

# County's image changes under scrutiny

Orange County is wealthy, well educated, expensive to live in, politically powerful and ethnically diverse.

That may not exactly be new information. But 37 customers paid \$150 each to learn yesterday how computers could turn that information into valuable market research on which to plan private industry growth and government services.

The Rose Institute of State and Local Government, based at Claremont McKenna College in Claremont, zeroed in on Orange County as a pilot computer study because, says director Alan Heslop, its rapid growth makes it a laboratory for studying population development.

The institute also assembled experts at the Registry Hotel in Irvine to expand on some of its findings.

High housing prices and traffic

congestion will limit expansion, said economist Richard Ayer of Security Pacific National Bank. The county won't grow economically as quickly as it did in the last decade, but it will grow, he said.

Agriculture is dwindling. Technology and tourism are growing, said the experts.

Also growing is Orange County's Republican voter registration, and with it the political clout to affect statewide

elections, said Dr. Tony Quinn, consultant to the California Assembly Republican Caucus.

Some of the other Rose Institute findings showed an increase in the number of county residents who now work here, rather than commute to outside jobs. Many of those people work in technological fields.

But tourism still racks in \$4 billion a year here, and one out of every 10 county workers earns income from the tourist trade.

## Big tax victory for Rams

Team will get \$700,000 refund

The Los Angeles Rams football team posted its first win of the season yesterday, but the victory came in an Orange County hearing room rather than on the gridiron.

The county Assessment Appeals Board ruled that the National Football League franchise and owner Georgia Frontiere were entitled to a more than \$700,000 property tax refund for the team's use of portions of Anaheim Stadium in 1980-81 and 1981-82.

The three-member hearing panel also ordered that the value of the Rams' interest in the stadium be reduced, which in turn will reduce the amount of the team's annual tax assessment.

The Rams now will pay approximately \$150,000 per year in property taxes compared with the \$355,000 the county assessor had been claiming, said Kent Giboney, an appraiser in the assessor's office.

At issue in the hearing, which lasted nearly two weeks, was the formula by which appraisers determined the Rams' possessory interest in the 70,000-seat stadium. Possessory interest is (See RAMS, Page A2)

## Jail expansion under fire

County civic center panel voices opposition

The Orange County Civic Center Commission has added its voice to the growing chorus of opposition to construction of a new county jail on a parcel adjacent to the current jail in Santa Ana.

With one commissioner absent, the board's other four members voted yesterday to register strong opposition to construction of a medium-maximum security jail in the city's civic center.

Commissioner Vernon Evans, a former Santa Ana mayor, called the proposed facility a "super jail" that should not be located in the city. He said he would support any efforts to raise funds to fight placement of the jail in Santa Ana.

Commissioner Terry Mosbenko said the commission's resolution is intended "to remind (Orange County) supervisors the jail does not belong in Newport Beach, Huntington Beach or Santa Ana either when there are so many

desolate sites available."

The commission's action, however, is purely advisory, said Michael McLean, commission chairman. The commission is composed of five members, two appointed by county supervisors, two by the Santa Ana City Council and one member selected by the four others.

The panel is not empowered to

reject or approve of any projects slated for the Santa Ana civic center. It was established to raise money to finance approved civic center construction projects, according to county officials.

The Board of Supervisors voted recently to limit its search for a new jail site to three locations, one in downtown Santa Ana, the other two in remote canyons east of Anaheim.

## HB street 'washed' by spilled foam

Huntington Beach took a bath yesterday.

Five hundred gallons of liquid foaming agent used in laundry detergents spilled from a truck and flooded a busy street.

For awhile, chaos ensued. Cars lost control in the super-slippery stuff and spun in circles before the street was closed.

No accidents or health hazards were reported. But the foamy liquid proved a mess to clean up.

"If we had poured water on it, we'd have had a soap bubble for

30 feet high," said one official. Another claimed "it would have foamed forever" if water were applied.

Instead, city crews poured sand and concrete on the area of Gothard Street between Warner and Slater Avenues.

The road was closed from 12:50 p.m. until 7 p.m.

Police said a plastic container overturned and the concentrated liquid poured out through the sides of the truck.

The material was being hauled from a City of Industry chemical (See FOAM, Page A2)





the taxable portion of the stadium leased to the team for its exclusive use during certain days of the year.

Rams attorneys, joined in the challenge by lawyers representing the city of Anaheim, argued the team's taxes should be closer to \$70,000 than the \$355,000 levied by the county. They also claimed the possessory interest in the stadium should be valued at \$6.5 million, not the \$30-plus million claimed by the county.

The appeals board ruling set the Rams possessory interest in the stadium at \$13 million, some 17 percent of the facility's total \$76 million assessed value, Giboney said.

Frontiere, who was not present when the board's decision was announced, could not be reached for comment.

Costa Mesa undercover detectives arrested Protopappas Wednesday night at his office on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon on two officers, carrying a concealed weapon and possession of cocaine.

Coviello also said Protopappas didn't realize that the two men were officers when he allegedly drew a 9 mm pistol. Coviello said that the dentist was carrying the

weapon because of alleged "numerous death threats" made by an unidentified male caller Wednesday.

Costa Mesa police Lt. Jack Calnon said a substance believed to be cocaine was found inside a film canister in the dentist's jacket. He also said the officers had identified themselves.

At the time of his arrest, Protopappas was carrying two satchels containing the medical records of the three patients, police said. Calnon said Protopappas surrendered the documents to officers, who made copies.

Police records show that prior to this week, Protopappas has contacted them six times in the last four years to complain about alleged threats made by disgruntled employees, a former business associate and former boyfriends of women he dated.

## Some light fog forecast along coast for weekend

## Coastal

Fair tonight and tomorrow, but with some light fog and low clouds late tonight and early tomorrow morning. Overnight lows 45 to 54. Highs tomorrow 68 to 74.

Elsewhere, from Point Conception to the Mexican border and out 60 miles, due to northwest winds 18 to 30 knots tonight and tomorrow over outer waters. Sea levels 6 to 10 feet. Light variable winds tonight and tomorrow over inner waters, becoming west to northwest 12 to 18 knots tomorrow afternoon. Wind waves 3 to 4 feet. Westerly swells 3 to 5 feet. Some fog and low clouds tonight and tomorrow morning, otherwise fair tonight and tomorrow.

Cloudy mornings were expected to clear each day, with high temperatures reaching the mid-to-upper-70s in Los Angeles and coastal valleys and the 80s in the desert, the National Weather Service said.

In the mountains, ski conditions were expected to be excellent and all roads to the Southern California mountains were open.

Temperatures in the mountains

were expected to drop down to the 30s tonight, but the thermometer was expected to rise up to 60 Saturday with winds 15 mph in the afternoon, the agency said.

Ski resort operators reported good conditions at the slopes at 10- to 19-foot base at Tahoes, 14-foot base at the 8,200-foot level in Squaw Valley, 10-foot base at Echo Summit and similar conditions at Mammoth and June mountains.

However, the weather service warned against travel with high-profile vehicles due to southwest winds that were expected to gust up to 60 mph in the Reno-Carson City area and the Tahoe Basin. Some snow was also expected in those areas.

## Facelift expanded on HB state beach

Workmen and heavy equipment are preparing to give the southern half of Huntington Beach State Beach a facelift.

The \$4.2 million project, which entails construction of new restrooms, a main lifeguard tower and concession stands, got under way in late January. It is expected to be completed before the start of the busy summer season.

The affected part of the beach — from Magnolia Avenue to Brookhurst Street — will be closed to vehicle traffic during construction.

After the Magnolia-Brookhurst phase is completed, work is expected to start on the beach extending from Beach Boulevard to Magnolia Street.

When both phases are completed, the beach will have 2,500 parking spaces. It now has 1,250 spaces.

The work is being done by the Micca Construction Company of Long Beach.

Heavy equipment, including twin-engine earth movers, are busy hauling and leveling beach sand in preparation for construction.

## Dick Dale arrested on sex charge

Surf guitar king accused in case involving Newport girl, 13

Newport Beach resident Dick Dale, self-proclaimed "King of the Surf Guitar," will be arraigned early next week on felony sex perversion charges, authorities say.

Dale, 45, was arrested Wednesday evening at his home on the tip of the Balboa Peninsula and released several hours later after posting \$25,000 bail.

The musician is accused of oral copulation with a 13-year-old girl in Newport Beach, according to a warrant issued by a Harbor Municipal Court judge.

Newport detectives said Dale, whose real name is Richard

Anthony Monsour, did not use force in the alleged incident and offered no resistance when arrested.

Police would not say where or when the alleged crime took place.

Dale, who lives in the old King Gillette home overlooking Newport Harbor, attained popularity in the early 1960s during an era when the Beach Boys, Jan and Dean and other groups helped launch surf music.

He began a comeback several years ago and has performed at the Golden Bear in Huntington Beach and other night spots recently.

## UC Irvine poison center gets six-month reprieve

The UC Irvine Poison Center

will remain in operation for at least another six months as a private fund-raising group seeks private donations to keep it going.

Hospital Administrator William Gonzalez and Paul McQuade, chairman of the poison center's new foundation, said that the center would not be shut down in March, as proposed earlier.

The center was listed by Gonzalez as one of UCI Medical Center's programs that would be cut to meet budget cutbacks caused by dwindling state support.

But Gonzalez said he is hopeful the foundation, which has begun its first fund-raising drive, can

raise enough money to keep the center going.

