A. Close friends, though they live far apart. They correspond frequently between his California home and her Switzerland home. In fact, Ross even suggested to

USA WEEKEND through her publicist that Jackson might like to be godfather to her son, Ross Arne Naess, born Oct. 7. (Jackson hadn't accepted the honor before publication.) Ross is Jackson's fairy godmother. She discovered Michael and his brothers; their first album was 1969's *Diana Ross Presents the Jackson 5*. On Tuesday, Jackson starts a USA tour in Kansas City. And he'll be honored March 10 in New York at a dinner given by the United Negro College Fund; he gave Ross a personal invite.

A. Join the crowd. Actor Larry Drake is winning everyone everywhere for his portrayal of Benny, the L.A. Law office buff. And Thursday, he receives the highest acting nomination from the Association of American Attorneys.

Benny began as a pop-culture character. He was born in the late '60s and became TV's first coming-of-age character. Benny's early years were spent in L.A. Law's early days.

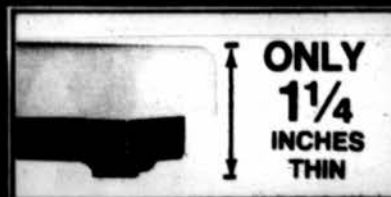

2 days to do it all

How many waking hours do we relax on the weekend? An average of only 9, our new poll shows.

This poll on weekends was based on interviews with 805 randomly selected adults. Margin of error: Plus or minus 3.5 percentage points.

It's Saturday. And Vickie Kurtz, who sells cosmetics during the week, is on her hands and knees, scrubbing a bathroom in her Harrah, Okla., home.

Kurtz, 31, has two bathrooms, one kitchen floor and four children to go: "I've got four sets of nails to clip and four heads of hair to wash to get them ready for church on Sunday."

Don't tell Kurtz that weekends are for winding down.

A new USA WEEKEND poll shows it ain't necessarily so — especially for women, baby boomers and parents.

According to the poll:

► Nearly four out of 10 of us say our weekends are busy; only slightly more say they're relaxing. It's a mixed bag for the rest.

► Women are busier and more frazzled than men. And parents are most likely to call weekends hectic.

► Six out of 10 are thinking about the weekend by Thursday; four out of 10 on Wednesday or

one quick date, see two long movies or play 18 holes of golf. Phew.

Scores of chores

What are we doing with the remaining 40-some hours between Friday night and Sunday night?

Getting callouses, for one thing. *Someone's* weekends may be made for Michelob, but nearly half of us say they're made mostly or partly for work.

Want proof? Just peek into a supermarket or your neighbor's garage some Saturday.

Nearly six out of 10 of us — including 80 percent of two-income couples — save chores like cleaning, yard work and grocery shopping for the weekend because we've run out of time during the week.

Indeed, about one-third of working people do their weekly shopping on Saturday, says *Progressive Grocer* magazine. No other day comes close.

And we divide weekend chores in traditional male/female ways: 35 percent of women do laundry, while just 9 percent of men say they do. Men are more likely than women to work in the yard; women march down the supermarket aisles more than men.

In fact, a recent *Working Mothers* magazine reader survey shows more than half of their 2,343 respondents do all the weekend laundry, cooking, bill-paying and ironing — without any help from husband or kids.

These mothers say they get just three hours to themselves each weekend. Not surprisingly, more than half feel disappointed or exhausted when Monday comes around.

Our poll shows 55 percent of us "don't mind being so busy," while 43 percent would "rather be less busy"; the rest aren't sure. Men like the busy weekends more than women do.

Skip the maid

But what if you could pay someone to do the drudgery? Would you?

Most would not. Those who say they would pay someone to do their chores value their weekend work at an average of \$38.73.

Bank employee Elaine Pompey, 39, of Whittier, Calif., would just as soon run her own vacuum cleaner, thank you. She says it's a welcome break from collecting late loan payments.

"I work long hours all week with a lot of overtime, so on my weekends I try to do absolutely nothing — except, of course, the

before. Singles daydream of the weekend earlier than married couples.

► When the weekend's over, we feel good about what we've accomplished: three out of 4 are satisfied.

The weekend may be a busy time, but at least it's our time, says psychologist John Neulinger, who studies leisure time for a living.

After a week handcuffed to a job, even a supermarket trip can seem liberating: "You can make all those meaningful choices among the toothpastes."

Yep, it seems we like our over-stuffed weekends — even though we relax an average of just nine hours. Four out of 10 working people relax only five hours or less — just enough time to have



housework. But housework is relaxing to me. I just turn on the radio and go."

Theodore Leggens, 42, of Sax-onburg, Pa., gets the same good feeling from his building projects. The medical supply salesman is putting the finishing touches on a new kitchen. Next up: he'll start a deck.

"When you do something like this, you can look at the finished product and feel a real sense of accomplishment," Leggens says. "I don't get that from my job."

The reason people enjoy weekend work is that it's *not their job* — it's something they choose to do, says psychologist Neulinger of the Leisure Institute in Dolgeville, N.Y.

"Puttering around can be very relaxing."

"The important thing," he says, "is the perceived freedom."

Together time

OK, so we may enjoy our chores, but the most important part of the weekend is spending time with family and friends. That's no surprise to travel experts, who say the largest proportion of weekend trips are visits to family and friends.

But those who fill their weekends with tasks may lose sight of the people in their lives, says Jane Vogan, a Rochester, N.Y., therapist. "People get very compulsive about everything that must get done. Working women do especially. They think if they can get everything cleaned and cooked and shopped for, they'll feel less irresponsible."

The family of such a weekend wonder might happily give up a few clean socks for a little more attention.

Says Vogan: "If it feels to you that every minute of your weekend is as busy as your work day, maybe you should take a hard look at what you're doing."

College student and single mom Jo-Anna Blanding, 32, of Lompoc, Calif., tries to find time during the weekend for both herself and her two children.

For herself, she takes what she calls an "un-weekend" break: "Saturdays from like 7 p.m. to midnight is mine. I'm locked in a room with a six-pack of Sprite and a bag of Ruffles potato chips." On her last un-weekend, she watched a tape of *Little Shop of Horrors* five times.

When she comes out of hiding, the former nurse plays games with daughter Jamie, 9, and son Justin, 5. Cleaning isn't a priority: "As long as my kids can walk through the house and nothing grabs them from underneath the newspapers, I figure I'm doing OK."

Play days

Is anyone else out there having fun? You bet. Nearly half — 47 percent — say weekends are mostly for play.

Pamela Steavenson, 65, of Tyler, Texas, could give lessons in weekend fun. Any Saturday or Sunday may find her backpacking in Arkansas, shopping in Dallas, putting on a Greek feast for her friends or acting in a civic theater production. "I don't sit around very much," says Steavenson, a widow who manages a high school cafeteria.

Michael Burns, a 30-year-old electrician from Colorado Springs, Colo., is a little more laid back. He starts his Saturday by letting out his mutt Bud, picking up the sports section and tuning his stereo to a classic rock station — preferably

playing a Rolling Stones song.

Then, "I just see what happens." In the summer, he and his friends may get together for some softball and beer. In the winter, it's tubing in the Colorado snow or watching a Denver Broncos game at a local tavern.

Engineer George Olcott, 53, of Las Vegas, starts his Saturdays with a long list of chores. But by

late afternoon, he's putting on his blue jeans and bolo tie for an evening of country and Western dancing with wife Beverlie, 49.

"It's the highlight of our weekend," he says.

Ah, Saturday night!

Olcott has lots of company: Saturday night is the most popular part of the weekend — especially for people 18-24 — followed by Sunday afternoon.

No wonder. It's the one evening even couch potatoes grow legs and get out of the house:

► Movie theaters do 50-to-80 percent of business on weekends,

depending on the season. Saturday is the busiest night.

► Saturday is the week's lightest TV viewing night; 45 percent of households turn off their sets, says NBC's Gerald Jaffe. Viewership is 10 percent below Sunday and Monday peaks.

And almost nobody likes Sunday night: it's dead last among all age groups, favored by less than 4 percent.

Therapist Vogan says people don't like Sunday night because it's so close to Monday morning: "On Monday, you have to go back and give yourself to the job," she says. "The weekend is about your life."

The racket over squash: It's fast, fun and friendly

A court game with Senate appeal, it really keeps this congressman on the run

There's only one thing Rhode Island Sen. John H. Chafee enjoys more than victory on the Senate floor: Defeating Oregon Sen. Bob Packwood on the squash court in their 4:45 p.m. match on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

After each face-off, Chafee gives the results to his secretary to be fed into a computerized standing. He says "the results are of no interest to anyone but me and Packwood, but we play for pride."

"I'm an enthusiastic and passionate squash player," adds Chafee. "I do it because it combines intense competition in a relatively short time with superb exercise that involves coordination, stamina and every muscle of the body. It's just darn good fun."

When the 65-year-old senator closes the door to the tiny, 18½-by-32-foot squash court, he is primed for a test of physical and mental stamina.

"What you learn from it is total concentration and determination. While I'm on the court, if my mind wanders to the events of the day, I'm through. It's also terribly important to work just as hard when you're ahead as when you're behind. You can't let up."

Chafee, who picked up the game while at Harvard Law School in 1947, says, "I don't think lessons are important. I learned it through playing. I've had only three lessons in my life."

Squash has many benefits, says Chafee.

fee. "I play not just for the exercise but also for a break, to get away even for an hour from my Senate schedule, which often begins at 7 a.m. and continues into the evening hours."

Chafee is a fixture among Congress' squash-playing coterie. Others include Pennsylvania Sen. Arlen Specter, Michigan Sen. Carl Levin and his brother, Michigan Rep. Sander Levin. The swatting politicians have become good friends, Chafee says.

"I'll drive 30 miles for a 45-minute match," he says. "On Sundays (Virginia Sen. John) Warner will entice me to charge into town for a game."

The game was not always played in such tony company. It was invented in the 19th century by inmates of a British prison. Their game of "hard rackets" graduated to the Ivy League via Harrow, Oxford and Cambridge.

Today players include: Kris Kristofferson, singer Paul Simon, artist Frank Stella and Eartha Kitt.

Chafee eschews the phrase "gentlemen's sport," but says good sportsmanship is essential. "It calls for honesty and trust between the players," he says. "You develop a camaraderie."

► Lessons: Find someone who is familiar with the game or learn from a pro; \$8 to \$20 for a half-hour lesson. Get the basics; then play regularly with someone at your skill level.

- 1/2 cup unsalted cashews or almonds
- 4 green onions, cut on diagonal into 1-inch pieces
- 4 tps. Chinese rice wine or dry sherry
- 2 Tbs. soy sauce
- 1/2 pound fresh snow peas, stems removed, or 1 8-ounce package frozen snow peas, thawed

Wash chicken under hot water. Pat dry. Cut into 1/2-inch cubes. Mix the egg whites, salt and cornstarch. Add chicken and toss to coat. Refrigerate, covered, for at least 20-30 minutes. Dish can be done in advance to this point.

Heat oil in a medium deep-sided sauté pan or wok. Add the chicken and quickly stir fry. Don't let pieces stick together. Cook for 3 minutes. With a slotted spoon, remove chicken to a plate.

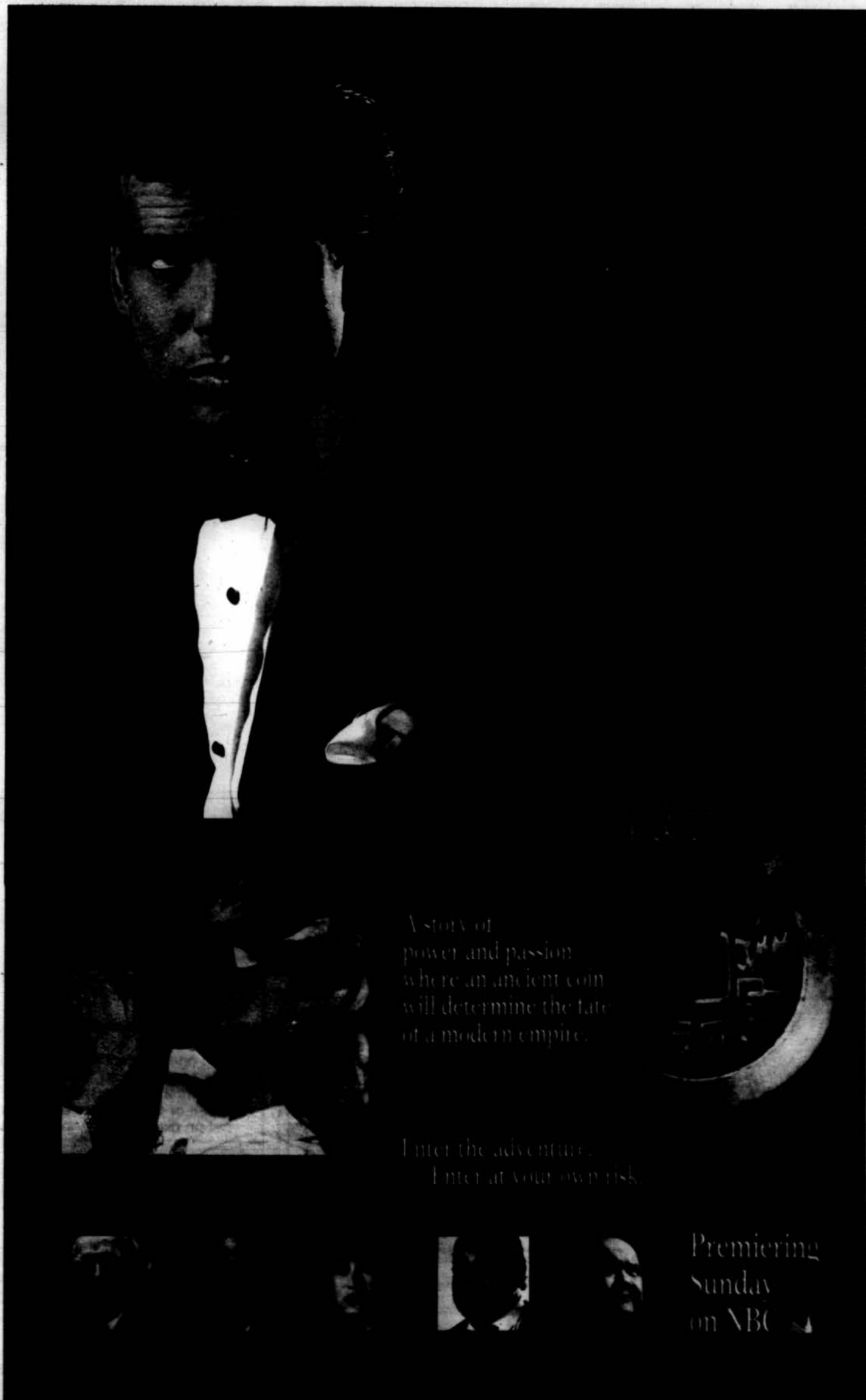

For grandparents, a new age dawns

Healthier, wealthier and in greater numbers, they're taking an active role and getting more help doing it

Cookies, bedtime stories, warm hugs: Grandparents still provide some or all of the above. But today's grandparents are, in many ways, very different from their parents:

- Studies show older people are healthier, wealthier and better educated than ever before.
- More people than ever — some 49 million, according to one survey — are grandparents. Reason: We're living longer, says *Grandparents* magazine editor George S. Bush. Thus, we have a greater chance to enjoy our years as grandparents and even great-grandparents.
- Distance and divorce have dramatically changed family life in the past two decades. Grandparents — as well as parents and children — have been forced to be more creative in overcoming the miles and differences that separate them.
- Today's grandparents have more public help and encourage-

ment. Many hospitals offer child-care classes for the pre-Pampers set. Schools sponsor Grandparent Days. Groups such as Grandtravel in Chevy Chase, Md., arrange trips for the two generations.

