

## Fast cars, not-so-fancy gems don't mix

The Newport Beach man told police he thought it was his lucky day when he swapped a pair of limited edition Mercedes-Benz and a \$100,000 handcrafted French sports car for the precious gems.

The stones, he told the police, were said to be worth hundreds of thousands of dollars. There were even papers to prove it, he said.

But what the unidentified Newport man got, police now claim, were inferior gems that "if you could even find a buyer" would barely buy back one of his cars.

When police unraveled what they alleged was a con job, they arrested 42-year-old Robert Ogle on conspiracy to commit grand theft charges. Ogle is being held in lieu of \$250,000 bail.

Court records show that this isn't the first time Ogle, a resi-

dent in Newport's Mariners area, has been hit with such charges.

In 1978, the Orange County Superior Court ordered him to pay a man named William Van Loben Sels \$5,300 for a diamond ring that allegedly turned out to be worth only a fraction of its stated value.

Sels and his wife told the court that he bought the ring at an auction at Ogle's business, Newport Galleries. He testified

that Ogle said the stone was worth more than \$10,000 and produced papers to prove it.

Later, though, Sels said a gem expert appraised the rock at \$2,500.

Stanley Behrens also sued Ogle in 1978 and was awarded a settlement of \$40,500. Again the allegation centered around diamonds.

Behrens testified he paid \$21,000 for two diamonds. He told the court that Ogle prom-

ised the stones would bring in at least \$64,000 on a "fast turnover."

According to the court documents, Behrens later discovered the diamonds were worth less than \$10,000.

In still another case, Joseph Milton was awarded \$18,000 after he sued Ogle and the Newport Galleries. Again it was a diamond at the heart of the dispute.

Police claim that, in all, there

have been 24 suits brought against Ogle or his business. Further, they say, since Ogle's arrest, other persons alleging to be victims have contacted police investigators.

In 1979, Ogle made news when he told police in Hawthorne that he had been robbed of \$2.2 million in diamonds.

One detective, who remembers the case well, says Ogle

## Nader says shut down Onofre

### Consumer advocate contends Nuke plant isn't safe

Consumer advocate Ralph Nader Friday asked the government to shut down the San Onofre nuclear reactor, saying the facility has "very serious safety problems" because of its location in an earthquake-prone area, the Associated Press reported.

Nader made the request in a letter to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, asking that the NRC review the plant's license and order the reactor shut down during the review, the report said.

Nader pointed to past safety problems at the San Onofre facility and its nearness to a "volatile" earthquake fault, and called it "among the most ill-conceived and dangerous nuclear power plants in America."

A spokesman for the plant's operator disputed some information in Nader's letter, including his judgment on the ability of the plant to withstand a strong earthquake.

Joseph Fouchard, a spokesman for the NRC, said the commission had not received Nader's letter and would consider the matter once it did.

Dave Barron, a spokesman for Southern California Edison Co., noted that the company is now trying to get two more reactors licensed at its San Onofre plant and characterized the Nader let-

ter as "part of the anti-nuclear propaganda that they're pushing right now."

In the letter, Nader maintained that the Newport-Inglewood fault, located four miles offshore from the plant, is capable of producing a tremor of 7.5 on the Richter Scale but that the operating reactor is capable of withstanding a quake of only 5 on that scale.

### Iowa woman displays talents in Costa Mesa

Norma "Duffy" Lyon has just about cornered the market on beating the summer heat at the Orange County Fair.

While fairgoers are cooling off with ice cold soft drinks and frosty snow cones, the Toledo, Iowa native has to don a long-sleeve shirt, sweat shirt, jeans, terry cloth socks and heavy overalls.

When she steps into her Orange County Building display booth, the temperature drops about 40 degrees. It's the perfect climate for her life-size sculpture of a Jersey dairy cow fashioned with butter.

"People don't realize how cold it's supposed to be," she said of her 42-degree walk-in cooler. "It's colder than normal air conditioning. There's a wind chill factor in there from the fans that blow that make 42 degrees feel like 32 degrees."

The icy temperature gives the creamy material the consistency of clay, she said. At higher temperatures, the 500 pounds of butter wouldn't hold its form on the wood and hardware cloth frame.

## Rioting spreads

### 'Battle of Britain' in London slums

LONDON (AP) — Fierce street fighting broke out in London and the week-long rash of urban rioting spread to two more provincial cities Friday night.

Home Secretary William Whitelaw signed an order banning demonstrations in greater London for a month in a bid to restore order. A Home Office spokesman said the order would take effect at 6 a.m. today.

Disturbances started in the port city of Hull and the Lancashire town of Preston for the first time since the rioting began last Friday. Mobs of youths have waged nightly battles with police in four cities, including Liverpool, where riots last Sunday night were England's worst in 200 years.

In London, following daylight looting and fights with the police by hundreds of West Indians, Africans and some whites in the battle-scarred slum district of

Brixton, looting and rioting started after dark in eight districts.

At midnight, Scotland Yard said there had been 143 arrests in London, 30 policemen hurt and "dozens" of civilians injured.

A Hull police spokesman just before midnight said "large public order disturbances" were under way in the center of the city, on northern England's East Coast.

Lancashire police said there was a "public order problem" in the town of Preston, about 30 miles north of Liverpool.

London districts where rioting and looting erupted after dark included Burnt Oak, Acton, Walthamstow, Southall, Dalston, Clapham, Battersea and Streatham.

In Burnt Oak, police reported crowds of youths smashed shop windows and carried merchan-

dise away in the supermarket shopping carts.

More than 1,000 youths clashed with police in Walthamstow, where one man was hit with an ax and hospitalized in serious condition, police said. They said most of the rioters were nonwhites.

Burglar alarms shrieked incessantly from looted shops in Brixton, where hundreds of policemen were out in full riot gear.

Brixton, with a large population of West Indian descent, was the scene of bloody racial violence three months ago — the worst riots in memory until this week.

In the daytime fighting Friday, youths hurled bricks and bottles at officers in riot gear and set a car on fire, a police spokesman said.

Three policemen were reported injured before order was restored in about one hour.

## Huntington firms fined for towing

Owners of a liquor store and a towing company in Huntington Beach were fined a combined \$8,000 Friday by an Orange County Superior Court judge for unfair business practices involving quick tow aways of vehicles parked in the store's lot.

Eldon Bagstad, owner of El Don Liquor Store on Pacific Coast Highway north of Main Street, and Charles James, owner of Ace Towing Co., also were permanently enjoined from future unfair towing practices by Judge Luis A. Cardenas.

James' company was forbidden from charging any fees other than those for towing and storage of automobiles, according to Deputy District Attorney Tom Buck.

Bagstad was forbidden from ordering cars towed out of his parking lot until a sign is posted specifically stating the time limits under which motorists may leave their vehicles there, Buck said.

He said the fines and the permanent injunction against unfair towing policies are part of a stipulated agreement by James and Bagstad in place of a jury trial in the civil case filed by the Orange County District Attorney's Office.

## Farmers say spray less risky from air

FRESNO (AP) — San Joaquin Valley farm leaders, pleased that Gov. Brown agreed Friday on aerial spraying to eradicate a medfly threat, said aerial applications offer less risk to people than ground spraying.

"Right now, there's a greater risk from ground spraying than aerial because it is more concentrated," said Gary Hurley, a Kern County Farm Bureau spokesman.

That view was echoed by Rep. William Thomas, R-Calif., who represents the southern San Joaquin Valley.

"Intensive ground spraying would present greater human exposure to malathion," Thomas said.

Don Rosendahl, president of

Fresno County Farm Bureau, defended the insecticide as safe despite concerns from Santa Clara Valley residents that aerial spraying might cause health problems later or endanger unborn children.

"I used to be in the commercial spraying business," Rosendahl said. "I have had malathion running off me and had no ill effects. My sons are big healthy boys, not malformed or anything."

Valley spokesmen said Brown should have ordered aerial spraying much earlier to eradicate the threat and prevent the possibility of a quarantine on

## Experts disagree about pesticide

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The sticky footed, blue-eyed Mediterranean fruit fly drops dead when exposed to malathion. People don't — but that's about all scientists agree on when asked about the pesticide's health effects.

Malathion, created in Nazi Germany during World War II, has been used for years to control insects. It is sprayed over New Orleans with no apparent ill-effects and has been used by other cities.

The state is gearing up to spray it over Santa Clara County to control the year-long Medfly infestation.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. said he feared adverse health effects from aerial spraying when, on Wednesday, he decided against such action. He changed his mind Friday after a federal threat to quarantine state produce if aerial spraying didn't start by Monday.

Despite the lack of direct evidence that malathion causes birth defects or cancer, some lab studies indicate that it can. However, the Environmental Protection Agency, which licenses malathion for use on food crops, says it has a good safety record.

"That doesn't mean that these things won't happen at any dosage level that one could conceive of, but at least at the levels that would be involved there are no problems," said Dr. William Durham, senior science adviser at the EPA's Health Effects Research Laboratory at

Research Triangle Park, N.C.

Durham said in a telephone interview Friday that malathion has been in use since the early 1950s and is commonly used in home insecticides.

He said malathion, an organophosphate similar to nerve gases, works by essentially short-circuiting transmission of

## Inmates making travel plans

The Orange County Men's Jail in Santa Ana has about 265 inmates officials can't wait to get rid of and one other who can't wait to leave.

He is William Bonin, chief suspect in the so-called freeway killings. Bonin pleaded innocent Friday to 33 felony charges in Orange County Municipal Court in connection with seven slayings.

He also asked, through his lawyer, to be returned to his cell at the Los Angeles County Jail as soon as possible.

Attorney Earl Hanson told Superior Court Judge William Murray Friday that "Mr. Bonin has informed me that he has received threats."

Murray told Bonin that he will be transported to Los Angeles on Tuesday when an Orange County sheriff's bus makes its next regular run.

Sheriff's Lt. Lewis Stavenhagen said Bonin told authorities he was unhappy with Orange County because other inmates had spit on him while he was waiting for his court appearance in a courthouse holding cell.

While Bonin has been kept in a separate cell, about 265 inmates from San Diego County have been crowded into cells on other floors as labor negotiations with deputies in their county continue.

However, all of the visiting inmates were scheduled to be

transported back to San Diego County facilities in Vista and Los Colinas beginning at 8:30 a.m. today.

The inmates were sent to Orange County 11 days ago when San Diego County deputies threatened to strike. Deputies did leave their jobs, but returned this week.

Orange County officials have been anxious to have the inmates returned to San Diego County to ease crowded conditions by this weekend.

Slaying suspect Bonin also asked Judge Murray to order that he receive salt with his meals in jail. Murray, apparently aware of an old jail policy, refused the request by claiming that no salt is provided because a former inmate once had saved his helpings until one day when he threw salt into a deputy's eyes.

But Stavenhagen said later that Bonin should have received salt but didn't because none was supplied on his food cart.

He said deputies now season food outside prisoners, cells with salt and pepper shakers that are supposed to come from the jail kitchen.

Bonin's dissatisfaction with Orange County isn't bothering David Carter, the deputy district attorney prosecuting the case.

Said Carter: "Mr. Bonin apparently doesn't like Orange County. He's fearful of the citizens, the community and the jurors. He much prefers Los Angeles County."