"Although we are in the initial stage of fund raising, we are confident that, through the efforts of the foundation, the poison center eventually can become self-supporting," he said.

The poison center last year handled about 25,000 calls from people concerned about toxic qualities of substances. Most calls were from parents whose children had ingested household items.

The center's annual operating budget is \$150,000. Until last year, federal grants had helped fund the program. Last year, however, the last of the grants ran out and UCIMC officials found themselves paying for the countywide service themselves.

## Khadafy threatens action if 'pushed too far'

Libyan strongman Col. Moammar Khadafy has threatened military action if Libya is "pushed too far" by U.S. naval maneuvers that might extend into southern Mediterranean waters claimed by his country.

He said the Gulf of Sidra will be turned into a "red gulf of blood" if the U.S. aircraft carrier Nimitz and its battle group move too far into the disputed waters.

"We will not permit America or any foreign state to enter the Gulf of Sidra or any other part of Libyan waters," Khadafy said Thursday in a speech to his Parliament. "The Libyan people are ready to fight to defend their land, their water and skies."

## \$25,000 reward for tax protester

JAMESTOWN, N.D. — After four days of futile searching, the U.S. Marshal Service is offering a \$25,000 reward for the arrest of an anti-tax radical accused of killing two marshals, because "the perpetrator is so dangerous." The announcement last night came hours after a small army of law enforcement officers searched three houses in Ashley and a farm in nearby Wishek without finding the protester, Gordon Kahl.

## Bomb explodes at Aeroflot office

WASHINGTON — A bomb exploded outside the Aeroflot Soviet Airlines building late last night shattering storefront windows on the first floor, police said. "It was a bomb, some kind of explosive device," said James D. Powell, a bomb technician for the District of Columbia police department. Police would not discuss details of the device.

## Johnny Cash joins wife in hospital

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Country music singer Johnny Cash and his wife, June Carter Cash, were in satisfactory condition early today in a Nashville hospital, a spokesman said. Cash, 51, was admitted with pneumonia, spokesman Paul Moore said. He was put in a room next to his wife, who underwent abdominal surgery Feb. 2.

LOS ANGELES — Relief officials have interviewed 850 people since disaster centers opened Monday to aid victims of a series of storms that battered Southern California in late January and early February. John Bernatz, a spokesman for the state Office of Emergency Services, said the centers would begin shutting down Saturday.

SPRINGVILLE — An electrical short was blamed for a \$722,000 fire that destroyed or damaged nearly half of the downtown businesses in the Tulare County mountain community of Springville yesterday.

LOS ANGELES — The county is experiencing a sharp increase in strep throat infections during flu season, a health official says, but there have been only "sporadic mild cases" of flu.

## Philanthropist Schuman, 79, dies

PALM SPRINGS — Irwin Samuel Schuman, founder of the famous Chi Chi Clubs has died in his sleep at age 79, Riverside County Deputy Coroner Pat Choate said. Owner of the Hilton Riviera Hotel in Palm Springs, he was an intensely private man known as a philanthropist who gave millions of dollars to charity.

## Deputies hunt exotic bird thieves

LOS ANGELES — In a case dubbed the "Famous Feather Caper," sheriff's deputies say they're following up leads in a series of some 240 exotic-bird thefts since last October. The birds, stolen from wholesale and retail outlets in Pico Rivera, Ontario, Pomona, Santa Ana and Westlake Village, were valued at more than \$145,000 retail, Deputy Jerry Dudley said.

## Poor to receive free medical care

GRASS VALLEY — Free medical care to poor people no longer eligible for Medi-Cal will be provided by a local group of doctors and other health care workers in Grass Valley. Starting Feb. 26, a clinic staffed by volunteer physicians, nurses, X-ray technicians and others will be open Saturdays and weekday evenings, if necessary, according to Dr. Richard Cobden, an orthopedist.

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union today offered to withdraw 20,000 troops from central Europe if the United States pulls out 13,000 soldiers in an "initial practical step" toward major reductions of forces in the region.

## British oil to slash crude price

LONDON — The state-owned British National Oil Corp. today announced it was cutting the price of its North Sea crude about 10 percent to \$30.50 a barrel. The move was expected to put more pressure on OPEC to cut its \$34 base price to stay afloat in a glutted market.

## Australia fire still out of control

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Fire roared through the parched hills ringing Melbourne today after a series of killer blazes scorched the drought-punished southeast coast, leaving farms and forest looking like they were "attacked by napalm."

At least 89 bodies had been found, including those of 12 volunteer firemen who died when flames engulfed two fire trucks in Cockatoo. By late yesterday, about 900 people were reported injured, and officials estimated damage along a 500-mile stretch affected by the brushfires at \$400 million.

Badly burned animals were being shot today by workers from the agricultural department in the state of Victoria. A spokesman said at least 15,000 sheep and 8,000 cattle had died in the fires, which

destroyed about 750 Victoria farms.

"The fire-hit areas of Victoria looked like they had been attacked by napalm," said Adm. Sir James Murray, the governor of that state. "It was like a giant flame-thrower," an exhausted firefighter said.

By late yesterday, more than 4,000 firefighters had controlled most of the brushfires, except for those in the hills around Melbourne, Australia's second largest city.

The blazes, which began Wednesday, consumed about 3,000 homes in seven towns, in Victoria and the state of South Australia, authorities said. Some of the homeless slept on cricket fields.

Thousands of acres of farmland, brush and forest were devastated. Regal stands of pine and eucalyptus became giant bonfires

as flames grew 300 feet high.

Desert winds of up to 60 mph fanned flames as they lashed through the Adelaide hills and down the coast past Melbourne into the Dandenong Ranges. "The wind was like it came from a huge hair dryer," said a man who lost his home.

"The roar of the wind and the flames were horrific, it was like a train," said Alanor Gray, who lost her store in Macedon. "The fire was coming up the highway like a fireball."

"A panzer division going through could not have caused so much damage," said Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser after inspecting the devastation.

In Cockatoo, where the 12 firemen died, two men sat on the roof of a school and hosed it down to help save the lives of 120 children who were inside.

## San Diego plane crash kills four

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The death toll rose to four today in the fiery crash of small plane that smashed into a department store parking lot last night.

Ed Hastings, 23, critically burned in the fire that engulfed the cockpit of the twin-engine Piper Aerostar, died at 4:30 a.m. at University Hospital, said deputy San Diego County coroner David Lodge.

The pilot, Marden Dixon, 41, a Provo, Utah attorney and father of six, remained in critical condition at University with burns over 91 percent of his body, a nursing supervisor said.

Hastings, of Battle Mountain, Nev., was a student at Brigham Young University in Provo, Lodge said.

Dixon and Hastings, their clothes on fire, had escaped the flaming cockpit after the plane went down shortly after takeoff

## FV mayor keeps post till August

Then the plane's fully loaded fuel tanks exploded, sending a wall of fire and leaking aviation fuel along the curbs of Balboa Avenue.

"It hit the ground and three seconds later it blew up," said gas station attendant Troy Painter, 19. "I don't know how those people got out."

"It sounded like a loud pop when the fuel ignited," said Debby Mahoney, a desk worker at the health spa across the street. "Then there was a stream of fire running down the street, and drivers were honking their horns and panicking."

The dead were identified by the coroner's office as Linda Austin, 28, of Provo; her 3½-month-old baby, Alex Austin; and David Jones, 27, also a Brigham Young University student.

Witnesses, who said the aircraft sounded as if it was having engine trouble, said the pilot had tried to land on Balboa Avenue.

"The plane winged over and was stalling, and it looked like the pilot was trying to put it down on the street," said Bob Rapoport, a 26-year-old pilot who saw the plane approaching. "It was coming right for me. I jumped out of my van and ran across the street and felt the heat and flash from the explosion."

The aircraft narrowly missed a service station.

"It was coughing as it went over us," said attendant Larry Baker. "It definitely lacked power. I could see the numbers on it. Then it went in."

## UC cites need for \$4 billion

The University of California will need \$4 billion worth of building and remodeling in the next decade in order to keep up with technological advances and changing student interests, a UC official says.

"The obvious question is: Where will the money come from?" UC Assistant Vice President William Baker told the Board of Regents yesterday. Under present funding levels, the university can expect only \$200 million to \$250 million from the state in the next decade, he said.

In a report Baker presented to

the regents, he said that \$1.6 billion will be needed for new classroom buildings, libraries, laboratories, hospitals and clinics.

Another \$900 million will be needed to renovate existing facilities and \$500 million will be required for self-supporting campus facilities such as parking lots, athletic facilities and housing.

Baker's report, the result of a year-long study of UC's nine campuses, said nearly \$1 billion extra operating funds will be needed for deferred maintenance and operating expenses for the UC physical plant over the next decade.

UC President David Saxon has appointed a 12-member committee of faculty, students and administrators to consider ways to raise the rest of the needed funds.

The major building needs stem from changes in academic programs, the report indicated.

Another report presented to a Regents committee said a shortage of more than \$85 million in Medicare and Medi-Cal reimbursements could "seriously affect" UC's teaching hospitals in San Francisco, Davis, Irvine, Los Angeles and San Diego.

The idea is to quickly determine which districts have usable water supplies after a disaster, then to get available water where it's needed, Elser said.

To that end, plans now being completed will create an emergency volunteer organization of water officials which can make quick decisions on using those supplies, Elser said.

That group will set up a single meeting place shortly after an emergency and assess water needs from there, Elser said.

Using a hypothetical emergency which destroys Irvine's water supply, Elser said the group would determine which district closest to Irvine had water it could ship to the city, and then find a way to pipe it there.

