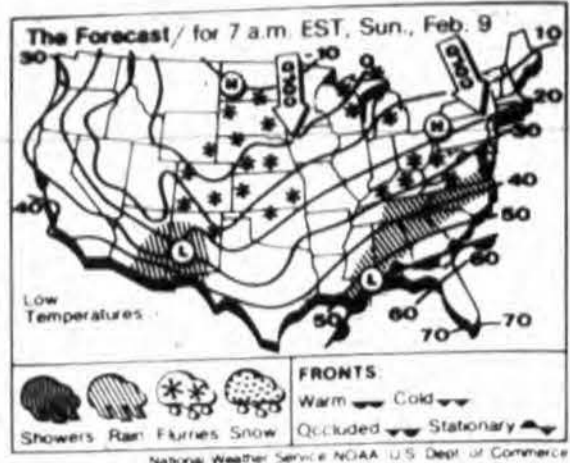
eral witnesses who believe the man shot and killed Leville and Santangelo because "they knew too much." The Landers man was described in court documents as a chemist who processed gold and manufactured LSD in a home lab. Leville told friends he wrote down his suspicions and sealed the papers in a metal box, which he hid in a rusted army ambulance parked in front of his Pioneertown residence. But when sheriff's deputies obtained a search warrant for the ambulance after Leville was killed, the metal box could not be found. Though it takes a stretch of the imagination, some are trying to link the Bradbury kidnapping and the fatal shootings with the disappearance of James Michael Nestor, a 57-year-old Johnson Valley resident who disappeared last October. It has not escaped attention that Nestor vanished almost a year to the day after Bradbury's disappearance. The little Huntington Beach girl was last seen Oct. 18, 1984, when she disappeared from her parents' campsite at Joshua Tree National Monument. Nestor disappeared Oct. 22, 1985, from a flat, open area near his home in Johnson Valley, a small community north and west of the Joshua Tree campground. "There are a lot of people trying to link this up with the Bradbury case because it happened a year later," said Lt. Dean Knadler. "But so far, it only appears to be a strange coincidence." But another sheriff's official said there is an unsubstantiated theory that Nestor stumbled upon something related to the kidnapping or slayings. It is more likely, however, that Nestor suffered a heart attack, a snake bite or simply decided to run away, said Capt. Gene Bedow. But an extensive search for the man was fruitless and relatives said Nestor loved the desert and had no reason to leave, according to reports. Whatever the explanation, Nestor's disappearance has only heightened the sense of mystery that has settled over the Morongo Basin, now wryly referred to as the "Morongo Triangle" by sheriff's investigators. The Morongo Basin is a sparsely populated expanse that takes in small settlements like Paradise Valley, Flamingo Heights, Pioneertown and Timingo Acres. The names are

arguably fancier than the towns themselves. Twenty-nine Palms is the largest town in the basin. Knadler said the Morongo Basin has a nefarious side. There are drug dealers, motorcycle gang members and others who occasionally live outside the law who call the area home. During the search for Nestor, for instance, deputies accidentally came across two marijuana farms. "It's very conducive to that because it's so rural and people live so far apart," he said. "You can do things without your neighbor ever knowing." When Bradbury was abducted in 1984, sheriff's deputies combed the entire basin, questioning known sex offenders and criminals. During that period of heightened investigation, Leville and his girlfriend came forward. Much of what is publicly known about the couple and their suspicions is contained in court documents filed in San Bernardino Superior Court. Among other things, the couple told authorities of a conversation they overheard between the man from Landers and another man. The conversation apparently occurred during a party. They said when the Landers man accused the other of being a sexual deviate, he replied: "At least I didn't kidnap a 3-year-old girl from her parents." On April 16, 1985, a man and two women contacted investigators to report Leville and Santangelo had disappeared. They said Leville in particular was "afraid for his life" because the Landers man knew he had reported him to authorities. They claimed Leville, who made his living selling jewelry at swap meets, also was afraid because he agreed to sell LSD for the Landers man and that somehow the deal had gone sour. They weren't sure why. Also, they recalled that the Landers resident had requested a meeting with Leville and Santangelo at one point. They were unsure whether that meeting took place. On July 12, 1985, two hikers found Leville's decomposed body buried in a dry lake bed. On Aug. 6, Santangelo's body was found in another lake bed. Both had been shot and buried under a layer of sand. Sheriff's investigators revved up their engines a little more still later in August when they heard that Public Defender Alan Spears had dropped

hints that he had information connecting the Bradbury kidnapping and the fatal shootings. According to court records, Sgt. Chick Swanlund said his wife, an investigator for the Public Defender's office, told him she had a message from Spears. The message, in part, was: "I tell Sgt. Swanlund not to drop the idea the two cases are related and they are so close." Swanlund said he was told Spears knew the Bradbury girl was alive and that her kidnapping was "related to a heavy case in Central California." The "heavy case" wasn't specified. "I don't care about those two people. They're dead and nothing I say or do will bring them back. But I'll do anything I can to get that little girl back," Spears told Swanlund's wife, according to court records. Spears denies ever claiming he knew the whereabouts of Laura Bradbury. He said sheriff's deputies embellished or concocted statements in order to get a search warrant to confiscate his home and office telephone records. "What's really cruel is that this raises the hopes and expectations of the (Bradbury) parents for no damn reason," said Spears. According to sheriff's investigators, Spears desired to discuss whatever he knew about the kidnapping and the shootings but first wanted to check with the State Bar ethics committee to assure he was not violating attorney-client confidentiality. In late September, Spears was ordered to appear before a county grand jury, which conducts its sessions in private. Other attorneys and several sheriff's investigators also were called to testify before the grand jury. None of the participants will discuss what happened during the secret sessions. However, investigators concede that Spears' phone records were of no help to them and the matter—for the time being at least—seems to have fallen by the wayside. In fact, Knadler said the entire Bradbury investigation is at a standstill. "I wish I could tell you different," he added. "But not much is happening."

Barclays awaits court OK to take over failed OC bank

Barclays Bank of California will take over the failed Valencia Bank if Orange County Superior Court approves the transfer today, said Louis Carter, superintendent of the state Banking Department.

State regulators seized the Orange County bank — which has offices in Irvine and several other cities — after it closed Friday because of bad loans and operating losses in California's first bank failure of 1986, state officials said.

Injury accident congests streets

NAVAL STATION REFUGE CLEANUP...

Congress declared the area a federal wildlife refuge in 1972 to protect a variety of endangered wildlife living there. "They (the Navy) reported it to us and we listed it as Category A (a site where evidence shows the need for corrective action)," said Smith. He said he is also waiting for the test results on 16 water samples taken from the site. When asked about the samples, Frye responded, "They took samples here?" "Officially and for all we know, no samples have been taken." The preliminary assessment report finished by the Navy in February 1985 used records, interviews with personnel and field studies to determine what hazardous materials might be present at the refuge, said Bill Venable, an environmental engineer in charge of the report. The report, which identified 25 closed disposal sites, was the first stage of a three-phase process to be completed by Navy personnel. "Of the 25, no sites were recommended for immediate cleanup," said Venable, who added that no immediate dangers were present. In the second stage, nine of the 25 sites have been recommended for further study to determine the actual presence of suspected contaminants. Five of the nine disposal sites are located on the refuge. The Navy hopes to hire a private firm by spring to collect samples and conduct that study. If any contaminants are found, the Navy will conduct a cleanup, said Venable. He said all Navy sites are being studied and that the Navy had always intended to conduct a cleanup if the site needed it. "In our study there was no evidence to verify that wildlife had been endangered. If there was an immediate problem we'd be dealing

Beach erosion also has become a problem north of the Huntington Beach Pier and further up the coast in Sunset Beach, according to officials. The worst flooding problems occurred in 1983 when thousands of tons of sand were heaped on the highway during a winter storm. The road was closed for repairs for five weeks, then flooded again only weeks after it reopened. A high tide of 6.6 feet was forecast for this morning.

'Visit' with friends puts new perspective on life

Chance encounters transformed trip to New York into learning experience

Whenever a gloomy mood of provincialism sets in, I call on "friends" met in the early 1980s. They were the important part of two trips across America by bus, truck, train, plane and hitchhiking to run in the New York City Marathon.

These "friends" live in a manuscript never published.

"I met Cecil Thurmer on a wet Tuesday in the Ranger Lounge in Laramie. He had on an engineers' cap. We quickly got into talking about railroads, being in shape and wife beating. Cecil, nicknamed "The Diesel," preferred talking about weight lifting to talking about running, but his favorite topic was wife beating.

"Nothing gets to me like a guy who'll hit his old lady. Nothin', man. I just see red."

He pressed stout, puffy arms down on the bar top, and his dark, watery

eyes began to glisten. "I just popped off a dude who was known for messin' up ladies, broke up the bastard's jaw."

After eight beers our talk started to wind down and Cecil offered me his tattered, expired Union Pacific Employees Rail Pass.

"It'll get you into any caboose west of Chicago."

I declined the offer but paid for the beers and "The Diesel" moved on. He left me and staggered through the Ranger Lounge, one arm around a big blonde, a mutton-chop of a fist in the air, urging me to "kick the crap out of 'em in that there big race."

A second "friend" was encountered in the middle of the night on a Greyhound bus headed for Omaha:

We didn't exchange a word until 3 o'clock in the morning when the bus stopped in Grand Island. She asked where I was headed. I replied New York and the marathon. Then I asked

where she was going and she jumped right in. She was a widow who lived 90 miles away in Columbus.

She said she had three daughters and a son. I asked her if her children lived near her. She replied with a strong but pleasant voice that pierced the darkness, "No, my son, he's dead, died a year after my husband. They both had cancer. My husband had bone cancer, he was 54. My son had cancer in his glands." She rubbed a thumb and forefinger over her throat. "He was only 31."

It was pitch black outside; the only noise inside was the hum of the engine. Everyone was asleep. She said her daughter's marriage dissolved right after the two deaths. I asked how she handled all that sadness.

"She said she didn't know, but that you do what you have to do and she had help from lots of friends in Columbus and she also had a faith in God and that helped.

Then she started right into me and said, "We're all told that this life will not be easy. There will be good times and bad. We are all sinners and must pay for our sins."

Two rather passing "friendships" originated at a truck stop outside Madison, Wis.

Finally I landed a ride in a broken-down '73 International, five-axle rig, traveling 'dead head' toward Chicago. The owner/driver was 22-year-old Ernie Reeves from Roundup, Mont. Married three years, he was already the father of three children with his wife at home expecting a fourth. When I looked amazed, he shouted over the engine noise. "They ain't gettin' any cheaper! First kid cost 800 bucks, now the hospital wants 1,200 bucks a kid. I want to have 'em all before the price gets any higher."

When Ernie turned south on Interstate 90, I quickly hitched a ride into Rockford, Ill., with a muscular young man in a Pinto who was drunk and still drinking. He had a large paper cup of beer between his legs and kept rubbing his arms, claiming his wife was with her ex-husband and a bunch of his buddies at a bar in East Rockford. He felt if trouble came, the two of us could handle it and she'd dig hearing about Southern California.

"Besides," he said, "she's into

jogging." I kept my backpack on my lap, diverted him into a bar near the bus terminal and at 9:00 that night grabbed my customary seat on the Greyhound into Chicago.

And finally, in the South Bronx I met a classroom of "friends."

I was drawn into Public School 50, shamelessly using my two terms as PTA president of Corona del Mar Elementary School as an entre. That allowed me to "share" with Miss Dickerson's 5th grade class.

The school smelled well-scrubbed and students appeared the same way, with a bright-eyed eagerness to learn. The staff was courteous but businesslike. After a week on the road I looked like hell, but they didn't

prejudice. I was amazed. On only a few occasions have the affluent schools of Southern California matched the discipline and dedication I encountered in the classrooms of P.S. 50. Outside it looked like Warsaw, Poland, 1948.

"How does it feel to be in the South Bronx?"

A plumb girl with wire-rimmed glasses and a sly grin taunted me with that question just as my turn in front of the class was about to end. I admitted that at first I was scared, really scared. "Your streets are different from the streets in California where I live. But after I started talking with people and not acting scared, everything seemed just fine."