## Link nixed in molest, strangling

Police Friday ruled out the possibility of a connection between the strangulation murder of a 7-year-old Anaheim boy last week and the near choking death and molestation of a 10-year-old Fountain Valley girl days earlier.

Anaheim Detective Randall Gaston said police have nearly eliminated the possibility of any link between the strangulation of Jeffrey David Vargo and the girl who was kidnapped and sexually assaulted before being left for dead along a lonely stretch of road, near where Gypsum Canyon intersects with Santa Ana Canyon Road.

"We're reaching a point now where we consider a connection very remote," said detective Gaston. "The only connection is that they occurred in the same week and the beginning of one was five miles from the end of the other."

The Vargo boy disappeared last Thursday evening enroute to a fireworks stand near his home. His body was discovered the next morning at a construction site in Pomona.

Police found his abandoned bicycle behind a shopping center near Santa Ana Canyon Road and Imperial Highway, roughly five miles from where the Fountain Valley girl was strangled June 29 and left for dead.

The Orange County Sheriff's Department released a composite sketch of a man in his late 30's who drove a late model car and is considered a suspect in the girl's abduction and molestation.

## 8 still missing in fire

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Eight people were still missing Friday night after a fire termed suspicious burned half a city block and created tons of debris before dawn in one of San Francisco's worst conflagrations since the 1906 earthquake.

Deputy Fire Chief Emmet Condon said a list of names of people who may have occupied some of the buildings revealed at least eight unaccounted for. But he said "they may be staying with friends or relatives. We just don't know."

Condon said the fire started in a building that formerly housed a gay bathhouse and then raced through the block, destroying 14 buildings, damaging 10 more and burning 15 vehicles.

Although no bodies were initially found in the tons of debris, Condon said the search would continue into today.

He said damage to the buildings exceeded \$4 million.

Condon said there were reports that some of the buildings may have had quarters where homosexuals engaged in sadomasochistic rituals.

The area is frequented by homosexuals. Dozens of men in leather jackets stood outside and watched the blaze, sometimes comforting each other. Brown smoke rose into the robin-blue morning sky.

"There may have been people chained to beds," Casper said, referring to reports that a sadomasochistic "slave quarters" was located at the back of an alley in the area where the fire began.

At least five persons suffered minor injuries, including two firemen, two residents and a passerby. The Red Cross reported 15 persons left homeless.

Casper said the flames spread with such speed that for a time it seemed there might not be enough manpower, although about 220 firefighters battled the five-alarm blaze, the largest number of alarms possible.

Newport Beach resident Gerald M. Shaw has been elected president of the Orange County Board of Education by his fellow board members. He will serve a one-year term in the post.

Shaw, a partner in a Newport Beach law firm replaced former board President A.E. Arnold, who had served 12 consecutive years in the post. Arnold has been named president emeritus of the board by fellow board members.

Shaw also is vice president of the California Republican Assembly and a member of the Republican Associates, California Republican State Central Committee and the South Coast Republican Forum.

told police he and his wife were on their way to the Los Angeles International Airport to transport the diamonds to Saudi Arabia where a buyer was waiting.

The spokesmen at the auction company, at the corner of the coast highway at Tustin Avenue, claim Ogle has nothing to do with their business.

Bullish on dairy products, she combined her animal science background and a sculpture course into her brand of food art.

"I try to make a true type animal — not just any cow," she explained. "I try to copy a winner or a high (milk) producer — a cow that doesn't have a lot of faults."

"When I first started it was hard for some people to believe that this one big chunk of food could look like something."

And since she hates to waste any food, the butter, donated by a local dairy, will be given to a rendering works to make livestock feed or soap.

Her repertoire of works include a variety of dairy cows, hogs, sheep, beef steer and she plans to mold tubs of the yellow bread companion around the frame of a life-size Clydesdale horse with harness. "I'll have to have a ladder to do his head," she mused.

Naturally, when you catch Mrs. Lyon chattering on the CB radio, it'd be impossible to not to recall her handle — butter-fingers.

She's also a member of a national weight-loss group and, ironically, has thought about sculpting a 45-pound animal to celebrate the weight she managed to melt from her body.

Her artistic medium may not be the favorite among the diet soda set, but Mrs. Lyon boasted butter's other advantages.

"It makes lovely, soft skin," she said. "If it didn't smell weird, I'd use it as a hand lotion."

## Laguna Hills water rates to go up 6.1%

The California Public Utilities Commission has authorized the Laguna Hills Water Co. to increase its rates by 6.1 percent effective immediately.

In granting the rate hike, the commission took into account the increasing costs to the company of purchasing water, according to Carole Kretzer, a public information officer for the commission.

Under the new rates authorized, bills for a typical residential usage of 1,500 cubic feet of water a month will go up 78 cents.

Homeowners paying an average monthly bill of \$15.29 will now pay \$16.07. The Laguna Hills Water Co. serves about 20,650 customers in Leisure World and the surrounding area.

all California fruit and vegetables.

"We felt he should have done it sooner," said Stanislaus County Agriculture Commissioner Hugh Sinclair. "At least, this will alleviate the possibility of an immediate quarantine on our local products."

Tulare County Farm Bureau President Ron Michaelis said he was "very disappointed that he (Brown) fooled around with this whole matter."

Bob Odom, Louisiana's commissioner of agriculture said malathion — an organic phosphate with a sharp, distinctive odor reminiscent of a stale lockerroom — is probably the most commonly used pesticide in the state.

"We investigate damage complaints in the Department of Agriculture, and we have never had a damage complaint reported to us because of malathion," he said.

"I sprayed my shrubs and garden with it yesterday," he said.

Odom said his experience with insect control in Louisiana agriculture indicated that Brown's resistance to aerial spraying was wrong.

signals from nerve cell to nerve cell.

In humans, the liver contains other enzymes that protect man against its effects, he said. But that is disputed by some.

Dr. Helen Blau, a Stanford University geneticist, said the liver also contains an enzyme that converts malathion to malozon, a much more toxic chemical that could be dangerous to humans.

A report by state Health Director Beverlee Myers concluded aerial spraying posed "no significant health risk." Jerry Scribner, head of the Medfly eradication project, said, "It's been tested more than any other chemical that would help us get rid of this medfly."

He said in some 800 studies of malathion, there have been no confirmed cases of cancer or birth defects.

American Cyanamid, maker of malathion, expressed "amazement and dismay" over claims that malathion was toxic.

**Transport costs rising?**

Official assesses Reagan budget cuts in Mesa talk

Californians who use transportation systems, whether they are highways, railroads or airlines, will be paying more directly for that privilege over the next few years, a federal official predicted in Costa Mesa.

William Royer, regional representative for the U.S. Secretary of Transportation, offered that outlook Friday in translating President Ronald Reagan's federal budget reduction plans and legislative proposals for members of a Southern California transportation lobby group.

Royer told about 100 members of the Southern California Transportation Action Committee that to reduce federal expenditures, transportation policy will be realigned along three basic principles.

First, he said, federal efforts will focus on programs that are national in scope, "instead of trying to manage the way funds are spent for every state and local transportation project."

Second, he said, the federal government will attempt to give back to the states the authority to deal with their local transportation needs.

The federal government will leave immediate future gasoline tax increases up to state governments to finance local programs, he said.

Third, costs of transportation that can be directly identified will be paid by the users.

"We shouldn't tax the farmers to pay for dredging our rivers," Royer explained.

He predicted future hikes in railroad fares, airline ticket taxes, truck highway use fees and mass transportation fares.

Federal highway funding, he projected, will be used primarily to complete the interstate system by 1990 and maintain it and primary highways.

State and local road programs, he said, should revert to the states.

The Reagan Administration, he said, believes that as far as public transit systems are concerned, federal funds are best invested in capital improvements rather than in subsidizing operations.

"When Washington foots the bill," he said, "the local transit agency has no incentive to set fares realistically or to hold costs down."

As for aviation, Royer said the administration is looking at a new technology air traffic control system that may cost \$10 billion over the next decade.

He said the result is expected to be an increase in taxes on airline tickets and general aviation fuel.

"We also propose over the next two years to end federal subsidies to the nation's largest airports, which generally have means to finance their own development work," he said.

Royer predicted that Amtrak railroad services along the California coast will be continued at present levels.

But he warned that lesser used CONRAIL and AMTRAK routes will see reduced federal subsidies.

Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis is proposing in legislation sent to Congress in March that Amtrak revenues be required to cover at least 50 percent of operating costs beginning this October, Royer said.

Passengers today pay only about 40 cents of every dollar Amtrak spends, he noted.

Mr. Stroot and his wife, Magdalen, moved from their Lido Isle home to retirement in the San Diego County community in 1972.

Mr. Stroot and his family had moved to the Harbor Area in 1949 from Illinois. He purchased the TeWinkle Hardware store at 18th Street and Newport Boulevard that year and con-

tinued its operation until 1957.

In 1959 he built Costa Mesa's Crestview Shopping Center at 17th Street and Irvine Avenue which he owned, with his son managing affairs, until his death.

Mr. Stroot was active in Chamber of Commerce affairs while a Costa Mesa business

Other survivors include five sisters, a brother and five grandchildren.

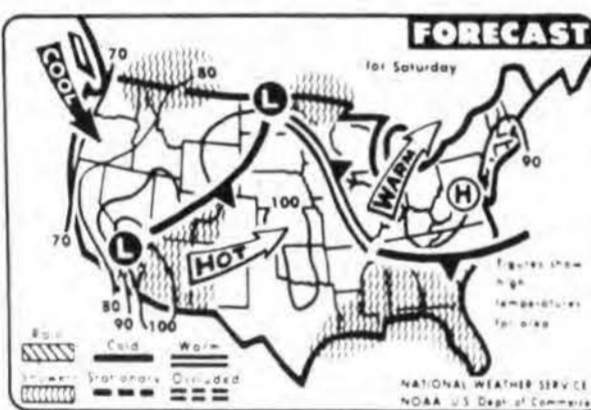

Chuck Holt, chief of the corps' navigational branch in Los Angeles, said about 80,000 cubic yards of sand will be removed from the shoal which sits inside the southern jetty.

He said the sand bar has been increasing gradually in size over the past 15 years.

will cost about \$400,000 and will begin either in late August or early September, he said.

The sand will be pumped to settling ponds built behind sand dikes at the beaches just north and south of the jetties. About 23,000 cubic yards of sand will go to ponds at "The Wedge," north of the jetty.

The majority of the sand will be pumped to ponds to be created at Corona del Mar State Beach, but not until after the Labor Day weekend, he added.

Holt said the corps already has begun soliciting bids from private firms to do the dredging.

The corps is responsible for maintaining entrances and main channels for coastal harbors.

Tony Melum, tidelands administrator for Newport Beach, said the city has been requesting the dredging for at least three years. He said the sand bar runs from the tip of the southern jetty to Pirates' Cove.

Several large sailboats have run aground on the sand bar, he added.

## Laguna gets \$15,000 for improvements

The Laguna Beach City Council has unanimously allocated \$15,000 in revenue sharing funds to purchase equipment and make further improvements at the city Community Center.

In April the council appropriated an initial \$6,000 for acoustical improvements at the center, formerly the American Legion Hall.

The money approved Tuesday by the council will be used to buy folding tables and chairs, room dividers, drapes, window screens and lounge furniture.