Readers of the year-old, Des Moines-based *Grandparents* magazine, which sells its 400,000 copies on newsstands only, typify these new, more active grandparents. Their average age: 54. "They've probably not yet moved to Florida," says editor Bush. "Possibly both are still working. They're busy with their own lives. And they combine that with being a grandparent."

This new emphasis on grandparents will only grow: 6.4 percent of grandparents are in the 35-44 age group, the first wave of baby boomers.

Experts agree grandparents play a vital role in the family. Unlike parents, who often are busy with the concerns of discipline and putting food on the ta-

ble, a grandparent can offer pure, unconditional love to their offspring's offspring.

"It's the only relationship where people are crazy about each other simply because they're breathing," says Dr. Arthur Kornhaber of the Foundation for Grandparenting and author of two books on the subject.

Art Linkletter, a grandparent (and great-grandparent) and author of the recently released *Old Age is Not for Sissies* (Viking, \$17.95), says the older and younger generations share common traits that make their friendship a natural. "They're willing to take time and to listen to each other. They're willing to have fun and games, where they're

not as dignified as grown-up parents try to be."

John Orr, 17, of Beaver Creek, Ohio, thinks his love of reading comes from his grandmother. "When I was younger, I had a special name for each of my grandmothers. There was 'the grandmother that cooks a lot' and 'the grandmother that reads a lot.' Grandma used to send us books, and she also sent a tape and read the book into the tape."

For Clarice Orr, part of the

fun of being a grandmother to John and nine others is "knowing that part of me is going to continue on. I like the very special feeling of seeing my own children, or seeing little bits of myself or my husband, in the grandchildren."

Five years ago, the Lincoln, Neb., resident went back to college to get her master's degree — in grandmothering. "I was interested in studying grandparents because I wanted to be a good grandparent," says Orr.

For her human development thesis, Orr talked to 270 grandparents. Her conclusion: "People are very interested in having a good relationship with their grandchildren."

As for parents — the generation in the middle — couples who have the support of their parents tend to have strong marriages, says Kornhaber.

And grandparents, by acting as a mediator, can provide a new perspective to harried parents who are trying to do a good job.

For example, if a grandson wants a car and Mom and Dad say no, Grandpa might remind his own son about the day he asked for a car. "One of the principal jobs of grandparents is to protect their grandchildren from their parents," Linkletter says. "Grandparents have the experience of parenthood behind them. They can look at a situation much more calmly."

But the grandparent-grandchild alliance does not come without tension. Parents may complain that their parents spoil the grandchildren or that parents and child are united against them. Kornhaber says this is natural — even to be expected.

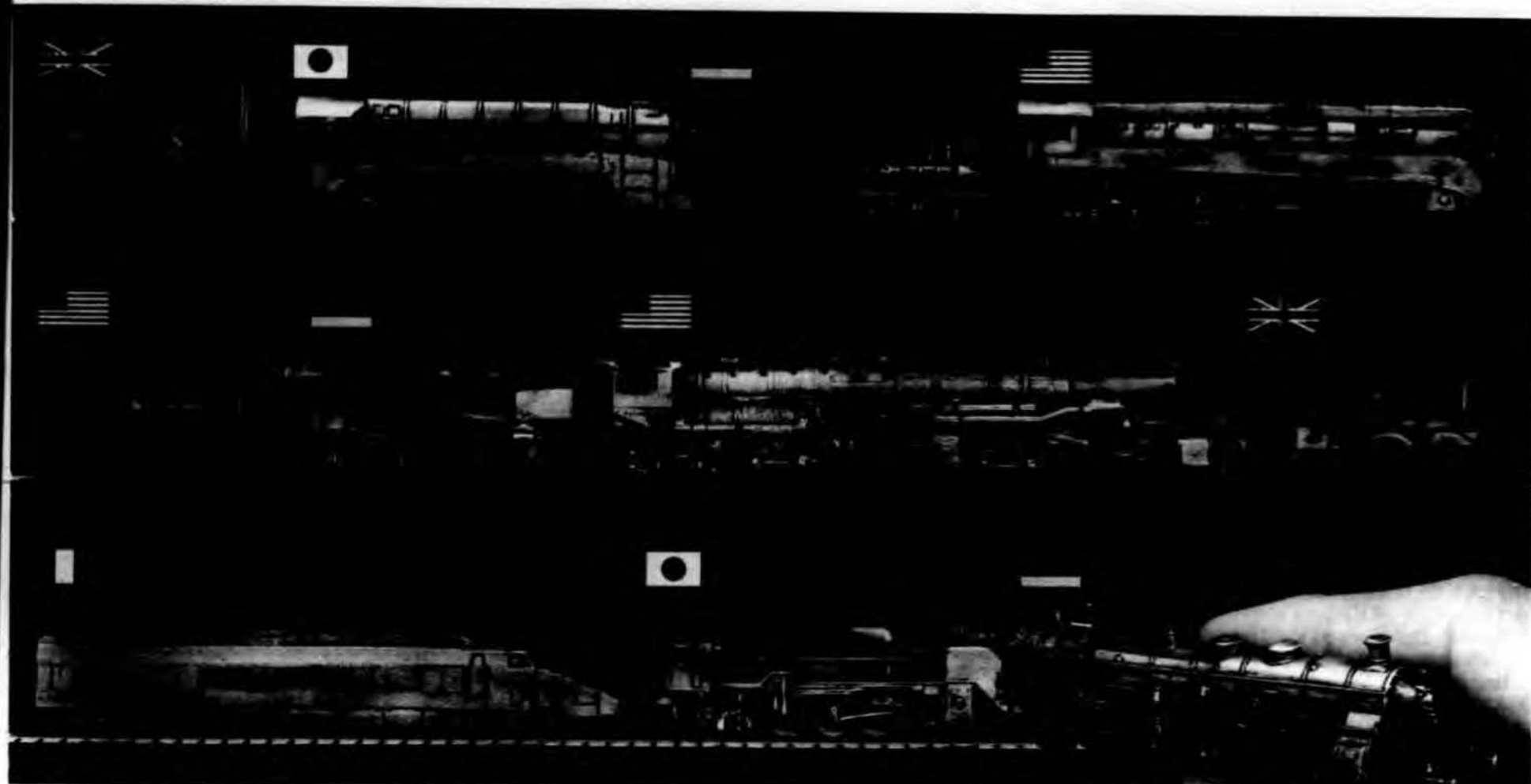
"Deep down, parents are often envious that they weren't treated as well when they were kids," he says.

"Just remember that your parents were as busy then as you are now. But now, as grandparents, they have the time for children they wished they'd had for you."

Once parents accept that, they can enjoy vicariously the special friendship that has developed between two very important sets of people in their life.

▶ **Follow home-turf rules.** "If you go to their house, you have to abide by their rules," says Clarice Orr, grandmother of 10. "When grandchildren are in your own home, if the parents don't discipline the children the way you'd like, it's up to you to set the rules."

▶ **Be willing to bend.** "Accept your grandchildren as they are," Orr says. "Accept their religion, their values. Don't try to make them into your own children."

▶ **Be a good friend, but be an old friend.** "Kids don't want their grandparents to be too hip," says George S. Bush, editor of *Grandparents* magazine. "Grandparents are supposed to be exotic creatures, not totally hung up on, say, videos." But bow to the interests of the younger set once in a while, too. Art Linkletter once took his grandchildren to a rock concert.

▶ **Take advantage of your experience.** Introduce grandchildren to their roots with photo albums and stories. Teach them old skills, such as fly-tying.

▶ **Schedule one-on-one time with your grandchildren.** When all 20 members of Orr's family gathered last Christmas, they planned several small-group activities. On New Year's Eve, just one granddaughter spent the night.

▶ **Stay in regular contact if distance separates you.** "I lived in the same town as my paternal grandparents. It's not the norm anymore," says Evelyn Townsend of Ferndale, Calif., who has nine grandchildren, three of whom live in Hawaii. "You have to work at it," she says. "My phone bill is always over \$100."

▶ **Visit as often as you can.** Better yet, take the grandkids on vacation. That gives you time alone and allows parents some much-needed time to themselves. One possibility: a week-long summer camp sponsored by the Foundation for Grandparenting (Write Box 31, Lake Placid, N.Y. 12946.) And Grandtravel, a travel agency in Chevy Chase, Md., offers 12 summer vacations for grandparents and kids. Call 1-800-247-7651.

▶ **Don't feel you have to spend all your time with your grandchildren.** Grandparents want time for their own pursuits — and time to recoup from the noisiness of grandchildren. As Orr puts it, "Grandparents love to see their grandchildren come, and they love to see them go home."

In search of adventures

From bus tours to ski slopes, seniors find challenge, new experiences and excitement

Tom Stein's commitment to skiing turned him into an inveterate traveler.

Stein, 66, has skied slopes across the country and traveled elsewhere extensively. "I've been to England, France and Ireland. This year my wife (Pauline) and I are going to the Holy Land and to Greece."

The Denver resident is typical of his generation. About 25 percent of the population of the USA is over 50. But, according to the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and the U.S. Travel Data Center, they account for:

- ▶ 30 percent of all travel.
- ▶ 30 percent of air trips.
- ▶ 32 percent of nights spent in hotels and motels.
- ▶ 72 percent of trips in recreational vehicles.
- ▶ 44 percent of adult passports issued.

Stein is the founder of the Over the Hill Gang, a ski club for those 50 or older. In its seven years, the club has swelled to about 2,000 members nationally. The club schedules winter ski trips in the USA and Europe and warm-weather hiking, biking and windsurfing outings.

This generation travels more than the general population because they can. They have the time and the money — an estimated \$150 billion in discretionary income, according to the Consumer Research Center, a non-profit business research organization in New York City.

"You suddenly find yourself with a lot of time and freedom," Stein says. "Nobody asks you for advice anymore. Some people use that as an excuse to sit down and do nothing. But a lot of us this age are still looking for challenges. Travel opens up your mind, and it gives you the recognition that you can do things again."

Bern Keating, a 72-year-old travel writer, equates traveling with learning — and doesn't want to stop learning. "There is an inevitable loss of elasticity with age. Your muscles stiffen up and your mind stiffens up. There are people who haven't had a new thought since they were 21. Traveling forces the mind to loosen up. It won't keep you young, but it keeps

you smarter than a young man who's never been anywhere."

No figures are available to prove seniors travel more frequently than their parents did. But there's no question that travel is far easier now than even 30 years ago. Today's seniors also stay in better health and can expect to live longer than their parents, so they are capable of much more. "Sixty-five is very young compared to what it was 20 years ago," says Barbara Quaintance of AARP.

Travel opportunities abound for seniors of all income groups, from discount charter-bus tours to a 31-day, South American odyssey with a price tag of \$4,499. Cruises are extremely popular for seniors now — particularly ones to Alaska, says John Tarkov, travel editor for 50 PLUS magazine.

For the adventurous or those seeking physical challenges, there are outfitters who run birding expeditions or wildlife safaris for seniors. Saga International Holidays sends over-60 travelers on exotic tours to 140 destinations worldwide.

Other programs emphasize educational experiences. Elderhostel of Boston coordinates tours in conjunction with more than 1,000 universities, museums and institutes of environmental education around the world. The tours combine travel with study: Shakespeare in Oregon or marine biology in California. You must be 60 years old to participate (spouses can be younger). Elderhostel even has scholarships for those who can't afford the programs.

