that rectifies this issue," said Costa Mesa police Lt. John FitzPatrick. "We decided this is as good a time as any to have a coordinated program and merge our resources together."

COSTA MESA — The consequences of checking the immigration status of people in the Costa Mesa Jail go beyond just sending suspected criminals back to their native countries, opponents are


Checking the immigration status of those who have already been arrested may seem justifiable on its surface, but it has raised questions among some in the community.

"You can't really speak against deporting undocumented criminals, but are they really criminals?" asked Jean Forbath, founder of Share Our Selves and longtime advocate for the poor.

Forbath's question is a valid one, said Kathryn Terry, a Whittier Law School professor and an immigration attorney who represents immigrants in deportation hearings.

Terry agreed it is hard to speak against the screenings when someone ... has done something to deserve getting

Keeping ahead of OCC's growth spurt

Robert B. Moore joined the staff of OCC in 1960 and quickly advanced to become president in 1964, a position he held until 1982.

Armed with a doctorate from Stanford University, Moore guided OCC's growth from 3,200 students to 30,000 and was honored as the college's Outstanding Citizen in the mid-1980s.

In addition to his school chores, Moore was a trustee and director for the Costa Mesa Chamber of Commerce and chair for the Costa Mesa Development Committee. He was named Costa Mesa's Outstanding Citizen in 1972 for his distinguished community service, and he acted as president for the Harbor Area United Fund, which was

honored as the Outstanding Service Organization the same year. Moore was a member of the Newport-Mesa Lions Club-for more than 20 years before he retired to southern Oregon, where he still lives with wife Pat.

Commission to decide if liquor and beer can mix

Planners say they are reluctant to change the Newport Brewing Company's license.

NEWPORT BEACH - The Planning Commission is expected to decide Thursday whether the Newport Brewing Company can add liquor to its line of beers.

The Balboa Peninsula establishment carries a license to serve beer and wine and would like to appease some of its customers' wishes for something stronger.

Owners Allan Fainberg and Arnold Feuersten, both of Anaheim, have told planners that the permit would not cause problems for residents who live near the restaurant's Newport Boulevard and 30th Street location.

However, in a recommendation to the commission, Planning Director Patricia Temple and Senior Planner Patrick Alford said the facts support a finding that the proposed use would be detrimental to the area because a public

convenience or necessity would not be served by the license.

The crime rate is a major consideration. According to police, overall crime - from drunk-inpublic citations to speeding tickets - in the area exceeds the citywide rate by more than 258%.

The adjacent areas also have high crime rates. Authorities said during the first six months of this year, reported offenses for driving under the influence and drunkenness increased 19% when compared with the same period in 1998. Citywide the increase was 8.8%.

Temple and Alford reported that: "Although there are no day care, religious establishments or schools in the area, this is located in a mixed commercial and residential zoning district where residents dwell on 30th Street. Therefore there is always the potential for impacts to the residents associated with patrons arriving and departing from the site.'

City policy does provide criteria for situations when the public convenience or necessity will not be served, however it is applicable only to bars, cocktail lounges, cabarets and nightclubs, officials said.

District begins talks on school reconstruction

Series of meetings will focus on how to repair crumbling schools, and whether a bond is needed.

NEWPORT-MESA - It's going to take many, many meetings.

That was the first conclusion of the school district's facilities advisory committee, a group of local business and community leaders convened by Supt. Robert Barbot to figure out what to do about the district's crumbling classrooms, leaky pipes and cracked roofs.

Last month, Fred Good, an architect with the firm PJHM hired by the district, estimated that the total cost to repair and modernize schools would be at least \$127 million, money the cash-strapped district does not have.

Financial options include selling district property, applying for state funds and asking voters to approve a school bond.

On the bright side for the district, Larry Tramutola, a public opinion expert and consultant to the school board, said that 72% of registered voters in Newport Beach and Costa Mesa could — under the best of circumstances — be convinced to vote for a tax increase to repair aging schools. State law says that tax increases must be approved by a two-thirds majority.

Now, the committee, which had its inaugural meeting Tuesday evening, must figure out what to do with this information.