Improvements include landscaping, installation of a sprinkler system and tinting of south facing windows to reduce heat in the building.

Improvements to further reduce noise include installing new insulated walls, replacement of hollow doors with solid doors, installing acoustical wall panels and adding more thresholds and weather stripping.

## County wins fund bid

Judge rules Dana Harbor money may be spent elsewhere

Orange County officials won a Superior Court case Friday permitting them to continue spending money earned at Dana Point Harbor on projects outside the tidelands area.

The state Attorney General's Office had requested a court order preventing the county from spending harbor revenues on such expenses as development of other beach parks and subsidies for lifeguard services along the Orange Coast.

But Orange County Superior Court Judge Edward Wallin sup-

ported county lawyers who argued that a state tidelands grant permits the county to budget its funds for other purposes after the harbor is maintained.

State and county officials have tangled over the issue since about 1977. State officials, who contend all revenue should be re-invested in the harbor, filed their lawsuit on April 9 seeking a preliminary injunction.

Terry Dixon, deputy county counsel, predicted that Wallin's ruling is only the first round in

what could be a lengthy fight.

Bob Hamilton, special districts administrator, said the county expects to receive \$1.7 million in the next fiscal year from harbor revenue. About 20 percent of the money is set aside to be spent outside the area, he added.

With budget sessions with the county Board of Supervisors beginning next week, Hamilton greeted Wallin's ruling with relief.

"It certainly will enhance the county's flexibility in managing the funds," he said.

## Copters still 'problem'

Mesa homeowners complain about low flights

Helicopter pilots are not cooperating in voluntarily quieting low-flying aircraft over north Costa Mesa, according to a homeowners group leader.

The helicopter problem "is entirely out of control," Dave Leighton, president of the North Costa Mesa Homeowners Association, wrote to City Council members recently.

The letter, he said, reaffirms the association's opposition to further installation of helicopters within the city.

"The problem," he said, "has become more of an annoyance with extremely low flying helicopters over our roofs."

In April, the City Council postponed a decision on heliport requests submitted by the Los Angeles Times and Downey Savings and Loan in north Costa Mesa.

Council members said they would give helicopter pilots six months until October to see what they could do toward eas-

ing low-flight noise problems within their own profession.

At that time, the council approved a 10-point policy to guide future heliport approvals, ignoring several residents' requests to ban the pads.

The noise controversy peaked in January when former Mayor Robert Wilson charged that as many as 40 helicopters flew low every day over his Greenbrook area home, rattling dishes and knocking pictures from walls.

## Computer game ban shelved

Laguna mayor complains about young people loitering

A proposal to prohibit computer games and pinball machines in city establishments that sell liquor has been tabled by Laguna Beach City Council members.

The matter was brought to the council at the request of Mayor Wayne Baglin, who said large groups of young people have been loitering in liquor stores, mini-markets and supermarkets since the amusements were installed in the stores.

He said businesses that sell liquor are not appropriate places for minors to spend their time, and approval of the measure would eliminate the problem.

However, council member Sally Bellerue argued that to her

knowledge there have been no problems of law enforcement, and that many liquor stores are actually convenience markets frequented by people of all ages.

She proposed an ordinance that would require the machines to be placed away from where liquor is dispensed.

City Treasurer Frances

Engelhardt suggested that amusement devices be allowed to stay in the markets, but that the city charge store owners a \$57 monthly fee per machine.

Council members asked City Attorney Mark Winthrop to describe legal problems that might arise from a prohibition order at their next meetings.

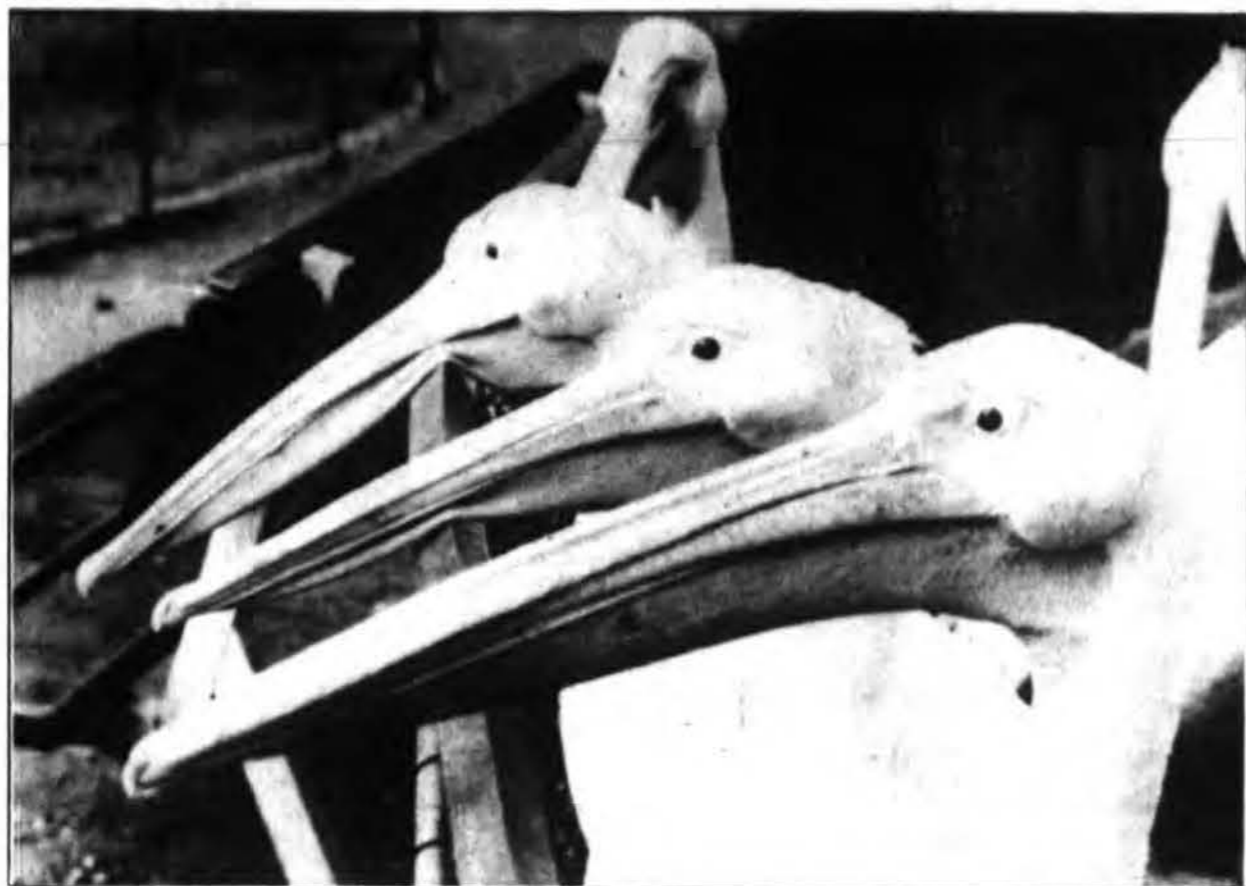

# Slow evolution backed

## Four anthropologists challenge rapid-change theory

NEW YORK (AP) — The human species evolved gradually through a process of natural selection, not through sudden changes in environment or behavior, four anthropologists say.

Their assertion, published in the British scientific journal *Nature*, challenges a theory favored by some others in the field and by some believers in the biblical version of creation.

According to the challenged view, evolution occurred as a succession of rapid changes, following long periods when no new species appeared.

The rapid-change theory is attractive to some creationists — believers in the biblical theory of creation — because it is compatible with their view that all manner of animal species appeared suddenly through divine intervention.

Most scientists agree that both kinds of evolution — rapid and gradual — can occur. Proponents of the rapid-change theory, however, say that most species evolved through distinct,

sudden changes. Their opponents, who support the view first advanced by Charles Darwin, say most species developed gradually.

The rapid-change theory, called "punctuated equilibrium," was developed in the early 1970s by Stephen Jay Gould of Harvard University and Niles Eldredge of the American Museum of Natural History in New York.

Gould would not comment directly on the paper appearing in *Nature*, but said that even if the paper is correct, it shows only that early human species developed gradually.

"Our contention has never been more than that the vast majority of cases occur by this punctuated model," Gould said in a telephone interview. If the finding of the four anthropologists is correct, Gould said, it would simply represent a "counter case" to the theory.

John Cronin, an anthropologist at Harvard and one of the authors of the paper in *Nature*, says he and his associates used

new evidence to show that human evolution occurred gradually.

The authors said each of the four species of early man that came before *Homo Sapiens* was on Earth for about 750,000 years.

That would seem to suggest gradual evolution, the authors said, rather than the quick, unexpected development of new species propounded in the rapid-change theory.

"We feel pretty comfortable that we document gradual change in human evolution," said Cronin, on sabbatical at UC Berkeley. "I think they (the proponents of the rapid-change theory) have overstated their case."

The scientists acknowledge that it is difficult to resolve their disagreement, because of gaps in the record of fossils used to determine when various species appeared.

"It's been a key question through evolution for a hundred years," said Cronin. "How fast do things occur?"



## Judge picked in good class

STANFORD (AP) — Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman selected for the nation's highest court, graduated from what one law professor described as Stanford University's "dumbest" law class.

He was wrong. If the Senate confirms Mrs. O'Connor, the Stanford law class of 1952 will have produced two sitting U.S. Supreme Court justices — Mrs. O'Connor and William Rehnquist — and a governor, Scott Matheson of Utah.

Three years earlier, the law school produced graduates who held key posts in the Carter administration: Shirley Hufstедler, former Secretary of Education, and Warren Christopher, the former Deputy Secretary of State who negotiated the release of the American hostages from Iran.

A classmate of Mrs. O'Connor recalls the Supreme Court choice was a student in a law trusts class taught by the late George Osborne when the professor declared that the class of 1952 was "the dumbest class he had ever taught at Stanford."

"It's a 30-year recollection of a quote," said Menlo Park attorney Leon Shiels.

He said Osborne was a curmudgeon who "became disgusted with the class, threw down his book and refused to teach" after calling on a student — not Sandra Day — who was unprepared.

Shiels remembers Mrs. O'Connor as a prim, dark-eyed woman with delicate features who was scholarly, generally well-liked but not particularly outgoing.

Professor Emeritus John Hurlbut, who taught criminal law, remembers her as a "very brilliant law student and hard working. She had as her objective achieving excellence. She was very acute."

Matheson said he remembers Mrs. O'Connor because "she was in a very small minority" in the predominantly male law class.

"She was an aggressive participant in class," the Utah governor recalled. "She was a competent, intelligent and capable law student — she was close to the top of the class."

Just how close to the top is a matter of some question, however. Sandra Day received her law degree at the age of 22 after entering Stanford at age 17, completing a four-year economics course in three years and ranking in the top 5 percent of her undergraduate class.

While there is little doubt she placed among the top 10 students of her law class, confusion has arisen over whether she was third from the top, as Stanford initially reported.

Rehnquist was the top graduate of the 1952 class but several students have been tentatively identified as the No. 2 graduate — raising questions about Mrs. O'Connor's precise standing.

Bob Beyers, Stanford spokesman, said the university is searching for 1952 records that would resolve the confusion.