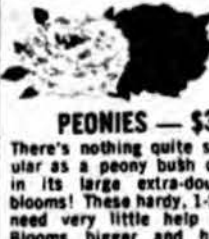

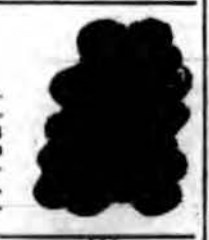

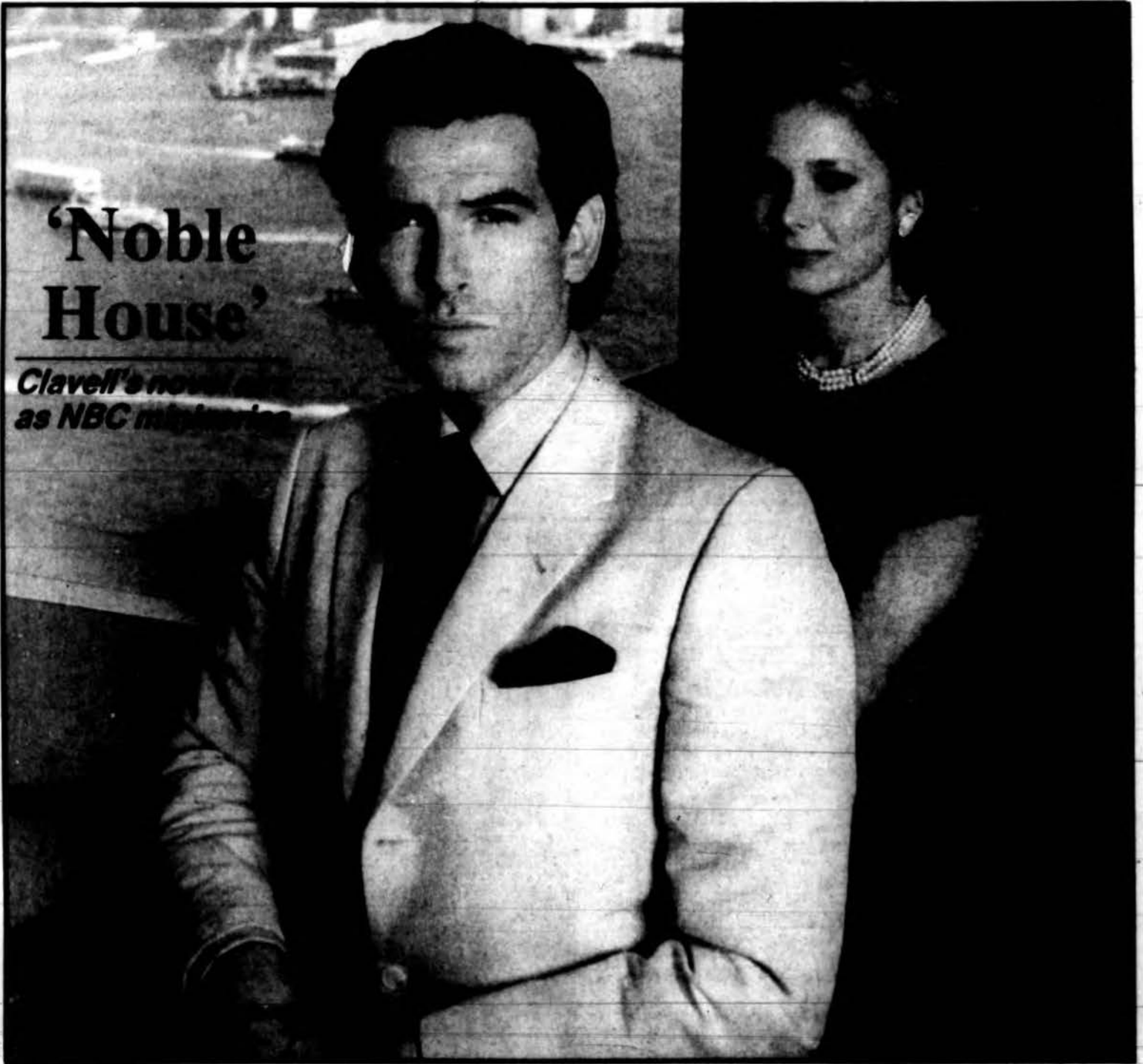

Clavell's 'Noble House' airs as NBC miniseries

The elements that work best for author James Clavell also work well for miniseries, a fact that provides a big TV event this week.

"Shogun" author Clavell's best-selling novel "Noble House," a saga of passion and greed set against the world of big business in modern Hong Kong, will be served in nightly two-hour portions Sunday through Wednesday on NBC. Pierce Brosnan - the network's former "Remington Steele" - stars as Ian Dunross, the new "tai-pan" (leader) of the colony's oldest trading house, Struan and Company. To increase its power base, he arranges a merger with an American conglomerate partly operated by the beautiful and career-minded Casey Tcholak (Deborah Raffin), with whom Dunross is destined to become involved romantically.

For those familiar with the literary version of "Noble House," some major changes will be noticeable. First, the book is set in 1963, rather than the present; secondly, Dunross and Casey have strictly a business relationship in Clavell's original story. However, also serving as executive producer of the miniseries, the writer claims he had no problem with the alterations: "There are so many subplots and interwoven



"Noble House" author James Clavell characters (in the book), we had to drop some things, but we feel it works." The TV adaptation was done by Eric Ber-covici, the writer-producer who also revised Clavell's "Shogun" for the home screen.

Though some secondary characters have been dropped from "Noble House," quite a few remain. Among the most prominent: Linc Bartlett (played by Ben Masters, also of the miniseries "Celebrity"), the driven president of the U.S. corporation who intends to fully take over Struan and

Company; Quellan Gornt (character actor John Rhys-Davies, of "Raiders of the Lost Ark"); Dunross' top nemesis in business: Four Finger Wu (former "Hawaii Five-O" regular Khigh Dheigh), an underworld figure who tries to maneuver Dunross into his debt; Alastair Struan ("A Room With a View's" Denholm Elliott), former chieftain of the business that Dunross now runs; Orlando Ramos (Julia Nickson, of "Rambo: First Blood, Part II"), a TV reporter used as a pawn in a plot against Bartlett; police investigator Robert Armstrong (Gordon Jackson, of "A Town Like Alice"); and Sir Geoffrey Allison (John Houseman), the British Governor of Hong Kong.

Even with all of those colorful people on hand, the core of "Noble House" clearly is Dunross. While Irish-born actor Brosnan enjoyed having a part with a less-flashy veneer than his popular series role as private eye Steele, he claims, "I haven't tried to transform myself. I consider myself an actor, able to portray many different characters."

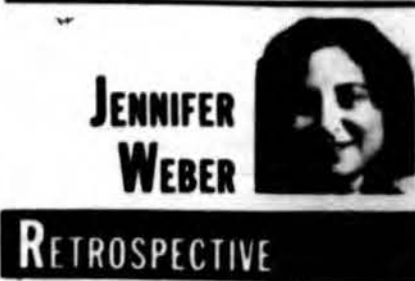


A murder case that won't go away

Costa Mesa police veteran still haunted by a series of unsolved killings in 1979

Sam Cordeiro is haunted by the ghosts of three women whose murders he was never able to solve. A 28-year veteran of the Costa Mesa Police Department, the sergeant says the case that nags at him the most, the one he wants to solve before he retires, is a series of brutal attacks in 1979 that threw the Orange Coast into a frenzy of fear. Cordeiro speaks softly, but his voice has the gravelly quality of a 1940-era detective. A stocky man with clear hazel eyes, Cordeiro has spent an entire career viewing the seamier side of life. A case tugging at a

man like this has to be special. This one is. Three women were bludgeoned to death. Another was beaten and left for dead. All the attacks were within half a mile of Harbor Boulevard and Victoria Street in an older section of Costa Mesa. It is the worst case Cordeiro has ever handled. It is the worst because of the scope, he says. "This makes it the worst because of the number of people's lives it touched in a short period of time. It was a lot of tragedy in a very short period of time," he says.

Teen-ager's death forever changed life for her family

Debra Senior was just 17 when she was killed, beaten to death in her bedroom. But Debra was not the only one who died Oct. 21, 1979. In a way, her whole family died that morning. "It killed all of us, really and truly," said Pam Senior, her mother. "It kills you, it really does. As a family, you're finished." It wasn't supposed to happen that way for the Senior family. They were a middle-class clan with a home in the Mesa Verde tract in Costa Mesa. The four Senior children — Jeff, Jackie, Michael and Debra — grew up in a tumultuous era, but their parents never had problems with any of them. "We kind of had this very charmed life with a mom, a dad and four kids. And then — bingo," Pam Senior said. "It seemed like something that would never happen to us, but it did."

Response to an offer from the city of Laguna Beach to bus residents to an upcoming meeting on the proposed widening of Laguna Canyon Road has exceeded expectations, and the city is considering hiring a second vehicle. The bus the city hired to transport residents to a California Coastal

Commission meeting Wednesday has 53 seats and so far 65 people have requested reservations, said City Clerk Verna Rollinger. "I would say that the interest level is overwhelming," Rollinger said. About half of the requests came from members of the newly-formed Laguna Conservancy, which was set up in December specifically to combat the road widening and other

development in the canyon. City officials Monday will decide if they should hire another bus or try to arrange transportation through private carpools to the meeting in Marina del Rey. Meanwhile, at Coastal Commission headquarters in San Francisco, officials have received about 900 letters opposing a highway widening plan being advanced by the state Department of Transportation, said Tim McGrath, a planner with the commission. So far the commission has received 14 letters of support. McGrath said the commission is bracing for an overflow crowd at the

upcoming meeting, which is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. at Burton Chase Park at the end of Mindanao Way. Loudspeakers are being placed outside the 100-seat meeting room in case the crowd exceeds capacity. This will not, however, be the first time the commission has heard from Laguna residents who oppose widening the road from two to four lanes from El Toro Road to Canyon Acres Drive. In late 1986 the commission sided with residents and city officials who accused Caltrans of going overboard on the amount of earth it planned to

Cities to unite in bid to aid homeless

Panel considering using joint effort to obtain funding

Five Orange Coast cities are considering filing a joint application to receive federal funds for a cooperative effort to aid the homeless. The application is only in the proposal stages, but representatives of cities in the Inter City Liaison Committee said they are seriously studying applying for federal funding to better meet the needs of the area's homeless. City officials from Costa Mesa, Irvine, Laguna Beach, Newport Beach and Santa Ana sit on the 10-year-old committee, which meets monthly to discuss issues concerning all member cities. Mission Viejo, which will officially become a city next month, may soon join the group. Newport Beach City Councilwoman Evelyn Hart, who represents that city on the committee, said committee members are considering applying for Housing and Urban Development funds to launch a cooperative program to aid the homeless. "I think this is the type of thing that if we can approach it on a regional basis, we might be able to more effectively meet the needs of the homeless," said Hart. If the committee does decide to apply for the grant, each city on the

Reagan budget a shot in the arm for McDonnell Douglas

Spending plan calls for \$1 billion outlay in start-up funds to build space station

Officials with McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Co. in Huntington Beach believe that President Reagan's 1989 budget bodes well for work on the space station contract, a spokesman said Friday.

"They are very positive numbers for the space station," spokesman Tom Williams said. "We're not whistling in the dark. We think it has captured America's imagination."

Douglas received a major NASA contract for \$1.9 billion to build the main structure of the space station at

the Huntington Beach plant. The company already has put about 250 engineers to work on design work for the project. Reagan's budget contains \$964 million for the space station, but that amount is to be shared with other contractors, Williams said. The budget would boost America's space and science spending by 20 percent and proposes new funds to put astronauts on Mars, probe particles smaller than the atom and listen for voices from distant galaxies.

The \$13.1 billion general science request is an increase of \$2.2 billion over this year and includes start-up funds for the superconducting super

collider in the Department of Energy and the space station in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

NASA also would get start-up money for a new machine to search for radio signals from unknown sources in outer space — an effort to answer the ageless question of whether there is intelligent life elsewhere in the universe. The spending plan, part of Reagan's \$1.1 trillion fiscal 1989 budget proposal delivered to Congress on Thursday, calls for new money for a National Science Foundation program to develop scientists and engineers for America's future and to

continue fundamental research at colleges and universities. "Our faith in science and technology has served us very well in the past," said William R. Graham, the presidential science adviser. "We see this as the dawn (of this concept) and not the end of it." The budget calls for \$400 million to start construction of the super collider. The experimental device would be the world's most powerful proton collider, capable of conducting re-

Growth measure hearing delayed

Supporters of the Citizens Sensible Growth and Traffic Control Initiative have accused county officials of trying to delay certification of the measure, which officially qualified for the county election ballot Thursday.

Backers said Friday that county officials had to place the initiative on next Tuesday's Board of Supervisors agenda in order to comply with the state elections code. County officials said, however, that the measure would go before the board on March 1.

"The election code says that when the count is

completed, it must be on the next regularly scheduled meeting," said Tom Rogers, co-author of the initiative. "The law is so damn clear on this thing. I don't know why they wouldn't just follow it." But county attorney Adrian Kuyper said he interpreted the elections code differently. "It must be on the next meeting agenda, but the Brown Act requires that a meeting be posted 72 hours in advance," said Kuyper. In order to comply with the Brown Act as well as the elections code, Kuyper said, the clerk of the board must be given enough time to get the initiative on the agenda.

Huntington Beach lifeguards on the move

Huntington Beach officials have decided to move the lifeguard headquarters to make room for a restaurant, which is part of the \$27 million Pierside Village on the beach side of Pacific Coast Highway. Administration officials say they don't know where to move the 24-

year-old building — they just know they have to move it. City Councilwoman Ruth Finley said there should be a site in mind so officials can make sure that it's satisfactory and will work out in the long run. The move is frustrating for the lifeguards who don't want to relocate north of the pier or to an inland

location. Both possibilities have been mentioned. City Administrator Paul Cook told City Council members Tuesday that he needed to get the OK to move the headquarters in order to close negotiations with Pierside Village Developer Bryant Morris. It was initially hoped that the

Second man dies from canyon wreck

A second man has died and a third remains in critical condition as the result of a head-on collision on Laguna Canyon Road on Friday evening.

Joe Tovar, 59, of Placentia was pronounced dead at 12:50 a.m. Saturday at Mission Regional Medical Center, where his passenger, Edward Belosreyes, 25, was in critical condition following surgery Saturday morning, a hospital spokeswoman said. Belosreyes suffered facial lacerations, a broken right ankle and abdominal injuries in the 6:20 p.m. accident.

The first victim, Kelvin D. Price, 33, of Laguna Niguel, was pronounced dead at the scene, a straightaway 1.8 miles north of El Toro Road, a California Highway Patrol

dispatcher said.

Price was reportedly traveling south in a compact car toward Laguna Beach when for an unknown reason his car swerved into the oncoming lane and collided head-on with a northbound van driven by Tovar, the CHP said.

Neither Tovar nor Belosreyes were wearing seatbelts, and both were thrown from their vehicle. Belosreyes was then hit by a second northbound van that had collided with the wreckage.

The driver of the second van, Keith Ring, 24, of Anaheim, was treated for minor injuries at Saddleback Community Hospital, where he was arrested for felony drunken driving, the CHP said.

The accident closed the state highway for at least three hours as traffic was rerouted. It occurred less than a mile from an accident last April that

claimed the lives of four people, including a honeymoon couple.

Friday's accident brings the highway's death toll to 13 in nine accidents since 1983.

The collision comes only five days before the California Coastal Commission is scheduled to consider a state Department of Transportation plan to widen a section of the road from two to four lanes. Caltrans maintains that the widening — which would occur almost two miles south of the accident site — would improve road safety.

Laguna Beach city officials have long argued, however, that safety will be improved not by widening, but by installing center dividers to prevent head-on accidents.

The Caltrans widening plan would include dividers along the "Big Bend" curve, but not at the site of Friday's collision.

