Sirhan, convicted assassin of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, has denied allegations of threats against the second Kennedy bro-ther.


Bell, a convicted burglar, told Sirhan's parole board that key witness Wilson, is "a chronic liar" and "a prolific manipulator." The board is considering whether to rescind Sirhan's 1984 parole

Bell said Wilson approached him in 1978 and suggested he corroborate Wilson's story about the alleged Sirhan death threat.

"He wanted me to say I overheard him and Sirhan talking about political figures and that I

heard him say he was going to assassinate Edward Kennedy after his (Sirhan's) release," Bell

Even as he announced American support for Britain, "our closest ally," Haig said that in the end there will have to be a negotiated settlement of the territorial dispute over the sparsely populated islands 250 miles off the Argentina coast.

"Otherwise we will all face unending hostility and insecurity in the South Atlantic," Haig said.


He began by saying that the crisis was entering "a new and dangerous phase in which large-scale military action is

He reviewed what he called an "extraordinary effort" by the United States to find a peaceful solution, an effort that sent him shuttling between London and Buenos Aires.

Haig said the United States had proposed "a fair and sound" settlement that would have included an end to hostilities, military withdrawal by both sides, creation of an interim British-Argentine-U.S. authority to administer the islands and the creation of a framework for negotiations to determine the final ettlement.

He said the final arrangement would have had to take into account "the interests of both sides and the wishes of the inhabitants," most of them of British descent.

He said the administration had reason to hope the British would consider those terms, "but Argentina informed us yesterday that it could not accept" them. (See FALKLAND, Page A2)

The first openly homosexual person named as a University of California regent won confirmation in the state Senate Thursday when Sen. Paul Carpenter, D-Cypress, cast the deciding 21st

Los Angeles attorney Sheldon Andelson, a 51-year-old gay activist, civic leader and bank chairman, won confirmation by the minimum 21 votes required after several earlier roll call votes fell short.

Carpenter, seeking the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate, said he reluctantly cast the deciding ballot so that Sen. Joseph Montoya, D-Whittier, would not have to leave his sickbed in order to vote.

Montoya had indicated he would vote "aye" on Andelson's appointment if he were present

Of the 10 votes cast against Andelson, two came from Democrats and eight from GOP law makers. The two Democrats said they opposed the appointment because of Andelson's sexual preference.

Carpenter termed his vote "courtesy vote" and said, "On the natural, I don't think I would (See GAY, Page A2)

Riverside, Imperial counties urge freeway on 'Killer 86'

BEVERLY HILLS (AP) - A 68-mile stretch of highway that offers motorists a "white-knuckle trip" as passing truckdrivers muscle them onto the road's shoulder, should be a four-lane freeway, state highway officials have been told.

However, residents of Riverside and Imperial counties, ma-king their pitch for a piece of the state transportation budget, also said they will settle for widening any portion of what they call the "killer" highway from Brawley to Indio, just to get the project under way

"We'll take it anyway we can get it, piecemeal or whatever,' said Bill Freeman, chairman of the Highway 86 Improvement Association. The group says there were six fatal accidents on the two-lane road last year.

tive director of the California Transportation Commission, held out little hope for widening at least the Riverside County por-

tion of the highway.
"It would be difficult to add anything," to highway improve-ment plans for the county because most of the funding allocated for Riverside County is slated for construction of Interstate 15, he said. He made no assessment for the Imperial County portion of Highway 86, the north-south connector between the east-west Interstates 8 and

projects to fund in the state highway program, at its Wed-nesday meeting in the Beverly Hills City Hall.

The Southern California Association of Governments is asking the commission to include in its 1982 five-year transportation program three separate stretches of Highway 86 for widening to four lanes. The projected cost would be \$32.9 million, said Ginger Gherardi, program director for SCAG.

Breaking up the two-lane road with stretches of freeway will give drivers "a chance to relax" between harrowing sections heavily used by produce trucks, said Dave Pierson, Imperial County public works director.

Recent improvements widening bridges and improving shoulders have proved a hazard for motorists, Imperial County Supervisor Abe Seabolt told the

commission.
"Truckers recognize that you can get off on the shoulder and they can use your lane to pass another truck," he said. "Generally this is the routine on Highway 86 for you to be forced off the road at least once by some large truck taking advantage of this wider pavement and using the opposing lane as a means to pass whether traffic is coming or

not."
"It's a white knuckle trip" for those Mexico-bound and the recreational vehicles heading to snow vacations, said Pierson.

In addition to reducing the number of accidents on Highway 86, a four-lane divided road could cut down on the accident toll on Highway 111, which runs along the east side of the Salton Sea, roughly parellel to Highway 86 on the west side of the water, said Richard Jandt of the Improvement Association.

During the four-year period ending at the end of 1980, the two highways together saw 1,356 accidents, 74 of them involving

fatalities with a total of 100 peo-ple killed, Jandt said.

According to the association's figures, 64 percent of the acci-dents on Highway 86 between January 1, 1977 and Aug. 31, 1980 involved trucks. Jandt said trucks were involved in 90 per-

trucks were involved in 90 per-cent of the fatal accidents.

The three stretches recom-mended by SCAG for widening include seven miles in the Kane Springs area of Imperial County, 4.6 miles in the Salton City area of that county, and a 6.2 mile stretch that would cross the coun-ty line, three miles of it in Ri-verside County.

Air Force general relieved of post

WASHINGTON (AP) — Maj. Gen. Edward Dillon is being re-lieved as vice commander of the Air Force Reserves because of an "incompatible management style" with his boss, the Air Force said today.

Air Force headquarters said Dillon's relief results from a finding by an Air Force Manage-ment Assistance Group of a "lack of a cohesive command relationship" at Air Force Reserve headquarters at Robins Air Force

Maj. Mike Gallagher, an Air Force spokesman, said Dillon, a reserve officer who has been on extended active duty, will be reassigned as a "mobilization augmentee" to the vice commander in chief of the Aerospace Defense Command at Peterson Air Force Base, Colo., effective

Gallagher said this means Dillon will return to civilian life but will spend brief periods on active duty in a job he would fill full time in the event of a national mobilization.

Until June 1, Gallagher said, Dillon will serve as a special as-sistant to the commander of the Air Logistics Center at Robins Air Force Base.

In response to questions, the

Air Force said Dillon's relief is "designed to serve the best interests and improve the operations of the Air Force Reserve.

The Air Force declined to provide any details on what led up to Dillon's reassignment or what constituted an "incompatible management style."

His successor as vice comman-der of the Air Force Reserve has not yet been named, Gallagher

Dillon, who has been in the vice commander's post since April 1979, has the right to "submit any material he wishes" if he chooses to appeal "his release from extended active duty," the Air Force said.

The appeal would go to Air Force headquarters in the Pentagon, according to Gallagher. Earlier, the Air Force said an

investigation of anonymous allegations of improprieties at Air Force Reserve headquarters found no basis for the accusations but that the investigation had indicated a need for a review of management practices there.

As a result, the Air Force assigned the Management Assistance Group to study the si-tuation. Gallagher said that group still has not completed its

Space station is next

Orbiting platform topic at Space Congress

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A space platform that would un-fold in orbit like a butterfly and grow giant solar wings was the hot topic at the 19th annual

Space Congress.

"It's a natural outgrowth of the shuttle programs," Dr. Hans M. Mark of NASA told reporters Wednesday night before addres-sing 500 participants at the space conference at Patrick Air Force

Mark said whether or not Congress commits funds for a space platform, "we're going to go out and do it."

Mark said he hopes a space platform would be placed in orbit in this decade.

He said the National Aeronautics and Space Administration had not yet presented a firm proposal to Congress because "we don't know which way we're

going to go yet. . "
The Soviet Union announced April 20 it had placed a new space station, Salyut-7, in orbit. An earlier space station, the Salyut-6, reportedly is slipping from orbit after having been closed down during the last manned Soviet mission in May 1981. It had been home to 16 cosmonaut teams, including Soviets Valery Ryumen and Leonid Popov, who set the space endurance record of 185 days in 1980.

Mark, who served as secretary of the Air Force from 1979 to 1981, found fault with the Soviet program, saying they should first develop a reusable space shuttle.

The Space Congress is an an-nual symposium dedicated to the exchange of space science and technological information. It draws NASA, military and private industry specialists who present technical papers, conduct panel discussions and give spee-

Engineers for two NASA contractors, TRW Inc. and McDonnell Douglas Corp., discussed prototypes for the space plat-

form, which could be used to launch, deploy, retrieve and maintain satellites.

Larry Morata of McDonnell Douglas said a basic space plat-form would go up on the shuttle while folded in a cocoon fashion. Once in orbit, the shuttle's robot arm would place it in space and help to unfold it "butterfly feshion" he said fashion," he said.

Additional shuttle flights then would bring more modules and "wings, legs and feet, which would be added to make the platform grow eventually into a manned space station," Morata

Marshall Norvick of TRW said space scientists are seeing "more and more interest in the com-mercialization of space." The platform would allow versatile operations such as Earth observation stations, an infrared telescope beam developed for the shuttle and astronomy and wea-

ther satellites, he said. Paul Goldsmith of TRW and Martin Gerbasi of Lockheed Inc. presented a technical report on the development of "solar power wings" to be added to space platforms to provide the heavy power demands necessary for their different functions.

Gun control

Opponents lose court challenge

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Efforts to block a gun control measure aimed for the November California ballot have been shot down by the California Supreme Court, which rejected arguments that typeface on gun control petitions was so small as to be il-

The court ruled without comment against State Sen. H.L. Richardson and eight other taxpayers who wanted a writ prohibiting the secretary of state from certifying the initiative and placing it before voters.

The measure would require registration of all handguns in California by Nov. 2, 1983. Importation and sale of new guns would be banned after April 30,


Justice Frank Richardson was the only one to vote to grant the

Richardson and the other taxpayers had contended the threepoint type for the text of the measure on the signature petitions was too small to read. Generally, the type in a word in a newspaper article is about three times that size.

Supporters pointed out the law only requires that the title and summary by the attorney general be in 12-point Roman boldface type but doesn't specify the size type for the text.

Richardson said that the secretary of state routinely advises an initiative's text should be printed in no less than six-point

Proponents said that by March 24, they had collected 300,000 of about 350,000 signatures needed. The signatures must be filed by today for verification. They said it cost about \$225,000 to collect the signatures.

DEAR PAT: When a taxpayer receives a refund check, does that mean the return has been accepted and there is no longer a need to worry about keeping receipts? Also, my refund check was not the amount I expected. Why

K.E., Huntington Beach

Even if you have received your refund check, Internal Revenue Service says this does not mean the return has been accepted without question. It is still subject to audit for three years from the deadline for filing. For example, receipts and records for the return filed by April 15, 1982 should be kept until April 15, 1985.