The so-called Water Supply Emergency Preparedness Study, being conducted by Boyle Engineering of Newport Beach, already has surveyed all county water agencies, Elser said.

The survey, financed by three water districts, determined where each agency gets its water, where it stores it and where its major supply hookups are, he said.

Boyle officials now are drawing up a mock emergency scenario using a powerful earthquake — one measuring 8.3 on the Richter scale — as an example, Elser said.

## Ex-talk show hostess sued

### County public defenders seek \$2 million in damages

Two Orange County public defenders, alleging that their careers and personal reputations have been damaged, are suing former KABC radio talk show hostess Carole Hemingway, KABC and the ABC network.

Deputy public defenders Jean Farley and James Egar are seeking more than \$2 million for damages they say they suffered when Hemingway criticized Farley's role in a rape case.

Hemingway, at a press conference yesterday, said that she, the station and ABC are standing by her story. Hemingway now is a syndicated columnist for the Los Angeles Times Syndicate.

The suit stems from a report on the criminal justice system where Hemingway, it is alleged, said Farley employed "delaying tactics" and was

"callous and cruel" in her feelings toward the 10-year-old victim in a rape case.

The case was declared a mistrial when Farley failed to appear in court, Hemingway reportedly told her listeners. The suit alleges that Hemingway accused Farley of abandoning her client.

Attorneys for Farley are claiming that she left the area with Egar to seek medical treatment for him, and was forced to remain away longer than she planned.

Hemingway's account was "designed to embarrass the plaintiffs and cause them emotional distress," the Orange County Superior Court suit contends.

Hemingway stood by her actions when asked if she thought she'd been too hard in the broadcasts.





## Election posters dated

By PAT HOROWITZ

DEAR PAT: I bought some copies of presidential campaign posters and noticed that all of them had the dates of manufacture listed. Is this some kind of a legal requirement?

K.R., Costa Mesa

Yes. The federal Hobby Protection Act requires that sellers of imitation political items (buttons, posters, literature, stickers or advertisements) mark the items with the calendar year in which they were manufactured.

Imitation numismatic items (coins, tokens, paper money or commemorative medals) must be marked "copy." If you receive an imitation instead of an authentic item and it's not marked properly, under this law you may file suit for damages and seek an injunction against the practice.

## Don't 'wash' aphids

DEAR PAT: Someone told me aphids can be controlled by spraying plants with a detergent and water solution. This would be a lot cheaper than chemical sprays. Is this garden hint true, and if it is, what amounts of detergent and water should be used?

L.P., Laguna Beach

Don't use detergent and water. Your plants won't like the detergent and the aphids won't be discouraged. The aphid control spray you mention calls for a mixture of three tablespoons of Ivory Flakes thoroughly dissolved in a gallon of water. Only the old-fashioned soap flakes will work for this garden care money-saver.

## Ginseng tea problems

DEAR PAT: Someone told me ginseng tea causes high blood pressure. I drink a lot of

this tea, so I'd like to find out if this is true.

L.E., Irvine

Ginseng can cause problems for some long-term users, according to research done at UCLA School of Medicine. Hypertension, diarrhea, skin lesions, insomnia and nervousness can occur. These and other effects reported by long-term users were neither uniformly negative nor uniformly predictable, but long-term ingestion of large amounts of ginseng is not advised.

## 'Milk glass' stain removal

DEAR PAT: I bought several antique bottles at an antique bottle show recently. They are just lovely, but there is one problem. There is a slight discoloration inside the bottles, even though they've been washed and dried. Can this "milk glass" appearance be removed safely?

W.T., Fountain Valley

Fill the bottles with a half and half mixture of ammonia and water, letting the mixture stand for two or three days. If this doesn't work, half-fill the bottles with denatured alcohol or water, and add a cup of clean, white sand from an aquarium supply shop. Shake well until a cloudy deposit yields to clear the glass. Another method is coating the inside of the bottles with mineral oil and cleaning with cotton swabs.





Films on the behemoths will run


from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekends

## Job burnout

There's no shortage of nurses now

Just a few years ago,  
hospitals offered bounties of  
cars, cash and exotic vacations to  
meet their need for registered  
nurses.

As a result of the nurse  
shortage, salaries swelled,  
working conditions improved  
and health care administrators  
devised new incentives and  
options for career advancement.

But as the nation plunged  
deeper into economic distress,  
"retired" nurses donned their  
whites and went back to work  
to help bolster family incomes.  
The nursing shortage quickly  
disappeared. Some warn the  
profession may be glutted by  
1985.

"What I see now is a  
temporary decline in positions  
available due to economic  
hardship," said Dr. Toni  
Sullivan, director of the new  
nursing program at the  
University of Southern  
California. "What we're seeing  
now is maybe it's harder to find  
a job."

"One may have to go to  
another city. But jobs are still  
available and it's going to pick  
up. Nursing has been the ideal  
profession because nurses could  
pick right up and work  
anywhere and usually where  
they want to live."

The Huntington Beach  
resident launched USC's nursing  
school last September, with 44  
students enrolled in a four-year  
program offering a bachelor of  
science in nursing.

She eventually plans to  
expand the school to include  
master's and doctorate degree  
programs for nurses wishing to  
pursue specialized health care  
services as well as teaching and  
administrative careers.

She blames the tough job  
market for nurses on the sour  
economy as well as hospital  
cutbacks due to changes in  
reimbursement programs, such as  
recent cutbacks in Medi-Cal.

"Institutions are turning down  
patients because they're unsure  
about getting paid," Sullivan  
said, adding that nursing staffs  
are trimmed when hospital beds  
aren't filled.

About 60 percent of registered  
nurses work in hospitals, she

hospitals during the late '70s  
was in part a result of job  
burnout and complaints over the  
subordinate role of nurses to  
doctors and nursing supervisors,  
Sullivan said.

The shortage changed some of  
that. In recent years, primary  
care nurses have been offered  
educational opportunities to  
enter emerging health care  
specialties.

Some nurses are given  
caseloads of patients, so that  
they can follow people from  
hospital admission through  
treatment and release in a  
similar fashion as a patient's  
personal physician.

Sullivan said the nursing

\$17,300 annually.  
Her figures show hospital  
administrative nurses command  
the largest annual salary, at  
about \$24,600. Convalescent  
home nurses make about  
\$14,300 a year and doctor's  
office nurses average \$11,900  
annually.

Sullivan believes the  
profession will command higher  
salaries as nurses assume more  
responsibilities that traditionally  
have been those of primary care  
physicians. Midwifery and nurse  
practitioners are becoming  
popular specialty fields, she said.

"There is a stage being set for  
competition for some people for  
some services," Sullivan said.  
"Nursing has made great strides  
with medicine. There is  
evidence of nurses working with  
doctors in collaborative practices  
as peers."

Sullivan earned a bachelor's  
degree at Felician College in  
New Jersey and a doctorate in  
nursing from New York's  
Columbia University. She  
moved to California to start  
USC's baccalaureate program.

Though a student can become  
a registered nurse after earning  
an associate arts degree from a  
two-year community college,  
Sullivan believes the bachelor's  
degree offers better chances for  
advancement and earning  
power.

USC nursing students spend  
50 percent of their classroom  
time studying non-nursing  
subjects in the arts and  
humanities sciences and various  
electives.

profession's subordinate role —

## She lives with dying

When children talk like 'wise old men'

When dying people look back  
at their lives and try to make  
some sense out of them, the  
things they remember most are  
the things that Dr. Elisabeth  
Kubler-Ross calls "the  
moments."

"It's those all-too-brief times  
when people have experienced  
unconditional love that they  
remember at the end of their  
lives," Kubler-Ross said at a UC  
Irvine lecture last week.

"Like the time when a father,  
who was always too busy with  
work, took an afternoon off to  
take his son fishing,"  
Kubler-Ross explained.

It is the small things that  
make life worth living,  
Kubler-Ross said.

An internationally recognized  
expert in the field of death and  
dying, Kubler-Ross spoke to an  
audience of nearly 600 at UCI's  
Fine Arts Village Theater.

The charismatic author and  
former professor of psychiatry  
began her pioneering work with  
the terminally ill 20 years ago.  
Since then, she has published  
seven books dealing with death  
and has been a prime mover in  
the field of hospice care for  
terminal patients.

In her work with the dying,  
she said, she finds it is most  
important simply to listen to  
them. She finds terminally ill  
patients have much to teach all  
of us about life and about the  
experience of death — which  
she feels can be positive.

One thing she has learned  
from dying patients is that all of  
us have a certain amount of  
what she calls "unfinished  
business" we must take care of  
before we can die in peace.

"Unfinished business is all the  
negative things we learn — like  
rage, hate, shame and guilt —  
and we've pressed deeper and  
deeper down until we're  
emotionally drained from  
keeping it all inside,"  
Kubler-Ross said.

If we express our feelings and  
settle our score with friends and  
family we will be prepared to  
die, or prepared if someone close  
to us dies unexpectedly, she  
said.

"Do it today," she said. "Don't  
put off all the good things and  
bad things you wish you could  
do or say. Anytime you hold on  
to pain, anger or depression,  
you're doing it to punish  
someone else. People who  
punish have a lot of unfinished  
business."

Dying people, especially  
children, develop their spiritual  
qualities prematurely,  
Kubler-Ross said. "They talk  
like wise old men, and they're  
not afraid to die if you allow  
them to talk about it. I've never  
seen a child that doesn't know  
he's dying."