Donor baby taken off life-support as second brain-dead infant arrives

LOMA LINDA, Calif. (AP) — A brain-dead baby whose body was kept alive in hopes of transplanting his organs was removed from life-support machines Saturday after no suitable recipient could be found, officials said.

Meanwhile, a second anencephalic child born Saturday in San Antonio, Texas, was placed on a respirator and flown to California in hopes her organs could be transplanted.

The child known as Baby John was born Tuesday and declared brain-dead Thursday at Loma Linda University Medical Center. Officials had hoped to keep the baby's body on life-support machines for up to seven days, hospital spokeswoman Anita Rockwell said.

Three hospitals had turned down his liver.

One prospective candidate in Pittsburgh was an inappropriate match and another in that city became infected, Rockwell said.

A medical center in Wisconsin was unable to accept the liver for a candidate because they were committed to another transplant and could not do two in one day, Rockwell said.

UCLA Medical Center in Los Angeles turned down the liver because officials felt it was not an ideal candidate for their recipient, she said.

Like the Texas infant, Baby John had been suffering from anencephaly, a condition that is fatal, usually

within days after birth. An infant's healthy organs can only be transplanted if organ damage is prevented by maintaining the infant on life-support from birth.

The first anencephalic child considered by Loma Linda hospital for the pioneering procedure was the

child of Brenda and Michael Winner of Arcadia, Calif. But the baby was stillborn on Dec. 22.

Meanwhile, 6-pound, 1-ounce Evelyn Keys was put on a chartered plane in Texas en route to Loma Linda. She was born with only a brain stem.

Roofer vents his frustration after alleged robbery attempt

ISLIP, N.Y. (AP) — A roofer who apparently was trying to break into a bank by squeezing down an air vent was trapped upside-down in the duct for five hours Saturday, police said.

Raymond Mention of Bayshore suffered minor injuries to his right arm and collar bone and bruises on his face, said Officer Thomas Sorriano, a Suffolk County police spokesman.

"This is the first time in my life I've ever been so glad to see a bunch of cops," Mention told his rescuers. Employees of the Long Island Savings Bank in Islip arrived at work at 8:45 a.m. and heard a man calling for help, Sorriano said.

When the officers reached the roof, they found a roofer's belt and tools, the vent, and then discovered Mention's feet "wiggling up in the air."

said Officer Mark Ryan.

"He told them he tried to get in feet first and when he couldn't, he tried head first," Ryan said. "He had nothing to hold on to and fell in."

The officers kept Mention talking while they tried to get the blood circulating in his legs and pry him from the curve in the 2-foot-by-2-foot vent where he had become lodged, he said.

When he was finally freed, Mention asked for the time, was told it was 9 a.m., and said he had been stuck for five hours, Ryan said.

Mention was taken to Southside Hospital, where he was treated and released into police custody. The roofer was charged with criminal mischief; other charges were pending, said Sorriano. Arraignment was scheduled for today.

grade from the "Big Bend" hillside.

Months of negotiations between Caltrans and the city followed and the state agency finally came up with a compromise that significantly reduced the amount of grading.

Although their decision carried no official weight, The City Council rejected the updated plan as well. Instead, city officials came up with their own design, one they said would improve safety along the accident-

plagued road without widening it. Caltrans has long maintained that widening the state highway will improve safety.

In a major setback to city officials, the staff for the Coastal Commission two weeks ago recommended that the commissioners adopt the latest Caltrans plan with a few stipulations.

• Caltrans donate eight acres of undeveloped property to the city in compensation for land that would be

used for the widening.

• Caltrans should bury most of the utility lines as a trade off for grading certain sections of hillside on which landscaping will probably never take root.

Although McGrath said the staff recommendation will stand despite the 900 letters of opposition, he added, "I can't tell you it doesn't have some influence," on both the staff and the commissioners.

committee would have to organize as a joint powers authority, said Irvine City Manager Paul Brady, also a committee member. The committee has no legal authority, he said.

The city of Irvine has had more than its share of experience with obtaining federal grants for use on homeless projects. The city weathered a barrage of public criticism late last year over its proposal to use those

funds to convert an unused dog kennel to a shelter for the homeless.

HUD withdrew its \$496,000 offer after it was discovered that the proposed site was within an El Toro Marine Base crash zone. The city was eventually awarded \$339,000 in federal funds for the purchase of five apartments to house homeless families.

Hart said the committee will ex-

plore a variety of uses for the federal funds, but said she doesn't believe building more shelters will solve the area's growing homeless problem.

"My concern is that shelters alone won't be enough," said Hart, who is also a member of Orange County's Homeless Task Force. "What we really need is more affordable housing, but I don't know how we're going to get there."

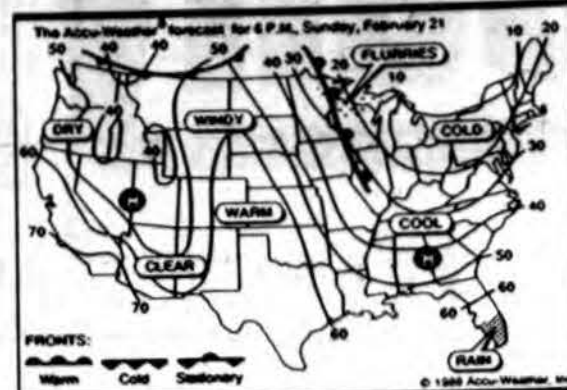
Fair skies, warmer temperatures

search into fundamental subatomic particles.

Several states are competing for the \$4 billion super collider, but a final location has not been determined.

The Department of Energy's science budget authority for 1989 would total \$1.2 billion, a 49 percent increase over the 1988 level. Most of the increase would go to the collider.

James Fletcher, the NASA administrator, told reporters that Reagan's budget follows a policy that "clearly commits the United States to space leadership as a fundamental objective."

For the first time, he said, it also

funds a national goal of putting astronauts on other planets. About \$100 million is planned for the Pathfinder Project, an effort to develop the technologies needed to send astronauts to Mars in the next century.

The budget asks nearly \$1 billion to start construction of the space station, a permanent orbital base that NASA plans to have in operation in the mid-1990s. NASA officials had hoped for a presidential commitment of about \$1.8 billion, but even the reduced amount may run into resistance in Congress.

"I am not prepared to sacrifice

important science projects, including environmental Earth studies, to build a space hotel," said Rep. Bill Green, R-N.Y., the ranking Republican on the house subcommittee for independent agencies.

NASA's total budget outlay would increase by about 20 percent, from \$9.11 billion in 1988 to \$10.97 billion in 1989.

The funding would include the final expenses in recovering from the Challenger accident and returning the space shuttle fleet to orbit. Seven missions are planned for the shuttle in fiscal year 1989, with the resumption of flights planned for next August.

lifeguard station could remain at its location at Pacific Coast Highway and Lake Street. Morris had the blessing of the City Council to build a restaurant on top of a proposed parking structure north of the pier. But state Parks and Recreation Commission officials vetoed the plan because the restaurant would have blocked views of the beach and ocean.

Morris then wanted the restaurant at the site of the lifeguard headquarters.

Cook said the council had to act because Morris plans to begin work on the restaurant in the fall.

"Lifeguard headquarters is inappropriate (at the current site) if you want the Pierside Village to be successful," Cook said. "It's probably the most important piece of land because of its location and size. We need a strong anchor tenant that would assure success of the village."

Marine Safety Capt. Bill Richardson, who fired a gun and held off a mob that attacked the building in a 1986 Labor Day beach riot, said Thursday that if the headquarters has to move, he prefers a site about 100 yards south, the current site of several restrooms.

Richardson opposed moving inland, and to a lesser extent to the

north side of the pier, because most lifeguard activities are concentrated south of the pier because of southerly swells and currents, he said.

An inland location, which would force lifeguards to cross Pacific Coast Highway to respond to emergencies, would stretch conditions "beyond what's necessary," Richardson said.

Richardson said that lifeguards make about 2,000 rescues a year.

There hasn't been a drowning in the guarded part of the beach in two years, he said.

The lifeguard station was built in

1964, remodeled in the 1970s and is now worth about \$2 million, Richardson said.

Councilwoman Grace Winchell said that the lifeguard headquarters is at a good location and shouldn't have to move.

But Councilman Jack Kelly said the Pierside Village poses an opportunity to do something with a "delicious" piece of property.

The Pierside Village is a 750,000-square-foot waterfront commercial and retail center of 55 shops and fast-food outlets and restaurants.

He said he was advising the board to stick to its normal procedure, which requires that proposed agenda items be submitted to the clerk about eight days in advance.

"The board has established what I think are reasonable rules for the orderly transaction of business," he said. "And I think it's reasonable to say that the next scheduled meeting

means the next meeting within normal procedures."

Initiative supporters say they don't accept Kuyper's argument, however.

"It's an emergency matter and it should be dealt with as such," said Russ Burkett. "We don't know what they're up to over there, but the more delays, the more time there is for skulduggery."

signs of a struggle.

Rawlins' boss in the shipping department at Shiley Laboratories still remembers her, instantly reciting the date of her death. The man, who declined to identify himself, described Rawlins as being bright and a hard worker.

"She was very bubbly and outwardly," said her sister, Cheryl.

She was "an extremely gorgeous woman" who walked down the halls at work greeting her colleagues with a chipper, "Ello, luv, 'ow's it going?"

"She was just a real person," Cheryl recalled. "She worked hard and played hard and had a lot of real friends."

Kim Rawlins loved to dance. She liked clothes. She and her sister thrived on camping and backpacking.

Kim and Cheryl, five years her senior, lived together until Kim decided to get a place on her own. She moved down the street with a friend. She had been in the apartment 2½ months when she was killed.

"She was starting to feel proud. She knew she was starting to make it," Cheryl said.

Rawlins' mother, who had one son die as an infant and another killed by a hit-and-run driver, never recovered from the loss of her daughter. Fed up with California, she moved to San Antonio, Texas.

Cheryl moved from her Costa Mesa apartment to another Orange County city, but she still works at Shiley.

She is bitter and angry that police never tracked down her sister's killer. "It struck me very hard," she said. "We were at the point where we could start enjoying each other's company."

The memory she prefers to dwell on is a vision of her sister the Friday before she was killed, sitting in the passenger's seat of Cheryl's car. They were on their way home from work, laughing at something that had happened in the office that day. The sun was shining on Kimberly's long hair, and it was blowing in the wind, she recalled.

The next victim was Jane A. Pettengill, 24, who was found unconscious — her head battered and her voice box crushed — in her apartment at 381 Hamilton St.

Pettengill, who worked for an optometrist, beat the odds and survived the July 20 attack. She left Costa Mesa shortly after for a Northern California city.

Pettengill remains in Northern California, to the best of Cordeiro's knowledge. Today, she speaks with an implanted voice box and breathes through a hole in her throat — the remnant of a tracheotomy she underwent following the attack.

On Sept. 15, Marilyn Carelton was bludgeoned to death in the apartment she shared with her 9-year-old son. The 31-year-old self-help counselor lived just down the street — at 224 Avocado — from Rawlins' apartment.

Carelton's son, Joey, woke up in the middle of the night to see a man standing in his doorway.

Later, he heard his mother screaming and saw the man coming out of his mother's room. The man gently moved the boy out of the way and left the apartment.

Joey Carelton went to live with a friend. At one point he asked the friend, "Why did Mom have to die so hard?"

Detectives have lost track of Joey

Carelton. They know he is living with an aunt and would be 17 or 18 by now. But they do not know where he is or how he is doing.

The final murder took place Oct. 21, when 17-year-old Debra Lynn Senior's roommate found her nude body on the floor. She had been raped. Her skull was crushed. Her clothing, which was ripped from her body, lay in a crumpled heap nearby.

Senior had been at a party but returned home early. No one else was

mother is convinced the girl would have worked with animals at some point in her career — that was what she always wanted to do.

Pam Senior says her youngest child was likely to go farther than anyone else in the family.

"She probably would have made the biggest bang in the family," Pam Senior said. "She was the little spark in the family."

The killer came to be known in some circles as the "Costa Mesa

with shorter hair and no mustache. As he continued his spree, the killer became increasingly brutal. "It seems to us almost an overkill at the end," Cordeiro says.

Most of the women were raped. All were "attacked in their bed, almost before they knew it," he says. The attacks took place between midnight and 4 a.m.

There were no signs of forced entry to any of the apartments, indicating that the killer slipped in through an open door or window. Because some of the women had roommates who were gone at the time of the attack, investigators believe the killer stalked out their apartments.

All of the victims lived in first-floor apartments with entries that were not visible from the street. All the apartments were in complexes and located in working-class neighborhoods.

Other than that, the women shared nothing in common. Not age, not looks, not build, not interests.

They were not even beaten with the same instrument. The suspect used something different on each of his victims.

He left few clues, leading police to comment at the time that the killer was "wrapped in plastic." In fact, police even turned to psychics in the hope of getting clues, Cordeiro said.

Investigators were "desperate," Cordeiro now says.

Even with the lack of clues, the sergeant says he still has one "face in the hole" that could eventually link a suspect to the crimes.

At the time, officials believed the same man may have attacked nine Orange Coast women, killing six of them. Cordeiro says now, however, that only the four central Costa Mesa attacks are definitely related. One or two attacks in other Orange Coast cities may be related, but there is no definite connection.

Still, the crimes threw residents into a frenzy of fear at the time.

People made runs on local gun stores and hardware shops to increase security in their homes.

One Tustin woman became so nervous she shot at a shadow. The bullet went through the wall of her apartment and hit her neighbor's television set.

After Senior's slaying in October, police advised parents to curtail their children's trick-or-treating. They suggested parents have parties or take advantage of other, safer neighborhood festivities.

The manager of the Alpha Beta market on Harbor Boulevard near Wilson Street staffed his night boxing

at the 2256 Maple St. apartment, where she had lived for two months, when she got home.

Senior had graduated that spring from Estancia High School and was taking secretarial classes at Orange Coast College. Friends described her as a good student, a "sweet girl" who was dependable and had a zest for life.

"She was 17, just like every other 17-year-old," said her mother, Pam Senior. "She was just a little girl on the threshold of life, really."

A gentle girl, she liked to write poetry. She loved animals. Her

After Debbie was killed, Pam went into counseling and joined Bereaved Parents, a support group for parents whose child has died.