First, they must decide whether they agree with Good's and Tramutola's conclusions.

Then, by Sept. 28, they must tell the school board what to do about it.

If they decide to ask voters to approve a tax increase, board members want to have the option of putting the measure on a March ballot, and state law requires board members to give a least four months notice.

But it was clear from the meeting that committee members are nowhere near making such a decision yet.

Many committee members said they were concerned that the \$127 million price tag does not include any seismic retrofitting to make schools earthquake safe.

"To not have evaluated that is almost starting down a path ... you can't finish," said, Rush Hill, who is representing the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce. Hill warned that any construction at Newport Harbor High School would likely require earthquake renovation, since that school was

built in the 1930s and 1940s. "Frankly, it makes me ashamed to sit here admitting the goal is ... (to avoid doing seismic retrofitting)," Good said, adding that Newport-Mesa, like many other school districts, simply cannot afford such expensive renovations. He promised to bring information about state earthquake standards to the next meeting.

Committee members also learned that only 9% of registered voters in Newport-Mesa have children in schools, which means that the school district will have to convince people who do not have children in schools to approve any potential tax increase.

The committee will meet as a whole next Thursday and then will break into smaller groups to tackle the many questions which must be answered.

"I wouldn't call it depressing," said Del Heintz, who represents Media One and plans to advise the district on technology issues Heintz sighed throughout the meeting at the incredible obstacles faced by the district, and urged committee members to come up with a long-term solution, "so this never happens again."

"I would call it sad, though,"

Time to take a gray look at a black-and-white world

his is about the color gray, which is a mix of black and white and can only be achieved by diluting those colors in various proportions. It has occurred to me that although our most stubborn problems today might be profitably addressed with shades of gray, our society is moving more and more to the absolutes of black and white. While recently emasculating a mild (gray) gun control bill, for example, the House of Representatives chose instead to open The doors of our public schools to The posting of the Ten Commandments.

These musings are prompted by — but certainly not the result solely of — a letter I received from Jim de Boom in the aftermath of my column opposing the policy of zero tolerance in our schools. His letter was neither pnexpected nor hostile in tone. It went to the weakness of my argument - the comparison of zero tolerance with such authoritarian states as Yugoslavia while dismissing as impractical my main thesis: eliminating the unfair and sometimes ludicrous imbalance of treating widely diverse offenses with the same inflexible (black-and-white) punishment.

But I don't want to hash all that over again. I want to reach for a different point that might



help explain and perhaps even begin to bridge this gap. I'm becoming more and more convinced that the protagonists in our society are not so much Democrats and Republicans or liberals and conservatives, but rather the grays versus the black-and-whites. In that contest, the intractability of the absolutists makes any sort of compromise - or even communication — increasingly difficult.

grays and the black-and-whites get into more complex trouble is when the absolutists overlay their concept of morality on social, political or highly person-

The marquee problems have been up in lights for a long time. The opponents of abortion have turned it into an absolute moral issue that brooks no compromise — and at its extremity has influenced unstable people to murder abortion workers. The same is true of homosexuality; fundamentalists of a variety of religions have ignored biological findings and human rights to demonize homosexuals and thereby provide a rationale, again, for murder.

A few weeks ago, for example, the Roman Catholic hierarchy cashiered a Maryland nun and priest who have long been ministering to the gay community. This action prompted an official of Catholics Speak Out to say: "The kind of message the Vatican has put out about homosexual persons and phrases like intrinsically evil' frankly is part of the antigay rhetoric that ultimately undergirds violence."

These absolute statements aren't dropped into a void. They provide authority from on high for the extremists in our society to vent their fear and hatred. And because the grays of our

world don't confuse human opinion with the word of God, we aren't nearly as attractive to those who require absolute answers.

The argument made so often against the grays is that we lack principle and thus the ability to take a decisive position and stand on it. That is simply not true. The grays reach a principled stand by making every effort to weigh the pros and cons of an issue while recognizing and respecting opposing posi-

Many grays, for example, would support the registration of all guns in this country. But we recognize the legitimate concerns of hunters and collectors and this nation's long history of firearms and so propose laws designed only to protect us against an open market on military weapons and cheap handguns. The National Rifle Association, emulating the Vatican, opposes all gun legislation.