Kubler-Ross told the story of  
Jeffy, a young leukemia patient  
she once knew. When his doctor  
wanted to try yet another  
experimental treatment on the  
9-year-old, the boy refused and  
asked that he be taken home to  
die.

When he left the hospital  
with his parents, Jeffy asked  
Kubler-Ross to come home with  
him for a few minutes.

Kubler-Ross advocates  
holistic medicine, which takes  
the entire person into account —  
his physical, emotional, intuitive  
and spiritual quadrants, she  
said.

"Holistic medicine doesn't get  
rid of the good things in the  
scientific approach, but it takes  
account of all the patient's  
needs."

The more unconditional love  
we give and receive, and the  
more we rely on intuition rather  
than on cold logic, the better off  
we will be, Kubler-Ross said,  
physically and emotionally.

It is a lesson she learned from  
the dying. "I've learned that  
we're all students and we're all  
teachers," she said.

the block, he was grinning from  
ear to ear. It was his last victory  
— the big dream of his life,"  
Kubler-Ross said.

If Jeffy had been forced to  
undergo more treatment and  
stay in the hospital, Kubler-Ross  
explained, he never would have  
achieved the last ride which  
meant so much to him.

"The next week he called his  
brother into his room, told him  
he would not be alive for the  
brother's birthday which was  
coming up in a few weeks, and  
said he wanted him to have the  
bicycle. 'But on the condition,'  
Jeffy said. 'Don't ever use those  
damn training wheels.' "

"Become intuitive —  
remember all the things you  
learned as a child and didn't  
believe were true," she advised,  
"things like 'ask and it shall be  
given.' "

Attitudes and circumstances  
have changed since she first  
began work with the dying,  
Kubler-Ross said. "You must be  
prepared to face rejection when  
you come up with new ideas,"  
she said. "Twelve years ago I  
would be split in the face for  
working with dying patients.  
Last year I saw the  
inauguration of hospices to take  
care of all the needs of terminal  
patients."

noted. Others take positions in  
home health care, occupational  
health and long-term care of the  
elderly. Less than 5 percent of  
nurses work in doctor's offices.

Sullivan predicts an  
increasing demand for nurses  
specializing in critical care  
services involving sophisticated  
medical technology as well as  
the care of senior citizens, a  
population segment that is  
growing rapidly each year.

This application was filed with the CPUC on November 4, 1982, and seeks only to offset increased depreciation expenses resulting from a study undertaken to review telephone equipment lives and salvage values. Depreciation is the method used by businesses to recognize the cost of equipment over the period the equipment will be used. This recognition allows the company to replace this equipment when it finally fails or is obsolete.

If this application is approved, it will not increase the company's current earnings level. Rate increases resulting from this depreciation rate application, if approved, would be in addition to increases that might result from Pacific's pending general rate increase application (D.O. No. 85).

The California Public Utilities Commission will hold public hearings on this application according to the schedule printed below.

If the application is approved by the Commission, the estimated impact on the average residential customer's monthly bill will be an increase of \$1.56. The \$165.9 million revenue requirement represents a 6 percent increase in Pacific Telephone's total intrastate revenues.

The Commission's staff will review the company's application and any proposed changes in the rates requested by Pacific Telephone. Other telephone companies also propose their rate changes. Although a series of rate proposals may be submitted, the final determination will be made by the Commission after thorough hearings have been completed. Final rates authorized by the Commission may be in different classes of service and/or higher than those listed below.

DEAR DR. STEINCRONH: This isn't exactly a medical question, but I think it's important. I think how a doctor "looks" makes a difference in how he succeeds in treating his patient. Take my doctor, as an example. When I leave his office, I don't have the confidence in him I should have. He doesn't look like a doctor. He wears no tie. I've never seen him in a white coat. I don't get the impression that he's neat and clean. I'm thinking of changing doctors, although he's supposed to be an excellent doctor. Am I being silly? — MRS. C.

DEAR MRS. C.: You're not silly. Anything that interferes with the proper and satisfactory physician-patient relationship may interfere with attaining good health. However, you'll be interested to know that a recent survey of patients indicates that many differ from your point of view.

The report appeared in the *American College of Physicians Observer*. Many questions were asked. For example, does the starched white physician's coat imply competence and inspire confidence? Some think it is too formal and creates a barrier between doctor and patient. Yet, others think that a doctor should look professional and that appropriate clothes lend credibility and a sense of authority. Some patients said, "I'm not here for a fashion show." What they cared most about were such qualities as friendliness, openness and medical expertise.

It will interest you to know, Mrs. C., that 84 percent said that male physicians need not wear ties. One patient concluded, "It is important to me that I be listened to, answered honestly and patiently and in general, be treated as a responsible, decision-making adult. Appearances are inconsequential to accessibility of information and treatment." Think it over before you change doctors.

FOR MRS. K.: Any teen-ager who collects women's shoes or other apparel may require professional help. Is there any way you can convince him to have a frank talk with your family doctor? An apparently unimportant fetish may be only the tip of the iceberg. Deeper trouble requires help, rather than hope that it will disappear in time.

## How to grow plants from seeds

### Germination aided by re-creating natural conditions

If you've tried growing plants from seeds and nothing sprouted, there's probably good reason... or reasons.

A cardinal rule is starting with fresh seeds, said

Alex Grigg, horticulturist at the Sherman Gardens, Corona del Mar.

"Seeds should never be more than a year old. Packets are dated, so be sure to check," he advised about 80 students at a Weekend Gardeners class.

Other reasons for poor germination, cited by Grigg, include overwatering causing roots to rot, using the wrong kinds of amendments that compact soil, and incorrect or no pre-treatment of seeds.

"Think about where the plant is native to, and try to re-create that condition for optimum germination."

For instance, if seeds come from the desert they require warming (300-degree oven for a few minutes).

Aiding germination, seeds are scratched as wind blows them across the sand, he explained. To reproduce this process, use sandpaper. Larger seeds, require a light tap with a hammer to crack the shell.

Certain fruits need a cold treatment (refrigerate for a few weeks), and some seeds need to be soaked overnight in warm water.

The best planting guides, Grigg said, can be found in seed catalogs or gardening books geared to this region.



### Seed planting methods shown

Techniques for starting seeds in flats were demonstrated by Alex Grigg for a Weekend Gardeners class.

"Be sure containers are clean," he stressed. "To sterilize, use a solution of one-part bleach and nine parts water, and rinse thoroughly."

Grigg said flats should have small diamond-shaped holes at the bottom. "Never line them with plastic or newspaper as they hold water in the soil and seeds are likely to rot."

Use a fresh potting or garden soil and fill to one inch from the top. Level with your hand, but don't compact it by tapping it down, he said.

The best method of planting is scattering seeds.

Don't poke them in the soil. If they need covering, sprinkle with soil.

Use a fine spray nozzle and water until it drips out the bottom. Whenever the soil is dry to the touch, water. Repeat until it's time to transplant.

Trays should be kept outdoors in a protected area and in filtered sun, he said. Direct sun is too hot.

"Don't cover with plastic or glass. Seeds will stay too wet and rot."

When stems are strong and the second or third set of leaves appear, the seedlings are ready for transplanting.

However, before they go in the ground, they should first be moved to smaller pots for more maturing.





# Tip to Robinson: Get Lanham back

### BEHIND THE SCENES:

According to sources, Rams owner Georgia Frontiere had narrowed her candidates to two before John Robinson appeared on the scene. Assistant coach Paul Lanham was one of the finalists. The other is unknown, although if Robinson had turned down the job, executive vice president Ray Nagel was supposedly going to make a strong pitch for UCLA's Terry Donahue.

There are still a number of people within the Rams organization, primarily players, who don't want Lanham to depart to join George Allen and the Chicago Blitz staff as a special teams and wide receivers coach.

Add Lanham's exit: There is a catch, though. Lanham left for two reasons: a) his contract with the Rams had run out (as of Feb. 1); b) he needed a job. One, hopefully, that would lead to a head coaching position some day. That's why he chose Allen, who hired Lanham as a Rams assistant in 1978.

More Lanham: He is currently in Arizona at the Blitz's training camp without a contract. Why? Because he's leaving the option open of possibly returning to the Rams if Robinson gives him a call. Logic would seem to dictate that Robinson could use Lanham. First, Robinson needs some NFL experience on his staff. Second, nobody knows the Rams better than Lanham. Third, Lanham would be an extremely popular choice by the players for the team's offensive coordinator spot.

Tip to Robinson: Pick up the phone and call Lanham before it's too late. Lanham has already

been approached by Washington Coach Joe Gibbs, Atlanta Coach Dan Henning and New York Jets Coach Joe Walton. Says Lanham: "If I'm going to stay in the NFL, I'd rather be an offensive coordinator with the Rams and stay in Southern California." George Allen, incidentally, has been pursuing Lanham since November.

## A pitch for triple A

That's Mike Hogan's goal at spring training

Mike Hogan is probably one of the few persons on the face of the earth to base his dreams and goals on words of wisdom from the very quotable Yogi Berra.


Nonetheless, the former Newport Harbor High and Orange Coast College baseball star, about to embark on his first full-year of professional ball, remembers the ex-Yankee catcher's words.

"Yogi said, '75 percent of baseball is 90 percent mental,'" Hogan explains. "You'll see pro players in spring training who don't even think they're in top shape but they know the game so well mentally, inside and out, it's just unbelievable."

"The young kids may run circles around them, but the veterans survive because of the confidence they have in themselves," Hogan adds.