Her husband, John, did not join her on a regular basis, finding it difficult to talk with anyone other than Pam about their daughter's death. He was grief-ridden, but kept it bottled inside. An Orange County probation officer, he cried himself to sleep "many times," his wife recalled.

Three years after his daughter was bludgeoned to death, John Senior died of a massive heart attack.

"He really and truly just died slowly," he wife said. The heart attack was merely the last blow.

Pam Senior describes herself as "a totally different entity" than the woman she was 8½ years ago.

After her daughter's death, the mother said her friends abandoned her. She said that is not unusual because they feel uncomfortable and fearful the same thing could happen to them.

She has become more hardened, more cynical, unwilling to let people get close to her. She said she used to be quite trusting — just like her daughter.

"There's a void inside of me. I don't have the same kind of empathy," she said. "Life now has become a point A to point B situation, where you're waiting to come to the end of the line."

She waits for the day her daughter's killer is caught. "That's what I'm around for," she said.

And if he is?

"There's nothing I could do to him that would be bad enough."

Jackie and Jeff both got married and had children of their own. "They're getting on with their lives," their mother said.

But Michael "has shut the whole thing out," never discussing his sister's death, she said.

Pam, Jackie and Michael still live in Orange County, but Jeff lives in Maryland, just outside Washington D.C.

The family remains tight-knit, she said, having come to depend on each other after Debra was killed.

But it's not the same.

crew only with men. Male employees escorted women to their cars after dark. Night business fell off.

Restaurant employees said the slayings became common conversation during the day, but no one seemed to talk about the spree at night. Workers said they scanned the faces of patrons to see if anyone resembled the composite drawing of the killer.

The Costa Mesa Chamber of Commerce and various citizens contributed some \$4,000 to a reward fund for information leading to the capture and conviction of the killer.

Police meanwhile flooded the city with fliers.

Investigators got 100 calls a day, many from people convinced that the killer was a neighbor, a friend, the man who sat next to them on the train that morning, Cordeiro said. The tips left police with 40 suspects at one point, but none panned out.

The city assigned 13 detectives to work full-time on the case. They logged more than 8,000 hours trying to catch the killer and donated 300 hours of their own time to track him down.

But it was to no avail. Police believe the fliers and the intensive media coverage may have scared the killer away.

The flood of calls eventually dwindled. Police say they now receive about one call a month.

Daily conversations with the victims' families have ceased, replaced by Christmas cards or occasional

telephone calls.

And the killer remains at large. He may be in jail. He may be dead. Or he may have moved to another part of the country. Police can only speculate.

If he is still alive, Cordeiro believes he is probably still committing crimes at some sort against women.

A psychological outline prepared for police indicated the killer was probably married, but has a "very severe inner hatred of women for whatever reason," Cordeiro says.

The outline suggested the assailant was driven by a need to control women, a drive that was ultimately satisfied only by killing them. He probably has tremendous feelings of inadequacy and isn't very bright, the outline also suggested.

Cordeiro has a simpler explanation: "He's a sicko."

Though police did all they could to track down the killer, the case eats at Cordeiro.

"If you put that much work, that much headache and heartache into something, it's very frustrating. It's very hard not to come up with something," he says. "It's kind of like the Super Bowl: It's not just getting there, it's winning the game."

With some unsolved crimes, the detectives just close the case.

Not this one.

The file is still open, with Cordeiro and fellow investigator Linda Giesler still hoping the man may slip up.

"This is not one you could put down. Not ever."

Mesa woman attacked by rapist

A 37-year-old Costa Mesa woman was stabbed and raped Saturday morning after accepting a ride from an Orange man.

The unidentified woman was attacked and then abandoned near the drive leading up to the Orange Hill Restaurant at 6410 East Chapman Ave. at about 10:15 a.m., according to Sgt. John Higley.

William Addison, 38, was arrested

leaving his home near the restaurant and is being held at Orange County Jail until he can post bail for \$250,000.

The woman, stabbed several times in the legs and stomach, was taken to Chapman General Hospital, but her injuries were not life-threatening, reported Lt. Marnie Ortega also of the Orange Police Department.

The woman apparently accepted a ride from Addison in Anaheim, and instead of taking her home, he allegedly attacked her. She was

found by passersby.

Orange police arrested Addison at about 3 p.m. on a tip from Tustin police after issuing a description of the suspect and crime. Tustin police had issued a warrant for Addison's arrest on suspicion of assaulting a Tustin woman with the intent to rape, kidnapping and false imprisonment.

Tustin police called Orange police after they recognized similarities in the suspect's description and type of crime, said Tustin Lt. Bob Schoenkopf.

The driver of the van, Maria T. Reynoso, 29, of Claremont, was not charged with any citations and "none are expected," Lovelady said.

Of at least a score of witnesses, only one stayed to recount what they saw to police.

"It would be nice if someone came forward out of the 20 people or more people who saw this," Lovelady said.

While Orange County coroners have yet to determine the exact cause of death, preliminary indications are that she died of a blunt chest trauma.

Lungren endorsement a family feud

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Gov. George Deukmejian said Saturday that Jesse Unruh's widow has endorsed his controversial nomination of Daniel Lungren to replace Unruh as state treasurer.

Deukmejian's office released a copy of a letter from Chris Edwards Unruh, which was dated Feb. 15 and said she would like to see her husband's vacant office filled quickly and "would be pleased to support" Lungren.

The letter led Senate leader David Roberti, D-Los Angeles, to release one from Unruh's youngest son by a previous marriage, calling his stepmother's endorsement "a callous

abuse of my father's name."

Lungren, a Republican congressman from Long Beach, has drawn opposition from Asian-American, civil rights, labor and senior citizen groups for his conservative voting record in Congress. And a Senate committee has recommended rejection of his nomination.

In her letter to the governor, Mrs. Unruh defended scrutiny given by Democratic legislators to Lungren as "their right" but said it has revealed "no hint of scandal or outrageous behavior in his record."

The letter described Lungren as a "very knowledgeable and energetic

person" and "fully capable of assuming the stewardship of the state's financial affairs."

"I believe it is time to take another step forward," the letter said. "California needs leadership in the state treasurer's office. I would not want to see the office which Jesse worked so hard to build into a position of enormous responsibility languish any longer than necessary."

Unruh, a Democrat, died in August of cancer.

Deukmejian announced Mrs. Unruh's endorsement during his weekly, statewide radio address. At a news conference during the Re-

publican state convention in Santa Clara, he said that she approached him after his Jan. 6 "State-of-the-State" address and told him she supported Lungren. "It was unsolicited," he said.

In a letter dated Feb. 17 and sent to Roberti, Randy Unruh said he had heard rumors that "a Mrs. Unruh" might endorse Lungren. "I would like you to know that my family and I feel that this is a contradiction of everything my father stood for in every way," he wrote. "My family and I feel it is our duty our of respect for my father's memory to clear up any confusion that such a callous abuse of my father's name might produce."

Surgeons optimistic over future of animal-to-human transplants

The surgeon who transplanted a baboon's heart into an infant girl in 1984 says he's optimistic about the continuing research toward eventual use of animal heart transplants in humans.

"We're still really working vigorously in that area from all points of view, goats and sheep and primates," Dr. Leonard L. Bailey said at a three-day international conference on thoracic organ transplantation that concluded Saturday.

Researchers have turned to exploring the use of cross-species, non-human organs for transplantation on either a temporary or possibly even permanent basis, in part because of the lack of sufficient organ donors.

In a controversial procedure in October 1984, Bailey and his staff at Loma Linda University Medical Center in Loma Linda, placed the heart of a baboon into the chest of a 12-day-old girl known as Baby Fae.

The child, born with a heart defect, survived for 20 days before her body's immune system rejected the foreign-tissue transplant, or xenograft.

Rejection has been a major obstacle to overcome.

Another problem area has been the ethical question of using a primate heart in humans, said Dr. Bartley P. Griffith of the University of Pittsburgh.

Bailey said the testing that has been conducted at Loma Linda has involved a series of experiments, testing the "xenograft bridge to allograft theory, and it's working out very well." An allograft is a same-species organ transplant.

The testing, he said, includes using xenografts of green monkey hearts into baboons in temporary bridge-to-transplant situations.

"We still very firmly believe that a well-selected primate heart from a baboon will be virtually as good" as a human allograft "that may have no tissue match whatsoever and bear very little resemblance and genetic makeup" to the original — even as a permanent graft.

He added, "We have yet to prove that," but said the Loma Linda center's next protocol on the laboratory testing of non-human organs will authorize temporary testing of such grafts.

State loses about \$2 billion a year to tax cheaters

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Californians who cheat on their income taxes will rob the state treasury of some \$2 billion this year, according to a rough estimate by the state Franchise Tax Board.

For every \$1 the tax board will collect, about 13 cents will get away in the pockets of tax cheats.

"Tax cheating is a thriving business in California," said Jim Reber, spokesman for the tax board.

New penalties will raise the ante for those who cheat this year. Those convicted face up to three years in prison and a \$20,000 fine. After that, they will still be liable for the taxes owed, more fines and interest.

The tax board makes its loss estimate from national figures compiled by the federal Internal Revenue Service.

Breakthrough reported in use of superconductors

SACRAMENTO — A newspaper reported Saturday that researchers have made a major breakthrough in developing a commercially usable form of superconductors, the new wonder materials that could revolutionize the electronics industry and dramatically reduce energy use. The Sacramento Bee said the researchers predict the development could allow for commercial use of superconducting material as soon as six months. Previous estimates were that development of commercial use of superconductors could take years. "We are the first in the world to produce dense shapes of superconducting material...in a well-understood, reproducible commercial process," said Robert Shelton, physics department chairman at the University of California, Davis. Superconductors are materials that offer no resistance to electricity in transmitting it, meaning little energy is lost and equipment could run on small boosts of electrical power.

Suspect arrested in Whiskey Pete's slaying

SAN DIEGO — A 37-year-old man was arrested in connection with the abduction and slaying of a 7-year-old California boy who disappeared from a video arcade near a Nevada casino last year, authorities said Saturday. Howard Lee Haupt was arrested by FBI agents and Las Vegas, Nev., detectives Friday at his home here on a federal warrant charging him with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution, said FBI special agent James Bolenbach. Fugitive warrants filed in Nevada seek Haupt for kidnap and murder in the death of Alexander Harris, said Detective Curtis Walker in Las Vegas. Alexander Harris of Mountain View, vanished from Whiskey Pete's casino in State Line, Nev., on Nov. 27 just before 11 p.m. His body was found under a trailer near the casino on Dec. 30.

Snake venom promising stroke treatment

SAN DIEGO — An extract of snake venom shows promise as a treatment for stroke victims, according to researchers looking for ways to dissolve blood clots before brain damage can occur. The treatment, called anecrod, is derived from the venom of the Malaysian pit viper. Doctors have given it to 10 patients, and although the results are still preliminary, the therapy appears to help. "This is a drug that shows potential," said the study's director, Dr. Charles P. Olinger, of the University of Cincinnati.

Moderate quake rocks Northern California

HOLLISTER — No damage or injuries was reported Saturday after a strong earthquake, with an epicenter 80 miles south of San Francisco on a branch of the San Andreas Fault, woke some people in a wide area of Northern California and shook some things from shelves. Police in the Monterey area and the state Office of Emergency Services said strong motion was reported in the shaker at 12:39 a.m., centered seven miles southeast of quake-aware Hollister. The seismographic station at the University of California at Berkeley assigned the tremor a preliminary Richter scale reading of 5.1.

Brazilian floods kill as many as 165

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — A flash rainstorm caused floods and mudslides that left at least 70 people dead Saturday. As many as 95 others were feared dead after an avalanche of mud and boulders crashed into a nursing home.

Firemen used surfboards and the navy used amphibious vehicles to rescue people stranded by the storm, which began late Friday night and left about 3,150 homeless.

State Health director Jose Noronha said at least 70 died and 80 to 95 more were feared dead. The same number of victims was reported by Civil

Defense spokesman Bruno Avila, who said the death toll could be even higher because of mudslides in poor shantytowns that line mountainsides in this city of 5.6 million.

The four-hour downpour dumped 4.88 inches on Rio and left many streets under 5 feet of water.

Mayor Roberto Saturnino Braga declared the city a disaster area, called in all off-duty municipal doctors and canceled a post-Carnival Parade of Champions scheduled for Saturday night.

"There is nothing to celebrate now. There is only sorrow," said Martinho

da Vila, a popular samba composer who performed in the famous Carnival festivities here a week ago.

The Vila Isabel neighborhood, whose samba school won this year's top Carnival prize and which celebrated Wednesday with an all-night victory party, was one of the most rain-battered zones in the city.

State troopers were sent out to prevent the looting of stores and stop holdups of drivers whose cars had broken down in the high water.

Avila said most of the 70 deaths occurred in poor slum areas, where housing is precarious and drains and

sewers often nonexistent.

James Lewis, a rescue work coordinator in the mayor's office, said: "We are accustomed to tragedies in our slums, but this was too much. Something definitely must be done to protect...slum people from rainstorms."

A mudslide knocked down one three-story wing of the three-wing Santa Genoveva Hospital, a Social Security nursing home in Santa Teresa, a well-to-do mountainside neighborhood. There was little hope that the estimated 80 to 95 elderly patients there would get out alive.


Israeli soldiers raid hospital in search of wounded rioters

RAMALLAH, Occupied West Bank — Israeli forces shot at brick-hurling Palestinians on Saturday and two Arabs were killed. Soldiers seeking wounded rioters then raided a hospital, forcing patients to flee their beds, the hospital director said. Violence erupted throughout the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip and police responded with live ammunition in several instances. Israeli army and Arab sources said. Two firebombs were thrown at the U.S. consulate in Arab east Jerusalem, slightly damaging a shed outside the main building. Jerusalem police spokesman Avi Zelba said. He said there were no arrests. The army said border police shot and killed a 19-year-old demonstrator in Ramallah and that a 12-year old boy died in the Tulkarem refugee camp. A military spokesman said the army was investigating the boy's death.

Opposition leader escorted out of Haiti

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — An opposition leader who led two unsuccessful invasions during the Duvalier family dictatorship left the country Saturday after spending six months holed up in an embassy, said Haiti Radio Inter. Bernard Sansaricq, who was granted political asylum by the Argentine Embassy after the Haitian government accused him of urging peasants to revolt, boarded an Eastern Airlines flight bound for Miami at 5 p.m., the independent radio station said. Sansaricq, head of the National Peoples Party, was driven to the airport in an Argentine Embassy limousine, accompanied by four carloads of Haitian soldiers, the radio said. President Leslie Manigat, in an address on state television Friday night, promised safe conduct "for all of those in political asylum."