The change in your refund check can be the result of a correction to arithmetic, or it could be because part of your refund has been applied to pay a balance due for another year. In any event, you will be receiving a letter from the Fresno Service Center within two weeks explaining the

Both sides need to be aired

DEAR PAT: I'm a member of a special interest organization. I'm upset about a television program I saw which only represented the opinions of the other side. Isn't the station obligated to air opposing views?

K.E., Fountain Valley

Yes, stations are legally required to air opposing sides of controversial issues of public importance. However, there is no requirement that both points of view be included in the same program, or even the same program series, as long as a reasonable opportunity for contrasting views is provi-

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SACRAMENTO (AP) - California's welfare chief has com-plained that Oregon advised 5,-000 jobless Indochinese refugees to move to California where they could collect welfare, the Sacramento Union reported.

A telephone hot line told refugees in Oregon "if you want a job, go to Oklahoma City or Houston. If you want to go to school or go on welfare, go to California," according to Marion Woods, director of the California Department of Social Services.

He said the Oregon hot line also offered the refugees travel money.

The Union reported Thursday that Woods made the statement in Washington, where he attended a congressional hearing on refugee funding problems Wednesday.

He said the Oregon hot line message supplemented a letter sent to the Indochinese refugees April 1 by Keith Putnam, assistant director of human resources for Oregon.

The letter said: "I am sorry to say that for many of you, the best advice I can give you is to move to another state where your job prospects are better and where federal refugee program funding continues to be available to refugees who have been in the U.S. over 11/2 years."

It referred them to the hot line for more information.

The letter was sent two weeks ago after 2,000 Hmong tribesmen began moving from Oregon to California's Central Valley upon hearing that farm jobs were available

Putnam, contacted by the Union in Salem, Ore., acknowledged that the letter and hot line message were too strong, and said the hot line message has been changed, the newspaper

In Sacramento, Shawn Ortiz, a spokesman for Woods, said a de-legation of Hmong tribesmen from Oregon was scheduled to meet with state refugee officials.

Ortiz said part of the problem is that the federal government, which had been supporting refugees for the first 36 months, recently ruled that after 18 months employable adults would get federal help only in those states where they are eligible for local welfare.



The violation of 9 mph over the speed limit keeps Redford under a 200-point limit on violations, Utah officials said.

NBC to push comedy

Fall lineup includes 8 'funny' shows

NEW YORK (AP) - NBC, which experimented last season with prime-time series featuring stars from the past, will pursue in 1982-83 another tactic drawn from TV's history — a lineup heavy in comedy.

The network's fall schedule,

announced Thursday, includes eight comedy series, the most it has presented since 1965-66.

NBC, No. 3 behind CBS and ABC in the recently completed TV year, was the first of the three networks to unveil its fall schedule.

The NBC schedule for 1982-83, the first drafted under Grant Tinker, who succeeded Fred Silverman as the network's chief executive 10 months ago, includes 11 new series and 13 returning programs.

At least three series introduced with fanfare in the recently completed season - "Bret Maverick," starring James Garner, Mickey Rooney's "One of the Boys," and "McClain's Law," starring James Arness — were not in the schedule unveiled by

the network.

One series built around a ve-teran star, "The Devlin Connec-tion" with Rock Hudson, was announced for last season but withdrawn because he became ill. That show will be introduced in the coming season Saturday nights, 10-11 p.m.

Yet another, "Love, Sidney" starring Tony Randall, enjoyed some success last season, and will

remain a part of the NBC lineup.
"The Powers of Matthew Star," which was withheld last season after the star. Peter Barton, was injured on the set, will be in the lineup, Fridays 8-9.

NBC's enduring hit, "Little House on the Prairie," will be back, but with a new family and a new star, 19-year-old Leslie Landon. She is a daughter of Michael Landon, who is departing as star of the show but will continue as executive producer.

Other programs from this season that are not on the network's fall schedule include "Flamingo Road," "Chicago Story," "Harper

Valley" and "Barbara Mandrell, and the Mandrell Sisters."

Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC's entertainment division, said the renewed emphasis on comedy is at least partly the result of the success of series like "Love, Sidney" and "Gimme a Break," introduced last season.

The new comedy programs are "Family Ties," starring Michael Gross and Meredith Baxter Birney, Wednesdays, 9:30-10; "Cheers," with Ted Danson and Shelly Long, Thursdays, 9:30-10; "Mama's Family," starring Vicki Lawrence and Ken Berry, Sat-urdays, 9-9:30, and "Silver Spoons," with Ricky Schroder, Saturdays 8:30-9.

New dramatic series include "Gavilan," with Robert Urich, Tuesdays 9-10; "St. Elsewhere," starring David Birney, Tuesdays 10-11; David Hasselhoff in "Knight Rider," Fridays, 9-10; "Remington Steel," with Ste-phanie Zimbalist, Fridays, 10-11, and Jon-Erik Hexum and Meeno Peluce in "Voyagers!" Sundays,

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Bill seeks to curb Congress pay tricks

A bill that would, among other things, end the sneaky congressional practice of slipping members' pay raises and tax breaks onto unrelated legislation has been introduced by Sen. William Proxmire.

The measure further would bar automatic cost-of-living pay increases for congressmen and prevent any pay raises from going into effect until a new Congress is seated.

All this is in response to the storm that arose when members raised the ceiling on outside income they may earn and gave themselves permission to deduct \$75 a day for Washington living expenses without showing how the money was spent.

In the House, that benefit was tacked onto a bill raising the coal tax and passed without discussion.

Adverse public reaction to this maneuver already has resulted in attempts by some members to repeal the tax break.

The Proxmire bill would not address itself to this repeal, but it would specify that no future legislation affecting congressional pay or taxes could address any other issue, and that any such bill could be approved only by recorded vote.

It also would remove members' exemption from item-byitem justification of tax deductions for business expenses, putting them on the same footing as any other taxpayer.

And, as is done in many state legislatures, it provides that changes in compensation, tax benefits or outside earnings would be effective only when the next Congress takes office.

Proxmire says his reforms are designed to "force the Congress to deal with items of direct interest to members in a regular and open manner."

That's not only as it should be, it is long past due.

Legal but improper

Three justices of the California Supreme Court broke tradition last week by endorsing the candidacy of an Alameda County superior court judge who is facing an election challenge.

Until October 1978, judges were prohibited by the California Code of Judicial Conduct from endorsing candidates. The code has been changed to bar only en-dorsements for "non-judicial" of-

So the justices' action is quite legal. But we find it troubling.

The endorsements of Justices Frank C. Newman, Allen E. Broussard and Cruz Reynoso, all of whom were appointed to the high court by Gov. Brown, appeared in campaign literature distributed by Judge Henry Ramsey Jr., who is being challenged by an Alameda County assistant district attorney

Justice Broussard says he sees nothing wrong with the endorsement. Judges, he says, "ought to be able to turn to their fellow judges, people who know them and can say they're doing a good

job and should be retained." That sounds reasonable enough on the surface, especially in a period when incumbent judges find themselves increasingly involved in tough election races, instead of winning almost routine re-election as formerly was the

We don't doubt the sincerity of the justices who apparently have known Judge Ramsey for some time and think highly of his ability. And there should be little objection when judges at lower court levels support one another.

But, an election endorsement from members of the high court raises some difficult questions. Decisions made at the superior and appeals court levels frequently come before the Supreme Court in final appeal.

Fairly or not, the justices can be perceived as seeking to mold the lesser courts in their own image and meddling in local poli-

The Supreme Court is a highly visible and very powerful podium. It has become politicized in recent years as a result of controversial appointments or controversial decisions.

If California's high court wants to regain its once enviable position in public esteem and help restore confidence in the administration of justice to high levels, the justices should eschew even the hint of political involvement. It could come back to haunt them and hurt the court.

Soviets target Christians

WASHINGTON - Perhaps emboldened by the partial success of the Catholic Church in standing up to the Polish government in recent years, Christian sects have been giving their communist rulers a headache in the Soviet Union itself.

Astonishing reports seeping out of Russia recently indicate that the Chris-tian "problem" has become serious enough to warrant a concerted crackdown by the authorities. The particular targets of their anti-religious zeal are the underground presses of various Christian

SINCE 1979, Baptists and Seventhday Adventists have managed to set up secret "publishing houses" to turn out religious literature. The Baptists have a clandestine publication called The Christian, while the Adventists have one called The True Witness.

In addition, the underground presses have been turning out everything from Bibles and hymnals to critiques of Soviet

This clearly has the Kremlin worried. Amnesty International estimates that at least 115 Baptists and 30 Adventists in the past two years have been imprisoned "anti-Soviet slander" - an offense that includes any teaching of religion in

this officially atheistic country.

While Western journalists have publi-

cized the plight of Soviet Jews, more than half the prisoners of conscience in 1981 were Baptists, Adventists, Russian Orthodox, Jehovah's Witnesses or other Christian church members, sources told

my reporter Jeff Nesbit. Most were convicted under the slander statute, which carries a maximum sentence of three years in prison.

Besides outright prosecution, the communists have other official weapons to use against Soviet citizens brave enough to practice their religion.

Belief in Christianity is defined by Soviet law as a form of schizophrenia. With a certain ironic Marxist logic, a Soviet citizen who dares to practice Christianity might reasonably be deemed crazy and out of touch with his environment. At any rate, this statute has been used to confine Christian leaders in mental hospitals for "treatment."

Even more frightening is the law concerning deprivation of parental rights. Soviet courts can take children away from their parents and ship them to another part of the country if the elders have "neglected their duties" in child-rearing. One such duty is to edu-cate children in "the spirit of the moral code of the builder of communism," according to the Soviets' Fundamentals of Legislation. There are documented cases of children having gone into hiding to

avoid being kidnapped by the state.

The authorities have been quite successful in their crackdown on Christians: For example, most members of the Baptists' loose governing body, the Council of Evangelical Christians and Baptists in the U.S.S.R., have been in prison since January 1980.

THIS WIDESPREAD official persecution of Christians has gone virtually unnoticed in the United States. Only rare cases are reported here — like that of the "Siberian Seven," the Pentecostals who forced their way into the American Embassy in Moscow in 1978 and were given an uneasy, unofficial sanctuary in the embassy basement.

The amazing thing about the Kremlin's crackdown is the evidence it gives that Christianity still survives after more than 60 years of official repression. The regime's fury is a tribute to the courage and devotion of Christians determinedly practicing their faith in defiance of the overwhelming power of hostile rulers. It is a story unmatched since the days of the Roman Empire.