It is confidence which Hogan feels will determine his destiny. It is confidence that he feels will help him make the jump from single A baseball to triple A by the time spring training is over.

Hogan reports to Cocoa Beach, Fla., March 9 where the Houston Astros conduct spring training. He's hoping to make the move from Auburn, N.Y., (the Astros' single A team in the New York-Penn League) to Tucson (the

Astros' triple A team).

"My goal is to put a sparkle in somebody's eye and maybe get that crack at triple A," Hogan says. Still, he's the first to admit that the biggest step in a young ballplayer's career is from A to double A.

Hogan wasted little time making his presence known last season after reporting to Auburn in mid-season. The hard-throwing right-hander

finished with a 5-2 record, seven complete games in 10 starts and a league-leading 1.81 ERA.

Houston was the fifth team to draft Hogan. He had been noticed earlier — in 1981 when he was 11-1 with a 1.90 ERA at Orange Coast and in 1982 when he was 13-2 with a 1.80 ERA at Arizona State.


"I felt like I was ready (to turn pro). I finally had enough confidence to go into the professional ranks," he says.

Hogan's rise to professional baseball has been swift, considering he only played one year of high school varsity ball and that was as an outfielder.

It wasn't until OCC assistant Tim Kelly helped him convert his talents to the mound in summer Metropolitan League baseball prior to his freshman year at Coast, that Hogan got the chance to pitch in a game.

The way Tim Kelly coached pitching really helped me," Hogan says. "He explained the difference between pitching and throwing. You have to think about what you're doing."

When Hogan reports to Florida next month, he'll, no doubt, be reunited with former OCC and Arizona State teammate Don Smith, who was drafted by the Dodgers and is already training in Vero Beach.


### Eagles seek eighth straight CIF opening win

NEW YORK — Major league baseball's championship series, which determines the World Series teams, will be expanded to a best four-of-seven event this year if the players' union approves, Commissioner Bowie Kuhn announced Thursday.

Since the American and National League Championship Series were introduced in 1969, they have been a best three-of-five series.

Kuhn said baseball's executive council made the decision to switch at a meeting here Wednesday.

"It's the first we heard of it," said Arthur Schack, administrator for the Major League Baseball Players Association. "We'll have to study it. Otherwise, we have no comment."

Kuhn, chairman of the 11-man committee, said in a statement: "It is the feeling of the Council that the time has arrived to take this step. It is not an overnight decision. There has been a great deal of sentiment for some time and that feeling continues to grow."

## Smith finds angel roles all the 'Rage'

Certain performers have a thread running through their careers. Sometimes, it's a co-star or director with whom they've worked several times. For others, a word in a title can be the continuing factor, and that's the link between two projects for beautiful Jaclyn Smith. It's almost needless to mention that she was one of "Charlie's Angels" in that hit series, and she'll star in NBC's version of Sidney Sheldon's best-seller "Rage of Angels" on Sunday, Feb. 20 and Monday, Feb. 21.

Smith plays Jennifer Parker, an ambitious young woman training to become a lawyer. An encounter with a witness in a gangland trial tarnishes her reputation. She then finds it hard to establish her own practice, but she pushes onward and overcomes all obstacles, attracting two different suitors: conservative but married attorney Adam Warner (Ken Howard) and ruthless, streetwise underworld lawyer Michael Moretti (Armand Assante).

"I've always looked for departures from *Charlie's Angels*," the model-turned-actress admits, "simply to fight that superficial image; those roles really were interchangeable among the girls. Each character I've wanted to do since then has been totally different from the last; I even consider Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy a character role because of the wigs and the dialect. This role is really the best I've been offered, though, because she's so fully developed. Jennifer is very well written in the book, but my imagination could play a part in determining how she had to appear."

Though Smith was spontaneous to an extent, she also did some heavy preparation for the part. "I worked with a dialect coach, because I do have a bit of a Southern accent, and the courtroom scenes had to sound crisp and clear. I also did legal research, to become familiar with the terms, and spoke with several female attorneys. In a courtroom, a lawyer is really giving a performance; he's an actor in a sense, so the delivery had to be very spunky and certainly not in the soft-spoken manner I really have."

Since Smith gave birth to son Gaston (by her third husband, cinematographer Tony Richmond) shortly before filming began, her maternal duties remained as important as the movie: "I really had Gaston with me everywhere except Acapulco — which was only four days — and Paris, which was also four. He stayed back in New York, but we were together all the time I was shooting there, so I didn't feel cheated."

# ABC's Thursday night insult festival

If you're a veteran situation comedy watcher, you no doubt spotted several familiar trends in the premiere episodes of two new ABC series, "Condo" and "Amanda's," airing at 8 and 8:30 p.m. Thursdays.

First, you realized that old sitcom stars never die. They just get a new name, a new family, a new format and a fresh wagonload of recycled one-liners.

And you noticed that old sitcom themes never die. They just get a change of scenery. If it was funny once to make fun of racial tension between blacks and whites, let's try it between whites and Mexican-Americans. If cranky senior citizens and dimwitted employees were good for some cheap laughs before, by all means do it one more time.

But before taking a closer look at these two new series, let's pause for a brief refresher course in sitcom history.

Back in the 1960s, the airwaves were dominated by corny rural comedies such as "The Beverly Hillbillies," "Petticoat Junction" and "Green Acres." But something happened in the early 1970s: TV sitcoms grew up and moved to the city. Two groundbreaking series, both debuting in 1970, set the tone: "All in the Family" and "The Mary Tyler Moore Show."

Archie Bunker's bunch and the WJM newsroom gang

took slightly different routes in raising sitcom humor to new, more mature heights. "All in the Family" launched a loud, frontal assault on important social issues, employing all the subtlety of a bazooka. Archie, the all-purpose bigot, took on blacks one week, Jews the next, homosexuals the week after that.

The series worked, of course, because of the perfectly balanced ensemble (sweet Edith was always on hand to counter Archie's worst habits) and because the writers were always clever enough to show that Archie's bigotry never paid off.

"The Mary Tyler Moore Show," of course, did not attack social issues as directly, but it was no less revolutionary. It presented an independent, professional woman who had a social life but was not desperate to be married. It was intelligent and unafraid to deal with social issues in a more gentle manner. (During the series' seven-year run, Lou Grant got divorced, Chuckles the Clown died, Phyllis' brother revealed he was gay, Ted Baxter had fertility problems.)

The comedy styles of the two series were quite different. "All in the Family" relied on loud philosophical arguments (between Archie and the Meathread, for example) and outrageous insults (between Archie and the Jeffersons, for instance).

The MTM shows were quieter, relying on the more difficult comedy of character. The laughs were based on

**ONE LIFE TO LIVE:** The mob feels that Jenny may realize who killed Stubbs. She and Larry go out for dinner, unaware that the bottle of wine they have has bacteria placed in it by Tommy. Dee and Asa wed and go on a Texas honeymoon. A lonesome Bo decides to see Becky. While Becky loves Bo, she realizes he's seeing her on the rebound. Free from jail, Marco decides to open up a talent agency and in order to finance it, he steals Samantha's health club mailing list and sells it to a travel agency. Katrina agrees to let Jenny care for Mary. Cassie takes Ian's letter sweater but says she won't go to bed in exchange for it. Wilton Varner, the interior decorator, turns out to be Tango, although no one in Llanview realizes this.

**RYAN'S HOPE:** Joe and Johnny have an argument with Johnny accusing Joe of being back in the mob. Ace gives Angie's dog to Siobhan. Patrick discovers Amanda is having toxic reaction to the potion Catsby gave her and Amanda is hospitalized. Catsby tells Kirk she prevented Amanda from revealing anything about the man in Switzerland. Pat hires an actor who looks like Kirk's former partner in hopes this will smoke out Kirk's secret. Seneca tells Jill and Faith he plans to wed as soon as a viable candidate comes along. Frank Ryan is about to return to New York.

**SEARCH FOR TOMORROW:** George fears Rusty when Tony refuses to deceive Liza any longer. Brian graduates from the police academy. At Stu's urging to take some time off, Joe decides to accept Rusty's offer to become chairperson of his bank. Rusty continues to create tension between Travis and Liza by making Travis believe Tony and Liza were lovers. Jenny learns she can't afford to hire detective to locate her long-lost daughter Danielle. Jo unaware that she is heading a bank which is being used to launder illegal money. Warren takes Suzi on a delayed honeymoon in order to escape Rusty's control. In Trinidad

the complex interaction of people bonded together by unspoken affection, despite their drastically different personalities. What other show could have created hilarious classic episodes out of the death of Chuckles the Clown or Lou Grant's refusal to attend his own surprise birthday party?

Many of the popular sitcoms currently on the air follow in the footsteps of these programs. "Newhart," "Taxi" and "Cheers" are character comedies in the MTM tradition.

ABC's two new Thursday series, "Condo" and "Amanda's" follow the "All in the Family" model, each delivering 30 minutes worth of heavy-handed insults. Neither of these tasteless programs, however, has the underlying heart and occasional moments of poignancy that balanced Archie's anti-social tendencies.

The new series also employ two sitcom veterans: McLean Stevenson, who was Col. Blake on the early "M-A-S-H" episodes, and Beatrice Arthur, who starred as "Maude."

In "Condo," Stevenson portrays a WASP family man who finds his new neighbor, played by Luis Avalos, is a Hispanic landscaper. In predictable fashion, Stevenson early on mistook his neighbor for the condo gardener, and the racial insult battle was under way.