Miss Dickerson glanced at her watch and I took the hint. The class had work to do.

Reading that old manuscript always offers something new to think about. These friends offer the perspective one needs when depressed over losing a tennis match, missing a business deal or dinging a new Mercedes.

Ex-Gov. Brown derides Star Wars as 'fantasy'

LOS ANGELES — President Reagan's so-called "Star Wars" defense plan is a "gilded fantasy" that can only lead to nuclear destruction, former Gov. Jerry Brown said Saturday in one of his rare public appearances since leaving office three years ago. "Security can only be a common security. We all either survive together, or we all perish together. There is no technological fix that will guarantee our safety," he said. Brown delivered the keynote address to a California Democratic Party convention which also featured forceful, partisan speeches and predictions of victory by U.S. Sen. Alan Cranston and Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley.

Governor vetoes Dems' toxics bill

SACRAMENTO — As expected, Republican Gov. George Deukmejian vetoed a Democratic toxic waste reorganization plan Saturday, sparking allegations by the state Senate's top Democrat that Deukmejian and Republicans lawmakers are "owned" by oil industry polluters. Deukmejian said in his weekly radio address Saturday that he was vetoing the reorganization plan because of the "sorry and inexcusable" actions of Assembly Democrats, whom he accused of renegeing on their promise to support an earlier draft of the plan last September.

Comet begins new trip to deep space

LOS ANGELES — Halley's comet, invisible from Earth but watched by the Pioneer Venus spacecraft, begins a new trip to the outer reaches of the solar system this weekend as it races around the sun at 122,000 mph. The most recent calculations of the famed comet's orbit showed it was to reach perihelion — its closest approach to the sun during its current trip — at 3 a.m. PST today, said Ravenel Wimberly, a computer scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena. Wimberly said the comet would be 54,575,000 miles from the sun.

Lottery makes three new millionaires

SACRAMENTO — A Pasadena woman hit the California Lottery Saturday for \$5.2 million, payable over 20 years, and two others each won \$1 million annuities. The grand prize winner at the weekly "Big Spin" was Laura Grancy, 34, who owns an antique business with her husband, Bruce. They have four children, ages 2, 4, 6 and 10. The \$1 million winners were Margaret Fancher, 33, a Santa Maria waitress, and William McLain, 27, of Rosemond, foreman for a pipeline construction company.

NATION

General Dynamics pardon hit, lauded

WASHINGTON — The Defense Department's assurance to General Dynamics Corp. that the firm will not be subject to contract suspensions for any past misconduct has prompted negative comments from a powerful congressman and words of praise from two other lawmakers. "This pardon in advance might be even more sweeping than that given to Richard Nixon 12 years ago," said Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., who chairs a House Energy and Commerce investigations subcommittee that has been looking into General Dynamics. But Sen. Christopher Dodd and Rep. Sam Gejdenson, both Connecticut Democrats, praised the Navy's decision for lifting a cloud over blue-collar workers' livelihoods.

Storm stymies communications

BOULDER, Colo. — One of the strongest geomagnetic storms since 1976 disrupted communications across much of the northern United States on Saturday, a spokesman at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said. The disruption of the Earth's normal magnetic field meant problems for satellites, radios and aircraft, but also meant a "northern lights" display much farther south than usual, a spokesman at NOAA's Space Environment Services Center said. The spokesman said the storms were linked to a series of powerful solar flares this week.

Billionaire philanthropist dies

CHICAGO — Billionaire philanthropist A.N. Pritzker, founder of one of the nation's foremost business empires including the worldwide Hyatt hotel group, died Saturday at the age of 90. He had been hospitalized since Jan. 3 and had undergone surgery for an intestinal obstruction. Death was due to "cerebral vascular occlusion," which is a type of stroke, said Andree Celovsky, a spokeswoman at Michael Reese Hospital.

30 to 40 dead in train collision

HINTON, Alberta — A passenger train collided with a freight train in the Canadian Rockies Saturday and a Via Rail spokesman said 30 to 40 people perished in the heap of twisted, burning rail cars. Medical workers said 80 people were injured, at least a dozen seriously. A spokesman for the freight line said the accident occurred on a slight curve after the freight train entered a single track from a double track. The trains collided about 75 yards from where the section of double track ended.

Pope performs India's first beatification

NEW DELHI, India — Pope John Paul II on Saturday performed the first beatification ever on Indian soil, venerating a nun and a priest for their legendary powers of healing and devotion to the destitute. The 65-year-old pontiff beatified Rev. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, a 19th century priest who established India's first native order of monks and nuns, and Sister Alphonsa, who died in 1946 after a life marked by physical disease and suffering. In Roman Catholic rites, beatification is a first step toward possible sainthood.

Mass graves found in South Yemen

ADEN, South Yemen — Two weeks after fighting ended between rival Marxist factions, authorities are digging up graves and finding other evidence that indicates both sides carried out mass killings, informed sources say. The sources, who insisted on anonymity, said the discovery of the graves in Aden is expected to shed light on the actual toll from 12 days of fighting that erupted on Jan. 13 in this Marxist Arab nation, a key Mideast ally of the Soviet Union.

U.S. Filipinos fear election aftermath

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Reactions to Philippine elections varied throughout Southern California's large Filipino community with some immigrants fearing their homeland would erupt in civil war and others seeing a communist takeover.

Philippine president Ferdinand Marcos raised the possibility Saturday that he might declare the just-held presidential election invalid before the vote count is done and serve out the remainder of his term.

Opposition candidate Corazon Aquino, a political novice in her first race for office, was leading in the government's own unofficial tally and a count by a volunteer civic organization. She called on the president to concede defeat.

Larry Guzman, 72, who served with a Filipino-American regiment in the Philippines late in World War II and knew Marcos, said an Aquino victory would be disastrous for the country.

"She and her vice-presidential candidate are known communist sympathizers," he said. "If they win, she will take over the American bases and the people will lose over 150,000 jobs. I am proud that the Philippines has a man of Mr. Marcos' quality to run the country."

Pedro Chan, acting principal of-

ficer of the Philippine Consulate, which serves an estimated 350,000 residents, downplayed election day violence, saying elections are traditionally held in "a festive atmosphere."

The Rev. Dan Calderon, a supporter of Corazon Aquino, said she couldn't have won against President Ferdinand Marcos, and he predicted a violent reaction in Manila to the election results.

"Mrs. Aquino had no more chance of winning than a lightweight boxer has of beating a heavyweight boxer, no matter the amount of sympathy for the underdog," he said.

"We have a saying in our country at election time and that is that you can only win if you have the unholy trinity on your side. This trinity is composed of the 'Three G's': Guns, Goons and Gold."

Liza Javier, director of a local Filipino youth delinquency program, said that recent immigrants from the Philippines are gravely frightened.

"The majority of new immigrants I see are very scared," she said. "They feel that violence and civil war is imminent. They are afraid that the Philippines might not even exist after the elections."

LA officers die in blast while defusing bomb

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two police bomb squad officers, one of them a world-renowned explosives expert, were killed in an explosion Saturday while attempting to defuse a pipe bomb inside a house, authorities said.

Police Chief Daryl F. Gates, who went to the North Hollywood residence after learning of the deaths, told reporters four hours after the blast that one of the victims was his longtime friend.

Detective Arleigh McCree, 46, a 21-year Police Department veteran who directed bomb squad operations during the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles, and Officer Ronald Ball, 43, a 17-year veteran, were killed when the pipe bomb exploded.

Gates said it was believed to be the first time any members of the Los Angeles Police Department's bomb squad have been killed.

"I can't remember ever having two of our bomb technicians killed before," he said. "There haven't been any in my 36 years with the department."

Gates said the incident started Saturday when officers served a search warrant at the North Hollywood home of Donnell Morse, 35, a

make-up artist for a television station. The warrant was in connection with the non-fatal shooting of a union official, he said.

Howard Smit, 74, business representative for the Make-up Artists and Hair Stylists union local, was shot once as he and several other people left a union meeting Tuesday evening in the North Hollywood area, Sgt. Charles McTaggart said.

He was taken to North Hollywood Medical Center in serious condition. McTaggart said he didn't have details on Smit's current condition, and a hospital spokeswoman said they were instructed by police not to release information on Smit.

While searching the garage, the officers found two pipe bombs in a storage cabinet and the bomb squad was called, Gates said. McCree and Ball arrived and began working to defuse one of the bombs when it exploded at about 11:30 a.m.

"Arleigh said before working on the device that they (the pipe bombs) were indeed booby trapped," Gates said, adding it was unclear whether one or both of the bombs exploded.

"We'll go through the house and try to determine if there are any more in there," Gates said.

Antitrust probe of 5 banks launched

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Antitrust investigators are examining the interest rates on money market accounts at California's five largest banks to determine if federal price fixing laws may have been violated, it was reported.

A published report said that the banks have been paying remarkably similar and relatively low rates of interest for more than two years on money market deposits.

At least four of California's five largest banks — Bank of America, Security Pacific National Bank, Wells Fargo Bank, Crocker National Bank and First Interstate Bank of California — paid identical rates nearly 90 percent of the time over the last 26 months, the newspaper said.

The interest rates were the same down to the one-hundredth of a percentage point, according to an analysis of weekly survey data provided by the Bank Rate Monitor of North Palm Beach, Fla., an industry newsletter.

The Antitrust Division of the U.S. Department of Justice said it has begun a probe to see if there is evidence that the banks may have violated federal laws against price fixing.

In addition, a member of the House Banking Committee said he would ask the committee to examine the situation with an eye to launching a formal investigation.

Although the banks either declined comment or denied any collusive or otherwise illegal activity, the published report said the rate structure appears to run counter to the federal government's intention when it authorized the accounts, beginning in December 1982.

The accounts, which have no interest rate ceiling, were intended to promote greater competition among banks — to the benefit of consumers.

"To our knowledge," said Robert K. Heady, publisher of Bank Rate Monitor, which has been surveying bank rates in major U.S. markets since money market accounts began, "no other market has demonstrated the same consistent degree of similarity in commercial bank rates on the money market deposit account as California."

Military charter that crashed loses contract with Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force on Saturday temporarily suspended its contract with Arrow Air, whose charter flight last Dec. 12 crashed in Newfoundland and killed 248 U.S. soldiers returning home for Christmas.

The suspension came after the Federal Aviation Administration announced it has discovered unapproved, foreign-supplied spare parts in 10 planes operated by the small charter airline, more than half of its fleet.

The FAA said unapproved spare parts were found in DC-8s, the same aircraft that crashed on takeoff in Newfoundland.

The FAA in effect grounded the 10 planes in question until the unapproved parts are replaced. The Air

Force went further, suspending military passenger flights indefinitely and military cargo flights through Tuesday.

The Miami-based airline has contracts with the Air Force totaling more than \$20 million.

Arrow spokesman Robin Matell said Saturday called the FAA action "totally incomprehensible because all airlines — large and small — operating outside the United States use these same parts."

The FAA had previously given us permission to use these parts, which were certified by an FAA-approved repair station in Europe," he said.

However, Matell said, the airline agreed to change the parts quickly and expects to have "all planes flying by early next week."

Matell also said that the parts in three of the DC8s already had been changed, so that those planes wouldn't be affected by the grounding. But FAA spokesman Bob Buckhorn said Saturday evening that Arrow would have to provide the government with proof of the corrections before flying them and he did not know if Arrow had done so Saturday.

"Today the U.S. Air Force curtailed Arrow Air military contract passenger flights until such time as the results of an ongoing FAA inspection are known and reviewed," the Air Force said in a statement.

The FAA said the unapproved parts were found in inspections within the last two days.

Q—I have some difficulty with lead-directing doubles. Let's assume that the opponents are playing five-card major suit opening bids. As South, what suit do you lead after partner's lead-directing double in the following auctions:

I would appreciate your help.—H.P., New Orleans, La.

A—The first example is a classic case of a Lightner double. Since you do not expect to beat a freely-bid slam on power, the double is lead-directing. It asks partner to attack with dummy's first-bid suit or, if dummy has not bid a suit naturally, with declarer's first suit.