Immigration solution

"A simple and reliable and final documentation procedure for determining whether a job applicant is an illegal alien" is the major point of any effort to reform immigration law, California Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Manager Jim Van Varen told joint congressional subcommittees on immigration last week.

California firms oppose sanctions against employers for hiring illegal aliens unless such a documentation procedure can be implemented, he told committee members.

The employer, he said, should not have to be a policeman. Proper documentation would stop the wholesale movement of the Border Patrol into agricultural fields, and the law should require that before a worker could be removed from the property, his documents would be inspected by the Immigration and Naturalization Service to determine their legitimacy.

The current INS "Operation

Jobs" maneuver further emphasizes the need for adequate, noncounterfeitable documentation for legally admitted aliens to protect them and their employers.

Following the wholesale roundups in small plants and fac-

tories, it developed that the INS was obliged to release up to onethird of those detained when they were able to establish their status as legal immigrants or citizens.

Much publicity was given the fact that hundreds of unemployed Americans applied for jobs at the plants following the raids. Less, however, was given the fact that many - as in the Orange County strawberry field raids - did not want the jobs offered. The proprietor of one fish cannery, for example, was unable to find candidates for fish-cleaning jobs. "They all want to be truck drivers," he explained.

The California Chamber representative testified in a hearing on the Simpson-Mazzoli bills that would give employers a warning during the first year if caught hi-ring illegal aliens, with fines or jail terms for succeeding offenses.

It would permit the use of multiple existing identification documents for the first three years, to allow time for the government to develop a new and secure system to verify eligibility for employment.

This, of course, is the only eventual solution - and it cannot come soon enough.

Split roll initiative misses mark lief for these homeowners, it has spurred establishing a separate and higher tax

Although the inequity in property voters in 1978 was well recognized by the legislators, four years have passed without their taking remedial action. This is not surprising since the homeowners had been crying for relief for 10 years before Proposition 13 became a fact without any aid from the lawma-

Now, as the inequities increase whereby post-Proposition 13 home purchases constructions are being taxed at current market values while those who owned their homes prior to the 1978 initiative are paying taxes based upon 1975 valuations, another rebellion is brewing.

FOR THE INEQUITY of the different amounts of taxation upon homes which are similar in value has not only contributed greatly to the depression in real estate sales and slump in the building industry but is creating increasing resentment of the unfairness of the law by those who have acquired homes in the past four years.

As evidence of this, a group calling themselves "Taxpayers for California" has launched an initiative drive to provide tax relief for the victims of the Proposition 13 homeowner inequities. Since, instead of jogging the lawmakers into taking action to provide proper re-

ments to collect new unlimited amounts from the hapless homeowners under the guise of "assessments," the new initia-



tive, referred to as the "Split Roll Property Tax Initiative," must be taken seriously

While it addresses itself to the inequity problem, it actually provides much less than full equality. As Sacramento County Tax Assessor William Lynch, who agrees that the inequities are becoming a serious problem, states, "The proposed initiative doesn't do enough."

His reference is to the provision which allows only a 50 percent exemption of the difference between the previous owner's value and the market value when acquired by a new owner. It not only doesn't give the new owner the same break as the pre-Proposition 13 owner but increases the tax differences each time the home changes hands.

Not only is it a poor attempt to correct the inequity but its additional feature of

The proponents justify the split roll provision by claiming Proposition 13 has shifted the property tax burden away from business and increased the share paid by homeowners. The California Taxpayers Association, while not yet taking a position against the initiative, cites figures refuting that claim. They show the assessed value of owneroccupied homes representing only 36.5 percent of the 'otal statewide assessed property valuate ns, a drop from the 38.8 percent share which prevailed in 1976-77.

In a detaile report Cal-Tax analyzes all aspects c ... he proposed initiative. While conceu g that there has been a slowing of 'some construction and sales since Proposition 13, the report is totally negative to the initiative proposal.

If the central interest of the proponents is to bring about equality for homeowners they might put their money to better use by bringing a lawsuit for equal protection of homeowners. In fact the state Supreme Court, in ruling on the validity of Proposition 13 at the time of its passage, left the door wide open for such litigation by specifically noting the inequity flaw. In any event their solution is not the answer.

Literary lions poor marital prospects

Not only that, these fickle literary creatures invariably kiss and tell. They love to flaunt their amours in humous or posthumous me-

amours in humous or postnumous memoirs.

Think only of Coleridge and Mary Evans, Goethe and the Frau von Stein, Harlitt and Sarah Walker, Samuel Johnson and Mrs. Thrale, Montaigne and Mile, de Gourmay, Petrarch and Laura (who was the wife of Hughes de Sade), Spenser and Rosalind Kent, Voltaire and the "divine Emille."

State punishes SoCal Gas

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Southern California Gas Co. unwisely bought a lot of expensive natural gas — forcing it to pass up a bargain — say state regulators who won't let the company recover \$34.8 million in

"Imprudent" purchase of ex-pensive Canadian gas from Northwest Pipeline Corp. and Pacific Gas & Electric Co. meant SoCal Gas lost out on the chance to buy the same amount of cheaper gas from El Paso Natural Gas Co. and Transwestern Pipe-line Co., the state Public Utilities Commission said as it denied So-Cal's request to recoup gas costs.

The PUC also scolded SoCal Gas for buying "unreasonably expensive" gas in the last quarter of 1980 after supplying gas from storage to electrical utilities during a high smog period.

Robert M. Loch, a SoCal Gas vice president, said in a statement that all gas purchases made in 1980 "were reasonable and necessary under circumstances then existing to assure our ability to maintain service to utility customers, including residential

The PUC's denial of the company's request to recover \$34.8 million "imposes an exorbitant and unfair penalty on a utility that instead deserves a commendation," Loch said.

The justices upheld a state rule barring law firms from using the names of people not li-censed to be lawyers in New Jersey. Jacoby & Meyers sought a rule interpretation as a prelude to the possibility of opening offices in New

Jersey, the court noted. Leonard Jacoby and Stephen Meyers founded the interstate firm in California in 1972 and watched it grow to a to-tal of 75 law offices in California and New

The high court's 7-0 decision also noted a New Jersey ban on television advertising by lawyers. Jacoby & Meyers uses a media campaign that sometimes stresses that the rich can afford any attorney they want, the poor get free legal aid and the middle class should know about Jacoby & Meyers' rates.

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

Precision jumpers form moving art on way to Earth

That's how Marine Lt. Col. Roger Henry hailed the man in the white jumpsuit.

It sounded like a term of respect because the guy in white, Marine Capt. R. Gatewood Smith, has bailed out of planes and helicopters into the wild blue yonder nearly 2,000 times since

Thursday at the Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, he was ready to do it again along with 11 other members of the interservice Precision Parachute

The team, 11 Marines and one naval officer, led by Henry, was taking practice jumps in pre-paration for this weekend's annual Armed Forces Open House and Airshow at El Toro.

Billed as the largest free acti-vity of its type in California, the event hosted more than 350,000 visitors last year.

Like his colorfully garbed teammates, Smith appeared calm, yet alert, prior to boarding a CH46 Sea Knight helicopter for the jump.

Smith said he's jumped so of-ten that he doesn't get a lot out of it anymore but noted, "It used to be a real adrenaline rush.'

He added, "Remember the first time you ever drove a car and how you feel now about driving? Well, it's like that."


Henry, who's a parachute jump instructor and veteran of 700 jumps, was less casual. "It's a lot of fun," Henry said,

"a challenge, gets the adrenaline flowing." Describing a particular jump, called the Diamond Track, Henry said jumpers in that configuration move across the ground at 100 mph and vertically at 200

mph.
"You just boogie," he exclai-

med, "just truckin'." Another team member, Marine Gunnery Sgt. Lupe Gonzales, a jump instructor from Camp Pendleton, said, "It takes a sense of adventure and it's better than cutting grass on weekends."

Ol' Balboa ferry a Harbor fixture

It growls and rattles and chugs and with a sudden reversal in power, gently slides into port another voyage across the hectic Newport Harbor completed.

Cars rumble off and others rumble on. Men in business suits, kids in swim trunks and others on roller skates or bicycles get aboard.

Another seven-minute trip be-

The Balboa Island Ferry, ready for its 63rd summer of operation, is history in motion.

Since 1919, when a man na-med Joseph Beek took over the service and cut the cost of a trip from a dime to a nickel, the boats have been hauling man and machine across the busy bay, seven

days a week.

The ferry boats are the work-

ers of the harbor, used daily as a quick, convenient, scenic and

cheap way to get from Balboa Island to the Balboa Peninsula and back again. The flat-bottom contraptions have been used in movies, television commercials and for weddings, including one that was completed before the ferry reached the midway point in the

They've been used as launching pads by unsteady motorists who've ended up in the bay and

as targets by amateur yachtsmen. But the boats - the Admiral, the Commodore and the Captain keep on chugging, 150 trips a

Since the day Beek first launched the operation in a dinghy named the Ark, the fleet has been forced to halt service only twice - once in the early 1950s for dock work and again early this month when a hotel fire spewed charred debris near the

peninsula loading ramp. Bob Snyder, manager of the ervice, started working for the Beek family ferry line 32 years ago as a ferry pilot. His dad did the same thing before that and his two sons worked on the boats

several years ago.
"I wouldn't do anything else in the world," says Snyder, a well-tanned individual who still takes an occasional turn at the helm. "I get to work where most

people play. I've never hated coming to work." He says he always has an am-

ple stack of applications from young college students who want to spend a summer working on one of the boats. He says it's a more popular summer job in Newport Beach than being a li-

Allan Beek, one of the late founder's three sons, says the ferry operation has always pul-led its own weight, financially speaking, but has never turned a great profit.

"At any one time," he suggethe most profitable thing we to the west profitable thing we are to the west policy. And, he says, he doubts they

He recalls the story his father use to tell on how he landed the service, which actually started in 1909 as a means of hauling prospective customers to Balboa Island where vacant lots were for sale.

"There were three potential operators who approached the town council. One said he could start in a month, another said he be coming soon.

"We've been trying to hold the line at 15 cents but with inflation and everything it may be time for an increase

The present trio of boats, each of which can hold three average-sized vehicles, can accommodate up to 100 people in-cluding the pilot and money-

could start in a week and my dad said he could start the next day.

"Dad told them he had a rowboat, a pair of oars and an out-board. He said the outboard didn't always work but the oars

Seymour Beek, another of the late founder's sons and now president of the ferry service, says his father got into the business to help out another business he was - real estate.

"It was to his advantage, there's no doubt about that. He needed to get people to the island and that was the best way to do

In the early days, back when a ride was still a nickel, kids were charged to cross to the peninsula but were given free passage back on the assumption they probably would lose all their money at the Balboa Fun Zone.