Dozens of daily decisions arise that offer no problems to

the black-and-whites but give the grays pause. These opposite states of mind have been produced by many years of living and conditioning and needs. Black-and-white is by far the most comfortable place to live, and there are times when grays look upon that place with envy. But grays haven't arrived where we are easily or quickly, and, once there, it is impossible to

And so we look at the history of the Ten Commandments, the different forms in which they appear, and how posting them in the schools might conflict with the intent of the Constitution. We examine the subtleties of meaning, the confusion with such current widely acceptable human activities as war, capital punishment and the worship of money, and we wonder who will

clarify these conflicts for the school children.


And when a patriot says, "My country, right or wrong," we tend to say, "Well, now, hold on

a minute. In his letter to me, Jim de Boom wrote: "With Zero Toler-

ance you know what the rule is. . Families have rules. Businesses have rules, Religion has rules. Newspapers have rules. Schools have rules."


Of course they do. We grays subscribe heartily to the necessity of rules. Without them, we would have chaos. We just think those rules should be crafted with fairness and reasonable objectivity rather than moral absolutes.





Like much of the rest of Honduras, this town was ravaged by the destructive winds and torrential rains of Hurricane Mitch, and Sister Teresita has been struggling to find clothing, toothbrushes and money to send children to school. The girls want to help out.

Basically, we're raising money so these kids can have clothing and food, and bedding, and amenities that we take for granted," said 14-year-old Sara.

Chattering to her friends, watching television and going about her days in a comfortable house on a tidy Costa Mesa street, Ana seems just like thousands of other young people in

Newport-Mesa. But she didn't start out this

way. Ten years ago, Ana's mother, Carol Burke, a professor of English at OCC, flew to the tiny town of San Pedra Sula, Through Sister Teresita, Burke met a woman named Maribel, who was too poor to support her children and asked Burke to raise one of

her daughters - that's Ana.

Many of Maribel's other children have gone to live in a home. run by Sister Teresita in San Pedra Sula, and Burke and Ana have stayed in touch with them, even spending a year living in San Pedra and visiting with Ana's Central American family.

Ana said she thinks of Burke as her mother, but has stayed in touch with her biological family as well. Photographs of them adorn her house.

So when Burke won a bicycle in a raffle at a local supermarket last spring, her first thought was not how much fun it would be to ride it, or even how much she could sell if for. It was "What can this bike do for the people of San Pedro Sula?

The girls decided to raffle it off to raise money. They asked a friend who owned a cabin in the mountains to donate a weekend, and they tossed that in the raffle too. They plan to hold the raffle Sept. 12, one week after school begins so they have time to hit up teachers and school friends as well.

As they were making their plans, Burke learned that Sister Teresita herself would be visiting



Owner demands apolog

Tom Moore wants a retraction from the radio talk show host, or his day in court.

SOUTH COAST PLAZA -The attorney for Beach Access surf shop in South Coast Plaza issued a warning to Laura Schlessinger Wednesday: Publicly apologize or face a prescription that includes a lawsuit claiming defamation of character, slander and trade libel.

"We're demanding a retraction because there is damage being done, and the sooner it's taken care of, the better things will be for my client," said Andrew Guilford, the attorney for Beach Access owner Tom Moore and manager Ryan Scheiber.

The controversy began about two weeks ago when the popular radio personality known by her fans as "Dr. Laura" walked into the Beach Access surf shop in South Coast Plaza.

After noticing a Big Brother skateboarding magazine, published by Hustler magazine boss Larry Flynt, and talking to

Scheiber, Schlessinger left the

store vowing never to return. Schlessinger then told her radio audience, estimated at 18 million people, that the store had a porn magazine on its shelf and

urged them not to shop there. "My goal was to protect children from exposure to [pornographic] material," Schlessinger said.

However, Guilford said, Schlessinger was out of line.