Another Stanford law graduate, Class of '53, was John Jay O'Connor III, who met Sandra Day while both were editing the Stanford Law Journal. They dined together for the next 45 evenings, Mrs. O'Connor once said, and were married Dec. 20, 1952.

# Pets pampered at 'Palace'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Candlelight, Henry Mancini music playing softly in the background and a steak dinner served on china plates — it's a romantic tete-a-tete. Reserved for your pet.

The pampered pet meals, chosen from an extensive menu, are just one feature of the Belle Meade Pet Palace.

Another is a luxurious VIP, or Very Important Pet, room, a "home away from home" for owners reluctant to leave their animals while they travel. It has been solidly booked since the facility opened for business in March.

"The room has a sofa and a doggy-size bed for people who don't want their pets in cages," manager Judy Myers said. "It's a little bed cut down from a twin bed with a pink and blue quilt on it."

"If we had 20 of them (rooms), we could keep them full."

One recent VIP occupant, a poodle named Misty, had never been away from home, Miss Myers said. For \$5 per

day for a small dog, owners can buy their pets the extra dose of care.

For special occasions, \$50 will provide a birthday celebration for a dog or cat with cake, candles and a few of the animal's closest friends.

"We've provided a ground beef cake with mashed potato frosting for schnauzer," Miss Myers said. "It looked rather like a birthday cake and was a hit with the dogs. It was down in one gulp."

She said another dog brought his "girlfriend" for a candlelight dinner, selected from a menu that included chopped steak, liver, chicken and mackerel to tuna casserole.

"Luckily, we've had no dog fights or cat fights," she said.

The carefully planned parties "usually end up with dogs all over the place walking on the tables."

The Pet Palace, housed in an unassuming white building, offers a regular boarding service, a photographer, obedience and guard training and

funeral services. If a pet needs medical attention, its normal vet is usually contacted, Miss Myers said.

Some boarding animals roam the lobby, where toys are scattered on the rug. The goal, Miss Myers says, is personal attention.

The palace's clientele are people "who have money they don't know what to do with," but she said she is not surprised at what animal lovers will do for their pets.

"In many cases, pets are the focus of people's lives," she said. "They are substitute husbands, wives, children. I'm gratified to see people care that much, since we see the other side of it here too, with Action for Animals," a local humane group headquartered at the Pet Palace.

Miss Myers said the group sponsors a therapy program, taking Me-Ling, a Pekinese who lives at the Pet Palace, to nursing homes.

"Doctors say the visits give people a new lease on life," she said.

## Hard roll triggers lawsuit

The church's problems with Louie began when a long-time church member asked Avilla to do some work at the church without first checking with Barton. Barton refused to pay the bill, and Louie attached the church's funds.

"I have nothing against Louie. He does good work. I just think it wasn't necessary to garnish church funds," said Barton.

## Vermont midwives go 'underground'

LINCOLN, Vt. (AP) — Midwife Carol Warnock smoothes her daughter's hair and gazes out at the mountains beyond her remote farmhouse. Three weeks after her acquittal on a charge of practicing medicine without a license, she is pensive.

"I don't really feel bitter," she said, "but I feel like I always have to look over my shoulder."

Dr. Alan Ayer drums a pencil on his desk. After serving as the prosecution's star witness against Ms. Warnock, the obstetrician is angry.

"What they're doing is folk medicine," he said. "The lives of mothers and their babies are being endangered, and I'll continue to work to prevent that."

Ayer and Ms. Warnock were the central figures in a court case that brought supporters of Vermont's

cope with emergencies and difficult births. Ms. Warnock, who said she has attended about 130 births, insisted that if trouble arises, she calls for help.

"It's very hard for a woman who has planned for nine months to have the baby at home to go to the hospital," she said. "There are always tears. But I don't hesitate to make the decision."

But Ayer claims that midwives feel that they "lose face" when they must call on doctors for help.

"Rather than do that, they try to handle it alone," he said. "People just don't know what they're in for when they choose to rely on a midwife."

Yet it is an option chosen by more and more Vermonters.

"The number of home births is definitely increasing," said Dr. David Jillson of the state health department. "There are a lot of people in this state who want to live in a low-technology environment, and want to give birth in that kind of environment."

growing home birth movement out of the hills and raised questions about the need to regulate the practice of midwifery.

Charges were brought against Ms. Warnock by the state attorney in response to a complaint filed by Ayer. He was the physician on duty at the hospital when Ms. Warnock arrived with a woman who was bleeding heavily after giving birth.

The midwife told Ayer at the time that she had administered two drugs to try to staunch the bleeding. Ms. Warnock was found innocent on a defense of having reacted properly in an emergency.

Lay midwives are not formally recognized by the state, but until Ms. Warnock was cited, midwives had maintained an uneasy truce with the medical establishment. Now, however, some midwives are reluctant to speak with outsiders about their practice and will deal only with clients referred by friends.

"I guess you could say we've gone underground," said one midwife, once a frequent public speaker on home birth, who refused to grant an interview or permit her name to be used.

The midwives say their ancient practice of home birth has been twisted by opponents who portray midwives as ignorant and superstitious.

"During the trial, the prosecutor wanted to know if I carry incense in my bag," said Ms. Warnock.

Both midwives and physicians say they would like to see midwives formally licensed. But midwives want a regulatory board made up of midwives; doctors want doctors to oversee the licensing process.

Another area of disagreement concerns the ability of lay midwives to

## Mutiny ship on sale for \$4.5 million

NEW YORK (AP) — A film production company here is trying to unload a rather large prop: a full-scale replica of the H.M.S. Bounty, the scene of the 1789 mutiny against Capt. William Bligh.

The asking price is \$4.5 million.

Fred Sidewater, vice president of the Dino de Laurentiis Corp., said in an interview that he has had a few calls from "people who want it in a few years for some sort of exhibition," but no firm offers.

The 133-foot square-rigger was built for a remake of "Mutiny on the Bounty," which never was filmed. It is fitted with two diesel engines and 10,500 square feet of flaxen sails. It can accommodate 30 people — enough for a

sizeable mutiny.

The Bounty is bobbing in the waters off New Zealand.

Sidewater was vague about what went wrong with the film project, but apparently it had to do with money.

"Well, Dino met with David Lean, the director, and they got a script and then ran into problems and then Lean tried for a while to do it himself, and by the time it turned out the project was a little too costly, the ship was already built."

He did not rule out the possibility that Capt. Bligh and crew may show up eventually on the screen in a de Laurentiis remake.

"If the sale doesn't go well, we may

make the picture," he said, and added another possibility: "If they want it for the bicentennial celebration in two years in Australia, we could sell it to them and make the movie in the meantime."

So far, there have been some encouraging nibbles.

"We've had two or three calls like the Australia thing," he said, and logged some 30 telephone calls about advertisements he placed in the Wall Street Journal and the International Herald-Tribune.

One caller asked if Sidewater would accept MasterCard or Visa.

"I didn't know whether to hang up or laugh," he said. He did both.

## Scouts lose tax exemption bid

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Boy Scouts of America is not entitled to a property tax exemption for a supply center because it earned a "significant and perhaps intentional" profit, the state Court of Appeal has ruled.

The Boy Scouts lost its property tax exemption for non-profit charitable organizations at its Sunnyvale supply distribution center when the state Board of Equalization ruled in 1975 that the property was not used exclusively for charitable purposes.

BSA filed a lawsuit in Santa Clara County Superior Court hoping to recover an unspecified amount of taxes paid on the property since 1975. The scout group contended it was entitled to a refund because the center fell within an exemption for property exclusively used for charitable purposes.

**Life insurance unchanged**

DEAR PAT DUNN: My husband has accepted a job with a U.S. construction company that does business in the Middle East. It has put up buildings in Egypt, Iraq and Iran. Will this affect his life insurance policies? And can he take out some additional insurance before he leaves the United States on this job?

— P.J., Fountain Valley  
AYS checked with the American Council of Life Insurance, which reports your husband's new job will have no effect whatsoever on any life insurance policies he now owns. If he applies for additional coverage on an individual (non-group) basis, he might have to pay a slight additional premium because of unfavorable living conditions or dangerous political situations where he will be working. If an extra premium has been charged, it can be removed after your husband returns to the United States on a permanent basis.

In addition, some microwave cookbooks may include recipes that call for cooking pork at too low a temperature. Microwave manufacturers have been notified of this potential problem.

There were only about 100 to 120 clinical cases of trichinosis reported to the USDA in 1980, although there may be 150,000 to 300,000 cases of mild trichinosis in the country each year, according to government estimates.

A USDA spokesman said those who prepare pork in a microwave oven should check the manufacturer's directions for appropriate cooking times and be sure to rotate dishes during cooking.

After cooking, remove the pork from the oven and let it set several minutes or wrap the pork in aluminum foil to assure even temperature distribution. After the pork has been out of the oven several minutes, check various parts with a meat thermometer. If any part has not reached 170 degrees return the pork to the oven to cook more thoroughly.

**Cook pork thoroughly**

DEAR READERS: Owners of microwave ovens should use caution when cooking pork, warns the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Pork cooked below 170 degrees may still contain micro-organisms that cause trichinosis — a disease that, although rarely fatal, can cause fever, nausea, diarrhea and muscle pain, according to the USDA. The problem is attributed to uneven heat radiation typical of many microwave ovens.

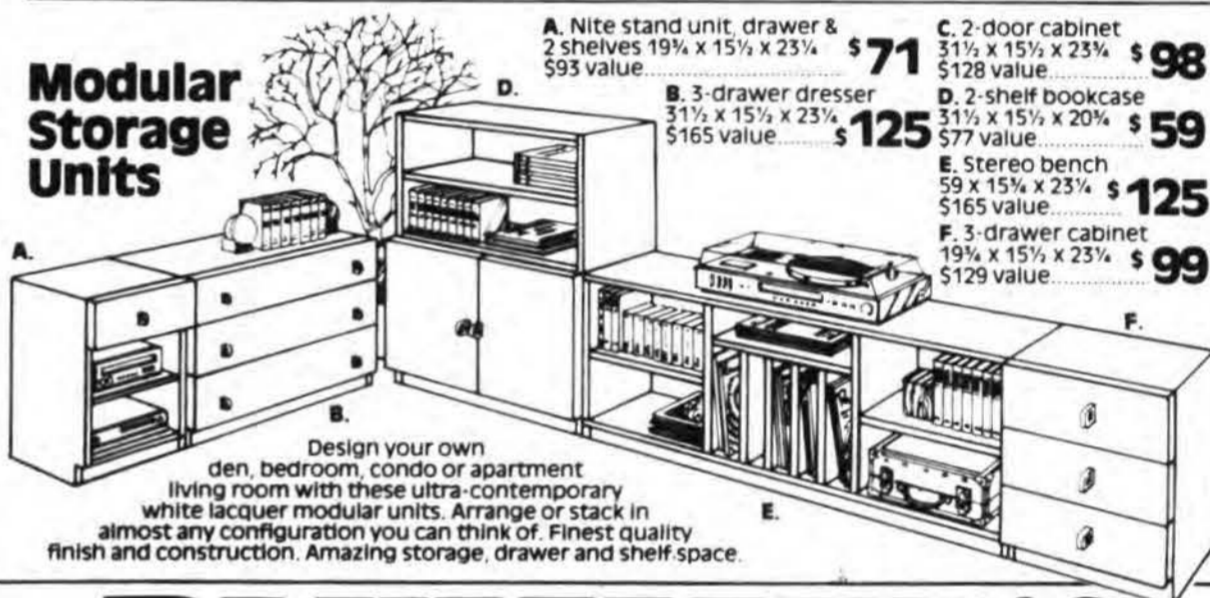

## Solving the mystery of the pyramids

A scientist at the Smithsonian Institution may have solved at least one of the mysteries of the Pyramids of Giza — why they, unlike the other Seven Wonders of the World, are still standing for all to admire.