Even though your opponents are playing a five-card major system, West's one club opening bid is natural. Therefore, you should lead a

club. Either your partner has a holding such as ace-queen over West's presumed king, or else declarer has a concealed fit for dummy's suit, your partner is void and he wants to ruff.

The second example is not lead-directing in the same sense, since the opponents have not mentioned a suit. However, here, too, partner is not expecting to beat the contract on power — the opponents must have at least 25-26 points in their combined holding unless dummy is a few points light and is banking on running a long suit.

Since partner is not expecting to take enough high-card tricks to set the contract, his double must be based on a long suit with at least one side entry. Your best bet is to lead a short suit, since that is probably where partner has length. If you have to choose between a major and a minor suit, choose the former — the fact that West did not look for a 4-4 major-suit, and that increases both his chances of having length in the minors and, conversely, partner's odds on having length in at least one of the majors.

Q—Why does the World Chess

Championship receive so much more coverage than the World Bridge Championships?—M.S., Philadelphia, Pa.

A—Bridge players are in part to blame for this. If enough wrote to the editors of their newspapers demanding coverage, they would get it.

However, there are also technical reasons for this. It is easier to cover a chess game in the press than a bridge match. The moves of one game take up very little space, whereas full coverage of a bridge match would require pages. Still, if you put pen to paper, at least the daily results would be carried.

Agencies seek to give public facts on AIDS

County's Response Program among 10 groups involved in public relations bid

A coalition of AIDS services agencies is undertaking a major educational effort aimed at reducing the spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrome and calming public hysteria associated with the incurable disease.

Dubbing themselves Southern California Cares are 10 regional AIDS service agencies, including the AIDS Response Program of Orange County and AIDS Project Los Angeles.

Armed with \$500,000 in State Department of Health Services funds, the coalition has hired Los Angeles public relations firm Hunt Marmillion Associates to mount the largest AIDS public education effort ever.

Messages attacking common myths and misunderstandings about AIDS will begin appearing on television, radio, billboards and in general circulation magazines starting this week.

The public service announcements will continue through March, which is AIDS awareness month, said John Mortimer, Southern California Cares

director.

The campaign, whose theme is "AIDS — Fight the Fear With the Facts," will attempt to explode misconceptions held by many about how AIDS is transmitted and tell people how one can avoid contracting the disease, Mortimer said.

In doing so, the coalition hopes to raise the awareness of those in high-risk groups who have not been reached through small, regional organizations and, at the same time, lower anxiety among the general population, many of whom harbor unwarranted fears about "catching" AIDS through casual contact, he said.

"AIDS is a disease, and, like most others, can be curbed through the widest possible dissemination of the facts about transmission of the disease," Mortimer said.

At the same time, "irrational and harmful fear has been built up around the AIDS problem. Again, the best way to curb these fears is by reaching the greatest number of Southern Californians with accurate, up-to-date information about AIDS risks and myths," he said.

AIDS is believed caused by a virus

called HTLV-III, which can be transmitted principally through certain sexual acts and the sharing of infected needles.

AIDS attacks the immune system, weakening its victims and making them susceptible to cancers, pneumonia and a host of other illnesses. There is no vaccine nor any cure.

By the end of 1985, 1,769 cases of AIDS had been diagnosed in Southern California. Of that number, 757 people have died, according to Southern California Cares statistics.

Most AIDS victims are homosexual men, but the disease also has struck in the larger heterosexual community.

Unfounded fears that AIDS can be transmitted through casual contact like a handshake, a kiss or through food preparation by someone who is infected have resulted in unnecessary anxiety for many, as well as increased discrimination against homosexuals, Mortimer said.

Educating the public about the hows and whys of AIDS will go a long way toward prevention and help keep battle lines from forming between "straight" and "gay" communities, he said.

"AIDS has the potential to be really divisive of people in our society and there's no reason for it," Mortimer said.

OC's commercial airliner traffic increased by 30%

The number of commercial jets using Orange County's John Wayne Airport increased by 30 percent in 1985. As a result, 456,835 more passengers hopped flights at the busy facility last year than in 1984, a summary of 1985 flight activity shows.

Increases in both the number of regulated and non-regulated commercial flights are responsible for the boost in available airline seats and the passengers to fill them.

County supervisors, who oversee airport operations, approved an average of 14 more commercial flights per day last April 1 over the 41 average daily departures (ADDs) permitted in 1984.

One airline also gained extra flights for itself by putting ultra-quiet jets into operation at John Wayne. Pacific

Southwest Airlines' BAe-146 jets are specially designed to operate below the decibel level at which noise regulation measures are required. Under airport noise rules, quiet jets qualify for additional flights over the 55 ADD limit.

A total of 38,144 commercial takeoffs and landings were recorded in 1985 compared to 29,299 in 1984, airport statistics show. More than 3.28 million passengers passed through airport gates last year, a 16 percent increase over 1984's 2.82 million passenger total, however, that is still 1.47 million fewer passengers than the 4.75 million a year that will be permitted from 1986 through 1990.

Despite the success of commercial operations, short-haul commuter airlines did not fare well in 1985.

Commuter takeoffs and landings decreased 42 percent from 21,847 to 12,699.

But general aviation experienced a healthy 8.9 percent increase in flights over the same period. Total takeoffs and landings of private planes increased from 435,261 to 473,858.

The county made strides in 1985 toward improving airport facilities. County supervisors in December settled a lawsuit with Newport Beach and two citizens' groups over airport noise and growth that clears the way for expansion.

An expanded terminal and 8,400 more parking spaces are in the cards under a \$190 million construction project now on the drawing board. When complete, perhaps as early as 1990, 8.4 million air travelers will be able to fly out of Orange County.

Fertilizer, sewer water cited for pollution of bay

A report released by a Newport Beach physician this week says Newport Bay's murky brown discoloration is being caused by a number of sources, including liquid fertilizer from wholesale nurseries and reclaimed sewer water discharged by the Irvine Ranch Water District.

The study, completed by internist Dr. John F. Skinner, estimates that six tons of nitrates flow daily into the Upper Newport Bay Wildlife Reserve, causing extensive growth of plankton and algae in the water.

The nitrates serve as vitamins for the algae and sea lettuce, making them grow and thicken the water with brownish murk.

So, said Skinner, the Orange Coast is actually feeding the problem.

Joanne Schneider, an environmental specialist for the state Regional Water Quality Control Board, stressed that although nitrate levels in the bay pose a problem, they are not a threat to public safety or wildlife in the reserve.

"Things are in motion to take care of the problem," Schneider said.

Three wholesale nurseries operating in the foothills northeast of Irvine were blamed in the study for causing fertilizer to drain into Upper Newport Bay.

The three are Hines Wholesale Nurseries, El Modeno Gardens and Bordier's Nursery, Skinner said.

Agricultural runoff and reclaimed sewer water discharged by the Irvine Ranch Water District were also cited as causes of increased nitrate levels.

Newport Beach residents have noted marked growth in algae around docks in Newport Bay, and the browning of the water over the years has made even the lower parts of the bay unpleasant for swimming, Skinner said.

"I stopped swimming in the bay 10 years ago because I could only see two feet in front of me," Skinner said.

Skinner, an active participant in bay pollution studies, said he based his report on determinations and figures from the county Environmental Management Agency.

Resister's house arrest 'not an easy sentence'

Confined to grandmother's house for 6 months for refusing to register for draft

WHITTIER — Prison inmates would consider six months at home an easy stretch, but draft resister David Wayne says it's harder than it sounds.

"It's not an easy sentence," said Wayne, 25, who hasn't been allowed beyond the yard around his grandmother's yellow stucco house in east Los Angeles County since Sept. 10. "The psychological aspect is the most difficult; the idea of being a prisoner

in my own home."

Wayne's six-month house arrest was imposed by U.S. District Judge Terry Hatter after he was convicted of refusing to register with the Selective Service. The draft ended in 1972, but President Carter reimposed registration in 1980 after Soviet troops entered Afghanistan. No one has been called to serve, however.

Wayne, a former Yale University philosophy student, had faced up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

"I expected to get some kind of prison term," said Wayne, sitting in a patio chair by a backyard swimming pool.

He requested a sentence of community service, but Hatter instead prohibited this.

"He felt community service was what I enjoyed doing and what I asked to do for my sentence, so he punished me," said Wayne, who was a teacher's aide at a school for developmentally disabled adults when he was sentenced.

"I didn't know whether to feel relieved because I wasn't going to prison or to feel dread about this highly unusual sentence. It was something I hadn't thought about,"

Wayne said.

The tall, sandy-haired Wayne says he rises at 6 a.m., writes in his journal, and does housework before reading for five to six hours each day.

"There are restaurants I miss. I miss Pasadena (where he was raised and worked) and going to the movies and taking walks. I miss the people I worked with," said Wayne. A federal probation officer visits him once a week and also telephones to make sure he stays home.

Wayne lives in the house 15 miles east of Los Angeles with his wife, Jacqui Holt, and his grandmother, a stroke victim under the care of two nurses. He and his wife, who works at a nearby vitamin store, plan to take a

trip once his sentence ends March 9.

Wayne continues to work with the National Resistance Committee, an anti-draft group in San Francisco, and the Selective Service Law Panel in Los Angeles.

"I talk to people about my experience," he said. He also writes articles but says he "wouldn't do anything to call a great deal of attention to myself."

Wayne said he decided to resist draft registration after receiving a warning letter from the government in the summer of 1980.

"I felt registration would lead to the draft and another Vietnam-type war," said Wayne. He sent letters to the White House and the Selective Service calling attention to his action.

"I wanted to take responsibility for my decision by making a public statement rather than avoid the threat of prosecution," he said.

When he was indicted, he fought the charge, arguing that prosecutors targeted him because of his vocal opposition. In November 1982, Hatter ruled the government violated his free-speech rights by prosecuting only visible resisters. But the ruling was reversed on appeal, and in March 1985 the Supreme Court concurred. Wayne then pleaded guilty to one count of refusing to register.

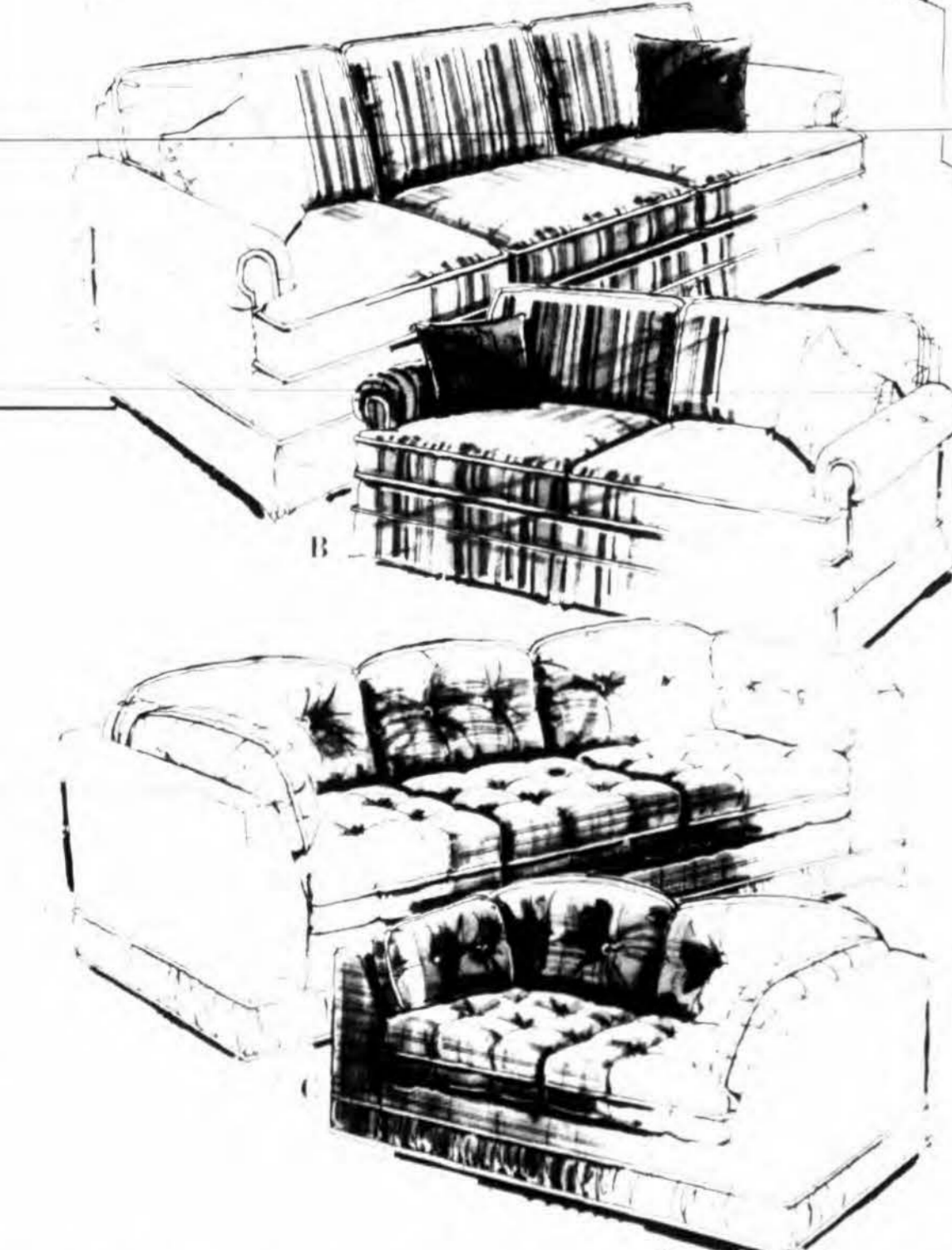
Wayne, noting that he knows many quiet, unprosecuted draft resisters, said: "I think non-registration has had an effect, but not as encompassing an effect as I had imagined. We probably slowed down the return to the draft, but didn't wipe it out."