As the years went by, boats with names like the Joker and the Square Deal replaced the Ark. In an effort to haul cars as well as people, founder Beek instituted a wooden float for cars that was alternately pushed and pulled across the harbor by the

In 1953, the rate for a per inus car or bike was hiked a d'ma. In 1980, it was ra cents where it still ame cents where it still ame ek, as president of the another rate increase r

On a hot August night, cars are lined up two and three blocks deep on either side of the harbor waiting to get aboard.
On a cool January day, though,

the ferry may leave port with only a handful of passengers aboard. From June 15 through Labor

Day, the ferry operates around the clock. The rest of the year it runs from 6 a.m. to midnight on weekdays and until 2 a.m. Fri-days and Saturdays.

A fulltime crew of 10 operates the service with extra help added during the summer months. It takes a person one full year of training to become a boat ope-

"It's a little trickier than it looks," cautions Snyder. "But

looks," cautions Snyder, "But passengers usually get a smooth ride. Sometimes when its foggy, though, you may get a little twisting and turning.

"We've never lost anybody yet," he laughs. Seymour Beek, who conducted a public opinion poll on the ferry service 12 years ago, claims the boats are one of the most popular features in Newport Beach.

"It's largely nostalgia, I suppose," says Beek, "but what makes me happy is that most people say they like the ferry sust the way it is.

Farmers' drives: A protection of livelihood

DEAR ANN LANDERS: In your Washington Post column you implied that 55,000 rabbits had been cruelly clubbed to death in Idaho because farmers there had offered an 8-cent-a-head bounty.

Unfortunately, many of the protesters and publicizers of the jackrabbit drives in Idaho have had a knee-jerk reaction to the clubbing stories, with little insight into the larger issue at stake.

Contrary to the common perception, the jackrabbit is not a rabbit, but a hare. He belongs to the family of rodentia, along with mice and rats. They frequently carry lice and worms, as well as two diseases fatal to humans - Rocky Mountain spotted fever and tularemia. Unlike other rodents, hares are equipped with two sets of incisor teeth, making them capable of large-scale destruction of nearly every form of plant life including orchards, vineyards, hay, grain and potato fields.

As crude and violent as the rabbit drives may seem, I have been told by Idaho farmers that this is the most humane and effective method of controlling the jackrab-

bit damage.

Alternatives to the drives have been proposed and discussed at great length, and I hope one day a less objectionable remedy will be found. Meanwhile, I think the Idaho farmers should not suffer a moral judgment because of their efforts to protect their crops and their livelihood. Sincerely - SEN. STEVE SYMMS (R-IDAHO)

Writers' hope novel

NEW YORK (AP) - The news that a book publisher is restoring cuts, changes and a whole missing chapter to "The Red Badge of Courage" nearly 100 years after Stephen Crane wrote it gives hope that writers will win out over editors in the long run.

Score one for our side.

Of course in the long run, we're all dead, as are Crane and editor Ripley Hitchcock, who excised 5,000 words from the classic novel on the Civil War when it was published in 1895 to make it more palatable to the public and less gloomy.

Rumors are rife, as they always are (you seldom run into an unrife rumor in these suspicious times) that a whole slew of literary masterpieces are about to re-emerge in their original manuscripts, exactly as their authors wrote them. Publishers row is agog with the possibilities.

MAYBE THIS TIME around, we'll get the full story of "The Lady, or the Tiger?" which we all read in school without realizing it might have been a slick editor who stuck in that question mark to make the tale more palatable.

BY BRIBERY AND cunning the princess had found out which door held the tiger this time, and she shot a signal to her lover to pick the right-hand one. The editor, being a chicken, left it to the reader to decide whether the princess had sacrificed her lover to her detested rival or thrown him to the big cat.

Rumor is that in the original manuscript Stockton had the maiden emerge in wedding raiment, but the princess in fury jumped out of the royal box, tore her to shreds, then opened the door and kicked the slats out of the tiger, too. But that apparently was considered too violent for 19th century readers, so some little tin god in a green eyeshade and celluloid cuffs went to work with scissors and pastepot and turned the whole

thing into an enigma. I hear tell that pretty much the same thing happened to "Lady Chatterley's Lover." We never did get that last chapter, "Lady Chatterley's Lover's Lover," in which Constance finally goes off to live with the gamekeeper Mellors on a farm someplace and then one of his old boyfriends shows up. That was considered too 1980s for 1928, when D.H. Lawrence wrote the novel, but you can bet your ad budget the TV producers can't wait to get their hands on

that original manuscript. Maybe this time around, we'll get the original uncut, unedited version of the movie "Citizen Kane." There have been whisperings for years around the studios that the final scene where the kid's sleigh burns up with the word "Rosebud" on it was added as an afterthought to make some sense from heavy cuts in the plot.

THE REAL ROSEBUD, they whisper, was Rosebud Bonbon, one of Kane's kinky lady friends, a carnival geek with a heart of gold and a stomach like cast iron who got him kicked out of Harvard for biting the head off a frog in biology class. The Hays office wouldn't buy it.





How to attract hummingbirds

How can you attract hummingbirds to your

It isn't easy, but you can offer some inducements to these tiny birds which apparently visit

only flowers from which they can get nectar.

There are about 300 species of hummingbirds and the family is found only in the Americas. Only one major species, the Rubythroat, lives in the northeast United States.

Flowers that lure hummingbirds include mock orange, butterfly bush, wisteria, honeysuckle, beebalm, trumpet vine, lobelia, phlox, Sweet William,

Other hummingbird favorites include lonicera, japonica vine, salvia pratenis or blue sage, a semishake perennial, aquilegia canadensis, American columbine, penstemon hybrids called beard tongue, delphinium formosum, or hardy larkspur, and silene, or catchfly

They also enjoy cockspur, coral bells, flowering tobacco, garden balsam, gladiolus, jasmine, morning glory, petunia, red hot poker, scabiosa, scarlet bush. scarlet sage and weigela.

The hummingbird depletes its energy so fast that it must visit many flowers to feed on nectar and tiny insects.

These active feeders, which visit flowers often, also are especially attracted by red or orange colored blooms

Hummingbird feeders are available at garden shops or you can make them. Needed is a container to hold a sweet syrup and glass or plastic tubes from

which the birds can feed. Colored flanges around feeding tubes that suggest flowers draw the birds.

A recipe for the hummingbird container: Fill it with a nutritious sweet solution of water and honey, syrup or other sweetener and red or orange food coloring.

Hummingbirds feed mostly at dawn and dusk, the females generally perch quietly while the male swoops and dives above her in a May courting ri-

For nesting, hummingbirds prefer dense sh-rubbery shaded by taller plants, building diminutive nests of lichens and mosses stuck together with

Check tools carefully:

When buying gardening tools you may ask; long or short handles? Garden tools are extensions of your body for reaching, pulling, pushing, throwing, or shaping, cutting or for use as lever when turning over the soil. You use tools precisely when weeding or thinning, or when you are moving soil.

So, the best length of handle depends on your size and strength and whether the tools will be used lightly or roughly with lots of force. Spades and shovels need heavy, reinforced handles because you use them as levers

Big, square hoes for chopping heavy soil need heavy handles. Iron rakes and the small hoes for weeding need long, strong and lightweight handles because they are used for reaching and precise



FDA orders recall of Colorado firm's pacemakers

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — Experidevices that regulate heartbeats by delivering electrical shocks at a pre-determinent of a linear part of a linear because of a "reasonable probability that the use of or exposure to the product will cause death," says a Food and Drug Administration spokesman.

Bill Rados said that the federal agency ordered a recall of pacemakers distributed under the brand names Synthemed and Valleylab.

Pacemakers are battery-operated

makers have a reserve battery cell for backup power.

Rados said 34 of the pacemakers — 12 in the United States and 22 in Ja-pan — are still in patients.

Ed Cheatham, president of Synthemed, said his company notified the FDA about the potentially defective pacemakers after one of the 108 devices the company has manufactured stopped working in a patient. He said the patient didn't suffer any immediate ill effects.

"We advised the physicians managing the patients about the problem," Cheatham said. "For a very great percentage of patients, it's not a lethal

"It depends upon what their un-

derlying heart problem might be," he said. "It's the doctor's decision whether it's in the patient's best interest to remove the pacemaker."

Letters warning of the defect were sent by the company in December, January and again last week, said Rados. He said the devices were distributed to physicians in Colorado, California, Missouri, New York, Ore-gon, Texas, Vermont and Washington, plus in Japan and Austria. PUBLIC NOTICE

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Businessmen try mortgages to raise cash

By JOHN CUNNIFF

NEW YORK — Pressed by sluggish sales and the reluctance of old credit sources to lend them money, many small-business people are mortgaging their homes.

The extent of activity isn't quite clear, but many consumer credit companies are involved, and one company, BA Business Credit Corp., has \$100 million of such loans outstanding and is growing

All the loans, said William R. Hobson, president of the BankAmerica Corp. financial services com-

pany, are made to small businesses, often retail outlets, restaurants or taverns, with homes as col-

Hobson stresses that some loans are for expansion, or even for seed money in brand-new businesses, rather than to meet emergencies. But he also provides figures to show the latter is very much at work.

Last year, he said, 30 percent of applicants were rejected, though screened by brokers, accountants and others who refer potential customers. The ratio this year is 45 percent to 50 percent, he

Adding to the pressure on small businesses, said Hobson, is that traditional sources are tending to draw away from small-business loans. Banks, he said, say they can't afford to make them, and some commercial finance companies establish a minimum of \$500,000 for each loan.

Hobson's company, based in Allentown, Pa., offers loans from \$10,000 to \$500,000, although the latter is relatively rare.

"Our current loans average \$100,000, except in California, where the average has been \$200,000,"

Collateral generally is the borrower's home, but rental and commercial properties are accepted.

Making possible this source of business financing has been the sharp rise in the market values of houses. A home bought for \$45,000 a decade ago might be worth \$110,000 now. Assuming a mortgage of \$20,000, up to 80 percent of the remainder, \$90,000, might be available for borrowing.

Hobson's rates range from 18 percent to 21 percent, payable in five years, but with installments

made on the basis of a 15-year loan. That means the borrower's monthly repayments are manageable, but he is presented with a sizable "balloon" payment at the end of five years.

Assuming the borrower's credit standing has remained good, he usually can be considered for another loan at that time, based on current interest rates. While no one can say what rates will be five years from now, Hobson suggests there is at least a chance they might be lower.

One criticism of such practices is that the loans are made on the basis of total rather than business income. The important factor is the overall ability to handle the loan, said Hobson, and therefore his company includes income from sources other than the business.