"Schlessinger's stated purpose of protecting children is commendable," Guilford said. "But people like her who are provided with powerful forums have a high calling to act responsibly.

"If you have a bully pulpit, you don't have to be a bully. Dr. Laura acted like a bull in a china closet, and the china closet is the Beach Access store.'

Guilford said if the comments were not retracted within a "reasonable" amount of time, he would file a suit seeking damages for defaming the store, its owner

and manager and for libelous and slanderous statements.

Schlessinger's spokeswoman and the general manager of her show, Keven Bellows, said the entire episode is "ridiculous" and that the talk show host has

attempted to reach Moore. "We both have left messages for him," Bellow said. "He's having lots of fun. This is Tom Moore's 15 minutes of fame, and he's milking it for all it's worth."

Shock jock Howard Stern and colleague Tom Leykis of KLSX radio last week blasted Schlessinger's comments. Stern said Schlessinger should "stop picking on the little guys," while Leykis railed at her for militant actions.

"Dr. Laura is using a nuclear weapon to kill a bug," Leykis

Stern and Leykis both urged listeners to patronize the store in support of Moore and Scheiber, who was confronted by Schlessinger about the magazine.



No shouting about the bridge

Group supporting 19th Street bridge complains city won't listen; consultant says city told him 'no bridge.

WEST SIDE — A potential shouting match on the proposed 19th Street bridge was squelched before major discussion got started at Tuesday's West Side Specific Plan

workshop. A small grass-roots group of residents who support a bridge at the end of 19th Street -19th to the Beach - showed up in force at the meeting carrying placards reading "A Bridge to the Beach Makes Sense" and "We Want the

Bob Graham, a founding member of the group, said he

believed their "legitimate input" had been ignored during the public outreach process for the West Side Specific Plan. He said none of their input promoting a bridge had been included in any of the reports produced by EIP, an urban planning firm.

They're trying to shut us out for recommending new ideas," Graham said.

Woodie Tescher of EIP told Graham and the public that his firm had been instructed by the council to prepare the West Side Specific Plan with the assumption the bridge would not be built.

Representatives from the County Sheriff's Department and the Costa Mesa and Newport Beach police departments met Wednesday morning to begin discussing options for the homeless in Talbert Park. While nothing was resolved in the two-hour meeting, police feel confident that over the next two months, an ami-

cable resolution can be found. While homelessness has been an issue in the community for years, police said there has been more activity among transients in the park. Over the last six months, there have been sporadic reports of crime ranging from

burglary to sexual assault. More recently, there was a 2acre fire - cause yet unknown - in the park and a pit buil that lunged at a police officer who shot the dog in the

A police helicopter routinely scans the area with a special infrared system that detects sources of heat. During one patrol, at least a dozen camps were spotted

scattered around the park, authorities said.

Some residents who live in condominium complex above the park have complained about the noise below, saying they hear loud shouting and the occasional chorus of barking dogs. Others express empathy for the plight of the transients.

You can't sweep them under the carpet ... you must help them out," said Jim Schabarum, who has lived in the area for 17 years. "They are annoying the rest of us, but you have to find a solution at least give them an alterna-

Schabarum suggested trimming the trees and bushes to expose some of the camps. He believes the city should find a spot where homeless people can sleep and shower instead of pushing them into another area.

But both city officials and law enforcement know the answer won't come easy.

"I don't know if you can appease everyone when dealing with the homeless problem," FitzPatrick said. "That's why you need a coordinated effort to ensure everyone's voice is heard."







A few guys filming a beauty pageant may not sound particularly creative, but "Drop Dead Gorgeous" bursts with originality and creativity, pulling numerous, consistent gags that had me in hyster-

This film will survive mostly by word of mouth, since its publicity hasn't been that great. But this politically incorrect comedy ranks right up there with the "South Park" movie and last year's irreverent "There's Something About Mary."

What's Cooking? You'll be glad that you asked

took yet another well-quali-fied group of critics to What's Cooking Bistro, a familyowned Italian restaurant on San Miguel Drive in Newport Beach. My family liked almost everything about this little secret, from the appetizers to the desserts. They even hemmed and hawed over the wine list.