He said he'll continue anti-draft activities and "look for a job where I can help people" after his sentence is completed.

"I'll continue to speak out for peace and against the draft and follow my principles," Wayne said. "Refusing to register has been a major influence in my life. It's put me through a lot of experiences I would never have had. It's made me a stronger person."

Furs and jewels will stay beautiful with proper care

Two popular gift getting and giving items during the recent holidays were furs and jewelry. Both need care to keep them at their best and to assure their lasting beauty.

If you want to take good care of your jewelry, a good place to start is in the kitchen.

In that room you will find products suitable for good home care, according to Kathleen Hefferan of Macy Jeweler.

Plastic sandwich bags are great to use to protect your rings.

"When you take them off place them in the plastic bags and put them away. I certainly would not leave them out in the little jewelry boxes. If there is a burglary, the jewelry box is a dead giveaway and easy for a thief to scoop up," Hefferan said.

"The best way to clean diamond rings is a mixture of household



amonia or a cleaner like Mr. Clean mixed with water — one part amonia to three parts water."

The pieces should soak for about 30 minutes then be lifted out and tapped gently around the back and front of the mounting with an old soft tooth brush. Swish once more in the solution and then drain the pieces on tissue paper.

The at-home cleaning can eliminate the smudges the diamonds

pick up from lotions, powders, soaps and natural skin oils.

"All of your rings, especially the ones you wear everyday, periodically need for a good professional cleaning — steam and ultra-sound," Hefferan added.

"Emeralds and opals should never be cleaned with ultra-sound," said Hefferan. But, they love salad oil or baby oil. "You can use an oiled cotton swab to clean them or soak them in it a few hours. It lubricates them."

Pearls on the other hand respond to soap and water cleaning to remove cosmetics, hair sprays and perfume. "Plain soap, like Ivory, not detergents," explained Hefferan. "No chemicals on pearls. It harms the skins. After washing, dry with a soft cloth."

Soap and water cleaning is also recommended for jade and lapis

pieces. Gold chains also respond to a Mr. Clean solution, according to Hefferan. After dipping in the solution, they can be placed on a paper towel and brushed with a soft brush, then rinsed and dried with more toweling. They should be placed on a stand or knobs to prevent scratching and tangling.

Proper care will assure the lasting qualities of your jewelry. If you have questions about a particular piece or stone (there are so many different types of colored gemstones and combination of stones), your jeweler is your best source of information.

While jewelry may love being stored in plastic, furs do not. "I assume that a woman who has a fur has a dust-free, clean closet and not even a garment (fabric) bag is necessary. Hang it in the closet where

nothing will touch it," said Chuck Erwin, manager of the fur salon at Neiman-Marcus.

"Before placing the fur on a wide, long neck hanger, you should always give the coat a shake. Hold it inside at the armholes where it is reinforced and give it a good shaking. It fluffs up the fur.

"Always turn the collar up when you put the coat away. The weight of the collar can flatten the fur on the shoulders.

"Also, when you take the coat out to wear, give it another good shaking.

"You've been in rain or snow? Not to worry. Shake the coat and put it on the hanger where the air can circulate around it. Never use heat on fur. If the skin is soaked, you would need a furrier's attention. But, who is going to stand around in a fur coat and get soaking wet?"

"No at-home spot removing...if you get something spilled on a coat, especially something sweet...take it to a furrier immediately. Insects are attracted by spills on coats and they love sweets," said Irwin.

"Rips also need immediate attention. They can get worse."

Irwin advises women to spray on perfume before they put on the fur and if they love scarves... "Wear one... it will keep makeup off the fur and lessen the number of cleaning times."

"A good fur should last 25 years or maybe longer if you take care of it. One of the best investments is storage. The cold storage retards aging and protects the fur from theft and insects. We charge \$40... that's a good investment to protect a \$10,000 or up investment. And while the coat is in storage, the furrier can check for any needed repairs."

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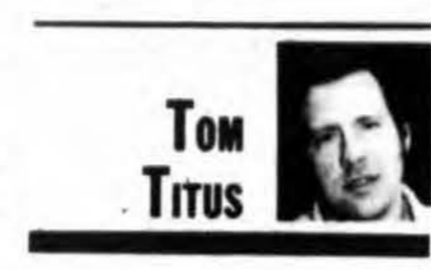

Bid to help Angola secure freedom baffles Africans

U.S. opposition to Marxism ought to be self-evident

The headline in the International Herald Tribune is, "African Leaders Are Baffled by Reagan's Embrace of Savimbi." There is a great deal going on in Africa that ought to baffle African leaders, including genocide, starvation and neo-colonialism.

But no, they elect to be baffled by Mr. Reagan's public decision to help Savimbi, a freedom fighter in Angola who already dominates one-third of Angolan territory and is determined to dominate the whole country, upon which he is publicly committed to two objectives. The first is the ouster of 40,000 Cuban soldiers who have maintained the Marxist dictatorship in Angola since 1975, and who transmit to the reigning junta instructions from Moscow. The second is to hold democratic elections.

Nine African leaders were summoned to a meeting in Harare, Zimbabwe. It was there that they expressed their dismay over Savimbi's meeting Reagan. One would think they could profitably have used their time by expressing their dismay over Zimbabwe. It is there that, in the name of freedom and equality, the government of Robert Mugabe was established. As recently as last November, Prime Minister Mugabe announced his devotion to a one-party state in Zimbabwe, the entire collectivity oriented to Marxist ideals.

African leaders have had some experience with African states oriented toward Marxist ideals. Most recently in Ethiopia, which required a worldwide conscription of rock singers to prevent universal starvation.

They do, however, have a great deal to teach the United States about the utter fatuity of declarations by most Third World leaders when talking about U.S. policy — or, for that matter, when talking about a great many matters.

It is difficult to think of a single president of the United States who did not at least once in his term enunciate U.S. goals of aiding those who sought to resist colonization by the Soviet Union. We began with the theory of containment: The Soviet Union's frontiers cannot be extended. Well, directly and indirectly, they have been extended: in Southeast Asia, in the Caribbean, in Africa, and in Afghanistan. We did more merely than to help to provision those who resisted that imperialism. We ourselves fought in Korea, and achieved a stalemate. And we fought in Vietnam, and lost.

But the African leaders are not bemoaning American inconstancy in Indochina. They appear to be saying that our willingness to help Angolans achieve the freedom from colonialism that they achieved from Portugal, only to lose it to Castro, is evidence of American hypocrisy. We do well to ask why it was that Portuguese dominion over Angola was resented, not so Soviet-Cuban dominion over Angola. But here we run into, yet again, the greatest paradox of the post-war years: the relative immunity of the Soviet Union from criticism for its barbarities, combined with the relentless criticism of the United States for its endless efforts, however clumsy, to help the people of the world protect themselves against the black plague made in Moscow, whose fruit is intrigue, tyranny, torture and starvation.

Really, those are what they used to call fighting words. The states of Angola, Botswana, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, Swaziland, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe, all but one of them one-party states (though Zimbabwe has not quite yet achieved despotism, though through no fault of its leader), don't have a great deal to teach the United States about the search for peace, justice and equality.

Nursing homes cleaned up deficiencies prior to review

U.S. agency cited them based on list that was outdated

WASHINGTON — As fairly constant critics of the federal bureaucracy's manifest shortcomings, we're pleased to be able to report that sometimes the system works — even though officials at the top may not have been aware that it was working.

Last month we reported that Health and Human Services investigators had compiled a list of 44 nursing homes across the country with "chronic substandard conditions." When we asked the enforcement chief of the federal agency that supervises Medicare-funded nursing homes about the faulty 44, he told us: "We're waiting to see that list. We're going to chase them all down."

Possibly inspired by our interest in the subject, the oversight agency, the Health Care Financing Administration, instituted a "priority review" of the 44 nursing homes, which had been fingered by HHS Inspector General Richard Kusserow.

The results of the expedited review were, frankly, astonishing. An enforcement official told our reporters Tony Capaccio and Jenny Cunningham that in 40 of the cases, the operators cited or the nursing homes' new owners had already cleared up the deficiencies that had put them on

Footnote: The four other nursing homes on the IG's list had been terminated from the Medicare program — before the list was compiled. All but one have since been reinstated.

The following are the California nursing homes included in the Dec. 13, 1985 report compiled by the Health and Human Services Inspector General (entitled "Long Term Care Facilities Failing Critical Conditions of Participation for Two Consecutive Surveys"), which are now considered "in compliance."

Alpha Convalescent Hospital, Oakland; Royal Home, El Cajon; St. Therese Convalescent Hospital, Hayward; Edgemoor Geriatric Hospital, Santee; Linda Mar Convalescent Hospital, Pacifica; Brommer Manor, Santa Cruz; Terrace Gardens Convalescent Center, Paramount; Valley Convalescent Hospital, Bakersfield.

Of the remaining homes, Great Lakes Continuing Care Center in Detroit, Mich., has been permanently terminated from the Medicare program.

Termination notices are pending against the Moroun Nursing Home in Detroit and the Retirement and Nursing Center, Corpus Christi, Texas.

The Arkansas Health Care Center, Hot Springs, will undergo a direct, on-site federal inspection.

Resents movies' blatant nudity

WASHINGTON — Let's come right to the point: Naked women bug me.

I can't go to a movie theater or rent a movie for my VCR without some woman ripping off her clothes. When I was on the wrong side of 18 this might have seemed a delightful prospect, but it turns out to be an oppressive reality, this plague of cinematic nudity.

Some people may think my complaint is priggish. Believe me, it isn't. A prig is someone who pretends to be above common temptations. All those people who say they find pornography "boring" — they are the real prigs. I, like most people, am subject to those temptations. I find appeals to my prurient interests all too appealing. That's why I resent them.

There are several matters at stake here. The principal one is morality. But there are others that get less attention: Decency, for instance. The distinction between morality and decency is too often overlooked. Decency involves only appearances, but it serves as a sort of moor around morality. Some things — vile words, loose talk — may be indecent without being strictly immoral, but the moralist should be on guard against them. Nude pictures, even when not pruriently appealing, are usually among them.

Then there is the matter of aesthetics. Nudity in movies, far from being "necessary to the development of the story," is nearly always a distraction from the story, unless perhaps the story centers around a nudist colony. The moment a character disrobes, you become aware of him or her (usually her, of course) less as a character than as an actual human being.