Conceivably, therefore, a failing business could persist as a drain on the borrower's personal assets when, it has been suggested, it might be wiser for

him to fold or radically reorganize the business. So far, however, BA Business Credit has had few bad experiences with borrowers. It owns 4 houses as a result of foreclosures, down from 6 a short time ago, and Hobson suggests that if business were better in general these might never have appeared among BA's assets.

In his estimation, the industry, which he credits BA Business Credit with pioneering, "is still in its infancy." The company has four branches, in Richmond, Atlanta, Indianapolis and San Diego, and expects to open a branch in Denver, and perhaps another city also, this year.

In his estimation, the home mortgage type of financing offers small-business people — proprietorships and partnerships as well as those that are incorporated - an open door at a time when doors

Moreover, it adds an alternative to "brickhouse" outfits that offer home mortgage loans almost indiscriminately, but charge as much as 35 percent interest, depending on the state, and frequently foreclose.

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

Edison, Workman survive flow blows

Surprise! Surprise!
A state administrative law judge has found no evidence that Edison High football coach Bill Workman is a cheat and devious rascal. Nor, apparently, are any of Workman's aides.

What has transpired over the past few months has been one of the more remarkable stories of the Orange Coast area.

Edison High football became so strong that envy turned to hate. For many, the only good news was bad news if it pertained to Edison, which has rampaged to a 45-5 record over the past four years, including 32 straight victories before ending in the CIF playoffs in 1981.

There are always a lot of people ready to jump on a successful boat and sail with a winner - and Edison's tremendous reputation brought forth a few transfers, none the least one Kerwin Bell, in my judgment possessing the fastest initial burst of any high school back in Orange County history. Kerwin came to Edison following Mike Dotte-

rer's transfer from Mater Dei a year before and with him he brought a younger brother, Dino, who PREP SPORTS



started for Edison at tailback after Kerwin's de-

So, for three years the Chargers had a starting tailback who was a transfer and lo and behold, the 1981 season found Chatsworth High transfer Theo Langford starting in the backfield, too.

And, there were other transfers, some pretty good, some average. And, along with the power already present, the Chargers just kept winning despite being the primary target of every oppo-

Out of it all came a multi-paged document charging Edison with a lot of misdeeds. It was more of a statement than a charge, since it wasn't signed,

but distributed to one and all, demanding an in-

vestigation.
The final resolution by the Sunset League was to have a law judge enter the issue, hear from all sides and give a judgment, to the ire of Workman and his associates.

Workman told me more than once he knew exactly what would come of it.

"They won't find anything wrong because there hasn't been anything wrong," said Workman.
But he also knew this. The judgment is "not guilty." It isn't "innocent,", but "not guilty" — and there is a big difference in that statement for someone who happens to be innocent.

"The case is closed. We'll not run after our tails anymore," said Huntington Beach District Superintendant Jake Abbott.

"It needs to be said loudly and clearly that the administration and coaches are honest and ethical and we are proud to have them.'

This is one time I'd like to have a loudspeaker available, rather than this column.

The authors of the unsigned document, howe-

ver, maybe did themselves some good. After being treated as an accused cheat for several months. chances are Workman will pack his bags one of these days and head off to somewhere where he's appreciated. Once that's done inferior programs may find

themselves doing better. "They (Edison High) were dealt some pretty

low blows," says Westminster High Coach Barry You know, it's not like Workman and his crew are strangers to the league. Look around. Hunt-

ington Beach's football team is coached by Greg Henry, who replaced Bob Isherwood, both with experience under Workman. Mike Henigan was Marina's coach and is now an assistant at Fountain Valley after a tour with Workman and Waters was an assistant to Workman

for several years. Ken Moats, Ocean View's coach until stepping down just recently, had nothing but admiration for Workman and his team, before and after getting (See ROGER, Page C4)





proximately two minutes. ABC's telecast of Saturday's race will be 88 minutes longer. Chuck Howard worries whether that will be enough time to tell the story of what he sees as a festive happening in America.

"That may sound ludicrous, that 90 minutes isn't enough time to do a two-minute race, but it's true," said Howard, who is producing the Derby show.

This will be ABC's eighth consecutive Run for the Roses, but the first time 11/2 hours is being set aside specifically for the race. The telecast starts at 1:30 p.m. PDT, approximately 1 hour and 10 minutes before posttime.

"We felt we just didn't do it justice in 60 minutes (the previous on-air time)," said Howard. "It had nothing to do with ratings; it was a matter of journalism. When you take away the race itself, plus the time we're live in the paddock and the replays and interviews afterward, plus the commercials, you have literally less than 15 minutes to fill in the background.

"The Kentucky Derby is not just a horse race, it attracts its own audience. And a majority of the people who watch it watch one race a year. They don't know about the horses, the tradition. We have to tell them the story of a festive happening in America.

"When we first proposed expending to 90 minutes, we won-dered if we could fill the time. But once we looked at the story possibilities, it became obvious we wouldn't have any trouble. The way the field is going this year, we may run out of time before we run out of material."

With injuries knocking out any of the early favorites, this ear's Derby is expected to draw wide-open field with the maxsum 20 horses entered.

"Each of those 20 horses has an wner, a trainer and jockey who sch have an interesting story," oward said.


Finally, he thoroughly examined the Rams' strengths and weaknesses and proceeded — with a feeble NFL draft - in trying to fill some of the holes he found.

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
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Wilderness man

John Muir to be featured on KOCE

The life and writings of the father of Yosemite National Park, environmentalist John Muir, are chronicled in "California Dreams: Wilderness Man," airing Wednesday at 8 p.m. on KOCE (Ch. 50). The special features actor and environmentalist

Eddie Albert as host and narrator

It is a production of KOCE-TV, Huntington Beach, and is made possible by a grant from First Interstate Bank of California Foundation, which has also distributed special educational materials free to Calfornia secondary and post-secondary schools and librarie

"Wilderness Man" offers breathtaking footage of the Yosemite National Park from its inception in 1890 to the present day. The story focuses on Muir's struggle to educate the public about the natural beauties of the California wilderness and on his

life-long efforts to preserve it.

Excerpts from Muir's prolific writings are delivered by Albert, who also offers a narrative on the environmentalist's personal and political life. The story follows Muir's life, from his family's arrival in the United States from Scotland, through his first trip to Yosemite and into his later life, when he have me one of the first environmental labbuirt in became one of the first environmental lobbyists in

Vintage photographs of Muir with Presidents Taft and Theodore Roosevelt, with whom he "swapped tall tales around the campfire," highlight the telecast, as do classic stills of his home and family, of loggers and shepherds who were changing the Yosemite landscape in the early part of this century, and of the breathtaking Yosemite area which has lured environmentalists, businesses and

the public for over 100 years.

The preservation of the Hetch Hetchy Valley, one of only three such natural wonders in the world and one of Muir's pet projects, is also examined in "Wilderness Man." Controversy over the damming of this magnificent area was heated and the arguments split the naturalists into two groups; the preservationists and the conservationists. This stor-my issue brought the reticent Muir to the forefront as America's leading environmental lobbyist, but unfortunately it did not change the fate of the Hetch Hetchy.

"Wilderness Man": will air as part of a special "California Dreams" series retrospective over KOCE, which includes the May 12 premiere of "The Valley," a program on the Salinas Valley, and encore telecasts of "The Dream of Don Guadalupe" and "Golden City."



Reagan vs. CBS: Who's the heavy?

Pity the poor President.

Last week the Reagan Administration asked for 30 minutes of prime time on CBS to respond to a network documentary exploring how recent cut-backs in federal aid have hurt the needy and the

White House officials said President Reagan was upset because the Administration hadn't been given a chance to present its side on the documen-tary, which was entitled "People Like Us."

In a rare display of network moxie, CBS said

The one-hour CBS documentary was reported by Bill Moyers. Although he is known as one of television's more distinguished journalists, Moyers also did a stint as White House press secretary under Lyndon Johnson, as his critics took pains to point out during last week's flap.

CBS described the program as "advocacy journalism," an examination of the so-called "victims" of Reaganomics, not a pro and con look at the President's fiscal theories.

Nevertheless, Reagan reportedly watched the broadcast and considered it unfair.

CBS responded to the White House request for

equal time by saying the network had done exten-sive reporting on the President's economic views in the past. CBS "respectfully rejected" the Reagan

It has become obvious that the former actor in the White House is quite uncomfortable with one role that's sometimes been assigned to him: the

Reagan has consistently rejected any attempts to make him a scapegoat for every American who is

hungry or out of work.

Yet this stance runs directly counter to the traditional journalistic technique for covering stories such as poverty and widespread unemploy-

Reporting that thousands of people are out of work has little impact on a television viewer — or a newspaper reader, for that matter. Journalists overcome this by focusing on one or two individuals who have lost their obs and then indicate there are

thousands more out there in the same bind. So while the President denies responsibility for

every little shopkeeper who's had to close his doors TV and print journalists keep zeroing in on such shopkeepers as symbols of a nationwide trend.

Reagan talks about bad-tasting medicine that will eventually improve the nation's health. But

those pesky news reporters keep finding people who are choking on that medicine.

No wonder the President is upset! Was CBS right to deny Reagan's request for 30 minutes to respond to the documentary.

Yes, for several reasons.

Giving in to the President would have set a bad precedent. The Administration might get into the habit of demanding TV time — or print news space every time a report portrays him as anything less than a saint.

Such a habit could have a chilling effect on journalists. News people could begin to think twice before reporting stories critical of the Administration out of fear that the President would demand valuable air time or print media space.

This is not to say that all news should be re-ported in a one-sided fashion. The networks' regu-lar nightly news broadcasts strive for balanced comments from the Administration and its critics.

But this is not always necessary in a more ecialized documentary format, which often reflects a particular point of view and focuses on narrower subject matter.

In the case of "People Like Us," it was important to see how the little people outside the Washington spotlight are faring under the current Adminstration policies.

Though these little people may be forgotten by next week, the White House press corps will still be following Reagan around like a pack of hungry

The President will get plenty of time on the TV screen to sell his economic policies. in fact, Reagan uses television better than his recent pre-

Television was not kind to Richard Nixon, who always seemed to develop beads of sweat on his upper lip under the hot TV lights.

The same cameras caught Gerald Ford stum-bling numerous times as he tried to board the Presidential ist

Presidential jet.

Jimmy Carter could don a cardigan sweater and pose beside a fireplace, but he still came across as cool and distant on the home screens.

Whether it's his actor's training or not, Ronald Reagan comes across superbly on television.

The cameras have caught him on horseback.