But I must tell you, I just couldn't get past the name. What's Cooking Bistro? Nothing Italian about it. What do you mean What's Cooking? We hope food is cooking. Our food. At least it's not named Who's Cooking? Then I might as well be at

However, call yourself what-

ever you want if you are going to serve food

like this: fresh fish and fresh tomatoes; ravioli, gnocchi and tortellini homemade by 85-yearold Grandma Maria every day of the week; unique sauces and artistic presentations. And with Chef Bret Young at the helm, you are in much safer hands than you would be at my home.

Still, I had to find out why the name. Lucia Luhan (mother of Jorge and Jason Luhan, the owners) and other family members were sitting about discussing potential names for their future restaurant when Papa Luhan walked in through the front door asking his usual question, "What's cooking?" Thus the name, whether I liked it or not.

What's Cooking Bistro is an elegant little getaway, but you might not know that at first sight. They have a casual patio with the red-and-white checkered tablecloths, an atmosphere than mixes well the green and red paint on the windows and makes you think of one or two other Italian restaurants.

But once you enter the restaurant, wrapping around a beautiful teak bar with sleek wood chairs and tables, accented with wrought iron and soft lighting, you realize you are in the kind of place that makes you immediately want to order a glass of your favorite wine and enjoy your escape. And What's Cooking has your favorite wine, and my favorite, and even the Dom Perignon crowd's favorite. The offer a sure-to-please list of Californian and Italian reds and whites, and a nice but smaller selection by the glass.

We got down to the serious business of eating. In my family this could be a dangerous business as well. When today's catch of calamari (\$7.95), cut in strips and not your standard circles and tentacles, landed in front of us, you were liable to lose a hand if your timing wasn't just right. Serving this with a spicy, chunky marinara - loaded with garlic for dipping only, added to the delicious risk.

My sister, a well-known salad hater, raved about the Insalata della Casa (\$4.95), the house salad loaded with blue cheese and dressed in a balsalmic-based vinaigrette, with cherry tomatoes like candy. This is big news. The buffalo mozzarella in the Caprese (\$6.95) was fresh and light, but I wanted more.

More arrived. Much more. And the critics were ready. My mother, testing the chef, ordered the risotto, one of those do-or-die dishes. It arrived generous with seafood and fresh vegetables with a zing of lemon. He passed. My father, going one further, asked for veal parmesan, an item

not on the menu. "No problem," smiled our waiter, Bill. And while they may or may not appreciate this at What's Cooking, this dish was worth ordering, crispy and tender and served with a mountain of mashed potatoes and fresh vegetables. Linguini Luciana's (\$16.95), a seafood pasta, was served with a not-toozesty marinara sauce, but with no shortage of scallops, shrimp, clams and mussels.

The gnocchi with pesto, gorgonzola and walnuts (\$12.95) received high marks for both its richness and how good it felt in your mouth. For those of you who really like to feel your food, this is your dish. But it was the Costoletto di Maiale (\$17.95), a

marinated rack of pork served with horseradish cream sauce and fried leeks that took home the gold, something this particular group of critics rarely dishes out. My husband would call this a destination dish, a dish worth going back for again, and again.

For dessert, we went with the vanilla bean gelato and the chocolate hazelnut gelato, both served with fresh berries and an almond biscotti. Yum.

And Bill reminded us of a dear friend, all grown up, we had to like our him. He was funny and friendly, remembered our entire order after we did our best to confuse him, served our food at a leisurely pace, and wanted to throw me a birthday party even though it wasn't my birthday (my kind of guy). You can't get better service than that.

We will now consider ourselves part of the regular crowd at What's Cooking Bistro, and if, on any given day, my husband should muster the courage to ask me, "What's for dinner?" the answer will be "Well, What's

A lesson from Big Brother

Publicity, even the bad kind, isn't always harmful; just ask Dr. Laura and the Beach Access staff

here's no such thing as bad, publicity. Just ask Beach Access surf shop owner Tom Moore. His store at South Coast Plaza became the epicenter of a sizable media quake last week after radio talk show host Laura Schlessinger paid a visit to the shop with her son and noticed a copy of Big Brother magazine, which is published by Larry Flynt of Hustler fame.