I recently saw an old film in which Ann-Margret peeled for a bedroom scene. My immediate reaction was something like: "So that's what Ann-Margret looks like with her clothes off." It wasn't thinking about the actress, her probable feelings, her husband, the cameraman, that sort of thing. The aesthetic dimension was disrupted: Reality had intruded on realism.

Consider a hypothetical analogy. The script calls for a character to be killed. During the filming the actor playing the character is, accidentally, killed indeed, in such a way that there is no mistaking it. (Cut in half by a propeller, say.) The director, regretting the incident, nevertheless decides to leave the scene in the movie, thereby heightening the verisimilitude.

What would be the result? The audience would be horrified. It would completely forget the story, and concentrate on the real human being.

Come to think of it, the same applies to naked male actors. Though I do not — repeat, not — find naked men tempting, the aesthetic point applies. When I see Jeremy Irons' backside, say, in "Brideshead Revisited," I cease thinking of the character he is playing and start musing about how a man would feel exposing his rump to the millions.

But, as I say, the naked woman is the exception. The naked woman is the rule. And since, in real life, men disrobe at least as often as women, the prevalence of naked women on the screen has to be chalked up to motives other than realistic representation. True realism would also show unattractive people in the raw more often than young, nubile, well-shaped people.

Ask yourself a simple question: Has any serious critic ever objected to a movie on grounds that it contained too little nudity? Or for that matter, can you think of any great film — "Grand Illusion" or "Gone With the Wind" or "The Third Man" — that would have been improved had the major characters appeared without their clothes?

I doubt it. The actual result of showing a nude human being is to throw our attention out of balance. Strictly aesthetic and dramatic interest is upstaged by other kinds of interest, of which the prurient is only one. Even an ugly naked body, without physical attraction, has the same baneful effect on the viewer.

Still, the main reason for all this nudity is simple prurience. And it's remarkable how little this is admitted, or criticized. Especially considering how the nudity is justified in the name of candor. For real candor, give me Dr. Samuel Johnson, whom James Boswell quotes as telling the great actor David Garrick, "I'll come no more behind your scenes, David, for the silk stockings and white bosoms of your actresses excite my amorous propensities."

Bird, Webb shine

Celtic wins 3-point shootout; 5-7 Hawk takes slam-dunk title

DALLAS (AP) — It was a day for dunkers, bombers and old-timers. "The fun is not playing, it's reliving the old lies we tell each other," Hall of Famer Bob Cousy said after Saturday's NBA old-timers' game.

But Larry Bird and Spud Webb won't be telling lies 20 years from now. The stories they have to tell will be good enough without embellishment.

The 5-7 Webb won the third annual Slam-Dunk title with three perfect scores, including both of his slams in the final round against defending champion Dominique Wilkins.

"The crowd helped me get more power into my jumps," said Webb, the shortest player in the NBA. "I can't describe it, it's just something I can do."

"I'm the king of the three-point shooters," Bird said after winning the NBA's first long-distance shootout. "I always thought I was and I proved it."

The Saturday events, originally designed as a prelude to the All-Star game today (Channel 2, 10:30 a.m.), is turning into a major event in its own right.

Commissioner David Stern said a scalper outside soldout Reunion Arena offered him a \$5 ticket for \$20 Saturday morning.

"I hope that's a sign of the health of the NBA," he said.

Webb and Wilkins, teammates on the Atlanta Hawks, easily reached the final round over two other semifinalists, Terence Stansbury of Indiana and Gerald Wilkins of New York. In the first round, Stansbury and Gerald Wilkins, Dominique's brother, both dunked over chairs set up on the floor.

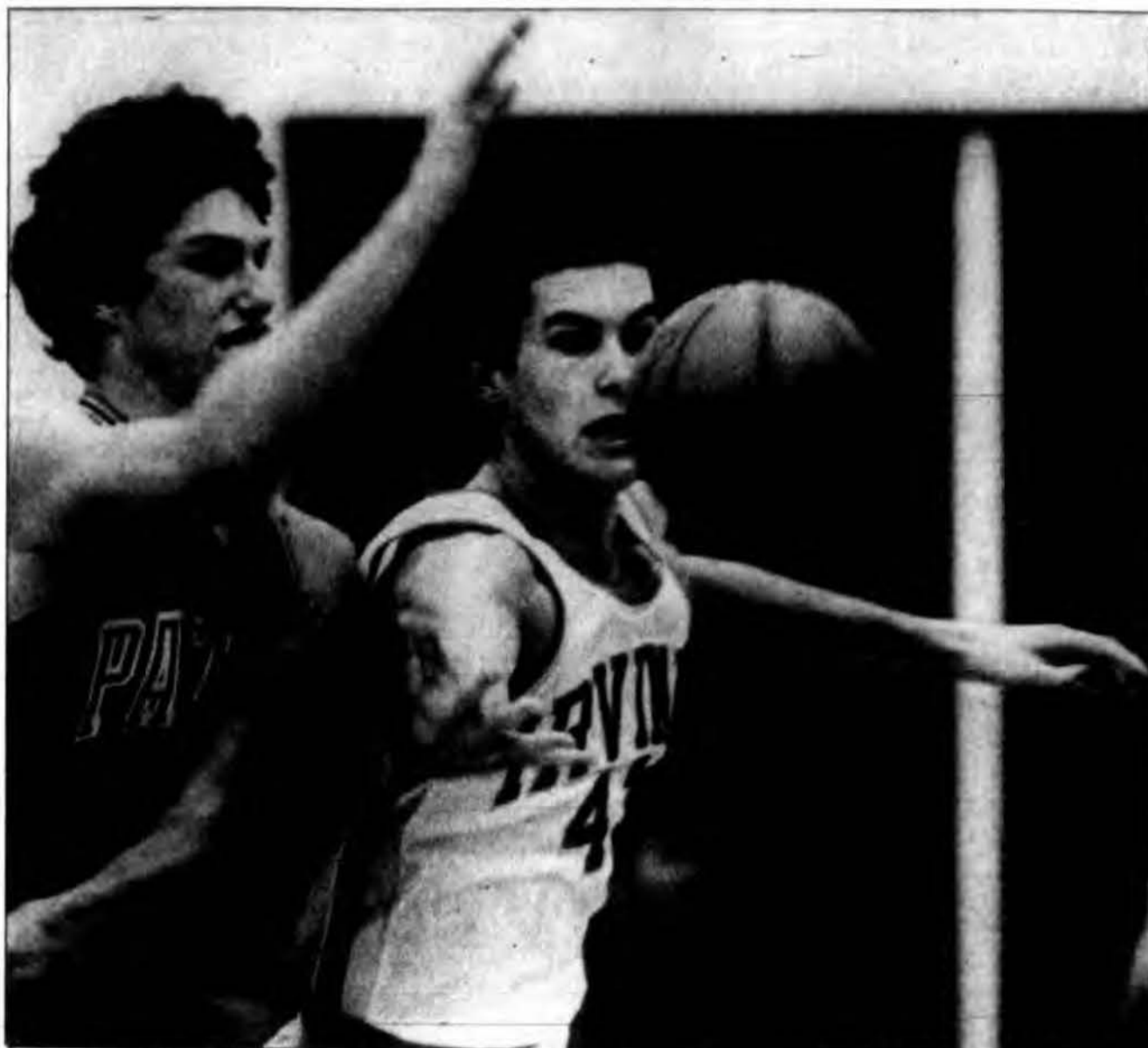
In the finals, Webb had the crowd waving '10' signs when he turned 360 degrees and dunked the ball with one hand. The five judges agreed, but Wilkins responded with a 50-point 360-degree dunk of his own.

On the second dunk of the finals Webb bounced the ball off the floor and the backboard before dunking, again with one hand.

That gave the Dallas native another 50 and he was the winner when Wilkins got 48 points with a double-pump slam.

Bird put on a dazzling display of pressure shooting by hitting 18 of 25 three-point shots in one minute in the finals against Craig Hodges of Milwaukee. Bird had 22 points because he made four shots with balls that counted two points.

You can bet, however, the sentiment wasn't shared by any of the University of Pacific Tigers, who probably would have preferred a punch in the chops rather than the shot Brooks hit them with to run the Anteaters' mastery over UOP to the lucky number of 13 straight wins.

"It was just luck," said Brooks in jest of his three-point shot that arched so high it nearly brought rain to Crawford Hall and tears to the Tigers in UCI's 80-76 PCAA basketball win in front of 1,341 fans.

"Actually it wasn't luck," said the 5-10 guard. "It felt good to me all the way," he added after hitting the game-winner with 33 seconds left on the game clock and only five seconds showing on the shot clock.

"I don't want to say anything about Pacific because I don't want to start anything," Brooks said with a smile.

"All I want to say is I really wanted to go there but they didn't offer me a scholarship."

Mesa's Kravette, partner take junior pairs dance event

UNIONDALE, N.Y. (AP) — Debi Thomas triple-jumped her way over the rainbow and into the history books Saturday at the National Figure Skating Championships.

Thomas, 18, of San Jose landed all five of her triples in the freestyle program to become the first black American seniors champion.

Earlier Saturday, Ron Kravette of Costa Mesa and Colette Huber of Los Angeles combined to win the junior dance.

Brian Boitano of Sunnyvale successfully defended his men's title, leading all the way and punctuating the victory with a fine freestyle routine that featured a triple axel, the only one completed in these championships.

Thomas skated with verve and, as she left the ice after her routine, pumped her arms in the air in a victory salute.

"This is like the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow," said the exuberant Thomas, a freshman at Stanford University. "But it's at the end of a bumpy road instead."

"Oh, I can't believe it!"

Thomas should believe it. She led throughout the competition here to culminate a sensational year in which she went from runner-up at the 1985 Nationals to victories at the National Sports Festival and two international meets.

Thomas said she "guessed it's a big accomplishment" to be the first skater of her race to win such a prestigious title.

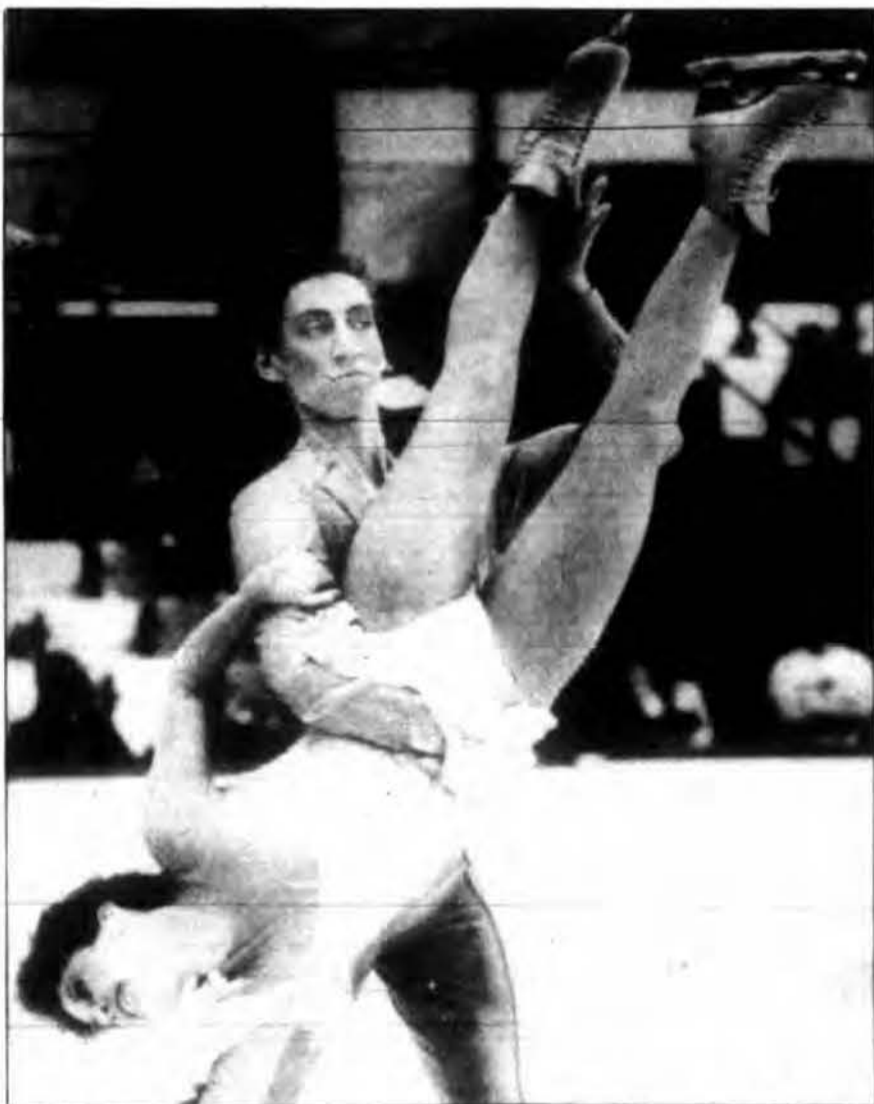
"It's sort of a coincidence," she added. "I never thought of that too much. I was just trying to be the national champion."