"Do you speak English? Nice to meet one of you who does," Stevenson said.

When he realized the Latino was his neighbor, Stevenson muttered, "Oh, my God . . ."

To which Avalos replied, "If you have one, pray to him for some intelligence."

Later, Stevenson told him, "Go back to your probably enormous family."

Stevenson's own sitcom family was apparently out to lunch when brains were handed out. His younger son (Marc Price) wore stereo headphones constantly and made such intelligent statements as "Ah, Dad, do I have to read? It's Saturday!"

His dippy wife (Brooke Alderson) explained the history of the family's Christmas wreath: "Some black children were selling them door to door, and we felt we'd better play it safe and buy one."

But in a credibility-straining plot turn, the teen-age children from the two families (Mark Schubb and Julie Carmen) fall instantly in love, and get married secretly so their parents won't keep them apart. Then they conveniently forget to tell their parents about it until the girl finds she's pregnant three months later.

So you guessed it! Now, the feuding fathers are in-laws and will be forced to trade insults week after week. What could be funnier?

An old rubber boot, perhaps.

The show's racial humor is pointless and offensive. "Condo" ought to be demolished as soon as possible.

"Amanda's" was a bit funnier because it moved faster. But it wasn't really much of an improvement.

Bea Arthur resurfaces Maude's obnoxious personality as the proprietor of a small Southern California hotel.

She's so rude to her guests, however, it's a wonder anyone would want to stay there. "If there's anything you want, go take a flying leap!" she told one.

In the dining room, another guest complained about the wilted lettuce. "You probably scared it to death," Arthur replied.

Neither her family nor her enemies were spared.

She told rival hotel owner, "If I die before you, I'm to be cremated and my ashes blown in your eyes."

Speaking of her son's wife, she said, "Face it, Marty, the girl is a lemon."

As a back-to-back barrage of insults, "Condo" and

"Amanda's" raise sitcom nastiness to new heights. The fact that the shows included not one likable character didn't seem to bother the producers.

The only antidote for this Thursday night monster festival is a quick trip at 9:30 p.m. to the "Cheers" bar. The characters at that place show a little warmth and compassion now and then, and might restore your faith in humanity.





## Sue Etem . . .

*Artistic style blends with limited-edition collectors plates*

Artist Sue Etem of Huntington Beach has come a long way since starting her professional career in her native state of Texas.

There she worked for a newspaper, illustrating advertising copy for Montgomery Ward.

"I drew a lot of post-hole diggers and union suits," (long underwear) she said.

But she's put an emphasis on painting people ever since, particularly chubby-cheeked children.

And about three years ago, she discovered the world of limited-edition collector's plates. Her artistic style seemed to blend perfectly with the fast-growing business and Etem soon became a leading star among plate collectors.

Her illustration of a blonde child sipping water from a garden hose was named the plate of the year in 1982 for the biggest increase in value over the year.

Initially the plate was sold at \$39.50. At year's end it was quoted at \$132, according to industry sources.

## Bach Festival . . . OC Master Chorale to honor composer

The Orange County Master Chorale will present the county's first two-day Bach Festival Saturday and Sunday at two Santa Ana locations.

The Chorale will begin its musical tribute to the Baroque composer, with a free concert to be held at the First Baptist Church of Santa Ana, 1010 W. 17th St. at 8 p.m. Saturday. Sunday's concert, which will feature one of Bach's greatest masterpieces, "Mass in B Minor," will be held in the Santa Ana High School Auditorium, 520 W. Walnut at 7 p.m.

Widely acclaimed Baroque artists performing at the first event include nationally acclaimed concert artist and University of Southern California instructor Eudice Shapiro; nationally top-ranked organist Marvel Jensen, USC magna cum laude graduate pianist Sandy McCune; and the singing ensemble, the Jane Hardester Singers, led by choral conductor Dr. Jane Hardester. In addition, members of the Orange County Master Chorale, as well as a professional chamber orchestra, will perform at the event.

Shapiro will be soloist for Bach's "Suite No. 3 in D-major" and "Partita in C-major" as well as his "Brandenburg Concerto No. 2 in F-major." Jensen will perform "Passacaglia and Fugue in C-minor," while pianist McCune's solo contribution is Bach's "Concerto in D-minor."

The Jane Hardester Singers will perform "Nach dir Herr, verlanget mich" and will later join with members of the Chorale for their rendition of Bach's "Lobet den Herrn, alle Heiden."

Sponsors who have made it possible for the Chorale to present this program by underwriting the majority of the costs are Bingham Electric Company, Carl Karcher Enterprises, Murdy Foundation, Inc., Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. The second day of the Bach Festival will feature a special presentation of Bach's "Mass in B Minor." Bach completed his setting of the Latin service of Holy Eucharist within the last three years of his life, after a quarter-century of writing and directing the music for St. Thomas Lutheran Church in Leipzig. He divided each of the five traditional movements — those used in every celebration of the mass — into portions for the chorus and portions for soloists.

The composition will be performed by the Chorale under the direction of music director Dr. Maurice Allard.

soprano, who has been associated with the San Francisco Opera for the past three years. Gail Dubinbaum, mezzo-soprano, who debuted in December at the Metropolitan Opera as a member of the company's Young Artists Program, will solo in the "Mass" as will Stephen Amerson, tenor, who was selected as a finalist in the Ventura County Symphony's Young Artist Competition in 1981. Rod Gilfry, bass-baritone, who will soon graduate from USC with a master of music degree in vocal arts, has appeared at concert halls throughout the West. Although he has performed Bach's "Mass in B-minor" previously, this is his first appearance with the Orange County Master Chorale.

The Orange County Pacific Symphony Chamber Orchestra, conducted by Dr. Keith Clark, will join the Chorale for this performance.

"The Chorale was founded in 1956 on the occasion of the City of Anaheim's centennial celebration," according to Donna Bunce, business manager and 12-year member of the Chorale. "The Orange County Master Chorale name was adopted in 1969 to better reflect the countywide nature of its performing locations and membership."

"Dr. Allard is in his fifth season as director of the Chorale. He is well known in Orange County from his 11 years of teaching at the University of California, Irvine, where he was professor of music in the areas of voice and choral work," said Bunce.

The first night's concert is free. Tickets for the Chorale's Sunday concert, Bach's "Mass in B Minor," are \$8.50 for adults and \$5 for seniors and students 18 years and under.

A plate is a plate is a . . . plate?

Not when it is one of the more than 1,100 kinds of limited edition plates currently gracing the shelves and walls of American homes.

Then, it's much more than the utilitarian dish. It's a work of art. A decorative masterpiece. And an investment.

According to James Woodward, manager of the Raphael Galleries, Ltd. of La Jolla and president of the Southern California Association of Plate Collectors Clubs, limited edition plates are the world's most popularly traded art form.

The first California Plate Collectors Convention, scheduled for tomorrow and Sunday at the Anaheim Convention Center is sponsored by the SCAPCC. The convention will feature plates from the world's foremost manufacturers and is expected to draw more than 30,000 plate enthusiasts from the Western United States and Canada. It is open to the public.

Woodward says plate collectors currently number between five and six million nationwide and another 400,000 are joining the ranks annually.

"The perception of collectors plates as affordable and enjoyable art is the underlying reason for the phenomenal growth of the plate market in recent years," says Woodward.

A collectors plate is a decorative plate produced in a limited edition for the purpose of being

collected. They may bear pictures or sculpture and be manufactured in a variety of countries.

Most plates are round and ceramic, from simple terra cotta to true hard-fire porcelain. Others are square or made from a variety of materials — crystal, wood, silver, silverplate, copper or pewter.

Historically, the first collectors plate ever produced was by the Danish firm, Bing & Grondahl, in 1895. Only 400 to 500 copies of the "Frozen Window" were made, with most still in existence.

The key to a collectors plate is a limited edition. Because only certain numbers of plates are made the plates have the potential for increased appreciation.

"Once closed, the edition of a plate is never reopened," explains Woodward. "The market price is determined exclusively by how much collectors are willing to pay."

And, collectors pay plenty for some of the more popular editions. Collectors who purchased the Lalique Annual in 1965 (\$25) or the Goebel Hummel Annual in 1971 (\$30) or the Rockwell Society Heritage in 1977 (\$14.50) have seen their plates increase in market value from 1,275 percent to 7,300 percent.

The most expensive collectors plate is the 1907 Rosenthal at \$5,000. It originally sold for \$1.

According to Woodward, most plates sell (at first issue) anywhere from \$20 to \$50.

## 'Lovesick . . .' A film which suffers from schizophrenia

In "Lovesick," the doctor needs a doctor.

More precisely, a psychiatrist played by Dudley Moore falls in love with a beautiful young patient (Elizabeth McGovern) and agonizes over the unethical affair during visits with a fellow shrink (John Huston).

As a film, "Lovesick" isn't particularly healthy either.

Writer-director Marshall Brickman (Woody Allen's writing partner on "Sleeper," "Annie Hall" and "Manhattan") has tried to inject too many ideas into a vehicle that's too frail to contain them.

He's wound up with a comedy that's not funny enough, a romance that strains credibility and a social satire that barely scratches its target.

An uneven performance by Dudley Moore doesn't help. As the film opens, Moore is a serious New York psychiatrist who consults at a hospital and listens to a succession of wealthy, eccentric patients. He's also quite bored.

During a birthday party, a fellow shrink (Wallace Shawn in a brief but funny appearance) tells Moore about his repressed love for a neurotic young playwright he's treating. Shawn's sudden death prompts the woman to begin seeing Moore for treatment.