In case you hadn't heard, Hustler once ran unauthorized, decades-old nude photos of Schlessinger, who in her syndicated show advises her listeners on matters of morality.

She told her listeners - 18 million of them — about what she saw. She called the magazine pornographic and chastised the store for carrying such salacious material in a place that's geared toward youngsters. She vowed never to return - and urged her listeners to do likewise.

It's hard to know who to root for in this controversy. We know pornography when we see it, and we couldn't find any in Big Brother magazine. The language is coarse and the tone is flippant, but sex on skateboards it's not.


Still, Schlessinger had a complaint and, according to her, was treated rudely by the store manager. The Nordstrom touch would have diffused everything.

Instead, the story made ink in the local papers and then got picked up by the wires. Moore refuted Schlessinger's claims, said the magazine isn't pornographic and is threatening to file suit, saying she "has definitely done some damage." He said the store was swamped with calls from angry Dr. Laura fans who were "swearing ... and yelling at our employees."

And then things really started shaking. Syndicated shock jock Howard Stern went on the air next, blasting Schlessinger, saying her real disagreement is with Flynt, and she should leave Moore and his store alone. Then Stern went one step further and urged his listeners to shop there.

Then came Tom Leykis, another radio talk show host, who echoed Stern's sentiments and again urged listeners to visit the store.

And they did. Ray Reyes traveled to Beach Access all



the way from Moorpark after hearing Stem's show.

"Howard's right, Dr. Laura is picking on the little guy here," Reyes said.

Less than two weeks ago, few had ever heard of Beach Access much less shopped

Whatever side you land on, this much is certain; Millions of people now know the name Beach Access, and some who have been drawn there would have never stepped foot in the store had it not been for all the hype.

Talk about free advertising.

Readers back Dr. Laura Schlessinger's stand

s a longtime reader of the Daily Pilot and a longtime Alistener of Dr. Laura Schlessinger, I felt compelled to write you regarding the today's article on page four titled "Shop owner considers suing radio host" (July 29). Having heard both Schlessinger's on-air comments about the experience she and her son had at Beach Access and the interview Tom Moore did on the local television news as well as reading his comments in your article, I was frustrated by his lack of disclosure of the whole truth of the situation.

Schlessinger was very clear that after seeing the magazine in question (while waiting to purchase a sizable quantity of surf shorts and T-shirts that her son had selected), she politely asked to speak to the manager. When she asked the store manager on duty if the store was aware of the affiliations and contents of the magazine (giving them the benefit of the doubt), he responded that they did, that the magazine was there on purpose,

and would remain there. During her discussion of the incident with her listeners, she even offered ways that the young man could have handled the situation to better advantage the store (i.e. - "Yes, I hear that you are concerned. Why don't I take it off the floor and discuss it

with the owner?"). Your staff writer Stacy Brown made it sound as though Schlessinger simply walked in, saw the magazine, made a pronouncement about it and walked out. Moore stated, "I wish she would have called before she went on the air.

The truth is that she and her son were shopping there. She

did have a discussion with the store manager to express her concerns that day and left regretfully because of the response she received from the manager. If Moore is angry about the situation, I suggest he direct his anger, and perhaps a short course in customer relations, to the young man who was store manager for that day. He handled the situation badly, losing a sizable sale in the short term, and giving the store a "black eye" in the public relations department for the long

I would further suggest that Moore spend a little more time researching items that come into his store "for promotional use" before he allows them to go out on the floor. Having 20- and 22year-old sons, I am familiar with and have patronized Beach Access in the past and know that the store is characterized by a sort of cutting-edge feel. Unfortunately for Moore, this time he is the one who has been left bleeding.



LIKE THE WATCH, SHE JUST KEEPS TICKING

■ Longtime OCC coach is still a leader by example.

t's something that can never be taken away from

Longtime Orange
Coast College Coach
Barbara Bond will always have
the distinction of being the
only women's soccer coach in the
school's storied history.