Following her scintillating freestyle routine, Thomas had to watch Caryn Kadavy complete her program. Kadavy, skating next, landed three triple jumps but missed one and was not nearly as spectacular as Thomas.

Thomas, who also won the compulsory figures and was second to Kadavy in the short program, had 2.4 placement factors, while Kadavy, of Colorado Springs, Colo., had 4.2.

Defending champion Tiffany Chin, making her first appearance in competition since finishing third in the 1985 World Championships, was third. Chin had been sidelined with a muscle imbalance and admitted earlier this week she was not in top shape.

Her freestyle program was conservative and she ended up with 5.4 factor placements.

Olson regains pole vault mark

Dixon sets record; Ashford comeback a winner in 55m

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Billy Olson regained the world indoor best in the pole vault Saturday night, clearing 19-5½ in the U.S. Olympic Invitational Track and Field meet at the Meadowlands Arena.

Olson's effort, the seventh time this season that the world best has been broken, beat the mark of 19-5 set earlier Saturday by Sergey Bubka of the Soviet Union in Moscow. It was the fourth time this season that Olson had set a world indoor best.

Evelyn Ashford made a triumphant return to track competition winning the women's 55-meter dash, and Diane Dixon smashed her American record in the women's 400.

The victory by Ashford, the 1984 Olympic 100-meter champion and 400-meter relay gold medalist, was highly popular with the crowd of 12,914.

So was the swift race run by the 21-year-old Dixon, who led all the way in winning in 52.13 seconds, well under the mark of 52.20 she had run Feb. 22, 1985 at New York.

Ireland's Marcus O'Sullivan, who

had ended countryman Eamonn Coghlan's 15-race winning streak in the mile last month at Los Angeles, beat him convincingly again.

It was the third straight loss for Coghlan, the so-called "Chairman of the Boards." Last week at Dallas, he was beaten at two miles by Doug Padilla.

Coghlan, still showing the effects of an intestinal virus that has slowed him throughout the year, finished fourth, behind O'Sullivan, Abdi Bile of Somalia and American Olympian Jim Spivey.

O'Sullivan was timed in 3:57.33, with Bile clocked in 3:58.23, Spivey in 4:01.26 and Coghlan in 4:01.52. American record holder Steve Scott was fifth in 4:02.99.

Ashford had not competed since Aug. 31, 1984, taking time off to prepare for the birth of her first child. A daughter, Raina, was born last May.

The men's 55 meters, won by Ben Johnson of Canada, was run without Olympic quadruple gold medalist Carl Lewis, who pulled out when he discovered he would have to run in a qualifying heat.

Immediately after her victory, Ashford took her daughter from the hands of her husband, Ray Washington, and carried the child around the track in a victory lap.

Men's, women's tournaments wash-outs

Rain postpones Sarasota, Torrey Pines golf events

SAN DIEGO — Steady rains washed out Saturday's play and reduced the Andy Williams Open to a three-round golf tournament.

"It will be a 54-hole tournament, with the full purse paid and a winner on Sunday (today)," tournament chairman John Brophy said.

Consideration was given to extending the tournament through Monday, but officials decided that "the world doesn't care on Monday," Brophy said.

The full \$450,000 purse will be distributed, including \$81,000 to the winner, Brophy said, even

though the sponsors are required to pay only three-quarters of the purse when the tournament is cut to three rounds.

Brophy said the rainout was "the first day we've lost to rain in the 35 years the tournament has been played in San Diego."

It also marked the second consecutive week that weather problems had disrupted the schedule for a PGA Tour event. Only 54 holes were played in the storm-plagued tournament in Pebble Beach last week.

"It's awful frustrating to come out ready to play, and then not get to play," said Larry Mize, who holds a one-shot lead going into today's final round.

"It's too bad. I wanted to play. And I wanted to play 72 holes. But I guess it's nice to have a one-shot lead with one round to go," Mize said.

Mize completed 36 holes with a 134 total. 10

shots under par. Bob Tway and Danny Edwards were a stroke behind at 135.

SARASOTA, Fla. — The third round of the LPGA's Sarasota Classic was suspended because of heavy rain Saturday.

Play on the par 72, 6,124-yard Bent Tree Country Club course was halted at 10:30 a.m. and tournament officials announced three hours later that the round would resume this morning.

Golfers who already were on the course will begin play where they left off Saturday.

The final round, originally scheduled for today, was pushed back to Monday. The winner will earn \$30,000.

Defending champion Patty Sheehan, who shot a 69 Friday for a 36-hole total of 7-under-par 137, held a one stroke over Stephanie Farwig after two rounds.

UCI doubles up on USC, 9-7

LOS ANGELES — Doug Kline's 2-RBI double, his second double of the day, led the UC Irvine Anteaters to a four-run ninth inning and a 9-7 non-conference college baseball win over USC Saturday at Dedeaux Field.

The Anteaters entered the top of the ninth down, 7-5, but Gene Roumimper sacrificed Ed Clark home to pull UCI within one, 7-6.

Kline blasted the double off James Wayne, a freshman Trojan from Fountain Valley High, to score Tom Baine and Mike Faye with two outs. Kline went to third on Devan Shockley's single, and scored on the error charged to the

Trojans' first baseman when Wayne tried to pick Shockley off first.

Doug Linton retired USC in order in the bottom of the ninth, striking out the last two batters.

Linton earned the win; his first this season, as the Anteaters improved to 3-1. Linton struck out three batters in 2½ innings. The Trojans dropped to 3-2 after pounding UCI a day earlier, 8-2.

Four Anteaters — Mark Webster, Clark, Baine and Kline — collected two hits apiece.

Meanwhile, the game between Redlands and Southern California College was postponed because of wet grounds.

Tark talks about walking away from Runnin' Rebels

LAS VEGAS — Jerry Tarkanian pulled a Frisbee-sized wheat wafer from a drawer, took a few bites and washed it down with a glass of water. It didn't look much better than the towels he often chews during close games.

"My fibers," he explained. "I try to eat a lot of fibers."

A stint at the famous La Costa health spa near San Diego during the off-season has transformed Tarkanian into a health freak. He looks 10 years younger since eschewing spicy Armenian dishes for wheat wafers, bean curd and an exercise bicycle.

But even as he celebrates his 25th season as a college basketball coach, Tarkanian talks about leaving a game that has consumed his life since 1956, when he made his debut as head coach of San Joaquin Memorial High School.

"I'm getting very tired and very old," said the 55-year-old coach of the University of Nevada-Las Vegas team. "I don't know, but I don't figure I'll last too much longer."

"It's tough having coached this long because you can't remain calm. I don't know how to remain calm during a game," he said. "I think a team reflects a coach's personality and I'm a very intense coach. I want my guys intense before a game, just like I am."

Friends say they can't imagine basketball without Tark, whose .814 winning percentage on the major college level (428-98) is the highest among active coaches.

Yet he feels his battles with the NCAA have left him scarred in the eyes of the public and have overshadowed a career in which his teams have won at least 20 games every year but one since he took over at Long Beach State 18 years ago.

"I'll be bitter my whole life," Tarkanian said. "I can never make up what they did to me."

The NCAA tried to suspend Tarkanian for alleged violations in the UNLV basketball program during the mid-1970s. But following a two-week trial in 1984, a district judge ordered the NCAA to drop any action against Tarkanian and later ordered both the school and the NCAA to pay most of his attorneys' fees.

Tarkanian would rather talk about the surprise of having a 23-2 team, ranked No. 9 in the nation despite the lack of a decent big man and the loss of three starters from last year's squad. The Runnin' Rebels have a chance to win 30 games even before the conference and NCAA tournament.

Yachts start race to Manzanillo

SAN DIEGO — Twenty-nine crack ocean racing yachts got off to a soggy, breezy start in lumpy seas Sunday in the sixth biennial 1,100-mile San Diego to Manzanillo, Mexico race.

The start was in a brisk 18-20 knot southeasterly breeze that had crews riding the weather rails as they boiled across the starting line surrounded by a mass of spectator boats which also braved the inclement weather which included frequent rain squalls.

Leading the fleet at the leeward end were the Santa Cruz-70 Kathmandu and the Santa Cruz-50 Upbeat, but Kathmandu soon forged into a substantial lead as the yachts headed toward the U.S.-Mexican border on a tight reach.

Kathmandu, skippered by John Landon of the host club is one of the favorites for first to finish.

It was a short race for the Islander-40, Silberrad, skippered by Jim Brown of San Diego as the mast came crashing down less than a mile from the start. No one was injured, but the crew worked for more than an hour to cut away the rigging and haul the mast and sail back aboard.

Orange County entries in the race are Ms Blu, skippered by Harry Thomason, Balboa YC; Nalu, Peter Grant, Newport Harbor YC; Toboggan, Paul Querel, Voyagers YC, and Tomahawk, John Arens, Balboa YC.

With fair winds the fleet is expected to finish at the Las Hadas Hotel in Manzanillo in about six days.

San Jose also led 33-24 at halftime, but Long Beach pulled even at 45-45 with 6:50 remaining in the game on a Wiley free throw.

Fresno State 61, Cal State Fullerton 54: In Titan Gym, Brian Salone had 21 points and Jos Kuipers scored 20, and each pulled down seven rebounds to pace Fresno State.

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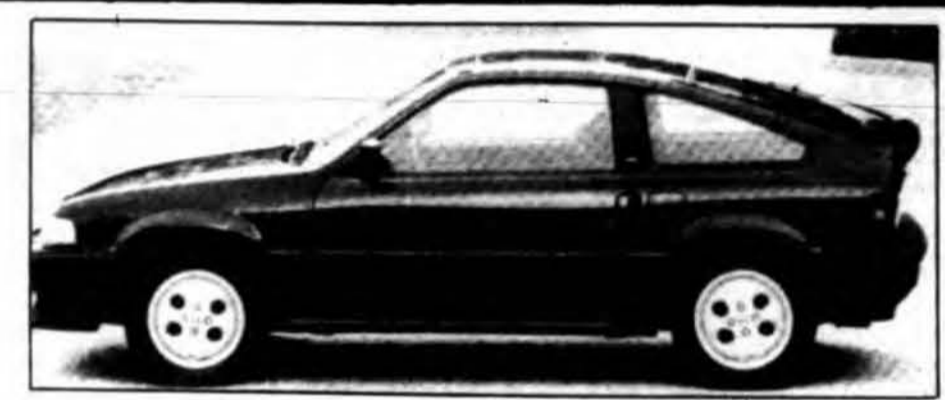

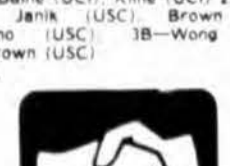

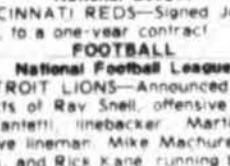

Banker enjoys best of 2 worlds

CHICAGO (AP) — When C. Paul Johnson isn't minding one of his Chicago banks or looking for new ones to buy, he might be enjoying the solitude of a horseback ride on his llama ranch in Wyoming.

Or, this year, he might be on the high plains of the Andes Mountains in Peru, "watching Halley's comet with the ancient astronomers."

Johnson, 54, considers himself an innovative entrepreneur. He wears the hats of a big-city banker, country rancher, pilot and amateur astronaut.