The answer, Dr. Farouk El-Baz says, lies in the engineering and scientific acumen of the ancient Egyptians. These clever builders, he believes, constructed the towering monuments in the image of natural landforms that were already resistant to wind-erosion.

"Had the ancients built their monuments in the shape of a cube, a high-rise building like those of our cities, a pentagon or even a stadium, they would have been erased by the ravages of wind erosion long ago," El-Baz writes in the current issue of Smithsonian magazine.

"Instead, they chose the pyramid shape, which evades destruction by leading the wind upslope and funneling its erosive power to the peak where its energy dissipates into the air."

El-Baz, a geologist and director of the Center of Earth and Planetary Studies at the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C., came to this conclusion after a number of years of exploration in the Egyptian deserts.

In the Western Desert of Egypt — part of the driest tract of land on Earth — El-Baz has seen numerous landforms that are startling in their resemblance to the pyramids in the Nile Valley. They are startling particularly because these

forms have been created not by man but rather by natural geological processes. Moreover, these natural pyramids have been exposed to and withstood the action of the wind for hundreds of thousands of years.

El-Baz believes it is not surprising that apparently no one has made the connection between natural and man-made pyramids until now.

"An expert looks at nature and thinks immediately how to modify it for the benefit of man, rather than trying to learn a lesson from it," the geologist explains.

"This idea has certainly been cooking in my head for a long time. I looked at some of these structures over and over again before I made the connection. But it now seems obvious to me that the ancient Egyptians must have studied such natural desert structures before deciding on the form of their towering monuments."

The first and largest true pyramid, the so-called Great Pyramid, was built by the Pharaoh Khufu (Cheops) about 4,500 years ago. An awesome engineering achievement, its four-sided plan covers 13 acres.

At a height of 482 feet, it is one of the largest buildings ever erected by man and, until the Eiffel Tower was constructed in 1889, it was the highest man-made structure in the world.

Despite their age, the pyramids are still shrouded in mystery, and many scholars disagree about their original function and how they were actually built.

Whatever else they may be, the pyramids are a tribute to the ancients' keen knowledge of their environment and resources, El-Baz maintains.

"The Egyptians of the past appear to have learned more about the desert than their modern counterparts," he writes. "They mastered desert exploration and exploitation of building materials. They combed the Eastern Desert and the Sinai for precious metals . . . (they) roamed the Western Desert terrain and left their mark."

During these explorations, he believes, they must have seen many natural pyramidal and conical landforms, as El-Baz himself did on several journeys in the late 1970s into the Egyptian deserts. On one such trip, he saw firsthand how nature's pyramids resist the wind.

In March and April, he explains, the wind in Egypt's deserts shifts direction. Normally, the winds blow in the general direction of north to south, but during the windy season, the winds blow generally from south to north.

This spring wind carries enormous quantities of debris and redistributes the sand even as it erodes obstacles in its way, El-Baz says. A strong gust of

wind lifts fine dust from the pebbles and sand grains on the desert surface and hurls it upward toward existing conical and pyramidal hills. The velocity of the dust cloud increases as it approaches the hill, releasing its energy into the air at the apex.

The existence of these natural landforms may also help explain some of the mysteries surrounding the unprecedented magnitude of the pyramids' construction and the manner in which they were built, El-Baz says. What if, he ponders, the pyramids were built over existing conical or pyramidal shapes, thereby easing the extent of the construction?

In fact, a search in the library revealed that an Egyptian

archaeologist, Ahmed Fakhry, had written a book in 1961 which described a rocky knoll of unknown size lying underneath the Great Pyramid and a big hill underneath the tomb of Queen Khent-Kawes at Giza. It thus seems likely that the ancient Egyptians received an assist from Mother Nature.

In his desert explorations, El-Baz also has uncovered natural, wind-sculpted forms resembling the Sphinx, which dates from 2500 B.C. The Sphinx, he now believes, may have originated as one aerodynamically stable landform called a yardang, which is a naturally wind-carved hill found in the Western Desert of Egypt and in many other deserts.

# COMMENT

These commonly asked questions about the U.S. foreign assistance program are taken from letters to senators. Facts for the responses were supplied by the Federal Agency for International Development in Washington, D.C. The text is reprinted from its bi-weekly World Development Letter.

**We have to work five months out of every year just to pay our taxes. Are we going to bankrupt the United States so we can support the world?**

The per-person annual cost of all foreign economic assistance is about \$34. Most of that \$34 is spent in the United States for goods and services that mean jobs and income for Americans.

Take Missouri for example. The U.S. foreign aid program bought almost \$50 million in goods, services and agricultural products in Missouri during 1980 for use in the less developed countries.

Of the total, \$41.6 million went to Missouri farmers and food processors for grain and other agriculture commodities under the Food for Peace program. The balance, \$8 million, went to Missouri manufacturers and other firms for supplies used in overseas economic development programs administered by the Agency for International Development.

The foreign aid program buys more from other states than it does from Missouri: \$96 million from California, \$173 million from New York, \$145 million from Kansas, \$114 million from Texas — to name a few.

**How come we are sending millions of tons of grain to developing countries for free, yet farmers in this country are paying such high prices for grain for cattle that meat is being priced out of sight?**

The bulk of the grain exported under our Food for Peace program is sold — not given — to Third World governments at roughly the same price that American farmers pay. What free grain we do send abroad helps people devastated by disaster or provides food for nursing mothers, school children and food-for-work programs.

Much of our economic assistance is aimed at helping developing countries increase their own farm output — thereby reducing global demands on U.S. food supplies that tend to bid up grain prices.

**I see red when I read we are sending foreign aid to OPEC countries.**

The United States extends aid to only three of the 13 OPEC countries. They are Indonesia, Nigeria and Ecuador, which together provide the U.S. with about 18 percent of its oil and are considered stabilizing elements in their regions.

The fact that a country has oil doesn't necessarily mean it's rich. Indonesians earn an average of \$385 a year, Nigerians \$670 and Ecuadorians \$880. Nigeria is a large market for U.S. goods and training services; our exports there reached \$1 billion in 1978, and a vocational skills training program financed exclusively by the Nigerian government brings the U.S. an average of \$12 million a year.

Ecuador is one of the smallest oil producers in OPEC with limited reserves. Unless new oil is discovered it may have to import petroleum by 1985.



# Foreigners profit?

Answers show aid for overseas helps America

**Why are we sending so many of our dollars overseas when there are so many things that need to be done at home?**

By and large we are not sending dollars. Most foreign economic assistance over the years has consisted of food, equipment, training, expert services, heavy machinery and technology. Most of these have come from American farms, factories, universities and research institutions in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

More than a third of all U.S. economic aid has been extended on a loan or credit basis and is being repaid with interest.

This means that a large percentage of money spent has gone to U.S. business and Americans for goods or services they render Third World countries. Thus, though the benefits are reaped by developing nations, the money ends up in U.S. pockets.

**I don't understand why we give foreign aid. We have a lot of poor people here, too. America can take care of itself; let developing countries take care of themselves.**

Progress in the Third World serves the U.S. national interest. Apart from our traditional humanitarian concerns, as these nations develop they become bigger customers for our farms and industries; they become bigger markets for American investments and more accessible sources of raw materials essential to our economy and national defense.

For example: U.S. exports to developing countries have tripled in the past five years. These countries now buy 38 percent of U.S. manufactured exports.

U.S. exports to developing countries exceed our exports to all of industrialized Europe and are four times greater than our exports to Japan. Some 2 million American jobs now depend on exports to the Third World. One out of every 10 acres of American farmland produces for export to those countries.

The U.S. depends on Third World countries for 100 percent of our natural rubber; 96 percent of our tin, essential to the electronics industry; 88 percent of our bauxite, vital to our aircraft industry; 75 percent of our cobalt, needed by the steel and nuclear industries.

By the year 2000, about 6 billion people — 1.5 billion more than now — will crowd this planet. More than 80 percent of them will be living in the less developed countries. There — despite the progress that has been made — extreme poverty, overpopulation, environment degradation, disease and periodic famine are still the lot of most.

These conditions breed increasing violence, riots, terrorism, urban guerrilla warfare and border strife. In our own backyard we have already felt the pact of Third World overpopulation and poverty in the massive immigration of Latin Americans into the United States.

**If I don't pay my debts, the stores cut off my credit. But with developing countries, we just keep shoveling the money down the drain. Why?**

Developing countries do pay their debts. From 1946 to 1980, U.S. economic aid loans and credits totaled over \$47.3 billion. Principal and interest payments to the U.S. amounted to over \$23.6 billion by the end of 1980.

Virtually all loans and credits disbursed early in this period have been repaid in full — with interest and on time, sometimes in advance of maturity. With rare exceptions, the balances remaining reflect loans that have not yet reached maturity, payments that are not yet due. In short, the repayment record has been excellent.

And it's not money down the drain: development is occurring. Many of the countries of Southeast Asia have achieved a level of development few would have predicted a decade ago. India has survived a drought on the strength of its own home-grown food.

Population growth rates have dropped dramatically in Thailand, Indonesia, Colombia, the Dominican Republic, South Korea, the Philippines and Panama, among others.

More than 30 countries are establishing health care systems that were virtually nonexistent in the past. Third World nations are increasingly able to borrow in private capital markets for development projects.

**Our Social Security program is in trouble (no money) yet we spend \$77 billion for foreign aid. (That is sick.)**

We can't speak for the Social Security program. But last year the total for all U.S. foreign economic assistance programs added up to \$7.6 billion. That is 1.33 percent of the federal budget and 20 percent of our Gross National Product. To give some perspective, in 1980 alone Americans spent \$50.8 billion on alcoholic beverages and \$20.8 billion on tobacco products.

**Why does our country lend millions of dollars to foreign countries at 3 percent interest, yet we must pay 16 percent?**

We do extend loans to some Third World countries (not all foreign countries, of course) on easy terms — 2 to 3 percent for up to 40 years — because it is one of the best ways to expedite their economic and social development and to benefit U.S. interests.

The sale of American grain at low interest is a case in point. Already one of every 10 U.S. acres of farmland produces for food exports to the Third World. The Third World share of our overseas market is increasing. From 1979 to 1980 the U.S. agricultural exports to the Third World increased 35 percent — from \$10.8 billion to \$14.6 billion.

In addition, farm sales abroad create hundreds of thousands of jobs in related industries. Workers in grain elevators, truckers, shippers, those on assembly lines who make tractors, the mechanics who maintain farm equipment may not know it, but their jobs depend in part on grain sales to the Third World.

These sales at favorable interest rates are also hastening the development of poor countries that may some day be our best customers. Twenty or 30 years ago, for example, South Korea, Taiwan and Singapore, among others, were struggling to feed their people. In 1950 Taiwan's per capita income was less than \$100 a year. In 1980, it was \$2,200 — and the country is a major purchaser of U.S. grain and other products.