Congress urged to hold firm on budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan beseeched Congress Saturday to "stand firm" against election year pressure for expensive additions to his \$1.1 trillion budget, but the chairman of the House Budget Committee called for more money to help the homeless.

Reagan, defending the spending package in his weekly radio speech delivered from Camp David, Md., said deficit spending will drop from \$221 billion in fiscal year 1986 to \$130 billion in the 1989 fiscal year, which his proposed new budget covers.

"If Congress upholds its commitments and stands firm against pressures for increased spending — pressures that reach a peak during election years — solid results will be forthcoming," the president said.

The new budget, sent to Capitol Hill Thursday, was written after a series of consultations with Congress on deficit-reduction goals and outlines of the amounts to be spent on broad categories.

As a result, Reagan said, the legislative and executive branches "are demonstrating the kind of responsible leadership expected by the

electorate."

The budget, the president said, "remains firm in our commitments to essential domestic programs. It also includes funding for the minimum defense programs needed to keep our country safe and necessary to honor our commitments to our friends and allies."

He called it a "trim budget" that keeps the lid on spending, while permitting increases for education, the battle against AIDS and illegal drugs, and air safety programs.

Rep. William Gray, D-Pa., chairman of the House budget panel,

echoed the president's praise for the budget consultations and the hikes for education, AIDS and narcotics programs.

"Let's give credit where it's due," Gray said in the Democratic response. "In at least some areas, the president has recognized that Congress' priorities are also the priorities of the American people."

"In other areas, this budget is out of line with America's needs and America's values," Gray said.

His only specific criticism of the package was a request for \$1 billion to build a manned space station

Environmental group gives 'State of the World' report

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nations of the world ought to spend about \$150 billion a year — about four times the current pace — fighting threats to the environment over the next decade, a private research group says.

The Worldwatch Institute, in its annual "State of the World" report, said major efforts are needed to restore and protect topsoil on cropland, restore forests, slow population growth, retire debts of developing countries, and raise energy efficiency and develop renewable energy sources.

"If the world stays on the current path, crises will compound and accelerate until they overwhelm the capacity of institutions to respond," wrote Lester Brown and Edward C. Wolf in the summary of the report.

Plane crashes take 19 lives in past 2 days

MORRISVILLE, N.C. (AP) — A commuter plane that plowed through a stand of trees just after taking off, killing 12, was only three years old and had just been inspected, the company president said Saturday.

The two-day plane crash death toll reached 19 nationally as seven other people died Friday and Saturday: three each in crashes in New Jersey and Texas, plus one death in Connecticut.

American Eagle commuter Flight 3378 had just taken off from Raleigh-Durham Airport at Morrisville, N.C., on a flight to Richmond, Va., when it disappeared from radar and crashed about 3,000 feet from the runway, officials said.

"It sounded like a blast or something ...," said Mary H. Ward, who lives in a mobile home about three miles from the airport. "It wasn't too awful loud. It was kind of muffled."

"The airplane is completely disintegrated," deputy airport director R.C. Shackleford said Saturday.

AIDS panel told of private testing

NEW YORK (AP) — People with AIDS who have begun their own trials of experimental AIDS drugs found support for their efforts Saturday from members of the president's AIDS commission.

"The most exciting aspect of this project is that it originates from the AIDS community, empowering ourselves to participate in the research that may save our lives and dramatically expand the number of patients who have access to experimental drugs," said Thomas Hannon, administrative director of the Community Research Initiative in New York.

The project uses private physicians and their patients to test ways of preventing development of full-blown acquired immune deficiency syndrome, he said.

Amtrak fire kills worker, injures 16

HASTINGS, Neb. (AP) — Passengers aboard Amtrak's California Zephyr complained that they received no warnings or instructions from crew members when a smoky fire caused by a defective heater in a crew car killed one crewman early Saturday and injured 16 people.

"It's a miracle that there wasn't some kind of panic," said Sara Bentley, of Fremont, Neb., a passenger in the first coach car behind the passenger sleeper, which was coupled to the crew car.

"I think the worst thing was that they didn't let anyone in our car know whether we were in danger. We couldn't find out if our car was safe."

Social Security is a moral commitment

By JOHN T. DENNING

In the continuing debate over how best to reduce the enormous federal budget deficit — a step which the American Association of Retired Persons believes must be a national priority — a number of editorial writers, political cartoonists and columnists once again are taking aim at Social Security as an inviting target. Cartoons depicting Social Security as a "bloated, sacred cow," editorials denouncing Congress for refusing to slash Social Security cost-of-living adjustments, columns describing older Americans as greedy and self-centered people, with no regard for the rest of society — this sort of thing has become standard fare on too many editorial pages.

These attacks on Social Security may help sell newspapers. But they are morally and factually flawed. Here are some reasons why.

• Social Security is not contributing to the federal budget deficit. To the contrary, it makes the deficit seem smaller than it actually is.

Were it not for the necessary reserves in the Social Security Trust Funds, that deficit would be \$38 billion higher in fiscal year 1988 and more than \$250 billion higher over the next five years. The fact is that Social Security is a self-financing program. The reserves now being accumulated in the Social Security Trust Fund eventually will be used to pay benefits to today's younger workers.

Furthermore, any money that might be saved by reducing or eliminating cost-of-living adjustments must — by law — be returned to the Social Security Trust Fund and cannot be used directly for any other purpose.

• Social Security is not just a retirement program for older Americans. It is a universal social insurance program that protects virtually all Americans, regardless of age or income.

More than a quarter of all Social Security beneficiaries are under the age of 62 — more than 3.3 million of them are children.

It is this universal protection that has made Social Security the most successful and popular government program in our nation's history. Survey after survey has shown that Americans of all ages overwhelmingly

support Social Security and oppose cutting benefits for any reason. Most working Americans believe that the payroll tax is "fair," unlike other taxes, they know exactly where their payroll taxes are going — to pay Social Security benefits.

• Cost of living adjustments are not benefit "increases." All they do is keep beneficiaries barely even with inflation. In fact, because the Consumer Price Index used to calculate adjustments may be understating the impact of rising medical costs on older people, Social Security beneficiaries may be losing a quarter to a half percentage point of the purchasing power of their benefits each year even with the cost of living adjustments. A cost of living adjustment freeze would mean a drop in real income and standard of living for millions of Americans who cannot otherwise share in our nation's economic growth. For example, a one-year adjustment freeze would push more than 300,000 people into poverty.

• Most older Americans are not "well-to-do." It is true that Social Security has been America's most successful anti-poverty program. Thanks to Congressionally approved benefit increases and the creation of the annual adjustments, poverty rates for older Americans have been cut in half since 1970.

Despite this progress, however, millions of older persons remain economically vulnerable. According to the Census Bureau, the median

income of a household headed by an older person is \$13,845, less than half of the median income for non-elderly households (\$28,467). One-in-five older people are living below or just above the poverty level. Fully one quarter of all those age 65 or older — mostly single, elderly women — must rely on Social Security for 90 percent or more of their total income.

Surely it is absurd to suggest, as one columnist did recently, that a cost of living adjustment cut or freeze would have "relatively little impact" on these people.

• Older Americans have not been exempt from making sacrifices. More than \$70 billion has been cut from Social Security, primarily due to the 1983 Social Security Amendments. \$30 billion more has been cut from the Medicare program.

Where is the fairness in asking Social Security beneficiaries to accept

another reduction in their "real" incomes when non-elderly households aren't being asked to make the same sacrifices? Why are the elderly being used as scapegoats for a budget deficit for which they aren't to blame? Why should the nation break its moral commitment — made more than a half century ago — to provide economic security for older Americans?

It's time to set the record straight.

Development, traffic cures

To the Editor:

A news clipping was sent to me indicating that Laguna Canyon Road and its surrounding hills will soon be carved to make room for larger roads, new communities and a freeway. My silence cannot be contained, and I must speak.

The total desecration of the Southern California I knew wouldn't be long off.

When the wildlife and rolling hills of Wilderness Glen were bulldozed, making way for the planned community of Mission Viejo, I felt sad. When the wildflower-strewn hills around UCI were dozed to make way for Turtle Rock and other Irvine communities, I felt sad.

When the tomato, strawberry and soybean fields were leveled to create more and more subdivisions in Huntington Beach, leaving the meadowlarks with few — if any — places to nest, I felt sad.

When the hills around Dana Point were reshaped and weighted down with high-priced homes, and when the curling waves off its beach were stilled to create a marina, I felt sad.

Now that the orange groves are gone in Orange County, and freeways upon freeways overpass each other, now that Los Angeles' Wilshire Business District has run out of room, skyscrapers and office complexes build in once pastoral Costa Mesa and Irvine, now that the smog finds it tougher to be blown inland by ocean breezes, but stays in Orange County, turning the sunsets a bloody red; now that the urbanization of Orange County has happened — gang warfare, graffiti, traffic moving to a dead stop on the freeways — that is why Orange County is no longer my home.

Sure, I left Orange County six years ago because I married a serviceman, but in my heart, Orange County was "home" as I was raised there. I hoped to return home some day. My roots in Southern California extend three generations — but I must permanently uproot.

I'm ashamed of this cancerous growth. The serene cattle roaming on Laguna Canyon Road's hillsides will soon no longer roam and eat from mustard fields in peace. The glutinous dozer will again chew the colorful land, leaving it a uniform brown. Next, construction crews will paint the land colorless, a cemented-in land of sidewalks and stucco; gone the perfume of purple thistles, honeysuckle and California poppies — replaced by black exhaust from thousands of vehicles warming up in the morning.

I read an article a few years ago describing Southern California as rapidly becoming "The New Tokyo." That description fits: wall-to-wall people and buildings. The green remaining is a created green: swaths of planted Bermuda or dichondra, not the wild grasses that once sweetened the air.

The wildlife in Orange County has taken flight already, or faces man's ire. The on-going story about the mountain lions in Caspers Wilderness Park captures the despondency the wildlife must feel. They're driven from their dens by dozer, so they move to another den — if they can find one.

The men driving big rigs shovel under more land. The mountain lions retreat and retreat again and again. Their food — the jackrabbit and ground squirrels — scatter, many flattened under speeding cars. Cornered, the mountain lions grow skinnier and skinnier, finally shriveled to skin and bones, nearly starved to death.

The hunger pangs are a constant torment.

In Caspers Wilderness Park, a little girl walks off the trail where the humans walk.

The mountain lion doesn't like the smell of human but he must eat or die so he attacks the child.

This bedraggled, pitiful mountain lion, only fighting for his very survival, becomes the target of a massive manhunt. Once found, the hunters are surprised at the lion's leanness; he's more than half his normal weight.

The mountain lion is shot. His body and brain are scrutinized by scientists who search a cause. Isn't the cause self-evident?

Most of my family still live in Orange County. But the stresses and strictures upon their lives because of the ever-growing urbanization has radically altered their lives. Dead-bolts must be installed on doors. They look in the backseats of their cars before getting in because a stranger may be lurking there. They feel trapped in the traffic. They save hard-earned money only to spend it on vacations to get away from Southern California for a while, to get some peace and quiet on an uncrowded beach or mountain.

I'm sad that I cannot return to Orange County — "The New Tokyo" — and nostalgic about the Orange County that was.



ROCKY MOUNTAIN POWDER

If you're looking for the year's best powder, then this is the time to head for the Colorado Rockies. All of the Colorado ski resorts are receiving a bountiful gift of snow from the winter weather that brought rain to Southern California, and they are settling in for a very good season.

"The snow has been excellent this year," said Jim Felton, of Breckenridge Ski Area. "January is routinely our driest month, but we had four feet of snow then. March usually ends up as our litmus test, but we're already predicting a fantastic season all

the way through to our closing on April 10."

Linda Kleaver, a spokeswoman for Snowmass Resort, says the same for her area. "Skiing has been much better this year than last," she said. "We've had just an incredible amount of snow."

Besides the snow, a nice, fluffy white blanket of it, Colorado's ski areas offer other attractions to powder hounds, including new high-speed chair lifts, programs for kids, bargain packages, and a number of special events between now and April closing.

Following is a roundup of programs, happenings, and facilities at some of the more popular resorts:

ASPEN/SNOWMASS

Well established as an international ski mecca, the Aspen, Snowmass resort complex holds continuing appeal to many skiers because of its overall size and its many choices of terrain.

Bermuda is a technicolor vista of coral sand beaches, clear turquoise waters, and buildings painted every color of the rainbow — especially pink.

"That's because, in the old days, the most available dye was red," said Vince, a local guide. "So, you mix red dye with limestone wash and you get pink!"

The "old days" go back nearly four centuries, when the first English settlers sailed into the harbor in 1609 and established a crown colony. British traditions abound here, where cars are driven on the left side of the road, cricket is a popular sport, and afternoon tea is served daily at 4 in most hotels and dining rooms.

In spite of its distance (3,500 miles) from Southern California, Bermuda has become much more accessible from the West Coast than it used to be. With the recent same-day service instituted by Pan Am, you can arrive in time for dinner. American, Delta, and Eastern are other possibilities, but the connections are not as good.

This tiny archipelago (only 21 square miles) has about 60,000 residents who mostly live on the four largest islands (Bermuda, St. George's, St. David's, and Somerset) which are linked with each other and also several smaller islets by bridges or ferries. One of the popular tourist attractions is Somerset Bridge, said to be the world's smallest drawbridge, which allows only an 18-inch clearance for the mast of a sailboat.

Vacationers are especially attracted to Bermuda's sparkling beaches, considered among the most beautiful in the world because of their varying shapes (ranging from long, sweeping curves of sand to secluded coves for two), and their distinctive pink sand, tinted by shells and coral which have been ground by the surf for centuries.

The most frequented is Horseshoe Bay Beach,

which offers full facilities — a snack shop, restrooms and changing rooms, and a shop for renting snorkeling gear.

Aside from the pleasures of the beach, there are a variety of sightseeing, shopping, and sports opportunities all around the islands as well.

and Aspen Highlands), together comprise nearly 250 miles of ski trails, ranging from novice to advanced. Free shuttle buses connect all four mountains and the villages at Aspen and Snowmass.