Several times a year the former Air Force fighter pilot flies his twin-engine Cessna from Chicago to Wyoming, allowing him to enjoy what he says is the best of both worlds: the culture of the city and the solitude of the wilderness.

But most of Johnson's time is spent in Chicago building what he hopes will be a \$1 billion banking chain.

Johnson is chairman and chief executive officer of First Colonial Bankshares, a holding company that acquired its fifth bank two days after Christmas, pushing total assets up to

more than \$600 million. Johnson had marked what he called a milestone earlier in the month when the price of his corporation's stock reached \$18, twice the price of a year earlier, when it was first issued.

His initial issue sold out in two hours at a time when the Midwest banking industry was in disfavor with Wall Street because of the near-collapse of Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Co. He also did it with an innovative type of stock, one that carries low voting rights but pays higher dividends.

He issued the stock to finance the purchase of his fourth bank, the \$181 million Michigan Avenue National Bank, in a deal he closed from a pay phone on the Hopi Indian Reservation in Wyoming.

His first bank, Colonial National, a north side institution in the midst of Chicago's ethnic neighborhoods, had \$65 million in assets when he bought it from its founder in 1972. Today it has \$279 million in assets.

Johnson, a graduate of Howe Military Academy and an Air Force fighter pilot in 1953-56, got into commercial banking in 1967.

With a degree in finance from Michigan State University, he was working as an investment banker in Milwaukee and helped arrange the purchase of Milwaukee Western. The buyer liked his work so much, he asked Johnson to sign on as a director and senior vice president.

With that introduction to banking, Johnson bought Colonial National with help from the founder, who was retiring.

'Producer beware' trend proves costly

Company obligations are legal nightmare if products misbehave

NEW YORK — When consumers start complaining that they are being hurt by products designed to help, producers may be faced with a tough decision — fight the charges or give up the product.

The decision is especially difficult when the manufacturer is convinced the product is reliable but finds the cost of waging a defense too high, such as when G.D. Searle & Co. decided to stop U.S. sales of its two IUD models.

Searle had been the last major producer of intrauterine devices in the United States when it withdrew its CU-7 and TATUM-T models from the market because of the unavailability of insurance and the high cost of defending against lawsuits that claimed the birth control devices caused infertility or infection.

"It was not a simple decision, but it was very clear cut," said Mark Brand, a spokesman for Searle.

Legal expenses, even in cases in which a company successfully defended itself, were wiping out profits. The defense tab totaled \$1.5 million in four recent trials in which Searle, a unit of Monsanto Co., paid no damages. There are 305 cases pending.

Sales of the IUDs totaled \$11 million in the United States last year.

"We are a pharmaceutical company, we're not in the business of trying lawsuits," Brand said.

Analysts say the pressures that led Searle to abandon a government-approved product are part of a sweeping change in attitude about the rights of consumers.

In the business world, where taking investment risks on new products and technology has been the key to growth, this change of sentiment is a cause of concern. Among some con-

sumer groups, it is a reason for rejoicing.

"We have seen a major shift in the last century from a 'buyer beware' attitude to a 'producer beware' attitude. Some people would say such a shift has been excessive," said Kenneth Goodpaster, an associate professor at Harvard Business School and a specialist in corporate ethics.

It is possible, he said, that a fear of lawsuits and the related rise in the cost of insurance protection from product liability challenges have removed beneficial drugs and consumer products from society.

There was a shortage of whooping cough vaccine in the United States in 1984 and 1985 because a leading producer temporarily halted sales rather than pay sharply higher premiums for insurance against lawsuits.

Parents of children who had died or suffered brain damage after being vaccinated claimed important information was withheld from them about the risks and the relative safety of the drug's use compared with a competing product.

Drug companies and medical experts said the risk of death or serious injury from not being immunized far outweighed the risk of a serious reaction to the vaccine.

The American Academy of Pediatrics said last year that whooping cough cases had nearly doubled over the past three years, apparently because many parents refused to have their children vaccinated because of fears of side effects.

Bank makes \$2 billion goof

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, which transfers funds for most of the banks in the West, made a \$2 billion blunder during a high-speed computer test.

"It was a snafu that shouldn't have occurred, and it's embarrassing," said Ron Supinski, a spokesman at the

bank. The error occurred January 21 when the bank accidentally transferred \$2 billion worth of funds to 19 financial institutions while testing its computers, according to a report in Friday's San Francisco Chronicle.

The bank refused to identify the institutions.

A mistake by bank employees caused the error, said Richard Griffith, the Federal Reserve Bank's chief operating officer.

He said the workers had been testing the computer during a three-day weekend, using 1,000 transactions that the bank already had recorded the previous Friday.

However, the software experts forgot to erase the test program from the computer's memory, Griffith said, and the orders to transfer the funds were resent the next Tuesday. Officials found the error within hours and corrected it, he said.

Seventeen of the 19 institutions canceled the erroneous transfer the same day. However, two waited a day before notifying the Federal Reserve bank that they had fixed the mistake.

Griffith said none of the banks or savings and loans made a profit from the mistake. He said the transactions weren't posted in the institutions' accounts at the reserve bank, making it impossible for them to receive interest.

The disease claimed thousands of lives each year as recently as the 1930s, before mass vaccination programs were launched.

Experts agree that in cases where there is no doubt that a product is harmful it either should be removed from the market or redesigned. It is cases where there are legitimate disputes about the safety of a product or its design that wind up in court.

Consumers received a potent weapon 25 years ago when courts began holding that producers not only would be liable for damages caused by negligence, but when it was determined that an injury could have been avoided if a different design was used.

William McCormick, the chairman of Fireman's Fund Insurance Cos., says he believes the courts have

gone too far. He is trying to rally public support for changing a legal system that he contends keeps life-saving drugs off the market and adds to the cost of products, services and government.

"The tort system today has more million-dollar winners than a state lottery," McCormick said in a recent speech.

"When you purchase a stepladder, for example, one-fifth of the price tag goes to cover the manufacturer's liability protection. The product liability component of a GM car now costs more than the steel that goes into it," he said.

Michael Pretl, senior partner in the Baltimore law firm of Pretl & Schultheis, which specializes in IUD litigation, said that too often, companies are not forthcoming about dis-

closing negative side effects of medical products.

He maintains that when lawyers bring problems to light, consumers first learn of the links between the use of a product and a medical problem.

Companies and doctors, he said, have been reluctant to work with lawyers on determining what disclosures should be made about the risks associated with health care products. "Companies are suspicious of defense lawyers," he said.

Joan Claybrook, president of Public Citizen, a consumer affairs group founded by Ralph Nader, is a vocal proponent for taking businesses to court over product liability claims.

"Juries set the ethical standards for the rest of society," she said. Defects or poor designs in products regulated by the Consumer Product

Safety Commission result in about 30,000 deaths each year, she said. Product design or production practices, she said, also may be related to the 10,000 deaths in the workplace and 45,000 deaths on the highways.

Claybrook said manufacturers should inform the public of any risks associated with their products, and should recall a product when they know its design or construction will cause injury, when they discover a design error that poses a clear possibility of injury or when consumer complaints point to a dangerous problem.

To provide "incentives" for speedy product recalls, she would make producers liable to criminal penalties, such as jail terms, for refusing to remove their products and would allow unrestricted punitive damages to victims.

Claybrook denies such a stance would add to the cost of goods and services. "Prevention is the cheapest system of all," she said.

There has been no standard response by manufacturers in such cases.

Noel Capon, an associate professor at Columbia Business School, singled out for praise the response by Johnson & Johnson to the 1982 cyanide poisoning deaths of seven Chicago area residents who had taken Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules.

Before it was even clear that the company had nothing to do with the poisonings, Johnson & Johnson was pulling its top pain-relief product from the shelves nationwide and working on new safety packaging.

"Johnson & Johnson very much came out a winner," Capon said. "It re-established itself in the mind of consumers as a company that really cared."

Beginners need guided tour through mortgage market

The latest entries in arena are 15-year, 'yuppie' mortgages

NEW YORK — Choosing the right home mortgage these days can be just about as complicated as choosing the right house.

Several years ago, mortgages with adjustable interest rates joined the conventional fixed-rate loan as a common means of financing the purchase of a dwelling.

Since then, there have been a couple of prominent new entrants:

• Fixed-rate mortgages that call for repayment over 15 years, rather than the standard 30.

• Loans, sometimes called "yuppie mortgages," on which payments are made every two weeks, rather than once a month.

And, as always, the interest rates and other terms available

on any given type of mortgage may vary widely from lending institution to lending institution.

Each type of financing has its advocates. The fixed-rate loan provides a measure of certainty for the future, and the hope that the burden of paying it off will get lighter as the years pass and your income increases.

Some borrowers with variable-rate mortgages have had a special reason to enjoy the decline of interest rates in the past few years: lowered payment amounts.

The 15-year and "yuppie" mortgages are touted as a means of paying off your obligation more quickly, and thus saving substantially on the total interest you pay.

"Most important, you'll own your own home free and clear 15 years sooner," proclaims one bank that recently added a 15-year loan to its mortgage offerings.

Financial advisers with no particular axe to grind say the choice

generally comes down to your own personal financial situation and preferences.

Obviously, first-time buyers squeezing their savings dry to purchase a house may well lean toward the proposition with the lowest available monthly payment.

By the same token, a middle-aged couple with a sizeable income might opt for a mortgage with a fast repayment schedule so that it will be over and done with by the time they plan to retire.

Whatever your situation, experts in personal finance say, you should not forget in your comparison-shopping that mortgage interest on a personal residence is fully deductible on your federal tax return. The government, in effect, pays part of that cost for you.

For that reason, any calculations of net interest savings afforded by a given mortgage deal should be done on an after-tax basis.

Shop around before picking broker to buy or sell a home

Knowledgeable client will find that many things are negotiable

WASHINGTON — Home selling or buying is a major but infrequent undertaking for most families, so using a professional broker can help. But before choosing one, shop for the best deal you can get.

Brokers can smooth the way for buyers and sellers thanks to their knowledge of the market and procedures. But while they all may seem to have the same fees and contract provisions, many things are negotiable for a knowledgeable, and insistent, customer.

The Federal Trade Commission advises interviewing many brokers before selecting one to sell a home. Discuss terms and fees to make sure you understand what will be done, your rights and obligations, and get it all in writing.

The commission studies sales and advertising practices and has developed some brief booklets on real estate dealing. Copies of "Real Estate Brokers" and "Escrow Accounts for Home Mortgages" can be obtained, at no charge, by writing the Federal Trade Commission, Room 130, 6th St. and Pennsylvania Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C., 20580.

The commission points out that one of the most important services provided by a broker is listing a home in the area Multiple Listing Service, a usually computerized system by which all area real estate dealers will be made aware of the home, its price

and description.

Some brokers may use this means only, however, and wait to see if a buyer turns up. So, it can be important to ask what other methods they will use to sell the home, such as newspaper advertising and open houses.

Ask the potential brokers to estimate the price of your home, based on comparable sales in similar neighborhoods, and be wary of any who differs sharply from the others.

Some may state a high initial price to get you to list with them,

and then wait for you to come down when the house doesn't sell. Others may list a low price to sell quickly; less work for them, less money for the seller.

And it is important to discuss the commission. Rates may seem to be standard within a community, but they are not set by law. Ask if the broker will accept less to get the listing, say 5 percent instead of 6 percent.

In many cases, the broker doesn't get the full commission anyway. For example, if a second broker finds a buyer through the multiple listing, they split the commission.

So, ask if your broker will accept a lower commission in the event he sells the home without a

second broker and thus gets the whole amount. All of 5 percent is better than half of 6 percent.

Others may be willing to accept less if they have to provide fewer services, such as less newspaper ads or open houses.

It also may be a good idea to encourage the broker to try to sell the house by offering a reduced commission if the sale is not made during a set time period, 90 days for example.

Whatever provisions are agreed on, make sure they are written into the sales contract.

That contract must state starting and ending dates. Brokers will seek the longest sales contract they can get, for the seller shorter terms may be better. This will give the home seller the chance to renew if satisfied with the effort being made, or to switch to another broker.