Moore has been reasonably credible thus far, but his abrupt infatuation throws the film into an grinding gear change. Before long, Moore is spying on McGovern through Manhattan

and breaking into her apartment to read her diary.

Moore's credibility evaporates as he begins to mimic his Bo Derek-chasing character in "10." Later, a combination of pills and alcohol turns him into a lovable drunk resembling the one he portrayed in "Arthur." McGovern, whose natural charm and beauty graced "Ordinary People" and "Ragtime," fares only a little better. It's easy to imagine her as the object of any man's desire, but she's doesn't show enough intellectual depth to convince us she's a playwright.

To be fair, writer-director Brickman must take much of the blame for the sketchy performances. His thin script doesn't give McGovern, in particular, much to work with.

John Huston is hammy as the older psychiatrist Moore consults. Alec Guinness is more restrained and more effective as the ghost of Sigmund Freud, who pops up now and again as Moore's conscience.

Near the conclusion, Brickman seems to lose interest in the romance. Instead he tries to skewer psychiatry as a whole during a confrontation between Moore and some colleagues who disapprove of his romance.

In his role as Freud, Guinness mutters, "Psychoanalysis was just an experiment. I never meant for it to become an industry."

It's questionable whether even the real Freud could have straightened out this schizophrenic film.

## 'The Entity . . .' An above-average supernatural thriller

Let's get one thing straight up front: Dr. Phil Sneiderman, a psychiatrist who is one of the central characters in "The Entity," is not related to this reviewer, even though he does bear the same name.

Ron Silver portrays this mind doctor, who believes an invisible creature that's been raping Carla Moran (Barbara Hershey) is just a figment of her imagination.

We in the audience, know better, of course,

because we've seen Carla getting bounced around her bedroom by an unseen presence. We've even seen this creature attack her son with lightning bolts.

Despite some muddled plotting, "The Entity" is an above-average supernatural thriller with several effective white-knuckle sequences.

While it's haunted house effects aren't as flashy as those in "Poltergeist," the film does

present an interesting tug of war between skeptical psychiatrists and ghost-hunting parapsychologists.

Above all, "The Entity" boasts an outstanding lead performance by Barbara Hershey. The film forces Hershey to endure quite a few physical indignities at the hands of the unseen force, but her character emerges as a strong-willed, caring woman struggling to regain control of her life.

After the creature's first attacks, including a scary runaway car episode, Carla seeks help from Dr. Sneiderman, the unrelated psychiatrist mentioned earlier.

He believes the attacks are imaginary events, linked to Carla's troubled childhood. When his treatment fails, however, she turns to a group of

parapsychologists, who are quickly convinced a real psychic phenomenon is haunting the woman.

Over the psychiatrist's objections, the ghost hunters set out to trap the being in liquid helium, setting up a literally chilling climax.

As the psychiatrist, Ron Silver, who played an obnoxious producer to perfection in "Best Friends," gives a more low-key, yet no less intense performance here.

Frank DeFelitta scripted, from his novel. While he sets up an interesting debate between the different scientific groups, he doesn't adequately resolve the quarrel.

Veteran director Sidney J. Furie ("The Ipcress File," "Lady Sings the Blues"), handles the suspense sequences well and keeps the film grounded closer to reality than is usual for this sort of chiller.

Jimmy Richmond knew if he waited long enough, a plot of land surrounded by cauliflower fields

along Beach Boulevard would make an excellent site for a restaurant. In 1966, 11 years after the property was purchased, he opened Francois as a house of fine continental cuisine at competitive prices.

Francois seems an anomaly amid the cacophony of the major thoroughfare, with its endless string of car dealerships, fast-food eateries and gas stations. But once inside the restaurant, the noise and noxious auto fumes disappear. Diners instantly are

enveloped by rich wood paneling, leaded glass, antique chandeliers and high-back chairs accented by white linen, elegant silverware and china and a carnation at each table.

Service likewise was found to be helpful and of highest quality; attention you'd expect at restaurants charging twice as much for dinner entrees. It's the kind of ambiance and culinary excellence forged from Jimmy's lifetime experience in the restaurant trade.

His son, Frank, now is at the helm of this popular hangout among Huntington Beach locals. On any visit you'll also find the cordial and attentive service offered by Arnold Lindqvist and Gustavo Populus, who add the flavor of a European bistro.

The dinner menu is a popularity contest of continental favorites. Francois is well known for its flambe entrees, including specialties such as chicken Grand Marnier (\$12.95) and roast duck flambe with liquors and orange sauce. Among the three a la carte soup and salads list is a popular spinach salad flambe (\$3.75).

Our meal was launched with a complimentary homemade beef and chicken liver pate, served with flowered radish and parsley garnish and a heaping basket of crackers. It's a Francois tradition that others would do well to imitate.

Dinners are served with choice of soup or salad. My guest chose a salad with vinaigrette, a rather un-

distinguished plate of iceberg lettuce and shredded carrots. But the soup of the evening, cream of vegetable, was a most remarkable brew. It's made from a creamy chicken stock and is brimming with fresh garden-fresh vegetables, a sheer pleasure to the palate.

My guest's rack of lamb (\$16.75) was cooked to order and accompanied by sculpted mashed potatoes, green beans with onions, red peppers and brussels sprouts as well as mint jelly and mint sauce. The picture was made complete with a finger bowl and a requested sampling of chef James Pigage's savory bearnaise sauce.

I opted for one of the restaurant's longtime specialties, boned chicken breasts flamed at your table with brandy, Grand Marnier, apricots and ginger and saddled with wild rice and broccolini with butter sauce. The chicken was moist and tender and the flambe performance added a festive mood to our meal.

If you still have room after one of Francois' sumptuous feasts, you'll find a most tempting dessert list. The sweet tooth might enjoy strawberries Romanoff, crepes suzette, bananas Foster, crepes Fitzgerald or cherries jubilee, all at the relatively modest price of \$5.25.

The bar offers coffee diablo, cappuccino and espresso for after-dinner enjoyment. The saloon each evening also features the tunes of pianist Blaine Hardin.





Newman gives his best performance in years as a drunken lawyer who pulls himself together to try a longshot case against a powerful legal firm representing the Catholic Archdiocese of Boston. High-octane direction by Sidney Lumet ("Prince of the City").

**THE LAST UNICORN:** Rated G, this is another animated version of a novel—but this time it's for adults as well as the kids. The story, based on a fantasy by Peter S. Beagle, follows the odyssey of a unicorn on her search for another of her own kind. Features the voices of Mia Farrow, Robert Klein, Alan Arkin and Jeff Bridges.

**THE HOUSE ON SORORITY ROW:** Rated R, with Kathryn McNeil and Eileen Davidson. A well-made, suspenseful horror film with surprisingly little of the blood and gore most of these flicks concentrate on.

**SOPHIE'S CHOICE:** Rated R, stars Meryl Streep in a soul-deep performance which is strong enough to eclipse the film's shortcomings. Streep disappears completely into her role as a concentration camp survivor haunted by guilt. But the film, at nearly three hours long, may tax the patience of action film addicts.

**TIMERIDER:** Rated PG, this is a humorous, fast-paced action film based on a time warp which hurtles the main character back into old Mexico. Stars Fred Ward as biker Lyle Swann, with Belinda Bauer and Peter Coyote.

**TIMEWALKER:** Rated PG. Science-fiction film about a mummy who breaks loose on a college campus. Though it is silly, shallow and humorless, the film does manage to work up some suspense.

**TREASURE OF THE FOUR CROWNS:** Rated PG, this is a 3-D adventure story with advanced special effects, masks and a stone castle centerpiece.

**THE ENTITY:** Rated R. Barbara Hershey gives an outstanding performance as a young mother who is repeatedly attacked by an unseen presence. Despite some muddled plotting, the film boasts some effective white-knuckle sequences and presents an interesting tug of war between psychiatrists and parapsychologists.



The plate also was named collectible of the year by the National Association of Limited Edition Dealers along with an art work by Norman Rockwell.

She also will be vying for top billing Saturday and Sunday at the first California Plate Collectors convention at the Anaheim Convention Center.

Industry sources say that an estimated 5.9 million people — a 4000 percent increase from 1971 — collect plates and more than 400,000 new enthusiasts will be added this year.

Etem is not involved with transferring her art to the collector plates.

Once she finishes her paintings in the studio of her second story home, she turns them over to a producer.

The painting, usually done in acrylics, is transferred to the plates by a photographic process.

Etem's works have become so popular with collectors, says her son and business agent Darrin, that her paintings are sold before she can finish them.

She was born in Fort Worth and has been involved in art since her childhood.

She and her husband Maury and their three sons lived in Europe for several years and the travel, she says, gave her a chance to study such classic artists as Velasquez, Goya, Jacques-Louis David and Murillo.

Etem said the experience fed a desire to want to duplicate the works of the masters.

# County's image changes under scrutiny

Orange County is wealthy, well-educated, expensive to live in, politically powerful and ethnically diverse.

That may not exactly be new information. But 37 customers paid \$150 each to learn yesterday how computers could turn that information into valuable market research on which to plan private industry growth and government services.

The Rose Institute of State and Local Government, based at Claremont McKenna College in Claremont, zeroed in on Orange County as a pilot computer study because, says director Alan Heslop, its rapid growth makes it a laboratory for studying population development.

The institute also assembled experts at the Registry Hotel in Irvine to expand on some of its findings.