Aspen Mountain's recently installed Silver Queen Gondola (named for the town's mining days), can whisk skiers up 3,267 vertical feet to the top in just 13 minutes. (Non-skiers also enjoy the gondola's panoramic ride to lunch at the Sun Deck restaurant at the top).

Buttermilk, celebrating its 30th birthday this year, is the site of Aspen Skiing Company's new three-day "First Time On Skis" package which promises beginners that they will be skiing from the top of the mountain by the end of day three. This mountain is also headquarters for Vic Braden's Ski College, and Mimi Schlumberger's Powder Pandas, a ski school for toddlers.

Topping the news at Snowmass this season is the addition of a fourth high speed quad SuperChair, installed for the slopes of the Big Burn area. Snowmass' third annual Banana Season (end-of-the-season celebration) will include skydiving exhibitions, relay races, and other festivities between April 2 and 10.

Aspen Highlands is offering a free ski school lesson every Monday for any ability level, with the purchase of a full day adult lift ticket. Also, the Highlands Family Plan allows two parents and all kids age 18 and under to ski for \$72 a day, or less, depending on the number of consecutive days purchased.

BRECKENRIDGE

Like Aspen, another mining town cum ski resort is Breckenridge, a good family locale with plenty of beginning ski programs, yet also providing slopes to challenge expert skiers.

This town's three interconnected ski mountains, Peaks 8, 9, and 10, offer 107 trails and more than 400

acres of above-timberline skiing. Peak 10 has the distinction of being Colorado's newest ski mountain (opened two seasons ago) to provide new terrain for intermediate and advanced skiers.

Cross-country equipment rentals, lessons, guided tours, and torchlit evening tours are available at the Breckenridge Nordic Center, and crosscountry skiers have virtually unlimited terrain around Breckenridge in the adjacent Arapaho National Forest.

The resort's 13th annual Telemark competition, with hundreds of competing skiers dressed in the costumes of the Breckenridge 1880s era, takes place March 5 and 6, while a Women's Skiing Seminar will be held April 1-3.

COPPER MOUNTAIN

In its 16th year, Copper Mountain Resort recently received the Mobil 4star and AAA 4-diamond awards for its facilities, which have been undergoing a \$40 million expansion program. In addition to skiing, Copper Mountain has a year-round athletic club, plus golf, tennis and horseback riding in the apreski season.

Its 76 trails, spread over 1,180 acres of skiable terrain, have become more accessible this year with the installation of the "American Flyer," the resort's first high-speed, quad chairlift.

Along with technological improvements, Copper Mountain is focusing on the family this year. The "Children Stay Free/Ski Free" program is available for children 12 and under when their parents buy a minimum two-day package. Rates begin at \$117 per adult for a 2-night, 2-day package.

KEYSTONE

Also the recipient of the Mobil 4-star award, as well as the AAA 5-diamond rating, Keystone has all the facilities of a full-service resort, including 900 condos; 11 swimming

pool, sauna, and Jacuzzi locations; and some 30 restaurants.

For skiers arriving via Denver's Stapleton Airport, Keystone offers free roundtrip van transportation as part of the "Keystone Super Saver" (minimum five nights' lodging and four days' lift tickets, beginning at \$282 per person).

The resort's Nordic Center, at Ski Tip Lodge, offers cross country and telemark lessons and tours by sun or moonlight for novice and experienced skiers on 27 kilometers of prepared trails. A new "Mountain Top Trail" accessible by the Skyway Gondola, is a full-day trip which descends around North Peak and into Keystone Gulch with spectacular views.

Popular here also is night skiing.

available until 10 p.m. on 13 lighted trails and serviced by the gondola.

STEAMBOAT SPRINGS

Celebrating its 25th anniversary this season, Steamboat Springs is another former "Old West" town which is blending its tradition of Western hospitality with the development of a state-of-the-art ski area.

Among its recent \$30 million in improvements is the addition of the "Silver Bullet," an eight-passenger, high-speed gondola which highlights the resort's extensive lift system (seven triple and ten double lifts).

Like Keystone, Steamboat Springs' trails — 107 in all — are mostly for intermediates, but it offers 15 per cent novice and about 30 per cent advanced runs within its 2,500 acres.

McClellan married Woody McClellan in May, 1974. He was an American college professor on tour, and she was a Russian think-tank translator on vacation. When he returned to the U.S. three months later, Soviet authorities refused to let her go with him.

For more than 11 years, McClellan participated in protests, resulting in frequent arrests. She was forced to resign her position at the Institute of World Economy and International Relations and become an English teacher at a Moscow high school. After being tricked into leaving her teaching position by a false KGB promise of an exit visa, she gave private English classes in her home in order to support herself and her daughter.

Finally, McClellan was released as

part of the new Soviet leadership's goodwill campaign on the eve of the 1985 Geneva summit. She and her daughter arrived in the United States Jan. 30, 1986.

Slime eel wallets suspected in demagnetized ATM cards

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The mystery of demagnetized automatic teller machine cards may have been solved by an unlikely snooper — although the answer sounds like something off the deep end.

John McCosker, director of San Francisco's Steinhart Aquarium, said he suspects the culprits are tanned hagfish.

For years, bank officials have been perplexed by a phenomenon that somehow fouls the electronic code identifying the user's account

number, which is recorded on the magnetic strip on the back of an ATM card.

McCosker has suggested that the cause is the slippery hagfish, also known as the slime eel, whose eelskin is prized for luxury wallets and purses.

Where's the rub? McCosker said he suspects the trouble is caused by a metallic residue deposited on hagfish while they're being tanned in Korea, where most of the accessories are made.

or moped, hop a ferry or one of the many buses, or take a taxi. (Those taxis displaying a blue flag indicate that the driver is also a qualified tour guide.) Whatever the choice, most travelers will have to adjust their pace to the laid-back lifestyle of the islands, where the speed limit on the roadways is 20 mph and even the ferry terminal clock is set five minutes slow so that latecomers have a little leeway in catching the boats.

Virtually all tourists make their way to St. George, the original capital, which retains much of the flavor of a 17th-century English village. It was the second English town to be established in the New World (after Jamestown, Va.); but unlike Jamestown, which is now a replica village and museum, St. George has continued as an active town since the Pilgrim days.

Two "must-see" attractions here are St. Peter's Church, the oldest continually used Anglican church in the Western hemisphere; and King's Square, which prominently displays stocks, a pillory and ducking stool (used in the early days to punish wrongdoers). Here, every Wednesday, the official Town Crier, Bob Burns, reads a proclamation on behalf of the mayor.

Next to the square are a number of old-English style shops and boutiques, and a full-scale replica of The Deliverance, the ship which brought the first English settlers.

Bermuda's other main town is Hamilton, the seat of government since 1815 and center of most business and commercial activities. The showcase shopping area here is Front Street — a line of pastel stores displaying goods from around the world.

Best buys — sometimes 30 to 50 per cent lower than at home — include English bone china, French perfumes, Irish crystal and linens, Scottish woolsens, Swiss watches, and fashions from such diverse places as Greece, France and England.

Local specialties include Gosling's Black Seal Rum, Bermuda Black Rum Cake (made from a secret old recipe of a Somerset family), and Outerbridge's Original Sherry Pepper Sauce (used in chowders and other spicy dishes).

Spending money is easy here, since the Bermuda dollar is on a par with

the U.S. dollar, and U.S. currency and credit cards are accepted everywhere on the island.

Beyond the shopping areas, the islands' other pleasures include five 18-hole golf courses, countless tennis courts and, of course, such water sports as scuba, snorkeling and sailing.

'Pandas' fine children's comedy

Entertaining by virtue of its animation and lovable characters is the fast-paced comedy for children, "The Revenge of the Space Pandas," currently in production at the Little Theater on the University High School campus in Irvine.

Written by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright, David Mamet, the lively piece also endears itself to its adult audience. Under the able direction of Daniel R. Trevino, an energetic cast portrays the escapades of 12-year-old super scientist Binky Rudich, with his pet sheep Bob, and neighborhood girlfriend as they experience a time

machine parody and step into a galaxy where intelligent pandas and colorful space beings create a nonsensical world — the likes of which they have never seen.

Leonard "Binky" Rudich, played alternately by Darren Turbow and Eliam Kraiem, uses his latest invention in the form of a two-speed clock to stop time on Earth and take his two friends on an adventure to Crestview, Fourth World in the Goolagong System.

Turbow (and Kraiem) are well complimented by renderings of Nicole Odekirk as Vivian Mooster, and Karl Stenske as Bob the Sheep. Both are vibrant and spontaneous in

their responses adding a necessary air of suspense and tension over their situation — not only stranded but being pursued on a planet in outer space with no apparent avenue of escape back to Waukegan, Earth.

Excellent pandas are interpreted by Denise Baum, Melanie Smith-Jacks, Amber Poland, Kate Stombaugh and Leslie Stevenson with supporting pandas, Tony Daverso, Beth Luteran and Tully Summers.

An evil cloud hovers over Crestview in the person of dastardly dictator, George Topax, and his "heavies" — Hank and the Executioner. Topax is impressively portrayed by Michael Wardner.

Hank, the planet bully, is well done by Paul Schellberg while the Executioner, complete with black tights and studded dog collar accented by a sinister black mask, is musically rendered by John Reedy.

Providing lighthearted breaks in the heavy action is the bouncy Jester, effervescently done by David Pritikin. In contrast, the real hero of the piece, Edward Farpis (aged movie star) is presented by Chris Jones.

A humorous comic segment is created with interaction between the Newscaster, Christy Barley, Turbow (Kraiem) and Baum. Binky's mother is Susan Cereda and the Offstage voice is Rand Olson.

An obvious strength of this work is very effective creativity offered in the areas of scenic design, lighting, costumes and staging done respectively by Ron Kennihan, Milton Markey, Glenna Bolton and Cheryl Bodman.

A sparkling back-drop of knirkled foil and multi-colored neon lighting enhancing the fluff and color embellished with sparkles and paints serve to inject a power into an entertaining make-believe experience.



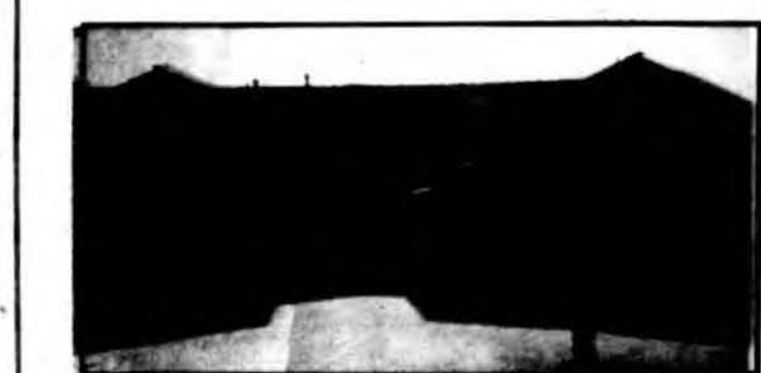

table. Sitting South on this hand from a team match was one of the country's leading women players, Lynn Deas of Schenectady, N.Y.

North's raise to two diamonds was inverted, showing a good hand but denying possession of a four-card major. Therefore, South's bid of two hearts, in theory, showed a heart stopper, although in practice it is doubtful whether it would have stood the test of an enemy attack. After North indicated club strength, South continued on to three no trump.

West made his normal lead of the top of his spade sequence, and declarer saw at once that, if the diamond finesse were to succeed, the contract was beyond reproach. Should it fail, however, the defenders would be in position to cash four heart tricks to defeat the contract.

Declarer had already diverted attention from the heart suit in the bidding. To reinforce that impression, she won the ace of spades and dropped the queen from her hand! When West won the first diamond trick with the king, he saw no reason not to continue spades—indeed, that might have been imperative had declarer held the ace of hearts and not the king of clubs. The result? The contract rolled home.

West might have done better to hold up the king of diamonds one round. That would have permitted East to discard the jack of spades on the second diamond, making the heart shift easier to find.

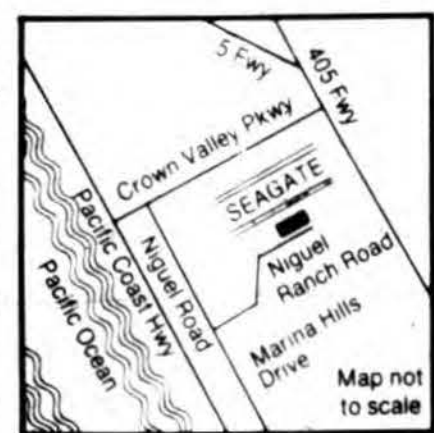

Extending new home warranties

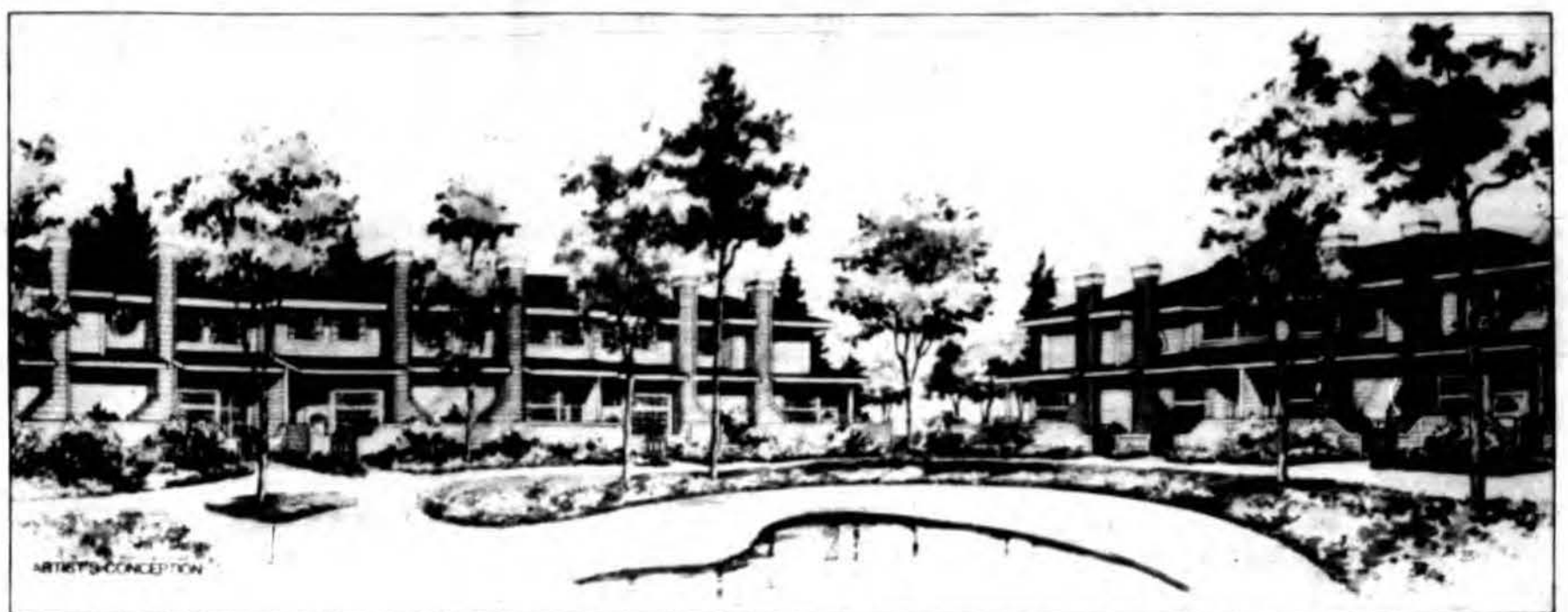

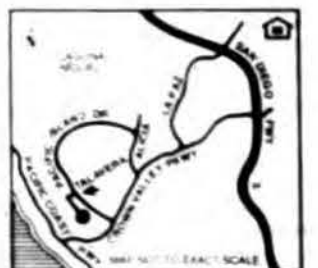

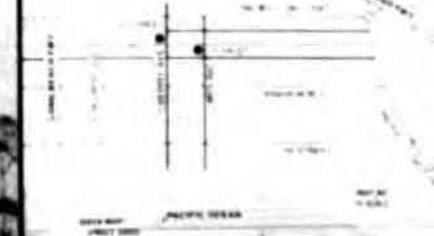

UCI seniors take over in a crunch

Hess, Engelstad, Woods lead Anteaters by Pacific, 85-81

After Saturday night's game, three UCI seniors stood at center stage with their families to receive homage for their farewell home performance from 3,153 fans at the Bren Events Center.