Also, there is more than one type of contract. In most cases, brokers want an "exclusive right to sell" contract, meaning they get the commission no matter who sells the house.

An "exclusive agency contract," however, may be better for the home seller. In that type of deal, the broker gets the commission if he or another broker makes the sale, but not if the homeowner finds a buyer himself.

Home buyers also need to give some thought to the brokers they deal with and to keep in mind that — generally — the broker is working for the seller.

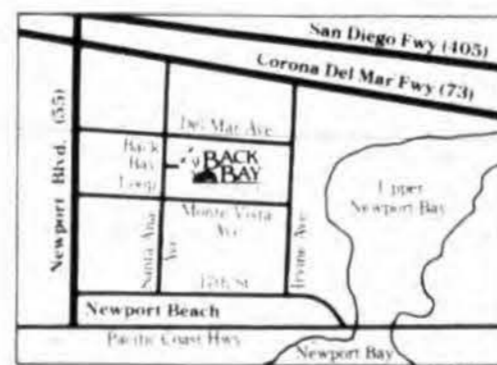
Representing the seller, means they are obligated to try and get the highest possible price for the house.

So, the trade commission says, be cautious about what you tell brokers.

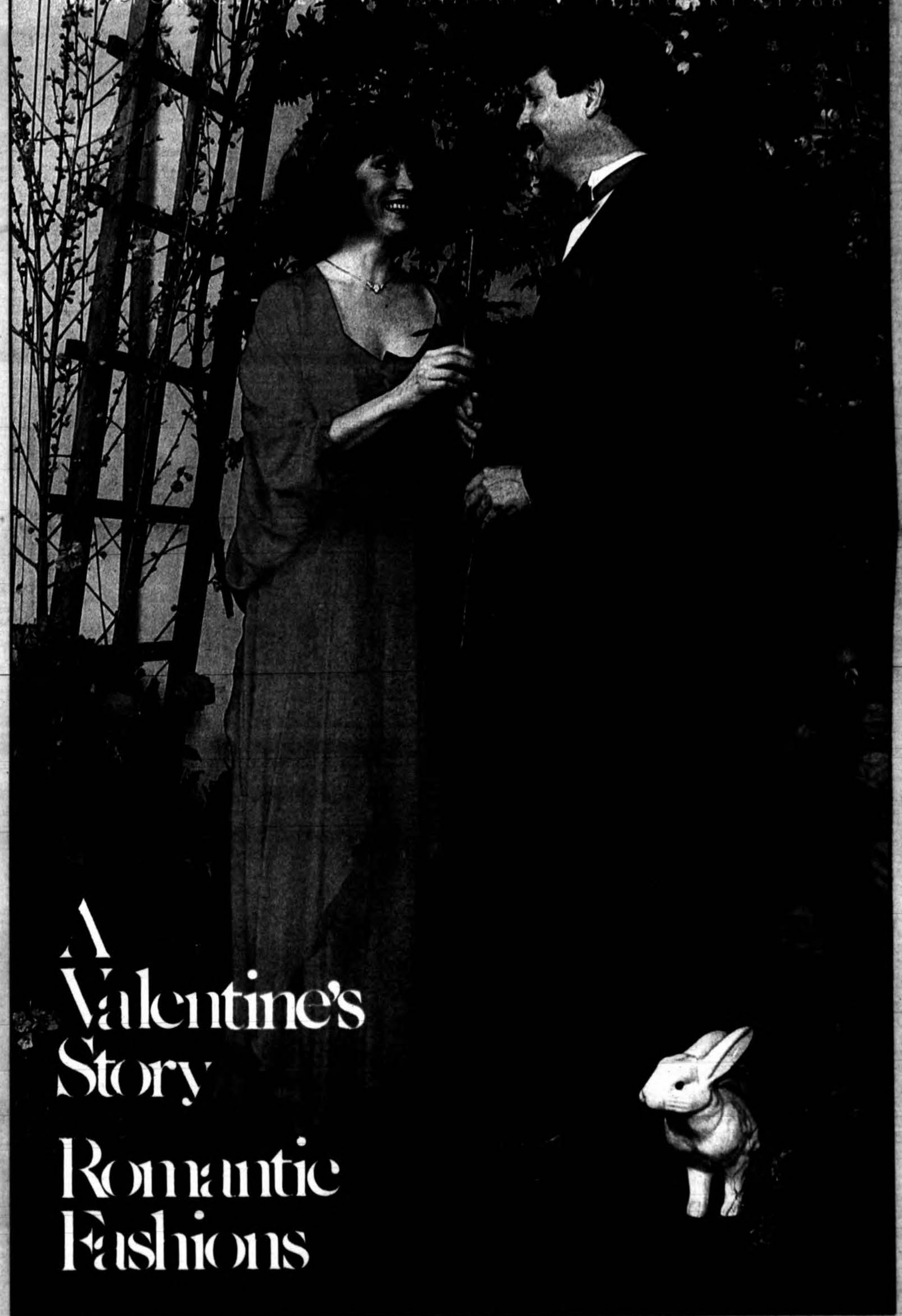

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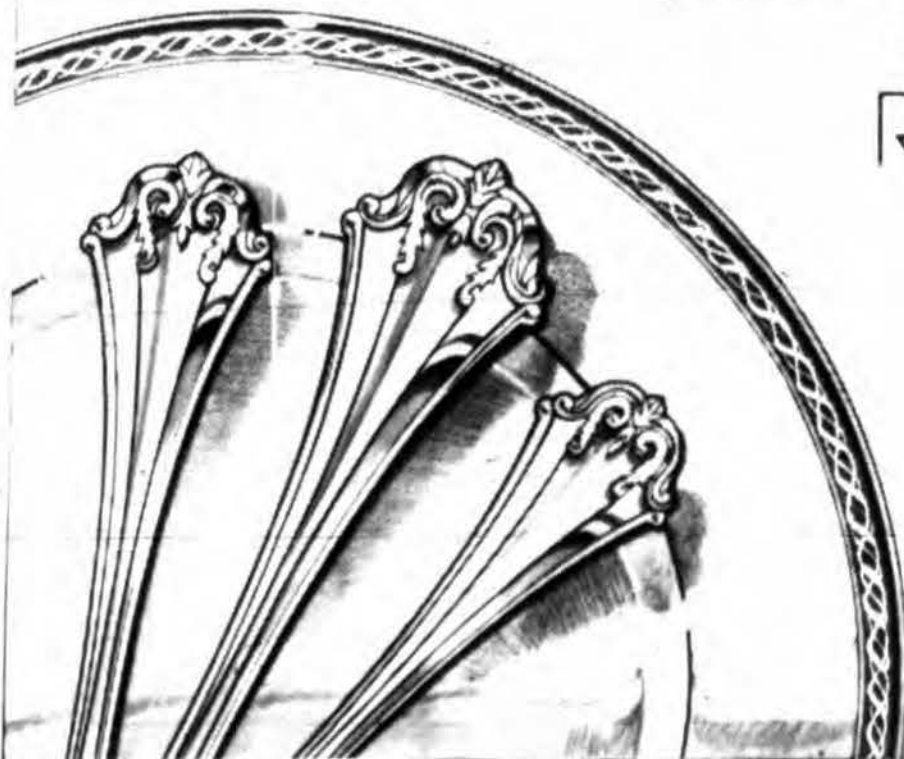

I have 15 benefit shows planned for spring involving all Fashion Island stores."

One of the shows is the March 13 Gentleman's Hoberdashery to benefit the Sisters of Sacred Heart. "I'll use 60 volunteer male models, all VIPs, who actually pay a fee to model. It's always great fun. They've changed the date, so I'll have to do two shows that day...but I'll pull it off."

"I always get involved in the fittings and selection of each stores' fashion," explained Leslie. "I do my own lineups and prefer a fast-paced show. Although I'm commentator at the productions, I rarely use notes...it's all in my head."

The native Californian and UCLA alumna, who really wanted to be a fashion editor, began her career journey at Bullocks Wilshire when she was 16. "They thought I was 18. I started as a stock girl but one day the advertising office needed a model for an ad and I happened to be there. I filled in

and immediately fell in love with advertising."

Taking a break only to have her five children (Mary Catherine, Cindy, Nancy, Melinda and son Chip), Leslie spent the next 20 years pursuing her passion. She was a free-lance copywriter producing catalogs for major California retailers and says she worked with some of the best ad people in the business. She coordinated fashion shows and special events and planned the opening festivities for both the May Co. and Bullock's in Costa Mesa.

Prior to her association with the Irvine Company, Leslie was fashion director for Neiman Marcus, which she says is like dying and going to merchandise heaven.

"The store is filled with such beautiful things. It was fabulous working with live designers like Oscar de la Renta, Bill Blass and Bob Mackie."

For herself, Leslie prefers tailored coordinates, loves pants and flat shoes. Sitting in her "temporary" Fashion Island office, she appeared laid-back and casual.

Although known for her wit, she says she uses humor to soften the shock of her straight-forward personality. "I'm a ham," she said, "but more uptight than people

"In my job I have to be able to turn on a dime and save situations. I had a real moment of horror when I planned the World's Largest Office Party last summer. planned on an attendance of 2,500 but 5,000 people showed up. We went everywhere buying more beer!

"I still laugh when I think of a fur and lingerie show I did not too long ago. I often use my husband's pickup to transport the clothes to an event. Although I usually bag all the merchandise, this time I just

hung all the furs on a rod across the back of the truck. As I was leaving the show I swung out of the parking lot and dumped every fur. The street and parking lot was a mass of furs, they flew everywhere. I was hysterical and, of course, they all had to be checked for tire marks!"

And how does this busy lady relax? "I read a book about every two days and I love to garden. I hate to sit and since my husband is a yacht broker, we spend a lot of time on the water. Our home base is a townhouse in Irvine, but we also have a place on Balboa Island that we enjoy. My husband is a wonderful cook and we entertain often."

Kitty and Hal, her husband of 35 years, have discovered traveling. Soon to venture through Canada by train, they have also been to Europe three times, sailed the Mediterranean and glided through France in a hot air balloon.

High on my list of priorities is visiting my five grandchildren. I want to include them in some of our travels," said the proud grandmother.

Leslie insists, "The worst thing about being a fashion director for so long is that I can't get away with wearing blue jeans to the supermarket."

"This women's group is being formed because a lot of women are doers and the Trauma Society needed a few pushers. We also hope to eventually have a men's and a teen-age support group."

Membership applications will be sent to everyone who was invited to the reception.

Socializing and trying Hans Prager's Ritz hors d'oeuvres were the order of the event, which also had its serious side.

Dr. John West, founder of the society and author of a new book on trauma, and Phil Northcote, society president, explained the purpose of the organization founded in 1981.

It is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the prevention of accidental injuries and deaths.

"Trauma is the leading cause of death and disability among Orange Countians between the ages of one and 42," said West. "Trauma cost the nation billions of dollars."

The estimate is that 70 percent of all trauma could be averted by the introduction of various prevention programs. Thus, the programs on teen-age drinking and driving, automobile safety for children and a "protect our kids" from drownings.

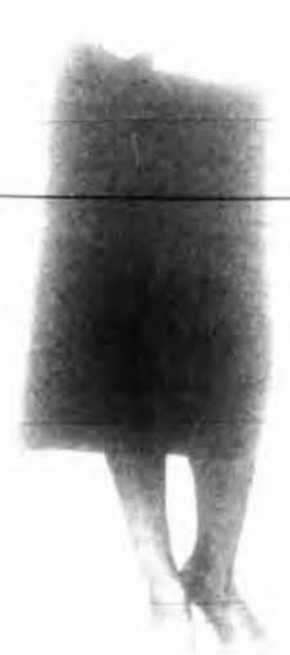

filled with family, charity activities and tennis. The Newport Harbor Museum was very important to me. I was involved in the opening... from painting the walls to helping with exhibits."

When Wilson's children

eventually became more independent, she began to think of continuing her original goal of becoming a psychologist.

"My mother had started Nelly's in 1965 at a cozy adobe store in San Juan Capistrano. It was called Nelly's of Puerto Vallarta. When Mother decided to sell the business, I realized how interested I had become in it. I jumped in as