# Most buyers find home no longer savings bank

Major changes in the way California homes are bought and sold became inevitable in the late 1970s, as prices soared and interest rates headed toward today's record levels.

But only now is the result of those changes starting to become clear: For most new buyers, a home won't necessarily be a kind of savings bank.

Already, the federally-chartered savings and loan associations in California have started making new types of mortgage loans. With open-ended interest rates, they could produce a crop of homeowners who owe more after

paying for 30 years than they did at the start.

But those same mortgages will often feature terms as long as 40 years or accelerating payments so that young families can pay small installments at first and larger ones as their income climbs through the years.

While federally-chartered savings and loans make only about one-third of the mortgage loans in California, it's only a matter of a short time before the

Legislature okays the same tactics for state-chartered associations.

For the undeniable fact is that all savings and loans need something to keep pace with money market funds that compete for cash savers put away.

Deposits in money market funds have increased from \$70 billion to \$120 billion over the last three years, while deposits at savings and loans dropped sharply.

The savings and loans can only regain those deposits if they offer the same high interest as their rivals and they can only do that if their investments — home mortgages — pay off at up-to-date interest rates.

Since the savings and loans account for about 75 percent of all money invested in California housing, their loss of deposits is a major reason many homebuyers now have trouble finding anyone to give them a mortgage.

The new types of mortgages should solve that problem, argues Linda Tsao Yang, commissioner of the state Department of Savings and Loans.

"It's not as nice as a fixed-rate mortgage," Yang said in an interview, "but for many homebuyers it is the only way to get money at all. It is the only way I see to keep alive the dream of home ownership."

Yang also believes the new mortgages will soon end the need for much of today's wide variety of "creative financing" schemes.

"Creative financing," the term many real estate brokers use for trust deeds with large balloon payments, is now involved in more than half the home transactions in California.

But these loans often come from small sources not required to make disclosure statements and Yang worries that new buyers may be caught by surprise when some of the balloon payments come due.

"I feel this is a powder keg," she said. "I worry about who is going to finance the homebuyer with a three-year second trust deed when the balloon payment has to be paid off. We are already seeing some second trust deed brokers having problems because of non-payment."

If flexible interest mortgages end that danger, they'll be better for everyone, even the homebuyer who may end up owing more in 30 years than he paid for his house.

Even that problem may have its silver lining. Yang believes the flexible interest will make real estate speculation — a major factor in the surge of home prices — into a far less attractive investment.

"The new rates," she said, "will mean that home purchases will be made to meet real housing needs, not for speculation."

But they also mean that new buyers may not get the same financial security that homes have traditionally provided to their owners.

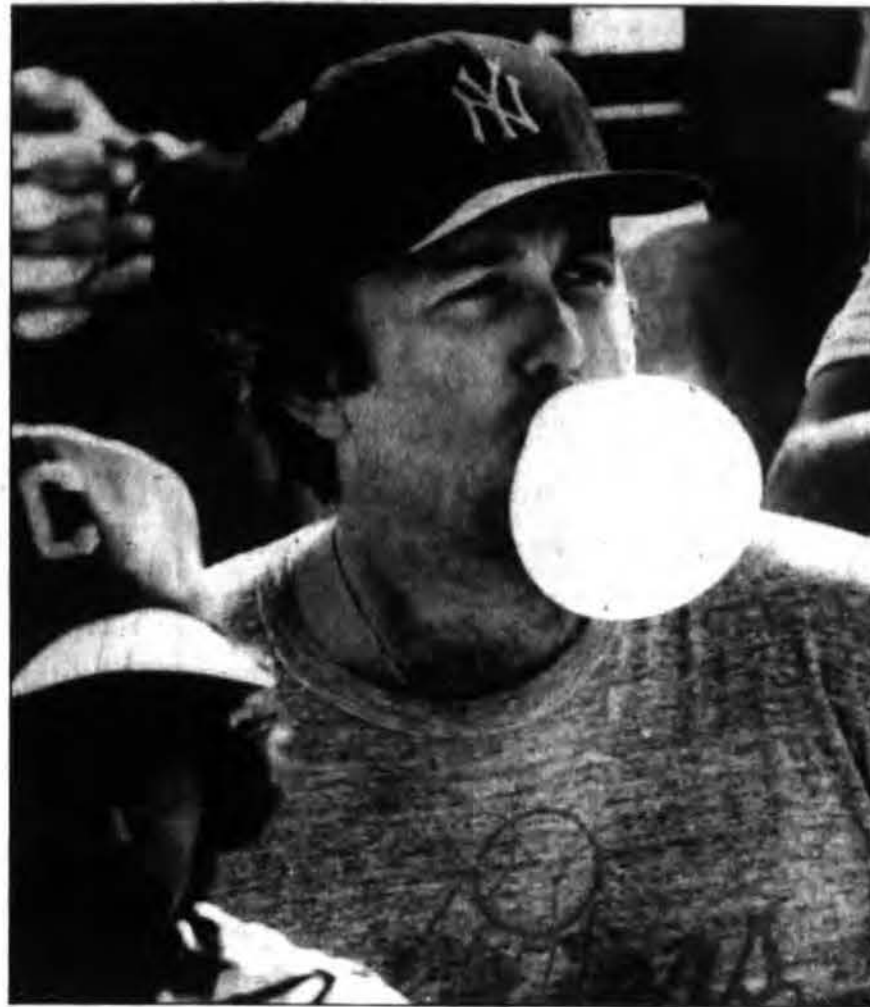
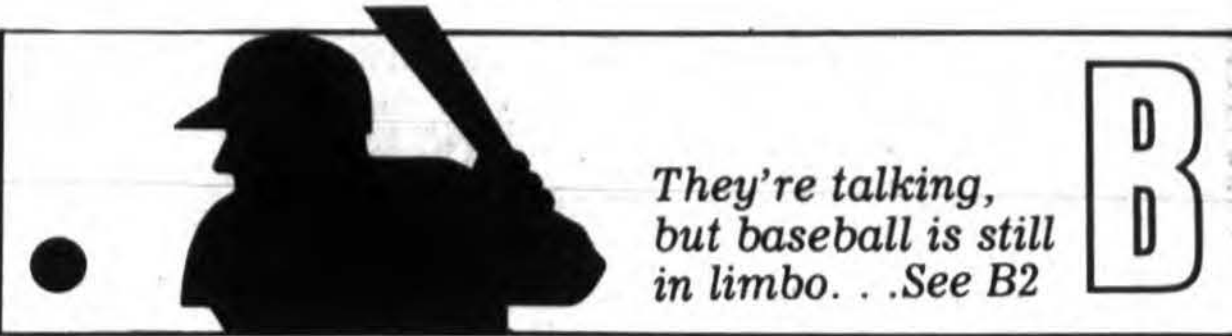

## Walter Mitty couldn't dream this up

A 28-year-old sportswriter trying out for the big leagues? Nonsense -- or is it?

I would guess almost everybody has a little bit of Walter Mitty in them. People like to dream.

Maybe it's to become president of the United States, or a doctor, or a lawyer, or an actor or actress, or a fireman or even a contented housewife.

I'm no exception.

**I'M A SPORTS NUT**, always have been, always will be. I idolized Mickey Mantle, Elgin Baylor and Johnny Unitas as a kid and I still admire people like Jimmy Connors, Jack Nicklaus, Dr. J, Tommy John and Steve Garvey.

I admire them because of their professionalism, and envy them because of their ability.

I have often wondered about what might have been. As a teen-ager, I was a pretty good athlete in most sports -- but my forte was baseball.

It's a cliché, but I used to live, eat and sleep the game. My greatest dream is hitting a Bob Gibson fastball for a home run with the bases

loaded to give the Dodgers a 4-3 victory and a National League pennant.

**ACTUALLY, FOR AWHILE**, I was fortunate enough to get a taste of the limelight. I was good enough to play semi-pro ball with the San Francisco Giants and Dodgers during high school. I even bounced around a couple of Dodger rookie leagues.

But an injury (and maybe my lack of ability) cut my "career" short. That's why I'm pounding keys on a typewriter instead of pounding singles in the major leagues.

Still, when my sports editor gave me the assignment of posing as a major league hopeful at a recent baseball tryout camp, the fires in my stomach started to flicker again.

Oh, they were nothing serious. I knew I had too much going against me. But they were there nonetheless. It was only natural.

**THE TRYOUT, CONDUCTED** at Cal State Fullerton, was handled by the Major League

Scouting Bureau and represented 17 teams.

Hopefuls -- more than 400 of them -- came from as far east as Michigan, as far south as San Diego and as far north as Washington for what one player called, "a last ditch effort to be noticed."

Of course, there are really only two ways to be recognized at a camp of this size: a) you must have exceptional ability, or b) you must dress up like Ronald McDonald.

I didn't do either -- although dressing up like McDonald's clown did pass my mind (I was hoping a scout from San Diego might find humor in it).

**THE QUALIFICATIONS** for the tryout were easy -- you had to be 17-25 in age (I am 28); you had to run the 60-yard dash in 7.2 or under (I hadn't made a dash since my last trip to Tijuana); you had to field three ground balls and show you could throw with authority (not my strong suit).

Those of us who passed the tests, we were told,

would be asked to stick around to hit in "game situations."

At this point, all I could do was reflect on the amount of preparation I had put in for this assignment -- which consisted of playing in my weekly softball game.

Also, since I wanted to be totally realistic, I got drunk, broke curfew and had my girl friend act as a pick-up the night before. I decided if I was going to try out to be a major leaguer I should act like one.

**MY NEXT DISTRESSING** thought was which position I should attempt to play. I was a catcher-third baseman-outfielder during my playing days, but an injury to my throwing arm nullified those.

Finally, I decided on designated hitter. The scouts didn't appreciate that, though, so I moseyed over to where the first basemen were standing.

We were each given a number (I was 308) and (See WRITER'S, Page B4)

## Soviets grab lead over U.S. in track

Women give Russians the edge

LENINGRAD, U.S.S.R. (AP) -- The Soviet Union, who won the last four events on the first day, had a 97-93 lead going into today's competition in the 17th U.S.-Soviet track and field meet.

The two-day event, which concluded today, is the first major athletic contest between the two superpowers since the United States led a boycott of the 1980 Moscow Olympics.

But the Soviets seemed happy to play host to the Americans. The crowd of 25,000 applauded warmly when the U.S. team marched into Lenin Stadium waving miniature American flags.

**RUSSIAN CHILDREN** presented the athletes with red carnations, and a Soviet official said he hoped the meet would contribute to friendship between the two countries.

The Soviets lead the track and field series 12-3-1, and appear headed for another overall team victory.

One American team official said he thought the Russians "have enough muscle to win."

But U.S. head Coach Harmon Brown insisted after the first day of competition, "It's impossible to dope the meet ahead of time because there are so many new faces."

The Americans got off to a flying start Friday when 17-year-old Michele Glover of Willingboro, N.J., streaked to victory in the women's 100-meter dash in 11.45 seconds.

**JEFF PHILLIPS** of Whitehall, Ohio, came from behind to nip Ron Brown of Baldwin Park, for a 1-2 sweep of the men's 100 meters. Phillips was timed in 10.21 and Brown in 10.24.