High housing prices and traffic

- Tourism nets \$4 billion annually and one in 10 county workers earns a living at it.
- Farm land may disappear soon. It's decreased 44.8% since 1972.
- 20% of county households earn more than \$50,000 a year.

congestion will limit expansion, said economist Richard Ayer of Security Pacific National bank. The county won't grow economically as quickly as it did in the last decade, but it will grow, he said.

Agriculture is dwindling. Technology and tourism are growing, said the experts.

Also growing is Orange County's Republican voter registration, and with it the political clout to affect statewide

elections, said Dr. Tony Quinn, consultant to the California Assembly Republican Caucus.

Some of the other Rose Institute findings showed an increase in the number of county residents who now work here, rather than commute to outside jobs. Many of those people work in technological fields.

But tourism still racks in \$4 billion a year here, and one out of every 10 county workers earns income from the tourist trade.

## Big tax victory for Rams

Team will get \$700,000 refund

The Los Angeles Rams football team posted its first win of the season yesterday, but the victory came in an Orange County hearing room rather than on the gridiron.

The county Assessment Appeals Board ruled that the National Football League franchise and owner Georgia Frontiere were entitled to a more than \$700,000 property tax refund for the team's use of portions of Anaheim Stadium in 1980-81 and 1981-82.

The three-member hearing panel also ordered that the value of the Rams interest in the stadium be reduced, which in turn will reduce the amount of the team's annual tax assessment.

The Rams now will pay approximately \$150,000 per year in property taxes compared with the \$355,000 the county assessor had been claiming, said Kent Giboney, an appraiser in the assessor's office.

At issue in the hearing, which lasted nearly two weeks, was the formula by which appraisers determined the Rams possessory interest in the 70,000-seat stadium. Possessory interest is

## Jail expansion under fire

County civic center panel voices opposition

The Orange County Civic Center Commission has added its voice to the growing chorus of opposition to construction of a new county jail on a parcel adjacent to the current jail in Santa Ana.

With one commissioner absent, the board's other four members voted yesterday to register strong opposition to construction of a medium-maximum security jail in the city's civic center.

Commissioner Vernon Evans, a former Santa Ana mayor, called the proposed facility a "super jail" that should not be located in the city. He said he would support any efforts to raise funds to fight placement of the jail in Santa Ana.

Commissioner Terry Mosbenko said the commission's resolution is intended "to remind (Orange County) supervisors the jail does not belong in Newport Beach, Huntington Beach or Santa Ana either when there are so many

desolate sites available."

The commission's action, however, is purely advisory, said Michael McLean, commission chairman. The commission is composed of five members, two appointed by county supervisors, two by the Santa Ana City Council and one member selected by the four others.

The panel is not empowered to

reject or approve of any projects slated for the Santa Ana civic center. It was established to raise money to finance approved civic center construction projects, according to county officials.

The Board of Supervisors voted recently to limit its search for a new jail site to three locations, one in downtown Santa Ana, the other two in remote canyons east of Anaheim.

## Dentist's woes mount Restraint sought after deaths, arrest

The legal troubles of Costa Mesa dentist Tony Protopappas mounted today as authorities planned to seek a temporary restraining order to restrict the Laguna Beach man's use of anesthesia in his practice.

Deputy District Attorney Hal Morgan said authorities also may attempt today to obtain a court order barring Protopappas from practicing dentistry altogether

until an investigation involving the deaths of two patients is completed.

Officials from the state Attorney General's Office, the state Department of Consumer Affairs and the Orange County District Attorney's Office were scheduled to appear this morning in Orange County Superior Court, police said.

Authorities have been investigating the deaths of two women who died following

treatment at the dentist's office at 534 W. 19th St. A 13-year-old Sacramento girl also treated by Protopappas remains in critical condition.

Officials said all three patients had been given anesthesia prior to developing medical complications. Cathryn D. Jones, 31, of Costa Mesa died Sunday and Minna Kim Andreassen, 23, of Huntington Beach, died Sept. 20. Patricia Craven, 13, remains (See DENTIST'S, Page A2)

## Dental patient critical

The family of a 13-year-old girl, who is suffering from apparent brain damage and kept alive by life-support systems, is waiting today for a miracle.

Patricia Craven of Sacramento has remained in critical condition at Mission Community Hospital since she was rushed there Feb. 8 following dental treatment earlier that day at the Costa Mesa dental office of Tony Protopappas.

Attorney David Fishman, who represents the family, said yesterday that the girl's mother, Patricia Craven Russ, decided to take her daughter to the Costa Mesa dentist because he had previously treated Russ.

Fishman said the girl entered the dentist's office at 10 a.m. to have some cavities filled and wisdom teeth removed. The attorney said she was unconscious when she left the dentist's office at 6:30 p.m. She had been given anesthesia.

The attorney said Protopappas had assured the mother that Patricia "would come out of it soon."

After arriving at her son's home in Mission Viejo Russ called paramedics when she discovered that her daughter had stopped breathing, Fishman said.

"I understand she's being kept alive by life support systems," said Fishman. "There's a flat EEG (electroencephalogram). The family is trying to decide what to do."

Authorities are investigating why Cravel slipped into a coma and why two other patients died after being treated by Protopappas.

## HB street 'washed' by spilled foam

Huntington Beach took a bath yesterday.

Five hundred gallons of liquid foaming agent used in laundry detergents spilled from a truck and flooded a busy street.

"If we had poured water on it, we'd have had a soap bubble for

The road was closed from 12:50 p.m. until 7 p.m.

Police said a plastic container overturned and the concentrated liquid poured out through the sides of the truck.



Costa Mesa undercover detectives arrested Protopappas Wednesday night at his office on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon on two officers, carrying a concealed weapon and possession of cocaine.

Protopappas' attorney, Robert Covello, said yesterday the dentist told him he was bringing the cocaine home to his brother to use as a pain killer following extensive dental surgery. Protopappas had performed a few days earlier.

Covello also said Protopappas didn't realize that the two men were officers when he allegedly drew a 9 mm pistol. Covello said that the dentist was carrying the

weapon because of alleged "numerous death threats" made by an unidentified male caller Wednesday.

Costa Mesa police Lt. Jack Calnon said a substance believed to be cocaine was found inside a film canister in the dentist's jacket. He also said the officers had identified themselves.

At the time of his arrest, Protopappas was carrying two satchels containing the medical records of the three patients, police said. Calnon said Protopappas surrendered the documents to officers, who made copies.

Police records show that prior to this week, Protopappas has contacted them six times in the last four years to complain about alleged threats made by disgruntled employees, a former business associate and former boyfriends of women he dated.

## Khadafy threatens action if 'pushed too far'

Libyan strongman Col. Moammar Khadafy has threatened military action if Libya is "pushed too far" by U.S. naval maneuvers that might extend into southern Mediterranean waters claimed by his country.

"We will not permit America or any foreign state to enter the Gulf of Sidra or any other part of Libyan waters," Khadafy said Thursday in a speech to his Parliament. "The Libyan people are ready to fight to defend their land, their water and skies."

## Australia fire still out of control

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Fire roared through the parched hills ringing Melbourne today after a series of killer blazes scorched the drought-punished southeast coast, leaving farms and forest looking like they were "attacked by napalm."

At least 69 bodies had been found, including those of 12 volunteer firemen who died when flames engulfed two fire trucks in Cockatoo. By late yesterday, about 900 people were reported injured, and officials estimated damage along a 500-mile stretch affected by the brushfires at \$400 million.

Badly burned animals were being shot today by workers from the agricultural department in the state of Victoria. A spokesman said at least 15,000 sheep and 8,000 cattle had died in the fires, which

destroyed about 750 Victoria farms.

"The fire-hit areas of Victoria looked like they had been attacked by napalm," said Adm. Sir James Murray, the governor of that state. "It was like a giant flame-thrower," an exhausted firefighter said.

By late yesterday, more than 4,000 firefighters had controlled most of the brushfires, except for those in the hills around Melbourne, Australia's second largest city.

The blazes, which began Wednesday, consumed about 3,000 homes in seven towns, in Victoria and the state of South Australia, authorities said. Some of the homeless slept on cricket fields.

Thousands of acres of farmland, brush and forest were devastated. Regal stands of pine and eucalyptus became giant bonfires

as flames grew 300 feet high. Desert winds of up to 80 mph fanned flames as they lashed through the Adelaide hills and down the coast past Melbourne into the Dandenong Ranges. "The wind was like it came from a huge hair dryer," said a man who lost his home.

"The roar of the wind and the flames were horrific, it was like a train," said Alanor Gray, who lost her store in Macedon. "The fire was coming up the highway like a fireball."

"A panzer division going through could not have caused so much damage," said Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser after inspecting the devastation.

In Cockatoo, where the 12 firemen died, two men sat on the roof of a school and hosed it down to help save the lives of 120 children who were inside.

## San Diego plane crash kills four

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The death toll rose to four today in the fiery crash of small plane that smashed into a department store parking lot last night.

Ed Hastings, 23, critically burned in the fire that engulfed the cockpit of the twin-engine Piper Aerostar, died at 4:30 a.m. at University Hospital, said deputy San Diego County coroner David Lodge.

The pilot, Marden Dixon, 41, a Provo, Utah attorney and father of six, remained in critical condition at University with burns over 91 percent of his body, a nursing supervisor said.

Hastings, of Battle Mountain, Nev., was a student at Brigham Young University in Provo, Lodge said.

Dixon and Hastings, their clothes on fire, had escaped the flaming cockpit after the plane went down shortly after takeoff