They've shown him passing sandbags during the recent Fort Wayne flood.

At press conferences, he employs a warm just-plain-folks tone and sounds like he knews what he's talking about - even when the White

House has to issue corrections a few hours later. CBS has turned him down this time, but the President shouldn't feel too sad. The next time he needs a few minutes of prime time for a news conference or a "major address," you can be sure the networks will give him whatever he needs.

And the people who are poor, hungry or out of work will probably be watching, too.....

The show, which captured three Tony awards including Best Musical in 1978, is still running on Broadway after 1,500 performances.



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

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Off the street and into 'Texas'

NEW YORK — Pam Long walked off the street — more or less — and into a leading part in "Texas" on NBC, and it's no wonder. "I think," she says, "I'm a female Burt Reynolds.

"We're both jocks from the South," Miss Long says, "both independent and funny and underrated as intelligent people, and I have the same goals as he does."

Miss Long, a self-described "late-bloomer," admits she's never met Burt Reynolds. "But," she adds with some haste, "I feel like I know him."

That kind of self-confidence has to count for something, and for Pam Long, Miss Alabama '74, it led directly to a role, as Ashley Linden, in NBC's struggling soap.

struggling soap.

The "Texas" story, in its own way, is nearly as unlikely as Miss Long's. The series was introduced Aug. 4, 1980 in the 3-4 p.m. EST slot, opposite the daytime champion "General Hospital" on ABC.

The series, moderately successful at times, clobbered by "General Hospital" for the most part, has moved to 11 in the morning now.

Miss Long had virtually no acting experience—only one paying part, in a dinner theater production of "Play It Again, Sam" — when she walked onto the "Texas" set in Brooklyn just over a year ago. She'd done some commercials, and had been on TV before, in Alabama.

"But my very first stage kiss," she says, "was

on 'Texas.' It was with Jerry Lanning, the guy who plays my husband and that's not very comforting when you find later that you've got to play a bed scene.

"My grandfather's a preacher back in Alabama," she says, "and when I read the script, I panicked." Lanning and others on the set, including Beverlee McKinsey, the daytime star who has since left the show, helped her through the scene, Miss Long says, "and I'm a professional now. Those things don't bother me. Besides, how romantic can it be, with two or three cameras staring you in the face?"

Pam Long was 26 when she arrived in New York City in July 1980, looking for work in commercials. She'd done a few, locally, and had been host on three TV interview programs in Alabama, including "Montgomery A.M."

"I didn't know you couldn't just a walk in and see people," she says. "All I knew is I wanted to make commercials — take the money and run. I'd never really been an actor — there were the talk shows and I was a ventriloquist. I walked in and said 'I want to be your spokemen."

said, 'I want to be your spokesman.'

"I think they thought I was a hoot," she says.
"But I ended up getting a test for a commercial for a new shampoo." The product, apparently, never was marketed.

There were other, mostly small, jobs, and plenty of screen tests, and, almost by chance, an audition for "Texas."

"I couldn't believe it," she says of the day she was cast in the soap. "I thought I'd blown the test, and here I was, Ashley Linden, college graduate, career girl, from Savannah, Georgia.

"Of course, she was conniving and mean, and I'm nothing like that," the actress says. "She's changed since then, but she's had all kinds of things happen to her. She's been blackmailed, and Reena"— Reena Dekker, played by Carla Borelli— "is always out to make her look bad. She's always trying to keep her husband out of trouble, and she's got a son she can't acknowledge."

Miss Long says instinct and life experience make up for a lack of time on the stage — she was involved in politics in Alabama — and she's got something else that suits "Texas."

"All of the people I've worked with have said, 'You've got to get rid of the accent.' I do want to learn 'General American' as a dialect," she says, "but I don't want to talk that way. I think I sound just the way I should for the show."

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

But the main focus will be the two major balloon competitions.

loon competitions.

In the morning, 10 hot air balloons will take part in the Orange County Classic, a successor to last year's Fountain Valley Classic contest.

In this event, each pilot picks a target within 50 miles of the Mile Square Park launch site. Each pilot is required to land his balloon as close as possible to the predetermined target.

This feat is not as easy as it sounds because unlike conventional aircraft, a balloon cannot be steered. It must ride with the wind, moving with the prevailing weather conditions.

Hot air balloons rely on a propane burner to remain aloft for two to four hours.

remain aloft for two to four hours.

Last year's hot air winner was Ken Frank of Redwood City, who landed on his predetermined target, the Imperial Golf Course in Brea.

This year, Orange County Classic pilots may lift off between 9 and 11 a.m.

From 1 p.m. to dusk, eight teams from the United States, Japan, Germany and France will lift off in the 1982 Gordon Bennett Race, a distance

competition utilizing helium-filled balloons.

This contest will feature some of the world's most famous balloonists.

Last year's winners, Albuquerque businessman Ben Abruzzo and Japanese restaurant chain owner Rocky Aoki, will return to try for a second victory. (Abruzzo also won the 1979 Gordon Bennett with a

(Abruzzo also won the 1979 Gordon Bennett with a different partner.)

Abruzzo was part of the three-man team that completed the first successful trans-Atlantic balloon flight in 1978. Last November, Abruzzo and Aoki took part in the first successful trans-Pacific balloon flight, flying nearly 6,000 miles from Japan to a crash landing in Northern California.

Also participating in this year's Gordon Bennett will be the father and son team of Maxie and Kris Anderson. Maxie Anderson was part of the 1978 trans-Atlantic balloon flight with Abruzzo.

In 1980, Maxie and Kris Anderson completed a transcontinental flight from San Francisco to Quebec, Canada. They reside in Albuquerque.

This year's Gordon Bennett Race will include the first American husband and wife team. John and Mari Shoecraft of Scottsdale, Ariz., will fly "Rodney the Jazz Bird."

Last October, John Shoecraft was half of the two-man Super Chicken III flight, which took off from the campus of Orange Coast College and landed off the coast of Georgia. This was the first non-stop balloon flight across the continental United States.

The Gordon Bennett Race is named for the Name York Harvald authlished and the states.

The Gordon Bennett Race is named for the New York Herald publisher who spensored the first contest in 1906. The competition continued annually through 1939, when it was canceled because of the onset of World War II.

The race was revived in 1979 by Rolling Hills scientists Thomas Heinsheimer. The 1879 event was See Balloon, Page 2

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


BLUE ANGELS . . . Strutting their stuff

After 10 months on the road, doing nine shows week in the biggest cities around the country, the Ice Capades brings its season to a close this weekend at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

For featured performer Aimee Kravette of Costa Mesa, the last homestand brings to an end the shortest, hardest season of her professional skating

And if she were the complaining type, she might bring tears to your eyes with tales of the broken collar bone last July that sidelined her for five months, or the Ice Capades show in New York last February when she tried to kick a bobby pin off the ice at the same time someone else did, and got a 60-stitch slash on her shin for her trouble.

But a complainer is one thing she isn't, and when the 22-year old skater takes to the ice for the year's last four shows this weekend, no one will probably notice much more than a graceful champion skater who loves making her audience gasp in appreciation.

Kravette sums up her injury-prone season — her second with the Ice Capades in an otherwise injury-less career — with a laugh and a self-

deprecating assessment:

"I'm so dumb. I was trying to walk my dog while riding my bike, and he crossed in front of me and down I went. I was lying there in the street thinking about everyone who would yell at me for being so dumb."

Eager to correct her "mistake," Kravette convalesced a short four weeks before hitting the ice

again. The broken collar bone separated, and she

was out again until December.
But bad luck wasn't to be outwitted. Kravette's first show in February was going without a hitch until she tried to kick the bobby pin off the ice. But in the flash of a partner's newly sharpened skate, it all changed.

"I remember kicking for the pin and someone else's skate hitting my leg," she said. "I didn't want to mess up the show, so I just held onto the people next to me, really leaning on them for support, before I had a chance to look down. I saw a little blood and skated off the ice. Then I saw the whole thing. I think I screamed for 10 minutes before they quieted me down."

And sitting in a New York City hospital emergency room didn't work wonders for her sense

of serenity either.
"This is definitely not 'General Hospital,' I kept thinking. I kept wanting Rick Springfield to walk by, but no luck. Just a lot of bums and here I

walk by, but no luck. Just a lot of bums and here I am in my skating costume with blood running off my leg," she said, laughing again.

It may be that Kravette has used up all the bad luck of a career in just one season, because until this year, her rise to the top of figure skating showmanship has been sweeping and unfettered by such niggling things as injury.



Playwright likes to 'haye written'

Like so many writers, Ted Tally ain't exactly bonkers over writing. He likes to "have written.

But you wouldn't know it by the way he has been grinding out plays since he decided that was

the way he was going to put food on the table.

Tally was in town last week to help stage the South Coast Repertory's production of "Coming Attractions" for the Second Stage. This slick little

one-act satire is scheduled to run through May 9.

"I'm very pleased with the way SCR has done the play," he said during a lunch break. "Paul Rudd is directing his first play and is doing a good job and there are seven very fine actors in a multitude of roles. They have done an excellent job with the play."

A native of Greensboro, N.C., Tally started out to be an actor, but the idea of writing continued to chew away at him. So, one summer, while still in high school and attending the summer school for

arts, he penned his first play, an anti-war story, simply titled "V."

"Both my parents were teachers," the friendly playwright offered, "they always encouraged me to read a lot. As a result, I became a bookworm. When other kids were playing Little League baseball, I had my nose buried in a book. I'd take a book and a flashlight to bed with me and hide under the blankets and when I was supposed to be sleeping,

I'd be reading.
"By reading so much, I came to love words and decided to write a novel while still in high school. I had no idea how it should be done, so I set to work. I thought a novel should be written like it is read—all at once. So I tried to write the whole thing at one setting in long hand. After about 40 pages of that I grew tired of it and decided to become an actor."

His first effort at play writing was quite suc-cessful and was turned into a TV special for local television in Greensboro. A second play, "Sand

Creek," followed. It was about the Indian massacre at Sand Creek and it, too, was successful, going statewide.

"After that," Tally said with a smile, "I thought this is easy, but it hasn't been that easy since. That was before I discovered writing takes discipline and can be a very lonely profession.
Words don't just jump on the paper and that's why
I say I don't like to write, but have written."

Because of his first two plays, Tally was able to attend Yale and the Yale School of Drama, where he became a John Golden Fellow in playwriting and won the Kazan Award as well as the Theron Rockwell Field Prize.

While a senior at Yale, Tally wrote "Terra Nova" in 1977 to become a professional writer. Afterwards he was able to get a grant and a teaching

position at the college.

"Terra Nova" has been a highly successful play, having been produced a number of times in the United States, as well as Great Britain, Sweden,

Norway, Denmark, Spain and New Zealand.