However, the Soviets' perennially strong women's team kept them close until the men finally put the Russians ahead at day's end.

Nina Isayeva led a 1-2 sweep in the shot put and Irina Nazarova outclassed the field in taking the women's 400 meters.

Olga Mineyeva saved her best for last, speeding past American veteran Madeline Manning on the final straight-away to capture the 800 meters.

Galina Savenkova hurled the discus 228 feet, 8 inches, nearly 55 feet farther than the closest American, Denise Wood of Knoxville, Tenn., who placed third.

Only a spectacular finishing kick by Glover in the 400-meter relay saved the American women from an even more lopsided deficit in the first day of competition. The New Jersey teenager nipped Russian anchor runner Yelena Kelchevskaya at the finish line after taking the baton more than eight yards behind.

**IN ALL, THE RUSSIANS** won four of six women's events and led 38-25 after the first day. Nine more women's events were scheduled today.

The American women have won their part of the competition only once before -- by three points in Los Angeles in 1967.

The American men, who have defeated the Russians 11 times in the previous 16 meets, were ahead 68-59 after Friday's events.

Greg Foster of Los Angeles and Larry Cowling of Sacramento, finished 1-2 in the 110-meter hurdles in 13.30 and 13.53.

Their sweep was duplicated by Andre Phillips of San Jose, and David Lee of University City, Mo., in the 400-meter hurdles. Phillips, running in the No. 1 position for the Americans because of the absence of world record-holder Edwin Moses, who was in Norway, was timed in

## Connors saves the day

U.S. salvages split with Czechoslovakia in Davis Cup

NEW YORK (AP) -- How important is it to have Jimmy Connors back on the U.S. Davis Cup Team? Nobody knows better than teammate John McEnroe.

"It's good to have a guy like Jimmy around, especially after you lose a match," said McEnroe, who did just that in his first court appearance since winning Wimbledon, bowing to Czechoslovakia's Ivan Lendl 6-4, 14-12, 7-5 Friday in the opener of the best-of-five quarterfinal series.

Connors, making his first Davis Cup appearance since

1976, bailed out the U.S. squad by beating Tomas Smid 6-3, 6-1, 6-2 in Friday's second match to even the series at 1-1.

"Knowing John had lost the first match made me more eager, more up," said Connors. "I didn't want to end the day with us behind 2-0 -- especially not on Arthur's birthday."

Arthur Ashe, the non-playing captain of the U.S. team who was celebrating his 38th birthday, said he sensed Connors would come out like a tiger.

"Jimmy loves to play in New York," said Ashe. "He loves the New York crowds and he feels that center court belongs to him."

It certainly did Friday. Smid was no match for the aggressive, tenacious Connors, who scored nine service breaks and was in complete control throughout. In one stretch of the third set he reeled off 16 consecutive points.

**"IT WAS PRETTY** inspired tennis," said Connors, a satisfied smile on his face.

Veterans Stan Smith and Bob Lutz, who are 12-1 in Davis Cup competition since 1968, were to represent the United States in today's doubles match against Lendl and Smid. The concluding singles matches Sunday will pit McEnroe against Smid and Connors against Lendl.

"With Jimmy on the team, I don't think it really matters what I do here," said McEnroe, who won Wimbledon a week ago to end Bjorn Borg's five-year reign and replace the Swede in the No. 1 spot in the world computer rankings. "Jimmy should win his two matches, and we should also win the doubles."

The 28-year-old Connors, currently ranked third in the world behind McEnroe and Borg and one notch ahead of Lendl, sat out Davis Cup competition in recent years because of differences with former captain Tony

Trabert. But he replaced Trabert as the non-playing team captain this year, and in January Connors agreed to be available for the series against defending champion Czechoslovakia.

**"I DIDN'T ASK** Jimmy why he'd changed his mind. I just said, 'Sign here,'" said Ashe. "He's an asset to any team."

Connors declined to talk about his past differences with Trabert, saying only, "I'm more at ease now." As for playing Davis Cup, he said, "It's a little more nerve-wracking to come out and play for your country. But once you're out there, it could be Davis Cup, Wimbledon, the U.S. Open, whatever. As far as the tennis goes, it's all the same."

Ashe was clearly relieved following Connors' victory.

"I've said all along our Strategy was to beat Smid twice and to win the doubles," said Ashe. "Lendl is such a great player you have to acknowledge the possibility he could win two singles. But the bottom line is to win at least three matches and I think when Sunday is over you'll be looking at us winning 4-1 or 3-2."

**TODAY'S DOUBLES** match underscores the depth on the American squad. Although McEnroe and Peter Fleming are the top-ranked doubles team in the world, Ashe opted to give McEnroe a day's rest and go with Smith and Lutz. Czechoslovakia, on the other hand, is forced to use Lendl -- its only high-ranking player -- and Smid, the best of the rest.

"New York in July can be brutal weather-wise," said Ashe. "That's why I wanted McEnroe to have a day off. Now he can cool out, and I expect him to win on Sunday."

Friday's matches were played in temperatures that soared to the 90s, with high humidity.

## Merlin has a shot at snapping record

**HONOLULU** -- Excitement at Transpac race headquarters here was building late Friday after news that the 67-foot sloop Merlin had a chance of breaking her own elapsed time record of eight days, 11 hours.

Skipper Nick Frazee said Merlin has already broken one record, a day's run of 307 miles at 8 a.m. Friday that beat her 303 mile day's run in the record 1979 race.

The weather during the last 500 miles of the 2,225-mile race is made to order for the big ULDB "downwind sled."

Strong northeast tradewinds were building up huge seas that had Merlin surfing at speeds of over 20 knots as she left Fred Preiss' Christine, her principal rival for first to finish, 56 miles astern.

The wind and sea conditions were also helping another ULDB, Ragtime skippered by Dick Daniels of Long Beach. Ragtime had closed within 13 miles of Christine.

Race officials here calculate that if Merlin averages 11.8 knots for the rest of the race she will finish early this evening, knocking several hours off her existing record.

## Baseball strike nixes All-star Game

**CLEVELAND** — Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn said Friday the July 14 major league baseball All-star Game has been postponed indefinitely "because of the continuing strike by the players association."

"It is no longer practical to play the game as scheduled," Kuhn said in a statement issued from his New York office.

Kuhn heads the 11-member executive council that reached the decision.

"This is a tremendous disappointment for all of us in baseball, as I am sure it is for fans everywhere," he said.

The 52nd renewal of the annual contest may take place at an unspecified later date if the strike, which began June 12, is settled, Kuhn indicated.

"I want to express . . . my great sadness that events have made this necessary," he said. "It is an additional disappointment because of the terrific fan support from the Cleveland area and because of the superb planning by the Indians, their special committee of civic leaders and the city government for three days of activities to showcase Cleveland to thousands of baseball visitors."

"We hope that when our player problems are settled we can reschedule the game, although it is impossible at this time to set a specific date."

# Messersmith saw it coming

## He helped set up strike

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** — Dave McNally sells cans with his brother, Jim, in Billings, Mont. Andy Messersmith invests in real estate and works around his new house in the northern California city of Santa Cruz.

In one sense, both men are light years away from baseball's war between owners and players. Yet in another, both are very close to it because they helped bring it about 5½ years ago.

"I KNEW IT (free agency) was going to be a problem," Messersmith said in a recent phone interview. "I think the owners made a few faux pas early on. They didn't control themselves very well with the players' salaries. Now, they may be seeing the error of their ways. They may be looking back and seeing they should have handled it a little differently. But hindsight is always 20-20."

"I never had any idea it would come to this," McNally said. "I'm very sorry to see it happen because no one wins a strike. But I can understand how the players feel. If I were still playing, I'd be right there with them."

Messersmith and McNally are pioneers. They created their spots in history by challenging and beating baseball's reserve clause. They became the first free agents to play out their options and earn the right to sell their services to the highest bidder.

**ARBITRATOR PETER SEITZ**, who also declared Jim "Catfish" Hunter a free agent in December 1974, because of breach of contract by Oakland owner Charlie Finley, ruled on the Messersmith-McNally case on Dec. 23, 1975. He said the reserve clause was illegal, thus eliminating teams' "lifetime ownership" of their players. Baseball hasn't been the same since.

"I sure didn't do it for any recognition," Messersmith, a product of Western High in Anaheim and former Corona del Mar resident, said. "I just got angry with the way I was treated and the way I saw other players treated. The owners had total control over us."

Messersmith, a right-handed pitcher, was a 20-game winner with the Angels before he was traded to Los Angeles in 1973. He went 14-10, 20-6 and 19-14 in his first three seasons with the Dodgers and asked for a no-trade clause in his contract. When the team refused, he decided to play out his option and take his chances.

"I thought I'd check it out and see what a contract really was."

**SEITZ RULED AGAINST** the reserve clause, and Messersmith signed a multiyear deal with Atlanta at the start of the 1976 season for an estimated \$1.75 million. Owner Ted Turner's generosity astounded him.

"Of course it was a surprise," he said. "That's still a lot of money. It sure was an interesting experience."

McNally never got the pot of gold Messersmith did. After building a 181-113 record in 12 seasons at Baltimore, he was traded to Montreal in December 1974. He retired in June of '75 with a 3-6 record and never threw another pitch, but he still pressed for free agency.

"I had enough," McNally said. "My arm wasn't feeling good the last couple of years and I was ready to leave. I just did it to challenge the reserve clause."

"When we got rid of the reserve clause, we got rid of lifetime ownership of the players."

# Moffet's proposal gives hope to strike issue

## Skeleton for an agreement may have been reached as talks pick up steam

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Baseball's club owners and striking players were considering a new proposal early Saturday to end the walkout, with some optimism over the prospects of a settlement being expressed as the latest bargaining session passed midnight.

Saying a proposal made Friday by federal mediator Kenneth Moffett was a "skeleton of an agreement," American League player representative Doug DeCinces of the Baltimore Orioles said an attempt was being made to iron out some of the differences.

"We are discussing the plusses and minuses," he said. "Both sides had some objections and some problems, but we feel it has the skeleton of an agreement."

**BUT RUSTY STAUB**, player representative of the New York Mets, said the proposal was "not a gift from God."

The owners and players were called back to the bargaining table late Friday night as the first midseason strike in the game's history was about to enter its 30th day.

The players walked out June 12 in protest of the owner's free agent compensation plan. The strike has forced cancellation of 363 games and the indefinite postponement of the All-Star game.

The New York Times reported in its early Saturday editions that a source close to the owners' negotiators said the parties had at least two hangups with the proposal.

The first dealt with the number of teams that would be eligible to receive professional compensation for losing premier free agents. The second objection was to a cash payment from the team getting compensation because of the signing of one of its players.

**DeCINCES SAID** the owners requested the five-hour recess. "The owners will come back and give us their problems with this proposal," he said. "I am not free to discuss it. We feel it has some possibilities. Something may come from it."

Moffett had presented his proposal to both sides on Thursday during a break in a National Labor Relations Board meeting charging the owners with an unfair labor practice.

That hearing concluded Friday with administrative law judge Melvin Welles announcing

that he expected briefs to be filed within three weeks and any decision would probably come at least a month after that.