"It's a pretty neat title to have," Bond said. "I remember I was coaching field hockey and we weren't getting enough people to participate. I asked Dick Tucker about starting a soccer team and he thought it might be a gamble. Our first-ever team had only one player who had ever played soccer before."

Still with the enthusiasm of a rookie, Bond still keeps going at a fever pitch.

"It's easy, because I truly enjoy what I do," Bond said. "Anytime you enjoy your work, it's not really work at all."

Bond grew up in Southern California and earned her B.A. in physical education at Long Beach State University in 1971 and her M.A. in 1973.

Before joining Orange Coast College, Bond coached Foothill High to a CIF Southern Section swimming champi onship. Success has seemed to

follow Bond in each sport she has been a part of. As an athlete, Bond competed on two collegiate national volleyball

champion teams at Long Beach State and three national open volleyball title winners.

Upon joining OCC, Bond became the softball coach from 1978-87, compiling a 170-144 record. Her 170 wins are the second-highest in OCC's softball history.

"The toughest thing for me to get used to as a coach was to sit still and observe," Bond said. "After playing sports for so long, just watching was difficult at first."

Bond's coaching legacy, however, will be best remembered in women's soccer, where she helped guide the Pirates to seven conference titles and two state crowns in her 17 seasons as coach, compiling a 210-80-37 career record.

"I pride myself on the fact that all my teams really enjoyed playing with each other," Bond said. "I can't remember ever coaching a team that didn't have fun. Of course, winning makes it fun, too."

Bond Despite witning two state titles in 1986 and 1989, Bond still has a fond remembrance to her 1988 team.

"We were just awesome that season," Bond remembers.
"We hadn't lost a game the entire season and we were 20-0-1 going into the final game, before we lost in double overtime. We even had two goals taken away from us in that

game.

"Then the next year, we lose four and tie four and win the whole thing," Bond continued.

"Just goes to show that you never know."

Included in Bond's hectic coaching and teaching schedule this season is a trip to Florida for the Senior Olympics in October, where Bond will compete in softball.

"I've always loved softball and baseball," Bond said. "I just had knee surgery and I've been doing a lot of therapy and conditioning. I'll be playing shortstop and I can't wait. It should be a blast." With all her success, even

With all her success, even Bond knows that she has only so much control of her team's outcome each season.

"To be successful, a little luck needs to be involved," Bond admitted. "Team chemistry and personality is another factor. A coach can only do so much for their team. The players have got to want it as much as you do."

Bond has two children. Her son, Kai, 20 and daughter, Brett, 17, are also at Orange Coast, which makes it fun for Mom.

"They're very supportive,"
Bond said. "They've both played sports in the past and it really makes me value what I do, because I've watched them play under some not-so-good coaches. It's a fun job, but it's not as easy as it looks. To be able to do it year-in and year-out, it really is a talent."

Always the competitor, Bond likes to keep with the top of the coaching elite at OCC.

"What keeps me going is the people I work with," Bond said. "I have such a high respect for all of them. They just make me work harder and harder each year."

n a series that attempts to capture the essence of the finest Newport-Mesa athletes this century, steps are retraced, legacies are written about and old war stories are rehashed.

But if our tiny pocket of the sports world had to select the absolute best "athletes" we could find as the end of an era nears, Estancia High's Scott Gayner would probably make the Top-10 list and perhaps be considered for the overall prize, if such a thing existed.

Versatile and talented, the 6-foot-2 Gayner played anywhere on the football field, including tailback, quarterback, punter and kicker. In the winter, he served as the Eagles' captain and ballhandler in basketball. In the spring, tennis was his racket.

"The sport I liked Scott Gayner best was tennis. I loved hand-eye sports," said Gayner, a professional racquetball player who once beat Marty Hogan and, with Mark Susson, placed third at the 1975 U.S. National Doubles in Las Vegas.

Gayner, who also played on the U.S. Volleyball Association team while working on his masters degree in economics at the University of Colorade, picked up football again at Chapman College, before the Panthers dropped their program in the early 1980s.