Wayne Engelstad, Mike Hess and Frank Woods were celebrating their careers as Anteaters and narrowly escaping with a 85-81 Pacific Coast Athletic Association victory over a game Pacific squad, which suffered its 17th straight defeat to extend the nation's longest losing streak.

And fittingly, the seniors played a major role, particularly Hess, who had some not-so-fond memories of two days earlier when the man he was guarding hit a pair of three-point goals in the final 30 seconds to pull Fresno State even in a game the Anteaters eventually won in double overtime.

"I was having visions of three-pointers at the end like Fresno," Hess said. "I wasn't going to let my guy get it."

Hess didn't let his guy, Pacific's Domingo Rosario, get it most of the second half. After scoring 12 in the first half, the Tigers' leading scorer was limited to two shots and no points by Hess in the final 20 minutes.

He also had four steals, including two late in the game. One he took in for a layup and the other resulted in a three-point play by Engelstad, propelling UCI from a one-point lead to an 80-74 advantage with 3:25 to play.

"Mike Hess is a good player," said Pacific Coach Denis Willins. "Everyone says he's not real quick. All he can do is beat you."

Hess also added a career-high 18 points, including a trio of three-pointers. In a game which featured 15 lead changes and eight ties, Hess twice hit three-pointers in the second half to regain the lead for UCI, and then shortly after forced a turnover and took a charge.

"He hit the jumpshot tonight," said UCI Coach Bill Mulligan. "He missed a couple early, so I pulled him over and said, 'Mike, you have to shoot the ball.'"

In the first half, Pacific used a three-two but sagged back on Engelstad posting while also trying to combat the three-pointers. They couldn't do both and despite hitting 53 percent in the first half after shooting only 36 percent Thursday against UC Santa Barbara, Pacific held only a 45-43 halftime lead.

"We had to play Russian roulette," said Willins. "Do you try to take away Engelstad and drop back, give away the three-pointer? We tried to cover everything, but they hit the crucial three-pointers in the first half and that kept them in the game."

Pacific managed to limit Engelstad to eight points in the first half, two on dunks and one on a flip of the wrist from above the rim.

But Justin Anderson came off the bench to hit a trio of three-point goals. Mike Labat made some rare outside (Please see UCI/D2)

Arizona clinches crown

Wildcats' victory over UCLA sews up Pacific-10 title

With four games left on its schedule, Arizona didn't want to take any chances this time after losing the Pacific-10 title by an eyelash to UCLA a year ago.

The third-ranked Wildcats got the supreme measure of satisfaction Saturday, dethroning the Bruins before a sellout crowd at Pauley Pavilion with a pulsating 78-76 overtime victory.

"It feels good, especially to take it away from UCLA on their home floor," said Sean Elliott, who capped a 17-point second half with 17 points — including a game-tying jumper with three seconds left in regulation. "It was tough for us to lose," said UCLA's Walt Hazzard, last season's Pac-10 Coach of the Year. "We're the Pac-10 champions, and we fought to our death not to give up the championship."

Elliott finished with a 24 points for the Wildcats, who improved their Pac-10 record to 14-1 and their overall mark to 25-2. It also assured them of the top seed in the Pac-10 tournament.

The Bruins fell to 12-13 overall and 8-6 in the conference.

Elsewhere in the Pac-10: USC 74, Arizona State 70: Ronnie Coleman scored 20 points and USC held off a late Arizona State rally to defeat the Sun Devils and snap a four-game conference losing streak.

Andy Olivarez added 14 points, Chris Moore 12 points and 12 rebounds and Dave Wiltz 10 points for the Trojans, 4-10 in the conference and 6-17 overall.

Tarence Wheeler had 19 points, all in the second half, for the Sun Devils, 6-9 and 13-12.

Oregon State 69, Washington 57: In Corvallis, Bill Sherwood scored 24 points and Oregon State outscored Washington, 13-3, in the final 2½ minutes of the game as the Beavers pulled away to beat the Huskies.

The victory moved Oregon State into sole possession of second place in the conference standings at 9-5, 15-8 overall. Washington is last in the Pac-10 at 3-11 and 7-16 for the season.

Boitano brings first Olympics gold to U.S.

Skater edges Canadian Orser; Flaim wins silver

CALGARY, Alberta (AP) — Brian Boitano spun gold and Eric Flaim streaked to silver Saturday, a bright day at last for America at the Winter Olympics.

Boitano skated a near-flawless freestyle routine to music from the film "Napoleon" to win the United States' first gold medal, barely beating world champion Brian Orser of Canada, who stumbled away the title.

"It was a tug of war and an exhausting fight," Boitano said. "I want to thank all Americans for their support. This is your medal, too."

Flaim set a world record in the 1,500-meter speed skating event, but saw it fall minutes later

when he was beaten, just barely, by Andre Hoffmann of East Germany.

"I had a world record for about six minutes," Flaim said. "It had to be the shortest world record in history, but I did what I wanted to do."

East Germany won two gold medals Saturday, keeping the Soviet bloc firmly in control of these Games, but at least America has reversed the calamity of Calgary, that saw only one U.S. bronze medal during the first week.

The Soviets won two medals Saturday, a silver in the 20-kilometer biathlon and bronze by Viktor Petrenko in the men's figure skating, and raised their medal total to 15, five gold, East Germany added a victory in the biathlon to its speed skating gold and now has 10 medals, six gold.

East German police lieutenant Frank-Peter Roetsch won the biathlon event, Soviet army officer Valeri Medvedtsev won the silver

After his routine, Boitano held both fists in the air, then wiped a tear from his cheek. With the gold medal draped around his neck as the national anthem played for the first time in the Games, Boitano's eyes filled again with tears.

"I felt so much support from the Americans, it was overwhelming, and I consider this medal a victory for all Americans," he said.

Alexander Fadeev of the Soviet Union fell on a triple axel and bobbled a triple Salchow and fell from third to fourth, behind Petrenko.

Boitano, of Sunnyvale, planned his wardrobe around the Napoleonic period — military-style, dignified, elegant in deep blue. He was armed not only with his blades, but also with an arsenal of spins, turns and leaps designed to create the mood of battle.

New audio system brings sounds of Olympics to TV

CALGARY, Alberta — When the world heard U.S. Olympic hockey Coach Dave Peterson muttering about cheaters and poor officiating during a crucial loss, it was because Jim Cory and Martin Slutsky had done their job.

Cory, from Canadian network CTV, and Slutsky, a senior technical manager for ABC, were in charge of perfecting a sophisticated audio system that would make the Calgary Winter Games sound like no Olympics before for television viewers.

Hundreds of microphones strategically scattered among the venues have picked up the sounds of skis cutting the icy tracks of Mount Allan, the whoosh of the bobsled and luge runs, even the ping of bullet striking target in the biathlon.

And Peterson's comments from the bench during last Wednesday's 7-5 loss to the Soviet Union. Those laments of a coach on the way to a big defeat helped get Peterson labeled a poor loser and were just the type of thing Slutsky was hoping to hear.

"We put microphones in the coaches' and players' benches and even in the penalty bench," he said. "People were nervous about that, for obvious reasons, with the possibility of hearing profanity. But to me, that's part of the event."

Slutsky said ABC officials asked him last year to come up with an audio system for Winter Games coverage that would provide "the best natural sound ever for the Olympics."

With Cory and a team of technicians, Slutsky spent 2½ months in Calgary last summer, exploring every venue and deciding where microphones should be placed.

"That's never been done before," he said. "Before, you laid out your cameras and then put a microphone on a camera or two. This time, we had months of lead time, and full support and dedication from the network."

When Switzerland's Pirmin Zurbriggen won the men's downhill, 60 microphones recorded the run, about three times as many as in previous Winter Games.

Workers sharing in record Ford profit

DETROIT — Ford Motor Co. out-earned industry-leader General Motors Corp. for the second straight year, a boon to Ford workers who will receive record profit-sharing checks early next month.

The No. 2 automaker's fourth-quarter profit rose 19 percent from a year ago and full-year earnings jumped 41 percent over 1986, but some Wall Street analysts said they had expected Ford to earn even more.

For the final three months of 1987, Ford said it earned \$932 million, or \$1.87 a share, on revenue of \$18.8 billion, up from profit of \$785 million, or \$1.50 a share, on revenue of \$16.26 billion in the final quarter of 1986.

For the year, Ford earned \$4.6 billion, or \$9.05 a share, on revenue of \$71.6 billion, up from 1986 earnings of \$3.29 billion, or \$6.16 a share, on revenue of \$62.7 billion.

Earnings for the fourth quarter and the year were both records, Ford said. Per-share earnings in 1986 were restated to reflect a 2-for-1 stock split Dec. 10.

GM's 1987 earnings rose to \$3.6 billion, or \$10.06 per common share. At No. 3 Chrysler Corp., earnings fell slightly to \$1.3 billion, or \$5.90 a share.

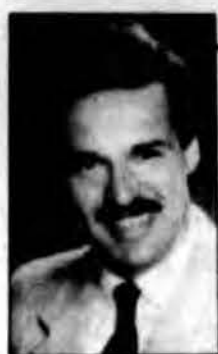
Market expectations that Ford's earnings would be somewhat higher for the year and quarter depressed the price of Ford stock after the announcement, said Douglas Laughlin, industry analyst with Dean Witter Reynolds Inc. in New York. Ford's stock closed down \$2.25 per share at \$42.25.

"The stock's mostly down on a gut reaction to the number but not on any real conclusive detail. It was a very respectable quarter and the year has been excellent," Laughlin said.

By the end of 1987, Ford's nest egg of cash and marketable securities had grown to nearly \$10.1 billion from \$8.6 billion a year ago.

Ford workers will receive their profit-sharing payouts March 8. The company was to release details Friday. Ford spokesman Tom Foote said checks will be up substantially from the average \$2,100 workers received for 1986.

Study: Crash shifted balance of power in banking industry

BOSTON — The balance of power in the banking industry has shifted dramatically since the October stock market crash, leaving many of the nation's largest institutions vulnerable to takeovers, a study released Friday said.

The report by MAC Group, a Cambridge-based financial research firm, rated 19 of the 50 largest U.S. banking institutions as susceptible to takeover as of the end of last year, compared with just four by Sept. 30.

Among those on the list are San Francisco-based BankAmerica Corp. and Los Angeles-based Security Pacific Corp. and First Interstate Bank Corp.

"In effect there's a new group of very strong institutions beyond the traditionally large institutions," said William T. Gregor, a MAC Group senior vice president.

The study measured the ratio of a bank's stock market value to its book value — its worth based on audited financial statements.

Gregor said the "market-to-book ratio" is a good predictor of a bank's long-term performance capabilities. He said the lower an institution's ratio, the more difficulty it has issuing new stock to raise capital.

"When you're selling below the book value, you're selling for below what the auditors are saying you're worth," Gregor said.

Bank stocks were hard-hit by the Oct. 19 market crash. The survey found that from October 31 to December 31, the stock price of the surveyed banks fell 29 percents.

The report concluded that:

- A bank's ability to grow and acquire other companies has become a critical feature of financial strength.
- Banks most severely discounted by the crash are under "unprecedented pressure" to strengthen performance to stay independent.
- Competitive advantage among banks now is more a function of market value and stock market performance than asset size.

The 19 banks labeled as vulnerable to takeover all had market-to-book ratios under 1.0 as of December 30. Besides BankAmerica, Security Pacific and First Interstate, the list included Bank of Boston Corp., Boston; Bank of New York Co., New York; Chase Manhattan Corp., New York; First Chicago Corp., Chicago; Manufacturers Hanover Corp., New York; and Mellon Bank Corp., Pittsburgh.

"In effect their earning power wasn't severely disadvantaged but their ability to issue equity and to make acquisitions certainly was damaged," Gregor said.

A core group of 17 banks that emerged from the crash in better shape or with limited damage all had ratios above 1.0, according to the study. Most weren't large banks in terms of assets.

They include "new powerhouses," Gregor said, such as Fleet-Norstar

Financial, of Providence, R.I.; Sovran Financial, Norfolk, Va.; NBD Bancorp Inc., of Detroit; Banc One Corp., Columbus, Ohio; and Corestates Financial of Philadelphia.

"Clearly we're not going to see tomorrow that Fleet has made an offer for Manufacturers Hanover, but nevertheless its clinically possible," Gregor said. "I think what we will see is more frequent acquisitions than in the past. In some cases those may be for entire institutions."