The 26 major league club owners met in Manhattan Thursday night and announced total support for their bargaining committee headed by Ray Grebey.

**GREBEY THEN RETURNED** to the negotiating table Friday to meet with Marvin Miller and a committee of players headed by league player representatives DeCinces and Bob Boone of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Moffett's proposal defined premier players — those requiring additional compensation — to be in the top 20 percent at each position, using statistics based on two-year averages. Excluded from the category would be players who were previously free agents, such as Reggie Jackson of the New York Yankees, Joe Rudi of the Boston Red Sox and Bobby Grich of the Angels; players with more than 12 years of credited service; and players over 35 years of age.

Under the plan, there would be no re-entry draft for premier players and such players would be free to negotiate with any number of clubs. The re-entry draft for other free agents would continue as it has been since 1976.

The plan limited to 12 the number of premier players subject to added compensation in any one year. That was the number proposed by management last Saturday before negotiations broke down.

**THE PROPOSAL THEN** divided the 26 major league clubs into three groups — Group A consisting of the top nine teams; Group B, consisting of the middle eight teams, and Group C, consisting of the bottom nine teams.

If a premier player becomes a free agent, compensation would be paid from the signing club to the former club as follows:

If the player signs with a Group A club and the losing club is in Group C, the signing club would be able to protect 24 players before supplying compensation.

If a player signs with a Group A club, and his former club is in Group B, or if a player signs with a Group B club and his former club is in Group C, the signing club would be able to protect 30 players.

Four other multihulls are still in the race but were not expected to finish here before Sunday.

# Did Raiders fool Oakland?

City official says he didn't know of Davis' doings

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A former Oakland Coliseum official testified Friday that Oakland was prepared to spend \$5.5 to \$10 million last year to keep the Raiders from moving.

William Cunningham, who left his post as Oakland Coliseum general manager in 1980, said the money would have been spent on a new practice field, executive offices, a Raiders' Hall of Fame and 64 luxury box suites.

**BUT AS THE NINTH** week of the Los Angeles Coliseum and the Raiders' general court antitrust trial against Commissioner Pete Rozelle and the National Football League concluded Friday, Cunningham said that Al Davis, the Raiders' managing general partner, wanted "more, more, more."

The trial stems from the plan of the Raiders to move to Los Angeles against the desires of the NFL.

Cunningham testified, "The Raiders knew we were ready to go forward so long as we could get a lease long enough to finance it."

**HE SAID ONE OF THE** problems in completing a deal was that Davis was unwilling to agree to a long-term lease.

The Oakland Coliseum's final offer came in early February 1980. Cunningham told the jury that Davis, at the time, had been negotiating with the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum about a move.

"As far as I know, no one connected with the Oakland Coliseum knew anything about Mr. Davis' discussions with Los

Angeles," the witness said. Cunningham apparently was suggesting that he believed the Raiders were stringing along Oakland officials while the club was considering moving to Los Angeles where it had been promised multimillion dollar improvements in the stadium which had been vacated by the Rams in 1980.

**IN JANUARY 1980**, when it became apparent the Raiders were seriously considering the move, Oakland officials set up a "task force" to negotiate with Davis.

Oakland Mayor Lionel Wilson and Cornell Maier, chairman of Kaiser Aluminum in Oakland, were sent to negotiate.

Davis apparently was interested in the offer made by the pair, but it was turned down by higher officials.

"They said, 'when is this going to stop? We won't get the votes and this thing won't fly,'" Cunningham testified. Later another offer was made.

**CUNNINGHAM DENIED** a suggestion by Joseph L. Alioto, attorney for the Raiders, that Maier and Wilson were repudiated in their dealings with Davis. Cunningham said the two did not have the authority to bind the city and county officials.

Cunningham did admit that the Rams had a "very good deal at Anaheim Stadium but insisted that the Oakland final offer would have been the third or fourth best in the NFL. He noted that the Raiders would have made \$750,000 to \$800,000 off the luxury box suites. He conceded the Rams made \$1.5 million off their suites last season.

Judge Harry Pregerson told jurors he expects lawyers will have completed presenting their evidence by July 24.

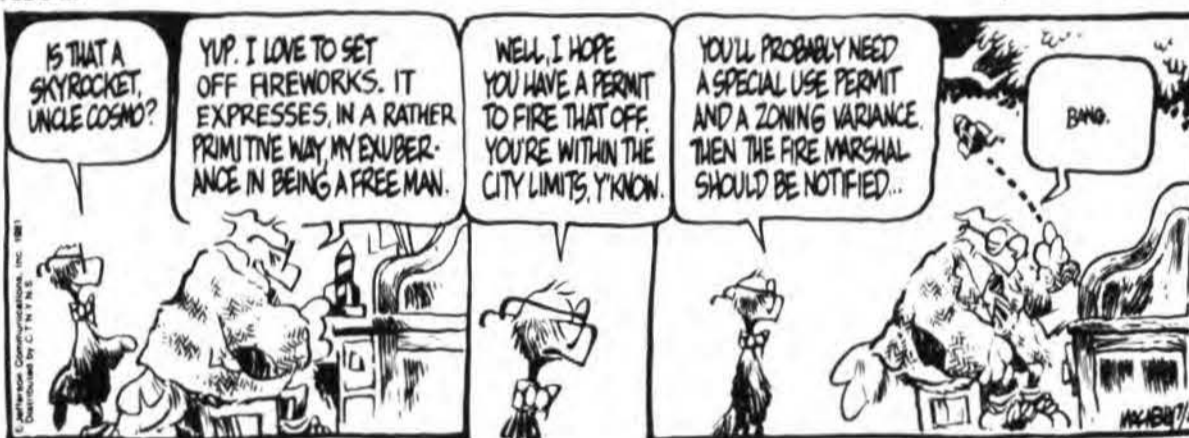

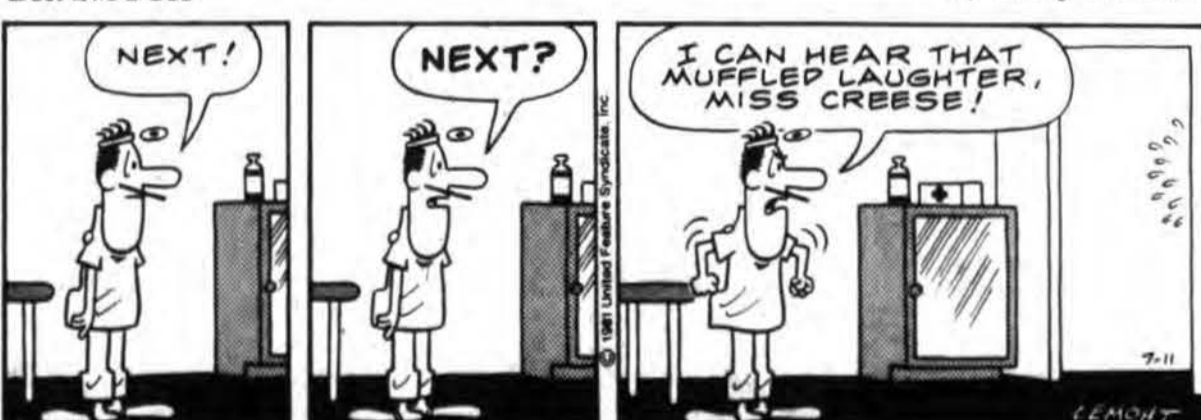

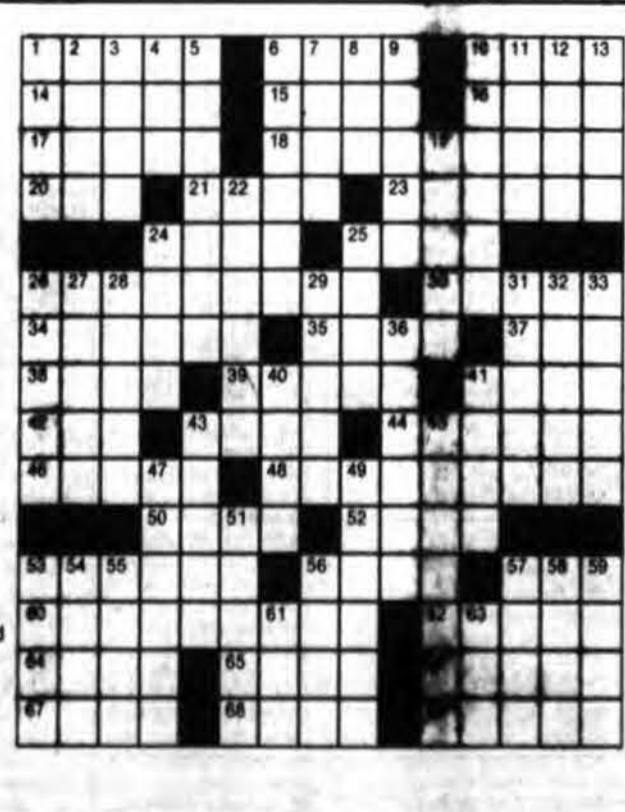

Comments added to help ratings

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The people who brought you the G, PG, R and X movie ratings system in simpler days are testing a sequel designed for an age in which even Superman leaps into bed with a single bound. Since the movie Classification and Rating Administration was formed 13 years ago in an effort to head off local censorship, a six-member panel has been giving movies ratings.

To many people, G still means "Gee!" and X still means sex, but PG and R are a little trickier. PG, for example, means parental guidance suggested, but many people have taken to asking theaters for guidance on what their children could expect to see on screen.

Now, as an experiment, the Motion Picture Association of America is providing additional comments at 200 movie theaters in Kansas and Missouri in an effort to help parents understand why some movies are PG and others are rated R, for restricted.

"The additional comments explain, for example, that we've rated something PG because of salty language, mild violence, war action or western action," said Jack Valenti, president of the Motion Picture Association of America.

"With the R rating we're just using three words: sensuality, violence and language. It's just so that people will have that additional knowledge."

The G and X ratings haven't been much of a problem. G — for general audiences — is assigned to wholesome, family type films. The X is for films featuring explicit sex.

But the PG and R ratings have long frustrated the industry. Four-letter words, particularly the frequency of them, are most likely to shove a film from the PG to R category, says Richard O'Rear, head of the Kansas City-based Commonwealth Theaters and president of the National Association of Theater Owners.

In past years, a glimpse of a woman's breast would mean a certain R rating. Now, with changing mores, it's likely to slide by with a PG.

"We've had situations where parents will call and ask why the R or PG rating," O'Rear said. "This expanded rating system just gives theaters a chance to become of more service to the parents." The additional explanation is posted at theaters, provided on recorded telephone messages and given to newspapers and reviewers.

But it's not included in ads, O'Rear said. Theater owners promised movie producers when the ratings began in the 1960s that ads wouldn't include reasons for ratings.

If the program works well in Missouri and Kansas, the idea could be expanded, Valenti said.

Steve Zuehlke, manager of the four-screen Bannister Mall cinema in Kansas City, said the theater used to get 10 to 15 calls a week from people asking for more rating information.

But answers varied from employee to employee, he said. "They reflected personal likes and dislikes and attitudes about things." The Bannister Mall cinema now uses the MPAA's expanded ratings system in its taped answering service.

"I think it's a very good service," Zuehlke said. "For those people who want that information, it is a good deciding factor for them."