As a tailback in 1980, Gayner averaged over 200 yards a game and made honorable mention NAIA All-American as Chapman (now a university) competed as a club team and went 8-0 in the regular season.

"We got invited to play in the Heritage Bowl in Providence, Rhode Island, and we got killed (against Providence)," Gayner said. "It was 16 below zero with a wind-chill factor and most of the guys had never been out of Southern California."

Gayner, who'd already completed his undergraduate degree at UCLA, played one season for Chapman while working on his MBA.

The cousin for former
Newport Harbor High and
UCLA'quarterback Steve
Bukich, Gayner was blessed with
speed and strength, and coming
dut of Estancia, was recruited by
Homer Smith, UCLA's offensive
coordinator at the time under
Pepper Rodgers.

But the Bruins had a couple of running backs named Kermit Johnson and James McAlister and Gayner suffered a broken ankle his senior year, after the Eagles opened the 1972 fall campaign 5-1.

"I decided to go to UCLA for academics, but Homer Smith still wanted me to

walk-on," said Gayner, who opted to focus on racquetball, in which he was earning prize money.

"The one who taught me how to play racquetball was Charlie Brande, who back then was using a big wooden racket with little holes," said Gayner, who later won a silver medal at the Amateur Athletic Union Championships.

Gayner, Estancia's Athlete of the Year for the 1972-73 school year, once played on a state championship Pop Warner football team (the Colts) with Dan Princeotto and Mike Magner When Magner, a quarterback, transferred from Servite to Estancia, the trio was reunited.

Estancia that year, also featuring All-CIF center Vince Klees, defeated several powers, including Corona del Mar, 14-7, when Gayner scored both touchdowns. But on the game's last play, a CdM player rolled into Gayner's ankle while he was covering the ball. The Eagles lost their last three games and missed the playoffs.

Gayner, who averaged 61 yards on three punts against CdM, also kicked both extra points as Estancia won in the final minute. He also booted a

57-yard field goal against Costa Mesa, a 32-20 Eagle win.

Selected to play in the Orange County All-Star football game, Gayner chose instead to stay with his plans of taking a European vacation as a graduation present with his good buddy, Mark Pender.

yner "Looking back on it, I wish I'd played in that game," Gayner said. "It was just

a once-in-a-lifetime deal."

In basketball, Gayner was
Coach Dave Carlisle's point
guard. But, painfully, an
overtime loss in Irvine League
play to heavily favored CdM
sticks in Gayner's memory bank.

CdM had stars Jeff Wharton, Casey Jones and Matt Keough, one of Gayner's best friends today. But the Eagles had a three-point lead in the waning seconds and only needed to run out the clock to pull off the upset.

One of the Estancia forwards, however, signaled for a timeout when the team had none left. CdM cashed in by sinking a free throw on the ensuing technical foul, then scored a field goal at the buzzer to send the game into OT, eventually winning, 53-52.

In tennis, Gayner was a four-year letterman and won the league doubles title in 1973 with Tony Sawoya.

But Gayner's most unforgettable time of the court occurred during the Hawaii Invitational, when Brande filled in as a stand-in coach for Jim Jenner and ended up playing doubles with Gayner under the alias Ruby Begonia, because Gayner's partner got sick.

"Charlie Brande was very young at the time, and we ended up winning the tournament," Gayner said.

These days, Gayner, 44, builds affordable senior housing communities, after going into business with Gary Davidson, founder of the World Football League and American Basketball Association. The Woodpark Development in Aliso Viejo, one of the state's largest low-income tax credit projects, is among Gayner's business accolades.

"(Davidson) was my mentor,"
Gayner said. "I followed him
when I was a boy passing out
towels at the Balboa Bay Club.
I was there when he was going
through the hardships of the
(WFL) folding. I learned the
senior housing business from
him."

Gayner's father, Wally, built Mesa Verde Country Club, and his sister, Kyle, was an international gymnast:

Gayner, who lives in Newport Beach and has two sons, Sam, 10, and Cassidy, 9, is a member of the Daily Pilot Sports Hall of Fame, celebrating the millennium.