A professional writer for the past five years,
Tally wants to try his hand at all kinds of writing

screen plays, novels, short stories, etc.
"I have done some film scripts," he pointed out. 'I've sold them, but none have been made into films. Writing for the camera is a lot different than writing for the stage. In film you have to think about camera angle and concentrate more on plot, story and action, while a stage play is more con-

cerned with the language.
"So far, most of my money has been made in writing for the stage. Only about a third has been in

Tally admits his dream is "to have a long and varied career as a writer. I hope I'll keep growing and writing vigorous plays until I'm 70. I see writing as a marathon and not a sprint.

"I've discovered that I make a different set of mistakes each time out," Tally volunteered. "But that's how I learn. If I made the same mistakes each

time out, I wouldn't learn much. I just keep moving from one play to the next, hoping to learn some-thing each time."

Tally openly admits that satirical writing is among the hardest. His "Coming Attractions" is a satire about media madness. It's funny and works

"A funny story came out of that Indiana production," Tally recalled with a chuckle. "I was talking on the phone with one of the production people about the play. I asked her how it was doing and she replied, 'Well, I've got some good news and some bad news. The good news is that the show is selling well, but the bad news is the theater burned down after the opening. We moved the play into the high school auditorium. It was a sell out, but the next day we were hit with 16 inches of snow. We've next day we were hit with 16 inches of snow. We've had the worst blizzard in the history of the state. Still, business is good.'"

(The program's excel-lence only heightened the need for the new Orange County Performing Arts Center. The 80-piece orchestra and 140-voice chorale made things a bit crowded, especially for the soloists jammed onto the stage's front edge. No one should have to dodge violin and cello bows

The Studio Cafe has long been a favorite among jazz aficionados who appreciate an intimate pub featuring live entertainment seven nights a

Witness the lines that form outside on a Friday or Saturday evening and you'll have to figure there's good stuff inside.

It's a boisterous group and the management couldn't be more delighted that a strong following has emerged since the place opened six years ago.

If you arrive before 9 in the evening, there's quite a different scene. The music is classical (recorded) and the atmosphere quieter but just as

The restaurant is in full swing serving up the Studio Cafe's rather simple but tasty menu offerings. You have a choice of four items; beef ribs, chicken breast, shrimp or a combination of ribs and

Manager Von Martt subsequently explained that the menu was planned for quality not quantity. But to give their bill of fare a little more variety, a fresh seafood offering is included in the Wednesday and Thursday evening menu. The catch (\$8.95) can be red snapper, sand dabs, bluefish, scallops, scampi or Boston scrod - all, according to Martt, served fresh, not frozen.

The Studio Cafe puts special emphasis on an easygoing atmosphere. The waiters are clad in T-shirts and make special effort to have customers feel like good buddies rather than patrons. The interior is marked by stained glass, wood shingle walls and hanging plants"

Adjacent to the Balboa Peninsula boardwalk,

Dinner begins with a large serve-yourself bowl

of salad with a creamy garlic dressing.

The ribs turned out to be the hit of the evening. I almost wished I'd changed my order upon seeing plates of succulent ribs served to others in the restaurant.

with the barbecue sauce.

The shrimp was lightly seasoned and broiled with onions, bell peppers and cherry tomatoes. Though I tasted the distinct flavor of soy sauce, 1 again missed out on the ginger.



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

Voman burned in crash

injuries in the collision, police Huntington Beach traffic officer J. C. Dowling reconstructed

the accident this way: Esin Denktas, 29, was north-bound on Golden West with her mother, Colingil Suat, 54, and her mother-in-law, Selma Denktas, as passengers in the Cadillac.

Lane address. Witnesses told police the Cadillac entered the intersection and was struck broadside by a Mercedes driven by Julia Marie Lammano, 36, of 5541 Ridgebury Drive, Huntington Beach



"He wanted me to say I overheard him and Sirhan talking about political figures and that I heard him say he was going to assassinate Edward Kennedy after his (Sirhan's) release," Bell

Initially, Bell said he did tell that story to authorities but now claimed he was lying. When parole board member Loretta Collier referred to a previous statement by Bell quoting Sirhan as saying, "I ain't finished with him (Robert Kennedy) yet. I'll get his brother," Bell was adamant.

U.S. cuts export, aid to Argentina

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. announced economic sanctions and the suspension of military exports to Argentina today and said the United States would "respond positively to requests for materiel support" for Britain in the crisis over the Falkland Islands.

"There will of course be no direct U.S. military involvement," Haig said in an-nouncing the sanctions ordered by President Reagan after Argentina on Thursday rejected anew U.S. efforts to mediate the dispute.

Haig said while he pressed the effort at mediation, the United States refrained from taking sides in the crisis, and Britain understood that position.

"Now, however, in light of Argentina's failure to accept a compromise, we must take concrete steps to underscore that the United States cannot and will not condone the use of unlawful force to resolve disputes," he

Argentina invaded the British-held islands April 2, and the British sent their fleet to the South Atlantic to mount a bloc-

kade that took full effect at 4 a.m., PDT today.

Even as he announced American support for Britain, "our closest ally," Haig said that in the end there will have to be a negotiated settlement of the territorial dispute over the sparsely populated islands 250 miles off the Argentina coast.

"Otherwise we will all face unending hostility and insecurity in the South Atlantic," Haig said.

He began by saying that the crisis was entering "a new and dangerous phase in which large-scale military action is

He reviewed what he called an 'extraordinary effort" by the United States to find a peaceful solution, an effort that sent him shuttling between London and Buenos Aires.

Haig said the United States had proposed "a fair and sound" settlement that would have included an end to hostilities, military withdrawal by both sides, creation of an interim British-Argentine-U.S. authority to administer the islands and the creation of a framework for negotiations to determine the final settlement.

County jobless rate expected to rise

Although Orange County's jobless rate remained unchanged through March, unemployment is expected to swell in the county by June when college graduates flood the job market, according to Employment Development Department figures released Thursday.

According to labor market analyst Alta Yetter, the county's 6.1 percent jobless rate "still compares very favorably" to the March unemployment rates for the state and the nation - 9.4 and 9 percent respectively.

The EDD figures indicated that 73,000 Orange County residents were out of work in March. compared to 72,000 in February. The unemployment rate remained unchanged because the size of the labor market increased.

The March 1982 rate compared to an unemployment rate of 4.3 percent posted in March of last year in Orange County.

Ms. Yetter said the outlook for the future isn't bright, predicting that the jobless rate will rise considerably in future months because of near-certain layoffs in manufacturing.

She said that the increased hiring in trade and service industries probably will not offset the layoffs.

Barbara Mandrell was named top female vocalist Thursday night, Merle Haggard won top male vocalist, and the duo of David Frizzell and Shelly West won top vocal duo and song of the year, for "You're the Reason God Made Oklahoma," in the ceremony at Knott's Berry Farm.

Alabama, which less than two years ago was playing a bar in Myrtle Beach, S.C., claimed "Hat" trophies for top vocal group and album of the year for their "Feels So Right." A year ago, the band won the top vocal group award.

"I think the academy just kind of leads the way," said lead singer Randy Owen. "It's a great honor. Last year we did 300 days on the road and we're glad all the people listened." Miss Mandrell's top female

vocalist award marked her fourth honor from the Los Angelesbased academy. "You've been very, very good

to me for a very long time," the singer told the audience of 2,000 at the Buena Park amusement

Haggard was not on hand to claim his best male vocalist trophy - his 14th Hat trophy and his sixth for male vocalist

Juice Newton was another absentee winner in the best new female vocalist category. But Ricky Skaggs said, "Thank you, Lord" as he collected his award for best new male vocalist.

The Oak Ridge Boys, gospel singers turned country, won the single record of the year award

for "Elvira." The song is the subject of a \$10 million federal lawsuit by members and survivors of the Rivingtons, who claim that the "Oo-papa-mau-mau" refrain of "Elvira" was stolen from a Rivingtons hit.

However, in accepting the best single award, Oak Ridge Boy Joe Bonsall said without referring to the lawsuit that the band had first heard "Elvira" sung by a group in Texas a few years ago.



Huntington couple in landmark case

A Huntington Beach man and his wife are central figures in a court case that could have a big impact on the way Americans buy and sell real estate.

THEY ARE Reginald "Reg" and Margaret de la Cuesta. They have just returned from Washington D.C. after hearing opening arguments in their case Wednesday at the U.S. Supreme

At stake, lawyers say, is the future of assumable mortgages. The case involves the purchase of the Yorktown shopping center on Beach Boulevard by the de la Cuestas in 1977.

The de la Cuestas intended to assume the existing loan of 9.25 percent from Fidelity Federal Savings & Loan of Glendale

HOWEVER, FIDELITY claimed that the balance of the trust deed was due on sale of the property.

When the de la Cuestas refused to pay the balance and take out a new loan at higher interest, Fidelity began foreclosure proceedings. The de la Cuestas got an injunction and the matter has been in the courts ever since.

An Orange County Superior Court judge supported Fidelity's due-on-sale demand, but California's 4th District Court of Appeal backed the Huntington Beach couple.

The California Supreme Court declined to hear the case and Fidelity appealed to the Supreme Court.

"WE SURE didn't know where this all would lead us 41/2 years ago, but we have gone this far and we'll see it to the end," de la Cuesta said.

Mrs. de la Cuesta said they are carrying on the battle for other property owners and buyers.
"If we don't win, a person won't be able to sell property

because of high interest rates.

"And even if people are willing, they probably won't qualify because of the higher rates," she said.

THE DE LA Cuestas' attorney, Fred Crane, said the Supreme Court is ruling on whether a federally chartered savings and loan association can prevent a property buyer from assuming an existing, low interest mortgage on the property and instead force him or her to take out a new loan at higher interest. A decision is expected this summer.

State chartered associations have been forbidden to require a new loan when a home changes hands under a 1978 ruling by the California Supreme Court known as the Wellenkamp decision.

He wants phone in grave

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — After waiting 13 years, a 63-year-old man has given up hope of getting a telephone installed at home and asked the telephone company to put one in his grave instead.

The Daily Milliyet reported that Ahmet Dereboy first made his application for a telephone to the postal authority' which handles such requests, 13 years ago. He was given a number — but no phone — and told to wait his turn.

Recently, he was told there would be opening for new phone exchanges in his neighborhood, but that earlier applicants had priority.

Gay LA regent seated

The first openly homosexual person named as a University of California regent won confirmation in the state Senate Thursday when Sen. Paul Carpenter, D-Cypress, cast the deciding 21st

Los Angeles attorney Sheldon Andelson, a 51-year-old gay activist, civic leader and bank chairman, won confirmation by the minimum 21 votes required after several earlier roll call votes fell short.

Carpenter, seeking the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate, said he reluctantly cast the deciding ballot so that Sen. Jo-seph Montoya, D-Whittier, would not have to leave his sickbed in order to vote.

Montoya had indicated he would vote "aye" on Andelson's appointment if he were present.

Of the 10 votes cast against Andelson, two came from Democrats and eight from GOP lawmakers. The two Democrats said they opposed the appointment because of Andelson's sexual preference

Carpenter termed his vote a "courtesy vote" and said, "On the natural, I don't think I would have voted for him, although I think he's qualified to serve on the Board of Regents."

He added he did not expect his vote would help draw support for his U.S. Senate bid from the gay community.

Also approved by the Senate were attorney and former U.S. Rep. Yvonne Brathwaite Burke and San Francisco attorney Jeremiah Hallisey. Both were confirmed as regents by wider margins than Andelson.

The appointments were made by Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. Andelson and Hallisey both are members of Brown's U.S. Senate Campaign steering committee.

In opposing Andelson's ap-pointment to the board, Sen. Ruben Ayala, D-Chino, com-mented, "I was told this man should be admired because he came out of the closet when it was not popular. I don't think that it's popular now — at least not in my district."

On the other hand, Senate President Pro Tem David Roberti, D-Los Angeles, argued that it was "a shame that sex became the overriding consideration" in some senators' minds. "If you look at his background,

he would be the kind of person everybody would vote for," Ro-

DEAR PAT: When a taxpayer receives a refund check, does that mean the return has been accepted and there is no longer a need to worry about keeping receipts? Also, my refund check was not the amount I expected. Why

K.E., Huntington Beach

Even if you have received your refund check, Internal Revenue Service says this does not mean the return has been accepted without question. It is still subject to audit for three years from the deadline for filing. For example, receipts and records for the return filed by April 15, 1982 should be kept until April 15, 1985.

The change in your refund check can be the result of a correction to arithmetic, or it could be because part of your refund has been applied to pay a balance due for another year. In any event, you will be receiving a letter from the Fresno Service Center within two weeks explaining the difference.

DEAR PAT: I'm a member of a special interest organization. I'm upset about a television program I saw which only represented the opinions of the other side. Isn't the station obligated to air opposing views?

Yes, stations are legally required to air opposing sides of controversial issues of public importance. However, there is no requirement that both points of view be included in the same program, or even the same program series, as long as a reasonable opportunity for contrasting views is provi-

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Oregon 'deports' refugees

fornia's welfare chief has complained that Oregon advised 5,-000 jobless Indochinese refugees to move to California where they could collect welfare, the Sacramento Union reported

A telephone hot line told refugees in Oregon "if you want a job, go to Oklahoma City or Houston. If you want to go to school or go on welfare, go to California," according to Marion Woods, director of the California Department of Social Services.

He said the Oregon hot line also offered the refugees travel

The Union reported Thursday that Woods made the statement in Washington, where he attended a congressional hearing on refugee funding problems Wed-

He said the Oregon hot line message supplemented a letter sent to the Indochinese refugees April 1 by Keith Putnam, assistant director of human resources for Oregon.

The letter said: "I am sorry to say that for many of you, the best advice I can give you is to move to another state where your job prospects are better and where federal refugee program funding continues to be available to refugees who have been in the U.S. over 11/2 years."

It referred them to the hot line for more information.

The letter was sent two weeks ago after 2,000 Hmong tribesmen began moving from Oregon to California's Central Valley upon hearing that farm jobs were available.

Putnam, contacted by the Union in Salem, Ore., acknowledged that the letter and hot line message were too strong, and said the hot line message has been changed, the newspaper

In Sacramento, Shawn Ortiz, a spokesman for Woods, said a delegation of Hmong tribesmen from Oregon was scheduled to meet with state refugee officials.

Ortiz said part of the problem is that the federal government, which had been supporting refugees for the first 36 months, recently ruled that after 18 months employable adults would get federal help only in those states where they are eligible for local welfare.

California has a local welfare program, differing in each of the 58 counties, but Oregon does not.


Ortiz said that by law California cannot deny the refugees welfare or food stamps.

South Laguna annexation due?

The Laguna Beach City Council says it will consider bringing all of South Laguna into the city, including Three Arch Bay.

And the council will take another look at prezoning a portion of South Laguna from the current city limits at Dumond Drive to Aliso Creek as a prelude to annexation.

Several property owners in the

area say they oppose both no-

The smaller annexation was requested a year ago by residents of the Treasure Island Mobile Home Park. They fear they would lose their units should the county approve a high rise timeshare project planned for the 24-acre parcel.

The county's Local Agency Formation Commission postponed a decision on the annexation proposal until this summer, saying the city's general zoning provisions are too restrictive.

The commission instructed the city to meet with developers at Treasure Island, and Hobo Canyon property owners, in an attempt to work out an agreement whereby the "integrity of county planning decisions" is preserved.

City zoning laws prohibit buildings higher than three stories. The plan for Treasure Island also includes grading provisions that do not match Laguna's ordinan-

In addition, a zone change for the proposed 700-unit project at Hobo Canyon also conflicts with city codes in relation to density and grading.

City officials have met with representatives of both developments and have proposed zoning which the city claims is comparable to the existing county zo-

ning. City Manager Ken Frank said the city has even proposed guarantees that would see that comparable zoning remain in effect

for three years after annexation. But both developers have

balked at the suggestion. Frank will suggest that the council prezone the initial annexation area and again offer guarantees to the two major landholders.

In addition, he will ask the council to investigate the costs and benefits associated with an annexation of the entire South Laguna area into the city.

If it is shown that there are benefits to Laguna by bringing all of South Laguna into the city the council could pursue that option when the LAFC meets again on the issue this summer, city officials said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. announced economic sanctions and the suspension of military exports to Argentina today and said the United States would "respond positively to requests for materiel support" for Britain in the crisis over the

Falkland Islands. 'There will of course be no direct U.S. military involvement," Haig said in announcing the sanctions ordered by President Reagan after Argentina on Thursday rejected anew U.S. efforts to mediate the dispute.

Haig said while he pressed the effort at mediation, the United States refrained from taking sides in the crisis, and Britain understood that position

"Now, however, in light of Argentina's failure to accept a compromise, we must take concrete steps to underscore that the United States cannot and will not condone the use of unlawful force to resolve disputes," he

Argentina invaded the British-held islands April 2, and the British sent their fleet to the South Atlantic to mount a bloc-

kade that took full effect at 4 a.m., PDT today.

Even as he announced American support for Britain, "our closest ally," Haig said that in the end there will have to be a negotiated settlement of the territorial dispute over the sparsely populated islands 250 miles off the Argentina coast.

"Otherwise we will all face unending hostility and insecurity in the South Atlantic," Haig said.

He began by saying that the crisis was entering "a new and dangerous phase in which large-scale military action is likely.

He reviewed what he called an "extraordinary effort" by the United States to find a peaceful solution, an effort that sent him shuttling between London and Buenos Aires.

Haig said the United States had proposed "a fair and sound" settlement that would have included an end to hostilities, military withdrawal by both sides, creation of an interim British-Argentine-U.S. authority to administer the islands and the creation of a framework for negotiations to determine the final settlement.

Jobless toll to increase in county?

Although Orange County's jobless rate remained unchanged through March, unemployment is expected to swell in the county by June when college graduates flood the job market, according to Employment Development Department figures released Thursday.

Ms. Yetter said the outlook for the future isn't bright, predicting that the jobless rate will rise considerably in future months because of near-certain layoffs in manufacturing.

Reagan endorsed a proposed Constitutional amendment, pending in the House and Senate, that generally would require Congress to approve a balanced budget in the future, except in wartime. It would take a threefifths vote of each chamber to approve a deficit budget any other time.

But even that step reflected Reagan's long-standing support for the balanced budget concept. He said at a March 31 news conference that he liked the idea, adding the caveat that it "must also carry with it a limitation on taxes."

That tax condition was missing from his speech Thursday eve-

The president sought to reemploy a tactic that worked extremely well for him a year ago: Encouraging the people of the nation to apply pressure, through letters and telegrams and telephone calls to their representatives in Congress.

After repeating many of the economic arguments he has made in the past, he told his audience:

"Make your voice heard; let' your representatives know that you support the kind of fair, effective approach I have outlined for you tonight. Let them know that you stand behind our recovery program. You did it once, you can do it again.'

Within a little more than one hour after the speech, 1,313 telephone calls were received showing support for the president and 261 opposing him, a White House press office statement said.



U.S. aids Britain in Falkland crisis

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States today offered military supplies to Britain in the Falkland Islands crisis, while suspending arms sales and loan guarantees to Argentina. President Reagan accused Argentina of armed aggression and said it

"must not be allowed to succeed." So ended four weeks of neutrality in the territorial dispute over the South Atlantic islands.

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. announced the sanctions against Argentina and the offer of aid to Britain, although ruling out any "direct U.S. military involvement" in the heightening crisis.

He said Reagan ordered the sanctions against Argentina because the Buenos Aires government refused to compromise in the dispute over control of the

Haig said the Falklands crisis "is about to enter a new and dangerous phase in which largescale military action is likely."

At the White House, Reagan told Midwest editors and broadcasters that Argentina was the aggressor "in this dispute over the sovereignty of that little icecold bunch of land down there, and they finally just resorted to armed aggression and there was bloodshed.

"And I think the principle that all of us must abide by is armed aggression of that kind must not

be allowed to succeed," the president said.

He said he was sure the United States would honor any British request for aid, because he knew they would not make any request he could not honor

But Reagan said he had not received any response to the offer - "At this moment we've had no request for such help" and repeated Haig's assurance that "there would be no direct involvement militarily by the United States.

The tilt toward Britain had been expected, but the American stance was toughened with Haig's announcement that the United States "will respond positively to requests for materiel support for British forces." He did not say what kind of supplies would be involved.

He spoke as both Britain and Argentina set up war zones around the disputed islands. The British had imposed a full blockade of the region at 4 a.m. PDT. and Argentina responded by de-claring a blockade of its own.

Despite Haig's pessimistic asessment of the prospects of war, Reagan was heard to remark that neither side seemed to want to

start the shooting. Reagan was overheard making that comment to senators at a White House meeting on the budget. "It just seems obvious that no one wants to start the (See FALKLAND, Page A2)

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

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

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

other time. But even that step reflected Reagan's long-standing support for the balanced budget concept. He said at a March 31 news conference that he liked the idea, adding the caveat that it "must also carry with it a limitation on


